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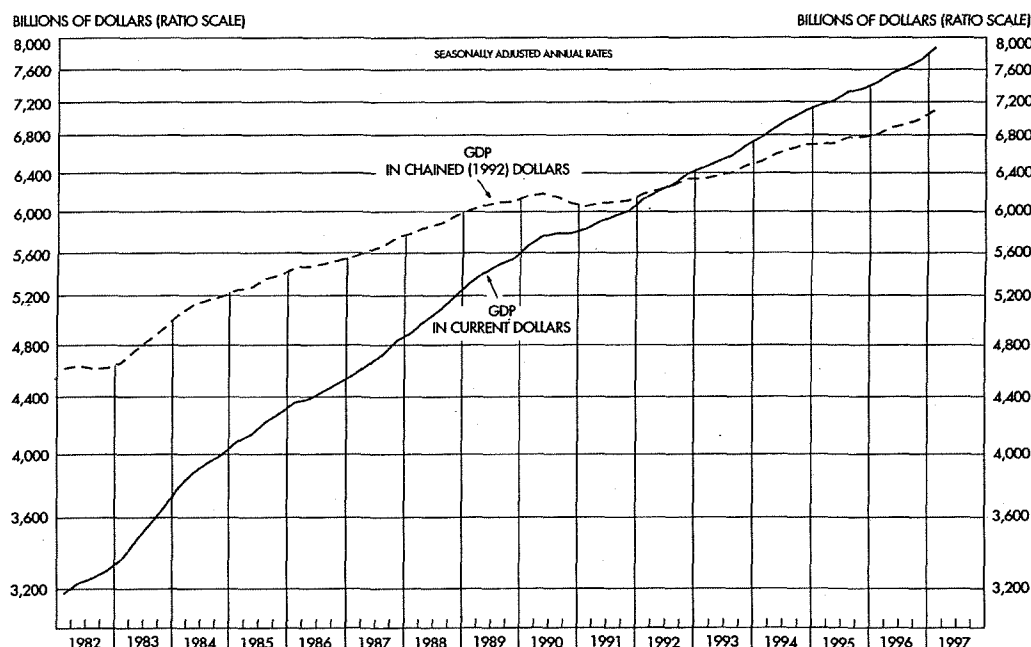
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TOTAL OUTPUT, INCOME, AND SPENDING

GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT

In the first quarter of 1997, according to revised estimates, current-dollar gross domestic product (GDP) rose 8.3 percent (annual rate), real GDP (GDP in chained 1992 dollars) rose 5.9 percent, and the implicit price deflator rose 2.2 percent.

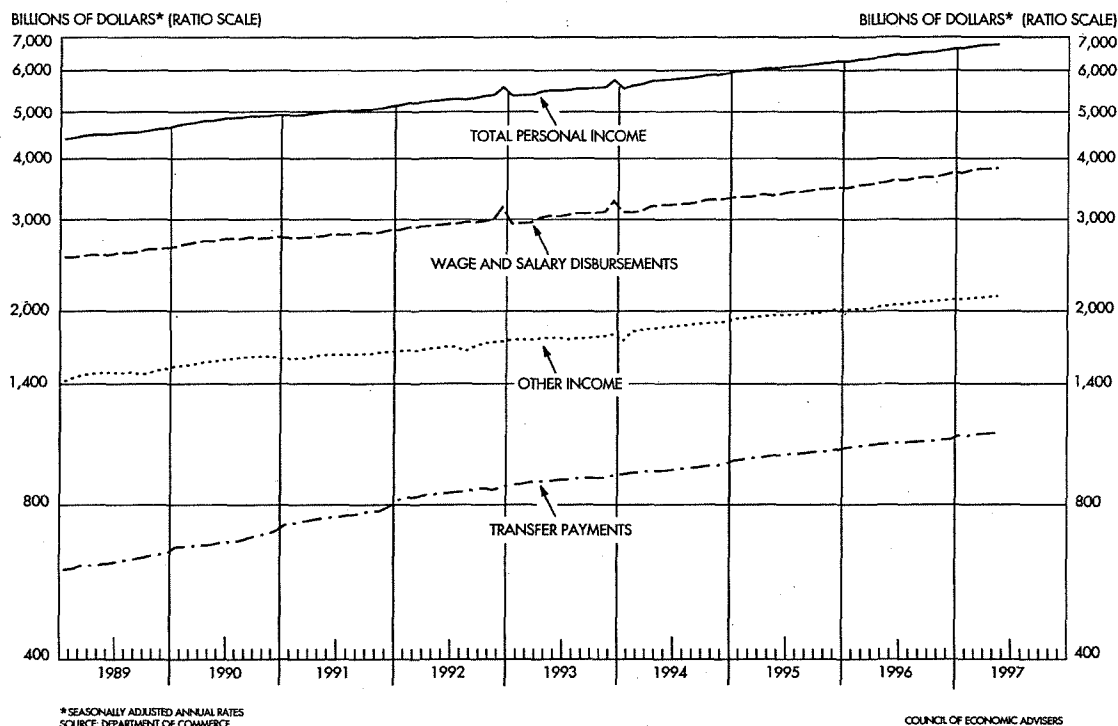

Personal income rose \$19.4 billion (annual rate) in May, following an increase of \$14.9 billion in April. Wages and salaries rose \$9.7 billion in May, compared to an increase of \$3.3 billion in April. In May, private-sector employment and average hourly earnings rose; average weekly hours were unchanged.

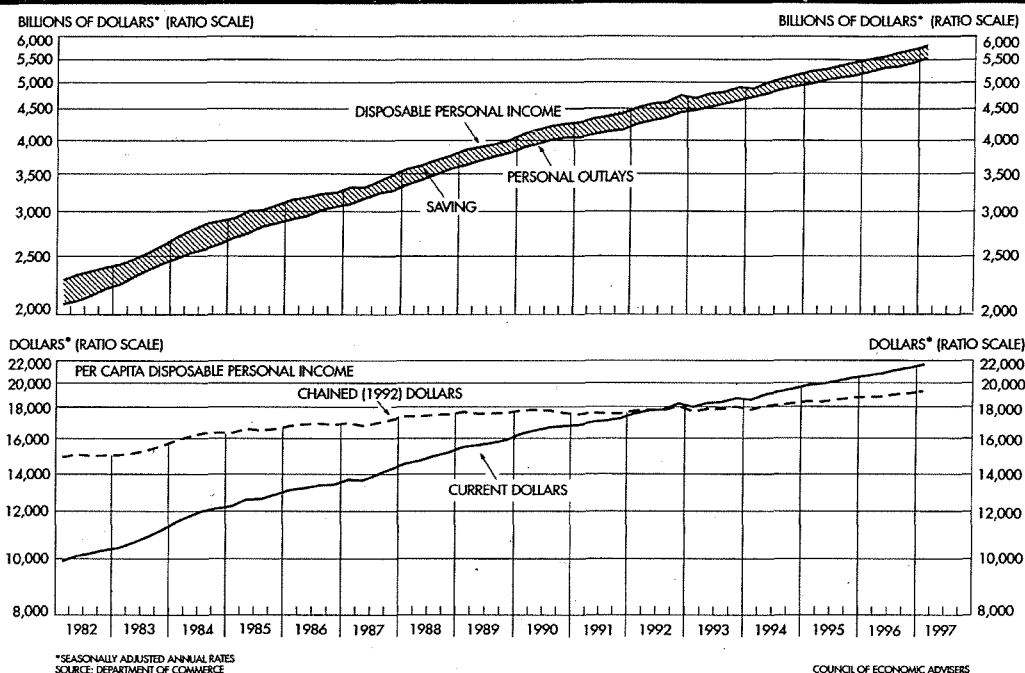

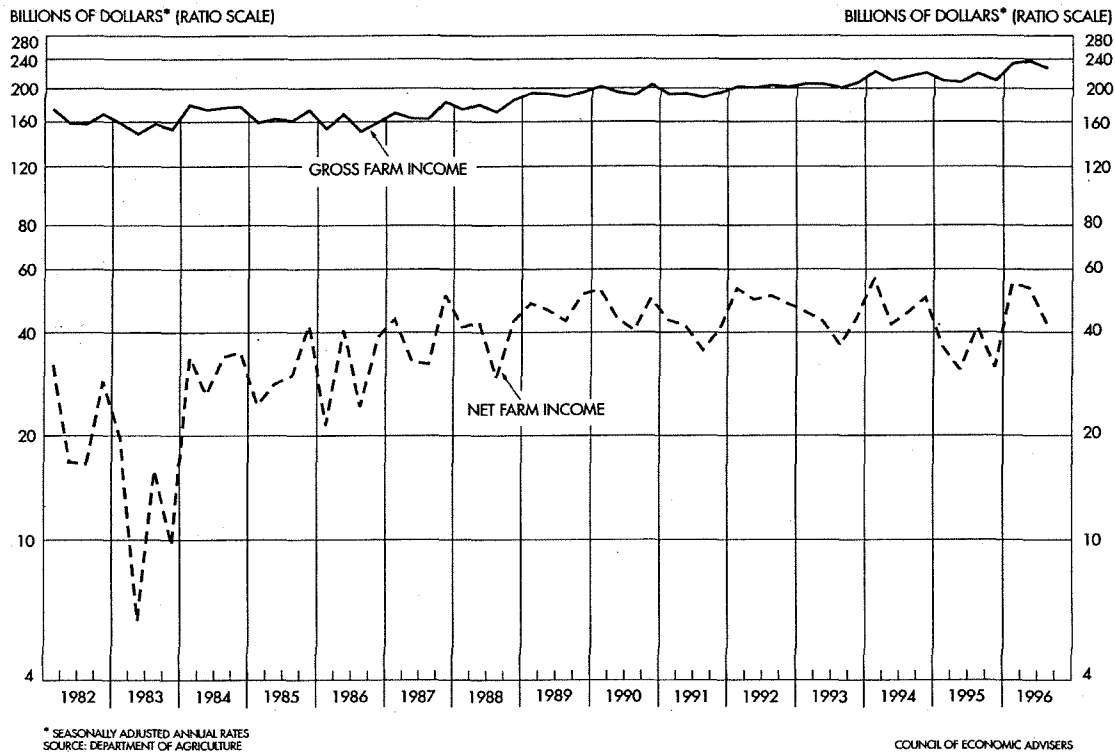

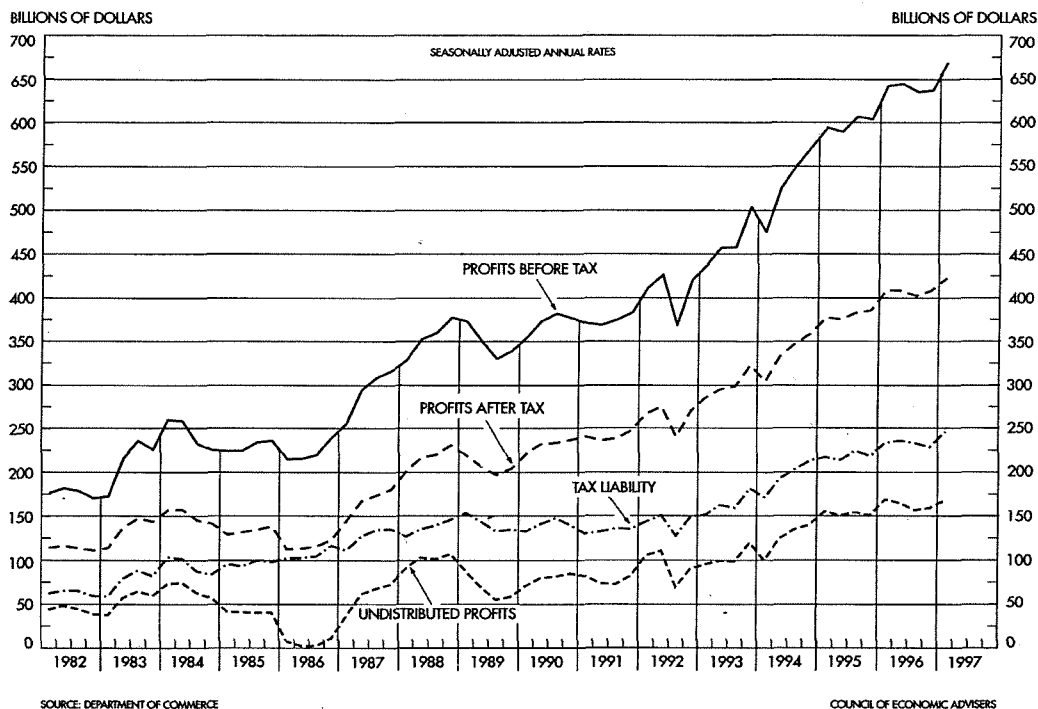

CORPORATE PROFITS

In the first quarter of 1997, according to revised estimates, corporate profits before tax rose \$31.4 billion (annual rate) and profits after tax rose \$14.1 billion. Financial profits had been reduced \$18 billion in the fourth quarter of 1996 to reflect a special assessment on thrift institutions to recapitalize the Savings Association Insurance Fund.

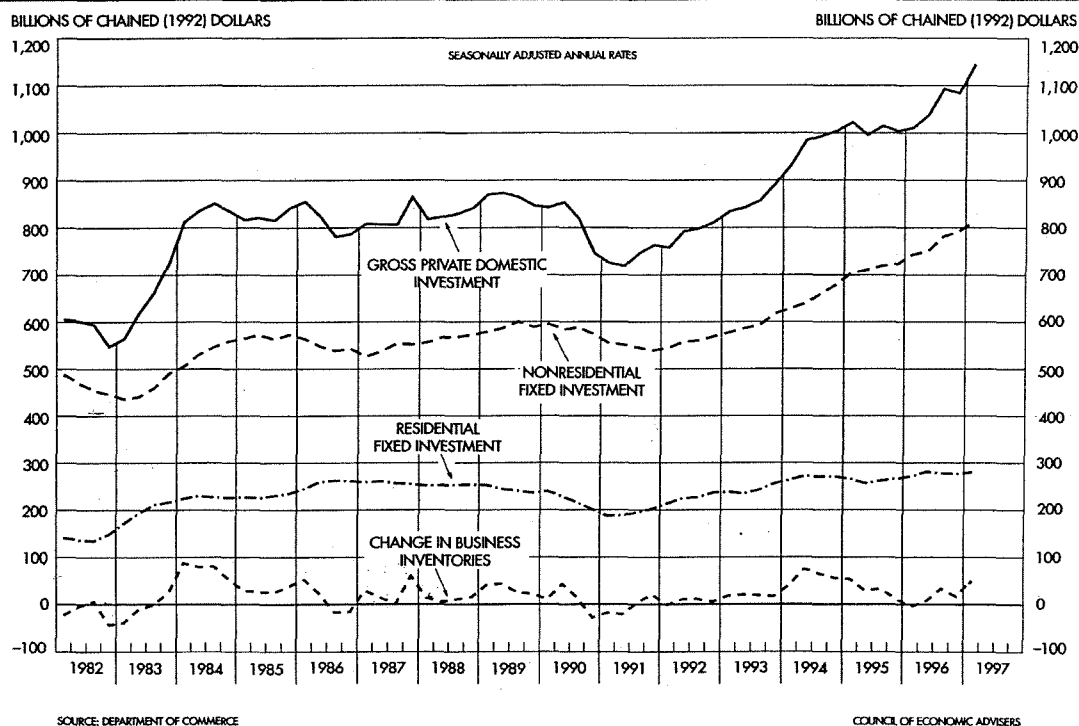

In the first quarter of 1997, according to revised estimates, nonresidential fixed investment in chained (1992) dollars rose \$21.0 billion (annual rate) and residential investment rose \$4.5 billion. There was an increase of \$48.6 billion in inventories following an increase of \$17.1 billion in the fourth quarter.

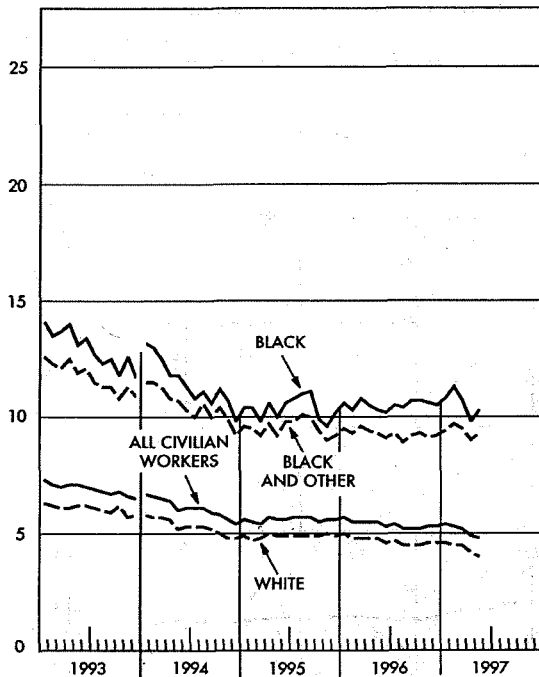

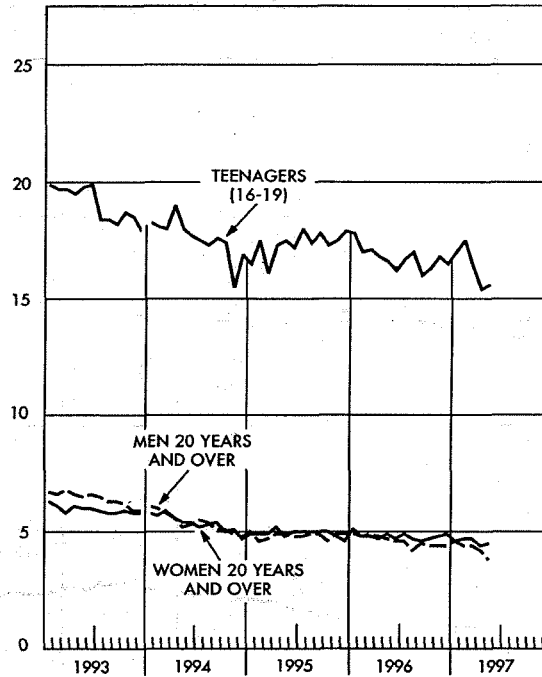

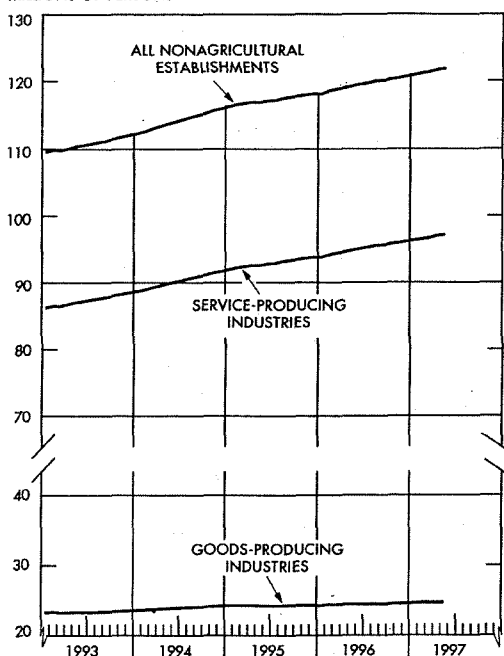

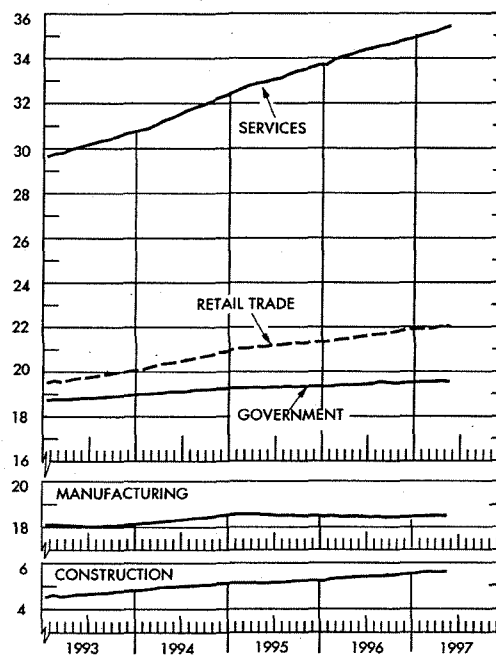

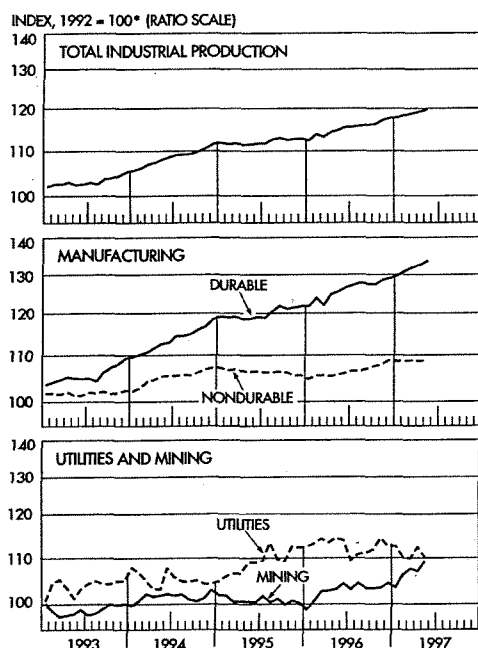

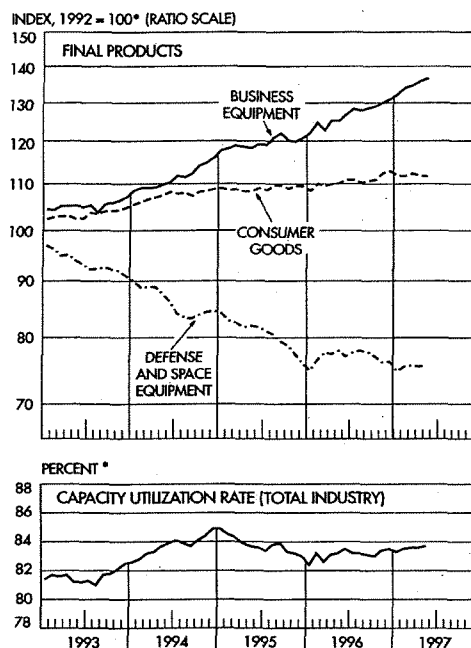

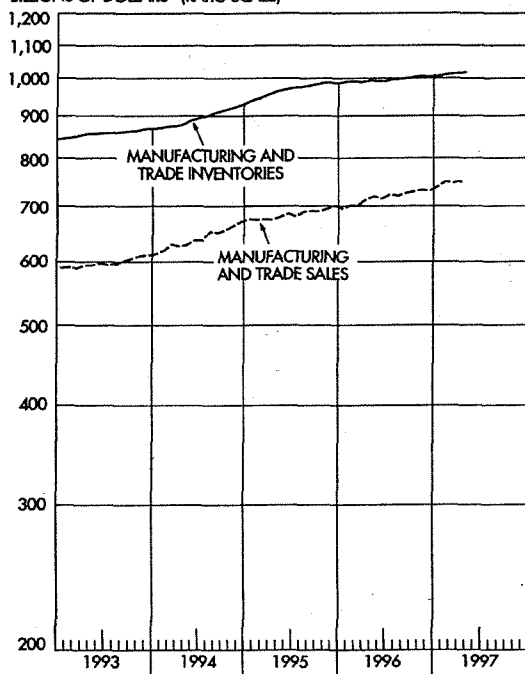

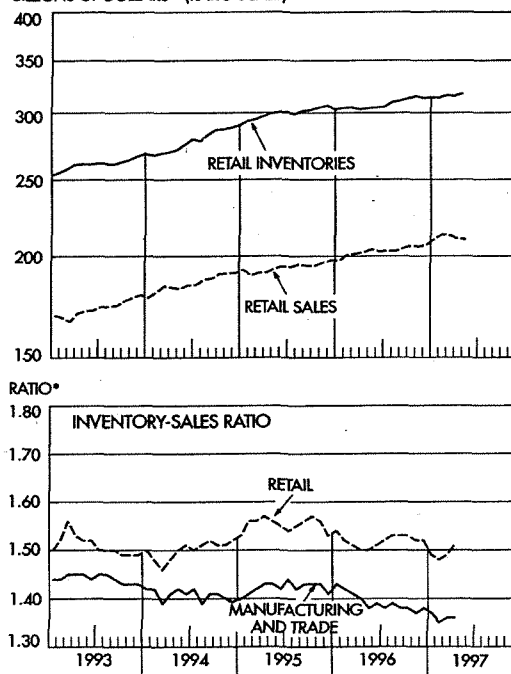
BUSINESS SALES AND INVENTORIES—Manufacturing and Trade

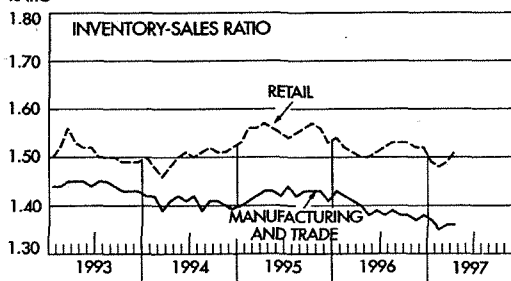
BILLIONS OF DOLLARS* (RATIO SCALE)

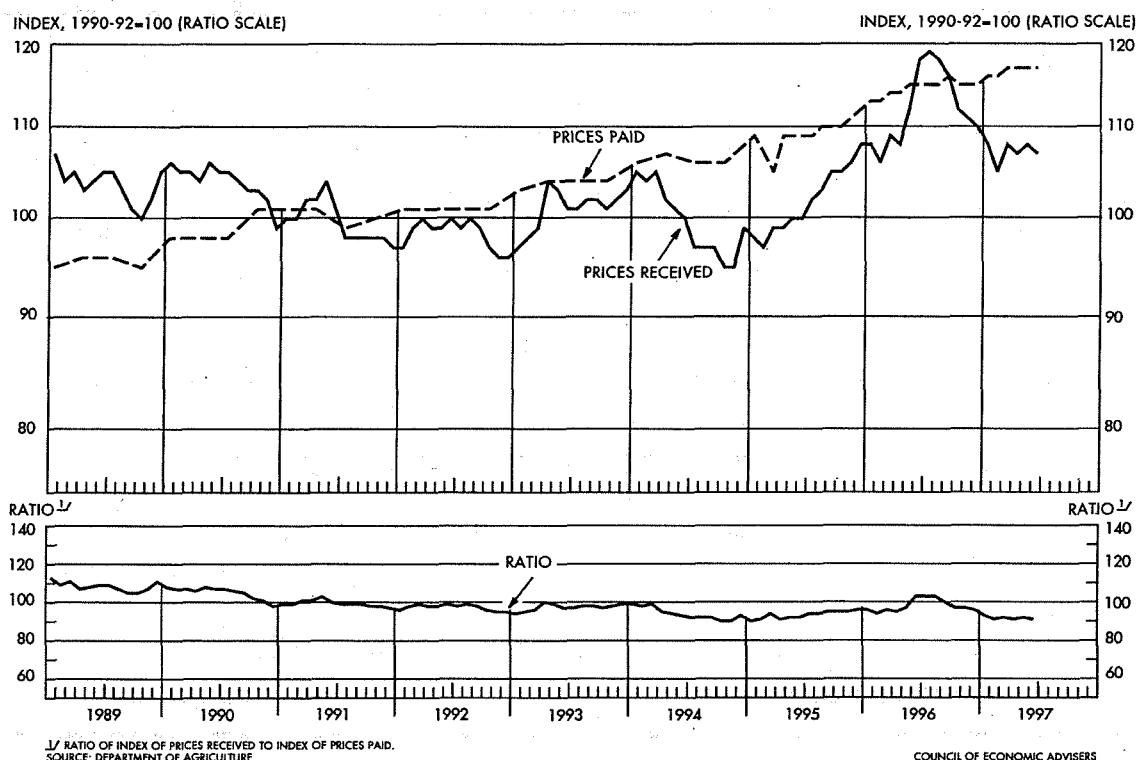

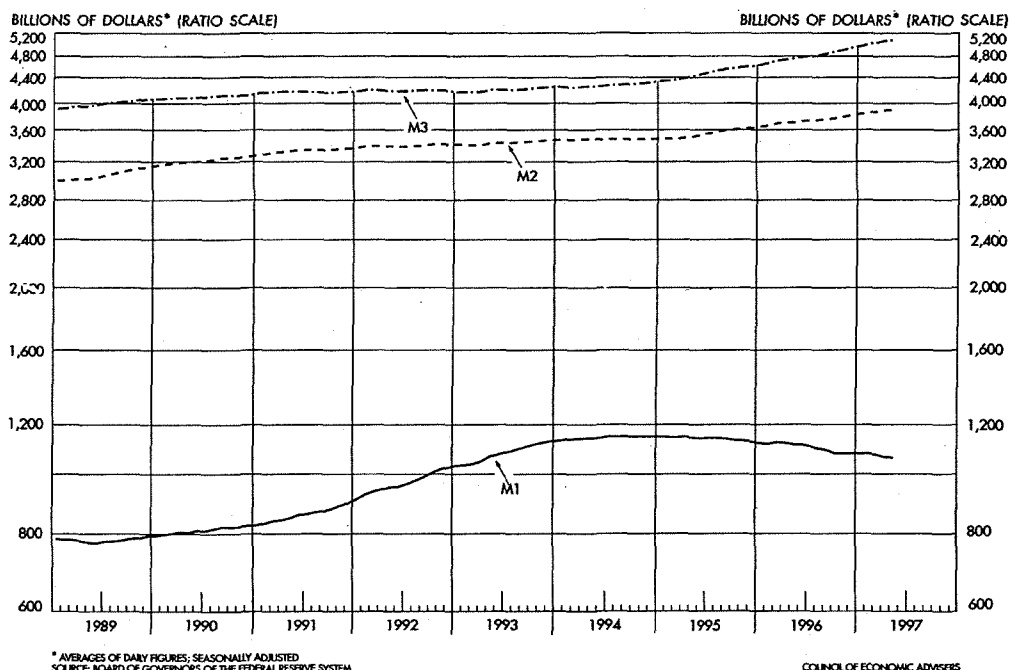

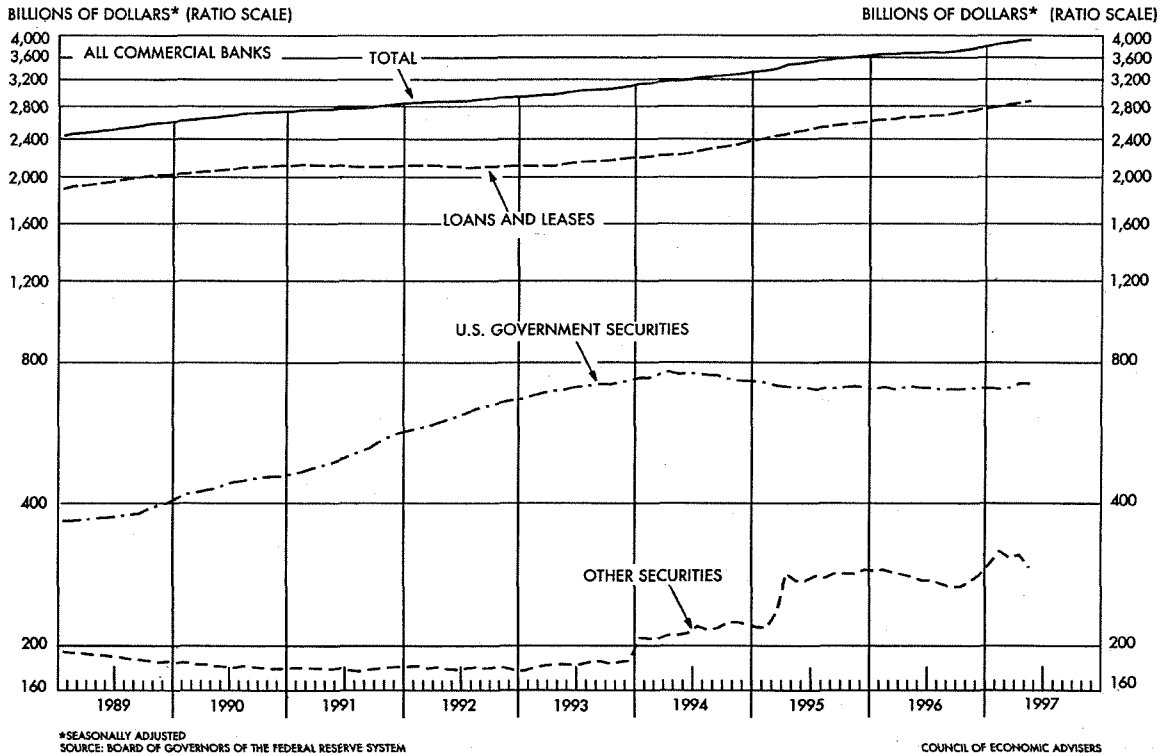

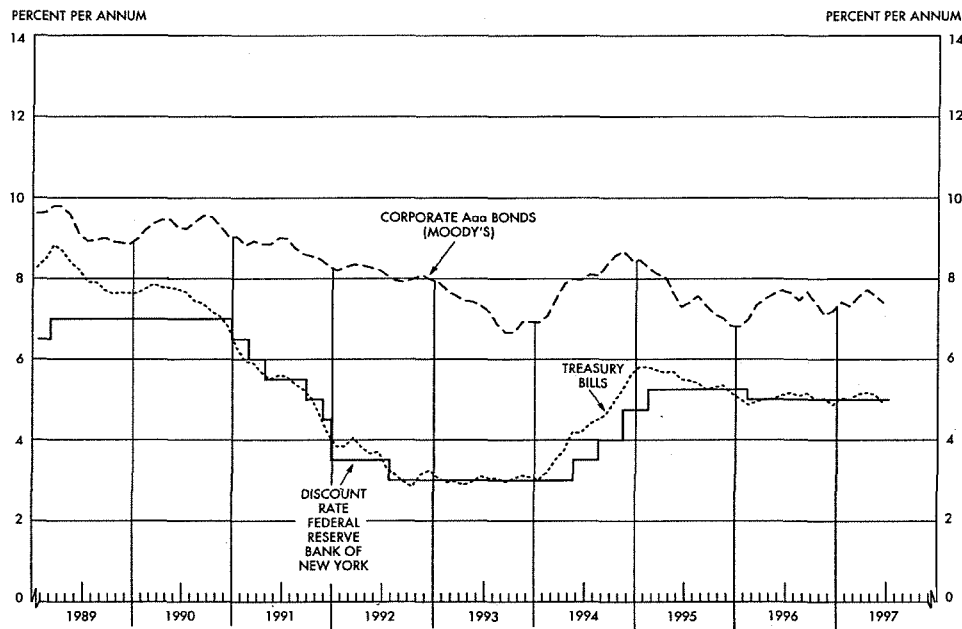

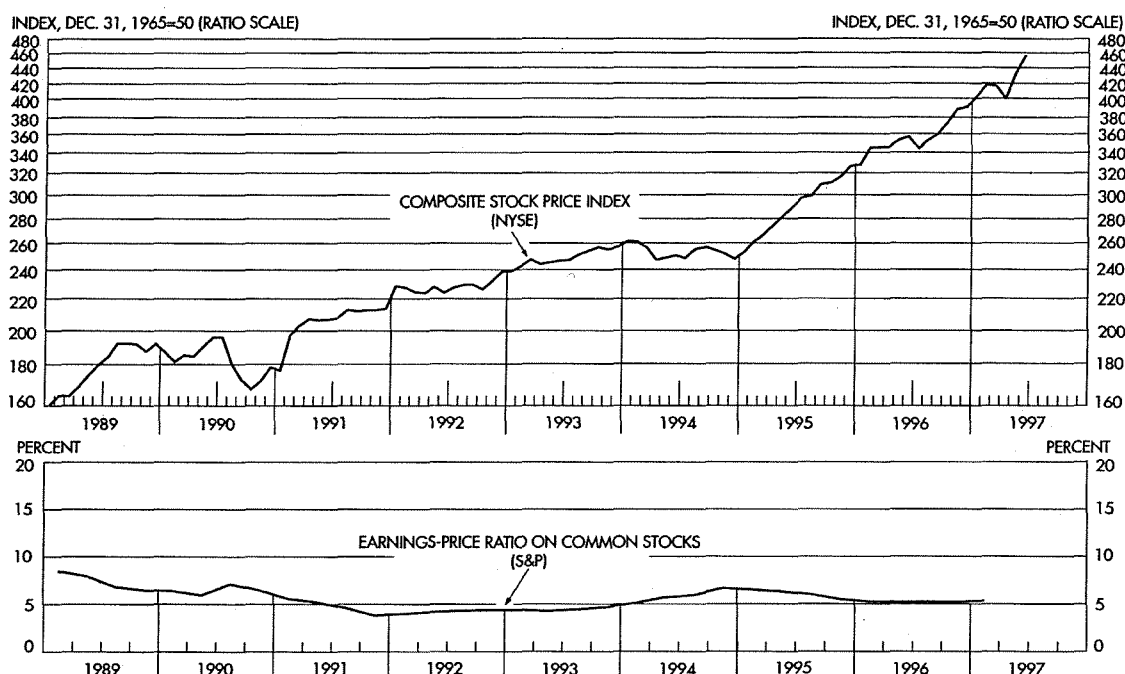

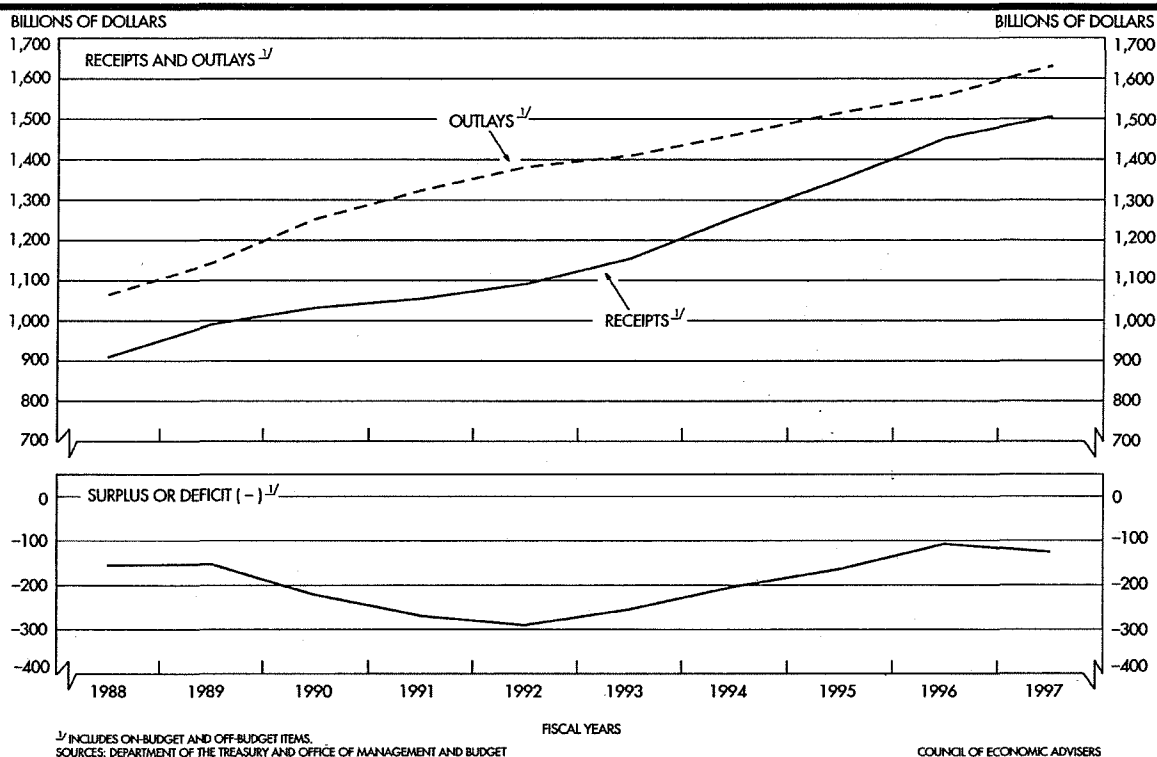

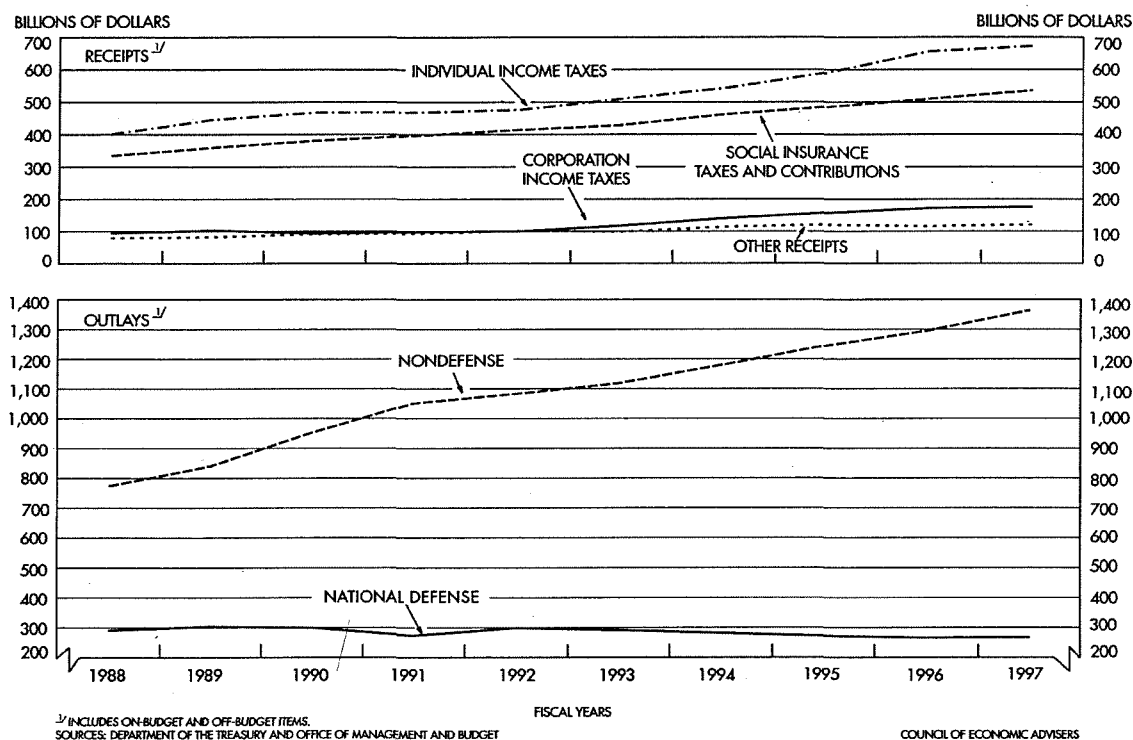

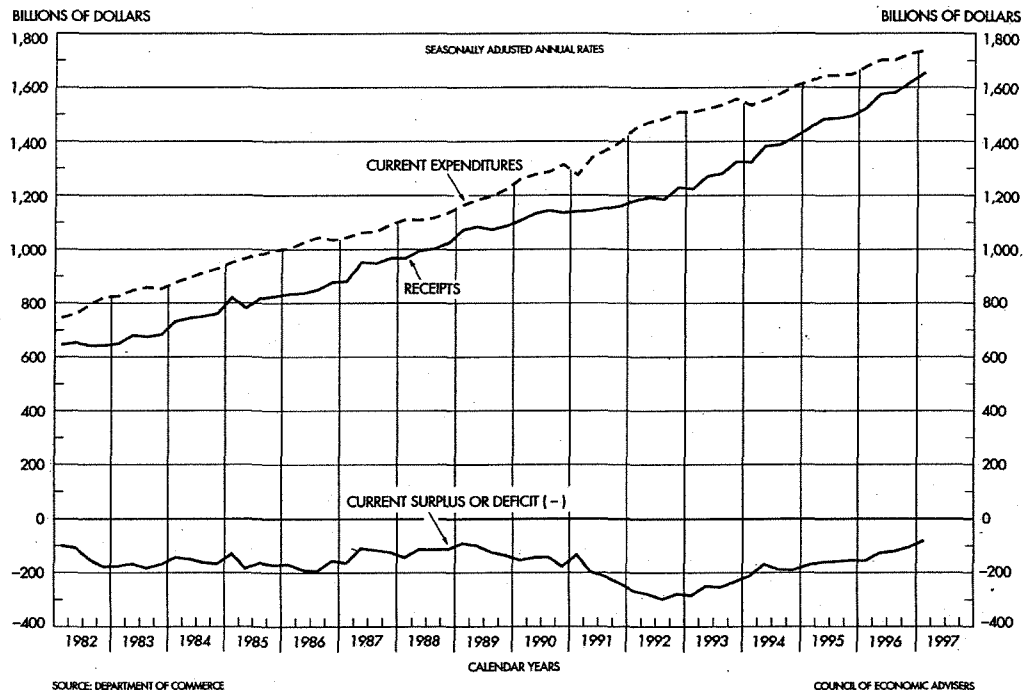

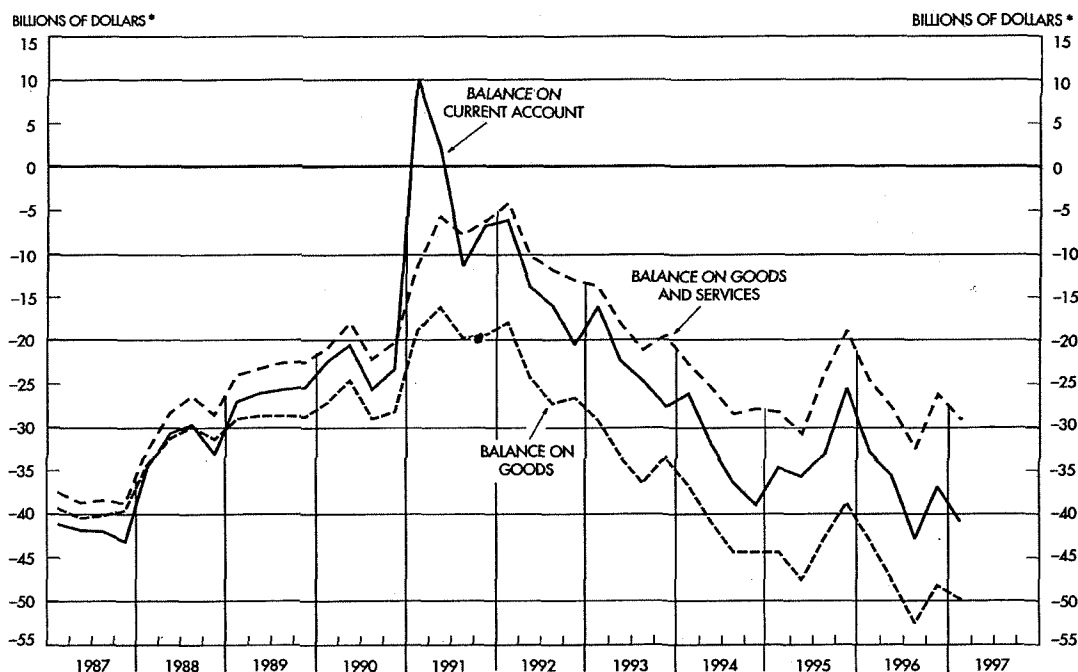

In the capital accounts, U.S. claims on foreigners reported by U.S. banks increased \$56.6 billion in the first quarter of 1997, following an increase of \$66.7 billion in the fourth quarter of 1996. U.S. liabilities to private foreigners reported by U.S. banks, excluding Treasury securities, increased \$18.9 billion in the first quarter, following an increase of \$39.0 billion in the fourth quarter.
