Dear Marriner:

Perhaps you will remember me, or perhaps not; however I am the Guy Poulsen who lived neighbors to your mother during the years of 1910-1914. I lived at my aunt's, Ellen R. Nibley, 290 West Center, Logan, Utah.

I have made application for a loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation in the amount of \$8,000.00. The application goes through the office of G. L. Leaver, Special Representative of the Corporation. Due to the red tape, which, of course, may be necessary, it seems that it is going to take so long to get the loan through that it will be of no use to me.

We are entering into an expansion program of our business requiring quite a large investment for fixtures and equipment.

We have operated our business here in Idaho Falls successfully for over sixteen years and feel that our present program is necessary to keep abreast of the times. Where we are having the greatest amount of trouble is the clause in paragraph 5 of the application called Bank Participation. I would rather not have the bank participate in this loan as I have a loan credit at the bank of between \$5,000.00 or \$6,000.00, which I need at the beginning of each fall and spring season to take advantage of an 8% discount allowed me by the wholesale companies with which we deal.

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I was wondering if it would be possible for you to give me a suggestion whereby I could speed up the action on the loan, or let me have some information as to the possibility of completing it in the immediate future.
