At the time the Japanese were evacuated from the coastal defense area, a loan was made to the above individual to purchase the chattels belonging to a certain Japanese. A mortgage was taken on the acquired chattels and as security, title was supposed to have been taken in favor of the United States, as represented by the Farm Security Administration, on a 1934 Chevrolet truck, motor number T4101698, serial number 6PD3203, but inadvertently the name of the Federal Reserve Bank appears as legal owner on the title certificate issued.

The registered owner, Mr. Menard, has now paid his loan in full and requests that the Farm Security Administration, who is handling the collection of the loans made to purchasers of Japanese property under the WCCA program, release the above truck to him.

Since the United States Federal Reserve Bank was shown as legal owner in error and since the Federal Reserve Bank has no interest in the above truck, we hereby request that you release the certificate of title number D362615, herewith enclosed, by endorsing it on line 2 on the back and returning it to us.



September 17, 13,2 Evacues Property Department (Prospective program of forwarding household goods, etc. stored privately by Japanese evacuees,) The following excerpt is taken from a memorandum dated September 9, 1942 directed by the Western Defense Command and Pourth Army to all Wartime Civil Control Administration Civilian Agencies concerned, which indicates that a program is being developed to make available to evacuees their household and personal effects which they stored privately at the time of evacuations " a. War Relocation Authority will, under the conditions set forth below, move the household and personal effects of those evacuees now in Assembly Centers to Relocation Projects. (1) Evacuees whose household and personal effects are stored in Pedoral Recerve warehouses, under the jurisdiction of the war Relocation Authority, and such other private warehouses as the Mar Relocation Authority designates. (2) For those evacues whose household and personal effects are in storage places not designated in (1) above, the War Relocation Authority will move such household and personal effects to Relocation Projects provided the evacuee, at his own expense, makes arrangements to have his household and personal effects moved from their present place of storage to a central receiving warehouse, the location of such warehouses to be designated by the Rer Relocation Authority. The name, address and location of such central receiving warehouses will be supplied at a later date by the War Relocation Authority. (3) The privilege of moving such household and personal effects from places of storage to authorized warehouses will be limited to a period as jointly prescribed by the War Relocation Authority and the wartime Civil Control Administration. (4) Shipment of household and personal effects, except clothing of immediate need, of evacuees from any source pursuant to any arrangements made by evacuous, their agents, any agency, or any other person or persons, to Assembly Centers is prohibited.

- (5) The Wartime Civil Control Administration will not great passus or transfers to evacuees for the purpose of permitting evacuees now in Assembly Centers to travel within Wilitary Area So. 1 or No. 2 for the purpose of making arrangements or preparing household and personal effects for removal to the warshouses designated or to be designated.
- (6) The Wartime Civil Control administration will not allow evacuees now in Relocation Projects to re-enter Military Area Bo. 1 or Mo. 2 for the purpose of making arrangements or preparing household and personal effects for shipment to warshouses as designated or to be designated later, or to Relocation Projects.
- (7) Instructions pertaining to shipment of household and personal effects for those evacuoes in War Relocation Projects will be issued by the War Relocation Authority.
- (8) For the purpose of clarification, household and personal effects which may be shipped (as provided above) are defined as such articles of household furniture, kitchen equipment, and utensils, and clothing normally used in connection with daily life at places of previous residence.
- (9) (a) In order that the War Relocation Authority will be kept fully acquainted with the volume of household and personal effects which are to be shipped from private storage to central receiving warehouses, it is desired that evacuees now in Assembly Centers whose housetold and personal effects are in private storage make an application in writing to the Center Manager on forms provided, setting forth their desire to take advantage of the privilege as set forth in Paragraph S.a.(2) above.
 - (b) This application will only apply to evacuees whose household and personal effects are not now in warehouses provided by the Federal Reserve Bank at the time of the evacuation.
 - (c) Application forms will be provided by the Operations Branch, Wartime Civil Control Administration, 1231 Market Street, San Francisco, California.

- (d) These forms are self-explanatory and will be filled out completely in triplicate. The original and duplicate are to be sent daily to the Operations Branch, Wartime Civil Control Administration, 1231 Market Street, San Francisco, California; the third copy to be retained by the evacues. Upon receipt of the original and duplicate, the Operations Branch will send the original copy of the application to the War Relocation Authority, transmitting same through the Chief, Temporary Sattlement Operations Division. The Operations Branch will maintain a file for the duplicate copy.
- b. All costs pertaining to such shipments, except as provided in Paragraph S.a.(2), this bulletin, will be for the account of the War Belocation Authority.
- e. Private automobiles of evacuees will not be included.

By Command of Lieutenant General DewlTT:

While this memorandum primarily relates to evacuees in assembly centers, we are informed that the War Relocation Authority is issuing instructions on the subject to its Project Directors and, in due course, residents of the relocation centers will be informed on the subject. It is probable that the information will not be generally circulated in the relocation areas for a week or two.

So far as we can determine, no consolidation points have been designated as yet, although we are advised by the War Relocation Authority that the matter is receiving consideration.

This memorandum requires no action on the part of this bank but is provided for your general information.



Since receiving your letter of August 21, 1942, we have been endeavoring to obtain some reliable information regarding the extent to which Japanese Evacuees have stored their farm machinery in such a way as to make it unavailable for production

While time has not permitted a complete check of the district, we have followed up a great many remove and so called "tips". However, the only case which investigation has so far authenticated is that a tractor (description unknown) belonging to Mr. Dando Yasuda is stored with the Matsen Motor Company at Wapata, Washington. Perhaps impury at the motor company will indicate that even this information is not reliable. We have not yet made such an inquiry.

1. We are enclosing a copy of a letter dated June 11, 1942, from Miyako Nakamura, which has been received by our Portland Branch under the circumstances outlined in a communication received from our Branch under date of June 22, 1942, which is quoted in part, as follows:

"A letter dated June 11, 1942, written by Miyako Nakamura, now at Tulelake, California, and addressed to Mr. M. K. Conway at Chehalis, Washington, came to this office after being sent by Mr. Conway of the Washington State Employment Service to Mr. Tom G. Rathbone of the United States Employment Service at Olympia, Washington, and referred by that office to the Seattle Branch, Federal Reserve Bank, reaching us from that source on June 20. We are enclosing a copy of the letter inquiring about the location of the evacuee's property and the steps necessary to return the property to the owners now at Tulelake, California.

Our records indicate that we did accept for storage in Portland, one trunk as described in the letter, from Yasaku Nakamura, under family No. 19883, and received at Warehouse No. 5, Oregon Transfer Company, 733 N. W. Everett Street on June 4, 1942. We hold also an acknowledgement dated June 12, 1942, signed by Yasaku Namamura for a copy of the WCCA Form FRB-2, sent to him as his official receipt for the stored property. The family registration and all of our storage forms are in the name of Yasaku Nakamura, while the inquiry letter is signed by Miyako Nakamura. Former identical address and all other details indicate they are apparently in the same family."

In addition to the personal property form WCCA Form FRB-2 copies of which have been forwarded to you for transmittal to the War Relocation Authority, we are holding nonnegotiable warehouse arrival notices issued by the Oregon Transfer Company to Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, covering the goods stored in the warehouse, indicating thereon the family number and name of the evacuee. The Transfer Company has informed us that it will not be necessary to surrender these forms at the time authorized releases are made from the warehouse. A blank copy of this form is forwarded for your information.

In view of this information, we shall be pleased to have you inform us as to the disposition to be made of the warehouse arrival notices.

Enclosed is a tentative outline of the information to be submitted to Colonel Bendetsen as requested in his memorandum of May N19, 1942 forwarded with our letter referred to above.

It will not be necessary for you to provide any information regarding Section I of the enclosure concerning the authority of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. We will desire the information called for in the other sections, however.

Sith respect to paragraph B-6 of Section III, it is our thought that in addition to the submission of particular cases we should be in a position to provide a general picture of the work accomplished, which will show the number of cases closed, the types of businesses involved and such other data as may be pertinent. We are enclosing an office form through which we have compiled reports on a weekly basis for Head Office zone, which shows, among other things, a breakdown of the types of business involved in interviews. This form is enclosed with the thought that you may have maintained some similar records by which it would be possible to show the total volume of cases handled during the period of operations and some breakdown as to the type of interviews. Esturally only the total volume figures will be recessary so far as our report is concerned, rather than the detailed weekly volume data that is called for in the enclosed report.

We should, of course, be informed as to the total cases closed on a numerical or a percentage basis, as well as the cases pending.

The enclosed outline is somewhat tentative and it may be that when the mechanical work of compiling the information suggested is undertaken, changes in the subject matter, or additions to it, might be desirable. If the advisability of making such changes or additions should become apparent, we will be pleased to advise you. At the same time, if desirable changes or additions should occur to you, we would be pleased to have you communicate your thoughts to us.

We believe our report should be as of the close of business Friday, May 22, 1942. Insemuch as we must have our information in the hands of Colonel Bendetsen by June 5, 1942, we will appreciate your providing us with the desired information by June 1, 1942.

The legal owner of the automobile is abroad and even if it were possible to obtain a duplicate ownership certificate, the legal owner would not be in a position to effect the necessary endorsement to qualify the automobile for sale, nor to place the legal ownership in his son for the purpose of permitting him to make the necessary arrangements. While if the son of the legal owner could arrange to obtain a duplicate ownership certificate showing himself as legal owner we might be able to disregard any technicality involved, we question whether the Motor Venicle Department would be willing to take such a step. We are presenting this metter to the Army for its consideration as it is typical of a number of similar cases which present serious problems so far as the automobile purchase program is concerned. Pending further developments or instructions, our only course of action will be to hold the car in storage and to proceed with the appraisal. In other words, if there are any cases where a number of Japanese have gotten together and stored their automobiles in a garage or some other place, we would be interested in having such information to pass along to the Army. For your information, the Army is apparently not interested in the property protection aspects of the problem, but rather in its military aspects. In obtaining this information we have avoided contacting the Japanese, but rather have limited our survey to

information coming into the hands of our representatives without going back to the Japanese on the specific point.



In instances where appraisals exceed the Army price limitations, namely \$750 for light cars and \$1200 for medium cars, further consideration as to the disposition of the meter vehicle must be given in each instance prior to selling to the Army at their maximum figure.

It is therefore suggested that as such conditions arise, the subject be impediately taken up with the evacues to determine whether or not he is satisfied with the maximum price which the Army is permitted to pay, or if he desires further assistance from us in an endeavor to obtain a better price in the open market.

Christaly, in the case of 1942 automobiles, with the fixed market condition which exists, the opportunities of obtaining buyers other than the Army will be most limited; hence, in many cases the evacues's only alternative, other than substantial loss through depreciation, may be to sell to the Army.

The car to a friend or a dealer, and if this is the case, Form EPMS should be used for this purpose, as outlined in our letter of April 21, 1942.

In instances where the appraised value does not exceed the amount which will be acceptable as final payment by the legal owner, we should not arbitrarily deliver the car to such owner. We should inform the evacuee of the circumstances and if he concludes that the car be delivered to the legal owner, which should be the case in most instances, his instructions should be obtained on Form EPMS. If however, he still feels that he has an equity to protect, every attempt should be made to bring him and his creditor together or to assist him in realizing a fair walms for his car from some other source. Delivery to the creditor or to a third person should be made only after we have received Form EPMS properly signed.

WCCA Form FRB-4 indicates that where the evacues has no equity, the right of any creditor to repossess or recapture, as provided by law, would not be resisted by the custodian of the motor vehicle; therefore, it is felt that if we can not bring the evacues and the legal owner together on agreeable terms, we should permit the legal owner to recover possession in accordance with such rights as he may possess in any given case. We do feel, however, that the burden should be placed upon the legal owner to establish the propriety of the repossession method he desires to pursue. Such cases should be few and our file should be complete showing all efforts made in the evacues should.

We are enclosing a copy of a memorandum dated May 10, 1942, directed to this bank by the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, signed by Lt. Col. Martin F. Hass, concerning a new program to be launched in an attempt to anourage evacues to sell their motor vehicles to the Army in instances where they have delivered them to us for storage under Alternative No. 1.

In the interests of uniformity, we are outlining the steps contemplated in this office, after the close of each Civil Control Station, and the acceptance by us of motor vehicles at the place designated:

- No. 1 and Alternative No. 2, will be appraised as quickly as convenient.
- 2. Simultaneous with the appraising operation, Forms KP6 will be mailed to the legal owner if he is other than the registered owner, regardless of the Alternative selected by the evacues.
- owner, they will immediately be forwarded to the Assembly Center for confirmation of balance owed by the evacues.
- 4. On receipt of the forms, properly confirmed by the evacues, they will be compared with the appraised amount and determination made as to whether the motor vehicles are eligible for purchase by the Army.
- 5. If the appraised value exceeds the settlement balance (amount which will be accepted as final payment), motor vehicles delivered to us under Alternative No. 2 will be delivered to the Army (Form EPM10) as quickly as convenient.
- 6. A letter will be addressed to the evacues who has chosen Alternative No. 1, making a definite offer, which will include the emount for which the car was appraised, the amount that the legal owner will accept as final payment, and will indicate the balance which will be paid to the registered owner. If the evacues is convinced that he should sell his car to the army, rather than continue to have it held for storage, he will so indicate in the space provided on the letter. A suggested form of this letter is attached.

and \$1200 for medium) must be kept in mind at all times in considering Paragraphs 4, 5 and 6 above.

- 7. If the letter is returned properly signed, and the evacues has indicated that he wishes to sell his car under Alternative No. 2, the car should be delivered to the Army on Form EPM10, as provided.
- 8. The letters should be given to our representstive at the Assembly Center, with instructions to determine that in each individual case the evacues understands that he will not be permitted to take his motor vehicle to a Reception Center and that no assurence whatever can be given that he will be enabled at some future time, to have the motor vehicle returned for his individual use. Also, that he understands the highly undesirable effect that open-air storage will have on his motor vehicle.

Obviously, the use of Form EP6 will not apply in instances where the registered owner and the legal owner are one and the seme person, and letters to evacuees, indicating the amount which they will be given for their motor vehicle. Bay be handed to our representative at the Assembly Center immediately upon completion of the appraisals.

- In It is imperative that evacuous' care be put to some economic use. The steel, ruther and lead involved is standing idle and deteriorating at a time when these items and transportation in general are needed for national defense.
- 2. It is desired that these care be acquired by the Army through purchase if possible, so as to obviate the necessity of using other means of acquisition.
- 3. At the present time the evaquee has the opportunity of selling his car to the Army, but he has been in the position of making a "blind deal", the result of which has been unsatisfactory from the standpoint of number of cars acquired.
- A. It is desired that the present procedure be continued and that in addition therete the program be augmented as follows:
 - (a) After the appraisal is made and
 - (b) After the amount of indebtedness has been obtained and
 - (c) After the indebtedness has been confirmed by the evacue
 - (4) Then the evacues be ismediately contacted with a definite offer (less incidental refunds, etc.) for the purchase of his car.

It is desired also that the evacuees be informed as tactfully as possible, but without over-emphasis, that no assurance whatever can be given that they will be enabled at some future time to have the motor vehicles now owned by them returned for their individual use. The news items appearing in the daily press about the prospective requisitioning of all civilian-owned cars, if nothing more, should be sufficient warrant for a further urging that the evacuees accept the offer to be made.

5. Early reports as to the progress of this plan are desired so that if it does not appear to be meeting with success other measures can be adopted.

As requested in your letter dated May 6, 1942 there is enclosed statement showing rental data for Evacuee Property Department activities.

The Pacific International Livestock Exposition 1 acre month to month agreement has been eliminated from the statement since this proposed parking area is not used by us and no rent has been paid. However, for your information, evacuee motor vehicles are stored in the open on the Pacific International Livestock Exposition grounds adjacent to the Wartime Civil Control Administration Assembly Center, North Portland, Oregon with no rental charge.

Continuous guard service of the William J. Burns International Detective Agency commenced at 6 P.M. on May 2, 1942. At the present time only six motor vehicles are stored by us for evacues and it appears that only a small number will be tendered either for storage or sale to the United States Army.

In view of the fact that ample storage space is evailable in the warehouse it appears advisable that we store the motor vehicles at 733 N. W. Everett St., Portland Oregon. This, of course, would result in considerable saving as the Burns guard service could then be cancelled.

That rustions regarding use of Towers of Attorney (Forms Mis. 253 and Mis. 234)

Mul

In dealing with evacuees relative to problems involving their property interests, there will be encountered certain cases where the evacuee will not desire to appoint anyone other than the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco as his attorney-in-fact. Forms Mis. 233 and Mis. 234 are designed to cover such situations.

Generally speaking this bank will not accept powers of attorney to act for evacuees unless and until the powers to be exercised and the general situation surrounding the transaction have been examined and it is felt that this bank can perform a useful function in accepting the power. The acceptance of a power of attorney carries with it the obligation to exercise reasonable diligence in the performance of the duties undertaken. The obligations thus involved should only be essued in those cases where it appears reasonably certain that no one else can be found to accept the responsibility and where it also appears that the evacuee hes a clear south or other property rights which cannot be adequately protected extake to act as attorney-in-fact in any case which involves the carrying on of a going business concern, such as the conduct of a mercantile business, the management and operation of a hotel or rooming house, or other such active business. Powers of attorney should be accepted in cases involving the care and hervesting of growing crops only in those instances where arrangements have been made in advance with the local agency of the Department of Agriculture, a reliable agriculturist or other competent channel through which the work can be performed.

In each instance where after investigation it seems necessary for the Federal Reserve Bank to accept a power of attorney, the power should be accompanied by written instructions signed by the grantor of the power, setting forth the duties which the bank is called upon to perform, the disposition to be made of the property, and any other necessary details in relation thereto. These instructions must, of course, be in form and substance satisfactory to this bank. Cases involving the assumption by this bank of important or onerous duties should be referred to head office for consideration, accompanied by a statement of all necessary details, before the power of attorney is accepted.

Since the exercise of power under the authority granted may involve dealing in real property or in personal property in connection with which mortgages or other encumbrances exist, both forms of power of attorney must be acknowledged before a netary public.

Form Mis. 233

This form is intended for execution by individuals or co-partnerships. If executed by a co-partnership, the structures of all co-partners should be obtained wherever possible. Names, addresses and dates should be carefully filled in. The evacues should not be encouraged to execute a power of attorney until after a sufficient investigation has been made to determine that the duties to be performed thereunder are such as reasonably can be accepted by this bank

As stated above, when the power of attorney is executed, it should be accompanied by written instructions signed by the same persons who execute the power of attorney, setting forth in general terms the disposition to be made of the property involved, a description of the property, its location, and such guaranties as may seem necessary with regard to the payment of rent, storage charges, taxes, or other obligations going with the property.

The grantor of the power of attorney should be furnished a duplicate copy. It will be noted that the power of attorney is not valid for any purpose until accepted in writing by this bank. Such acceptances properly dated and signed by an authorized egent of this bank should not be executed until after the investigation above referred to has been made.

Form Mis. 234

This form is intended for execution only by corporations. The general observations applicable to form Mis. 233 above set forth apply to this form. The same investigation should be made and the same form of written instructions should be obtained. Greater care, however, is necessary in consection with the execution of corporate powers of attorney.

The correct name of the corporation should be inserted on the first line and at the place for signature. It should be signed by the president or vice president, attested by the secretary or assistant secretary, and the corporate seal must be affixed. Powers of attorney should not be accepted from corporations unless accompanied by a certified copy of resolution of the directors specifically authorizing the issuance of the power of attorney.



- (a) Federal Security Agency will instruct its representatives at every U. S. Employment Service office in the Western Defense Command of the contents of Proclamation No. 3 and of the contents of a proclamation to be issued directing Jepanese as to the method of contraband disposition.
- (b) Federal Security Agency will instruct its employment service office representatives to accept contraband from Japanese and to prepare receipts in duplicate, delivering one to the owner, retaining one. The Agency will further instruct these representatives to arrange with local warehouse companies To pick up the contraband, store it, and issue a covering werehouse receipt for the items stored.
- (c) Mr. Tom Clark has agreed to arrange for constructive possession to be taken by the appropriate United States Marshalls. These Marshalls would take possession of receipts, including ware-house receipts; probably U. S. Employment Service office represen-tatives should be instructed to mail these receipts to the neurost United States Vershall.
- S. As I understand it the Alien Property Custodian will be responsible for absorbing the cost of warehousing and other incidentals involved in storage and at the proper time will vest title to the property described in the several varehouse receipts in the name of the United States.
- 3. I am delivering a copy of this memorandum to all of the persons described above. It is understood that no enforcement responsibility will be imposed by this arrangement upon the U. S. Employment Service officers. a proclamation will be prepared this date and or pies will be supplied all concerned at the first opportunity.

Reference is made to your letter of March 25, 1942 commenting on instruction letter No. 7.

Since we are not at the present time maintaining field offices in this zone other than the one in Portland, we have not been able in the short time at our disposal to obtain information regarding the situation outside of this city except such information as was obtained from the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and the United States Marshall's Office.

Neither the Portland Police nor the two other offices just mentioned would comment as to whether or not the contraband held by them represents substantially all of such contraband which should have been turned in under the previous order. However, from the volume reported it would be our opinion that the items collected might represent a substantial portion of such items.

Reference is made to Instruction Letter No. 4, dated March 20, on this subject. In this letter we have attempted to emphasize that Field Representatives should not assume the responsibility of designating "Special Blocked Property". However, this power should be exercised by you when in your discretion it is necessary. The exceptional conditionated cases should be referred to Read Office in instances where time will permit.

The Instruction Letter indicates the number of copies that should be made of each form. However, it is requested that, if necessary, additional copies be made in order that you might furnish Head Office with one copy of Forms EP 1, EP 2 and EP 4, and two copies of EF 3. TFE-1 (Revised) should be submitted to Head Office, in tripplicate, in the usual manner. You will observe that Forms EP 1 and EP 2 come in sets of three and the blue forms should be used for any extra copies necessary.

For your information, we are enclosing a copy of a memorandum from the Army, covering the proposed procedure to be followed in the evacuation of Bainbridge Island, in order that you might anticipate problems which will occur at the time areas in your zone are evacuated.

Registers for Forms EP 4, Petition for Blocking under Special Regulation No. 1, EP 1, Posting Notice No... Special Blocked Property, and EP 2, Wail Notice, designating Special Blocked Property, are being prepared by us and will be forwarded to you as quickly as possible. In the interim, however, a temporary Register should be maintained.

It is our intention to include on the Register, for Form EP 4, Petition for Blocking under Special Regulation No. 1., columns which will indicate the date that EP 3, Memorandum of Agreement and Settlement, and Form TPE-1 (Revised), are received by the Federal Reserve Bank.

A separate series of numbers should be used for each of the forms on which a Register will be kept, and you should use "P" as a prefix for all numbers assigned in your office.



We are asking you what stops may be taken in the case of E. Yemzhita, wife and granddaughter of twelve years. Their address is 516 South Central, Medford, Gregon.

The man end wife were both born in Japan, the granddaughter in Seattle.

The Yamashitas have lived here for thirty years or more.

The husband has been employed as jenitor. For years he worked for Fermers and Fruit Growers Bank until 1t was taken into the branch of U. S. National and also worked for the U. S. National when it was known as The Medford National. He has always been well respected and liked by his employers. Too, he has contributed generously to the Red Gross, Community Chests and other charities. Not just recently but through many years.

Me is past seventy three years and his wife in the late sixties.

His wife is and has been quite ill. She has been almost an invalid for years and the husband has paid thousands of dollars for operations and medical care for her. She suffers from asthma, stomach and other ills.

We know two reliable doctors here who will gladly sign affidavits to her condition and that she should not be moved.

We do not know if it has been definitely decided to move all nationals from this area, but we would like to know just what steps can be taken to permit this family of three to remain in their home?

For a man who has labored hard all these years, taken excellent care of his family and never, throughout his life, been in any kind of trouble there should be some consideration, even though his wife were not ill.

With us this is purely a humanitaries effort in their behalf. As to this fact, also as to our reliability I can refer you to Mr. George Fray, manager of Medford Branch of the U.S. National Bank. He also knows this family and I am sure would gledly help them in any way he could.

Evacues Property Department (Parking Pacilities at Assembly Centers)

The Wartime Civil Control Administration has expressed considerable concern in the problem of parking motor vehicles at the Assembly Centers, for the reason that in some instances it would use up the only recreation areas available for the evacuess of the camp.

In a telephone conversation with Colonel Evens of the local headquarters of the WCCA, he informed us that the number of motor vehicles which might be stored at each Assembly Center without seriously reducing recreation space, are as follows:



PROCURING PAYMENT FOR MOTOR VEHICLES SOLD TO THE ARMY

We are ehclosing a specimen copy of Form MPM 10. Schedule of Motor Vehicles Delivered, which should be prepared and attached to Public Voucher for Purchases and Services Other Than Personal. Form 1034. A supply of Forms EFM 10 should be mimeographed by you as required, the enclosed copy being intended only as a guide in preparing the schedules.

The schedule, Form EFM 10, should also be prepared in quadruplicate, one copy to be attached to each of the copies of Form 1034 submitted and one copy retained for your files. The receipt of the Quartermaster Corps representative who takes delivery of the motor vehicles need be obtained only on your file copy of the schedule.

Voucher Forms 1034, with supporting schedules, should be delivered to the local limison officer of the Quartermaster Corps, who will forward them through the regular channels for payment. Enclosures Armstrongigh Disposition of Motor Vehicles Eligible For Purchase by the Army

In our letter of April 22nd, 1942 and other communications previous thereto, we have outlined the procedure for the appraisal of motor vehicles and the execution of Form EP 6, where the legal owner is other than the evacues.

When these steps have been completed and a car has been designated for sale to the Army, the car may be released to the Quartermaster Corpa representative and a charge should be made to "Sundry Items Receivable - Advances Account Evaquee Property Department" for the sale price and the amount credited to the account of the evaquee in accordance with the accounting procedure outlined in a separate letter today.

If the legal camer is other than the evacues, necessitating the liquidation of the indebtedness against the vehicle, an Evacuee Property Department check should be drawn to the legal owner for the amount of the mettlement belance and the ownership certificate, properly endorsed by the legal owner, acquired. You should endorse the certificate in the twacues's ness and countersign as agent in the place provided for registered owner.

If the evacues is the legal owner, the ownership certificate will previously have been acquired and the above entries should be functioned upon designation of the car for sale. If the certificate was not properly endorsed at the time of surrender you should supply the necessary endorsement as above outlined.

The ownership certificate, registration certificate, and the license plates should be delivered to the nearest office of the Division of Noter Vehicles for cancellation, accompanied by conformed copies of WCCA Form FRB-3 and WCCA Form FRB-4. The Department of Motor Vehicles will issue a receipt for the documents and plates surrendered.

The belance due the evacues should be disbursed by Evacues Property Department check as provided in the accounting procedure.

We were hopeful that we would be in a position to inform you at this time of the procedure to be followed in procuring reintursement for cars sold. However, we have not yet been informed by the Quartermaster Corps as to woucher forms and other details required in obtaining reintursement, or as to what form of receipt will be given us for the cars. We will advise you in these respects as soon as possible.

Receipts and Disturgement of Funds Account Evacueus

The following procedure should be ob erved in accounting for receipts and dishursements of funds handled by this bank for account of errouses.

The following mes subsidiary accounts should be opened by the Accounting Department of the office concerned:

The accounting Department should maintain only a control sheet for "Other Deposits - Evacuee Funds." "Sundry Items Receivable - Advances Account Evacuee Property Department" should be carried in the subsidiary Ledger is the usual manner. The combrol office of the Evacuee Property Department in Sen Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, and Seattle should maintain a subsidiary ledger for "Other Deposits - Evacuee Funds" made up of the individual evacuee accounts and a control sheet, and a ledger record for the "Sundry Items Receivable" account. This latter record, if confined to purchases of autoribiles by the War Department and no further segregation is required, need consist only of a ledger sheet in the name of the Ear Department reflecting details of all transactions therein. A commercial ledger sheet form has been provided for the subsidiary ledger of "Other Deposits - Evacuee Funds" and a supply has been forwarded to you. If you do not have or cannot procure locally a suitable binder for those ledger sheets, please inform up. In entering the name and address of the evacue, the family number should also be shown in the upper right corner of the ledger sheet. A new form of officers check, known as Evacuee Froperty Department checks, has been provided for disbursements of evacuee funds and a supply of these checks also has been forwarded to pour.

All entries in connection with evacues accounts should originate with the Evacues Property Department. Individual entries to "Other Deposits - Evacues Funds" should be prepared for any funds received for evacues accounts. Should such be received, it should be deposited with the appropriate office of this bank against receipt on a teller's cash entry. The entrie for funds received and credited sculd be as follows:

Individual entries to the "Suntry Items Receivable" and the "Other Deposits" accounts, including copies 2 of the check form, should be recupitulated in each case on the reverse of a single entry which chould be

posted from these recapitulation entries before they are routed. This will

permit the retention of the individual entries in the Evacues Property

Storess of property not fitted for use in resettlement areas.

Following is the substance of a memorandum from Mr. Hale to Colonel Bendetsen dated April 14, 1942, and the substance of Colonel Bendetsen's reply memorandum dated April 22, 1942, regarding the fore-going:

Mr. Hale's Memorandum:

- *1. From time to time this tank is requested by Japanese evecuses to accept for storage special types of property which might not be appropriate for use in areas where evacuses are finally resettled.
- 2. Typically, we have received a request from the North American Shinto Temple, Los Angeles, to arrange for the storage or a memorial shrine to President Washing ton and President Lincoln, which is presently installed in the temple itself. The shrine is fourteen feet square and was built at a cost of approximately \$3.000.00. The temple and, of course, the shrine within it are situated on land owned by the Southern Pacific Railroad Company. The temple building has been sold to the Cetholic church and will be moved, but the shrine was not included in the sale.
- 3. Other avenues for the disposition of this property have been and are continuing to be explored by our representatives.
- 4. This situation, while unique as to the specific type of property involved, is nevertheless typical of many cases coming before this bank.
- 5. It would be appreciated if we were given some guide as to the wishes of the Military Authorities on the question whether it is felt that the storage of such types of property should be permitted at government expense."

Colonel Bendetsen's Memorendum:

- "L. Reference is made to your manor andum of April 14, 1942, with respect to the above subject, which arrived during my absence in Washington.
- 2. Responsive to the questions presented by you, you are advised that storage of property not fitted for use in connection with relocation is desired and authorized wherever provision can be reasonably made therefor. The case in reference cited by you is one falling within the authorization for storage."

We believe the foregoing will be self-explanatory.

We have today issued our expense check in the amount of \$3,500.00 covering the initial payment as provided for in the above contract. Insamuch as we prefer your advice as to the proper accounting procedure with respect to this payment, we have charged the entire amount to Deferred Charges. Of course, \$1,500.00 of the amount should be charged to current rent and included in our Mis. 190 representing recoverable expenses for the current month. We should, however, like your instructions as to whether or not the remaining \$2,000.00 should be charged currently direct to the rental account.

Since we do not have a seal in this office, neither the enclosed copy nor the one held by the Cregon Transfer Company have been impressed with the seal of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. The warehouse company would like to have the seal on its copy of the agreement. We suggest therefore, that the enclosed agreement form be completed in this respect and returned to us after which it will be exchanged for the copy now held by the Cregon Transfer Company which copy, will in turn, be forwarded to you.

Incidentally we do not have a copy of either this agreement nor the one between Gregor Transfer Company and the building owner in our file. This form was prepared for use in instances where the registered owner of a motor vehicle has requested that disposition be made contrary to that requested in the original instance on WCCA Form PRB-1 and consequently it is believed that the form will not be widely used. It will be observed that the form provides for the return of the original receipt given the Evacuee.

The form should be prepared in triplicate. The original and one copy should be retained by us and one copy given to the registered owner. Only one copy need be signed by the person receiving the car.

We are also enclosing under separate cover a supply of Form EP 6 "Statement of Indebtedness Owing to Legal Owner of Motor Vehicle". This form is intended for use in each case where the Evacuee has elected Alternative No. 2 for carrying out the Army purchase plan instructions. The confirmation by the Evacuee of the balance owing on the contract will eliminate the possibility of error in the statement submitted by the legal owner.

The upper portion of the form, which is prepared in triplicate, will be completed by this Bank and the original and duplicate forwarded to the legal owner for completion of the center portion of the form. The legal owner will retain the second copy and return the original to the office of this Bank concerned.

The Evacuee's confirmation will be obtained on the original. The yellow file copy will be retained by us at all times and no copy has been prepared for retention by the Evacuee.

We intend to have a representative of this Bank at each Assembly Center to whom the statement may be forwarded for the purpose of obtaining the Evacues's confirmation.

An appraisal form is in the course of preparation and instructions regarding appraisers will be forwarded to you in the near future.

Your letter infers that Mr. Campbell of your Portland office was informed by us that there are no longer any restrictions on such transactions. Both Mr. Campbell and Mr. Peterson discussed the above matter with us, and we are sure they understand that in the event they are satisfied that a Japanese national is entitled to the privileges of Freesury Department Gen. eral License No. 68A, such national is sutherized to carry on normal business transactions, and it is in order to allow transfer of title to an automobile to or from such national. In the event that a Japanese national is not entitled to the privileges of General License No. 68A or has had his assets blocked by the Treesury Department, it is, of course, necessary that a specific license be obtained from the Treasury Department covering any transaction involving the blocked sameta.

No doubt you have the above matters in mind, but we feel that it is desirable to state our position clearly so that there will not be any possibility of misunderstanding.

Before writing you, I contacted Mr. Swenson of the F. B. I., Portland, Oregon, as well as Major Belly of the V. S. Army, who referred me to Lt. Dennard of the V. S. Army, who in turn referred me to Mr. A. M. McDonald, who was gractous enough to telephone you by long distance Monday, April 13th and then relayed to me the substance of his conversation with you.

To identify myself let me say that during the World War, I was in the F. B. I., thereafter Assistant E. S. Attorney for the District of Oregon, thereafter a member of the 68th Congress representing Portland, Oregon. At all other times since 1912 I have been practicing law in Pregon, having been admitted to practice in the U. S. Supreme Court and other lesser federal courts and all state courts of Oregon.

We dislike the phraseology of this amendment. Oregon Transfer Company a responsible bonded warehousing concern this city with excellent reputation offers us same proposel for storing and removel of goods that is \$1.50 per hour for each employee. Also new proposel covers some building as Bekins deal with similar terms as to period of lease and cancellation clause. Following is the text of a memorandum dated April 8. 1942. from Colonel Karl R. Bendetsen, Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, relating to the above subject:

- "1. On the assumption that the matter of designating military areas and zones is one for continuing study and that there will be ascessity for the future clarification, correction and extension of Military Areas, and particularly Prohibited Zones A. as already set forth in Public Proclamations No. 1 and No. 2. it is desired that all communications, data, files and information bearing upon this subject be assembled for the purpose of study and the determination of a general policy in this regard.
 - 2. The major part of the information evallable in this connection will appear in the correspondence and written recommendations that have reached this Division, either direct or by transmittal from Headquarters Western Defense Command and Fourth Army. In addition to the material that has already been assembled, it is assumed that there are also communications scattered throughout the Division which have been retained by various Sections for lack of information as to where they should be forwarded or for the purpose of handling additional matters referred to therein not related to the subject matter of this memorandum.
 - 3. It is directed that all such communications, data, files and information referred to be retofore received, be forwarded to Captain Truman R. Young, Room 420, to reach him not later than Friday, April 10, 1942, and that similar disposition be made of such material received in the future.
 - 4. Any suggestions or ideas that WCCA personnel may have on the matter of the readjustment of military areas, prohibited and restricted zones, which may have occurred to him by reason of participation in activities of the Division, or that may have been communicated to him orally from outside sources, will be placed in the form of a written memorandum and referred to Captain Young within the time specified in the foregoing."

Apparently misunderstanding between Bekin's and Commonwealth on rent which is \$1,000 per month instead of \$900.00 as reported. This increases our monthly payment to Bekin's to \$1,300. Even on revised basis believe deal is to best interests of evacuees and Government and we recommend approval. To protect us on occupancy, it is intended that both Bekin's Commonwealth lease and Bekin's FRB agreement will be for six months after termination of war with 90-day cancellation clauses without penalty.

Inasmuch as we have been requested by the War Relocation Authority to forward a copy of WCCA Form FRB-2 to it in each case where an evacuee's property is stored by us, we would appreciate your transmitting to us, copies for that purpose, in order that we may in turn forward them to the War Relocation Authority. The copy which is to be forwarded to this Authority should conform to the copy which is to be forwarded to the evacues.

The inclusion of the above phrase on the form is so that the war Relocation Authority will be informed as to the total number of units of property in each case, which may not be disclosed by the item described by the evacuee. It is, however, not intended that the war Relocation Authority will have a detailed description of the number of units comprising each item, such as will be shown on the copy of the form which is retained for the files of this bank.

After all copies of the form have been filled in and returned to the

Civil Control Station, one copy, checked for conformity with the other three, will be given to the owner of the property. The copy delivered to the owner will be evidence merely that other copies of the form have been delivered. The copy delivered to the owner merely shows the number of items, boxes, and crates which the owner claims he has prepared for storage. It does not constitute an agreed inventory. We furnish guard but pay no rent. If similar arrangements cannot be mede by you your proposal approved. Your proposals for building storage areas might be too liberal. With over 5,000 Japanese in San Francisco we have estimated that between 35 and 40 thousand square feet would be adequate to store all items which might be offered. Believe desirable that Bekins store items but doubt necessity of having superintendent on job after items have been placed in warehouse.

SUBJECT: Fvacuee Property Department

Reference is made to our recent telephone conversation regarding the carrying out of the duties assigned to us in connection with the evacuation program, and to other correspondence and instructions on the subject.

In order to carry out our part of the program, we have made the following arrangements:

- 1. Guards are to be furnished by the William J. Burns International Detective Agency at 85 cents per hour for each guard. We are assured that all of the guards are responsible men and properly deputized, and that the agency is in a position to furnish us with any reasonable number of men which we may need on short notice.
- 2. Hauling and cartage will be under the supervision of George G. Cadwell, Sr., of Portland-Seattle Auto Freight, Inc. Cadwell has had many years of experience in this line and is, we believe, trustworthy and reliable. The name is already a familiar one in your files.

Cadwell will furnish his own company's trucks and vans so far as they are available and thereafter make outside arrangements to obtain whatever number of additional vehicles are needed. The charge will be \$4.75 per hour for each van - this to include the services of two men. If more than two men are needed, the charge will be \$1.30 per hour for each additional man.

3. Parking space has been arranged for on a six-acre tract directly adjoining the Portland assembly center (Pacific International Livestock Exposition building).

The owner is to complete fencing the property with barbed wire, gravel the grounds where necessary, and make any other improvements which are needed to place the tract in suitable form.

Rental is on a basis of \$100 per month with six-months' guaranty, the guaranty being principally for the purpose of assuring the return of funds used to place the grounds in shape.

1

4. Tentative arrangements have been made toward renting on a month-to-month basis a four-story reinforced concrete (so-called "fireproof") building in the center of the warehouse district of Portland. The building has two entrances and a large freight elevator. Experienced warehousemen assure us that the construction of the building is suitable for storage purposes, and that continuous storage operations can be carried on on two floors at the same time.

The monthly rental is \$900, and the usable floor space in the building is 68,000 square feet.

All of the details and personnel in connection with the actual movement of the stored goods from the trucks to their proper places in the warehouse will be under the supervision of the Bekins Moving and Storage Company, experienced werehousemen of this city, under the following arrangements:

5. Bekins will operate this building as a branch of its present warehouse system. This will include complete supervision of the building, the furnishing of necessary sidewalk, liability, and other miscellaneous forms of insurance, not including fire, and the employment of a superintendent at a salary of \$200.00 per month. This superintendent will be present at the building for eight hours of each working day, and since, during this period, he will replace a guard who would otherwise cost us approximately \$150.00 per month for the same time, the net cost to us is about \$50.00 per month. We believe this arrangement is well worthwhile.

The costs of storing the goods in the first instance are to borne by us - that is, Bekins will supply ell of the supervision and men necessary at \$1.50 per hour for each man so needed. The only additional expense will be \$200.00 per month, and this will include such items as miscellaneous liability insurance, electricity, and other similar items, as well as Bekins' spread on the deal. We believe that by the use of an experienced warehouseman enough space can be saved to not only justify the expense but possibly to effect an economy.

Incidentally, it seems impossible to determine with any degree of accuracy the amount of space which will be required, since certain articles of merchandise, as well as business equipment, are under present arrangements to be warehoused in addition to the household furniture as was contemplated at first. We believe, however, that the 68,000 square feet of this building will be ample for all purposes, and there may be some unused space remaining after all of the goods have been stored. Bekins agrees to take such space from us on a reasonable basis to be arranged later if any substantial portion of the building remains unused.

Since time is an important factor and we wish to arrange all of the necessary details as soon as possible, will you please wire us your re-action to the proposals herein contained as soon as you have had an opportunity to consider them?

- II. INITIAL STEPS TAKEN BY FEDERAL RESERVE BANK OF SAN FRANCISCO TO IMPLEMENT PROGRAM
 - A Preliminary work was mostly done at Head Office.
 - B The Evacues Property Department of the Portland Branch, Federal Reserve

 Bank was opened on March 13, 1942, at 317 S. W. 6th Avenue, Portland,

 Oregon. The Department was prepared upon its establishment to perform

 such functions as were outlined in Head Office letter dated March 11, 1942

 addressed to Portland Branch.
 - C Two regular employees of the Fortland Branch were assigned to the

 Evacuee Property Department on the opening day. In addition to these,

 four stenographers and seven consultants were employed on a temporary

 basis to assist in the performance of such duties as were required.
 - D It was not necessary for this branch to maintain permanent field representatives at the various offices of the United States Employment Service. As questions arose involving problems coming within the scope of those handled by the Evacuee Property Department, information was transmitted to the main office at Portland and, when required, field representatives were sent to the Localities which requested information or assistance. In other cases problems were settled either by telephone or by correspondence.
 - E The Portland newspapers were generous with their publicity regarding activities and duties of the Evacuee Property Department. Out of town newspapers in the Portland zone also gave such publicity as was requested.
 - It was not necessary to exercise freezing control under this Regulation since we had no problems requiring such action.

- III. FUNCTIONS PERFORMED BY FEDERAL RESERVE BANK OF SAN FRANCISCO IN CAPRYING OUT PROGRAM
 - Those functions incidental to property and business problems

 (exclusive of farming) were handled by the Evacue: Property Department

 up to March 29, 1942. Many problems, of course, such as farming,

 travel permits, curfew regulations, public assistance information,

 etc., came to the attention of the Evacues Property Department in the

 first instance but were referred to the appropriate agency for handling,

 as all agencies maintained a staff in the W.C.C.A. office at 317 S. W.

 6th Avenue, Portland, Cregon, in which office the Evacues Property

 Department is located.
 - B 1. After voluntary evacuation was prohibited the Evacues Property Department continued to advise and assist evacuees with their property and business problems with the thought in mind that, when controlled evacuation took place, the evacuees would have been given an opportunity to make an orderly and equitable disposition of their property. 2. Prior to evacuation, evacuees were informed that household furniture and effects could be disposed of on any reasonable basis that they saw fit. Evacuees were informed that should they desire not to dispose of their household furniture and effects, they could arrange for private storage and, if they did not care to pursue this course. storage would be provided for them at governmental expense at the owner's risk as controlled evacuation occured. A large number of evacuees stored their effects with American friends or left them in locked rooms on the premises or in the basement. Most of the Japanese churches, both Christian and Buddhist, also offered their premises for storage purposes and it is our understanding that these facilities were quite generally used. This procedure cut down, to a

large extent, the volume stored by the Government.

- 3. (a) In view of the fact that the first exclusion orders, evacuating areas in the Fortland zone, were not issued until some time after this office was established, evacuees had ample time to make arrangements for the disposition of their motor vehicles. Consequently, evacuees, in most instances, disposed of their motor vehicles by selling them and a very limited number was placed in private storage. Five motor vehicles are held in storage by the Government for evacuees. Victor W. Thomsen of Rt. #1, Hood River, Oregon informed the W.C.C.A. office at Portland. Oregon by letter, that he had approximately 50 evacuee automobiles listed with him for the purpose of sale, such automobiles being stored with him and other dealers.
- (b) Six motor vehicles have been tendered for sale to the Army.
- 4. Representatives of the Evacues Property Department were helpful in the negotiation and settlement of problems falling within this category and coming to their attention.
- 5. A representative of the Evacues Property Department was stationed at the Wartime Civil Control Administration Assembly Center, North Portland, Oregon for the purpose of impounding automobiles which were delivered for that purpose. He also delivered personal property inventory forms to the evacuese covering household furniture stored by us and was able to reconcile any discrepancies that appeared on such forms. Likewise, he was very helpful in acting as lisison to aid in the completion of unfinished problems. Representatives were, of course, also maintained at each Civil Control Station, as controlled evacuation occured, for the purpose of performing such duties as came within the scope of problems being handled by the Evacues Property Repertment.
- 6. Shasta Hotel, 320 N. W. Glisan St., Portland, Oregon. K. Nitta, owner of the furnishings of this hotel had a prospective buyer in mind

but was unable to associate the transaction due to the fact that the owner of the building was demanding a substantial increase in rent from the prospective buyer. However, as the result of a conference attended by evacues K. Nitta, the owner of the building, and a representative of the Evacues Property Department, the building owner agreed to rent to the prospective buyer on a reasonable basis and the sale was consummated to the satisfaction of all parties concerned.

Mikado Baths, 310 N. W. Everett Street, Portland, Oregon. In a round table discussion with Somaji Hara, owner of the Mikado Baths, his attorney. Paul Harrowitz, landlord, and Evacues Property Department representatives, a reasonable and agreeable settlement was reached regarding some fixtures which had been removed and sold by Hara against the wishes and without the permission of the landlord.

Fuji Grocery, 2037 N. Williams Ave., Portland, Oregon. George Azumano.

owner had considerable difficulty in finding a purchaser for his store.

He finally started negotiations with two Chinese purchasers, partners,

whom he brought to the Evacues Property Department office to discuss

terms. At the suggestion of the Department's representative, the purchasers

borrowed sufficient funds to pay cash for the inventory. The fixtures

and a delivery truck were handled on a sales contract deposited in the

seller's bank for collection. Later a tax problem arose which was success
fully adjusted with the new purchaser.

Hotels and Apartment Houses - Out of a total of 96 hotels and apartment houses, 73 changed ownerships and 23 were left in the hands of managers who, in most cases, function under a signed agreement with the owner. Of

the 23 remaining under Japanese ownership two are for sale in the hope of obtaining better prices than could have been received earliest.

Crocery and Produce Stores - Under this classification there were
63 such places of business in existence in the City of Portland prior to the evacuation order. Although some of the transactions did not clear through this office, our records show that 34 were sold and 22 liquidated, the fixtures being disposed of or stored. In one instance, the Lombard Center Market, the Japanese owner, Tom Okazaki purchased the property for \$6,200 cash and leased it to an American for three years at \$50 per month thereby assuring him of a definite income during his absence. Much satisfaction was expressed by evacuees. As far as we know there are no cases in this classification which will require further attention.

Restaurants - Of 18 restaurants in operation prior to the evacuation, only about 4 were sold outright, the balance vacating the property and either storing or selling the fixtures. One large one, the Burnside Restaurant is still unsold due to the inability of the owner, Frank Toyota, and the prospective purchaser, to get together on a price. Representatives of the Evacuee Property Department are still attempting to assist Toyota to make disposition of his business.

Tailors, Laundries and Cleaning Establishments - There were 39 businesses of this classification in existence prior to the evacuation. Our reports indicate 15 were sold intact and the balance of 24 liquidated either by selling their equipment or making some provision for storage.

Greenhouses - Disposition of about 6 greenhouses was not entirely satisfactory from a monetary standpoint. In each instance ownership was retained and the residence of the owner rented or leased for the duration, the new occupant agreeing to act as an informal custodian of the

greenhouses. In one case, that of a large establishment, the greenhouses were rented outright.

Residences - Due to housing conditions in this community no difficulty was experienced in renting, lessing or disposing of residences by ovacuees. In many instances, the American occupant permitted the storage of the Japanese owner's personal effects in a room or basement of the home.

The balance of the 325 Japanese owned businesses not included in the above and consisting of barber shops, beauty parlors, jewelry stores, general merchandise stores, newspapers, garages, baths, etc. were, with a very few exceptions, closed after making some disposition of their fixtures either by sale or storage. One large drug store was disposed of through a professional liquidator and the fixtures and inventory of another was packed and shipped to Spokane, Washington, where the owner will reopen the business, having first obtained an exemption and travel permit.

IV. FUELIC AND EVACUEE REACTIONS TO WORK PERFORMED

- A No unfavorable criticism regarding the work performed by the Evacuee

 Property Department has come to our attention. Many oral expressions of
 approval were offered by those who took the trouble to learn how the
 problems were being handled.
- In view of the fact that the bulk of the business and property problems

 were in Portland and its immediate vicinity and because most of our

 negotiations were in the form of personal interviews by our representatives,

 very few letters of appreciation were received.

Evacuees, however, were generous with oral praise of and thankfulness for the many services rendered and advice given by our representatives. Attached are a few typical letters designated as Exhibits A.B.O.D.E, and F.

D The banks and other corporate entities have cooperated to the fullest extent in the furtherance of the evacuation program.

VII. COMOLUSION

A Because of our satisfactory service rendered relations with both evacuees and Americans alike and also because of the good will engendered, it appears obvious that should questions arise in the future concerning business properties, those concerned will undoubtedly turn to the Evacuee Property Department for essistance and advice. Business properties being sold under contract may fail to return the income expected, due to inability of the American owners to operate as cheaply as did the Japanese. Default in payment may then occur and necessitate a change of ownership. The weakness in some of the hotel management arrangements will, in some cases, develop a need for a replacement of personnel or even force a sale of the hotel itself.

creditors are calling on the Department for information from time to time as to the means of collecting overdue accounts undisclosed by the evacuee at the time of his departure. It will be difficult to cut off abruptly the "clearing house" and advisory functions of the bank developed during the past three months.

Automobiles in storage or for sale to the government will, until the final disposition is determined, be the cause of some responsibility on the part of this institution.

B Care was used in handling all business cases not to involve the Department in any detail that would require supervision after the evacuation is completed. No escrow agreements were made, no powers of attorney taken and no collection arrangements entered into. We were often urged to perform these functions but satisfactory disposition was made of them in each case through banks, attorneys, and others who solved the problems for all parties concerned. In a few instances the evacuees attempted to

draw earnest money receipts, bills of sale, or other legal papers but we suggested that they consult their attorney and in each case this was done. The firm of Collier, Collier and Bernard of this city, according to problems coming to our attention, handled more individual evacues cases than any other local firm of attorneys and were always most cooperative.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF PORTLAND AND THE NORTHWEST

Today our country, the United States of America, is at war. War is cruel and hard. We have been ordered by the Military Commander of the Western Defense Command to evacuate Military Area Mumber One in the four Western states. The Japanese American Citizens League, made up of American citizens, pledged itself to co-operate with the government; therefore, in spite of the fact that we are citizens, we have agreed to evacuate provided that our government wishes us to do so. We look upon this as our contribution to the national defense effort, and we do it voluntarily.

We American citizens of Japanese extraction have been pioneers in America, just as were the men and women who crossed the plains in covered wagons. We have been pioneers, as many of them have been for the particular racial stock which they represent. As each of them has contributed to the growth of the United States, so we, too, have contributed a part; we will continue to do so no matter where we may go. That is our solemn promise. No racial group has ever in the history of America let the United States down, and we are certain that our group will not do so. The hundreds of American soldiers of Japanese ancestry will attest to that.

We have lived among you for many years peacefully and happily. Unless you were one of us you could not realize how much we appreciate the fact that we have been able to live in America. We love this city and the country in which it is located—this city which we so fondly call "home." As the eve of evacuation approaches we have found the many simple things mean more to us than ever.

In time of war, prejudices creep in; none feared this more than we. Since we live on the Pacific Coase, this was inevitable. Even though we may move from this area we will do so without bitterness or rancor. Any sacrifice which we make is none too great if it is for the good of the United States. We have tried to show you

where our hearts lie; many of us have joined the armed forces of the United States; we have participated in civic affairs, in the buying of defense bonds, and in civilian defense, as many of you have done.

Our youngsters have gone to school and learned the democratic way of life. We, as citizens, have learned the value of the democratic form of life, perhaps more so than many of you because we are so much closer to the practical aspects of it. We know that as American ideals triumph through the winning of this war, the whole world will learn the real meaning of the words, "regardless of race, color, or creed."

We do not know what the future holds for us, but we will conduct ourselves as Americans. Many of us will leave with tears in our eyes, but in our hearts we will have faith in the government of the United States and in the people from whom the just powers of the government are derived. God willing—may we neet again.

THE PORTLAND CHAPTER OF THE JAPANESE AMERICAN CITIZENS LEAGUE

Statement by Departing J-A Citizens

Hood River County Sun, May 15, 1942, Hood River, Oregon.

Just before leaving Hood River members of the Japanese-American Citizens League made public the following statement:

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE HOOD RIVER COUNTY AND TO THE PEOPLE OF THE NORTHWEST

"The fateful day for us to go into exile for the duration, has arrived for all the Japanese, aliens and non-aliens alike. We leave with tears in our eyes, not because we dread the unknown ordeal before us, but because we regret leaving this peaceful valley that has been our home for these long years. As we go with heavy hearts, we leave with hopeful expectation that some day soon we'll return once again to this land where the rain and the sunshine meet.

"We regret that the unprovoked attack of Japan upon our country - The United States of America - has made it a military necessity to evacuate all Japanese, irregardless of whether citizen or non-citizen.

"We are glad to sooperate with the orders of the government even with curtailment of our constitutional rights, if our cooperation will enable our nation to be better unified to prosecute this war against the axis aggression. It is the least that we can do to reveal that our protestation of loyalty is sincere.

"The national policy of our organization, the Japanese American Citizens
League, has been and will continue to be, "the greatest good for the greatest number
of Americans. To this end, this organization is dedicated.

"Our primary consideration as good Americans is the total war effort.

Individuals and groups are not important when the life of the nation is at stake.

We have been asked to evacuate from the Pacific coast as a military measure designed to strengthen national defense. We will cooperate in this war program.

"As a rational organization and as individuals, we have pledged our wholehearted cooperation to the President without qualification or reservations in the winning of this war. We will not violate our pledge. "We have continually cooperated with the Federal government on all regulations and orders in the hope that our cooperation would inspire a reciprocal
cooperation on their part. Our hope has been justified. We will continue to cooperate.

"Gracious acceptance of all army regulations and orders and cooperating with them to the fullest extent is our contribution to the national defense effort.

It is the sacrifice which we have been called upon to make. Although our contribution may seem greater than most, it still remains that it must be our share in the program.

We will make this contribution to our nation graciously and unequivocatingly.

"We are able to leave with smiling faces and courageous minds, for we know we leave many staurich friends who will guard, while we are gone, all that we hold dear and sacred of the things we leave behind. We are grateful to these friends who remained true to us when we needed them the most, even in our darkest hour. They have furnished us the courage to continue to have faith in the noble ideals upon which this country has been founded.

"Because we believe in America, and we trust she believes in us, we pledge ourselves to do honor to her at all times in all places; to support her constitution; to obey her laws; to respect her flag; to defend her against all enemies; foreign or domestic; to actively assume our duties and obligations as citizens, cheerfully and without any reservations whatsoever, in the hope that we may become better Americans in a greater America.

"So we bid you adieu as we intrust our fate in the hands of destiny and we pray that victory will bring peace to our nation and we further pray that we shall soon be able to return to this peaceful valley and to meet you all again. Until then, we, the members of the Mid-Columbia Japanese American Citizens League bid you all farewell."

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
