[Public Law 42—79th Congress] [Chapter 98—1st Session]

[S. 105]

AN ACT

To extend the life of the Smaller War Plants Corporation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the first sentence of section 4 (d) of the Act entitled "An Act to mobilize the productive facilities of small business in the interests of successful prosecution of the war, and for other purposes", approved June 11, 1942, as amended, is amended to read as follows: "The Corporation shall not have succession beyond December 31, 1946, except for purposes of liquidation, unless its life is extended beyond such date pursuant to an Act of Congress."

Sec. 2. (a) Section 4 (c) of such Public Law 603 is amended to

read as follows:

"(c) The management of the Corporation shall be vested in a board of five directors who shall be appointed by the President; by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, from among individuals who are familiar with the problems of small business. The President shall designate one of the members as chairman."

(b) Notwithstanding the amendment made by subsection (a) of this section, the members of the board of directors of the Smaller War Plants Corporation holding office at the time of the enactment of this Act shall continue in office until five members have been appointed pursuant to section 4 (c) of such Public Law 603 as amended by this section.

Approved April 27, 1945.

Section 16 of the Federal Reserve Act was amended so as to reduce the reserve requirements of the Federal Reserve Banks from 35 per centum against its deposit liabilities and 40 per centurm against its Federal Reserve notes in actual circulation to a uniform amount of 25 per cent in gold certificates. Section 11(c) of the Federal Reserve Act was amended so as to reduce correspondingly the graduated tax to be prescribed by the Board whenever reserves against Federal Reserve notes fall below the statutory limitation. (59 Stat. 237.)

Government obligations as collateral for Federal Reserve notes.

Section 16 of the Federal Reserve Act was amended so as to extend indefinitely the authority of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System to permit direct obligations of the United States to be used as collateral for Federal Reserve notes. (59 Stat. 237.)

All power and authority with respect to the issuance of Federal Reserve Bank notes under section 18 of the Federal Reserve Act was terminated on the date of enactment of this Act. (59 Stat. 237.)

Termination of authority to issue United States notes.

All power and authority of the President and the Secretary of the Treasury under the Act of May 12, 1933 with respect to the issuance of United States notes terminated on the date of enactment of this Act. (59 Stat. 237.)

President Truman approved the Bretton Woods Agreements Act, authorizing the U. S. to accept membership in the International Monetary Fund and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development.

This Act provides for establishing a National Advisory Council on International Monetary and Financial Problems, to consist of the Secretary of the Treasury, Secretary of State, Secretary of Commerce, Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Export-Import Bank. The essential purpose of the Council is to co-ordinate the policies and operations of the American representatives on the Fund and the Bank and of all agencies of the government which make or participate in making foreign loans or which engage in foreign financial, exchange or monetary transactions.

AN ACT

To authorize the Export-Import Bank of Washington to extend its operations to include the Philippine Islands.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section 2 (a) of the Export-Import Bank Act of 1945 (Public Law 173.9 Seventyninth Congress, approved July 31, 1945) is hereby amended by inserting immediately after the word "country" the following of (or the Philippine Islands)".

Approved December 28, 1945.

Certain limitations contained in section 24 of the Federal Reserve Act upon real estate loans by national banks were, in effect, set aside by this Act insofar as they relate to loans to veterans guaranteed under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944. (59 Stat. 626.)

Purchase of Government obligations directly from the United States.

The authority of the Federal Reserve Banks under section 14(b) of the Federal Reserve Act, to purchase United States obligations directly from the United States, which would have expired on December 31, 1945, was extended until June 30, 1946. (59 Stat. 658.)

Bank. -- Under the third paragraph of section 25(b) of the Federal Reserve Act, a Federal Reserve Bank is protected from liability in disposing of property received from or for the account of a foreign state or foreign central bank. If the authority of the party from whom the Federal Reserve Bank receives instructions for the transfer or payment of the property, is certified by the Secretary of State. The Opinion states that once a certificate is issued, it applies to any property received and held by the Bank while the certificate is in effect, irrespective of whether the certificate is issued before or after the property is received by the Federal Reserve Bank. 40 Op. Atty. Gen. 400 (1945).

M.701. Certification of Conversion Rates for Foreign Currency.—The plaintiff, in 1940, imported into the United States woolen fabrics exported from England. Payment was made with pounds sterling purchased in the New York market for cable transfer. In assessing the ad valorem duty on the goods, the Collector of Customs converted the pounds sterling into dollars at the "official rate" of \$4.035. Plaintiff claimed that the currency of his invoice should have been converted at the "free rate" of \$3.475. He paid the higher rate, and filed a protest; the protest was sustained by the Customs Court; and the Court of Custom and Patent Appeals reversed. The Supreme Court granted certiorari.

Both the "official rate" and the "free rate" had been certified to the Secretary of the Treasury by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, under section 522(c) of the Tariff Act of 1930. The Federal Reserve Bank filed a brief in the Supreme Court, as amicus curiae.

The Supreme Court held, consistently with the position taken by the Federal Reserve Bank in its brief, that section 522(c) did not require that the Federal Reserve Bank certify only one buying rate for a specified foreign currency; that, where dual buying rates have been certified, that rate should be used which is in fact applicable to the transaction; and that, since the pounds had been purchased at the "free rate," that rate should have been used. The action of the Federal Reserve Bank, in certifying rates, was said by the Court to be "non-reviewable." Barr v. United States, 324 U.S. 83 (1945).
