Dear Mr. Blacks

In re: Evacues Property Program

I appreciate your willingness to sesist in the legal work conmeeted with the above program, and I am writing you for the purpose of giving you a general outline of what the program is and to indicate what your probable duties will be in relation thereto.

Your work will arise out of the handling of this program through the Seattle Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank and such regional/offices, if any, as may be established in the State of Weshington. Just how ontanulve your work will be and how such of your time will be conjused it is impossible to state. I imagine that for the first conta during which the program is being placed in operation Mr. Show and those spot he may demignate to hendle the detail work will avoid themselves of year services at frequent intervals. I believe for the Initial period it could be well for you to arrange to spend certain definite hours puring each day at the office where the work is being performed, during which times you will be results available to the officers of the bank and those who may desire to consult you. As I stated to you over the tokephone, it will be necessary to leave the matter of pour compensation by an indefinite status for the present. I suggest that you keep Early close account of the time spent in the perference of this work and at the end of the month let me have a mesorandum of your suggested charges and a detailed statement of any expenses incurred, with receipted remchers attached. The amount of your charge for services will have to be left to the approval of the local Transpry officials and sixualf, and if the amount suggested by you is considered too high, it must be understood that you will leave the amount of your compensation to determination here. In such entire I secure you that I shall try to be entirely resonable.

For your general information, I am enclosing berestth copies of the following documents:

- 1. Public Proclemation No. 1 issued by General DeWitt March 2, 1942.
- 2. Mesorandum of General Principles Governing Operations. This semorandum was propered for the confidential use of the Federal Neserve Bank and should not be given publicity.

Wendell W. Black, Esq. March 12, 1942 3. Press release issued by the Federal Reserve Bank March 10. 1947. Other information of a similar character will be forwarded to you in the near future. A general putline of the program covering details not included in the documents handed you herewith may be gained from conversations with Mr. Shew. It should be explosised that the progress being undertaken is one which involves voluntary action on the part of the evenuess. The duties to be performed by the Federal Meserve Bank are not these conferred upon an alien property costodian. We are not taking forcible possession of the property of evacuees or in any manner penalizing them by reason of their status. On the contrary, our efforts will be to assist the persons effected in obtaining fair and orderly disposition of their property. In all cases the evecuees will be encouraged to select agents of their own choosing (banks, attorneys, real estate agents, or American business associates) to this over their affairs and dispose of their property. Forms of powers of attorney to be used in connection with such transactions are being prepared and will be forwarded to our Branch office shortly. It may be that in certain isolated cases the evacues will not desire to appoint anyone other than the Federal Reserve Bank of Man Francisco as his astorney-in-fact. This beak will not accept powers of attormay to set for evecuses unless and until the powers to be exercised and the general attaction surrounding the transaction have been esseined and it is felt that this bank can perform a useful function in accepting the cover. The taking of owers of attorney by the Federal Reserve Bank should be done only in rare cases where it appears certain that no one else can be found to accept the responsibility and where it also appears that the evacuee has a clear equity or other property rights which cannot be protected among through the acceptance of the power. The Federal Heserve Bank will not accept a power of attorney which involves the carrying on of a going business concern, the continued production and hervesting of growing crops, or other functions or duties foreign to the usual duties of a bank. In each instance where, after investigation, it neems necessary for the Federal Reserve Benk to accept a power of attorney, the opeer should be accompanied by detailed written instructions setting forth the duties which the bank is called upon to undertake, the disposition to be under of the property, and any other necessary details in relation thereto. These instructions must, of course, be in form and substance satisfactory to the Federal Reserve Bank. Cases involving the assumption by this bank of inportant or onerous duties should be referred to this office for considera-

tion, accommended by all necessary details, before the power of attorney

is accepted.

Wandell W. Black, Eng. March 12, 1942 It is possible that instances will arise where it appears that the creditor of the evacuee is seeking to take an unconsciouslis advantage. For example, the evacues may have purchased an article of personal presents or real extate on which substantial payments have been made and it is clear that the evacue has a valuable equity. In such cases, after full investigation and after conference with the creditors and the evacues in an attempt to reach an amicable solution, it may appear advisable to "freeze" the property of the evacues in order to prevent the creditor or creditors from taking sussary action. Such freezing powers are vested in the Treesury Department under Section 5(b) of the Trading with the Enemy Act, as emended by Title III of the First Bar Powers Act. However, it should be clearly understood that in carrying out this program the Federal Hezerve Bank of San Francisco, acting in its capacity as Fiscal Agent of the United States, will not exercise these powers for the purpose of vesting title to eny alien property without most dereful consideration and without prior consultation with and agreement of the Treasury Department. This entire program is still in its formative stages. It is one which will have to be developed and in relation to which the procedure will have to be determined as time goes on. I how that you and the officials of the Seattle Branch will feel free to get in touch with this office by telephone, telegraph, or otherwise in all cases in relation to which any doubt as to your authority or the proper procedure exists. On operating details Mr. Everson or Mr. Armstrong should be contacted. On all legal questions I will be glad to recder any possible service. If, after consulting with Mr. Blaw and reading this letter and the enclosed documents, there are any matters which are not clear to you, please let me know. Yours vary truly, General Counsel. The voucher should be filled in as follows: on the first line following the initials "U. S.", insert the single word "War"; on the next line, the name of your city and date. As (Payee) show the name of your branch as Fiscal Agent of the United States and on the next line, your address. In the body of the form under "No. and Date of Order", insert "Ex. Order No. 9066, February 19, 1942". As "Date of Delivery" in the second column, tasert the date shown on the schedule. Under "Articles or Services", insert " Motor Vehicles as per Schedule Attached and enter the amount of all supporting schedules following the word "Total". However, if schedules dovering deliveries made on more than one date are covered by one voucher, they should be listed separately on the voucher, showing each date of delivery and the number of vehicles and eacount of each such schedule. The certificate in the left center of the form should, of course, be signed in the mass of your branch on the original copy only.

The schedule, Form EPM 10, should also be prepared in quadruplicate, one copy to be attached to each of the copies of Form 1034 submitted and one copy retained for your files. The receipt of the Quartermester Corps representative who takes delivery of the motor vehicles need be obtained only on your file copy of the schedule.



At the present time it seems that any enemy alien or citizen of Japanese ancestry who wishes to dispose of an automobile or truck can, by signing a power-of-attorney, have the Evacue Property Department act as his agent for the sale of the vehicle in question. Only a few evacues have availed themselves of this arrangement, chiefly for two reasons:

- (1) Evacues believe that after a brief period they will be settled in a location where they will be permitted to use. and will have need of, their cars and trucks.
- (2) If turned over there is no assurance as to when the vehicle will be sold or at what price.

These and other uncertainties will result in large accumulations of cars and trucks in Induction Centers, where they will be impounded and immobilized. A large San Francisco dealer in new and used cars gives as his expert opinion that at the end of two or three months these vehicles will require an average of one day's work by a competent mechanic before they are usable, and that they will be practically worthless at the end of four to five months.

To further complicate the problem:

- (1) Many of these cars and trucks are being purchased under a payment plan.
- (2) The owners after a time will be scattered over a wide territory.
- (3) There will be a concentration of cars and trucks at Induction Centers far beyond the ability to absorb of the local market.
- (4) Who would bear the loss should there be a destructive fire, storm, airaid, etc.

The interest of the CPA in all this is the unsoundness economically of permitting thousands of cars and trucks, together with their tires and batteries, vitally needed for defense transportation, to sit in open fields until they become scrap.

A suggested remedy is as follows:

- (1) Explain fully to all evacuees that they cannot use their cars and trucks beyond the induction point.
- (2) Have them turn over their titles of "pink slips" to the Government at prices to be determined by a competent appraiser, which prices are to be somewhere between Blue Book list and current market prices.
- (3) Credit the evacue with the net proceeds of such "sale", first deducting any balance due, a handling charge, etc.
- (4) Give Government agencies engaged in evecuation, such as the Agriculture Department, first call on all cars and trucks.
- (5) Before cars and trucks depreciate unduly, arrange for their sale through established and reputable dealers.

To Members of the California Land Title Association

Gentlemen:

The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, (as Fiscal Agent of the United States and pursuant to authority conferred by section 5(b) of the Trading with the Enemy Act, as amended, and as appointee of the Commanding General of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army) has adopted a program designed to minimize loss by Japanese and other evacuees (called "evacues nationals") in the disposition of their property and to protect them from unfair action by unscrupulous creditors seeking to take advantage of their situation.

The program contemplates complete freedom in disposing of property: The evacuee is encouraged in his own interest to make private arrangements for the disposition of his property, directly or through an agent of his own selection. He may retain ownership in appropriate arrangements are made for its protection and preservation.

But, to forestell action by unscrupulous creditors and to minimize his losses, should negotiations with such creditors by or on behalf of the evacuee fail, the Bank may <u>freeze</u> his property, designating it as <u>Special Blocked Property</u>, by one or more of the following methods:

- 1. Posting notice thereof on or reasonably near such property;
- 2. Notifying the person holding or having possession or custody of such property:
- 3. Notifying one or more persons having an interest in such property.

There can be no acquisition, disposition or trensfer of, or other dealing in or with respect to Special Blocked Property except by license of said Bank expressly referring to its Special Regulation Bo. 1. Applications for such licenses are to be filed with the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco at one of its offices, on Form TFE-1 of such bank.

California Land Title Association Page 2 March 25, 1942 The term "evacuee national" is defined as "any Japanese, German or Italian alien, or any person of Japanese ancestry resident on or since December 7, 1941 in Military Area No. 1 or in specified zones in other Military Areas prescribed by Lieut. General J. L. DeWitt, Commanding General of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army. In order to facilitate transactions involving such evacues nationals the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco has agreed to cooperate with us by sending to this office a copy of all notices designating any real property or interest therein as special blocked property. Immediately upon receipt of any such notice this office will undertake to inform, by wire or telephone, all member companies operating in the county in which such property is located. The wire or telephone advice, which will state the name of the evacuee national and perhaps a reference to the property, will be confirmed by letter setting

forth the information which has been made available to us.

Unless you receive notification to the effect that property which is the subject of an order in your office is special blocked property, it is believed that you may safely assume that a transaction involving such property can be completed insofar as Special Regulation No. 1 of the Evacues Property Department of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco is concerned.

In order that there will be no delay in the receipt of these notices by your Company, it is suggested that you notify this office to whom the notices should be sent.

Circulars and releases setting forth the regulations and releases relating to transactions in special blocked property will be received by you from the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco if you are on their mailing list for Foreign Funds Control circulars and other releases referred to in our bulletin of February 2, 1942. The regulations and rules relating to transactions in special blocked property are separate, distinct and in addition to the rules and regulations pertaining to Foreign Funds Control and should not be confused therewith.

Evacuee's First Visit

One copy of each of these forms should be given to the evacuee on his first visit, in order that he might study them and know the contents thereof.

Evacuee's Second Visit

The State Motor Vehicle Registration Certificate, for the vehicle, must be submitted at the Civil Control Station and should immediately be checked to see that the owner's signature appears on the reverse.

Three copies of each form should be prepared at this time and WCCA Forms FRB-3 and FRB-4 should be stapled together in sets.

Two sets, together with the Registration Certificate, and an identification tag which the evacuee will tie securely on the steering apparatus of the motor vehicle, should be placed in an envelope and handed to the evacuee at this time, with instructions to bring all of these documents to the designated automobile storage point at the proper time. The third set should be retained as office copies.

ALTERNATIVE NO. 2. (Sell to Army)

If Alternative No. 2 has been indicated, and the evacuee is the legal owner of the motor vehicle, he must at this time present the Ownership Certificate, duly endorsed (lines 1 and 2 on reverse) and the Ownership Certificate should be attached to the office set of WCCA Form FRB-3 and FRB-4. The endorsements must be exactly the same as the name inscribed on the face of the form.

If Alternative No. 2 has been selected and the evacues is not the legal owner of the motor vehicle, the Ownership Certificate, being in the hands of the legal owner, will obviously not be available.

Delivery of Automobiles at the Place of Storage

From the above, you will observe that when the evacuee arrives at the place of storage, the only documents he will present, will be the tag to be placed on the steering apparatus, two sets of WCCA Form FRB-3 and FRB-4 and the Registration Certificate. At this point, all the numbers appearing on WCCA Form FRB-4 should be thoroughly checked, together with the information concerning accessories, etc., and any exceptions should be noted on both copies of the form. Inspection should be made to see that the tag is securely tied to steering apparatus. The space provided for "Receipt for Vehicle" on WCCA Form FRB-3 (both copies), should be completed and one set handed to the evacuee. The remaining set should be held and delivered to the Main Office of the Evacuee Property Department, together with the Registration Certificate and the Keys.

The motor vehicle will be appraised by two disinterested appraisers and, in its discretion and at its option, the Army may buy the motor vehicle at the appraised price which shall not, however, exceed the Blue Book wholesale value in the locality where the purchase is consummated.

PURCHASE OF MOTOR VEHICLES BY THE UNITED STATES

A. If the evacuee is NOT the legal owner of the motor vehicle, in order to arrange for a sale to the Army, he must present to the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, at the Civil Control Station, or such other place as may be directed, the following:

- 1. Registration certificate, duly endorsed.
- 2. The agreement on the reverse hereof, duly signed and witnessed.
- 3. Such other authorization and assurance as may be required by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States.

In case the evacuee is not the legal owner, it must be clearly understood that if the indebtedness against the motor vehicle is equal to or

ALTERNATIVES OF STORAGE OR SALE greater than the appraised value so that the evacuee has no equity, no sale to the United States will be consummated. In such an instance the right of any creditor to repossess or recapture, as provided by law, will not be resisted by the custodian of the motor vehicle.

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B. If the evacuee IS the legal owner of the motor vehicle, he must, in addition to the foregoing, present the ownership certificate, duly endorsed.

DEFINITIONS AND CONDITIONS

Included in the term "motor vehicle" are the following:

- 1. Passenger cars, light and medium. Heavy passenger cars in order to come within the purchasable category must be classed as "medium", as the Army is not authorized to purchase any "heavy" passenger cars.
 - 2. Motorcycles.
- 3. Busses and trucks of all types, including pick-up and delivery trucks; and tractors, including semi-truck tractors.

It is not intended to include within the term "motor vehicle" those self-propelled motor vehicles suited only for farm operation.

In the event that the sale of any motor vehicle is not completed or appears not feasible, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, acting for and as agent of the evacuee, reserves the right to store such motor vehicle at the owner's risk, as above set forth, or to make such other disposition of such motor vehicle as may, in its sole discretion, appear to be just and equitable, including the right to permit the legal owner of such motor vehicle to take his legal recourse for repossession or otherwise.

It is intended that the above procedure will provide a feasible means of protecting the interests of evacuees in their motor vehicles, without prejudice to the interests of others therein, and thus will effect an equitable disposition of such property.

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Agreement Regarding Disposition of Motor Vehicle

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THIS IS TO CERTIFY that the undersigned has read and understands the instructions on the reverse hereof regarding the disposition of the motor vehicle described on WCCA Form FRB-3, [to be attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein if this Agreement is signed] which the undersigned has signed concurrently herewith.

Said instructions and those on the reverse of WCCA Form FRB-3 are a part of this Agreement.

The undersigned desires to dispose of the aforesaid motor vehicle according to Alternative No. _____ set forth on the reverse hereof, and requests the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, to act accordingly. If the accomplishment of the alternative herein selected appears to said Bank, in its sole discretion, impossible or not feasible, said Bank is authorized to make such other disposition of said motor vehicle as it deems proper.

Said motor vehicle is delivered to said Bank at the sole risk of the undersigned, and it is agreed that no liability or responsibility shall attach to said Bank for any act or omission in connection with the handling of said motor vehicle or disposition of the proceeds Will temporal take as the assessment of thereof.

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SUBJECT: Use of Personal Property Form (NCCA FRB-2)

Evacuee's First Visit

These forms will be available at all WCCA offices, and normally will be handed to evacues by the representative of the Federal Security Agency at such offices, at the time the Family No. is assigned. It is believed that the "Instructions to Owner" for the preparation of the form are complete and self-explanatory.

The evacuee should take 4 copies of the form to his place of residence for completion, including the "Personal Property Inventor" List" on the reverse of the form.

Myacuso's Second Visit

All copies of the form should be returned to the Evacuee Property representative, who should check them for conformity, delivering one copy to the evacuee for his record.

It should be explained to the evacuee at this time, that any property not included in the Inventory List will not be taken from the residence at the time that the other items are removed therefrom. For example:

If a stove, refrigerator or any other item is found at the place of res.-dence and is not included on the Inventory List, it will be assumed that such items belong to the landlord or that proper arrangements have been made with a finance company, or other person, for their disposition. This point cannot be too strongly emphasized.

It should be explained to the evacuee that all such items as stoves to be stored with us, should be disconnected and that wherever possible, goods should be crated for their protection, as we do not assume any responsibility for breinage, etc.

The evacuee should then be given a sufficient number of Storage Tabs (WCCA Form FRB-1), bearing in mind at all times that the number of pieces indicated in the columns provided for that purpose on the Inventory List, would not necessarily indicate the number of tags needed. For example:

In moving and storing a grand wisho, the three legs are removed therefrom, therefore, a grand piano might require 4 storage tags. Likewise, a bed will consist of the headboard, footboard, side rails, slats, springs and mattress, and consequently would require at least 5 tags. The storage tags must be completed by the evacuee, giving the family name, Family No. and indicating the office of issuance, i.e., San Francisco.

At this time arrangements must be made so that the furniture movers will have access to the property. If the keys to the premises are delivered to us, we should immediately attach Form VT 17D, which was not drawn for this purpose but which will suffice until such a form has been prepared. The evacuee's Family No. should be shown on this form, as well as his name and address - and most important, the name and address of the person to whom the keys are to be returned after the furniture has been removed from the premises. If the key is not delivered to us the evacues must indicate on the form, the name and address of the person holding the key, who must be located in the immediate vicinity.

Drayage Instructions

The first copy of WCCA Form FRB-2 should be delivered to the person designated as a coordinator for the various moving concerns, who will take care of the furniture from this point to the time that it is actually delivered in our warehouse. The second copy will be placed with other similar forms, arranged numerically, and delivered to our representative at the warehouse. The third copy should be retained by our representative in the WCCA offices, in a numerically arranged file.

Delivery of Furniture at Warehouse

Arrangements have been made with the furniture moving people, not only to take care of the cartage but also to properly stack the furniture in the warehouse. Therefore, we will not receipt to the driver of the van, for furniture off the tail-gate, but rather will make our check of the inventory as the furniture is stacked.

On the Inventory List, immediately following the description of the article, the moving people will indicate, in the column headed "Article", the number of pieces which are being delivered. For example:

Piano, Grand - 4

Our representative, in checking the goods into the warehouse, will indicate the number of pieces in the column "Rec'd", which should correspond with that inserted by the movers, and we will receipt on a form provided by the movers for the total number of pieces indicated in the "Rec'd" column, rather than the number of pieces indicated in the column headed "Number of Pieces".

After the Personal Property Inventory List has been checked, the checker will retain the list until the end of the day, or some other convenient time, to be delivered to our representative at the WCCA office.

Because of the possibility that a great number of items, particularly refrigerators, have not been completely paid for, and it might therefore be necessary to examine these items for Serial Ros., etc., in connection with claims from the finance companies, we have requested that in storing the furniture, refrigerators be placed as close to the aisle as possible, so that they will be more readily available.

Office Routine

After the furniture has been properly stored, receipted for to the movers, etc., copies of WCCA Form FRB-2 will be returned to the Main Office of the Evacuee Property Department for proper distribution to the War Relocation Authority and the evacuee.

Before any property will be accepted for storage by the United States Government four (4) copies of this form must be filled in and returned to the Civil Control Station at which you registered for evacuation. On the back of each copy the items to be left for storage must be carefully listed. Items not on the printed list should be written in the blank spaces provided on this form.

Small articles must be securely packed in crates or boxes of not less than two (2) cubic feet capacity and will be indicated simply as to number of boxes, no attempt being made to itemize on this form the articles therein. All crates and boxes must be securely packed and fastened. Each box, crate, or article must be identified with tags obtained from the Civil Control Station.

No loose bundles of clothes, linens, utensils, or other small or unsubstantial household items will be accepted for storage. Farm products, farm machinery, automobiles, land, livestock, or pets must not be listed as personal property on this form.

After all copies of the form have been filled in and returned to the

Civil Control Station, one copy, checked for conformity with the other three, will be given to the owner of the property. The copy delivered to the owner will be evidence merely that other copies of the form have been delivered. At this time the owner must leave the keys to the place where the property is to be found, or make arrangements to deliver the keys to the representative of the Evacuee Property Department of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco before leaving the area of his residence.

The copy delivered to the owner merely shows the number of items, hoxes, and crates which the owner claims he has prepared for storage. It does not constitute an agreed inventory. It does not constitute a verified list. It does not constitute any evidence of the number of items actually stored or of the contents of boxes, crates or packages. Verification of the inventory list of items actually stored will be made as storage is accomplished. A verified list will then be forwarded to the owner.

The copy of the list mailed to the owner will serve as a permanent record and should be carefully preserved by him.

PERSONAL PROPERTY INVENTORY LIST

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If the property herein claimed to have been delivered, and which actually was delivered is lost, damaged, or destroyed as the result of negligence while it is in the possession or custody of the United States, or of any agency acting for it, the Congress of the United States will be asked to take appropriate action for the benefit of the owners.

Capital Company is prepared to operate and maintain the properties in question, but they insist that in addition to the actual cost of labor and materials soing into their operations they must be allowed to charge against the cost of operations a management and supervision fee equivalent to 10% of the gross income from the properties. This fee is in line with their usual fee for such work and, I am informed by the Capital Company, is less than the fee charged by many others for similar operations. My purpose in bringing these agreements and the matter of the supervision and management charge to your attention is to invite your opinion, as a representative in certain respects of the interests of Japanese evacuees, on the question of whether or not such a management and supervision fee would be considered equitable and just under the circumstances. Capital Company is aware of the fact that your office may be called upon to determine questions such as we are now bringing before you, and they wish to be assured that their method of handling properties will not be subject to criticism later by Federal authorities by reason of the necessity of making a charge for supervision and menagement as above indicated. An expression of opinion from you on this subject at your earliest convenience will be very much appreciated as we now have instances where Capital Company can take over properties to the advantage of both the bank as mortgages and to the mortgagor of the property, and undue delay might cause loss to all parties in interest. We have discussed at some length with prominent incurance brokers, the question of liability risk and insurability in cases where evacuess have delivered vehicles to Caucasians for usage during their sheeres. Generally speaking, no objection was expressed by these agencies to such arrangements. They unanisously stated, however. that each such delivery should be evidenced by a written instrument covering the salient points of such an agreement, including a nominal consideration. Ordinarily, a power of attorney or lease agreement would suffice. Beregistration showing the registered owner to be that person who is in possession as distinguished from the legal owner is definitely advisable. Further, some clause should be included in the agreement indicating liability of each party arising under accidents. proporty damage, etc. Congrally speaking, insurence companies have not welcomed the Japanese as risks. This was the case long prior to war time. In each such case, under the perhod outlined above, the underwriter would necessarily make an investigation of the possessor of the vehicle in order to determine his desirability as a risk. Additionally, some record would be essential concerning the Japanese legal cener, showing his place of birth, length of residence in this country, etc. If, after such investigation the operator and the Japanese owner proved satisfactory in conformity with their usual requirements. there was no reason why reasonable protection could not be obtained at a proper rate.

PRESS RELEASE-FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1, 1942---Lieut. Gen. J. L. DeWitt, commanding the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, announced today (Monday) that the evacuation of the Japanese from all important cities in Military Area No. 1 or the west coast and into Assembly or Relocation centers was complete.

These cities include Tacoma, Portland, Seattle, San Francisco and the entire bay area, San Jose, Sacramento, San Diego and Los Angeles.

The only persons of Japanese ancestry authorized to remain and at liberty to go about in these cities are persons employed by certain Federal agencies and their families. These must carry with them, at all times, means of identification. Citizens living in these coastal cities are requested to report, immediately, all Japaness without means of identification, to law enforcement agencies.

It was also reported by the Commanding General that, with the single exception of Yolo County, there were no Japanese not under surveillance in the California portion of Military Area No. 1.

Subsequent to your call at this office in regards the cancellation of your fire insurance I contacted Mr. Chas. Stewart, special agent for the Home Insurance Co, as you mentioned you had contacted the Home agent in Turlock. Mr. Stewart informs me that his company is more than willing to insure Japanese properties, however they place one condition in accepting same which in this instance is a step towards giving the Japanese quicker and better service. While arrangements for your insurance are being completed Mr. Stevart said that he would contact his agent in Turlock and issue a covering note for your ranch.

The one condition is that the Japanese evacues must give a broad form power of attorney to some individual who will be in the vicinity and in the event of loss will be able to sign the necessary papers so the claim can be adjusted. The company inelats on this due to the fact that they want to conclude all claims as soon as mossible and not have to go to a lot of trouble, expense and un-necessary delay while contacting the evacues at the various re-settlement areas.

I am inclosing power of attorney forms which will meet
the requirements of the insurance company. If you use
them you should give the original to your power of attorney
a copy to the fire insurance company and retain a copy.
You should select some one in whom you repose absolute
confidence and who has an unquestionable reputation.
Mr. Weaver, President of the First National Bank in
Trulock, might adopt same, however do not take this
as a recommendation of Mr. Weaver as I have only met
the gentlemen once and while he appears to be a very
reputable and dependable citizen I am not in a position
nor do I have the authority to recommend anyone.

I received your card this sorning stating that you had not recieved the return presium for the cancelled Oregon Mutual policy although you had demanded same in writing. I will have the Bank in San Francisco call them about it and undoubtedly you will hear from them soon. Let me hear from you as soon as they do refund to you.

I am sure that you will be able to conclude satisfactory arrangements with the Home. I would appreciate hearing how you make out with them.

Insurance - Evacuee Property Department

We have arranged with our insurance brokers for public liability coverage under our regular public liability policy on premises rented or leased in connection with Evacuee Property operations, including creas rented for furniture and for automobile storage. Such coverage is effective from the effective date of the lease or rental period, even though it may not be reported to the insurance company until several days later. When the report has been received by the company, its inspectors will be sent to survey the premises in order to determine the rate. When the proper description of the premises and the rate have been obtained, an endorsement will be attached to our public liability policy, and the premium will be considered reimburable as part of the Evacuee Property Department expenses. Such insurance will be arranged for by Head Office upon receipt of your advice of rental of premises or areas. Claims for reimbursement will also be handled through Head Office.

A question has been raised concerning our insurance coverage on evacues owned automobiles when arrangements are made to transfer the automobiles from one location to another. Under our extended coverage policy (Sun Indemnity Company of New York, N-557906, which covers the policy year commencing March 1, 1942) we have protection up to \$500,000 for bodily injury liability and \$5,000 for property demage liability, whether the cars are operated by our own employees or by our designated agents who have contracted to move the cars under our supervision. It is believed that this coverage is sufficiently broad to protect us in the movement of evacuees' cars provided such cars are moved under our direction. We do not have any insurance, however, protecting us against fire and theft and collision. Such coverage is not necessary, as the cars are accepted by us without responsibility under the terms of the automobile form executed by the evacues.

Summary of Interviews

1. Overall Attitude:

Although somewhat evasive with reference to their overall attitude toward Japanese, the general impression given is that Japanese property, real or personal, is not being accepted for insurance.

The Hartford and Travelers companies admitted that outside of certain Chinese they had always considered Orientals a poor risk and that now, with the "moral hazard" exceptionally high, and the possibility of sabotage to Japanese property, an additional new factor, they were not accepting any Japanese business.

U. S. Fire Insurance was particularly evasive. However, the conversation revealed that they had no taste for Japanese business and it might be assumed that they are not accepting it.

New Hampshire Fire Insurance is leaving it up to its agents who are generally refusing the business. However, the company might consider real property under "certain conditions".

2. General Cancellation:

No company indicated they were considering the cancellation of policies already in force, although U. S. Fire and the New Hampshire Co. intimated that in some instances the conditions pertaining to insured Japanese property had changed so materially as to necessitate a review and some cancellations.

3. Personal Property:

Under no conditions is Japanese personal property being accepted for insurance by these companies.

4. Real Property:

Asked specifically if real property, owned by a Japanese but managed by a bank, real estate company or white person of reputable background, was acceptable. Every company indicated it would depend obviously, first, on the nature of the risk aside from the Japanese factor and, secondly, on how much of an additional influence the Japanese factor would have in altering the normal hazard ratio. For example, an apartment bouse in a good neighborhood, occupied, and managed by a well-known real estate company, owned by a Japanese but not generally known to be Japanese properts, might be a good risk.

5. Sugar, ry of Japanese Risk Factors:

- (1) Japanese are considered a poor moral risk at this time. The moral hazard is particularly high on depreciated stocks, unusable personal property, or semiabandoned real property.
- (b) The possibility of damage to Japanese property in case of more intensive hostilities is also a factor of increasing importance.
- (c) Certain psychological factors have always made Japanese difficult to satisfy in a period of insurance adjustment or settlement. This is considered even more applicable at this time.
- (d) Japanese property, generally in racially segregated communities, congested areas, and poorly maintained, has never been a good risk. Today, packed with unprotected personal property, or semiabandoned, it presents additional hazards.

The above factors were cited as reasons why Japanese property is not considered desirable as an insurance risk. Generally speaking, conditions pertaining to evacuation have raised the risk factor on property that was already none too welcome by the more substantial fire insurance companies.

March 14, 1942

TO OFFICER ADDRESSED, AS PER ATTACHED LIST.

The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, has been delegated the duty of assisting German, Italian and Japanese aliens, as well as persons of Japanese ancestry, in making arrangements for equitable disposition of their properties in connection with their evacuation from the areas recently designated as "military areas" by the military authorities who maintain general supervision and direction of the entire program.

The property-disposal phase of the plan envisions voluntary action on the part of each evacuee, but its fulfillment in accordance with the guiding principles of American democracy will require the thoughtful and wholehearted cooperation of all who are in a position to lend their support.

It must be recognized that the problems which will confront the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco in these additional duties, with the pressure of time foremost in our minds, dictate that all agencies, including the banks in the military areas, be called upon to render their unselfish help in their solution. We must, therefore, ask you and your organization to join with us in an effort to assure speedy, proper, and complete execution of the program. Governmental agencies (Federal, state, and local) will also be called upon for assistance.

We are enclosing a copy of a press release which has been submitted to the office of Lieutenant General J. L. DeWitt, Commending General, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, for general publication. A memorandum is also enclosed which cutlines certain guiding principles for performance of the plan, and which emphasizes our hope and expertation that each bank will do its part in the acceptance of responsibilities delegated to it by evacuees, as well as in the dissemination of information and extension of assistance.

We shall be anxious to assist you at all times in solving the mutual problems confronting us in the execution of the program.

COPY OF LETTER FROM MR. BAY REQUESTING COOPERATION IN EVACUEE PROPERTY PROGRAM

March 14, 1942

TO OFFICER ADDRESSED. AS PER ATTACRED LIST.

The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, has been delagated the duty of assisting German, Italian and Japanese aliens, as well as persons of Japanese encestry, in making arrangements for equitable disposition of their properties in connection with their evacuation from the areas recently designated as "military eress" by the military authorities who maintain general supervision and direction of the entire program.

The property-disposal phase of the plan envisions voluntary action on the part of each evacues, but its fulfillment in accordance with the guiding principles of American democracy will require the thoughtful and wholehearted cooperation of all who ere in a position to lend their support.

It must be recognized that the problems which will confront the Federal Reserve Bank of Sen Francisco in these additional duties, with the pressure of time foremost in our minds, dictate that all agencies, including the banks in the military areas, be called upon to render their unselfish help in their solution. We must, therefore, makiyou and your organization to join with us in an effort to assure spendy, proper, and complete execution of the program. Governmental agencies (Federal, state, and local) will also be called upon for magistance.

So are enclosing a copy of a press release which has been submitted to the office of Lieutenant General J. L. Dewitt, Commending General, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, for Memeral publication. A memorandum is also enclosed which outlines certain guiding principles for performance of the plan, and which emphasizes our hope and expectation that each bank will do its part in the acceptance of responsibilities delegated to it by evacuees, as well as in the dissemination of information and extension of assistance.



Reports required by Treasury Licenses

In all cases where reports are required by Treasury Department licenses, we have been making systematic checks to make sure that the reports are filed promptly. If a power of attorney is given by the licensee, the appropriate reports may be filed by the attorney in fact, or by the licensee.

Instances have been called to our attention where the licensee has evacuated and is unable to give all the details required by the license, due to the fact that they no longer have access to their books of account. We have advised such individuals that it will be necessary for them to file the report, giving the required information to the best of their ability and to make any necessary corrections at such time as the records are again available.

In making reports required by specific or by general licenses, care should be taken to use the form prescribed and to give all details requested. If no specific form is named in the license, then Form TFER-1 (Revised) should be used.

Re: Helease of blocked accounts

Individuals who feel that their accounts have been blocked in error, may file an application on Form TFE-1 (Revised) and their request will be given careful consideration. The application should give the names of all parties having an interest direct or indirect, in the blocked account, the name of the bank and the name of the account in which the funds are deposited, the approximate balance as of the date the application is filed, nationality of all parties concerned and the date of their last entry into the United States, also the circumstances under which the account was blocked, together with all other pertinent information.

SUBJECT: Second meeting of the Committee on Building, San Francisco Board of Supervisors, Thursday Evening, April 23, 1942, to consider the question of rehabilitation of the Japanese Quarter

The meeting was opened by Supervisor MacPhee who, after mentioning that no action had yet developed from his motion of the last meeting, inquired of Mr. Thyle, Health Department Inspector for the City of San Francisco, if any report was available from that department. Mr. Thyle stated that an inspection had already been made of 728 buildings in a 24 block area bordered by O'Farrell, California, Fillmore, and Octavia Streets, and that a complete report would be available probably for the next meeting.

Mr. MacPhee then read a letter submitted by members of the Architectural Institute in which the following outline of the problem was given:

From 70 to 80 per cent of the houses in Japtown will be vacated. From the stand point of climate and many other considerations, this is a choice area of the City. Threat of a slum condition makes rehabilitation a necessity on the following grounds:

For providing defense housing
For lessening fire hazard
For reducing police costs
For lessening public health hazard
For increasing the tax value of the property

Rehabilitation, however, cannot be attempted without a clear-cut method of first gaining control of this property, and secondly obtaining the funds for rehabilitation.

Suggested method would be for the City to underwrite an architectural survey of each individual building. From this survey, suggestions would be made to each property holder concerning necessary improvements. Wherever voluntary cooperation could not be obtained, condemnation action through the City Health Department or some other body could be used. As for obtaining the funds, such plans as mentioned by Mr. Morris and others at the last meeting seemed practicable.

This letter concluded with the comment that such academic views were characteristic of the United States Housing authorities and other Government agencies and were impracticable in this instance, and that the City itself should handle the problem with a view to future planning before action would be taken out of its hands.

Supervisor Uhl commented that it seemed to him that

in order to obtain any action, somebody like the City or a private builder syndicate had to step in and buy the whole area. A representative from the Jefferson Lafayette Club proposed that during the intermit, some action should be taken to prevent the area from going downhill any faster than was already evident, by memorializing the police department and other departments to the effect that liquor saloon and pool hall licenses be curbed.

Supervisor MacPhee again questioned Mr. Thyle of the Health Department on the matter of how long it would take for condemnation proceedings to become effective in a given instance. Mr. Thyle stated that although 45 to 60 days would be sufficient, the court action to sustain such a move was notoriously a long drawn-out affair.

Mr. Christain, representing local real estate interests, said that in his opinion, the Federal Government ought to grent a loan to property owners in this area, and in similar areas all over the country, which would take the problem off the hands of local authorities and provide a low-cost means of voluntary rehabilitation of substandard areas. Supervisor MacPhee thought this was a very good idea and suggested that while the committee was waiting for a report from the Health Department before pursuing his proposal of last week, the supervisors might be requested to ask the Government for the kind of help Mr. Christain mentioned to apply not only to rehabilitation, but to mortgages as well.

There were many other comments from various parties present which did not reflect official utterances, but which seemed to indicate what most of the people present were actually thinking. For example, Mr. Rosseau, who spoke at the last meeting, once again took the floor bringing out the point that now the Japanese were going, it was an excellent chance to keep them out and they should not let such an opportunity slip through their fingers. In his opinion, wherever the Japanese were, property was destroyed, fire hazards were created, etc. He once again proposed that the City condemn all the property via low cost, and resell it to builders (like Rosseau), who appreciated the marvelous possibilities for beautifying San Francisco.

Following the meeting, I asked Mr. Thyle if he could give me a rough idea on how much substandard property in the area was actually owned by Japanese. He stated that curiously

enough, by far the greatest portion of the substandard property was owned by white people, and that in his estimation, the Japanese had kept their property up very well considering the means at their disposal. He intimated that this was not for publication, but it undoubtedly would appear in one way or another in the ultimate report that the Health Department would render.

This second meeting further impressed the writer with the fact that the real objective was not that what appeared upon the surface, but was one of eliminating the Japanese ownership in the area and preventing the Japanese from returning. To date, as indicated by these notes, there has been no constructive proposal for a bonifide rehabilitation plan which placed the emphasis on ultimate property improvement. During the course of these proceedings, the Japanese, on whose property the entire discussion is focused, have not been consulted.

Mrs. Stroman, who is the Executive Secretary of the San Francisco Housing Consul, recalled at one point during yesterday's discussion, that the question of priorities would rule out many large scale improvements, that very much of the property was in the form of Japanese community property developed through contribution, such as; Y.M.C.A., Y.W.C.A., churches, Salvation Army Center, etc., and that it might be a good idea to ask the Japanese how they felt about it. Mrs. Stroman was politely ignored.

A future meeting was called for next Thursday at 4:30.

Meeting of the Committee on Building, San Francisco Board of Supervisors, Thursday evening, April 14, 1942, to consider the question of Rehabilitating the Japanese quarter.

Place: 'Public Hearing' City Hall Committee Room #228 City Hall, 5 P.M. to approximately 7 P.M.

Those present: Members of the Building Committee,
Supervisors MacPhee, Uhl, and Gallagher;
members of the San Francisco Plenning
Commission; representatives of various
building and real estate groups and property
owners of the area. Also a representative
from the Alien Property Custodian's Office
and the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco,
the latter represented by the writer, L. E. Dake.

Definition of the Problem: The Committee defined the problem, as outlined in a previous meeting of the Board of Supervisors, which was, briefly, the formulation of a plan for preventing slum conditions in the "little Tokio" area and ways and means of rehabilitating the property thereon. This area was roughly defined as including the 26 blocks bordered by Ellis, California, Gough and Filmore Streets.

Outline of Action: Supervisors MecPhee and Uhl voiced the idea that inasmuch as this problem was the "Government's Baby" the Federal men present would no doubt have some constructive suggestions. Both the Alien Property Custodian representative and myself indicated that we were present as spectators to ascertain the findings of the committee. At the request of Mr. MacPhee I gave a brief description of the functions of the Evacues Property Department.

It was then proposed that the problem be opened for general discussion. Speakers, and their proposals in brief were as follows:

Mr. Stone of the Planning Commission advocated that the area be declared a defense housing district, the property be purchased by condemnation and be either demolished, preparatory to a new housing project, or rehabilitated.

Mr. Morris, Secretary of the Association of Home Builders, suggested a plan including four steps: appoint a local land commission with power to condemn the property, secure Federal Funds to purchase the property, sell the property to private companies, and sale by the private companies to individuals.

Mr. Byington of the Jefferson-LaFayette Improvement Club stated that financing was the principal problem, and expressed a belief that a bill recently tabled by the State Legislature be revived under which a majority of property owners in any given area could set up an urban development corporation, condemn the entire area and force rehabilitation or new construction.

A number of property owners present in the audience offered suggestions, such as selling the area to the Nevy for a Hospital, using it as a soldiers' barracks through sale to the Army, etc., etc. In general, their sentiment followed the pattern of removing the Japanese for all time, then finding a means whereby they might enhance the land values in the area or sell their property at an attractive figure. Nothing specific of a practical nature was suggested from the audience.

Mr. Dave Tatsuno, President of the local Japanese-American Citizen's League, asked to be recognized by the chair and presented what he termed a representative view of the Japanese property owners in the area. He stated that many of them had given power of attorney to either the Anglo Bank or to a Guy C. Calden, attorney, or to real estate firms, such as Madison and Burke. He indicated the considerable investment which the Japanese had in the area, in the form of churches, clubs, and other buildings, and that his people definitely hoped to return.

That rehabilitation was necessary in many instances was appreciated by his people but the question of funds to handle it and a source of income to pay taxes, agency fees, etc. during any period of vacancy presented the principal obstruction to such a move. Mr. Tatsuno concluded that his people

preferred to keep the property but would be cooperative in any plan to rehabilitate for defense housing which would not definitely evict them from the area in the future and that worries concerning the type of tenancy in the area would be relieved because they too preferred not to allow negroes or other sub-standard tenants to enter the area and further depreciate its value and general condition.

Mr. Gallagher thought some arrangement might be made with the Bechtel Company for housing some of their workers, if the property was renovated.

Mr. Smith, Secretary of the San Francisco Real Estate Board, had considerable data on hand as to percentage of Japanese ownership, etc. in the area under question. He indicated that the Board had been working out ways and means of taking advantage of the opportunity afforded by evacuation to clean up the area but had not proposed anything until now for fear of interfering with the Government's program.

First step, according to Mr. Smith, would be a condemnation law, such as mentioned by Mr. Byington, and now in operation in New York, Michigan, and Illinois. Following that he believed it would be relatively easy to get rid of Japtown. He proposed that San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Oakland seek enactment of a state law along these lines. That the Japanese have property rights must, of course, be considered, but he felt that alien races congregating in groups was an unhealthy development for the city.

A Mr. Evers, (connection not ascertained) said that obviously property cannot be seized except for public purpose-right of emminent domain. The problem is to find a reason, such as slum clearance. He thought the Health Department should be put to work to condemn the property, or at least make a detailed report on its condition.

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Mr. Knowles, an architect, told Mr. Tatsuno that what the Japanese needed was to have a plan for the rehabilitation of the area drawn up by some competent authority (such as an architect) and thus take it out of the hands of less interested parties.

Supervisor Uhl saw no immediate hope of solution

Supervisor Uhl saw no immediate hope of solution because the city could not step in and condemn without money and could not secure the funds without a good public purpose. This would require time. However, the problem was immediate and therefore it would seem a problem to be worked out privately.

Supervisor McPhee recommended that a request by the Board of Supervisors for a survey on the possibility of advancing loans at low interest rates to individuals be directed to the Home Owners Loan Corporation. In this way individuals could rehabilitate residences, flats, etc. and it could be expected that defense workers would provide a ready source of tenancy. This recommendation was approved by Gallagher and Uhl to be presented to the Board of Supervisors on Monday, April 20, 1942.

Mr. Rousseau, builder and representative of the Apartment House Association, stressed the opportunity of getting the Japanese out and keeping them out. He feared that San Francisco would otherwise be a "Big Tokio". That this would make a fine apartment house district was beyond a doubt if the Federal Government would buy up the property and turn it over to private interests for re-development.

The meeting was concluded and another meeting set for the following Thursday at 4:30 P.M.

Following the meeting Mr. Tatsuno, President, and Mr. Sakai, Secretary, of the Local Japanese American Citizen League, questioned me as to what protection might be expected from the Bank should developments be definitely detrimental to their interests, and whether or not the Bank would represent them when they are evacuated.

I indicated that responsibility for the future problems incident to evacuation have not been delegated but that I doubted if any undue advantage would be taken of the Japanese in view of the Government's expressed policy of protecting evacuees and their property rights. I suggested that they advise their agents or trustees of these developments, that perhaps the Anglo Bank, Mr. Celden, Madison and Burke and others might carry on for them at these meetings, and that they should in any event form a committee representing them as a group which could be contacted. This Committee through its chairman, could then make known the wishes of the Japanese who held property in the area under question even though the group as a whole became separated.

The foregoing is, no doubt, self explanatory. The writer's own impression is that developments were undoubtedly what might be expected in a first meeting. Future proposals should be more significant. However, the question as to the future role of the Bank has been implied on both the part of the Committee and the Japanese.

MEMORANDUM

CONFERENCE WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF AUTOMOBILE AND SUBJECT:

A conference was called at four o'clock this afternoon with representatives of the various finance companies and banks to discuss problems regarding the disposal of properties by evacuees, which properties are the subject of title retaining contracts. Those present and the interests represented were as follows:

Mr. Kimball of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York was in attendance.

This bank was represented by Messrs. Hale, Everson and Armstrong.

Our policy of encouraging the evacuees and all persons dealing with them to make their own equitable arrangements regarding disposition of their properties was carefully explained, and all of the persons in attendance expressed the desire of their own concerns to further the program. They explained that as businessmen they were attempting to minimize their losses but at the same time are endeavoring to be fair in their treatment of evacuees. It was explained that approximately 50 per cent of the evacuees desire to continue to hold the properties which are subject to conditional sale contracts, while the balance are interested in now settling their property interests with a view toward recovering reasonable equities where they are present.

It is apparent that considerable confusion is present in the field, and we explained that numerous complaints from evacuees have come to our attention wherein it is apparent that the contract holders have left the impression with the evacuee that whether or not the various contracts are in good standing they should be settled for in full at the present time.

The concerns represented that they expect to follow a policy of negotiating directly with evacuees, and where they can work out no satisfactory disposition of a given problem to consult our various field representatives in the presence of the evacuees in the hope of effecting a settlement satisfactory to all parties. We agreed that this would be a satisfactory procedure.

All of the concerns expressed a fear that they will be unable to locate their debtors when they have been removed from evacuated areas, and we have agreed to inquire into the procedure which we understand is to be established for contacting these persons.

The matter of automobiles was discussed to some extent, particularly the problems relating to the sale of 1942 automobiles which dealers are reluctant to take back into stock because of the limited sale possibilities of such cars and heavy floor stocks of new 1942 models.

The Army purchase plan was explained and discussed, and it was pointed out that automobiles so purchased would not go back on the private market.

All of the persons present displayed a completely cooperative attitude.

AGREW ENDORSEMENT OF REGISTRATION AND OWNERSHIP SUBJECT: CERTIFICATES IN CONNECTION WITH SALES OF MOTOR VEHICLES TO THE ARMY The Army has instructed us that we must be in a position to pass title to motor vehicles tendered by evacuees for sale to the Army under agreement with which you are familiar, in order to promptly dispose of motor vehicles left behind by evacuees in view of their probable rapid deterioration in the light of the type of storage facilities which will be provided. We will frequently be unable to obtain the registration certificate, and, of course, the ownership certificate, from the evacuee at the time he presents misself to the civil control center. Furthermore, such certificates as may be presented may not be properly endorsed. The question is therefore presented whether the tender agreement which has been prepared will be sufficient so that on its basis the Motor Vehicle Department will accept our endorsement of certificates of registration and ownership as the agent of evacuees. In other words, will our agreement place us in the position of the evacues in the eyes of the Motor Vehicle Department to take such action as may be necessary to arrange for the transfer of legal titles to motor vehicles which are subject to the registration requirements of the Motor Vehicle Act? Your consideration of this matter will be apprecised.

SUBJECT: DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION TO JAPANESE COMMUNITIES

- Mr. Sabu Kido, National President of the Japanese American Citizens League, will undertake distribution of instructions, press releases and information relative to evacuation, exclusion orders, property protection and crop protection.
- In the distribution of information of the nature described, provision should be made to insure its reaching his organization. The Administrative Branch, and through it, the Press Branch, should establish the point of contact and insure that it is maintained.
- I have had reports this morning of lack of current information in Wartime Civil Control Administration field offices. I am asking that a copy of this memorandum be circulated to each liaison officer of the associated federal services. The Press Branch and the Liaison officers should coordinate the dissemination of information so that all concerned are advised of all developments. The Planning Unit, in the Evacuation Operations Branch, should make provision for proper coordination and dissemination of information to the lialson officers. Liaison officers should insure, through their agencies, the immediate, and if necessary, the telegraphic distri-bution of information regarding the new developments to their field offices and agents.

SUBJECT: STATE RAILROAD COMMISSION TRUCKING PERMITS AND PROBLEMS
PERTAINING TO EVACUATION

This morning I received a telephone call from a Mr. Floyd McColl, representing the State of California Railroad Commission, who was seeking information on problems which will arise in connection with trucking permits.

The Commission, upon due investigation, has issued trucking permits to all licensed operators whether alien or citizen. This license includes certain payments on the pert of the truck operator to provide for public liability and property damage insurance.

The Commission had asked Mr. McColl to explore the mechanical procedure involved in storing or taking sustedy of such equipment. They were also interested in determining how we might work out a method for mutual occuparation in order that such licenses might be revoked in the case of those aliens affected.

I explained to Mr. McColl that actual evacuation orders had not as yet been issued but that such orders were imminent in certain Southern California areas; also, that we were establishing a method of tagging, identification and custodien facilities at reception centers to be designated shortly. It occured to me that the information which we will obtain, including the name of any evacuee together with a description of his property including trucks, trailers, etc., would afford an efficient means of expediting this problem. Following this line of thought, I suggested to Mr. McColl that when all such mobile property had come within our jurisdiction, we would contact his office and make arrangements for a list to be supplied by then containing the names of all truckers and truck operators who might be affected. Once this list has been cleared, it seems a simple matter to obtain from the equipment the necessary identifying licenses, enabling the Railroad Commission to cancel the paid up insurance, etc.

> "Quoting the Code of Ethics of the California Real Estate Association, 5% is considered a reasonable fee for . management, overseeing, collection of rents and crop proceeds, payment of taxes, etc. (Fee based upon gross proceeds) On very difficult jobs have charged as high as 72% (where income is very low in relation to management problem such as cattle ranch, etc.) 'Truck' forms - 5% individually, 3% or 4% in a group.

"General overall management of improved city property - 5% of gross (if there is an income). Less in certain cases.

"Very difficult to cite an average on farm property. They have one case -22,000 acre grain ranch requiring marketing and detailed management from the bank which has been charged almost 10%.

"A good farm, with good tenant and manager, could be managed at 5% easily.

"Average figure would not be a guide in any individual instance. Average of 7% would be too high for many, not high enough for a few."

Coldwell & Banker (Mr. Hall): (Urban)

"3% on gross collections, plus extras for special services."

San Francisco Real Estate Board (Smith) (Urban and rural)

"Improved property 3% plus renting and leasing commissions. General Management 5%. Rarely any reason to run higher than 5%.

The public is entitled to a complete and clear account of the activities of the Federal Government in evacuating Japanese and other persons from military areas and in relocating them.

Several agencies are involved in this program, each performing a necessary function. To make available the maximum amount of pertinent information, without conflict or duplication, will require close cooperation between all of us working in this field.

We therefore suggest that, beginning immediately, each agency involved clear with the Wartime Civil Control Administration and the War Relocation Authority all informational material relating to any phase of the evacuation and relocation program.

We undertake to clear such material promptly. With this in mind, the San Francisco information office of the War Belocation Authority and the Press Branch of the Wartime Civil Control Administration have been located in the same building - The Whitcomb Hotel. Captain Sinnett, Room 481, is in charge of the Press Branch of Wartime Civil Control Administration, and John Bird, Room 348, is in charge of Public Relations of War Relocation Authority.

The cooperation of your agency will be sincerely appreciated.

Reports of Interviews

I have just read over about twenty reports of interviews had with Japanese clients of the Evacuee Property Department. I found such reports very enlightening in getting adequate information both as to the problems being raised by such persons and the answers being given.

I suggest that you will want to get copies of all such reports and go over them, at least during the first few weeks the organization is in operation.

It seems clear to me that there is a great need of specialization on the part of the interviewers in various types of problems. I understand the system is to rotate the interviewers between interviewing, telephone calls, and other work, and not to have one man specializing in problems with regard to laundry business, nurseries, etc. I think you will find it true that most of the persons who come into the office not only have problems to raise but have a great deal of information to furnish, much of which can be passed on to the other people who come into the office. In a short time any able man should become reasonably c expert in handling the problems concerning one or more types of business.

The interview sheets reveal that many of the people coming into the office are persons desiring to acquire the property of evacuees. These persons are being told to proceed through regular business and commercial channels. Thus valuable opportunities for evacuees to dispose of their property are being lost. Immediate consideration should be given to establishing a listing procedure whereby any desiring to buy property of evacuees and any evacuees desiring to sell property may list such business opportunities with the Evacuee Property office, such list to be mimeographed and distributed to all interested persons.

Sawyer, partner in the firm of Cladatein, Grossman, Margolis and Sawyer, approached me this afternoon and represented himself as being chairman of a local committee of the Civil Liberties Union. Mr. Sawyer was interested in determining to what extent our organization was willing to go, in order to expedite the various problems affecting evacuees. He further stated that in his opinion, the problem of avarious business men who were attempting to accure Japanese assets at bargain prices, was very acute.

Along these lines he felt that if we would detail for his benefit our function, he might be in a position to offer suggestions as to additional services

Sometime was spent in explaining the functions of this department to Mr. Sawyer and the conversation was of an entirely amicable nature. After we had discussed the various problems both actual and hypothetical, which could be readily anticipated. I showed him certain documents outlining our procedure and giving him a fairly comprehensive idea of the nature of this work and what it entailed.

When the interview was practically concluded I asked Mr. Sawyer if he had any suggestions by which we might further act in aiding evacuees, or if he felt we were doing all that was possible at the present time. His answer to this question was that he could see no further steps that might be taken and that he felt we were performing an admirable function.

## PRESS RELEASE

Lieutenant General J. L. DeWitt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, announced today that the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco has been appointed to assist Japanese and other evacuees situated within prohibited or restricted military areas in the disposition of their property.

The Treasury Department and the military authorities have given broad powers to the bank to enable it to carry out the objectives of the program. Bank officials indicated that they are undertaking this program under the direction of General DeWitt for the purpose of assisting military authorities in clearing up the problem presented by the war emergency.

The Federal Reserve Bank, acting in conjunction with the commanding general, plans to carry on the project through the bank's extensive facilities, as well as those of its branches in Seattle, Portland, and Los Angeles. The objective of the program will be to bring about a fair and just liquidation of that property which the evacuees cannot take with them.

The Federal Reserve Bank will establish other offices in the coastal areas in order that evacuees may receive impartial counsel and advice in their efforts to liquidate their property, as well as assistance in the sale or other disposition of their property. These offices also will take strong measures to protect the evacuees against unscrupulous creditors.

General DeWitt and Federal Reserve officials stated that the government does not plan to take title to the property of the evacuees. On the contrary, it is their intention to aid the evacuees in a voluntary liquidation of their property at reasonable prices and to protect them against individuals who seek to take advantage of their situation. If need be, officials stated, the bank will be prepared to take over the control of the property under powers of attorney in order to protect the property interest of the evacuee. Evacuees will be encouraged to come in and discuss their problems relating to the disposition of their property. No one will be compelled to come in, but those desiring the bank's services will find competent and impartial men prepared to assist them in their problems.

General DeWitt made clear that speed and fairness are the keynotes of this program and that expeditious handling of the evacuee's property is essential because of the urgency of the West Coast situation.

Officials stated that the Federal Reserve Bank will work in close cooperation with Federal, state, and local public agencies that may be called upon for assistance in dealing with the property of evacuees during the course of its liquidation. These agencies have been or undoubtedly will be called upon by the military authorities to handle other aspects of the evacuation problem, such as the transportation and the resettlement of the evacuees and their reemployment in new areas. Banks and other institutions in the various communities throughout the West Coast area will be called upon to do their full part in bringing about an orderly and equitable disposition of the evacuee's property.

General DeWitt stated that he had been requested by the Federal Reserve Bank to point out that Treasury Department freezing regulations will not interfere with the program. This is particularly true in view of the amendment to General License No. 68A being released by the Federal Reserve Bank. The General License now permits Japanese evacuees operating under such license to dispose of their property without restriction.

In its operations as Fiscal Agent of the United States the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco has been delegated the duty of assisting Japanese, German and Italian aliens and persons of Japanese ancestry evacuating from the Military Areas which have been designated by Headquarters Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, Presidio of San Francisco, California, in Public Proclamation No. 1, issued under date of March 2, 1942, in arrapting for the protection, preservation and equitable disposition of the property holdings of such evacuees. In this operation, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco is subject to the general direction of the military authorities.

The following general outline of procedure has been established for the administration of this program:

- 1. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will not take possession of property of an evacuee as an alien property custodian, but will serve largely as an advisor to the evacuee in the matter of disposition of his property.
- 2. All dealings with the evacuee will be on a purely voluntary basis, and he will have complete freedom in disposing of his property.
- 3. The evacuee will be encouraged in his own interest to make private arrangements for the disposition of his property by sale, lease, or other appropriate means by either:
  - (a) Independent action of the evacuee on his own account, or
- and of body (b) Through an agent of the evacuee's own selection.
- 4. In the selection of an agent the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will recommend the appointment by the evacuee of some person or institution in which the evacuee reposes confidence to represent his interests such as his bank, his attorney, or his real estate agent.
  - 5. If an evacuee is unable to otherwise arrange for the equitable disposal of his property or for an agent acceptable to the evacuee to represent him, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will give consideration to accepting his power of attorney.
  - 6. Each case will be considered on its individual merits and disposed of on that basis.
  - 7. All advice and assistance possible will be provided the evacuee by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, and it is expected that the banks and others within the Areas involved who are approached by evacuees for assistance will likewise extend their full assistance and cooperation to the end that the purpose of the program will be completely served. It is recognized that the assistance of the banks in the field will make for greater speed in the execution of the program.
  - 8. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will endeavor to advise and assist banks and others whom the evacuees select as their agents in the performance of their agencies. Obviously, if the banks and others within the Military Areas who are approached by evacuees to act as agents will accept such agencies, the entire program will benefit.
  - 9. From time to time the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will disseminate such information and instructions as will assist in the administration of the plan.
  - 10. Assistance will be provided by governmental agencies, both Federal and state, in the administration of the evacuation plan, including those agencies handling other aspects of the evacuee

problem. The evacuees and their representatives including their agents should seek the helps of such agencies for specific matters within their fields such as those arising out of the treatment of growing crops and other specialized problems.

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- 11. While emphasis is placed on the liquidation of the property holdings of the evacuee, he will be informed by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco that he may retain ownership of property left behind if appropriate arrangements can be made for its protection and preservation.
- 12. The program will be administered by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco through its head office and through its branches in Seattle, Washington; Portland, Oregon; and Los Angeles, California; as well as such other offices as may be established in the Areas for the efficient furtherance of its aims. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco has established its Evacuee Property Department in San Francisco, California, at 500 California Street in that city.
- 13. It is intended to undertake to forestall action by unscrupulous creditors which would be detrimental to the interest of the evacuee and in all respects to minimize his losses to the greatest possible extent in connection with the disposition of his property. It is anticipated that this will be accomplished to a large extent through appeal to the creditor's sense of fair play and the obvious necessity of complete cooperation in the administration of the evacuation program. Any cases in which an equitable settlement is not agreed upon should be promptly brought to the attention of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco.
- 14. No compulsion will be placed upon evacuees to utilize the facilities provided by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, but they are invited to make use of them.

The foregoing are intended to set forth certain basic principles which the Federal Reserve Bank, acting in its capacity as Fiscal Agent of the United States, feels to be important in the efficient, speedy and proper execution of its duties. In the conduct of the evacuation plan it is particularly desired that the banks throughout the Areas will extend their full cooperation in the knowledge that by widespread assistance to the evacuees the problems incident to their removal from the Areas can be most readily and expeditiously solved. In their fulfillment of their places in this program, banks are requested to give consideration to the procedure and principles enumerated above. As the program goes forward the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco proposes to communicate to the banks additional suggestions and outlines of procedure or changes in procedure calculated to improve its administration of the program and to provide public circulation of data directed toward its speedy accomplishment.

Crowley has been named as the Custodian. It might be well to indicate that no office has yet been established locally so far as we know, but that undoubtedly information as to this matter will be available through the press in due course.
