Beginning with January 1978, data relate to line haul railroads with annual operating revenues of \$50 million or more. This class included all railroads with operating revenues of \$10 million or more for the years 1976 and 1977, \$5 million or more during the years 1965 through 1975, \$3 million or more during the years 1956 through 1964, and \$1 million or more for all years prior to 1956.
