OLIVER MITCHELL WENTWORTH SPRAGUE

(1873 - 1953)

The papers of O. M. W. Sprague, economist, banking expert, first American to be economic adviser to the Bank of England, financial adviser to the Secretary of the Treasury, are in the possession of his son, Theodore Sprague. The collection, believed to be small, contains some correspondence with Benjamin Strong of the New York Federal Reserve Bank. These have been checked and duplicates found in the files of the Bank, some in the Strong papers and some under subject headings.

Three mimeographed memoranda not otherwise easily available have been photostatted and are in Committee files.

It seems probably that Dr. Sprague's books may have been left to Harvard. This remains to be ascertained.
