Your letter regarding the inquiry of Mr. Earl Stoll for the purchase of the property of H. Yosukochi, of San Luis Rey, consisting of a Pepper Drying Plant & Buildings in San Luis Rey, was received this morning.

We have had this property brought to our attention and we made an interview report on April 13, under the name of George Yosukochi, a member of the family who operates and is part-owner in this Pepper Drying equipment. We have telephoned Mr. Yosukochi this morning and verified our report of him, of April 13, that the Pepper Drying equipment, together with, 93 acres of land and the eleven trucks and tractors have been placed in the management and operation of Mr. Crawford, X. L. N. T. Tamale Co., 4301 Valley Blvd., Los Angeles, California, through Power of Attorney.

A Mrs. M. Harada, a business associate of Mr. Yosukochi, apparently owns the most interest in the Pepper Dryer and under the agreement with the K. L. N. T. Tamale Co., they are to have the use of the Pepper Dryer for drying 45 acres of peppers, and should they be able to dry peppers from surrounding acreage, Mrs. Harada will receive 50% and the M. L. N. T Tamale Co. 50% of the returns from drying peppers for to other growers.

Mr. George Yosukochi informs me that this Pepper Dryer had an investment of over \$20,000.00 which makes the value suggested by Mr. Stoll, appear much under-appraised. Mr. Yosukochi suggested that should Mr. Stoll be interested in the drying of peppers from some connection he may have in producing peppers in this area, that Mr. Crawford of the X. L. N. T. Tamale Co., be contacted and negotiation taken up with him.

Mr. Yosukochi informs me, that at nottime has his family or Mr. Harada, considered selling any of the property, having been successful in negotiating a satisfactory operating agreement with the X. L. N. T. Tamale Co.

We were expecting to write a completed report on this in our summing up the business of the evacuation in this area. The evacuees, as a whole, have been very successful in arranging their affairs satisfactorily.

Trust we have been able to give you the imformation desired regarding this matter.

Yasagouchi of San Luis Rey. The property supposedly consists of chili dryer equipment with a value of \$5,000.- or \$6,000.-. This amount might also include a building which houses this equipment that is used as a factory, and it is also likely to be on leased land. Mr. Stoll is anxious to either buy or lease this property from the Japanese, but understands that he has moved from that location. We are wondering if you have any information regarding either the Japanese whereabouts or if the property was listed with us for some disposition. Possibly you might have heard of this set-up and if so, try and give us as many particulars as possibly in order that some kind of a deal can be effected between Stoll and the Japanese, rather than see the property abandoned, if such be the case. Dear Mr. Wood:

We have your letter of the 16th advising that Mr. Henry Chuman of Encinitas has asked you to take up with us the matter of compensation due him by our company.

Mr. Chuman called me last Thursday regarding this and I told him that the only reason we hadn't had time to check it up was because the pressure of additional work brought about by the evacuation of the Japanese growers in this area and the fact that we had been compelled to take over a number of properties and our organization just had been overloaded trying to pick up the loose ends on those deals which we had assumed. I wrote Mr. Chuman Saturday to advise me what his records showed as to the amount of celery he had purchased and how much compensation we had paid him.

We employed Mr. Chuman in January to purchase for us on contract celery from the Oceanside area. He was suppose to work full time for us but instead of doing so, we discovered he only worked for us when he didn't have anything else to do and that he spent his time working on the automobile business and Japanese problems. Furthermore, every time he made a deal, we had to send someone down from Los Angeles to close the deal for he didn't seem to be able to close any deals on his own initiative.

I don't think it is necessary to handle the payment, if any, due Mr. Chuman because if we owe him anything, we shall be very glad to pay him direct, and I am sure there isn't anything your office will do that will expedite such payment. We appreciate your good offers in the matter.

Mr. C. D. Wood May 18, 1942 -2-Our records show that we have paid Mr. Chuman something like \$150.00. Really that is just about all he actually earned. Like a lot of these Japanese who have been evacuated, I am afraid that he is simply trying to get all he can regardless whether it is due him or not, however, we shall clear the matter up with him just as soon as we hear from him. Ikemi, please be advised that on April 1, 1942 Mr. Ikemi and wife released all claim to the property which they had under contract east of Oceanside back to the Santa Ana Mortgage and Investment Company, an affiliate of this bank, and quitclaimed said property back to said Company. At the time this was done, they were \$2000.00 in arrears in their payments and were also in arrears on their interest from May 1, 1941. They also owed this bank \$350.00 which it had advanced for the building of a lath house on the property. This settlement with Mr. Ikemi on April 1st was made with the understanding that they simply occupy the house and pick the strawberries on the place until such time as they were evacuated from the property. The idea was that the strawberries would maintain them until evacuated. Since that time, a representative of the bank discovered that they had taken a house and a bunk-house off the property and at that time they were notified not to remove anything further from the property. Rumor again reached us that they contemplated further removals and on May 9th, we notified Mr. Ikemi by letter not to remove anything further from the real estate. We believe that we are within our rights in insisting that nothing be removed from the property and must insist that everything be left intact. It was very kind of you to write us on April 27th, on behalf of these two insureds who own the above contracts with us. We appreciate what they are trying to accomplish and shall briefly outline in this letter the present position of these policies.

The first policy is on the Endowment 25 plan for \$3,000, with an Annual premium of \$127.05, which includes the Disability Income and Double Indemnity benefits. As at October 30, 1942 the policy will be 12 years old and at that time will have a gross cash value of \$1,095.00, subject to a loan with interest of \$758.95. This leaves a net balance of \$336.05, which is sufficient to maintain the policy in force for several years under the premium loan clause, which is the automatic provision. This net cash value may be used to place the policy under the Extended Insurance feature, but if such is elected the benefits are automatically cancelled and if the insured subsequently applies for reinstatement, evidence of his continued good health will be necessary.

This case involved the settlement of a contract for Electrice power service which had 13 Months to go and wich called for a payment of \$ 52.50 in 6 equal payments commencing June 1st 1942. The Japaneses also had on deposit \$50.00 to assure the payment of any electric power bill.

The problem that arose was that the purchaser of part of the Japanese lease did not want to take over the Well and equippment that this power service had been cantracted for and the Japanese ws not going to crop or retain the Well use. The Sna Diego Power and electric Co. took the stand that if the power was not used they were damaged in the cost of installing the line and wanted not only the \$52.50 amount bu an additional damage amount of a total of \$108.00 and would collect same by attaching the Well and holding the \$50.00 deposit of the Japanese . We took the matter up with Mr. Kircher who knew the Fr Officers of the Co, in San Diego and after much discussion finally got asettlement of \$ 25.00 adjusted amount. This the Japaneses was happy to do. This closed a hard case.

The case of M. Suzawa and the San Diego Consoldiated Gas and Electric Co., involving the contract for Electric service entered into by Mr. Suzawa and which now will be come impossible for him to carry out owing to his having to leave this area.

The Electric Company contends that Mr. Suzawa must recompense them for the service charge for the balance of one year on the contract. However, in going over the facts with the Oceanside office we find that the contract calls for six equal payments of \$8.75 a month beginning June 1, 1942. Owing to it being impossible for Mr. Suzawa to continue operating the acreage which is supplied with water from the well that the power service is furnished under, the Electric Company contract, Mr. Suzawa does not feel he should be obligated for the service charge.

There is also a deposit of \$50 to the credit of Mr. Suzawa held by the San Diego Consoldiated Gas and Electric Co., to guarantee the payment of electric power used in pumping plant but as there is now no bills owing, Mr. Suzawa is asking the return of this deposit, which the Company continues to hold.

This office would appreciate it if you would take this matter up with the head office in San Diego, as any adjustment must come from them.

If we can be in San Diego during business hours, we will be glad to go with you and present this case to the Electric Company officials together.

A. had taken an application for a loan which was turned down when the fact of the difference of property set came to light. This neccessitated the purchaser arrangements for the money which he accomplished and when the seller found that the cash was forthcoming he accepted and this completed the sale. We had trouble getting the purchaser to continue to work the berries and market same during the negotations but did prervail upon him to do so which was very fortunate for all concerned. This case was one of the most comp licated.
