Dear Sir: The State of Wosconsin has made provision whereby the privilege of employing women for night work may be granted upon the recommendation of the Council of National Defense, Washington, D.C. to the Industrial Commission of Wisconsin. This Company wishes to make formal application for such a recommendation for the privilege of employing four women only for night work during the months of August and September. This Company is engaged in the manufacture of waterproof plywood for use on aeroplanes, hydroplanes, for the French Government, for the Italian Government and for the U. S. Government. The work we wish to employ the woman on is passing thin veneers in and out of a Philadelphia Textile Dryer. The work is very light and conditions are exceedingly sanitary and healthy. The demands for harvesting make us extremely short of men. This work is done exclusively during the day by girls, and we have a large number of women applying for work, among these are young women teachers, who wish war work during the summer months. We would agree not to employ women under twenty years old,

if necessary.

We assure you that this slight assistance is very much needed at the present time.
