Resolved - That the Gulfport Commercial Union, representing the business interests not only of this city, but the entire of the business interests not only of this city, but the entire of county of Harrison, hereby voices in the strongest of terms our disapproval of the recent action of the Federal Reserve Bank Organization Committee in their failure to select the City of New Orleans as a location for one of the Federal Reserve Banks - for the reason that her position as the Commercial Metropolis of the entire South, as well as her intimate and familiar acquaintance with the needs and requirements in a financial way of the several states surrounding her, makes it economically wrong and entirely impracticable for that particular territory to be served by other cities much smaller in financial caliber and a great deal farther removed from the center of the business and industrial activity of this district.

Resolved further that the original of these resolutions be mailed to the Reserve Bank Organization Committee at Washington, D. C. and that a copy thereof be mailed to the New Orleans Association of Commerce, and to our congressman, B. P. Harrison.
