Dear Mac:

As the Chairman had to go over to New York, he asked me to reply to your two memorandums. One refers to Miss Daisy Callahan. The only place that would be available for her here would be if one of the new Board members could use her as a secretary, as otherwise the Board has no position in which she might be used. I understand that she returned to Atlanta when the late Governor Black went back there, but that the Atlanta Bank did not see its way clear to continue her services.

The other memorandum encloses Jim Farley's note to you with reference to Senator Truman's interest in the appointment of Frank Connet, and this is being looked up. As you know, the remaining vacancy on the Board here is supposedly to be filled by a representative of agriculture.

I would still like to have a chance to talk with you about Charlie Michelson's problem. Although the tide is now turning the other way, which I date from the President's vigorous offensive, it certainly should not be allowed to reverse itself again.
