## Background of the C. E. D.

- 1. The national job ahead of us.
  - A. The Department of Labor estimates civilian labor force of  $57\frac{1}{2}$  million by 1946.
  - B. Gross national product of \$142 billion at 1940 prices.
  - C. Assist 3,100,000 private enterprises in achieving this goal.
- 2. The Philadelphia job
  - A. 4.511 factories
  - B. 225,000 wage earners
  - C.  $\$l^{\frac{1}{2}}$  billion value of products (1939)
  - D. Income \$3.2 billion

## The approach

- Concerted industrial attack upon the problems of production and employment – industry by industry and community by community.
- 2. On the national level
  - A. Research division working in two broad fields.
    - a. Governmental policies
      - (1) War contract renegotiation, termination, plant ownership, demobilization, taxation, and the like.

"Climate" for private enterprise

- (2) Government part in productive activity.
- b. Areas of activity for enterprise to serve the common good.
  - (1) Source of jobs and income
  - (2) Availability and use of credit

## B. The field development division

- a. To stimulate and assist all companies in all communities to prepare now for the immediate and the postwar future.
- b. To provide the "know how" kit of suggested application with respect to
  - (1) Organization
  - (2) Appraisal of post-war markets employment income
  - (3) Workers and productivity

# 3. At the local level - Philadelphia County

## A. The action committee

- a. To sell the importance of getting post-war plans started. To stimulate and assist business to reach national goals.
- b. To interchange ideas and information through panel discussion and personal interviews.
