SAMUEL UNTERMYER

(1858 - 1940)

The papers of Samuel Untermeyer, trial lawyer, counsel for the House Committee on Banking and Currency at the time of the Pujo Money Trust Investigation and the men who conducted that investigation, are in storage vaults in the office of his estate at 30 Pine Street, New York City. This collection is said to include a considerable number of clippings and perhaps pamphlets bearing on Mr. Untermeyer's activities in connection with the Federal Reserve System.

A bound volume of speeches, by Mr. Untermeyer, has been presented to this Committee on behalf of the estate.
