During the calendar year 1940, twenty-five Fourth District State banks were admitted to membership in the Federal Reserve System. The names of such banks, together with the dates of admission, are given in the accompanying tabulation. It is significant that the number of member banks now is substantially more than the number of non-member banks in actual operation in the Fourth Federal Reserve district.

The gratifying increase in membership of banks in the Fourth District in the last two years evidences also a growing appreciation that membership in the System is as advantageous to the small bank as to the large bank, or perhaps even more so. The 25 banks admitted during 1940 had total resources of \$42,628,676.56, or an average of \$1,705,147.06. Of these banks more than half (13) had total resources of less than one million each; and of that number more than half (7) had total resources of less than \$500,000.

The Federal Reserve System supplements the services rendered by correspondents, and enables banks to render to their customers the highest possible quality of bank service.
