#### Description of Series

The Louis Brandeis papers at Louisville are organized according to time and subject. They include the following groups:

> Correspondence 1879 to 1916 beginning with Justice Brandeis' first years of practice with McNutter, McClennen and Fish, and running through experience as a partner in his own firm up to 1916 when he was appointed by President Wilson to the Supreme Court. Subjects include Savings Bank Life Insurance (1905-1938), Government, World War, Supreme Court, Zionist Movement. Some speeches in Justice Brandeis' handwriting are included.
