Reference is made to your letter dated July 24, 1942 requesting information regarding the storage and forwarding of personal property of evacuees.

The questions propounded by you concern matters which are primarily within the jurisdiction of the War Relocation Authority rather than of this bank.

As you have undoubtedly been informed, storage facilities for evacuess' goods are provided by this bank at the time controlled evacuation operations occur in a certain locality. Evacuese' goods are picked up by drayage facilities provided by this bank and the goods are placed in storage for the account of the Mar Relocation Authority, who has control over the matter of future disposition of the goods in the warehouse.

The program of that agency is to make available at the relocation sreas such of the goods of the evacuees as can appropriately be used there in the light of the circumstances and to cause those goods to be forwarded as soon as possible.

The ascount of property which may be taken by an evacuee at the time of evacuation and the character of that property is determined by the Exclusion Order issued in each instance.

Civil Control Stations are now in operation at Visalia Municipal Auditorium, Visalia, California, and Reedley Junior College and High School Cymnasium, Reedley, California, where representatives of the Federal Security Agenty and Farm Security Administration and of this bank are available for the assistance of evacuees in the settlement of their problems arising incident to the evacuation of persons in your general area. It is suggested that you get in touch with the Control Station which is servicing your some, where you will be able to obtain the information you request regarding the amount and character of property permitted to be taken by evacuees at the time of evacuation, and assistance may be obtained with respect to the other questions propounded by you.

TO OFFICER ADDRESSED, AS PER ATTACHED LIST

The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, as Fiscal Agent of the United States, has been delegated the duty of assisting German, Italian and Japanese aliens, as well as persons of Japanese ancestry, in aking arrangements for equitable disposition of their properties in connection with their evacuation from the areas recently designated as "military areas" by the military authorities who maintain general supervision and direction of the entire program.

The property-disposal phase of the plan envisions voluntary action on the part of each evacuee, but its fulfillment in accordance with the guiding principles of American democracy will require the thoughtful and wholehearted cooperation of all who are in a position to lend their support.

It must be recognized that the problems which will confront the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco in these additional duties, with the pressure of time foremost in our minds, dictate that all agencies, including the banks in the military areas, be called upon to render their unselfish help in their solution. We must, therefore, ask you and your organization to join with us in an effort to assure agencies (Federal, state, and local) will also be called upon for

We are enclosing a copy of a press release which has been submitted to the office of Lieutenant General J. L. DeWitt, Commanding General, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, for general publication. A memorandum is also enclosed which outlines certain guiding principles for performance of the plan, and which emphasizes our hope and expectation that each bank will do its part in the acceptance of responsibilities delegated to it by evacuees, as well as in the dissemination of information and extension of assistance.

We shall be anxious to assist you at all times in solving the mutual problems confronting us in the execution of the program.

Memorandum of Functions and Operations of the Evacuee Property Department of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco as Fiscal Agent of the United States, and Suggested Procedure for Cooperation of Other Banks in Administration of Evacuation Program.

In its operations as Fiscal Agent of the United States the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco has been delegated the duty of assisting Japanese, German and Italian aliens and persons of Japanese ancestry evacuating from the Military Areas which have been designated by Headquarters Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, Presidio of San Francisco, California, in Public Proclamation No. 1, issued under date of March 2, 1942, in arranging for the protection, preservation and equitable disposition of the property holdings of such evacuees. In this operation, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco is subject to the general direction of the military authorities.

The following general outline of procedure has been established for the administration of this program:

- 1. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will not take possession of property of an evacuee as an alien property custodian, but will serve largely as an advisor to the evacuee in the matter of disposition of his property.
  - All dealings with the evacuee will be on a purely voluntary basis, and he will have complete freedom in disposing of his property.
  - 3. The evacuee will be encouraged in his own interest to make private arrangements for the disposition of his property by sale, lease, or other appropriate means by either:
    - (a) Independent action of the evacuee on his own account, or
    - (b) Through an agent of the evacuee's own selection.
  - 4. In the selection of an agent the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will recommend the appointment by the evacuee of some person or institution in which the evacuee reposes confidence to represent his interests such as his bank, his attorney, or his real estate agent.
  - 5. If an evacuee is unable to otherwise arrange for the equitable disposal of his property or for an agent acceptable to the evacuee to represent him, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will give consideration to accepting his power of attorney.
  - 6. Each case will be considered on its individual merits and disposed of on that basis.
  - 7. All advice and assistance possible will be provided the evacuee by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, and it is expected that the banks and others within the Areas involved who are approached by evacuees for assistance will likewise extend their full assistance and cooperation to the end that the purpose of the program will be completely served. It is recognized that the assistance of the banks in the field will make for greater speed in the execution of the program.
  - 8. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will endeavor to advise and assist banks and others whom the evacuees select as their agents in the performance of their agencies. Obviously, if the banks and others within the Military Areas who are approached by evacuees to act as agents will accept such agencies, the entire program will benefit.
  - From time to time the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will disseminate such information and instructions as will assist in the administration of the plan.
  - 10. Assistance will be provided by governmental agencies, both Federal and state, in the administration of the evacuation plan, including those agencies handling other aspects of the evacuee

- 1). While emphasis is placed on the liquidation of the property holdings of the evacuee, he will be informed by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco that he may retain ownership of property left behind if appropriate arrangements can be made for its protection and preservation.
- 12. The program will be administered by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco through its head office and through its branches in Seattle, Washington; Portland, Oregon; and Los Angeles, California; as well as such other offices as may be established in the Areas for the efficient furtherance of its aims. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco has established its Evacuee Property Department in San Francisco, California, at 500 California Street in that city.
- 13. It is intended to undertake to forestall action by unscrupulous creditors which would be detrimental to the interest of the evacuee and in all respects to minimize his losses to the greatest possible extent in connection with the disposition of his property. It is anticipated that this will be accomplished to a large extent through appeal to the creditor's sense of fair play and the obvious necessity of complete cooperation in the administration of the evacuation program. Any cases in which an equitable settlement is not agreed upon should be promptly brought to the attention of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco.
  - 14. No compulsion will be placed upon evacuees to utilize the facilities provided by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, but they are invited to make use of them.

The foregoing are intended to set forth certain basic principles which the Federal Reserve Bank, acting in its capacity as Fiscal Agent of the United States, feels to be important in the efficient, speedy and proper execution of its duties. In the conduct of the evacuation plan it is particularly desired that the banks throughout the Areas will extend their full cooperation in the knowledge that by widespread assistance to the evacuees the problems incident to their removal from the Areas can be most readily and expeditiously solved. In their fulfillment of their places in this program, banks are requested to give consideration to the procedure and principles enumerated above. As the program goes forward the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco proposes to communicate to the banks additional suggestions and outlines of procedure or changes in procedure calculated to improve its administration of the program and to provide public circulation of data directed toward its speedy accomplishment.

#### PRESS RELEASE

Lieutenant General J. L. DeWitt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, announced today that the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco has been appointed to assist Japanese and other evacuees situated within prohibited or restricted military areas in the disposition of their property.

The Treasury Department and the military authorities have given broad powers to the bank to enable it to carry out the objectives of the program. Bank officials indicated that they are undertaking this program under the direction of General DeWitt for the purpose of assisting military authorities in clearing up the problem presented by the war emergency.

The Federal Reserve Bank, acting in conjunction with the commanding general, plans to carry on the project through the bank's extensive facilities, as well as those of its branches in Seattle, Portland, and Los Angeles. The objective of the program will be to bring about a fair and just liquidation of that property which the evacuees cannot take with them.

The Federal Reserve Bank will establish other offices in the coastal areas in order that evacuees may receive impartial counsel and advice in their efforts to liquidate their property, as well as assistance in the sale or other disposition of their property. These offices also will take strong measures to protect the evacuees against unscrupulous creditors.

General DeWitt and Federal Reserve officials stated that the government does not plan to take title to the property of the evacuees. On the contrary, it is their intention to aid the evacuees in a voluntary liquidation of their property at reasonable prices and to protect them against individuals who seek to take advantage of their situation. If need be, officials stated, the bank will be prepared to take over the control of the property under powers of attorney in order to protect the property interest of the evacuee. Evacuees will be encouraged to come in and discuss their problems relating to the disposition of their property. No one will be compelled to come in, but those desiring the bank's services will find competent and impartial men prepared to assist them in their problems.

General DeWitt made clear that speed and fairness are the keynotes of this program and that expeditious handling of the evacuee's property is essential because of the urgency of the West Coast situation.

Officials stated that the Federal Reserve Bank will work in close cooperation with Federal, state, and local public agencies that may be called upon for assistance in dealing with the property of evacuees during the course of its liquidation. These agencies have been or undoubtedly will be called upon by the military authorities to handle other aspects of the evacuation problem, such as the transportation and the resettlement of the evacuees and their reemployment in new areas. Banks and other institutions in the various communities throughout the West Coast area will be called upon to do their full part in bringing about an orderly and equitable disposition of the evacuee's property.

General DeWitt stated that he had been requested by the Federal Reserve Bank to point out that Treasury Department freezing regulations will not interfere with the program. This is particularly true in view of the amendment to General License No. 68A being released by the Federal Reserve Bank. The General License now permits Japanese evacuees operating under such license to dispose of their property without restriction.

Amendment of General License No. 42, Under Executive Order No. 8389, April 10, 1940, as Amended, and Regulations Issued Pursuant Thereto, Relating to Trans-1940, as Amended, and Regulations in Foreign Exchange, etc.\*

General License No. 42 is amended to read as follows:

(a) Licensing as a generally licensed national any individual residing in the United States on February 23, 1942, and

(b) Licensing as a generally licensed national any partnership, association, corporation or other organization which is a national of a foreign country designated in the Order solely by reason of the interest therein of a person or persons licensed as generally licensed nationals pursuant to this general license.

(2) The following provisions shall govern the filing of reports under this general license:

(a) Before effecting any transaction pursuant to this general license the following persons licensed herein as generally licensed nationals shall file a report in triplicate on Form TFR-42 with the appropriate Federal Reserve bank:

(i) Every individual who was not residing in the United States on June 17, 1940; and

(ii) Every partnership, association, corporation or other organization which prior to February 23, 1942, was not a generally licensed national solely by reason of the interest of an individual or individuals referred to in (i) above. Any person failing to comply with this reporting requirement is not authorized to engage in any transaction pursuant to this general license.

(b) Individuals and other persons licensed herein as generally licensed nationals and not falling within classes referred to in 2(a) need not file reports on Form TFR-42.

(c) This general license shall not be deemed to suspend, cancel, or otherwise modify in any way the requirements of the Order and Regulations relating to reports on Form TFR-300 with respect to the property interests of certain persons licensed herein as generally licensed nationals; provided, however, that if reports on TFR-300 were not, prior to February 23, 1942, required to be filed in any case or class of cases, such reports are not required to be filed pursuant to this general license.

(3) This general license shall not be deemed to license as a generally licensed national:

(a) Any individual who on or since the effective date of the Order has acted or purported to act directly or indirectly for the benefit or on behalf of any blocked country, including the government thereof;

(b) Any individual who is a national of a blocked country by reason of any fact other than that such individual has been domiciled in, or a subject, citizen, or resident of a blocked country

at any time on or since the effective date of the Order;

(c) Any individual who enters a blocked country after February 23, 1942; or

(d) Any national of Japan. Nationals of Japan shall continue to be governed by the provisions of General License No. 68A in so far as General License No. 68A may be applicable.

For your information, the following statement to the press was released February 23, 1942 by the Treasury Department.

The Treasury Department today liberalized the freezing control restrictions by according to refugees arriving in the United States after June 17, 1940 the same treatment as that previously extended to other refugees.

At the same time the Treasury simplified the freezing control regulations with respect to resident aliens by consolidating into one general license the freezing control provisions applicable to all individuals (except nationals of Japan) now residing in the United States, and to the business concerns blocked solely because of the interest of such individuals. This was done by amending General License No. 42 and at the same time revoking General Licenses No. 42A and No. 68.

For some time the practice of the Treasury Department has been to liberalize the freezing control restrictions relating to bona fide immigrants and refugees in the United States and, at the same time, to tighten the controls in their application to individual cases singled out for close supervision. The experience gained by the Foreign Funds Control during the past 22 months and the mass of information gathered by it, particularly on the TFR-300 census reports, have enabled the Treasury Department effectively to carry out this policy.

Treasury officials stated that persons dealing with residents of the United States may now assume that such residents are not blocked unless they are affirmatively on notice to the contrary. The Treasury Department will rely on banking institutions to exercise continued vigilance in seeing that accounts which are not entitled to the privileges of General License No. 42 remain blocked, in carrying out instructions of the Treasury Department in cases which are singled out for special treatment, and in bringing unusual or otherwise suspicious transactions to the attention of the Foreign Funds Control through the Federal Reserve banks.

Nationals of China, who were previously subject to the provisions of General License No. 68, are now entitled to all the benefits of General License No. 42.

The new General License No. 42 does not free the accounts of persons who have been acting on behalf of Axis countries. Likewise, it has no effect on the great bulk of frozen assets, which are owned or controlled by foreign governments or by individuals or concerns located outside the United States. Nationals of Japan are still subject to the provisions of General License No. 68A and were not affected by today's action.

The Treasury Department directs your attention to the fact that the new General License No. 42 in no way alters the status of accounts which have at any time been blocked pursuant to specific instructions of the Treasury Department or a Federal Reserve bank. No such account should be unblocked until the matter has been submitted to the Federal Reserve bank and a ruling or license received authorizing the unblocking of such account. Furthermore, it is advisable for any banking institution or brokerage house to consult the Federal Reserve bank before unblocking any account which has been the subject of specific inquiry by the Treasury Department or by the Federal Reserve bank as to the status of such account under the freezing order. Business enterprises which are posted or on whose premises guards or supervisors are stationed by the Treasury Department are not to be considered as generally licensed nationals, even though such enterprises, except for the posting or presence of such guards or supervisors, appear to be included within the provisions of General License No. 42, as amended.

Because of the fact that General License No. 42, as amended, excludes by its terms individuals who acquire a residence in the United States after February 23, 1942, there will be cases in which an individual is excluded from the provisions of General License No. 42 solely because of the fact that he acquires a residence in the United States after that date. Such individuals may file applications to be licensed as generally licensed nationals under General License No. 42, as amended.

General License No. 68A, Under Executive Order No. 8389, April 10, 1940, as Amended, and Regulations Issued Pursuant Thereto, Relating to Transactions in Foreign Exchange, etc.\*

- (1) A general license is hereby granted: (a) Licensing as a generally licensed national any individual who is a national of Japan and who, has been residing only in the continental United States at all times on and since June 17, 1940, and
  - (b) Licensing as a generally licensed national any partnership, association, corporation or other organization within the continental United States which is a national of Japan solely by reason of the interest therein of a person or persons licensed as generally licensed nationals. pursuant to this general license.
- (2) This general license shall not be deemed to license as a generally licensed national:
- (a) Any individual, partnership, association, corporation or other organization on the premises of which the Treasury Department maintains a representative or guard or on the premises of which there is posted an official Treasury Department notice that the premises are under the control of the United States Government, or
  - (b) Any bank, trust company, shipping concern, steamship agency, or insurance company, or
  - (c) Any person who, on or since the effective date of the Order, has represented or acted as agent for any person located outside the continental United States or for any person owned or controlled by persons located outside the continental United States, or
  - (d) Any person who on or since the effective date of the Order has acted or purported to act directly or indirectly for the benefit or on behalf of any blocked country, including the government thereof, or any person who is a national of Japan by reason of any fact other than that such person has been domiciled in, or a subject or citizen of, Japan at any time on or since the effective date of the Order.
- (3) A report on the appropriate series of Form TFR-300 shall be filed with the appropriate Federal Reserve bank within 30 days after the date hereof with respect to the property interests of every person licensed herein as a generally licensed national if the total value of the property interests to be reported is \$1,000 or more.

- (4) Every business enterprise licensed herein as a generally licensed national shall also file with the appropriate Federal Reserve bank within 30 days after the date hereof an affidavit setting forth the information required by Form TFBE-1, if the total value of all property interests of such business enterprise is in excess of \$5,000.
- (5) Banking institutions within the United States effecting payments, transfers or withdrawals in excess of \$1,000 during any month from the account of any person licensed as a generally licensed national hereunder, shall file promptly with the appropriate Federal Reserve bank a report showing the details of such transactions.
- (6) This general license shall not authorize any transaction which, directly or indirectly, substantially diminishes or imperils the assets within the continental United States of any national of Japan or otherwise prejudicially affects the financial position of such national within the continental United States.
- (7) As used in this general license, the term "business enterprise" shall mean any individual proprietorship, partnership, association, corporation or other organization engaged in commercial or other business activities within the continental United States.

There is quoted below, for your information, a statement to the press released December 15, 1941 by the Treasury Department respecting such general license.

"The Treasury Department today further relaxed to some extent and under appropriate safeguards the tight restrictions which had been placed upon Japanese residing in this country. It will be remembered that on the outbreak of war the Treasury, as a precautionary measure, placed a complete stoppage on all Japanese financial and commercial transactions and took custody of many Japanese enterprises.

On December 11, the Treasury issued regulations governing living expenses and wages for Japanese nationals in the United States and regulations governing Japanese nationals engaged in the production, marketing, and distributing of food and agricultural products.

The general license issued today by the Treasury unblocks the accounts of Japanese nationals who have resided continuously within the continental United States since June 17, 1940 and permits business enterprises within the continental United States owned and controlled by such Japanese nationals to continue to operate, except in those cases in which Treasury representatives are maintained on the premises or an official Treasury notice is posted indicating that such premises are under government control. It is anticipated that Treasury representatives and posted notices will be removed from the premises of many Japanese enterprises in which they are now maintained, thus allowing such enterprises to resume normal operations under such general license. It is further anticipated that special business operating licenses will be issued to many Japanese enterprises in which Treasury representatives are continued to be maintained allowing such enterprises to operate under government surveillance.

Representatives in this country of concerns located abroad or owned and controlled by persons located abroad are excluded from the privileges of the general license.

The Japanese nationals who are given the benefits of today's license are subjected to certain reporting requirements and other restrictions which will constitute safeguards against the abuse of such benefits."

## Instructions for Use of Inquiry and Reference Slip

As indicated by the title of this form, it is intended to furnish the basic count of persons requesting any type of service rentered in the local offices in connection with the evacuation achivities of the Wartine Civilian Control Administration.

An Inquiry and deference Slip must be prepared by the office receptionist (or any person acting in lieu of the receptionist) for every person inquiring for services every time the inquirer comes into the office.

#### Instructions to Receptionist

In the upper left-hand corner write the Office Number of the office at which the slip originates. This number can be obtained from the Hanual of Policies and Procedures for Use of Social Work Staff.

Write the Name and Address of the inquirer in the space indicated. The inquirer is the person making inquiry for himselfor on behalf of others.

Check the proper square to indicate Sex and Class (Nationality) of inquirer.

In the section under Service Requested check the incuirer's requests:

- (1) If "Travel Permit and Change of Residence Report" is requested, check this item and refer inquirer to the person authorized to issue travel permits. This, in most offices, will be a representative of the U.S. Enployment Service.
- (2) If "Employment information and service" is requested, check this item and refer in wirer to the representative of the U.S. Diployment tervice. This item will also be checked for unemployment compensation inquiries.
- (3) If "Property Service" is requested, determine whether inquiry concerns farm property or other property. If farm property is concerned, check this item, write "farm" on the same line, and refer inquirer to the representative of the Farm Security Administration.

If other than far, property is concerned, check this item and refer inquirer to the representative of the Feder 1 Reserve Bank.

(4) For "Information Only," Social Service, or any other requests not mentioned above, check the applicable item, or write in the service requested under "other" and refer inquirer to the Social Worker.

It is possible that more than one, or possibly all services may be requested. In that event, check each applicable item in accordance with above instructions and refer inquirer to the Social borker.

On the "Date" line write the date of inquiry. On the line marked "Per" write your signature.

Then give the "Inquiry and Reference Slip" to the inquirer to present it to the person to whom referred.

At the end of each day collect all "Inquiry and peference Slips" from all representatives. All of these forms must be mailed at the end of each day to:

#### Instructions to Representations

As indicated above, the "Inquiry and Reference Slip" originates, with the receptionist. Each inquirer referred to you will present this slip with the "service requested" checked.

In the section under Disposition check the applicable item. It should be noted that more than one item under Disposition may be checked by one or more representatives.

If you furnish all of the requested services, check "Service without referral." If you are authorized to issue travel permits, and such were issued, check "Travel permit issued." If inquirer is referred to other representatives in the office, check "Referred to others, this office" and direct inquirer to the proper representative with the "Inquiry and Reference Slip." If inquirer is referred to another WCCA office, check the proper item, but retain the slip for collection at the end of the day. If inquirer must seek service from other organizations, or if his request cannot be complied with, check "Not able to handle" and explain briefly in the "Remarks." The reference slip is retained by the representative for later collection.

All "Inquiry and Reference Slips" must be retained for forwarding to headquarters. Accordingly, the representative last dealing with the inquirer in the office keeps the slips until the end of the day when they are collected by the receptionist.

#### SUGGESTED PROGRAM FOR THE FEDERAL RESERVE BANK OF SAN FRANCISCO AND OTHER FUBLIC AGENCIES TO DEAL WITH PROPERTY OF EVACUEES FROE PACIFIC COAST L'ILITARY AREAS

Suggested program for the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco and other public agencies to deal with property of evacuees from Pacific Coast military areas. The success of the proposed program will depend upon placing complete responsibility for its execution in a responsible West Coast agency acting under the general direction of the local military authorities.

#### I - SCOPE OF PROBLEM:

The evacuation on short notice of tens of thousands of persons from military areas on the Pacific Coast raises serious problems in connection with the liquidation of their property holdings and the protection of the property of such persons against fraud, forced sales, and unscrupulous creditors. Obviously the emergency will cause financial loss to the group involved. However, the following program is intended to accord to this group reasonable protection of their property interests consistent with the war effort.

#### II - LEGAL AUTHORITY:

Since the program is one basically to assist the evacuee in the liquidation of his property, it is expected that in most instances the evacuee will voluntarily avail himself of the facilities afforded by this program. Governmental sametions will be necessary to deal with creditors and others who seek unfair advantages of the evacuees. There is ample legal authority now vested in the military authorities and in the Treasury Department which can be delegated to such West Coast agency to deal with this problem without necessity of obtaining further legislation or new executive orders.

#### III - ADMINISTRATION OF PROGRAM:

The nature and urgency of the situation, coupled with the large volume of transactions that will require prompt handling, necessitates the program's being administered by an agency on the West Coast cloaked with full authority to act without reference to Washington. The over-all control of all aspects of the evacuation must obviously rest in the military authorities. Subject to this over-all control by the army, the direct responsibility for the execution of the property aspects of the program should be placed in the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, which has branch offices in Los Angeles, Seattle, and Portland. The Federal Reserve bank will be in a position to obtain the cooperation of other Government agencies, and of wellknown and experienced individuals and institutions in the various communities throughout the West Coast area. This cooperation, together with the established integrity and ability of the Federal Reserve bank, will enlist the confidence of all of the affected groups and discourage gouging by creditors or other self-seeking interests. The Federal Reserve bank will also work in close Liaison with the Federal Security Agency, the United States Department of Agriculture, and other Federal, State and local public agencies that can be of assistance in dealing with the property during the course of its liquidation. These agencies will undoubtedly be called upon by the military

authorities to handle other aspects of the evacuation problem, such as the transportation and resettlement of the evacuees, and their re-employment in new areas.

The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, which is the Fiscal agent of the Treasury Department, will be clothed with ample authority to execute the program. The Treasury Department will hay down the broad principles and objectives of such programs as well as the general procedure to be followed. The Department will also furnish the San Francisco Bank by airplane with the requisite number of trained experts to assist in working out the details of the program in the field and to participate in its execution. If need be the Department is in a position to provide the San Francisco Federal at once with 100 or more men for this purpose. The keynote of this program is speed. It is believed that it can be put in operation by Monday, March 9, 1942.

#### IV - OUTLINE OF PROGRAM:

- A. Properly staffed offices under the direction of the San Francisco Federal Reserve Bank will be opened at once in the local communities from which evacues will be moved.
- B. Announcement will be made throughout the area by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco that its representatives in these offices are prepared to assist evacuees with the problem of liquidating their property and protecting them against those seeking to take unfair advantage of their plight.
- C. These representatives will assist in putting the evacuees in a position to obtain buyers, lesses, and other users of their property on fair terms. In cases where the evacuee is unable to select his own agent to dispose of his property, the Federal will be prepared to act as agent for the evacuee under a power of attorney or similar arrangement and take steps to liquidate the property on fair terms.
- D. Evacues threatened by creditors will be encouraged to come to the representatives of the Federal for advice and guidence. The Federal representatives will also discuss the matter with the creditor with the view to working out a fair settlement and limiting the remedies that may be pursued by the creditor who threatens unfair action. By and large the mere existence of this program of helping evacuess will eliminate or forestall most of the sharp practices that are now feared.
- E. In some cases the property of the evacues may be such that its real value can only be realized at a future time, e.g., Japanese novelties. In such cases the bank's representative will assist the evacuee in arranging for the storage of such property if that is the wish of the evacuee.
- F. On agricultural properties the bank's representative, with the assistance of representatives of the United States Department of Agriculture, will attempt to arrange for the leasing or sale of such property or if need be for the growing of the crops, with a view to proventing their less through inattention.

G. The Federal Reserve Bank of Jan Francisco and its representatives will be cloaked with adequate authority to cope with problems arising on the basis of existing circumstances. The program will be flexible and at all times the bank will attempt to keep matters on a voluntary basis, satisfactory to the systume. Where these efforts fail it may be necessary for the bank's representatives to step in and take the property over for the purpose of obtaining a fair and reasonable liquidation.

It is expected that the setting up of this program and the accordance to the evacuees of facilities for the liquidation of their property should greatly expedite the departure on a voluntary basis of the evacuees from the military area.

#### Field Office will be staffed by following:

- 1. Federal Security Agency representative to handle interviews in first instance, disposing of problems within its scope, such as transportation, evacues permits, etc., and referring property problems to Evacues Property Department and agricultural problems to Farm Security Administration man.
- 2. Farm Security Administration man to handle agricultural problems presumably being prepared to extend current financial aid to evacuees or agents where funds are not otherwise available.
  - 3. Our own Evacues Property Department man.

Field agents for Evacues Property Department should keep in close touch with us by telephone and correspondence. We will endeavor to issue supplemental instructions as soon as possible.

This form was drafted locally and the principles therein have been accepted by representatives of the Treasury Department as well as ourselves.
- J. Copy of "Press Release" dated March 10, 1942 submitted to Lieutenant General J. L. DeWitt, Commanding General of Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, to be released through his office.
- 4. Copies of "General Questions and Answers" and "Questions and Answers Pertaining to Blocked Nationals" prepared in this office for use by our employees giving hypothetical questions and brief answers. The purpose of this list is to familiarize our employees with the program.
- 5. Sample of a form to be used in this office by all persons in interviews, both counter and by telephone. It is suggested that similar forms be used by your office. In the event that field offices are established by you, a copy of each of the forms prepared in that office, together with any correspondence or memorandum, should be forwarded to you.
- 6. Copy of a "Memorandum of Functions and Operations of the Evacuee Property Department of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco as Fiscal Agent of the United States, and Suggested Procedure for Cooperation of Other Banks in Administration of Evocuation Program" which we propose to forward to certain banks within the Military Areas together with a letter from Mr. Day requesting their assistance in carrying out the program.

Addressed envelopes will be handed to those individuals who are leaving the Area and from whom additional correspondence is expected.

TO POULLAND, SMATTLE, LOS AFGELES BRANCHES and SALT LATE CITY BRANCH FOR INFORMATION ONLY March 11, 1942

Additional forms which are being prepared in this office and which will be sent to you in the near future consist of a counter card to be made available to persons interviewed in order that they may have the poper address for future correspondence, etc., a reference card which is to be handed to the person interviewed when an appointment has been made for him with some person outside our organization, and power of attorney forms.

As to the power of attorney, we will forward appropriate instructions in the use of the form when it is transmitted to you. Meanwhile we will refrain from accepting powers of attorney, although in response to direct requests you may inform the person that we will give consideration to the acceptance of such powers in appropriate cases.

We cannot emphasize too strongly the necessity of instructions to employees of this bank prohibiting the purchase by them or members of their families of any property of an evacuee, the sale of which relates in any way to contacts with this bank. This, of course, does not mean that the employee or his family may not make purchases of an evacuee's goods offered for sale to the general public in the normal course of business.

Further instructions will be forthcoming from time to time and we again call your attention to the fact that we are not compelling evacuees to come to us for assistance, but we are inviting them to make use of the bank's services, assuring them that competent and impartial men are prepared to assist them in their problems.

Flagrant cases of attempted unscrupulous action of creditors which would result in fraud or forced sales should, of course, have your immediate consideration and be brought to our attention by any method of communication which seems desirable in the circumstances.

# OF DEALING WITH THE PROPERTY OF EVACUEES FROM PACIFIC COAST MILITARY AREAS

BING WITH

- (1) The controlling principles to be followed are those outlined in the "Suggested Program for the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco and Other Public Agencies to Deal with Property of Evacuees of Pacific Coast Military Areas" referred to in the telegrem of March 7 from the Secretary of the Treasury delegating authority to the Federal Roservo Bank of San Francisco.
- (2) All available sources, including the press, radio, appropriate federal agencies, banking institutions etc. will be employed by the Federal Reserve Ban't of San Francisco in the dissemination of information to evacuees with respect to the protection of their property interests. The evacuees will be encouraged to consult with the institutions with which they have been dealing and in which they have confidence, such as their local banking connections, attorneys, real estate agents, etc. in order to obtain information and work out satisfactory arrangements with respect to the disposition or maintenance of their property holdings. It will be made clear to the evacuees that the services of the Federal Reserve Bank and its branches and offices are freely available to them to see that they are not taken advantage of. Where the evacues is unable to make other arrangements satisfactory to him, the Federal Reservo Bank of San Francisco will undertake to act as agent for the evacues, reserving the right to decline to act if no useful purpose will be served.
- (3) It is understood that no decision has been made that evacues may not return after the war. Accordingly, while emphasis will be on liquidation, the evacues may rotain the ownership of property which he leaves behind, making appropriate arrangements with the Federal Reserve Bank or otherwise for its care and preservation.
- (4) In addition to its branches in Los Angeles, Seattle, and Portland, the Federal Reserve Bank expects to establish offices in such other communities as may be necessary to furnish adequate service to the evacues. It is recognized, however, that the Federal Reserve Bank may, in cases where it has accepted a power of attorney to act on behalf of an evacues, appoint as its agent any bank or other appropriate agency or person which it may designate.
- (5) It is understood that in protecting evacuees from unscrupulous action on the part of creditors, the Federal Reserve Bank may invoke the freezing powers and the other powers in Section 5(b) of the Trading with the Enemy Act. Thus evacuees threatened by creditors will be encouraged to come to the Federal Reserve offices and discuss their problems. These

offices will be prepared to call in the creditor and attempt to negotiate a reasonable settlement. If it appears that the creditor is not willing to deal fairly, the Federal Reserve office will make use of its delegated powers. It will block all or the relevant part of the evacued's assots and freeze them against any attempt of the creditor to seize or attach them. The creditor will be granted permission to pursue his remedies only when the Federal Reserve office is satisfied that adequate protection has been accorded the evacues. Usually the knowledge that the Federal Reserve office is prepared to act will be more than adequate to remedy the situation.

(6) It is understood in carrying out this program that the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco will not exercise the powers under Section 5(b) of Trading with the Enemy Act as Amended by Title III of First War Powers Act to vest title to any alien property without prior consultation and agreement of the Treasury Department.

This report is for Number 1 Zone only. Number 2 Zone would be an entirely different story.



Reference is made to your interview of June 13, 1942 with Mr. H. Sumida.

It is virtually impossible for us to obtain quotations only from the United States Army Quartermaster as these people are not in the habit of bidding for inventory. Rather, they ask us or any other agent to submit offerings at a specified price. However, we have dealt quite extensively in rice such as that which you mention and could indicate a price of around \$6.80 per hundred pounds. Heretofore we have been able to arrange delivery at little or no cost for drayage, so that virtually all of the \$6.80 would represent a net to the seller.

However, in this case delivery would in all probability be at the San Bernardino depot so you might find it advisable to discuss with Sumida two prices at which he is willing to offer his rice; one representing a delivered price at San Bernardino and the other an f.o.b.

The Army has been paying around 60¢ per gallon for Shoyu Sauce of a given quality. This price is subject to their own analysis of samples, however.

The iriko is an item in which they have no current interest, but they would like to know if the packages are cardboard cartons and what kind of fish is contained therein.

In talking to Mr Holmes at Visalia and Mr Jack at Reedley yesterday I was asked to check on the following report.

There was circulated a report that due to the fact Mexico had declared war on the Axis there would be no Mexican labor in the Valley this season and as a result the Army would not require evacuation until harvest time was over.

Apparently this rumor has had the effect of delaying the disposition of property among the Japanese and Mr Holmes stated he knew of instances where the Japanese had refused offers to sell or lease their holdings due to this misinformation.

In investigating the matter, I have arrived at the following conclusion.

It appears that a delegation or committee of citizens, residents of Area No. 2 had called on General DeWitt and requested that the Japanese be allowed to remain to assist in harvesting the crops and in addition that many letters had also been sent on the subject, resulting in the above mentioned rumor.

Whether or not the Army wants to make any public statement correcting this would of course rest with them. I am only passing this information along for what it may be worth.

Dear Siri

Reference is made to your letter dated May 13, 1942 regarding the matter of insurance on the property of your client, Mr. Wilton Nagata, and his family.

On numerous occasions we have placed before insurance companies in this city problems similar to your own, and have been assured by the companies that they have no general policy of refusing to write insurance on properties owned by Japanese. They have advised us that each case is treated on its individual merits and only where they feel that the risk is undesirable from a business standpoint have they refused to write insurance or have they cancelled insurance.

In the matter of the farm property you mentioned, it would appear that there may be reasonable grounds for the refusal of an insurance company to write insurance if, in fact, it appears that the risk occasioned by unoccupancy makes the business undesirable.

Undoubtedly you have the services of an insurance broker or insurance brokers who will be in a position to fully explore the possibility of placing insurance with various insurance companies, and it would seem that your approach to the problem should be along that line.

Se are uncertain from the tenor of your letter whether you are endeavoring to obtain insurance on household goess of your client and his family placed in our care for storage. As you have already been informed, property of this character received by us is stored at owner's risk and not insured, although private insurance could be made if the owners could find an underwriter willing to accept the risks involved.

The following case was reported here by the father and sister of Mitsu Ashima.

On May 1, 1941, a conditional sales contract was made by Tokiye kune Yamaguchi, seller, and Mitsu Kay Ashime, buyer, for certain land, buildings, greenhouses, plants, fintures and improvements situated in the city of Torrance. Sale price, \$17001.00. Torns, \$1.00 down. December 31, 1941—payment \$4000.00. June 30, 1942—payment \$4000.00. December 31, 1942—payment \$4000.00. June 30, 1943—payment \$5000.00 without interest. Certificate of title to be given at completion of contract. This instrument was recorded on January M., 1942, Book 19101, Page 9, County Records.

Then nursery stock was complete Ashima was offered \$60,000.00 and refused the offer. Later he sold the stock of plants to Japanese growers who later were evacuated, and he was unable to collect. The overhead cost to operate was about \$3000.00 per month. Ashima owes no bills, and made the first payment of \$4000.00 in December, 1941.

They voluntarily evacuated to one 2 and left the property in care of W. C. Wellier, Manager of the California Bank, San Fedro Branch. He has submitted an offer of \$14,000.00. They believe that Mrs. Yanaguchi's humband will compel her to forcolose if a payment became delinquent, although they agreed verbally, before witnesses, that in the event Ashima was unable to pay, they would not dispossess or cause them trouble. The Yanaguchia new deny this agreement.

Mitou Ashima has a signed agreement given by Mrs. Yamaguchi giving him permission to self the property. They believe if given a little time a sale could be made for considerably more than the offer

A sale was made by salesmen Billing and Henry to Bilbro et al for \$900.00 \$300.00 cash and \$25,00 a month on a note and deed of trust, on which we were to pay the usual 10% lot commission of \$90.00.

M. Ishikawa and T. Honda deposited a deed in the Oakland Title Ins Co 15th and Franklin Streets, Oakland, with instructions to record same when they had a note and deed of trust for \$600.00 in favor of Honda. We deposited in escrow with the Oakland Title Ins Co the note and deed of trust with instructions to record when the property showed free and clear. Our search revealed a deed of trust of \$1,500.00 in favor of Ishikawa the reconveyance of which is now in the escrow and later the owner paid the delinquent City of Berkeley taxes.

The County taxes were not paid and the property is on the list to be sold for delinquent taxes, a part of them on the installment plan had been paid by Ishikawa. The property is now going to final sale for \$142.90 and all the property will be lost.

I have now collected all of the money on the vacant property sale amounting to \$900.00 with some interest, so there is no need to record the deed of trust in the Title company giving them the cash for that —— now I want them to use that money to pay off the taxes, and also \$300 for the release of a prior deed of trust held by Phillip Angell trustee that has to be paid off to render the property clear, we would have to deliver the vacant property as the money is for that purpose.

The net result would be that the house would be clear of encumberance and some money left over from the vacant property sale, which I think should be deposited in an account for T. Honda and it could be added to by the monthly payments on the McMillan contract of sale, can you help me to get that authorization for the Title company from Honda, or from S. Kido their attorney.

I would appreciate this very much as although agent for all parties concerned have no written authority to instruct the Title company to do that although I have delivered to them our listing and option of the property signed by both Honda and Ishikawa. The purchasers are both in possession and have made improvements on the property and it would be a considerable hardship if the purchasers who have fulfilled all their obligations as agreed upon and spent considerable money and time were the losers.

If there is any further information you may want please call on me. I have a search on the property. It is my impression that T. Honda and Ishikawa are parties in this transaction.

In an ordinary transaction were all the papers in our own office as is often the case, we would pay off anything necessary to deliver the property as per agreement.

Answering your letter dated June 22nd regarding the whereabouts of T. Honda, I have contacted Mr. Saburo Kido and gave him a copy of Mr. Must's letter to road. He stated he had never not Mr. Honda, but believed he was drafted and igned now in the Service. I saked him through what draft board, he eaid he thought it would be Cakland or San Francisco.

He advised contacting Mrs. M. Ishikawa at Tanforan who should be in a position to give you that information.

Mr. Kido offered to call us if he obtained from his San Francisco connections any further knowledge that would be of assistance in the matter.

I called his attention to the fact that application had been made for a tex sale of the property. He suggested court action to clear the title-probable cost, about \$150.00. He did not seem particularly interested in Honda even though he would less out entirely if the property was cold for taxes.

We enclose a copy of a letter received from Mr. Percy Nutt, president of Thomas Wheldon and Nutt, Inc., 2060 Allston Way, Berkeley, California, which came to us subsequent to a meeting at this office on Friday last, attended by Mr. Nutt and Mr. Joseph Tyler.

The enclosed letter copy gives a general picture of the present complications which, however, for your guidance, can be summarized substantially as follows:

- l. There is apparently \$1,065.00 held by Mr. Mutt immediately available to pay \$142.00 of delinquent taxes; \$300.00 in settlement of a \$1,060.00 deed of trust which Mr. Angell, trustee, will release for the sum of \$300.00; \$300.00 to pay real estate commissions accruing to the above firm and its salesmen; with a balance remaining to pay to the legal owner of the property, T. Honda, together with further payments that will accrue over a period of years under the McMillan contract.
- 2. It is probable that T. Honda is not the real owner; possibly acting as a dummy for M. Ishikawa. Inasmuch as Ishikawa was picked up by the F. B. I. May 13, 1942 and is now in Bismarck, North Dakota, it is quite likely that Honda, who voluntarily evacuated prior to March 29, 1942 is afraid to make his present whereabouts known to any one except his attorney, Mr. Saburo Kido, to whom we will refer at a later point in this letter.
- 3. The \$142.00 Alameda County delinquent taxes previously mentioned above, represent delinquencies for a sufficient period of years to permit the property to be immediately advertised for sale, and if sold, any equity that Honda might have would of course, be automatically extinguished.

We have ascertained from Mr. Edwin T. Planer, Alameda County Tax Collector, that an application has been made to have such tax sale held and an early date in July had been contemplated for this action. We are now advised, after discussing the subject with Deputy Biddle, that no sale will be held for delinquent taxes until after a conference with us.

4. The action needed at the present time, and that is why it is so important to contact Honda, is to have Mr. Nutt's firm authorized to disburse the sums in the manner set forth above, totalling approximately \$742.00, and pay over the surplus on hand, together with subsequent payments, to Mr. Honda.

Inasmuch as we are charged with the responsibility of giving effective aid to Japanese in the settlement of their property problems, it will be readily apparent that Honda will suffer material damage if we do not make every possible effort to reach him and advise of the present serious status of his property.

Apparently the only possible person who might know of Mr. Honda's whereabouts, or could promptly contact him through others, would be Mr. Saburo Kido, a Japaness attorney with whom you are acquainted. It would be greatly appreciated if you would promptly contact Mr. Kido and learn from him Mr. Honda's present address. If he is unable or unwilling to give us his address, would you learn from him if he has any suggestions that would be effective in aiding us in reaching said evacuee.

We can see no objection to your showing Mr. Kido the enclosed copy of Mr. Nutt's letter to us, although it is our understanding that Mr. Kido is quite conversant with the details of the present transaction.

It will not be possible to indefinitely extend the date of the sale of this property for delinquent taxes, particularly as application has already been made for such sale, and we hope you will emphasize that fact to Mr. Kido in endeavoring to secure Mr. Honda's address for us, or Mr. Kido's suggestions as to the most effective action he would recommend to us.

Referring to the storage of goods for Hoshiaki Chas. Yasutake, said goods are now stored at our warehouse at 1595 Van Ness Avenue, San Francisco. Charges for wrapping and preparing furniture, as per agreement, will be forwarded directly by the City Transfer and Storage Company of San Francisco.

Enclosed are four copies of WCCA Form FRB-2, Personal Property Forms, which you will, at your earliest convenience, have signed by Mr. Yasutake. Of these documents, the original and copies 1 and 2 should be immediately returned to this office. Copy number 3 can be retained by the signer as his receipt.

To further complete the transaction it will be necessary, when the Yasutake family is evacuated, to obtain from them their assigned family number and the same forwarded to us without fail. For your information, the entire program of storage and forwarding is directly associated with a key family number and therefore the fact that we obtain same is emphasized.

There have been a few exceptions noted when the goods belonging to the Yasutakes were picked up in Miss Helen Long's residence at 1553 a Webster Street, San Francisco. This was possibly due to the fact that private arrangements had been made to ship some of the items directly to Visalia. However, generally speaking, the larger pieces were found to correspond to the submitted list and a few small articles, while not actually accounted for, were evidently contained in some of the already filled cartons. Attached to Mr. Yasutake's copy of NCCA Form FRB-2 is a copy of the list submitted by him and thereon the exceptions have been noted.

We trust that this will terminate the matter satisfactorily.

Referring to your report of June 5 perteining to various household goods and effects belonging to Hoshiaki Chas. Yasutake now stored with Helen Wong, 1953A Webster Street, San Francisco, and in addition one radio stored with George Clark, 2005 Buchanan Street, San Francisco, said goods have today been surveyed for probable storage at our warehouse in San Francisco.

It was impossible to definitely determine what the various cases contained but in all instances the heavier individual pieces of furniture seemed to agree with the inventory list enclosed with your report.

If these goods are to be accepted by us for storage, it is apparent that a certain amount of wrapping and packing will be required before they will be suitable for our type of storage. It is estimated that the simplest type of packing will amount to approximately \$15.00 and should a first class job of crating be desired, the charges will amount approximately to \$65.00. This expenditure will naturally have to be met by Mr. Yasutake and, therefore, it will be necessary for you to obtain his permission and. sanction to proceed with either of the plans above mentioned.

Miss Helen Wong, who now has custody of all of the said furniture, with the exception of the radio, is willing to cooperate but expresses her desire that Mrs. Yasutake at her earliest convenience return to her, express charges collect, one portable sewing machine of which Miss Wong claims to be the legal owner. Miss Wong also claims she will forward, express charges collect, to Mrs. Yasutake one bundle of covers and blankets, as per Mrs. Yasutake's recent request.

For your own information, a question arises as to the exact status of the Yasutake family. Generally speaking, they are as yet not to be classified directly as evacuees. It has not been the policy of this department to accept any property for storage other than that of evacuees but due to

In the year 1925, I believe, I put lot 1, Block 27, City of Visalia in my daughter's name, she being of age and had no property or indebtedness, was the reason for putting in her name rather than my own.

The law firm of Power and McFadzean drew up a lease from my daughter, weraldine Cross, to I. Aoki, she paying internal revenue on the amount of value of the lot. The lease was to run 45 years. Aoki had the right to build a building on the lot which he did. Aoki agreed to keep all improvements in repair, carry fire insurance - Public liability - plate glass insurance and pay all City and County taxes.

About five years ago Aoki went to Japan leaving power of attorney with a brother-in-law, S. Iwai, who went to Japan about Apr. 1, 1941. Iwai left authority to collect rents with us.

Aoki built a building which sost around \$30,000. on the lot. The building was vacant with exception of a small portion soon after Iwai left.

Building is located in Oriental section. Some Japanese evacuees from San Francisco applied to writer for use of property to live in (upper story has two large living apartments) and store merchandise in store room and basement. All the property is rented to bring \$245.00 a menth, beginning April 1st. First installment of County taxes were paid by us out of funds on hand - leaving \$548.67, including \$12.72 penalty on City of Visalia first installment, due for 1941-1942 taxes. All will be delinquent on Apr. 20.

A chinese laundry man has occupied a room being a portion of one story portion at a rental of \$30.00 per month since building was first erected. His portion of building and adjoining room is settling so badly that it is not in shape to use further. The Chinese refuses to pay further rent.

I have consulted the W.C.C.A. office at Visalia but was not able to obtain the proper advise.

The fact that I'm alone and do not live with or have any business connections with any enemy aliens, I feel that I'm entitled to some consideration, if it isn't but to be told as to my probable status in this whole matter.

We have also received a notice from the bank notifying us of your payment to us of the sum of \$1,834.13. In considering your letter, we have found that you are mis-representing yourself. The agreement we had made with you was for paying of any bills incurred by us before the date of transfer to you. There never was any agreement providing for payment to your Palos Verdes Farms Associated in regard to breakage or loss of equipments after the transfer to your firm. All items on the sales inventory as inspected and accepted by your representative, Mr. Oswalt and Mr. Holberg.

We wish to make the following explanation in regard to the items listed in your letter:

- 1. The model "22" catapillar tractor (Ashimoto) was in good condition and in working order at the time of our transfer to you. We have used the tractor for a full week under Mr. Oswalt's instructions in preparation of planting fields prior to our departure without trouble. In all probability, the tractor was damaged by inexperienced careless driver to which we can not be responsible.
- 2. In regard to the storage bill with the American Warehouse Co. for the sum of \$23.48, we wish to see the statement.
- 3. The 12 acres of land which you are referring to us was not included in our deal. Excluding this 12 acres, you have 450 acres of land less army territory and other acreage which the Palos Verdes Homes Association agreed to deduct. It is the mistake of your foreman for plewing or discing into someone else's property. Consequently, we cannot be liable for such a loss.
- 4. In regard to the water used by my associates and myself, we have paid all of the closing bills to the end of the month of March with our check on April 9. If you had paid the water bill incurred by us, we wish to see the bills.
- 5. The hay which was left to you was in perfect condition at the time of the transfer to you. The hay was covered with canvas to protect from rain damage during our presence until the time of our departure. We cannot assume no responsibility that had been caused by your carelessness. It is up to your foreman to see to it that the hay is protected from the rain storms.

- 6. The tools given to you with the model "22" catapillar and model "15" catapillar are the tools which was received when we purchased the tractors. Your representives had inspected and accepted the tractor and its accessories with approval.
- 7. The hose was examined by your party at the time the inventory was checked. Those hose was used by us without difficulty for sprinkling. The trouble is due to the inefficiency and non-experience of your employees to hendle the high water pressure. We have in the past experienced the same conditions where we have blown up even new hoses due to our inexperienced workers.
- 8. The small cabco crates were there to the correct count as per inventory. Therefore, we should not be deducted for the false deficiency.
- 9. My associates have checked with your party the cound of the hand duster. Therefore the 15 dusters as per inventory were positively there.
- 10. The hoes were inspected and accepted by your representatives at the quoted price.
- 11. My associates have checked the cound of the spade as per inventory with your representative. Therefore, the quantity of the spade was positively there.
- 12. The cound on the shovels was also checked with your representatives. the count was positively there.
- 13. The count on the hayforks was also checked together with our party and your representatives. The count of 15 was there, and furthermore there were several forks, aside of the inventory, left in the various barns.
- 14. We do not understand your item 14. The spring harrow which we sold with the catapillar tractor model "15" was listed in the inventory at \$10.00. The spring harrow was on the loading platform with the chisel that goes with the model "15" tractor. The spring harrow was on the platform on the day we left; and furthermore, where did you find the value of \$75.00 for the spring harrow equipped with the catapillar "15". We originally quoted you a total price of \$960.00 for the model "15" and its equipment complete, but on the closing deal we favored you by agreeing with a reduction of \$150.00 on the tractor or in another words a value of \$810.00.
- 15. Mr. Holberg and my associates have checked the quantity and weight of the quantity seeds. The quantity was transferred to you as per inventory.

16. In reference to the final sales inventory, we agreed to deliver to you only 2600 of quick coupling pipes at 7¢ per foot, and not 6¢ as you stated in your letter. We had charged you for 2600 of 7¢.

We have given you our version of the foregoing items. Your representatives, Mr. Oswalt and Mr. Holberg had inspected, checked and accepted all items of the inventory with satisfaction. To our estimation, we believe that many of the articles have been stolen by the Mexicans after we left. It is up to the foreman to keep the eye on the equipments.

We therefore cannot accept your deductions of loss and repairs sustained after our departure. We are entitled to the full payment of \$2,621.86 as per the sales contract. The warehouse and water bills will be considered after our inspection of the bills.

It was further agreed with Mr. Oswalt that all remaining farm equipments, aside of the inventory, which was left on the premise to be sold and the amount of the sale to be forwarded to us. We are expecting to receive some of the amount on the sales of the implements.

After this preparation, Palos Verdes Ferms Association purchased tomato plants for use on this 12 core plot. We were then informed by Mr. Mc Carrell that this 12 acre plot was not within your lease and that you had no right or interest therein whatever. Mr. Mc Carrell further informed us that this plot had been leased by him. As a consequence, we were unable to plant the land and lost our entire investment thereon.
