MEMORANDUM ON HOUSING SUBSIDY

The report made by the Senate Appropriations Committee on the proposed Emergency Relief Appropriation Act of 1935 recommends "a new section relating to utilization of facilities of private enterprise" as follows:

Sec. 7. Wherever practicable in the carrying out of the provisions of this joint resolution, full advantage shall be taken of the facilities of private enterprise.

This might be amended by changing the period to a semi-colon and adding the following:

and for the purpose of promoting private enterprise and encouraging employment in trades or occupations where unemployment is severe, the President is authorized, in his discretion and through the facilities of agencies of the United States now existing, to make loans or grants for home-building or other private construction projects out of sums appropriated in section 1 hereof, not exceeding in any such case 20 per cent of the amount required for such project.
