The papers of Thomas Wilson Lamont, financier, member of firm of J. P. Morgan and Company from 1911 to 1940 and chairman of its board from 1943 to 1948, remain in the files of J. P. Morgan and Company. Final disposition has not yet been decided by his son, Thomas S. Lamont, who says there is little concerning the Federal Reserve System except a few letters to Governor Strong, etc.
