NEW OFFERING - TREASURY BILLS

¹⁰ All Banking Institutions and Others Concerned in the Eleventh Federal Reserve District:

Your attention is invited to the following statement giving details of two issues of Treasury bills:

The Treasury Department, by this public notice, invites tenders for two series of Treasury bills to the aggregate amount of \$1,100,000,000, or thereabouts, for cash and in exchange for Treasury bills maturing June 25, 1970, in the amount of \$3,013,205,000, as follows:

91-DAY BILLS (to maturity date) to be issued June 25, 1970, in the amount of \$1,800,000,000, or thereabouts, representing an additional amount of bills dated March 26, 1970, and to mature September 24, 1970, originally issued in the amount of \$1,302,370,000, the additional and original bills to be freely interchangeable.

182-DAY BILLS for \$1,300,000,000, or thereabouts, to be dated June 25, 1970, and to mature December 24, 1970.

The bills of both series will be issued on a discount basis under competitive and noncompetitive bidding as hereinafter provided, and at maturity their face amount will be payable without interest. They will be issued in bearer form only, and in denominations of \$10,000, \$50,000, \$100,000, \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 (maturity value).

Daylight Saving Time, Monday, June 22, 1970. Tenders will not be received at the Treasury Department, Washington. Each tender must be for an even multiple of \$10,000, and in the case of competitive tenders the price offered must be expressed on the basis of 100, with not more than three decimals, e.g., 99.925. Fractions may not be used. It is urged that tenders be made on the printed forms and forwarded in the special envelopes which will be supplied by Federal Reserve Banks or Branches on application therefor.

Banking institutions generally may submit tenders for account of customers provided the names of the customers are Tenders. Others than banking institutions will not be permitted to submit tenders except for their own account. Tenders will be received without deposit from incorporated banks and trust companies and from responsible and recognized dealers in investment securities. Tenders from others must be accompanied by payment of 2 percent of the face amount of Treasury bills applied for, unless the tenders are accompanied by an express guaranty of payment by an incorporated bank or trust company.

Immediately after the closing hour, tenders will be opened at the Federal Reserve Banks and Branches, following which public announcement will be made by the Treasury Department of the amount and price range of accepted bids. Only those Submitting competitive tenders will be advised of the acceptance or rejection thereof. The Secretary of the Treasury expressly reserves the right to accept or reject any or all tenders, in whole or in part, and his action in any such respect shall be final. Subject to these reservations, noncompetitive tenders for each issue for \$200,000 or less without stated price from any one bidder will be a connectifive hids for the respective issues.
