I believe you will feel differently about my remarks on the 44-hour work-week if you read the entire text of my statement, and therefore I am enclosing a copy of it. You will note that I did not advocate a 44-hour work-week "without overtime pay", but "without overtime rates of pay", which in themselves would be responsible for producing more purchasing power than the increase in the supply of goods.
