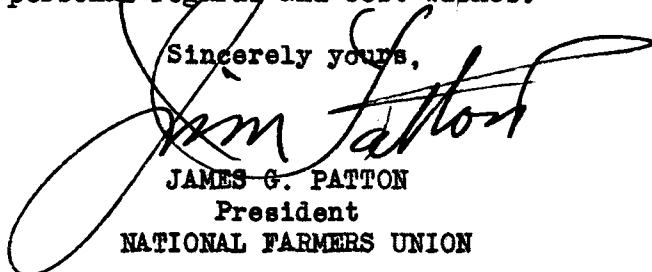
Dear Mr. Eccles:

Dear Jim:

I have delayed replying to your letter of July 30 awaiting the printing of the transcript of my testimony before the Senate Banking and Currency Committee. It has just arrived and I take pleasure in sending you a copy as you requested. I did not have time to prepare any statement in advance. All my testimony was off the cuff.

I sought to point out that we have gone so far that I can see no possibility of avoiding some degree of corrective deflation in the end, which means of course unemployment and reduced production. But I also said that its severity could be moderated by appropriate Government action so that there is no reason why we should have a major crash.

I appreciate your generous personal references and trust I will have an opportunity to see you when you have occasion to be in town. Let me take this opportunity to reciprocate your kind personal regards and best wishes.
