
Dear Mr. McIntyre:

Your letter of November twenty-sixth, in which you asked me to come to Washington and go over in detail my suggestion for cooperative activity between Government and Business, has been received.


MEMORANDUM FOR HONORABLE MARRINER S. ECCLES:


Dear Mr. Eccles:

Dear Mr. Eccles:


In accordance with instructions received from The White House, I am to telephone you tomorrow morning, December twenty-first for the purpose of making an appointment to visit you in Washington.
