Subject: Reviewing of Japanese
property problems.

Dear Mr. Everson:

The work of the writer in the local field of this department began on March 18, 1942, and could be regarded as having come to an end on October 17, 1942, which was the date upon which the final group of Japanese was evacuated from the Stockton Assembly Center.

According to Center Manager A. R. Nicholson, this disposes of all local Japanese excepting only those who are held over at the following institutions:

San Joaquin County Hospital	28
Bret Harte Sanitorium	1
Stockton State Hospital	3
Leffler Convalescent Home, Stockton,	8

We are quite certain that your office has been informed of all cases in which we were asked for assistance or advice by Japanese evacuees, through the medium of copies of correspondence, or S-5055 Reports, or by direct telephone. There were many instances in which we were asked many casual questions which were not indicative of any existing problems. No filing record was made of these cases because they were either of minor importance, or of hypothetical nature.

In reporting now upon those cases which must be classified as "unfinished", we shall record after each name as brief a report on each case as possible. You will recall some as being very old cases, subjects of many former reports. Again, some of those which we have previously filed as "closed" may come before you again. This has already happened in the past.

The list of unfinished cases follows:

- Susumu Yasuda - Subject of former reports and letters. FHA contract with Bk. of Am. Unpaid balance \$159.31. Covers conditional sale to him of Fluorescent lighting equipment installed in his store before evacuation. Present Chinese tenant (G.B. Puppo, landlord) offers \$60.00 - a "distress" offer. This being an insured loan, Bk. of Am. has filed claim for payment with FHA, Washington, D.C. Subject also troubled about refusal of tenant to permit subject to enter a compartment on property where he has some personal effects on storage.
- Roy Kawanara - See letter 10/14 and Japanese Tractor Report No. 10. Wants to sell farm equipment as listed. Also, writer has not yet called at his Terminus place as promised.
- Sam Kawamura - See several letters. Waiting now for his new address to fill in on his automobile ownership certificate, now in our possession. Also asked for instruction to list collection of \$230.00 due him on 12/15/42 with SS&L Bank.
- Mrs. A.S. Eiri - All collections made. See letters. Now at above Leffler Home. Inquired 10/12 about a detail in connection with suspension of trucking license in order to retain franchise. Advised her to write direct to State R.R. Commission.
- Mrs. Minaye Yamashita - A new case. No letters. Now at Leffler Home. Sewing Machine shipped last week from Pasadena to her at this center. Not arrived. Wants to reship by Gov't to Arkansas. Advised her to write to WRA San Francisco.
- Matsuo Okazaki - No letters. Attorney Wm. Dozier is accomplishing transfer of some local farm property from Mrs. Umena Tamura to her sister, Mrs. Satsuno Okazaki. There is also unfinished inquiry into disappearance of valuable fishing equipment from subject's store room in Lodi.
- George Kishida - See former report. Sold old car to minor who has paid only \$5. of \$30. debt promised last May. Meanwhile has traded car off for better car, but has not paid subject. Have talked to parents. See your Mr. C.P. Jones.
- Masao Sakai - No letters. Indefinite request. Could not leave center to get books at home, 128 So. Commerce, for income tax purposes, and wanted to inspect fixtures stored in basement, 39 West Washington. Referred us to a Filipino, Visayan Fish Market. No action taken.

-) Family No. (53) 25813. Much correspondence. Last known address, Box 154, Shelley, Idaho. His car (a very old one) is still on government storage at local Clark Garage. He avoided an offer of \$60. made by local wrecker and said he would send for car for use in carrying workers to harvest fields if his Idaho employer would guarantee him such employment for duration of war.

- An old case. Many former reports. Subject is a U.S. soldier. Today we interviewed Mr. D.E. French, Sec'y Stockton Production Credit Association, who holds note of Manuel Brazil payable to subject in amount of \$500., which, when collected, is to be the basis for deposit of \$500. to credit of subject in Bk. of Am., Tracy, Cal., and duplicate deposit slip to be mailed by us to subject. Mr. French's office has clearance control of Brazil's crops, now under harvest, and which crops were lately appraised at upwards of \$14000., with offsetting advances of \$6300. Mr. French expresses confidence in ability to collect note for account of subject as soon as harvest returns are in. Mr. French quoted from a transcript of the Brazil account. Therefore, we are inclined to consider collection as a probability.

Torao Hidaka

- An old case. Many reports, much correspondence. We suggest that future contacts be made through Attorney Moyle. Problem is how to get fairly well equipped laundry into operation. Location of laundry in Modesto is possible hindrance, according to Mr. Moyle, and competition of two very good laundries is also a factor. Unpaid contract balances covering part of the equipment are due the Prosperity and Pantex Companies, who have not replied to suggestions that a meeting be held in Modesto to plan action. At present the situation appears deadlocked. Am inclined to believe any action which will produce a fair equity for subject should be accepted.

The foregoing covers all memoranda we have been carrying in the way of such cases which were actually submitted to us and which could be classified as current or incomplete cases.

TO : Commanding General, Northern California Sector.
All Wartime Civil Control Administration Agencies Concerned.

1. Reference letter, this headquarters, June 26, 1942, subject, "Transfer of Evacuees of Wartime Civil Control Administration Assembly Centers to War Relocation Authority Relocation Projects," and Executive Order No. 9066.

2. It is directed that appropriate arrangements be made for the transfer of evacuees as indicated below:

<u>A.</u> <u>Approximate No. of Evacuees</u>	<u>From</u>	<u>To</u>
200	Stockton Assembly Center	Gila River WRA Project, Arizona

(1) This group will consist of those individuals included on List "A", Inclosure No. 1.

<u>B.</u> <u>Approximate No. of Evacuees</u>	<u>From</u>	<u>To</u>
150	Fresno Assembly Center	Gila River WRA Project, Arizona

(1) This group will consist of those individuals included on List "B", Inclosure No. 2.

c. Both above groups will move on October 16, 1942.

d. The increment from Stockton Assembly Center will be consolidated with the increment from the Fresno Assembly Center enroute to the indicated destination.

3. Transportation and meals while enroute will be furnished for such medical attendants as may be prescribed by the United States Public Health Service from Stockton, California to Casa Grande, Arizona, and return. Travel directed is necessary in the military service and payment when made is chargeable to Procurement Authority FD 35 F 435-02 A 0425-23. The issue of meal tickets is authorized, and each medical attendant will be furnished eight (8) meals enroute at a rate not to exceed 75¢ per meal or not to exceed \$1.00 per meal per individual when meals are taken in a dining car.

4. It being impracticable for the Government to furnish rations in kind, meals for each evacuee transferred under this order will be furnished under the provisions of Paragraph 2, AR 30-2215 for four (4) meals enroute at a rate not to exceed 75¢ per meal, or not to exceed \$1.00 per meal per individual when meals are taken in a dining car. Travel directed is necessary in the military service and payment when made is chargeable to Procurement Authority FD 32 P 432-02-03 A 0425-23; QM D-1 Funds when applicable. The issue of meal tickets is authorized.

5. A suitable military escort will be provided for each movement under this order. It being impracticable for the Government to furnish rations in kind, meals for each member of such escorts will be furnished under the provisions of Paragraph 2 AR 30-2215 for eight (8) meals enroute at a rate not to exceed 75¢ per meal, or not to exceed \$1.00 per meal per man when meals are taken in a dining car. Travel directed is necessary in the military service and payment when made is chargeable to Procurement Authority FD 34 P 434-02 A 0425-23. The issue of meal tickets is authorized.

TAX SAVINGS NOTES

The Secretary of the Treasury is offering new and revised series of Treasury Tax Savings Notes to provide (a) a convenient and systematic method of accumulating funds for the payment of taxes, and (b) an exceptionally attractive medium for the safest investment in the world for idle funds, particularly those held by business concerns and others who have unemployed cash seeking short-term investment. These notes constitute an important part of war financing.

Tax Savings Notes continue to be issued in two series — Series A designed primarily for small or moderate taxpayers, and Series C intended for the larger taxpayers and investors. The principal features of these notes are:

SERIES A

Price: Par and accrued interest.

Date and Maturity: Dated September 1, 1942, due September 1, 1945.

Interest: Interest accrues at 16 cents a month per \$100 or at interest rate of about 1.92% a year. If not used for tax payment, no interest paid.

Denominations: \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000, and \$5,000.

Acceptable for taxes: \$5,000 limit in one year. Each series may be presented for taxes at par and accrued interest during and after second calendar month after date of purchase.

Denom. exchange: Each series may be exchanged from higher to lower but not from lower to higher denominations.

Form: Name and address of single owner inscribed as in income tax return, but not issued in names of two or more persons jointly.

Redemption for cash: At purchase price only without advance notice.

Collateral: Not eligible for loans.

SERIES C

Price: Par.

Dated first day of month in which purchased, maturing in three years from that date. Not callable.

Interest accrues each month from date of issue on a graduated scale per \$1,000 as follows:

First 1/4 yr.	\$0.50
1/4 to 1 yr.	0.80
1 to 1 1/2 yrs.	0.90
1 1/2 to 2 yrs.	1.00
2 to 2 1/2 yrs.	1.10
2 1/2 to 3 yrs.	1.10

Average interest rate about 1.07% a year if held to maturity.

Denominations: \$1,000, \$5,000, \$10,000, \$100,000, \$500,000, and \$1,000,000.

Unlimited.

Each series may be presented for taxes at par and accrued interest during and after second calendar month after date of purchase.

Redemption for cash: At par and accrued interest, after 6 months from purchase date upon 30 days' notice, or at maturity.

Collateral: Eligible for loans from banking institutions only.

SERIES A

SERIES C

- Transfer:** None, except by parent corporation to its subsidiary in which it owns more than 50% voting stock.
- Conversion:** Series A and B purchased in September, 1942, may be converted into new series with certain limitations.
- Taxes:** Income subject to all Federal taxes. The notes are subject to estate, inheritance, gift or other excise taxes, Federal or State, but are exempt both as to principal and interest from all State or local taxation.
- When and where purchased:** At any time. Through Federal Reserve banks and branches, and the Treasury. For convenience, applications may be made through local banks and security dealers generally.

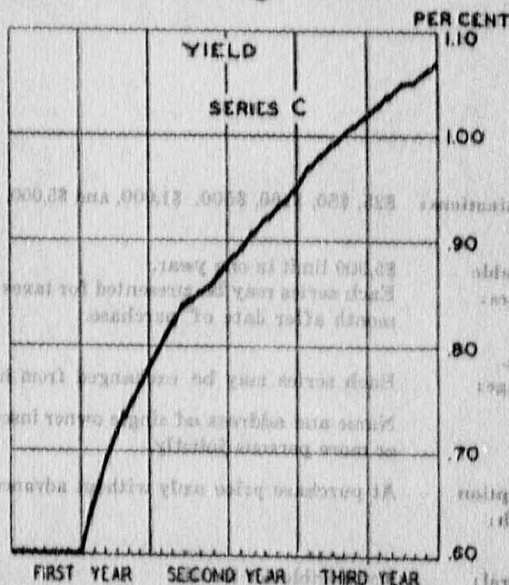
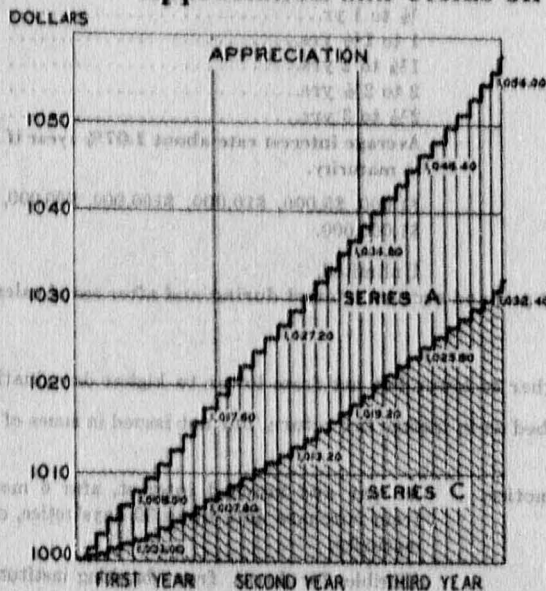


Reference is made to the postcard from D. Toscano dated October 12, 1942, inquiring as to the availability of tractors for sale. We are returning the card to you.





Dear Mr. Weeks:

Reference is made to your inquiry of September 29, 1942 pertaining to income tax questions posed by various evacuees.

We have considered the questions as presented by you carefully, and are of the opinion that they should all be directed to the Collector of Internal Revenue. It would appear that eventually a blanket ruling or set of rulings will ultimately be necessary in order to settle these problems. Obviously, no authority other than the Bureau of Internal Revenue or the Treasury Department would be acceptable.

Informally, as you were undoubtedly aware, we feel that evacuees have no legal escape from income tax liability because of their removal. This, however, is based upon practical interpretation of the broad evacuation policy rather than on specific rulings applicable to the questions in point. It is quite possible that final instructions could not be issued until adjudicated by the courts.

Difficulties encountered in obtaining safe deposit belongings should be discussed with the camp manager. Regardless of the fact that local banks may dislike to give access to such safe deposits to persons other than the holder, it must be remembered that the whole background is colored by war conditions. We feel that it is probable that all such banks will have to alter their policies slightly in sympathy with the objective or take the initiative in setting up a procedure which would be generally acceptable.

You, of course, realize that the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco has no authority to express an opinion or issue an instruction on any of the questions propounded. For your own information, we have outlined our informal thoughts on the subject. In every case, however, such problems should be referred to the Bureau of Internal Revenue or the specific bank holding the safe deposit.

We trust that the foregoing will conform with your request and be of assistance.

Dear Mr. Everson:

Mr. A. R. Nicholson, manager of the local center, and many of the evacuees have come to the writer lately in considerable anxiety caused by the question of the status of evacuees under the income tax laws.

The evacuees ask many questions which we feel we are not qualified to answer with certainty. We shall quote a few of them as follows:

If we are wards of the government must we file income tax returns?
If we file must we pay the regular tax on profits or earnings?
If we are required to file and to pay, will these requirements be modified in any degree due to our having been handicapped in our professional, business, and farming enterprises by the necessity of abandonment or evacuation?

How shall we reply to those of our income tax accountants who are now advising us to prepare returns covering operations up to the time of original evacuation to centers, before leaving for relocation centers?

Many of us have records and bank statements and savings account pass books in safe deposit boxes or in other outside places which we may not now enter due to orders prohibiting us from leaving the center. This same condition is working a certain hardship upon us in other than merely income tax matters.

In our case where does tax liability rest with respect to an enterprise which changes hands under duress or under emergency?

None of the local banks like the idea of any one but the evacuee himself having access to safe deposit. One bank suggested a certain form of procedure in reply to Mr. Nicholson's question, but, as much as we would all like to help the Japanese, there appears to be no sensible and safe substitute plan in prospect.

Will you kindly instruct us regarding the above?

Reference is made to your letter of September 7, 1942 pertaining to an evacuee, Susumu Yasuda, who had dealings with Eli Lilly Company, whose headquarters are in Indianapolis, Indiana.

We have discussed this case with the coast divisional manager for the Lilly Company, Mr. E. B. Kipfer. He informs us that their Legal Department has delivered an interpretation of the Alien Enemy Act which conforms in substance with those statements made to you by Mr. Harper. To the best of his knowledge there is no specific regulation prohibiting wholesale drug companies from disbursing funds to Japanese, as such.

Thereupon we informed Mr. Kipfer that to the best of our knowledge Yasuda did not appear to be a blocked account and therefore if such was the case, would, in all probability, be considered a generally licensed national.

It is suggested that Mr. Harper be apprised of this situation and that it is in order for him to explore Yasuda's status with commercial banks in that area who might have handled Yasuda's account. If it develops that Yasuda is not a blocked national, there is no reason why a rebate for the returned merchandise should not be made if it is otherwise agreeable to the Eli Lilly Company. You are, of course, familiar with the required procedure if it is proven that Yasuda is a blocked account. It would be in order to advise Mr. Harper that application should be made to the Foreign Funds Control Division of this bank for a special license to permit the rebate.

A copy of this letter is going forward to Mr. E. B. Kipfer, divisional manager for the Eli Lilly Company.

Subject, Yasuda, formerly a Stockton druggist, and now at 3-57-E, Stockton Assembly Center, returned a quantity of drugs which he claims to be worth about \$230.00, to the above manufacturing drug firm for credit. Your office has copy of our letter of August 12 to Yasuda which makes reference to the matter.

Mr. A. A. Harper, local representative of Eli Lilly and Company, has his firm's letter of April 21 which makes following statements:

The 20 pound express shipment has been received from Yasuda. They are prohibited by governmental regulations from issuing a check or sending exchange merchandise in payment for the returned shipment, which consists of pharmaceuticals or prescription merchandise. This is because of regulatory measures brought on by the war. Therefore, the shipment has been set aside and is being held subject to shipper's order. They would be permitted to return the shipment for shipper's future use.

Mr. Harper says that plant is being closely watched by FBI by reason of the importance of its products at this time.

It would seem from the above statements by Eli Lilly and Company that all we can do for Yasuda is to suggest that he allow the shipment to remain where it is until he again has need for the goods. However, will you kindly give us your opinion before we write Yasuda?

Reference is made to your letter of August 31, 1942 addressed to our Stockton representative concerning an evacuee, Toroa Hidaka, former proprietor of the Sunrise Laundry in Modesto, California.

We believe that you mis-apprehend the status of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco in the evacuation program.

We are charged with the responsibility of protecting evacuee property and to see that unfair advantage is not taken of these people because of evacuation. Please be advised, however, that evacuees as such have lost none of their civil rights nor by the same token are they excused from their contractual obligations.

In conformance with this program we have endeavored to be of assistance to Mrs. Hidaka in her problems connected with the Sunrise Laundry. In the course of such effort we have been instrumental in the sale of an automobile but as yet have been unable to solve the problem concerning the laundry. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco is not custodian of the property nor do we have any official status other than that of an advisory character, with Mrs. Hidaka.

It is noted that on July 13, 1942 our representative, Mr. L. S. Weeks, proposed to Mr. Bailey, Division Sales Manager of the PANTEX PRESSING MACHINE, INC. that a meeting be arranged with all the creditors, at the office of Mr. Myron Moyle who is acting as agent and official adviser for Mrs. Hidaka. To the best of our knowledge such a meeting has never been arranged looking toward a mutually satisfactory settlement of the problem.


In the opinion of our Stockton representative, Mr. Weeks, Mrs. Hidaka has some equity in the property. On that premise we would be pleased to see that every effort is made to protect such equity before repossession proceedings are begun.

With reference to your specific questions, you will note from the foregoing that we have taken no assignment of the property, that we are not custodians, figuratively nor literally, and that therefore, we would have no official position in case you proceed to take legal action.

It is observed, however, that Mr. Moyle, by virtue of his power of attorney, is the legal representative of Mrs. Hidaka and no proposed action should be taken before being called to his attention.

Additionally, we would be pleased to learn that all avenues, other than repossession, have been used before such a step is contemplated.





The enclosed letter of August 28 addressed to us by subject is in relation to the rental agreement of May 8, 1942 between her father, Tom Chikaraishi, an interned alien, and the new tenant of the hotel property, Anthony Moya. Copy of the rental agreement is also enclosed.

The facts and observations in the letter are, we believe, essentially true. It was quite apparent after we had discussed the matter with Mrs. Carniglia, the owner of this hotel property, and her agent, Adolph Peirano, that they were about to file an arbitrary claim against subject for \$350.00, and had high-handedly advised the tenant, Moya, to divert the monthly furniture rental payments of \$50.00 to them instead of making them payable as per agreement with subject. The basis of the claim referred to is described in subject's letter.

The claim was obviously unfair and was really inspired by owner's disappointment in the action of the Local Health District in catching up with them and in calling for corrective measures which should have been observed by them during the whole eight or nine year period of the subject's tenancy. Therefore, we felt called upon to inform owner and her agent verbally, that if they persisted in trying to upset the present arrangement between subject and tenant we would refer the matter to our headquarters with a request that protective measures be considered in interest of subject.

With reference to the action taken by the Local Health District in condemning such properties until corrections have been accomplished, the orders, in several cases, have applied against the buildings involved as well as against the furnishings. In such cases the owner has had to realize that corrective action was up to him and not to the tenant. Owner merely collected the rent over a term of years and neglected the building in the face of lax inspection.

This is the only case in which we have had to object to action as described above.

We are enclosing for your direct reply a letter dated August 31, 1948, from Attorney Walter H. Young, 311 South Spring Street, Los Angeles, who writes in the interest of Pantex Pressing Machine, Inc., regarding an equipment account with above subject.

This is one of the few Japanese problems which we were unable to bring to a definite conclusion. Their Dodge automobile was sold to good advantage, but we have been stalled in our efforts to either find an operator for the laundry or to market the very excellent equipment at a fair return for the owner. This last objective might have been accomplished if the Pantex and Prosperity firms could have spared us enough time for a group meeting in Modesto whereby their cooperation would have been sought toward placing this equipment in a manner fair to all concerned. Many requests were made by us for such a meeting.

Your files carry our many S-5085 reports on subject, also copies of our letters to Pantex and Prosperity Companies. We also refer you to your letter of June 17 to Bank of America, Modesto.

We have conferred many times with Mr. Myron Boyle, Modesto, who is attorney for both subject and owners of the property, and who has made many attempts get the business under way again. He feels that subject's equity in the equipment is of such value that he would probably put the business through bankruptcy before permitting unjust action on the part of any creditor. However, we have not yet had any experience in the case which would lead us to believe that any one wishes to act unfairly in the matter.



Dear Mr. Weeks:

At the request of the Treasury Department, we are endeavoring to obtain somewhat precise information as to the quantity of farm implements, including tractors, of Japanese evacuees which is not now in productive use. While from the general information which we have been able to develop it appears that in most instances the farm equipment of such evacuees was transferred to the substitute operators who acquired the farm property or was sold by them to other persons on a private basis, either directly or through dealers in farm implements, with the consequence that for the most part, such equipment remains in productive use, we should like to establish this fact to some degree of definiteness.

We have, from time to time, heard rumors that more or less substantial amounts of such property were stored privately by the evacuees and thus taken out of active production. We have been unable to obtain details of any specific cases of this type.

In order to obtain the information desired we would appreciate your making an investigation of the situation in your area. No doubt the local farm implement dealers would have a rather clear picture of the situation, as perhaps would the county farm advisers for the various counties. However, we believe you should contact such sources of information as the circumstances in your area dictate in order to develop the data.

The specific questions to be answered are as follows:

1. How much farm equipment owned by Japanese evacuees at the time of their evacuation remains unavailable for productive use by reason of private storage arrangements made by them, or otherwise?
2. Is it possible to obtain specific information in any given case? If so, it should be obtained.
3. Of any property so held out of production, how is it being held - i.e., stored on the farm land previously occupied by the Japanese; stored with dealers; or stored otherwise?

We would like as complete a picture on this situation as it is possible to provide.

Please give the matter your immediate attention.




Reference is made to your letter dated August 14, 1942 addressed to our Stockton representative, Mr. L. S. Weeks, relating to agency agreements affecting certain Japanese family clients now evacuated to the Stockton Assembly Center.

With, of course, the approval of your Japanese clients, we can see no reason why agency agreements could not be prepared and executed, under which you would serve as agents in charge of certain properties and collections and disbursements relating thereto. The aspects referred to in the second paragraph of your letter, dealing with the possibility of fire damage and repairs, could be incorporated it would seem to us quite readily into the agency agreements above referred to.

We would call your attention to the fact that as agents for your Japanese clients, you would possess only such powers as they themselves possess, with the consequence that if any of them happen to be subject to the restrictions imposed upon blocked nationals under Treasury Department Foreign Funds Control Regulations, such restrictions would also apply to the operations of their agents. In this connection we are enclosing a copy of Executive Order No. 8389, as amended, for your information. We are also enclosing a copy of General License No. 68A.

If the persons involved are either American citizens or qualify as generally licensed nationals within the meaning of the definition contained in General License No. 68A, they would, of course, be able to operate in the same manner as citizens of the United States.





Reference is made to your letter of July 16, 1942 relating to cases where certain evacuees left the community, permitting their personal property to remain on rented premises with the understanding that the landlord could make such disposition of them as she might see fit.

As you are probably already informed, this bank provided storage facilities for the properties of evacuees at the time of evacuation operations in the Lodi area. At that time arrangements were made to pick up and store such properties, and facilities were provided by this bank to be turned over and which have been turned over to the War Relocation Authority, which agency has jurisdiction of the matter of forwarding of goods to evacuees.

No arrangements have been made to pick up properties left behind by evacuees after evacuation operations occurred and it is doubtful whether it would be possible to arrange for the storage of the goods in question with the government at the present time.

Inasmuch as the warehouse facilities in the area in question and the general problem of the future disposition of evacuees' goods falls within the jurisdiction of the War Relocation Authority, we have forwarded your communication to that agency at the Hotel Whitecomb, San Francisco, in order that they may be informed of the matter.

Each of said tenants surrendered their said leased premises, respectively, when they were recently evacuated from the Lodi community, each of the tenants being of Japanese descent. I do not know whether they are alien-born Japanese or born in this country.

The family evacuation number of Nitta is 26463 and of Nishikawa 30138. I do not know the evacuation number of Ohata.

Each of these tenants left personal belongings in the premises in question, such as dishes, cooking utensils, furniture, etc.

Ohata owes \$150.00 back rent, and Nishikawa \$108.00 back rent.

Each of the evacuees signed an agreement in writing not to hold Mrs. Peirano responsible for any damage or shortage to the personal property and agreed that she might store or remove the same from the premises, or if the new tenant desires to use the personal property he might do so without responsibility on Mrs. Peirano's part. Apparently no new tenant desires to use any of the items in question but my client has a chance to rent the properties vacant and desires to get rid of these personal properties.

Please let me know if there is some government agent who will take charge of the personal properties in question so that we may be relieved of possession of the same.

In case the above does not come within your responsibilities, I am sending a copy of this letter to the office of General DeWitt.

We are forwarding to you the enclosed Forms EPM-8 in duplicate signed by the above subject by which he has authorized us to deliver his vehicle and registration card to the Stockton Morris Plan Company, 10 North California Street, Stockton, California. This car is now in dead storage at Allen's Garage in Sacramento, California.

You will probably recall that this is the case that we forwarded to you on June 17th, and which you later, on June 18th, returned to us advising us that Mr. Takehana had been sent to Tule Lake. In order therefore, to recall to your mind the circumstances involved, may we again set forth some of the facts.

This evacuee turned his 1942 Pontiac 8 over to us under Alternative #2, and when the appraisal was made it was found that the car was valued at \$925.00. Subsequently, we sent our Form EP-6 to the Stockton Morris Plan Company requesting that they set forth the settlement balance due them as legal owner. They replied that the balance acceptable to them would be \$1,019.25, if this final payment was made prior to June 20, 1942. This obviously brought about the problem which we wrote to you about, namely; that since Mr. Takehana evidently had no equity on the car, he would have to decide either to turn the car over to the legal owner or to sell the car to a third party. This information was passed along to the evacuee at Tule Lake on June 23rd, and as of yesterday, we received our instructions on Form EPM-8 to proceed with the delivery to the legal owner.

In accordance therefore, with these instructions, please inform the Stockton Morris Plan Company, through our Stockton representative, Mr. Leland S. Weeks, of the situation and the intention that Mr. Takehana has expressed. Undoubtedly, it will not be necessary to discuss our appraisal with the Stockton Morris Plan Company, but if



Acknowledging copy of letter addressed to you July 3 by San-Francisco office, and referring to telephone conversation of July 7 with Mr. Schmidt of your office.

Selling dealer of the above subject's 1942 Pontiac sedan "8", San Joaquin Motors of Stockton, and Stockton Morris Plan Company, the holder of the installment sales contract, are both controlled by one and the same man, Mr. Edwin B. Fuld.

Mr. Fuld states that he will go to Sacramento in about one week for the purpose of repossessing this car. He will call at your office and arrange with you for the delivery of the car to him from Allen's Garage. He will sign necessary papers. He will ask for registration certificate. He is requested to hand you a letter relieving subject from deficiency liability under the sales contract if the general condition of the car will merit his doing so.

Mr. Fuld is an honest and straightforward man. He deals fairly. Since we are asking him to relieve subject from deficiency liability, he holds as unreasonable any request to further protect subject with possible equity resulting from resale of car, particularly when, as in this case, the contract balance outstanding is in excess of \$1000. He points to the fact that this balance, going into his books as the cost of a used car, will exceed his distributor's cost of the same item in a new car.

Our reply to this statement was that this phase of the matter will be left in his hands. We feel that Mr. Fuld will treat the case fairly.

Reference is made to your inquiry of June 13, 1942 pertaining to the affairs of Toruo Hidaka.


We have in the past few months conducted many interviews with the wife of this aforementioned Japanese who is interned, and with others who have interested themselves in the Hidaka family problems. In the course of these negotiations we were instrumental in obtaining a sale for their 1941 Dodge sedan.

These people have frequently sought our help in connection with what is apparently a large amount of laundry equipment, the bulk of which is being purchased on time contract from various agencies. We have been unable to secure a buyer who would meet Mrs. Hidaka's terms, affording her a reasonable payment for her equity. At our recommendation, Mrs. Hidaka did obtain a power of attorney from her husband to carry on whatever negotiations were deemed necessary in the disposal of their affairs.

We have two representatives, Mr. Harold A. Johnson, 622 - 19th Street, Merced, California, and Mr. Leland S. Weeks, 314 First National Bank Building, Stockton, California, both of whom have interviewed Mrs. Hidaka many times and are familiar with these problems. We are also informed by a letter dated May 21, 1942 that Mr. Myron Woyle, Black Building, Modesto, California, is acting as attorney for these people and presumably has authority to carry on any necessary negotiations. We have no official relationship with this family other than that of a generally helpful character maintained towards all evacuees who have approached us.

We invite you to contact our above-mentioned representatives, looking towards further exploration and a mutually satisfactory settlement of this problem.





Interviewed Mr. James E. King this morning. He operates "O. K. Flower Shoppe", 565 East Harding Way, Stockton.

The interview does not fortify you with actual figures. However, such information as is available certainly supports you in your opinion that the business in question is worthy of constructive handling.

Answers given to following questions may show some inconsistencies as to figures given, particularly when considering length of operation, annual earnings, and net worth:

How long have you bought flowers from Yanagi? - About 8 years.

Do you know him well? - Very well. Have his confidence, I'm sure.

Ever see any data giving facts as to his progress or worth? - No.

What opinion as to annual sales? - Minimum of \$36000.

Annual earnings? - I will say \$12000. net.

And his net worth? - At least \$10000.

Does that reconcile with net earnings over a long period? - I mean after paying off much of his original encumbered investment.

What is your opinion of that original investment? - \$25000.

What certain product represented bulk of sales to you? - Carnations.

What general thoughts come to you regarding him? - A fine fellow.

A successful operator. An established business which should be continued. I think there should be an investigation of the Oakland Flower Shop, Italian owned, 626 - 8th St., which, I believe, is cutting off the product without proper replacement care. Their authority, motives, and procedure should be revealed. In this business replacement care is vital. His bank may keep a man to irrigate the property, but that is only one of many necessary activities. He asked me to buy the business and operate it, paying him off at rate of \$500. per month. Purchase price was not stated. He did much of his own work, thereby increasing earnings. I believe there is a destructive force working against the business from some angle.

Mr. King showed me a room containing furniture and personal effects which Yanagi had entrusted to his care.

Mr. King states that there are other flower shops of the kind mentioned above which, to say the least, are imposing upon the property interests of Japanese nursery men in that district.

I hope this information will prove to be of some assistance to you in your handling of this case. Call on me again if I have overlooked any available fact in the matter.

Mr. King estimates daily yield at between 60 and 70 bunches per day, @ .50¢ wholesale. Says Yanagi made daily trip to SE, where he maintained a stall for display. He also did some jobbing business. It is regrettable that actual transactions are not on record, because this daily yield would indicate that estimate of annual sales, \$36000., is too high.







Reference is made to a letter dated June 17, 1942 addressed to your office by Mr. L. S. Weeks, Field Representative of our Evacuee Property Department, stationed at Stockton, California, relative to a certain transaction involving an Oldsmobile coupe of S. Shingu.

In the above-mentioned letter Mr. Weeks stated that while Mr. Shingu was a "blocked national", the transaction in question could be effected pursuant to the provisions of General License No. 68A. If Mr. Shingu qualifies as a generally licensed national under General License No. 68A, he would not be classified as a "blocked national" and consequently the transaction in question could be effected without further action in so far as the provisions of the Order are concerned.

However, if he is a "blocked national" as indicated, the provisions of General License No. 68A would not be applicable and the transaction in question should be effected only under specific license, for which application should be filed with us on Form TFE-1. Consequently, the statement contained in Mr. Weeks' letter is erroneous and was undoubtedly occasioned through some misunderstanding.

We are enclosing a copy of General License No. 68A for your information and are also enclosing a few copies of Form TFE-1 for your use in applying for a license in the event Mr. Shingu does not come under the provisions of such general license.







Reference is made to the letter addressed to you by Mr. Mundell, Manager of the Stockton Assembly Center, under date of June 3, 1942, requesting that the bed roll and two suit cases of this evacuee, held at the Stockton warehouse, be surrendered to him at the Assembly Center.

Inasmuch as the goods in question are of a type which should probably not have been stored with us in the first instance, being that required for use by the evacuee at the Assembly Center, when we passed the request on to the War Relocation Authority for consideration, that Authority concluded that they would not object to our compliance with the evacuee's request.

Under these circumstances, we feel that it will be in order to arrange for the delivery of these goods to the evacuee, who should understand, however, that this is at variance from our general rule, and it should be made clear that this is not a precedent to be followed in other similar cases.

The personal property form (WCCA Form FRB-2) which we are holding in this office in connection with the above, shows that the three packages constitute all of the property of this evacuee received by us. Incidentally, the location of this property in the warehouse is not shown on the form, but we feel sure you will have no difficulty in locating it by reference to the name and family number. This property was received in the Stockton evacuation.

✓ We observe from your letter dated June 12, 1942 that Mr. Urabe has already returned to you his copy of WCCA Form FRB-2, which should, of course, be forwarded on to this office.



I really believe that in this instance you are justified in criticising me for failing to tell you that I would not appear on the 29th. I had it on my day book to write you but through sheer neglect and nothing else I overlooked doing so.

As you know, all of the Tsunekawas have been shipped out of here, along with all of the other Japanese, and I now have no authority to act in this matter. For that matter I don't believe that the Court has any jurisdiction to proceed in the absence of the defendant and I will say that he can not be present because of a military order. What your purpose is in attempting to obtain judgment in this matter is, of course, best known to you. There is no property here that I know of belonging to defendant. Moreover, it would seem as though your true client, Honda, is likewise gone.

I will not appear on June 5, 1942 or at any other time but I am sending a copy of this letter to the Municipal Court in which the action is pending and likewise to the office of the United States Attorney. I believe that is the only thing I can do to protect my client's interest at this time.

I regret very much that I have caused you any personal inconvenience.



Your instructions regarding time and place of Manteca operation noted, and also conveyed to Mr. Jones this afternoon. As stated, Mr. Jones will be busy on the local clean up until some time tomorrow.

The goods in storage are not all thoroughly crated. The instructions were clear, and form FRB 2 is also clear in this respect; however, the goods had to be brought in, whether or not they were satisfactorily crated. Doubtless, some storage space may be saved by uncrated articles, not only in the saving of space for those items which are on the floor, but also with regard to those which may be stacked on top of other goods, which, if they were crated, might have to be placed on the floor. Against this is an approximate figure quoted by Pacific Storage Company of \$2.30 per hundred pounds after crating.

According to Pacific Storage Company, Army requirements call for crating practically all articles--even trunks, which are not crated now.







Our files do not present any other inquiries of those interested in operating such an establishment.

This case appears to be one of those unfortunate situations in which there is admittedly a fair equity, but it contains so many appurtenant problems that it appears extremely difficult of solution. We cannot determine from your interviews as to the delinquency status, if any, on the laundry equipment. If it is not overdue, it seems to us that regardless of the husband's wishes in the matter, the most equitable solution would be an outright sale.

As far as the automobile is concerned, that, of course, can go through the usual procedure. Several qualified people in this office have stated that in their opinion, \$1,000 is over-estimating the value of this machine. Apparently, a figure approximating \$700 is somewhat more accurate.

Says office sent detailed inventory to U. S. Marshall's office in San Francisco.

San Joaquin County Sheriff's Office, Under-Sheriff Hitchcock:

A great deal turned in. 175 guns, 150 cameras, covering country clean-up. Doesn't think much still outstanding. However, is quite suspicious of Italians. Reason: only one 22' rifle turned in. No deer rifles in lot. Italians like to hunt. Thinks they still hold these or else consigned to care of friends. No idea on Germans. Thinks Japanese probably in clear. Japanese were first to clear, and Italians last.

Routine activities since initial period have not brought in more.

Lodi Police Office, Officer Briscoe:

A great deal. Believes well cleaned up, as to Japanese. Only small amount from Germans and Italians, and is certain many of these registered as Russians. Count: 105 radios, 211 cameras, 159 rifles & shot guns, 23 pistols, 1 short wave transmitter, 16 swords, 3 cases ammunition, 2 boxes knives, 3 projection machines.

Routine activities since initial period have not brought in more.

Tracy Police Office, Chief Wyman:

Not a great deal. All voluntary. Very little came in after orders affecting U. S. Japanese were issued. Much was sold or disposed of in line with requirements. Does not believe much outstanding. None picked up in routine patrol since initial period.

Manteca Police Office; Chief Brockman:

15 Shot guns, 4 kodaks, 5 short wave. Feels well cleaned up. Voluntary. All Italians. No Japanese here. No subsequent finds.

Lockeford Constable, Cliff Anderson:

Just one radio dismantled and since returned to owner. Apparently has not determined status of 4 Japanese families in district. Report not very positive.

Thornton Constable, James Barber:

20 Fire arms. Small lot of swords, etc. Thinks well cleaned up. No more uncovered in subsequent routine of office.

Your San Francisco man, Ted Kaufman, is doing good work here in helping us get to the bottom of the Japanese hotel situation. He is calling, individually, on each hotel and turning in a report covering each interview. Yesterday, the 16th, he turned in fourteen reports covering sixteen hotels, which reports are going forward to you today over his signature.

The effort is bent toward bringing about an arrangement for each landlord to buy the furniture from the Japanese in all cases where other arrangements have not been made. This is the most reasonable way to handle the matter, because the furniture, as a rule, is not valuable, although it is to the interest of both the owner and the new tenant, to save the expense and inconvenience of buying new furniture if the present equipment is moved out. We hope to clear up this awkward situation in this manner.

The above mentioned Report No. 9 was mailed to you yesterday, the 12th. Assistance in compiling the report was rendered in a most cooperative spirit by Mr. L. S. Wetmore, manager of Libby, McNeil and Libby's ranches in this district.

This letter is not written with regard to the contents of the report itself, but is prompted by the impression which was made upon the writer by Mr. Wetmore, and, if you will permit us to step away from the work at hand for a moment, we should like to "talk" to you a bit about this gentleman.

Mr. Wetmore, briefly, is a fine combination of a master of detail and practical and efficient management. He has the vision to know what he wishes to accomplish in a business problem, and then he follows through with thoroughness of detail in his office and practical, profitable operation in the field. He seems to know what he is doing at all times. He is not a young man but has led such a successful life in his field of business management, that confidence and success are still part of his back ground.

Mr. Wetmore, while still young, was manager of the California Wine Association with a salary of \$20,000. yearly, and has been with Libby, McNeil and Libby for 23 years. He has enlightened views on so many of the problems confronting the country with relation to farming, care of equipment, disposal of old equipment, treatment of lands and crops, analysis of irrigation problems, production maximums, plant management, and all questions of that sort, that he is a walking manual on such matters. He also has the ability to express himself clearly.

The writer has known Mr. Wetmore for many years. Probably it should be the duty of field workers to report on such able personalities for the information of men in more important positions during these times of stress.

Enclosed you will find reports number 6 and 7 covering investigation in Woodland district.

While we were given considerable time by both Mr. T. J. Stephens of Bank of Woodland, and Mr. W. K. Hatch of Bank of America, there was nothing learned from them that actually led us toward locating any idle equipment.

Four implement dealers of Woodland were also asked for information on the subject without producing any clue which would have led us toward finding anything. The lead which Mr. Johnson, of Merced, gave us on Clarence Kimura led to the Cruikshank Ranch. Mr. Cruikshank, in turn, suggested calling at the Oda Ranch. Once on the property, we began to have better sailing. We hope you will consider it worth while to ask the Crocker First National Bank if they can give us any assistance toward finding out what is in that locked up shed. Stephens and Low refer us to this bank, and are also the people who state their belief that implements of other Japanese are stored with this lot.

If this develops into a find of some importance, it would cause doubt as to how well informed some of our informants were in other communities, such as Sacramento and Modesto. It is also of interest to note that all former reports showing actual "finds" came from the Stockton district where the writer is well known, and where he follows channels which may not be known to him in other districts.

If it is really important to locate all of this hidden equipment we are of the opinion that the only way to get the truth of the situation would be to block out the territory systematically and thus cover every mile of it. This would call for a great deal of travel and time.

We have not completed the running down of leads in Stockton.

A trip made yesterday to Manteca, Ripon, Modesto, and Oakdale did not aid in locating idle Japanese farm machinery in those districts. No effort was made to cover territory south of Modesto, as Mr. Harold Johnson advises that he has taken care of every case there.

Mr. Rodden, First National Bank, Oakdale, states that there was just one Japanese farming enterprise in his district, which family is covered by our S-5055 Report of July 30, 1942, in name of Mrs. Mitsuye Yasui, and that all of the farm appliances are in actual use.

The Anglo California Bank in Modesto, also American Trust Company and Bank of America, had no information or belief that inactive equipment had been stored in that neighborhood.

Mr. Zimmerman of Stanislaus Implement and Hardware Company, Modesto, called his field man into conference. This man could think of only one possible case in Livingston which, he believes, must be known to Mr. Johnson.

Enclosed is Stockton Report No. 4, which is interesting and which covers such a lot of equipment that we hasten to forward the report without attempting to go out to this island ranch and make an actual inventory. We are told that this machinery is stored on the Ueda "Rio Blanco Ranch" under the trusteeship of Mr. George Atherton, an engineer of Stockton.

Mr. Johnson believes that there are two tractors stored on the Cruikshank Ranch at Woodland. It is our intention to go to Woodland on Friday, the 4th.

Mr. O'Brien of Nash-DiCamp, Florin, finally reports "nothing" over the telephone. May we suggest that you have your representative call at their San Francisco for verification of this report?

Second report is enclosed herewith. The following brief report on the investigation in Sacramento district may be of interest to you.

The banks are of one opinion as regards idle Japanese farm equipment.

Mr. C. L. Byrne said: "Always glad to do anything for Mr. Everson." He is with American Trust Company. He is quite positive in his opinion that there is not \$5000. worth of such equipment in both Sacramento and Yolo Counties. He suggests that you interview the district office of International Harvester Company in San Francisco and question them as to how much of the contract sales which they carry for many of their dealers covers Japanese equipment which is not in use. Doubtless International has kept a live finger on such contracts by reason of the evacuation and therefore could give ready answers to your questions. Mr. Byrne very kindly called up the Sacramento International dealer for his ideas in the matter and he, also, believes there is no idle equipment.

Mr. Holmes, Capital National Bank; Mr. Robinson, Merchants National; Mr. Ranlett, Bank of America, and two other branches of Bank of America were all of the same opinion, or else had no dealings with Japanese to form material for an opinion in the matter. The writer believed that the banks should be the first to be approached in the investigation.

Mr. Wm. Lais, brother of and manager for Mrs. Perkins at Perkins, and also Postmaster, reports no idle equipment under their care, and sent us to Mr. J. B. Fairbairn, local farmer and former field operator for FSA, who states all of such equipment under his care was transferred into active use.

Is a possible exception to all of the above is the branch of Nash-DiCamp at Florin. That office promises to complete and mail a list of equipment now in their care promptly. This will be reported as soon as received.

Mr. Reikert, 3512 Folsom Boulevard, formerly with Mr. Reid, mentioned a rumor that a large number of tractors were stored privately in the Woodland district, and suggested an investigation to begin with the local banks. Sacramento banks doubt truth of this rumor.

TO ALL JAPANESE FARMERS AND THOSE WHO WISH TO ACQUIRE JAPANESE FARMS:

The Stockton office of the Wartime Civilian Control Administration, with jurisdiction over San Joaquin County and that portion of Stanislaus County lying north of the Tuolumne River, has been established in order to assure continued agricultural production in this area, and to see that the interests of the Japanese farmers are protected.

David J. Gilhooley, Field Agent, advises that money can be advanced to qualified persons on the basis of a crop production loan to pay the Japanese operator for his investment to date of removal. The office will also provide sufficient funds so that the new operator can carry on to harvest. The new operator may also finance land rental as well, and if the new operator is unable to find private sources of finance, this office, on behalf of the Army, will finance them. If the Japanese have farming equipment, the Army wants to see the new operator buy it and keep it on the same land. The WCCA office will investigate present farming records of prospects to assure fullest possible production. Tomatoes and many other crops are essential and must be produced this year.

This program will be made available to the following groups:

1. Farmers who have the financial and physical ability to increase their present operations.
2. Farmers who feel they have extended themselves to the limit of their credit, but who can increase their operations.
3. Qualified individuals who at the present time are not engaging in farming operations but who have a farming record and are willing to enter into the production of war crops.
4. Qualified farmers -- nationals of friendly countries, including Chinese and Filipinos.

The WCCA office is authorized to aid in direct financing of these operations where private credit cannot be readily obtained, with the exception of financing actual purchase of land. This authorization includes financing sufficient to reimburse the Japanese for all of his material, labor and equipment up to the time of evacuation. This office will deal with the Japanese and the new operator, advancing money only to the new operator.

The following schedule has been approved by the WCCA office as a basis for future negotiations between Japanese and new operators:

Tomato Plants

\$1.50 per thousand for usable transplanting plants four inches in height and no less than four leaves;

\$3.00 per thousand within a week after transplanting;

\$3.50 per thousand over one week and less than two weeks;
\$4.00 per thousand for more than two weeks and less than three weeks;
\$5.00 per thousand when ready to plant in field, but still in beds;
\$4.00 per thousand for volunteer plants when ready to plant in field.
(All plants must be in first-class condition).

Cultivation:

\$1.50 to \$3.00 per acre for each plowing;
\$.75 to \$1.25 per acre for each discing and harrowing;
\$4.00 to \$5.00 per acre for transplanting in field with machine;
\$7.00 to \$8.00 per acre for hand planting. (Appraisals will be made to cover further work).

Curfew regulations might in some instances have been misunderstood. General DeWitt's Proclamation No. 3, paragraph 2, reads as follows:

At all other times all such persons shall be only at their place of residence or employment or traveling between those places or within a distance of not more than five miles from their place of residence.

It is the opinion of the local Wartime Civilian Control Administration office that this Proclamation is meant to include transportation between all farms operated by individual Japanese and Japanese farmers may also do any reasonable traveling to the nearest available point of supplies in order to maintain proper agricultural operations and family life. If these regulations are strictly abided by, no special permits to travel will be needed. This does not permit travel within prohibited areas.

The curfew applies between the hours of 8 P.M. and 6 A.M., when all Japanese operators must be on their ranches. This does not mean, however, that they must remain in their houses, but can work on their home ranches between these hours. They cannot, however, keep Japanese laborers on their farms who do not normally live there between curfew hours.

Japanese farmers should sell their produce f.o.b. farm so as to overcome the difficulty and misunderstanding they are encountering with regard to getting produce delivered to the early four o'clock markets.

Crops should not be allowed to suffer by devoting too much time to liquidation efforts. Japanese must meet production plans entered into and intended before December 7th. If any cases of neglect in the raising of tomato plants and other crops come to the attention of this office, they will be severely dealt with. This office is trying to work with you in every reasonable manner. Japanese are expected to give the same consideration in return.

Page Three

Japanese farmers are urged to continue taking care of crops and plants in such a manner that assures the future operation of their land by qualified farmers. You have every right to find some one to take care of your interests. If unable to do so, this office will aid you. If unable to get in immediate contact with the WCCA office at 201 North San Joaquin Street, Stockton, you may receive information at the San Joaquin County U.S.D.A. War Board, at 1 South Aurora Street, Stockton.



THE PERSON TO WHOM SUCH EXEMPTION FROM EVACUATION AND CURFEW HAS BEEN GRANTED SHALL THEREAFTER BE ENTITLED TO RESIDE IN ANY PORTION OF ANY PROHIBITED AREA, INCLUDING THOSE AREAS HERETOFORE DECLARED PROHIBITED

BY THE ATTORNEY GENERAL OF THE UNITED STATES." WHEREIN ABOVE QUOTED INSTRUCTIONS VARY FROM FORM WDGPV FIVE THESE INSTRUCTIONS PREVAIL. NEW PROCLAMATION IDENTIFIED AS "PUBLIC PROCLAMATION NUMBER FIVE". PLEASE ISSUE FORM WDGPV FIVE ONLY TO PERSONS CLEARLY WITHIN CLASSIFICATIONS OUTLINED. ALL OTHER MUST CONFORM STRICTLY TO PREVIOUSLY ISSUED PROCLAMATIONS AWAITING SOME FUTURE ORDER OR PERMISSION FOR ANY MODIFICATION. INTERPRETATION OF NEW PROCLAMATION SOLELY MILITARY FUNCTION TO BE PERFORMED BY ARMY OFFICIALS OR THEIR DESIGNATED REPRESENTATIVE.

QUESTION JAPANESE IN GROCERY BUSINESSES WHO SOUGHT PERMISSION TO MAKE ROUNDS OF THEIR DEBTORS TO COLLECT OUTSTANDING BILLS BEEN TOLD WOULD HAVE TO USE WHITE COLLECTORS. NO CURFEW ANGLE INVOLVED. MAY THEY MAKE THEIR OWN COLLECTORS? ANSWER, YES. QUESTION SAME MAY JAPANESE COLLECTORS MAKE ONE OR TWO TRIPS WITH WHITE COLLECTORS TO ACQUAINT THEM WITH CUSTOMERS AND ROUTES QUESTION MARK. ANSWER YES. QUESTION AREA AROUND SACRAMENTO HAS BEEN DEPENDENT UPON JAPANESE GROCERY AND FISH DELIVERY ROUTE IN AREAS WHERE NO LOCAL STORES LOCATED. BOTH JAPANESE AND WHITE CUSTOMERS AFFECTED. SUCH ROUTES USUALLY TRAVEL FOUR OR FIVE TOWNS TOTAL DISTANCE TWENTY-FIVE TO THIRTY MILES. NO CURFEW ANGLE. CAN THESE ROUTES CONTINUE? ANSWER, YES. QUESTION CAN REGULAR COLLECTORS FOR JAPANESE NEWSPAPER PUBLISHED SAN FRANCISCO CONTINUE COLLECTION WORK WITHOUT VIOLATING FIVE MILES? ANSWER, YES.

Army and selective service headquarters officials advise that all local Draft Boards have general instructions to provide registration stations for all persons in their areas required to register in fourth draft. Therefore, if situations arise where enemy aliens or Japanese cannot reach registration facilities because no station or official available outside prohibited area, you should immediately notify local draft board, and if it does not provide such registration location or registrar, you should contact area draft board coordinator requesting registration facilities be provided outside prohibited area. Provision has been made for registration of Japanese who are in assembly centers on registration dates, but all others should register in compliance with presidential proclamation on these dates with local registration officials or boards near their residences. In cases where team offices have been established in your area, issue copies this wire to other team representatives.

1. Telegrams were sent on March 16, 1942, to the following offices stating that they had been designated as local headquarters of representatives of the Federal agencies designated to handle alien evacuation problems:

These offices will receive further instructions from time to time from this office or from the regional representative.

2. It is understood that representatives of the following agencies will be stationed at the offices named for such period of time as their services may be needed but probably not exceeding 90 days.

Federal Reserve Bank -- To handle matters of financing, and custody of alien property.

Farm Security Administration -- To assist aliens in transferring farm property, leases or share-cropping arrangements to other individuals or companies.

Social Work Representative (designated by County Welfare Department) -- To handle personal welfare problems.

United States Employment Service -- To give advice and assistance with reference to employment.

3/18/42

3. Managers of the offices designated are requested to make available to representatives of the above agencies suitable office space and such office furniture and facilities as may be available. One receptionist should be designated to direct applicants to the appropriate agency. Interviewers should be assigned to handle employment interviews.

4. It is understood that the Office of Emergency Management can promptly procure necessary space, equipment and telephone service in those cases where the local office is unable to meet the requirements of the various agencies. As soon as it becomes evident that additional office space or equipment are needed requisition should be forwarded by mail or wire to James G. Bryant, Regional Representative, U.S.E.S., 785 Market Street, San Francisco, for transmittal to the office of Emergency Management.

5. Copies of Public Proclamation No. 2 issued by Headquarters of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army were sent to all local offices on March 16, 1942. This Proclamation contains descriptions of additional zones, most of which are outside of California, but contains no new instructions as to evacuation. The information contained in Public Proclamation No. 2 should be made available to persons who may inquire about the various zones therein established.

6. It is probable that local managers will later receive special authority to issue travel permits to aliens who are required to move.

7. There is being forwarded to day to each local office a copy of Department Bulletin No. 181 issued to county officials by the State Department of Social Welfare on the subject "Service to Aliens of Enemy Nationality Affected by Department of Justice Removal Orders". This bulletin describes the arrangement which has been made whereby County Welfare Departments assumed responsibility beginning March 9, 1942, for service to aliens of enemy nationalities whose need for continuing assistance has arisen because of the movement of such aliens from certain prohibited areas. This bulletin is merely for information.

8. All offices should furnish information requested by aliens as to the assistance which is available to them. Offices in which the Federal agencies do not have representation should inform persons inquiring as to the location of the nearest office where such representation is to be found.

PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING NOTATION CAREFULLY: The instructions given below are exact copies of the latest releases from the Federal Reserve Bank. They were issued in areas where evacuation has taken place or is taking place under Exclusion Orders issued by the United States Army.

Although we do not know definitely what instructions will be given in this area when orders do come, as far as we can determine the report is that instructions given out for evacuation in the different areas already will be integrated, and a general plan as given here will be followed.

Therefore, when you read this bulletin, please use your best judgment as to how you will make arrangements in taking care of your individual problems. If our chapter's office can give you further advice, we will be glad to do it.

INSTRUCTIONS TO EVACUEES REGARDING DISPOSITION OF MOTOR VEHICLES

Evacuees will not be permitted to take their motor vehicles to reception centers. No assurance whatever can be given that evacuees will be enabled at some future time to have the motor vehicles now owned by them returned for their individual use.

The United States Army is authorized, in its discretion, to purchase motor vehicles from evacuees.

(THIS IS IMPORTANT) Prior to evacuation, motor vehicles may be stored, sold or otherwise disposed of by the owner privately, without governmental interference or assistance.

ALTERNATIVES OF STORAGE OR SALE

The other alternatives presented to the evacuee who owns a motor vehicle are as follows:

ALTERNATIVE 1. To deliver his motor vehicle to Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, for storage at the owner's risk, without insurance; which storage will, in most instances, be in open areas (at Assembly Centers or other designated places) and must of necessity be of a character which will subject motor vehicles to a more or less rapid deterioration.

ALTERNATIVE 2. To offer his motor vehicle for sale to the United States on the following basis:

The motor vehicle will be appraised by two disinterested appraisers and, in its discretion and at its option, the Army may buy the motor vehicle at the appraised price which shall not, however, exceed the Blue Book wholesale value in the locality where the purchase is consummated.

PURCHASE OF MOTOR VEHICLES BY THE UNITED STATES

A. If the evacuee is NOT the legal owner of the motor vehicle, in order to arrange for a sale to the Army, he must present to the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, at the Civil Control Station, or such other place as may be directed, the following:

1. Registration certificate, duly endorsed.
2. The agreement on the reverse hereof, duly signed and witnessed.
3. Such other authorization and assurance as may be required by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States.

In case the evacuee is not the legal owner, it must be clearly understood that if the indebtedness against the motor vehicle is equal to or greater than the appraised value so that the evacuee has no equity, no sale to the United States will be consummated. In such an instance the right of any creditor to repossess or recapture, as provided by law, will not be resisted by the custodian of the motor vehicle.

B. If the evacuee IS the legal owner of the motor vehicle, he must, in addition to the foregoing, present of the ownership certificate, duly endorsed.

DEFINITIONS AND CONDITIONS

Included in the term "motor vehicle" are the following:

1. Passenger cars, light and medium. Heavy passenger cars in order to come within the purchasable category must be classed as "medium," as the Army is not authorized to purchase any "heavy" passenger cars.
2. Motorcycles.
3. Busses and trucks of all types, including pick-up and delivery trucks; and tractors, including semi-truck tractors.

It is not intended to include within the term "motor vehicle" those self-propelled motor vehicles suited only for farm operation.

In the event that the sale of any motor vehicle is not completed or appears not feasible, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, acting for and as agent of the evacuee, reserves the right to store such motor vehicle at the owner's risk, as above set forth, or to make such other disposition of such motor vehicle as may, in its sole discretion, appear to be just and equitable, including the right to permit the legal owner of such motor vehicle to take his legal recourse for repossession or otherwise.

It is intended that the above procedure will provide a feasible means of protecting the interests of evacuees in their motor vehicles, without prejudice to the interests of others therein, and thus will effect an equitable disposition of such property.

AGREEMENT REGARDING DISPOSITION OF MOTOR VEHICLE

THIS IS TO CERTIFY that the undersigned has read and understands the instructions on the reverse hereof regarding the disposition of the motor vehicle described on WCCA Form FRB-3, (to be attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein if this Agreement is signed) which the undersigned has signed concurrently herewith.

Said instructions and those on the reverse of WCCA Form FRB-3 are a part of this Agreement.

The undersigned desires to dispose of the aforesaid motor vehicle according to Alternative No. _____ set forth on the reverse hereof, and requests the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, to act accordingly. If the accomplishment of the alternative herein selected appears to said Bank, in its sole discretion, impossible or not feasible, said Bank is authorized to make such other disposition of said motor vehicle as it deems proper.

Said motor vehicle is delivered to said Bank at the sole risk of the undersigned, and it is agreed that no liability or responsibility shall attach to said Bank for any act or omission in connection with the handling of said motor vehicle or disposition of the proceeds thereof.

The undersigned further agrees, upon demand, to reimburse the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, Fiscal Agent of the United States, in full for all charges and expenses incurred in connection with the disposition of said motor vehicle; and authorizes and instructs said Bank to deduct from the proceeds of the sale of said motor vehicle any of such expenses incurred.

We advise you once more to carefully note the paragraph which is given below--it's repetition, but consider it seriously. If you have the financial set up for storage or friends to take care of your car or can negotiate a satisfactory deal, do it now.

"Prior to evacuation, motor vehicles may be stored, sold or otherwise disposed of by the owner privately, without governmental interference or assistance."

INSTRUCTIONS TO OWNER

To be accepted for storage by the United States Government, the motor vehicle must be in proper running order.

The procedure for registering and storing a motor vehicle is as follows:

- (a) The State Motor Vehicle Registration Certificate for this vehicle must be submitted at the Civil Control Station, and three copies of this form (FRB-3) will then be prepared.
- (b) Two copies of this form, together with the Registration Certificate, will be handed to the evacuee for his retention until arrival at the designated Assembly Center. The third copy will be retained at the Civil Control Station.
- (c) The evacuee will be given an identification tag which he will tie securely to the steering apparatus of the motor vehicle.
- (d) On arrival at the Assembly Center the evacuee will deliver to the representative of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco the two copies of this form, the Registration Certificate, and the keys to the vehicle.
- (e) The representative of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will check all numbers on the form and if found to be correct will acknowledge receipt of the motor vehicle by signing one copy of the form and delivering it to the evacuee.

If the motor vehicle described in this form is lost, damaged, or destroyed as the result of negligence while it is in the possession or custody of the United States or any agency acting for it, the Congress of the United States will be asked to take appropriate action for the benefit of the owner.

The following copy of the "Personal Property Form," released by the Federal Reserve Bank, is also FOR YOUR STUDY AND INFORMATION. Please note especially the instructions to the owners, with particular reference to the sections which have been underlined. It must be remembered that no small packages or individual bundles will be received for storage. All merchandise of a non-perishable sort, household furniture, professional equipment, etc., may be stored at government expense provided that it is packed or crated according to the specifications outlined.

The above mentioned PERSONAL PROPERTY FORM and STORAGE NOTICE is followed by a comprehensive PERSONAL PROPERTY INVENTORY LIST on which owners will be able to report the number of items to be stored in government designated storage space. The inventory list covers articles in living room, bedroom, dining room, kitchen and miscellaneous articles, as well as space to list other crated or boxed items.

On the following page, you will find instructions to owners as printed on the back of the above mentioned PERSONAL PROPERTY INVENTORY LIST, explaining the procedure to be followed.

INSTRUCTIONS TO OWNER

Before any property will be accepted for storage by the United States Government four (4) copies of this form must be filled in and returned to the Civil Control Station at which you registered for evacuation. On the back of each copy the items to be left for storage must be carefully listed. Items not on the printed list should be written in the blank spaces provided on this form.

Small articles must be securely packed in crates or boxes of not less than two (2) cubic feet capacity and will be indicated simply as to number of boxes, no attempt being made to itemize on this form the articles therein. All crates and boxes must be securely packed and fastened. Each box, crate, or article must be identified with tags obtained from the Civil Control Station.

No loose bundles of clothes, linens, utensils, or other small or unsubstantial household items will be accepted for storage. Farm products, farm machinery, automobiles, land, livestock, or pets must not be listed as personal property on this form.

After all copies of the form have been filled in and returned to the Civil Control Station, one copy, checked for conformity with the other three, will be given to the owner of the property. The copy delivered to the owner will be evidence merely that other copies of the form have been delivered. At this time the owner must leave the keys to the place where the property is to be found, or make arrangements to deliver the keys to the representative of the Evacuee Property Department of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco before leaving the area of his residence.

The copy delivered to the owner merely shows the number of items, boxes, and crates which the owner claims he has prepared for storage. It does not constitute any evidence of the number of items actually stored or of the contents of boxes, crates or packages. Verification of the inventory list of items actually stored will be made as storage is accomplished. A verified list will then be forwarded to the owner.

The copy of the list mailed to the owner will serve as a permanent record and should be carefully preserved by him.

Although we do not know WHEN and WHERE this area will be evacuated, it might be well to note that completion of nearly all Assembly Centers is scheduled about April 15, 1942.

SPECIAL BULLETIN

Due to the various notices and rumors of quick evacuation we deem it necessary to issue the following reports.

STORAGE

The federal government will store any and all personal belongings free of charge. They will pick up and store these goods at a central storage place, which in all probability will not be in Lodi. They will put guards on 24 hours a day, but will not assume responsibility as to fire or theft. They also will, when we are relocated, send these goods to us at our new location.

The Lodi JACL has also made arrangements to store all personal property at the Lodi Hall and the Lo-A Buddhist Church. In this storage we have contacted a reliable insurance co, who will insure all these properties at a rate of about \$2.00 per \$100.00 valuation. It is up to the individual whether he wishes the government to take charge of their goods or store them here.

Whatever you may choose to do, it is necessary that you make a list of all things you wish to store at the earliest possible moment. All property must be cased and marked as to the contents. Many of you have already made arrangements privately, but in case you have not, take advantage of these facilities.

We expect to also have some responsible party live in the quarters above the Hall so as to have more protection.

WHAT WE MAY TAKE

At the present, these items are the only things that we will be allowed to take: Bedding material (blankets, sheets, pillows) knife fork spoon plate and bowl, clothing, and as much luggage as you can carry. No automobiles, we understand, will be allowed. In the matter of autos, it is best that you dispose of them or make private arrangement for their storage, because we have heard that in case of gov't storage they will be left out in the open and with no guarantee of safe return.

REGISTRATION

In the very near future we understand that registration of all Japanese in the Lodi district will be started. This will very probably be in the local newspapers. Keep watch for this and comply with all the regulations. In the event you need JACL help, there will be someone at the office at all times.

WCCA SIGNUP

In the event that you have not already made arrangement for the disposition of any property, please contact the WCCA office in Lodi or Stockton. In any matter pertaining to evacuation, you do not need a pass to go to the Stockton WCCA. In the matter of any relief that you may need, call on Miss Lamb of the Lodi WCCA.

SPECIAL MEETING

There will be a special meeting of all persons who are interested in the disposition of the Lo-L Corporation. There will be elections of new officers for the duration and to make all arrangements as to storage and insurance. This meeting is called for Monday, April, 13, 1942. Please attend. Every body is requested to attend.

Dear sir:

We have heard that the War Department has made arrangements for the storage of Japanese owned property; that is, provide storage spaces. We understand that these places will be designated by the War Dep't. In regards to such places, inasmuch as no such places have been yet designated, we have a suggestion to make.

We have in Lodi two places that might be used as storage places. To be definite these are the Lodi Japanese Hall and the Buddhist Church at 2nd N. Stockton St., and 23 N. Stockton St. Because of the fact that no provision have been made as yet, the Japanese people are undecided as to the disposition of their goods. We offer these places to you, if it is advisable to your office. We have conferred with Mr. Weeks of the Fed. Reserve in the Stockton WCCA office regarding such a move.

The insurances on these two buildings have been cancelled recently; but we felt that thru the good graces of your offices such insurance may be taken out again. We also felt that in the event that these places are used as storage the individual persons storing their goods might be able to pay pro rata on the insurance.

In the event that these particulars can be taken care of thru your offices, kindly let us know at your earliest convenience. We feel that a early settlement of these matters will be conducive to the facilitation of the evacuation program.

Your letter to Mr. Orton regarding Miss Kikuko Morita, her sister, Miss Toshiko, and another sister, Miss Hiruko, has been referred to me.

We were glad indeed to know of your interest and we would like to be of some assistance to you in effecting your generous offer.

All three of these young women are able to type and Miss Toshiko has had some other business courses, including shorthand and book-keeping. However, she has not had any occasion to use these skills since she has been devoting her time to academic subjects at the University of California.

Miss Kikuko worked for several days during alien registration as an interpreter. It was Federal civil service work with Mr. George Dietz of this city as supervisor.

Although I did not know Miss Toshiko personally, since she attended Stockton Junior College before I assumed office here, I have known both of her sisters and they seem like good citizens who should be given whatever opportunity is available to do some kind of clerical work or to serve as interpreters. It is rather difficult to make further recommendations since the fields open to the American-Japanese are necessarily so restricted.

Dear Mr. Nagao:

You will recall your visit to this Office on April 17, at which time you presented your Sun Life Endowment Policy for analysis, and upon which date we wrote to Sun Life Company at their Office in San Francisco asking them to inform us what values exist in your Policy at the present time.

Enclosed herewith you will find copy of their reply dated April 27.

You have a very fine thing in this Policy, and you have taken good care of it. You would be safe in doing this, because as is so plainly shown herein, you can get money advanced under this Policy at any time.


Your letter of April 10th concerning Japanese to be evacuated at hand. Many have already paid their premiums two, three, four and five years in advance, thereby receiving a discount. This, of course, can be done by anyone who has extra money regardless of the age of the policy.

If they do not have money, it is true that the premium can be paid on the loan basis providing the policy has a reserve sufficiently large to take care of this premium loan. Nevertheless, on 20 Year Endowments or on policies of a shorter duration on which one annual premium has been paid, part of the second annual premium could already be paid by the premium loan (approximately 75%). On endowments of a longer duration than 20 years, the premium loan can be exercised providing two annual premiums have been paid. Therefore, you can see it is quite simple to take care of this matter providing they get in touch with our Cashier's Department of which Mr. Leo P. Dempsey is Cashier. He has already taken up many of their problems, and so far everyone is happy and satisfied with arrangements which were made.

We have a full-time Japanese representative, Mr. Nao Shibutani, who lives at 145 W. Clay St., Stockton, California, telephone #22254, who has been helping the Japanese people with their problems. Through his advice many have come into the office and paid premiums several years in advance. In fact, judging from the way money has been coming in, I am wondering if some of them don't feel happier by having their money with the New York Life than in government bonds. This is purely a personal reflection.

Outside of the above mentioned premium loan plan, we have no other method of meeting the situation. Most of our policyholders seem to have the cash, and I do hope that no one will lose his New York Life policy because of not being able to pay the premiums. 

I have your letter of May 20, 1942,
in regard to Mr. and Mrs. Hidaka formerly of Modesto.

I am quite familiar with their affairs
and have powers of Attorney from them to deal with
their affairs. I have so far, at least, been unable
to work out any solution to their problems, other than
to see that their property is properly cared for and
not stolen or lost. I had intended to get in touch with
you as soon as I could get a deal which locked even half
way to their advantage but so far have not even been able
to get that.

You are correct in your statement of the
case and I have full information in my files concerning
the description, approximate values ect., of their property.

The best solution, in my opinion, would be
to rent the whole property as a going business at a cash
monthly rental and then from the amounts so received pay
out the contracts on the equipment. I have talked with
Mr. Ralph Brown, who is attorney here for some of the
contract holders and it is possible that we can return
some of the equipment which is not necessary to the operation
of a laundry and get credit for it. I have talked with
several people here, including some real estate firms, in
view of getting such a renter but to date have not had any
success.

In event that it will be impossible to rent
this property after a reasonable time, or to possibly sell
the business as a whole, the only thing left to do would be
to sell out the equipment and pay off the contracts. This
equipment is in new condition and should bring a good price

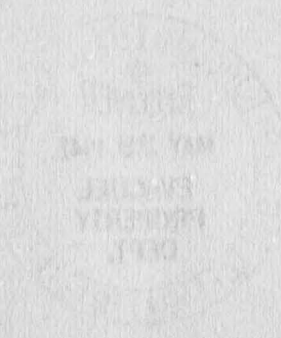

Fumio Nishida (citizen) 1941 Buick Sedan sold to Libby, McNeill & Libby for \$1,100. 1940 Ford Truck and 1941 Ford Pickup sold to Libby for \$900 and \$800 respectively, with the understanding that if Nishida returns within two years he is given the right to buy this truck and pickup back at the same price, less depreciation on the basis of 20% per annum.

Kaname Eddie Sasaki (citizen) 1940 GMC Truck sold to Libby's Sacramento Cannery for \$800. 1930 Ford Pickup sold to L. S. Wetmore for \$1.00, with the agreement that it will be returned to him if he comes back within two years. This Ford was registered in the name of Gosuke Sasaki, Eddie's father, but the father left the pink slip signed in blank for transfer of the car to his son, so Eddie was the real owner at the time of evacuation.

Isao Bob Sofye (citizen) 1939 Ford Pickup stored with Libby, with the privilege for us to use it at any time for a rental of 75¢ per day -- Libby to maintain the car and carry Public Liability Insurance. Fire & theft insurance is carried by Sofye. His 1940 Ford Truck was sold to an outsider, we understand, for \$1,100.

Chas. I. Sofye (alien) 1942 Ford Sedan--payments still due Pacific Finance Corp. of about \$869.00. We are authorized to sell this car for \$1,000, and have a prospect who will pay \$131.00 now in cash to be deposited to the credit of Bob Sofye, the son. Buyer will pay the remaining payments due Pacific Finance Corp. as they fall due. As soon as this prospect is ready to sign, I will get forms from you for purchase

of a 1942 car.

Tane Sofye (alien) 1928 Dodge Sedan sold to Libby for \$50.00 -- to be wrecked for tires and parts.

Saddie Yagi (citizen) 1940 Pontiac Sedan stored with Libby. 

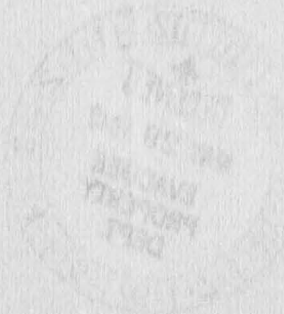

It is exceptionally good news to hear that you sold your 1942 car for \$1100. That is really a good sale, and I think you are very fortunate. With regard to ~~your~~ inquiry of Mr. Takase relative to the amount of \$366.21 on deposit to his credit at the Anglo-California Bank in San Francisco; under letter #11, Japanese with blocked bank accounts are entitled to withdraw up to \$500 per month to defray living and other necessary expenses. I do not believe there is any exception to this rule in the cases of Mr. Takase and Mr. Uno, and I do not believe any special license is needed by Mr. Takase to withdraw that amount of money from a blocked account. I would suggest that Mr. Takase write the Bank direct and state his understanding of these requirements, and at the same time, draw a check upon the account if he needs the funds.

I will be pleased to have either Mr. Takase or Mr. Uno call upon me for any assistance which I may be able to render them in the matter.

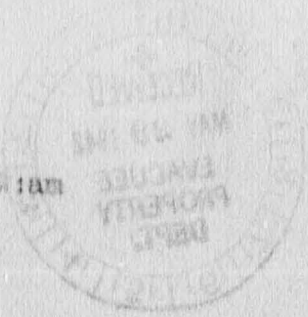
