Description of Series

The papers of Edmund Day are boxed and organized. The great bulk of them concern Cornell University. A small collection of personal papers contains half a dozen letters concerned with Federal Reserve matters, but these are routine and without special interest. Two of them have appended staff reports sent to Mr. Day in his capacity as Class C Director, or former director.

Careful search might reveal other Federal Reserve papers filed in another section, but the archivist in charge thought this unlikely.
