Dear Mr. Eccles:

Once again, this time in your statement before the Joint Committee of the Congress on the Economic Report, you have made us feel that at least we have one man in a critical spot who has the knowledge, the vision, and the courage to know and to say what needs saying so badly. I must acknowledge I have been exceedingly fearful of the close parallel between our policies now and those that were employed after the First World War, which brought on the depression of 1929. Unless something drastic is done at once, the world will tumble down around our ears. I fear that the world cannot afford to have America suffer another depression.

What shocks me more than anything else is the way my fellow bankers prove that they have learned nothing and are deliberately supporting policies which will make it so inevitable and so easy for the communists to say, "I told you so."

Thanks again for the encouragement that you always give us.
