Dear Mr. Eccles:

I agree with your view as reported in the New York Times for July 15 that aliens should be taxed at the same rate as citizens on income derived from sources within the United States. It seems to me that the sole basis for taxing income should be the source of the income regardless of citizenship or residence of the recipient. This would include abandonment of the attempt to tax citizens on income derived from foreign sources since this usually means double taxation of the recipient. For elaboration of these views see my book, "Jurisdiction and Power of Taxation" and an article in the June issue of the Cornell Law Quarterly, "Jurisdiction to Tax Income".
