Dear Dr. Rist:

I am not quite sure of the custom which prevails among physicians in Paris about sending a bill. The only time when I had any experience of the sort, in due course I received a bill. I hesitate to address your brother on the subject, but if you have opportunity to convey to him the idea that I would welcome the receipt of a bill and that my mail address will be care of Morgan & Co., 14, Place Vendome, Paris, I would greatly appreciate it.

In this connection, may I also say that his interest and the encouraging report he gave me have contributed much to my ease of mind and, consequently, to the improvement in my general condition.

A note about my plans. Mr. Cecil Lubbock will arrive at the Grand Hotel, Grasse, on the 2nd of June to remain for one week. I have deferred arranging for any other visitors until I get word from Governor Moreau as to his desire for a meeting and the date he prefers. We shall reach Grasse on June 1st, and likely the first week in July will move to Evian, subject of course to the developments of health and weather, so if you feel willing to drop me a line at Grasse advising me, so far as you are able, of the prospects of another visit, I shall be most grateful indeed.

It seems hardly possible for me to express to you, Governor Moreau and M. Quesnay my appreciation of your courtesy and hospitality and of the painstaking way in which you have arranged for my comfort during this trip. It has had much to do with the very distinct improvement
