My dear Senator:

I am so disappointed and disheartened by the outcome in your State that I cannot refrain from sending you this note. You have been so uniformly understanding and helpful to all of us here that I hate to think of your leaving the Senate, particularly at this time when we need more than ever and have so few men with a comprehension of economic, banking, and credit matters. Political results are frequently inexplicable to me. When the ablest and best informed men who are rendering the finest kind of public services are not retained but demagogues and outright disloyalists stay on, it doesn't make someo.

I have heard over and over again in the last twenty-four hours expressions of very real disappointment over the result in your case - expressions that had nothing to do with politics as such, but are a tribute to your fine record and service in the Senate.
