The share of goods imported to the United States from China in 2014, up from 8 percent in 1999.

13.5%

In 2014, the share of imports to China from the United States made up of electrical equipment.

23.3%

In 2014, the share of exports from China to the United States made up of electrical equipment.

23.7%

The share of all U.S. exports that went to Canada in 1999, making it by far the largest U.S. export market. (Mexico was second at 12.6 percent.)

The share that exports from Canada to the United States made up in 1999, making Canada the largest exporter to the United States.

The share that exports from China to the United States made up in 2014, making China the largest exporter to the United States. (Canada was second largest at 14.8 percent.)
