

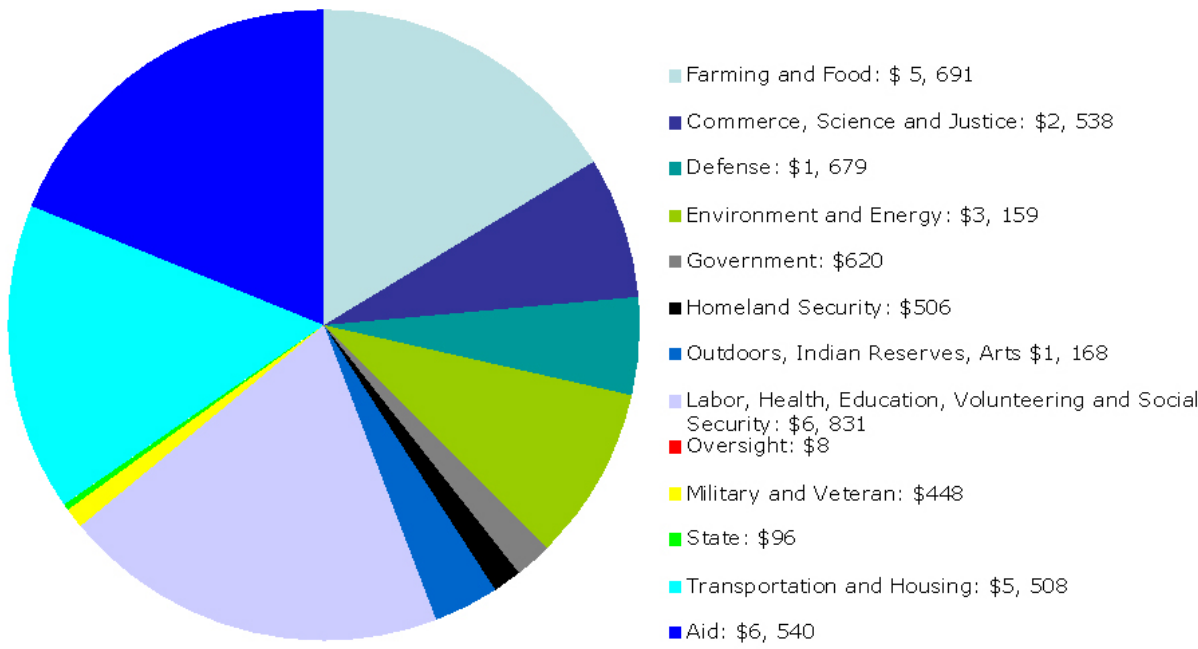

A year-by-year look at where the money goes:

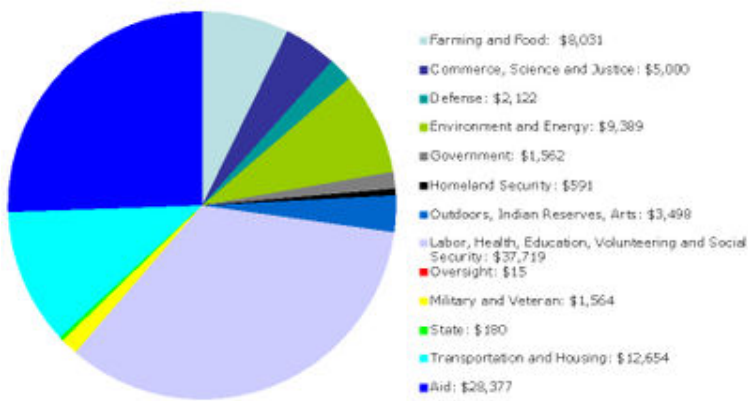

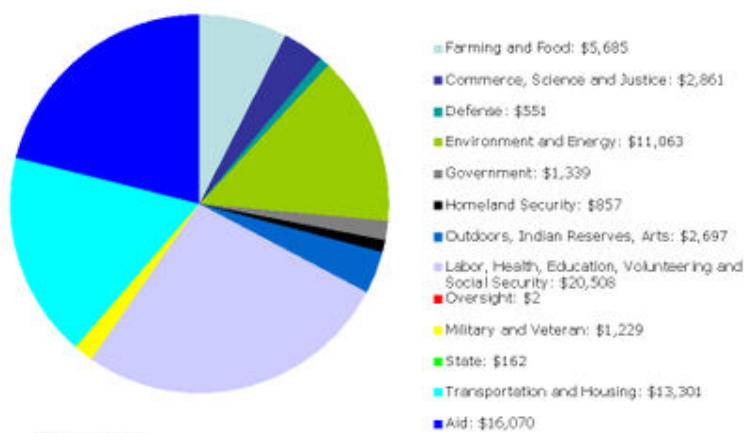

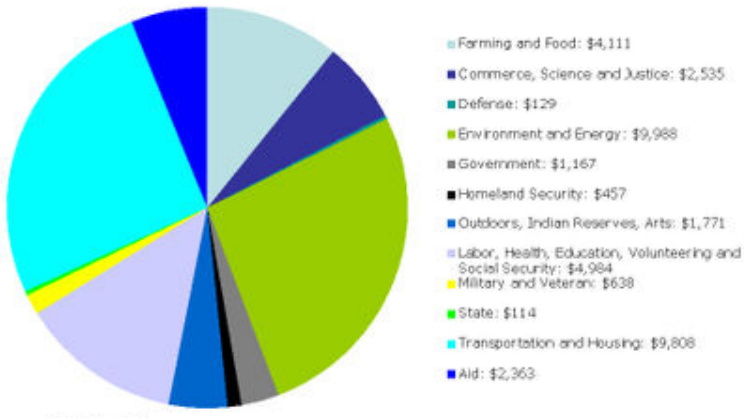

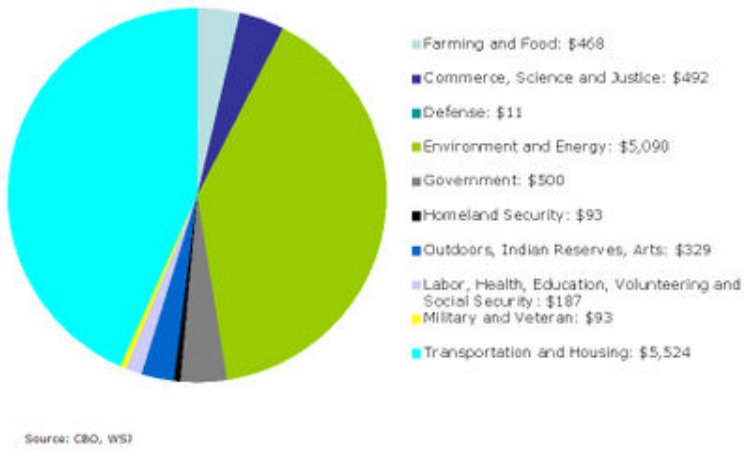

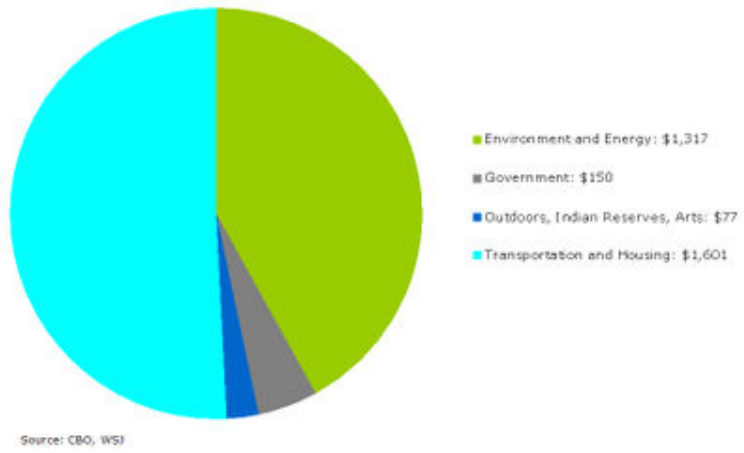

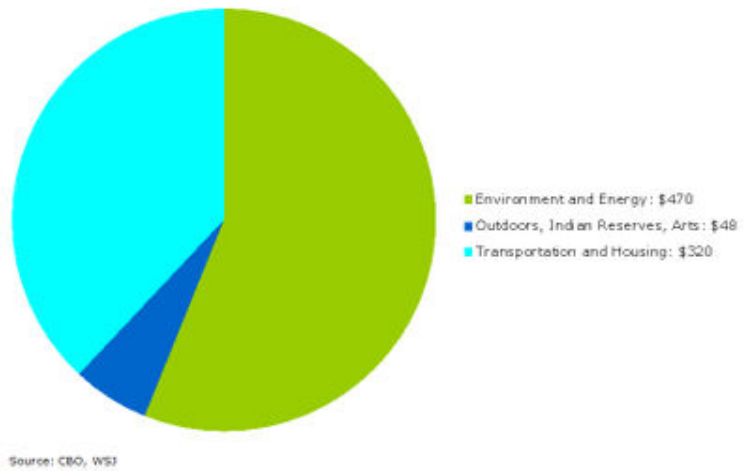

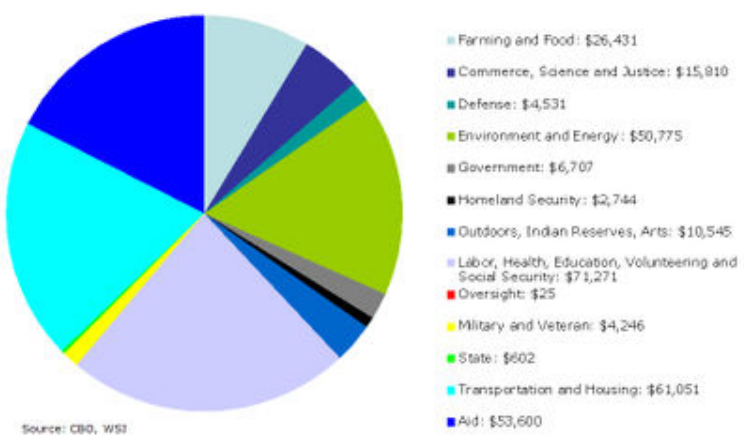
