Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Federal Reserve Organization Committee:

If your Committee shall designate the territory embracing Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Montana and Washington as a Federal Reserve District, you will be charged with the further duty, second only in importance to the first, of designating within such territory, a Federal Reserve city.

Section 2 of the Act requires: "That the Federal Re-Berve districts shall be apportioned with due regard to the convenience and customary course of business and shall not mecessarily be coterminous with any state or states." The real purpose and spirit of this requirement, with respect to the reserve districts, is peculiarly applicable in designating the reserve cities. It is especially the convenience, off the people within the district and the usual and customary course of business therein which must necessarily be controlling in the selection of a reserve city. Merely geographical, educational social, sentimental, governmental or political reasons should have little, if any, weight in the Besstien of such a city.

By the census of 1910 Minneapolis had a population of 301.408, while St. Paul was given 214.744. This lead in population of Minneapolis over St. Paul of 26,664 in 1910 (and now in Total Trivillis - Corr 076, and 1910 (and now in Mple. 60%.

all probability considerably greater) tells but a small part of the real story. The constantly increasing prestige and precedence of Minneapolis over St. Paul as the commercial, manufacturing and banking center of the Northwest is so marked and indisputably proven by the facts and figures of official records as to leave no room for doubt or discussion.

St. Paul had the advantage of being the older city and the capital of the State, which, in the days of small things, gave it an artificial lead over Minneapolis, but commencing with 1880, a decade of real rivalry and competition set in, at the end of which Minneapolis was well in the lead of St.Paul in practically all the lines of activity in which these cities were engaged, and every year since has but emphasized and increased this lead.

That city should be selected which, by reason of its location, the extent and variety of its business, the volume of its banking capital and surplus, its resources in available deposits, as well as its size and commercial and general importance, is most intimately connected with, and most closely touches, the various activities of the whole district.

We wish to show the supremacy of Minneapolis as the location for a regional bank over any other point which

would properly serve the district.

Just in what degree the beginning of the crop movement annually affects Minneapolis may be seen in Table No. 28 presented herewith, which shows that weekly clearings rose from \$17,766,000.00 in August, 1913, to \$37,616,000.00 in October, 1913, and in St. Paul from \$9,790,000.00 in August, to \$12,588,000.00 in October. Comparisons for a period of years show that these changes always occur at crop moving time and that Minneapolis always carries the load of providing money and credit for the Northwest. It is during this season we normally have the greatest demand for credit with which to handle this great agricultural production.

Elevator Capacity In this connection, we would call your attention to nearly 40,000,000. the fact that the lowest weekly clearings of Minneapolis exceeded by about \$4,000,000.00 the highest weekly clearings of St. Paul for the year 1913.

> Minneapolis banks handled in 1913, \$217,909,000.00 worth of grain drafts, and shipped out for the purchase of grain in the way of currency, \$34,355,000.00, of which \$20,782,000.00 was shipped during the months of August, September, October and November. % Chart No. 1.

There are 2,978 banks in Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and Washington, and the number of accounts carried in the Minneapolis banks during December 1913,

was 3,329. This exceeds the number of banks in the district of which we are speaking and is accounted for by the fact of our having accounts from banks in Wisconsin and Iowa and the further fact that many banks keep more than one account in Minneapolis in order to obtain more money and credit for crop moving purposes.

The total out-of-town checks handled by the banks of Minneapolis during 1913 was \$1,320,274,000.00

The process of growth in national bank capital and surplus of the two cities from 1872 to the present time is strikingly illustrated by Table No. 2.

In 1872 the capital and surplus of national banks in St. Paul was two and one-half times that of Minneapolis.

This table shows that it was between 1890 and 1900 that Minneapolis passed St. Paul in the amount of its banking capital and surplus. From 1900 on to 1914 the banking capital and surplus of Minneapolis have increased so rapidly that at the present time it is nearly twice as great as that of St.Paul. It took Minneapolis almost thirty years to equal and pass St. Paul in these respects, and now, in a period of fourteen years, it has become in a banking way both as to capital and surplus, deposits, and bank clearings, the superior of St.Paul in a proportion of almost two to one.

Nothing could possibly present more graphically the almost inevitable certainty that this lead will not only be maintained in the future, but greatly increased. This lead is not artificial, it results and could only result from the greater substantial growth of Minneapolis in a commercial way, and from that even greater growth of that vast territory lying westward to the Pacific Coast directly tributary to and depending upon Minneapolis as its natural marketing, distributing and banking center in almost every line of its material development.

Banking Resources of Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Montana and Washington.

As showing the banking resources of the states of Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and Washington, the following figures are significant. (I have these figures in detail but will not weary you with them, simply stating that the total capital and surplus of State and National Banks of these states is \$171,655,000.)

The total deposits of the banks of the states above enumerated are \$658,666.000.00, with loans of \$765,220,000.00.

The business of the two cities, Minneapolis and St. Paul, is undoubtedly well reflected in the receipts of their respective post offices. For 1913, the total receipts of Minneapolis' Post Office were \$2,150,185.00; of St. Paul, \$1.278,597.00. The total receipts of both sities for that year were \$3,428,782.00. Expressed in terms of percentage, Minneapolis furnished sixty-three per cent of this total, and St. Paul thirty-seven per cent. Custom Receipts

It is the combined effect of all these various statistics which point with unerring certainty to the constantly

increasing supremacy of Minneapolis in every matter which is

at all material or relevant to the requirements of this currency Bill.

Within a few months all of the post office business and departments will be moved from the Old Federal Building in Minneapolis to the new one which is now almost completed and ready for occupancy. This removal will leave at least two floors, ground and second, in the old building, unoccupied. The old Federal Building is a substantial one, is ideally located in the very heart of the business and banking center of Minneapolis. It is within an average of a block and a half from the leading banks of our city. If a Federal Building is desired, here is the ideal building for that purpose. ⁴ Chart No.35.


Minneapolis has long financed the Northwest crop movement. The interests of its people in grain elevators, line lumber yards, branches of produce firms and in numerous country banks, have made banking records that afford immediate access to the credit situation in the Northwest.

The personal acquaintance of the Minneapolis bankers with the bankers of the entire Northwest and their intimate knowledge of the territory in which they are operating would be quite indispensable to the Federal officers in charge of the management of a Federal Reserve Bank in this territory, and these services and facilities will be readily extended.

It is the peculiar merit of this bill which has so generally commended it to the intelligence and conscience of the American people that it is to be the especial handmaid of the legitimate industries of the whole country, be they agricultural, commercial or manufacturing. Those speculative activities which are, and always have been, essentially parasitical are, with rare wisdom, not fostered by this bill and are only recognized by it to be <u>expressly excluded from any</u> of the benefits of its provisions.

The Federal Reserve districts, except possibly in minor particulars, and the Federal Reserve cities which your Committee will designate, will, in all human probability, remain unchanged for five, ten, fifteen or perhaps twenty-five years. The important and far-reaching effect of your work in these respects cannot well be exaggerated. You are charged with the duty of meeting not merely the necessities of the present but also of providing for the probable requirements of the future. The designation of this territory as a Federal Reserve district and of Minneapolis as the reserve city will best serve the interests of that portion of the country and fully meet the requirements of the Currency Bill.

The strategic position of Minneapolis as a location for a Federal Reserve bank, taking into consideration the convenience of the member banks, has been commented upon by Mr. F. G. Winston of Minneapolis, who has given this subject considerable study and who has prepared a brief statement which, with your consent, Mr. Secretary, I would like very much to have him give at this point. This will take but a few minutes.



First, it is the larger city by some ninety to one hundred thousand; second, it is a greater distributing center and is more widely recognized in the northwest as the jobbing and wholesale city; third, its bank depositers are greatly in excess of these of St. Paul; fourth, it is destined to be the metropolitan center between Chicago and San Francisco.

You may suggest that this is a little out of my line, but as I am a member of the Civic and Commerce Association and one of its founders, and as I have been a close student of the life of these cities, and again, as a comparitively new observer, I have been freed drias that my testimony might be accepted in court. I know a very strenuous effort will be made by St. Paul people to have the proposed bank placed in that city, largely because it is the capital of the state. But I submit that this claim does not outweigh the above claims all of which may be duly authenticated. Mr. McAdoo - #2.

Dear Governor:

Referring to our recent correspondence regarding the location of a federal reserve bank in the Northwest, I wish to say that so far as the application of this city to have one of the se banks located here, is concerned, we are preparing for the hearing that will be held in Chicago in January and will be ready to submit the question upon the facts and merits.

We feel that the relation which this city bears, not only to the Northwest so called in the United States, but the Canadian Northwest as well, the relative importance that this city bears as compared to St.Paul, the size of the bank clearings, the bank deposits, the handling of fruit, potatoes, vegetables, the grain basidess, country elevator business, line lumber yard business, the agricultural and implement business, as well as jobbing, rightly entitle us to it.

This showing we believe would be so convincing that on its merits alone there cannot be a shadow of possible doubt as to our securing the institution. There is a doubt, however, in the minds of Minneapolis business men. That doubt is based upon the influence wielded by Jas. J. Hill, the Great Northern Railway, and the N. T. Railway. It is needless for me to call your attention to the influences which that trio can command. Hr. Lynch, National Committee-man, is also being forced into the fray by his St. Paul friends. In addition to that, J. R. Mitchell, President of the Capital National Bank, is a class-mate and close personal friend of Skellet Williams, C.L.GRANDIN, VICE PRESIDENT A.UELAND, VICE PRESIDENT.

Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, who I understand has been determined upon as Comptroller of the Currency, and who will be one with the Secretary of the Treasury and Secretary of Agriculture to determine the location of these banks.

This letter is not for the purpose of asking you to use your political influence in any way, shape or form, in favor of this city, but what your friends would like to have you do is to ask the President to impress upon the three gentlemen who are called upon to locate these reserve banks, that so far as a bank for the Northwest is concerned, no political influence, no personal friendship should under any circumstances be taken into consideration, but that the location of a bank which would serve the greatest agricultural section of this country and which ultimately will serve in the moving of the agricultural products of our friends across the border, should be determined and decided on merit alone.

I am enclosing herewith copy of the bill as enacted, and call your attention to that part of Section 2 which reads as follows:

"That the district shall be apportioned with due regard to the convenience and customary course of business and shall not necessarily be coterminous with any state or states."



Assuming that your committee will surely-accord to this great, naturally defined Northwestern region one of "The Federal Reserve Banks", our Minneapolis people are deeply interested in your choice between the "Twins".

Because of my known personal acquaintance with you and with the President, I have been asked to say a few words on this specific issue.

N.B. I hold no brief for anybody and have no pecuniary interest at stake. I speak from an entirely unselfish standpoint.

At the Chicago hearing (January 20, 1914,), our Minneapolis Civic & Commerce Association submitted a large pamphlet, replete with tables and charts of official statistics; and these, if fully understood, must hage satisfied you as to the claim of the general region and the predominance of Minneapolis as the commercial metropolis of the section. Unfortunately, however, that pemphlet does not contain any index, and some of the compilations came too late to include any single graphic sheet giving any condensed summary of the material date; and, curiously enough, the (2)

all-sufficient <u>cause</u>, for the great difference between the two cities, both in respect to each other and in respect to their gateway or focal relations to the region, is not emphasized or even noted in that otherwise serviceable pamphlet. Moreover, at least one highly important piece of information has since become available, towit, St. Paul's claim as to the number of its accounts with country banks, towit, 1579, needed to complete the value of the regional chart 1, printed in that pamphlet, and showing that Minneapolis has 3329 such accounts. Possibly, therefore, it may not be improper for me briefly to summarize the situation, and show you the causes of it. The pictures may be helpful.

(1) The Controlling Factor.

This can be stated in three words, i.e., available natural power.

Look at this picture! Minneapolis has, at her St. Anthony Falls, two large dams. From the upper dam, she has long had developed and in use 37,000 h.p. water power direct. From the lower dam, she has had (since 1897) 10,000 h.p. hydro-electric. From the upper dam, towit, the Hennepin Avenue generating plant, she has had (since 1905) 10,000 h.p. hydro-electric more.

In 1907, the Minneapolis General Electric Company completed its generating plant at Taylors Falls, in the St. Croix river, with a capacity of 20,000 h.p. hydro-electric, all of which has ever since been delivered and utilized in Minneapolis. This makes a total of 77,000 h.p. of natural energy hitherto available (3)

to Minneapolis.

The General Electric Company has, also, just completed another <u>new</u> dam in the Mississippi, at our northern city limits, known as the "Coon Creek Dam", and are now there installing a generating plant, with a capacity of 16,000 h.p. Hydro-electric, all booked for Minneapolis, and to be availagle on or about August first next. This gives a grand total of <u>93,000</u> h.p. of Mature's great primal force, and really tells the <u>whole story</u>. The successive developments of this energy, from these great natural sources, has put Minneapolis where she is, and is the all-sufficient explanation of her great predominance over St. Paul.

St. Paul has no direct water power whatever; and, up to a recent date, never had any hydro-electric energy from any source. Within the past few years only, St. Paul has received the comparatively insignificant amount of 4,000 h.p. from Apple River Falls, Wisconsin - not even enough to take care of its lighting business.

Is it any wonder that Minneapolis, long ago, outstripped and distanced the older city, and became the great mahufacturing center for the raw materials indigenous to the tributary region. Considering that, until a recent date, this Northwest Section included the most accessible forests of white pine timber, and still contains the largest productive area of hard spring wheat, barley and flax, is it any wonder that Minneapolis, long ago, became supreme, <u>among the cities of the world</u>, for lumber, flour, barley, flax and flaxseed products.

The same reason explains why St. Paul has no such great distinctive industries, but is simply in the position of fetching

and carrying for Minneapolis.

This situation, in respect to natural power, will, of necessity, <u>continue</u>. With a single possible exception, there are no other available fountain sources, for this great natural power, within striking distance. The exception is the mere project now before Congress for a high dam in the Mississippi, at the Soldiørs' Home, just within our southern city limits. If that is realized, it will make a large addition, but it is still far off; and, if developed, most of the energy will, in all probability, come to Minneapolis, because she already has established the great industries to create the demand. Increase in kindred industries always tends to grow about the original natural centers.

(2) <u>Collateral Effects</u>.

Nearly all of the outside or country flour mills, and most of the big saw mills, and practically all of the great lines of grain elevators in the region, are owned in and financed from and have their chief market at Minneapolis. Her terminal grain elevator capacity (exclusive of the mills), for example, is over 38,500,000 bushels - the largest in the world. St. Paul has only two small elevators, with the petty capacity of 40,000 bushels.

The transportation systems of the region are chiefly occupied in bringing the raw materials to the great manufacturing industries of Minneapolis and in taking away the converted products therefrom. The chief - and almost the only - exception is the grain shipped directly from the field to the head of the Great Lakes. St. Paul does not get it. St. Paul, however, does <u>un</u>- (5)

justly get credit for through shipments, at the Minnesota transfer in the Midway district, a large portion of which really should be credited to Minneapolis, because most of that freight is moved by and for Minneapolis people and financed therefrom. Notwithstanding this undeserved credit, the official figures for 1913 show Minneapolis received and forwarded 85% more carloads of freight than St. Paul.

Banking facilities naturally followed the industrial centralization above noted. In fact, St. Paul has practically <u>no</u> distinctive exclusive lines of business. The only exception is the live stock market of South St. Paul, and that is comparatively insignificant. It is more than offset by the mere by-products of the Minneapolis mills.

(3) Degree of Predominance.

According to the census of 1910, Minneapolis then exceeded St. Paul in population by 40%, and her output of manufactured products, according to the census classification, was three times as great. The difference in population is now still greater; and, if statistics of manufactured output, compiled on the same classification, were now available, they would probably show about the same or a larger ratio in favor of Minneapolis. Collectively considering all lines of business <u>handled</u> and <u>financed</u> in the respective cities, the totalities or volumes stand related about as 1 to 2, i.e., Minneapolis now does more than <u>twice</u> as much business as St. Paul. This is conclusively proven by the official statistics contained in the above noted pamphlet, entitled "Minneapolis", (6)

submitted at your Chicago hearing.

(4) Banking Business.

This is approximately <u>2</u> to 1, in favor of Minneapolis, all branches considered. The Minneapolis clearings have been over twide those of St. Paul for the past 17 years; and, in 1913, they were two and one-half times as much. The deposits in the Minneapolis banks were almost exactly twice those of St. Paul. In capital and surplus, the difference in favor of Minneapolis was over 70%. The amount due from Minneapolis to country banks was twice as great, and so were the number of accounts with country banks, towit, 3329 such accounts held in Minneapolis, and 1579 in St. Paul.

Hereto attached will be found a blue print graphic summary sheet containing some of the most important official figures. which sheet was recently prepared, at my suggestion, and is therefore marked with my name, simply to distinguish it from the official charts and tables bound up with the other parts of the original pamphlet entitled "Minneapolis". This blue print sheet speaks for itself. I also attach charts Nos. 1: 111; V: and X1 with None of these documents need any explanation, with its table 5. the exception of the typewritten matter appearing at the foot of Chart 1. The figures there given, as to the number of St. Paul's country bank accounts (1579), were taken from the advance publication of St. Paul's brief printed in the St. Paul Dispatch of January 20, 1914, on page 3 thereof, which is enclosed with the origin-Said paper introduces said brief in a senal of this letter.

tence which reads :-

"The following is a written brief presented by St. Paul business men at the hearing in Chicago today on the Regional Reserve Bank."

The paragraph marked with blue pencil contains a sentence reading as follows:-

"It (St. Paul) has 1579 country bank accounts."

This brief had obviously been given to the St. Paul newspapers before its representatives left for Chicago. After reaching Chicago, they probably early saw the Minneapolis pamphlet and its regional chart No. 1 was too much for them. In any event, the St. Paul representatives took great care to keep that vital item out of their testimony then given.

Item No. 4 of the blue print graphic sheet should be compared with these figures now on chart No. 1, as to the comparative number of country accounts. The two sets of items are corroborative of each other; and, doubtless, you will appreciate their importance.

(5) The State Capitol Argument.

The St. Paul people make much of this, but it is too trifling for serious consideration. It should simply be classed with other obsolete historical matter, like the old river trade, marking the stepping-stones to Minneapolis, the natural industrial center of the tributary region. You might just as well be called upon to decide in favor of Sacramento, as against San Francisco, (8)

Springfield, Illinois, as against Chicago, or Albany, as against New York City. In other words, St. Paul should now be regarded as simply a part of Minneapolis, - a suburban portal to the real gateway and live pulsating heart of the great Northwest.

CONCLUSION.

It is submitted that the points above made are conclusive of the issue, and that, if any Reserve Bank is to come to the Northwest, it should be located at Minneapolis, in accordance with the spirit of the Act, as stated in the proviso of Section 2 thereof.

> The power figures for St. Anthony Falls, stated in this letter, were given to me over the 'phone February 22, 1914, by Mr. William de la Barre, the St. Anthony Falls Water Power Company's treasurer and engineer in charge, and those for Taylors Falls and the new Coon Creek dam were given to me, on the same date, over the 'phone, by Mr. Robert F. Pack, the Minneapolis General Electric Company's engineer in charge.
