THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this day of May, 1942, by and between A. V. CHARGIN, the party of the first part, and the undersigned, owners of buildings and improvements situated upon grounds held by the undersigned under ground leases, or the owners of real property in Walnut Grove Japanese Town, and the Japanese section of Walnut Grove lying southeast of the railroad right of way, parties of the second part,

W I T N E S S E T H:

WHEREAS, the parties of the second part are members of the Japanese race and it is contemplated that they will be evacuated pursuant to orders of the United States Army shortly after the date of this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the parties of the second part desire severally to appoint and employ the party of the first part as their attorney in fact and agent for the purpose of managing and supervising their said properties during the period of their respective evacuations, and to that end each of the parties of the second part hereto has executed and delivered to the party of the first part his power of attorney; and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto desire to define and limit the duties, powers and responsibilities of the party of the first part in the management and supervision and operation of the properties of the respective parties of the second part,-

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED BETWEEN THE PARTIES HERETO AS FOLLOWS, TO-WIT:

1. That the parties of the second part do hereby severally and each for himself appoint and employ the party of the first part as their agent for the purpose of generally managing and supervising their respective properties, and, further, to do all matters and things hereinafter specifically provided.

2. The party of the first part hereby agrees to use his best efforts to obtain and procure tenants for all of the evacuated properties of the parties of the second part at such rentals and for such terms and upon such other terms, conditions and covenants as the party of the first part in his sole discretion may deem proper under circumstances that may be existing; that it is understood that difficulty may be anticipated in procuring tenants for all or any substantial part of the premises of the parties of the second part, and in the event that tenants cannot be so procured, then and in that event the party of the first part shall supervise and safe-guard said properties to the best of his ability, to the end that said properties shall be preserved for the period of the owners' absence during said evacuation.

3. That said party of the first part is hereby authorized and directed, as such attorney in fact, to draw upon any and all bank accounts of the parties of the second part for the purpose of paying all county taxes, water charges or any other charge or item of expense necessary and proper for the preservation, up-keep and protection of said respective properties, and to cause such taxes, water charges and other such costs and expenses to be paid.

4. That the party of the first part agrees to supervise and cause to be made all minor repairs upon said properties that he in his discretion may deem proper and that minor repairs for the purpose of this agreement shall be construed to mean all repairs that cost Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or less, and that all major repairs, that is all repairs costing in excess of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) will be supervised or caused to be made by the party of the first part only upon the written instructions of the respective parties of the second part.

5. The party of the first part further agrees to do other matters and things in connection with said properties which are in his opinion workable and practicable under existing circumstances as may be directed in writing by the parties of the second part, that is, represent the parties of the second part in the sale or properties, hypothecation of properties, et cetera.

6. That all moneys required for the payment of taxes, water charges or other matters and things hereinbefore provided for, shall be procured from bank accounts now standing in the name of such party of the second part for or against whom such expense is incurred, or from moneys otherwise made available or which may hereafter be made available for such purpose by such party of the second part; that under no circumstances is the party of the first part obligated to advance or procure moneys to defray such cost and expense; that in the event no bank account or other funds are available or made available by such party of the second part to defray any cost or expense necessary to be incurred, then and in that event, the party of the first part may borrow on behalf of or in the name of such party of the second part such money, secured by hypothecation of the property of such party of the second part, all in his discretion. It is particularly understood and agreed that the party of the first part assumes no responsibility or obligation to such party of the second part by reason of matters and things left unpaid or undone by reason of the lack of funds of such party of the second part unavailable at such time, or through the failure of the party of the first part to communicate with or notify such

party of the second part of the accrual of such obligations and the lack of funds available to defray the same.

7. It is further understood and agreed that the party of the first part, in the performance of this agency, shall use his best judgment and opinion and that the said party of the first part shall not be liable or responsible to the parties of the second part, or any of them, for any act, transaction, matter or thing done or undertaken by him, or which he may fail to do or undertake, and which the parties of the second part, or any of them, may deem improper, impracticable, negligent, bad judgment or abuse of discretion; in other words, the parties of the second part are to be bound by and accept without recourse all acts, transaction, matters and things either done or not done by the party of the first part hereunder or under the general powers of attorney hereinabove referred to.

8. That as and for compensation for the services rendered by the party of the first part to the properties hereunder or under such general powers of attorney, the respective parties of the second part hereby agree to pay to the party of the first part ten per cent (10%) of all rentals or any other moneys collected for and on behalf of the parties of the second part during the term of this agreement, and in the event that no rentals or other moneys are collected by the party of the first part for or on account of the parties of the second part hereunder as to any of such properties (or in the event such properties do not produce any income or revenue) then and in that event said party of the first part shall be paid a sum equivalent to ten per cent (10%) of the amount of taxes,

water charges, repairs or other items paid out by the party of the first part necessary and proper for the holding and preservation of such properties.

9. It is further understood and agreed that the party of the first part shall not be in any manner responsible or accountable for any personal property which may be left or stored in or about any of the buildings and improvements or upon the real property of any of the parties of the second part. In the event any such personal property is so left upon said premises or properties the same shall be left at the sole risk of the parties of the second part so leaving them.

10. That the parties of the second part shall at all times save the party of the first part free and harmless from each and every claim and demand of whatever nature made or to be made by or on behalf of any person or persons for any act or omission on the part of any renter or any person or persons acting on such renter's behalf or under his employ or direction or from any other person by reason of any transaction or act or matter or thing done by the party of the first part in the performance of this agreement or while acting as agent of the parties of the second part, and from all loss and damage of every nature and description by reason of any such act or omission or any such transaction or act or other matters or things done and taken hereunder.

11. That in the event the party of the first part enters the service of the United States or leaves and removes from the Town of Walnut Grove or its immediate vicinity, or becomes for any other reason unable to perform his duties as such agent or attorney in fact, then, and upon any of such events, this agency agreement may be terminated without notice to the parties of the second part, or any of them.

12. The term of this agreement shall be for the period of the existence of the evacuation orders under which the respective parties are compelled to evacuate from their present abodes or place of business, and for such additional time thereafter as would permit the parties of the second part to return to the Town Walnut Grove, provided, of course, that this agreement and the general powers of attorney are not terminated sooner, as hereinabove provided.

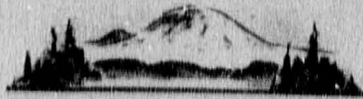

Dear Mr. McFarland,

It is hard to believe that only a few days ago, we were busy in Florin awaiting that significant "E" day. And that like a whirlwind, since the order - everything happened & we are now here in a camp.

I did not have the opportunity to thank you for the many kind advice and help you gave us while you worked during the two months & finally the last two weeks we were in Florin. But I shall never forget how fortunate we all were to have the understanding & friendship of such fine men as you & Mr. Reid. And I am certain the people of Florin want to express their appreciation to you & the Federal Reserve Bank for the splendid help they were given during the weeks of planning for evacuation.

The last few days were hectic and the parting very sad. We were so separated from our friends & even a few of our relatives. But now we are getting used to all this. The group that left from Elk Grove nursed a great deal of bitter disappointment because many who had signed up for Fresno were hurriedly ordered to Manzanar within one or two hours' notice. It broke friends apart--but it even tore family groups. That affected the people so much that they started to blame people & naturally our J.A.C.L. got a good share of the blame. For a few days - such a rumor stunned me to the core. I would have rather been separated from my family group & gone on to Manzanar than to be thus accused of something I had nothing to do. All I did was tried to keep my family group united. Since many were unable to do that, they thought we were especially blessed that all of us were sent to one camp. People in face of great events are capable of "great deal of harmful thinking. I've learned a lesson too. Those who work for an organization or a group -- cannot dare try to do something for his own family without arousing jealousy & suspicion.

I've been too tired & shocked to do anything but rest since coming here. But it is a nice camp. It is hot during the day. But very cool mornings & evenings.

Our apartment is very roomy. The six in our family - my husband, daughter, Morielle, my mother, father & sister-in-law find it very roomy and nice. The cots are comfortable and the large windows provide plenty of fresh air and breeze.

It took us quite a few days until we were able to really settle down. Shelves, closets, and drapes had to be arranged & made. But it is quite cosy & nice now. Our apartment is near the mess hall - and very convenient to the shower room and toilet. A new hospital will open next to our barracks - soon.

We are all pleased with the splendid cooperation of the people in the camp - and the officials in charge are wonderful. The accommodation is far more than we had expected. There are no trees in the camp - but we can get used to all this. Many have stated they wouldn't mind staying here for the duration, if we can be given work to do. There are over 5000 of us here & voluntary chore work & duties to keep up the community are all filled so for most of us there won't be much to do.

I received my second typhoid injection yesterday. As soon as I feel all right, I would like to teach summer school. I haven't been able as yet to get acquainted with everyone and haven't tried to get a job. I know I'm going to teach Sunday School & probably have a choir group.

They have a paper called the "Fresno Grapevine" - a wonderful Bulletin - with a staff and everything, so I guess they won't need our mimeographing machine or our amateurish help.

I have badly neglected some of my duties. I'm terribly sorry that I do not have the receipts for the sacks of rice. I had left it with the rice in the kitchen. We made three copies. One for the owner, one for the JACL & the other for the F.R.B. I wonder if I could have our copies of the receipts? I hope they aren't lost.

I am sending the signed consignment agreement. Thank you for your trouble.

I heard over the radio yesterday that evacuation of the coast has been completed. Praise goes to all of you who worked long hours - unselfishly to carry out the orders. I feel that you have done this great task magnificently. We are grateful. I hope that you will get a long rest after these weeks of hard work.

Closing with regrets that this letter can't be longer. I feel as though our "visit" must be cut short. But I shall write again.

Thank you for executing and returning the Consignment Agreement for the rice. I was sure you would need the copies of the receipts you gave for the rice and I enclose them.

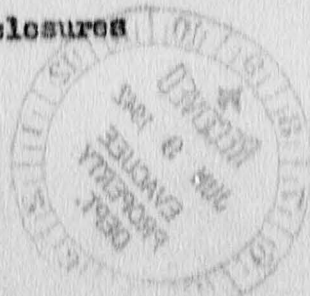
We have not had time to contact the Northwestern Mutual Fire Association regarding the policy on the Methodist Church property, but we will do so immediately.

Dear Mr. Reid,

The first time I met you was that day the WCCA office opened at Sacramento. I was among the few called in to meet the officials and I remember how glad I was that day when I saw for the first time, since evacuation became evident, that the government was planning to help us evacuate with the least amount of loss & hardship. I have been more & more grateful since then ---. And have marvelled at the miracle the W.C.C.A. performed. Memories of our association are very dear & pleasant. The Japanese in the Sacramento Valley are indebted to you and the Federal Reserve Bank for the million of kindness & help extended--without which, we could not possibly have evacuated with so much peace in our minds.

Fortunately, many persons connected with the language schools of which you seek information, are in this camp. I will visit them to find out what arrangements they made. I will send this information as soon as possible.

It took us several days before we felt that our room was in order. The apartment has 5 windows. It is clean and quite cozy. The weather has been warm but rather cool in the mornings & evenings for which we are grateful. The food is grand & plentiful. Our apartment is right near the Mess Hall. We can watch from the window to see how long the line is & go when there aren't so many waiting. Children get half-pint of milk for their meals. We are lucky that we can get fresh vegetables too.

The sanitary condition in the camp is good. The camp is organized well. Each section is an organized unit with representatives at the Council. Chores are allotted to every one. Many are working as errand boys, mail men, as waiters. We are opening a summer school this week. As soon as I get rested I'm going to teach something. I haven't decided yet what it shall be. I would like to teach piano - or singing. Or English. Much depends on the demand of teachers of certain courses.

I took my daughter to her first kindergarten class. That is a large group. I think it is wonderful that this camp has the leaders & active workers that make this summer school possible. Religious meetings are numerous and gets a great deal of support. I think that more than anything else, there is definitely a need for faith & God. It helps us to keep busy too doing church and Sunday School work.

Tomorrow night, they are holding "talent night" sponsored by the H section. Different sections are competing for honors - of good behavior - activities, athletics, etc. They are organizing baseball teams too in every section. (10 sections in all).

Yesterday all of us from Florin received our typhoid shots. It takes us several days before we feel all right again.

The rest of the family had their treatment completed in Florin. I still have another one to take next Monday again. The hospitals are busy now with mumps, measles & whooping cough. There are three hospitals in this camp of over 5000. There are two medical doctors and they certainly are kept busy.

The "Fresno Grapevine" is a splendid weekly of this camp. It has four pages & a lot of art work. It is put out by a capable staff of experienced people. Other news is spread through notices posted at Bulletin Boards at every mess hall.



We hope that if we must be moved that we can go to a camp as nice as this one. I'd like to go to a place where we can really work. I hope all of those in Florin can be united. The separation of friends and even families was a blow. I don't think we'd even want to go through it again. But there is fear ahead as the Army might move us again in a similar way.

Mr. Reid, please accept my sincerest gratitude for everything that you did for our people in Florin. We will never be able to thank you enough. I count it my great fortune that I had the privilege to work with you. And as long as I live I shall never regret having known you. I know that it was a significant day when the Army appointed men - splendid, understanding men such as you to work in the WCCA office for all of us.

Thank you again & again. Please remember me to Mrs. Reid.

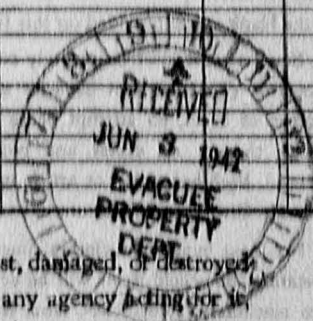

Dear Mr. President, we realize that this stupendous task was undertaken only because there lay in the hearts of far-seeing eyes, deep concern over the welfare of our people. Never did we dream that the government would attempt such a great responsibility with so much at stake in this emergency. We are grateful, but disappointed that we must burden the government at this time instead of joining our strength to help win the war. We are thankful for the fine Americans who are handling this huge program to evacuate thousands from the Western Coast. Ever since the beginning of our preparation for evacuation, we have felt the kindly hands of the army. We have known the sincerity with which the W.C.C.A. worked to help our people. The wonderful understanding that guided the personnel of the W. C. C. A. won the complete trust and faith of the thousands of bewildered, frightened Japanese.

Today hundreds already evacuated, write from Assembly Centers. They are wonderful, appreciative letters. A magnificent job of handling this evacuation is evident. We are deeply grateful.

We know that this has happened to us, only because we are in America; because the United States cannot permit undue suffering and bloodshed. We, who are Americans to the core, but in appearance betray our oriental ancestry, feel ashamed that the people of our own race are greatly responsible for the present conflict. Had we the miraculous power to influence world events, we would never have permitted this to come to our precious shore. We know that the root of all this suffering and tremendous sacrifice is war. As long as we have breath to breathe, we shall strive to eliminate such evil from the face of this earth. The entire country has responded admirably to the call to arms. We are proud of the spirit and courage that burns in the heart of every American.

EDITORIAL

As each new day brings new orders for some communities to evacuate, there comes to our minds, the realization that soon we will find ourselves in the midst of an order. Fortunately, the busy strawberry season has helped us keep our heads. We had work to do, and each new day meant the reaping of profits that all the hard work of months and months past was to bring. We could not afford to remain idle, or in a panic, throw our hands up in despair. Thanks to the calmness and dignity that a farmer cultivates in the years and years of partnership with nature and with God, he has been spared a great deal more than perhaps those who were employed in the city, or those who had idle hours to worry and fret over the coming evacuation. Even now as the evacuation day approaches, we find busy workers picking ripe red berries for strawberry short cakes to be enjoyed in hundreds of American homes. Quietly they are packing away their precious possessions they have accumulated in the 20 to 50 years they have been in this beautiful community. In a business-like manner, their ranch and their properties are being put to order and turned over to trust-worthy hands. Mothers are busily sewing and packing clothing for their families. At night, after a hard day out in the strawberry patches or in the green grape vineyards, the entire family is busy creating necessities, and packing suit cases and trunks.

We have come thus far with calm dignity--and when the order reaches us, we will continue to work in our patches as long as we can. For as the height of the season approaches, even a half a day's work will mean so much to all of us. When the order comes, the Control Center will be set up. Then only one responsible person of each family (the American way of classifying families) need come to register. Then he will have two days to tag his possessions and to make arrangements to store them. Let us plan exactly what we would do that final few days--and remember to take care of every detail that would be detrimental should we forget to tend to them.

This evacuation is an experience we can not avoid. If we must evacuate, let us do everything possible to make it pleasant and orderly. If we must face this, let us do so with a brave smile that will always be a credit to ourselves and our friends.

I was amazed when I visited Miss Thayer last Friday at the auditorium and saw the hundreds of Sacramento Japanese evacuate. Everything was perfectly timed and well organized. It seemed rather out of place to see so much order--quiet dignity as I walked with Miss Thayer through the crowd and saw little children running around in joy at the prospect of new adventure.

There is nothing to fear or dread. We are in good hands, the Army of the U. S. Let us, with high hope, prepare ourselves for this new adventure and with courage meet this Evacuation.

We have been anxious for news from the assembly camps and have been reading the papers eagerly for suggestions and hints on what we might take--and whatever might expect at these centers.

Since last week, many from our community have gone into Wadega and Marysville. The words we have received from them are quite reassuring and cheerful. They enjoy this new place and are greatly surprised at the food and comfort provided them. This is good news.

Dr. Ito sends his regards to the people of Florin.

James Fukuhara wrote a nice long letter to our office--and says he enjoys the food and fun and is working hard. He reminds those who have portable phonographs to bring phonograph needles. (everyone seem to have forgotten.

Roy Miura wrote and was surprised that the camp was 100% better than he had expected. Mrs. Miura is enjoying the leisure of no more cooking and washing dishes! (girls please note).

The JACL will send a few copies of this Bulletin to these camps so they will know how we are getting along in Florin.

HUMANE SOCIETY FOR YOUR PETS

Out of the interest and love of pet animals, Mr. and Mrs. Martenstein are devoting their life to the work of protecting and finding new homes for them.

Sacramento is undertaking a tremendous job as thousands of Japanese are leaving their pets behind them. Most everyone has a dog or two and a few cats on their farm. When there are more than 450 families, we can imagine what our community alone would be asking of the Humane Society. But, kindly, Mr. Martenstein has assured us that somehow, he will and must take care of their pets.

Mr. Martenstein was good enough to come to Florin this week just to discuss this problem carefully.

We have decided that it would be kindest and safest to let everyone keep their pets and watch dogs, as long as possible. Although it would mean a great deal of work for Mr. Martenstein, he has consented to come down to Florin to get the pets--probably a day or two before we actually leave Florin. We will designate a large shed, where the dogs can be tied. Because there will be millions of things that must be done in the last few days, he suggests we tie the dogs up, and leave them there. Someone will be there to watch them. We must leave a tag on the dogs, stating clearly--his name, age, whether he is accustomed to children, whether he is a house dog, whether he is a watch-dog or just a pet, whether he bites, and whether he was usually tied or not.

All this information will help Mr. Martenstein more easily to find the right new master for the pets. The JACL will arrange to have a large truck to be used to help move the hundreds of pets in one day. Our cats can be brought in a sack and left with the dogs at the shed.

Mr. and Mrs. Martenstein will feed the dogs, and give it care, and make every effort to give these pets to people, who will provide good homes for them. And all of this is being done from the charitable heart of these two fine people, out of their own expense. They are not asking for any fee for the handling of these pets, but we can all understand what a tremendous service they are rendering us, and perhaps for those who can afford it, even little donation would be quite in order to compensate in a small way, their kindness for our pets.

Those who are intending to ask the Humane Society's care for their pets, please register with the JACL, so that we will know approximately how many pets we must expect on that busy day.

OUR SOLDIER BOYS

For a long time, we have been thinking of our boys in the United States Army. They must be terribly concerned about home. Never have they heard of such a mass evacuation. Articles in the papers, and news over the radio are so brief and so often erroneous that they must be quite worried about their farms and their folks.

Bulletins will be sent to each camp so that somehow they may be informed with some of the details, we may have omitted in our letters. The JACL is writing a letter to every soldier that we know of from our JACL community. We have a few of the addresses, but we would like to request those who have brothers and sons in the army, to please give our office their latest addresses this week. The letters and bulletins are ready to be mailed and will be sent out as soon as we learn their address. Please cooperate with us in doing this little bit for our boys. It isn't very much but it is better than no word of encouragement from home at this time. If we should move and lose track of our boys in the camp, the National JACL office at Salt Lake City will serve as a clearing house. Let us write to the National JACL, Beason Building, 25 East Second South Street, Salt Lake City, Utah.

Luckily for a few of our friends, visits home were possible, and after a few days of happy reunion, there was the inevitable sad parting--Bill Kashiwagi; Sid Yamaguchi, Kazu Yoshihata, Ted Miyata, David Kato, Shige Okimoto, and Sam Sugimoto have been the pride of our community.

INNOCULATION CERTIFICATES

There are still some people who haven't come for their diphtheria and vaccination certificates. Please call for yours, if you haven't done so, as yet.

HINTS TO EVACUEES

Time has made it possible for the people in Florin to learn a great deal about the assembly camps. As the Army send thousands to the assembly centers, new hints and suggestions have come to us that makes for more comfort for all of us.

Let us remember for the sake of the Army, who are handling our moving and for ourselves not to take too much baggage, so that as we move to different centers, we would not be over bundled with too many things. But we are happy to give out the following hints:

THE NECESSITIES:

- Plenty of bedding and linen (no mattress)
- Toilet articles
- Extra clothing
- Personal effects

A few days ago the army informed us that eating utensils will be provided. It must be quite a shock for those who scoured the stores in search of tin plates and cups. But let us take a few of these utensils. They will come in handy at times, when we would like to enjoy a midnight snack in our own rooms.

But for those who have been unsuccessful in purchasing these eating utensils, do not worry about them because these things will be provided at the camps.

Here is a list of things that are optional, that will mean a comfort and help to give a little atmosphere of home:

- Coffee percolator
- Mosquito net
- Small electric burner
- Bathrobes
- Small electric fans
- Portable radio
- Portable typewriter
- Portable musical instruments
- Shower caps and shoes (for women)
- Curtain material for windows and partitions
- Electric extension cords
- Plain wire
- Small washtubs and washboards
- Small buckets and wash basins
- Small rugs
- Folding card tables
- Small folding chairs
- Baby cribs (Unassembled)
- Mattress for baby crib
- Hammer, saw, nails
- Padlocks and padlock hasps
- Children's toilet bucket

Now that shopping cannot be done at Sacramento, the JACL contacted the Perkins Merchandise Store and Elk Grove Haynes Store in an effort to help those who still wish to buy a few necessary things.

Mrs. Perkins talked to the Army Outfitting Company and has discovered that the canvas duffle bags can be made, if we order them. The largest size 18x40 costs about \$2.50. There are about three other sizes, ranging from about \$1.65, \$1.85, \$1.95 to \$2.50. If we wish to order them, we can call Mrs. Perkins at her store immediately. It may take a few days to have these bags made. Ropes are hard to get, but heavy twines are available. Mrs. Perkins is trying to get canvasses for sale at her store. We have sent them a list of things that the evacuees would need, and they will try to keep these articles in stock to accommodate all of us.

There has been suggestions offered by the WCCA officials that a few shoppers might be found that might go into Sacramento, for those who can not get their things at Elk Grove and Perkins. We cannot give this as a definite plan yet, but we will endeavor to work this out for everyone.

BANK SERVICE

Now that Sacramento has evacuated from this day, May 16th, 12:00 A.M., no Japanese will be permitted within the city limits. We are in the midst of a very busy season, and because of the impending evacuation, the company are giving out statements weekly, and consequently, there will be more checks issued and must be cashed or deposited more frequently, more than any other year.

Last week through the Federal Reserve, contacts were made with the Bank of America and an attempt was made to secure the services of the Elk Grove Bank, but we were unsuccessful at that time. However, Mr. Reid would not take "no" for an answer. Mr. Reid and his members at the Federal Reserve Bank are more than ever anxious to make arrangements through other firms to provide a banking service for our now isolated community. They feel that it is only just that we be given this privilege, especially now that we are in midst of our season. If it is at all possible, they will not leave any stone unturned in an effort to help us in our predicament.

FARM SECURITY OFFICE

Since Monday May 11, the Farm Security office of Florin has made themselves quite at home in the YBA kitchen with a telephone installed by the sink. Mr. Jack Fairbain and Mr. Booth are busy meeting prospective tenants, and thanks to their untiring efforts, many farms are finally being taken care of. Miss Mary Burbank and Mrs. King make up the personnel at this busy office.

This service at Florin is deeply appreciated by the busy farmers. We know that we owe the Farm Security Administration for the splendid cooperation we have been receiving all along--and to have them moved into Florin was something we had not anticipated. We are certain that the entire community is being better served during this busy season, and because of Mr. Fairbain, Mr. Phelps and Mr. Booth, they would evacuate with a great deal of satisfaction and peace of mind.

FLASH !

Word has come from Mr. Donnelly, the coordinator of the Sacramento W.C.C.A. that a team office will be opened in Florin Monday, May 18th at the YBA Hall. They will be made up of the Federal Reserve Bank, Farm Security, and Social Security offices. Until the order comes, the offices will render help and advice to the people in our community and the rural districts of the Sacramento W.C.C.A. jurisdiction, that have not yet evacuated. Some one from Miss Thayer's office and Mr. Reid's Federal Reserve Bank will come to join the Farm Security and the JAC offices. We know that we can count ourselves quite fortunate that Mr. Donnelly has taken the trouble to move these valuable advisers into Florin now that Sacramento is closed to us.

LAST MINUTE MUSTS

The final "E" day that we all have been waiting with dread anticipation has rapidly become a near reality. We have been so busily occupied with packing, harvesting, settling the affairs of our ranches, and a thousand other things, that we may have overlooked a lot of things that at the last moment we may forget. Following are some of the things we should remember to do:

- (1) Turn off the electric switch.
- (2) Bar the windows.
- (3) Fill the water tanks.
- (4) Hoe weeds around the house.
- (5) Find homes for your pets.
- (6) Repair fences around your property and across entrance roadway.
- (7) Clean house of combustible articles.
- (8) Return gasoline and stove gas tanks.
- (9) Pay all bills--PGE, grocer's, gas bill, etc.



WORK OF THE NATIONAL JACL GOES ON

The National JACL office at Salt Lake City is busy working to help everyone in this crisis.

A survey of west coast evacuees resettling in the inter-mountain states is being conducted.

National Headquarter advises chapters to welcome evacuee JACL members into the chapter activity without payment of additional fees, if they have already paid all dues to their former chapter.

National officers lead by field secretary, Mike Masaoka, are devoting all their time, in attending conferences promoting goodwill and speaking in behalf of the Japanese American Citizens. They are planning to visit New York, Philadelphia, Washington to see government officials; and as we are about to face evacuation, we do so with a hope and prayer sent to our National JACL leaders, who will work night and day, to pave new paths of freedom and justice for the thousands of Japanese American and their parents. We are proud of our National Organization and our local chapter becomes significant only because we are a part of a great National Mother Organization. We are grateful and we send our best wishes and hope to our National JACL.

A new Pacific Citizen will be issued shortly from Salt Lake City. Because of this great evacuation, all of us will be more than anxious to know what the National JACL will do, and we will be more than ever concerned for the welfare of the Japanese Americans in this crisis. We must keep the Pacific Citizen alive and active to serve as our spokesman and to help win more friends for our cause. Let us subscribe for the Pacific Citizen. Probably it will be the only publication to continue during the war. The yearly subscription is only \$5.00 for JACL members and \$2.50 per year for non-members. Let us subscribe now at the Florin JACL office.

TO THOSE WHO WISH TO SELL

Federal Reserve Bank has reported changes in regards to the selling of goods after the evacuation order. We may still sell anything even until after the order is issued. If you wish to sell things, JACL may be able to help you find prospective buyers. There are requests for bicycles, trucks, or pick-ups, bed-room sets, and outboard motor. Please inform the JACL office.

VOTERS ATTENTION!

There was a mistaken article in the paper yesterday about absentee voters, but the JACL checked it up and according to the latest information from the County Clerk's office, all those who are registered voters will be able to vote through absentee ballot. To acquire absentee ballots, you must write to County Clerk not earlier than August 5th, and not later than 20th.

Those who have not as yet registered, it may be possible for you to register after you get to the Camp. However, everything is very indefinite, as yet.

VERIFICATION PAPERS

The JACL office has made a form to be used by those who storing, renting, or lending their furnitures to their Caucasian friends. This is for your protection as well as for your friends, because none of us can foresee what will come to pass in the years ahead of us. If you wish to have copies of these forms, please call for them at our office.

OUR NEW ADDRESS

When we evacuate to our camp, let us remember to get our new residence address cards, which will be available then, and notify our post-master and post-mistress of our new residence address. The Post Office will forward all first-class mails to us.

Those who have registered with the selective service draft board must notify your local board; also with your new address.

CONTRIBUTIONS

A quit Claim deed, was signed on May 11th and for the duration these buildings and property will be taken care of by the Methodist Board.

They have gladly sanctioned the JACL's plan to have the Federal Reserve Bank use the Japanese Hall as a warehouse.

Should the Federal Reserve bank feel it best to concentrate the storage into Sacramento, the Methodist Board, will take over the responsibility of watching the building after the hall is vacant.

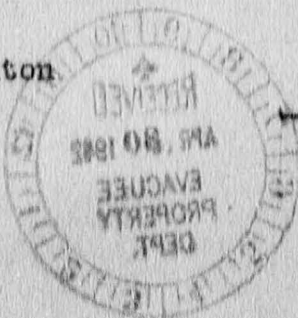

It appears now that our evacuation problem is getting very acute and the order might come almost any day. However, we still have hope that we might yet have a few weeks. Sacramento has received its order to leave, and they are now in the midst of evacuation. Just when will our orders come, nobody knows, except the Army. However, let's be calm and maintain normal existence. Whenever the order should come, let's face it with a smile and feel that it is our duty to evacuate, for the best interest of this government and for the interest of national security. It is a big blow to all of us to leave our homes and the district in which we have lived, accustomed, loved, and cherished for nearly 45 years. Let us leave without thought of bitterness but let's not forget to fill our hearts with hope of returning here in the future when this turmoil is over. That will be the desire of each one of us. Our properties will be well protected and safeguarded by the Federal Reserve Bank for the duration. We will be safely protected in every way.

When the orders should come and the actual evacuation starts, let's hope that we be moved into one center--however, in the event that this should fail, we the members of the editorial staff of our JACL bulletin unites in wishing each and every one of you good health, happiness, and luck. This may not be our last issue--we might continue for many weeks, depending on how soon our order may be issued, but we feel that it is our duty now to express our appreciations to all of you for the cooperation given us since the start of issuance of our bulletin.

We are leaving behind us many American friends who are deeply concerned over our departure and are hoping for the brighter side of life after this terrible maelstrom of world's struggle is over. Even though we be placed in a camp, let us not forget them--let's write to them often and tell them about our new life in the camp. After the war is over, many of us will be returning here again to re-establish our homes. And in that event, we must have someone to welcome us home again. So, in a sense of sincerity and good-will among us who lived and who will live here for many years to come, let us once again remind you to continue friendship by writing to our American friends after we are evacuated. Don't forget the motto, "A Friend in need is a friend indeed".

SACRAMENTO IS EVACUATING

Our closest neighbor, Sacramento, has been ordered to evacuate: Thursday, May 7th, the order was proclaimed. By the 16th of May, all of Sacramento will be evacuated.

This means then--the area in Sacramento is frozen. No Japanese can leave or come into this area. There will be absolutely no shopping permits issued during this time to those in our jurisdiction. If there would be any emergency, the provost-marshal will be the only one that has the authority to give permits.

NO MORE SHOPPING NOW!

Miss Thayer has said that if there are any shopping to be done, it will be taken care of after Florin is ordered for evacuation.

THOSE WHO WISH LUMBER MUST WAIT NOW!

If you wish to get lumber, have everything ready to be packed, and you will be given more opportunities to aid for lumber.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Treasurer, Sam Tsukamoto reports for the month of April: \$244.98.... cash on hand, not including the frozen account at Sumitomo Bank.

FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

PERMITS

For those who are connected with the Strawberry Produce Company, who must take their produce to distribution points, will be the only ones that can go within the frozen area of Sacramento now. From the 15th of May, absolutely no Japanese will be allowed in the city.

FARMERS HURRY

Everyone who has privately arranged to lease or sell his farms, please report to Mr. Fairbairn or to the JACL office immediately.

All those who cannot possibly find anyone to take over, please report, also.

WCCA still is open for service to the Japanese this week, if there are problems that must be cleared in preparation to evacuation, but absolutely no permits for doctors, shopping, or other things will be issued.

CAR STORAGE

Two days before we evacuate, those who have signed up for car storage at the Perkins Warehouse, must bring their cars. They must bring their own blocks, etc., to jack up their car, and take proper care before storing them. There will be a mechanic hired by the Nash Don Camp Co. to assist.

Those who want to insure their cars for fire and theft, must do so now, before it is too late. Don't leave these things till the last day. We won't be able to take care of everything then.

If you can't sell your car and you must store them, sign up immediately, while there is yet space.

MISS PATRICIA THAYER

The one person who has from the start been caring for all of our comfort, health, welfare, and transportation, is Miss Thayer. She wishes to thank the people of Florin for our willingness to cooperate, and has enjoyed working with us. She wants to remind us again to plan carefully and wisely for our evacuation--to take all the necessary things, but to try our best to limit our baggage to the minimum. She wishes us to be calm and keep our chin up and continue working to get our crops harvested.

LET'S KEEP OUR PATIENCE

Mr. Reid of the Federal Reserve Bank advises us to keep our patience as the "E" day approaches. Let us help to quench false rumors and do our share to keep up our morale. Cooperation from everyone will mean a great deal in the face of a new experience such as this. It will be trying but we can prove our metal. Let us show courage, our strength, and endurance, and do everything to keep up our operations.

HUMAN SOCIETY

As we had reported in the bulletin two weeks ago, Mr. and Mrs. Martenstein of the Humane Society of Sacramento will take our pets and see that new masters are found for them, if that is what we wish. To save our trips for Mr. Martenstein, we would like to have everyone interested in taking advantage of this kind offer, to come to the office with the description of their dog and register. Then we will send for Mr. Martenstein to come out a certain day to Florin for our pets.

There was a person who had a precious dog, and his dog is staying at the Humane Society of Sacramento for the duration to be claimed by him when he returns. The only charges will be for the food which will be about \$3.50 per month. They will be kept well and healthy.

If you are interested, take care of this immediately. This office will have too many other things to take care of when the order comes.

Agreement papers will be made at this office. If anyone needs help and advice, come now and take advantage of this help.

DEADLINE FOR SALES!

All those who are interested in selling their things must do so before the order for evacuation is issued. It would be too late to sell anything after the order.

If you wish to sell your bicycles, there are many who are anxious to buy bicycles.

Mrs. Haight is interested in a rug 9x12 or 12x16.

Mrs. Vivian Kara is interested in a desk model typewriter. Please report to our office immediately.

Mr. A. Riison--phone 5-7221--a floor lamp, and a good rug.

LET'S REMEMBER

If you have a lot of old magazines and books that must be cleared let us remember that the government will want old rags and papers. Let us do our bit for the Red Cross by giving these things that we won't want--yet--will help our country.

Bundle the magazines and newspapers and bring it to Mrs. Frasinetti's place. Let us be certain that old clothes, papers, and rubbish are not left in our houses. It might invite fire and danger to our houses.

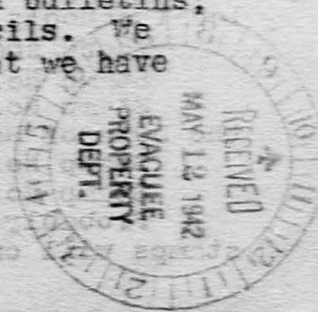
Let us try to leave our houses and yard cleaned of junks. If there are any scraps on the farm, the government will be aided by them, if we turn them in.

RICE

For those who still have extra sacks of rice, this is the positively the last week, the owners will be able to go into Sacramento for business. The staff of officers for the Bulletin headed by our secretary, Mary Tsukamoto, as acting editor; Lois Yoshinaga, stencil typist; Joyce Kawamoto, proof reader; Misu and Temmy Kushi, Nami Tsukamoto, Jack Sasaki, Asao Shintaku, Stanley Ochiai, and Kenji Morita, Mimeograph; Sumiye Uchida, typist; Ella Yoshinaga, circulation manager; were definitely overjoyed at the hope of making our bulletin better than ever. We know the public must have endured a great deal in endeavoring to read our poorly mimeographed bulletins; but this week, we are using better paper and better stencils. We hope that you will find our bulletin easy to read and that we have served you more courteously.

Dear Mr. Pich,

The first time I met you, was that day the W.C.C.A. office opened at Sacramento. I was among the few called in to meet the officials and I remember how glad I was that day when I saw for the first time, since evacuation, became evident, that the government was planning to help us evacuate with the least amount of loss & hardships. I have been more & more grateful since then — . And how marvelled at the miracle the W.C.C.A. performed. Memories of our association are very dear & pleasant. The Japanese in the Sacramento Valley are indebted to you and the Federal Reserve Bank for the millions of kindness & help — extended — without which, we could not

possibly have associated with so much
peace in our minds.

Fortunately, many persons
connected with the language schools of which
you seek information, are in this camp.
I will visit them to find out what
arrangements they make. I will send this
information as soon as possible.

It took us several days before
we felt that our room was in order. The
apartment has 5 ~~rooms~~ ^{windows}. It is clean &
quite cozy. The weather has been warm
but rather cool in the morning & evening
for which we are grateful. The food is grand
& plentiful. Our apartment is right near
the mess hall. We can watch from
the window to see how long the line is
& go when there aren't so many waiting.
Children get half-pint of milk for their
meals. We are lucky that we can get
fresh vegetables too.

The sanitary condition in the
camp is good. The camp is organized well.
Each section is an organized unit with rep-
resentatives at the Council. Choices are allotted

are to every one. Many are working as mess
boys, mail men, as waiters. We are
opening a summer school this week. As soon
as I get rested I'm going to teach something.
I haven't decided yet what it shall be. I
would like to teach piano - or singing. Or
English. Much depends on the demand
of teachers of certain courses.

I took my daughter to her
first kindergarten class. That is a
large group. I think it is wonderful
that this camp has the leaders & active
workers that make this summer school
possible. Religious meetings are numerous
and get a great deal of support. I
think that more than any thing else,
there is definitely a need for faith &
God. It helps us to keep busy too
doing church & Sunday school work.

Tomorrow night - they are holding
"talent night" ^{sponsored by the H. A. section} - A different sections are competing
for honors - of good behavior - activities,
athletics - etc... They are organizing
baseball teams in every section.
(10 sections in all.).

Yesterday all of us from Filoin
received our typhoid shots. It takes
no small days before we feel all right
again.

The rest of the family had
their treatment completed in Filoin.
I still have another one to take next
Monday again. The hospitals are busy
now with mumps, measles whooping
cough. There are three hospitals in this
camp of over 5000. There are two
medical doctors and they certainly are
kept busy.

The "Freeman Grapevine" is a
splendid weekly of this camp. It has
four pages - a lot of art work.
It is put out by a capable staff of
experienced people. ^{Other} news is spread
through notices & posted Bulletin Boards
~~at every mess hall.~~

We hope that if we must be
moved that we can go to a camp as nice as
this one. I'd like to go to a place where we can
really work. I hope all of those in Filoin can

to united. The separation of friends
& even families - was a blow. I
don't think we'd ever want to go through
it again. But there is fear ahead -
as ^{the} Army might move us again
in ~~to~~ a similar way.

Mr Reid, please accept my
sincerest gratitude for everything
that you did for our people in Berlin.
We will never be able to thank you enough.
I count it my great fortune that I had
the privilege to work with you. And
as long as I live I shall never regret
having known you. I know that it was
a significant day when the Army appointed
men - splendid, understanding men
such as you to work in the WCCO office
for all of us.

Thank you again & again.
Please remember me to Mrs Reid.

Dear Mr McFarland,

It is hard to believe that only a few days ago, we were busy in Fdoin awaiting that significant "E" day. And that like a whirlwind, since the order - every thing happened & we are now here in a camp.

I did not hope the opportunity to thank you for the many kind advice and help you gave us while you worked during the two months & finally the last two weeks we were in Fdoin. But I shall never forget - how fortunate we all were to have the understanding & friendship of such fine men as you & Mr Reid.

And I am certain the people of Fdoin want to express their appreciation to you & the B. Farland Reserve Bank for the splendid help they were given during the weeks of planning for evacuation.

The last few days were hectic and the parting very sad. We were so separated from our friends & even a few of our relatives. But now we are getting used to all this. The group

that left from Elk Grove missed a great deal of bitter disappointment because many who had signed up for Treason were hurriedly ordered to Mangrove within one or two hours' notice. It broke friends apart - but it even tore family groups. That affected the people so much that they started to blame people & eventually our J. A. C. got a good share of the blame. For a few days - such a rumor stunned me to the core. I would have rather been separated from my family group & gone on to Mangrove than to be thus accused of something I had nothing to do. All I did was tried to keep my family group united. Since many were unable to do that, they do - we were especially blessed that all of us were sent to one camp. People in fire of just events are capable of great deal of harmful thinking. I've learned a lesson too. Those who work for an organization or a group - cannot dare try to do something for his own family without arousing jealousy & suspicion. I've been too tired & shocked to do anything but rest since coming here. But it is a nice camp. It is hot during the day. But very cool morning & evening.

Our apartment is very roomy. The five in our family - my husband, daughter, Mariella, my mother, father & sister-in-law - find it very roomy and nice. The beds are comfortable - and the large windows provide plenty of fresh air and breeze.

It took us quite a few days until we were able to really settle down. Shelves, closets - and drapes had to be arranged & made - . But it is quite comfy & nice now.

Our apartment is near the mess hall - and very convenient to the shower room and toilet. A new hospital will open next to our barracks - soon.

We are all pleased with the splendid cooperation of the people in the camp - and the officials in charge are wonderful. The accommodation is far more than we had expected. There are no trees in the camp - but we can get used to all this. ~~John~~ Mary have stated they wouldn't mind staying here for the duration, if we can be given work to do. There are over 500 of us here & voluntary chore work & duties

to keep up the community are all filled
so for most of us there won't be much to do.

I received my second typhoid injection
yesterday. As soon as I feel all right, I
would like to teach summer school. I
haven't been able as yet to get acquainted
with everyone and haven't tried to get a
job. I know I'm going to teach Sunday school
& probably have a choir group.

They have a paper called the
"Greens Grapevine" - a wonderful
bulletin - with a staff and everything so I
guess they won't need our micrographing
machine or our amateurish help:

I have badly neglected some
of my duties - I'm terribly sorry that
I do not have the receipts for the sacks
of rice. I had left it with the rice in
the kitchen. We made three copies. One
for the money, one for the J. O. L. & the
other for the F. R. B. I wonder if I could
have our copies of the receipts? I hope they
aren't lost.

I am sending the signed assignment
agreement. Thank you for your trouble.

I leaned over the radio yesterday
the execution of the coast has been
completed. Plans go to all of you
who worked long hours - unselfishly
to carry out the order. I feel that you
have done this great task magnificently.
We are grateful. I hope that you
will get a long rest ~~and~~ after these
weeks of hard work.

Closing with regrets that
this letter can't be longer - I feel
as though our visit must be cut short.
But I shall write again.

IN APPRECIATION

When evacuation became a certainty to all of us Aliens and American Citizens, that certain dark day in March, the reality was a bitter pill to swallow. The entire program seemed so monstrous--so tremendous, that we could not realize the full significance of it. It took many weeks and constant thinking to drive home the truth that we must leave our homes, our friends, and our jobs. Many times we found ourselves thinking it couldn't be true that this was just a terrible nightmare.

Today, I feel as though I am old and years have passed since the somber day of evacuation was ever brought up.

From day to day as new developments erased some of the uncertainty away, we found our fears had been crowded farther into the background of our everyday thinking. Now we are busy crating and packing. Of course, there are still many problems and worries but much of the question of property disposal is being solved. Our storage plans are completed and our minds are being prepared more than ever for the final day.

Since the very first day, the JCCA office opened in Sacramento, our president, Hugh Kiino, went into see the officials. That very afternoon a committee of us were invited in to meet and discuss with the heads of that office--what the purpose of the JCCA was in this evacuation. Sacramento JACL, too, were asked and about 30 of us met Mr. Reid of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, Mr. Phelps of the Federal Farm Security Agency, Mr. Bonnelly, the coordinator and head of the Employment Department, and Miss Thayer of the Social Security Board.

There haven't been many days since that memorable meeting, that someone, in our Florin JACL, has been in to see these busy officials. We always saw them smiling even at the end of a good, hard day in a crowded and noisy office. Their consideration and kindly attention given so generously to the hundreds that come rushing into the office with their countless problems were deeply appreciated. They had to be more than patient in their effort to understand those many excited, frightened people, who could not fluently express themselves in English. Numerous personal problems were entrusted to our Miss Thayer, and her sincere and devoted consideration for every little trouble has brought relief and gratitude to many individuals. Many of us have gained a tremendous amount of help and advice from the Federal Reserve Bank. We got ourselves into trouble through false rumors and excitements. The Federal Reserve Bank was always ready to protect and help us. Many, who have frozen bank accounts at Sumitomo, have the Federal Reserve Bank to thank for making it possible to borrow 50% of their account through another bank. Some of us had expected to leave much of our belongings in our vacated houses with nails and bars as its only protection. Thanks to the Federal Reserve Bank, the moving and storing of our household properties are no longer an unsolved problem.

The splendid help, our farmers are gaining through Mr. Phelps and Mr. Fairbairn of the Federal Farm Security Agency, is certainly greatly appreciated. The Caucasian farmers, who are taking over many farms, are backed by the Federal Farm Agency. Many of us are leaving our farms with greater assurance, because competent men will run our farms till our return.

Our community and our JACL have received much recognition and praise because of our splendid cooperation and unity with the JCCA and the Army. But I cannot help but feel certain this cooperation was drawn from us by their love and interest for us. I am certain that I express the feelings of our JACL, when I say that we are deeply grateful for the personnel, that represent the JCCA, the Army, and our United States Government. Their understanding, of our people and their warm personal touch in the way they handled our problems, was the secret that opened our hearts and our complete trust in the sincere efforts of government, they represented.

We want to thank the JCCA and the Army for their sincerity in the way they are undertaking this tremendous task of evacuation.

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OUR JACL OFFICE

The JACL Cabinet meeting will not be held this week. We are trying to carry on the work through the bulletin and flash notices at the stores to inform people of latest developments.

We are mailing bulletins to every family in our jurisdiction, and in spite of the cost of mailing, will try to render this service if it is humanly possible to do so, weekly through the busy days to follow.

We have, indeed, been fortunate to have several voluntary workers every day at our office. Had it not been for them, our family survey would not have been completed. We are truly indebted to many girls who have spent tiring hours, checking up records, and typing all day. Kisu and Lily Kushi have come practically every day, Marian Meritt and Clara Ochiai have spent many hours with the JACL. In spite of the strawberry work at home, Lois Yoshinaga does all the cutting of stencils for our bulletins. Joyce Kawamoto, our corresponding secretary has been invaluable to our work. We have had numerous willing workers who came voluntarily to help at our office--Sumiye Uchida, Elaine Sano, Akira Hara, Kiyoshi Sasaki, and Nami Tsukamoto. The Secretary wishes to thank these people in behalf of the JACL for the voluminous unseen work they are doing in the office.

After three weeks of painstaking check-up, we finally were able to type several copies of the final list of families in our JACL Jurisdiction. There are 453 families and 2443 individuals. The boundaries extending from Franklin, Sloughhouse, Mills, Mayhew, Brighton, and even to a few families in Oak Park.

To every one of these families, we will extend our help and advice, and try our best to reach them with any important news. But we seek your cooperation, as we swing into busier days ahead. If we miss you, please understand and overlook our short comings. Help to spread the right information, and if your district chairman did not come to your home with certain news, feel it your responsibility to drop in at our office to receive the right information. All of the JACL members will be busy from now, and mutual cooperation will truly bring the best results for all.

We would like to announce that we can't come to each door to ask for your time, because we have no way of knowing how busy you are, or how willing you are to do your part for your community. In this emergency, with time so short, we will be deeply grateful to hear from you and receive your willingness to help.

TYPHOID

For a few days, the JACL office was on pins and needles, trying to complete all arrangements to give typhoid inoculations for those in the community, who wanted to have their treatments while they were still at home to nurse their reaction from the injection.

We found splendid cooperation from the many doctors in Sacramento who offered to come to Florin for a day, and serve the people in this program. Dr. Zipf of the Sacramento County Health Board offered to provide us with the Typhoid serum. The WCCA had sanctioned this plan, too, and we had notices out at every store and an article was written for the paper. Plans were discussed to ask for many typists and assistants to take care of the crowd. The date was set, and the bulletin was stenciled headlining this news. Then--the blow came.

News from Sacramento, that notices were received by the Japanese dentists that they must be ready to answer calls to go to camp, some time early next week. The Public Health office was called, and they were advised to cancel such a big program now. The doctors got together and finally decided it best not to attempt such an undertaking with so much uncertainty so close at hand.

The JACL wants everyone to know that the doctors and nurses, the army and the WCCA were anxious to cooperate and help us, if it were possible. And only because of these circumstances, we regretfully cancel--what would have been a tremendous, but a very helpful program.

Let us remember that we will have competent doctors at our camps; great care and consideration will be their keyword in their treatment. Let us have faith in them and be calm, as the evacuation day draws nearer. Typhoid, diphtheria, and small pox vaccinations will be administered there to everyone. This Sunday, May 3rd, will be the last day for diphtheria and vaccination treatments under the sponsorship of the Florin JACL. Dr. Ito will be here from 9:30 A.M. to finish everyone who desires his injection.

VACAVILLE NEWS

Miss Thayer was back Thursday afternoon in Sacramento, soon after her work at the Biographical Center in Vacaville. Fortunately for us in Florin, we can learn through the experiences of others who go before us. Miss Thayer and Mr. Reid were quite pleased with the smooth way the evacuation was handled there.

There are important suggestions that Miss Thayer offers to the mothers and the families in their last minute preparations for evacuation. Let us think carefully for the comfort of our families---Kosmo nets will be very important. If oil of Citronella is available, that would also help. Let us not forget our mirrors, soaps, Kleenex, towels, cream, and aspirins.

Curtains will help to improve the rooms. Clothes bags will serve as a place for some of our good suits and dresses. A lot of rope used in rolling our blankets will be useful, as clotheslines or to hang curtains with at the center. We will need a half full of nails to hang the clothes on one or two extension cords and extra double sockets and plugs will be quite useful.

For those who enjoy smoking, Miss Thayer suggests, you take a good week's supply of tobacco.

For mothers with little babies, remember to take plenty of formula to last several days. She also suggests mothers to take a small amount of baby candy for their infants. Let us plan carefully and take small toys, time comics, and other amusements for our children to occupy their time at the camp.

This week, Miss Thayer suggests to mothers who have folding cribs to take them with us.

One or two small pots might come in handy too. An electric iron might be something to add to our neatness. Let us, by all means, have a check for every member of the family.

Let us try to take all that we can manage that are immediate necessities, and it would be wise to take most of our clothing.

As far as Miss Thayer knows now, she understands that while we are at the Reception Center, packages that are sent by parcel post will be the only sizes accepted. Large trunks cannot be sent to the Reception Center. After we are relocated, everything we will need, will be sent to us.

Trunk bags are very handy to carry and a small hold all things. If trunks aren't available, muslin or heavy material will do to make sacks. If you have not bought suit cases yet, make these bags; they will serve the purpose more effectively, than cases that will take up space in the crowded rooms.

More than 200 rubber baby pants that Mrs. Tanikawa had stocked at her store, will be donated to the mothers, who have babies in our community. She is turning it over to the JACL. They will be available at our office, as long as they last, and on Sunday, the day of our children's treatments. Please feel free to come and see these unusual all-elastic, Japan-made, rubber-lined felt pants and plain rubber pants.

We are registering all the First Aiders who have passed the Standard First Aid course recently in our JACL First Aid Corps.

The JACL has given permission to the welfare committee to provide first aid kits to those who will belong to the corps; and if we have time one afternoon the clinic program is completed, we have to meet and give first aid to efficient units.

We want to thank the LPA as a whole team for their consent to let the JACL use their new First Aid Kit during the evacuation.

The JACL wishes to acknowledge the donation of several reams of paper from the Jewett League. The ink and pencils and other minor materials necessary to the program, and were also received. We are indebted to the Jewett League for the donation of a typewriter machine that makes the weekly bulletin possible.

The JACL has a constant demand for good typewriters, and we are grateful to its donors for their generosity.

SUBJECT: NO. 5 FIRST WITH THE LATEST NEWS APRIL 24, 1942

ATTENTION!

This is absolutely our final warning that all Japanese farmers in Military Area No. 1 should make all immediate plans for the settlement of their farm affairs. It is therefore imperative that every Japanese, alien or non-alien, report at once to the Farm Security field agent at his local WCCA service center to clear all matters relative to agricultural property and crops.

Japanese farmers have already been evacuated from Bainbridge Island in Puget Sound, from Los Angeles County, San Diego, San Francisco County and many other places. Yesterday, thirteen additional new exclusion orders affecting approximately 13,000 Japanese along the Pacific Coast were issued by Lt. General J. L. Dewitt. These new orders should serve as an additional warning to the Japanese farmers that the time is very short in which farmers may dispose of their property. The Army has already indicated that it will increase the tempo of the evacuation as fast as possible.

Colonel Karl R. Bendetsen, of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, gave today another emphatic warning to the Japanese farmers.

"Loss of property and great personal disappointment will be the harvest of Japanese and Japanese-American farmers who ignore repeated evacuation warnings from the Army. These farmers throw themselves at the mercy of unscrupulous persons if they believe rumors that evacuation will be delayed, or that they will be allowed to wait until after the harvest season to dispose of their farms. The evacuation program will not stop for anyone."

"Reports have reached my office that certain of the Japanese in farming districts, particularly in the inland areas, have been counting on two or three months elapsing before they are evacuated," the Colonel said. "The Army has indicated several times that the evacuation will be completed on schedule."

Colonel Bendetsen explained that a number of unauthorized individuals in positions not connected with the evacuation program have been telling the evacuees that the Army does not plan to move them for two or three months or until certain crops are harvested.

"The Army does not contemplate a ending three months evacuating the Japanese, nor does the Army intend to let the harvesting dates for certain crops determine the date of evacuation. Military necessity will not compromise. It is a stern matter," Colonel Bendetsen declared.

OFFICE OF AGRICULTURAL COORDINATOR.....

CAR STORAGE

Through the interest of Mr. Fairbairn of WCCA, the Nash & Camp Co. has rented a warehouse in Perkins to store automobiles. The rent is \$2.50 per month and is to be paid when we return. There has been many requesting for storage space, but there is room for about 15 more cars.

Those who are interested, please drop in at the office. There is an agreement that must be signed and we must have the engine number and the serial number too.

Mr. Bronson of the Occidental Life Insurance Co. is offering to insure cars for fire and theft, but cannot promise how long he will be able to keep this offer. If you are interested, please, do not delay.

Mr. Bronson has consented to be available on Saturday, April 26th at the YBA hall. It may be too late to get your car insured if you wait. Please try to see us within the next week concerning this.

The storage plan that was proposed by Ford & Henry Storage and Transfer Co. was dropped because only a few were interested in storing at Sacramento. The reports brought in by the district chairman totaled not more than 50. We had to have about 250 cars signed up to make this plan good.

There may be one or two other possibilities in Florin for Car Storage. We will inform you later when more concrete information can be released.

WARNING FROM WCCA AND SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Mr. Phelps received a complaint from the sheriff's office that many people are in Sacramento without permits. He wanted to clearly state that only boys who are working for the strawberry company have permission to go to Sacramento. Others must see Mr. Phelps and Mr. Stevens about permits before they can go into Sacramento with their vegetables, but strawberries must be sold in Florin, because they are buying them in Florin.

APPRECIATION

The district representatives are commended for their unfailing effort in helping the community in this emergency. They are no longer just "giving nothing." Strawberry season is getting underway, but their work still goes on with the JACL. Have you stopped to realize how many times they have driven to your house? Patiently reporting over information. Driving their car, giving their gas to serve everyone of you. Have you ever stopped to think how much you have done to share your duty as an individual towards the community? These boys and girls have proven worthy of a great trust as citizens, as sincere JACL members and have certainly born their responsibilities as no others have.

RED CROSS CONTRIBUTION ACCEPTED

The Red Cross will accept all your old magazines and papers (must be bundled) and your old clothes and rags, and cardboard boxes, books, furniture, and anything that we don't want, that can be used. STORAGE

At our meeting, April 13th, Mr. Reid of Sacramento W.C.C.A. and Mr. Cox of San Francisco, one witness to the evacuation of part of San Francisco, and Mr. Richards, all of the Federal Reserve Bank office attended our JACL meeting.

The discussions proved enlightening and many things about evacuation became clearer. The subject that was most on the minds of everyone was storage, and the numerous questions that were patiently answered has given us confidence in sending out the following information:

1. The Federal Reserve Bank will take care of storing every household furniture. Let us not plan to leave our belongings in our house unless someone is going to live in our home, or unless a very good neighbor who lives close by will look after our things.

2. Do not in this confusion sell your valuable possessions for below its equitable value.

3. Let us not be hasty in our decision to sell something which we will need later and which will be hard to replace.

4. None of us know how long we will be gone. We may stay at the Reception Center a long time, but the Relocation Board is working hard to plan a place where we can be relocated as soon as possible. When that time comes, we may want many of our own household goods sent to us. The Federal Reserve Bank will send those necessary furnitures to us if we store it with the Army when we leave. Those furnitures and crates left in the care of friends will be sent at our own expense. If you have friends who have offered to keep your good radios, radios, refrigerators, gas stoves, or your best bedroom sets, which you know you won't want until you return, that's fine. Those who cannot find places for them, the Federal Reserve Bank will store them for you until you return. Keep in mind that many of our necessary things will reach us more promptly if we entrust our friends to send them to us. But the beds, tables, stoves, trunks, and bureaus that we need when we are relocated, could be stored with Federal Reserve Bank to be sent to us later to our relocation Camp.

5. We know that YBA Hall and the Japanese Hall could not store very much, but everything that can not be stored in Florin, will be taken into Sacramento to be stored at Federal Reserve Bank warehouse.

Mr. Cox and Mr. Reid explained very carefully what would happen WHEN THE ORDER FOR EVACUATION IS ISSUED:

1. There will come to Florin a group of people--(clerks, typists, registrars) and a Control Center will be set up. Every family will send one person to register for the family and there receive his family number. He will be given a large cardboard stamped with the same numbers. Then he will take this home and attach the tag number to every single furniture and crates he wishes to have stored. If there is no tag No. on a piece of furniture, the storage men will leave it behind.

2. The JACL War Relocation Committee has with the advice of the Federal Reserve Bank set up a plan where by all the halls and Japanese School houses will be a temporary storage place during the week we are evacuating. Each family will be told exactly where their possessions should be taken when the order comes. This coming week, every family will be given an inventory sheet, and on it will be marked which school house or hall each family should plan to take his things when the order comes.

3. We must bring our possessions all in one place so that it would not get lost. Everything we store must be placed together no matter how large or small the furniture.

4. Professional men will be hired by the Federal Reserve Bank to handle the storage. They will come in their trucks with their equipments, and with their experience and skill, move all of our furnitures. In order to hasten the moving more efficiently, a cooperative plan was suggested. We'll move our things to our nearest designated hall or school house. Then the storage men will come and pick up the things at the various halls and schools, instead of driving to each and every home. Many trucks will be busy every day and should the day

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Arrive when we evacuate from Florin, and our possessions still not all packed into Sacramento, the Federal Reserve Bank will take the responsibility. The day we leave. They will put guards at every hall and school. It still has some things unremoved and will keep it guarded until every last piece of furniture has been moved from the temporary storage places in the suburban districts.

5. Hall and the Japanese Hall will have 24-hour guard. The place is filled with our belongings, most probably for the duration.

6. Because professional men with complete moving equipments, (blanks, etc.) will take care of our things, we need not crate every thing. If we want to, we may crate them, but it won't be necessary to crate most of our furniture. Small articles should be put to other than large boxes packed well--so that they will not break.

7. There will not be any charges in storing at the hall or anywhere. There are no expenses involved since the Federal Reserve Bank will hire the storage men and the moving men.

JACL FIRST AID CORP

When we met to take Red Cross first aid--at the out-break of war--we had thought to serve humanity in the event of an invasion. We had thought that shoulder to shoulder with our fellow Americans, we might have a share in saving lives for our U.S. when the time for a disaster comes.

Now with evacuation before us we are calling you to answer in the name of your people--you who have passed your first aid courses.

Let us try to review our books occasionally so that should the emergency arise, we will be able to meet the need of first aid with perfect presence of mind.

From the day of evacuation, we must expect to meet all sorts of accidents, and illness among the hundreds that will be crowded together in a new place.

We would like to have you come on Tuesday afternoon to our office for a meeting. We think that a JACL First Aid Corp should be set up.

FOR YOUR PETS

If you cannot find new masters for your pets, the Sacramento Humane Society has offered to try to place your pets in new homes. If you wish to get their help, telephone 6-3714 and they will extend their aid.

ALIENS WHO HAVE MOVED

So note:

If your address has changed from one Post Office to another, be certain that you report this to the local Post Office, and fill a card to be sent to the Immigration Office.

Last week the Florin Post Office did not have these cards. Please remember all aliens must report change of address.

ATTENTION!

This is absolutely our final warning that all Japanese farmers in Military Area No. 1 should make all immediate plans for the settlement of their families. It is therefore imperative that every Japanese, alien or non-alien, report at once to the Farm Security field agent at his local WFOA service center to clear all matters relative to agricultural property and crops.

Japanese farmers have already been evacuated from Bainbridge Island in Puget Sound, from Los Angeles County, San Diego, San Francisco County and many other places. Yesterday, thirteen additional new exclusion orders affecting approximately 13,000 Japanese along the Pacific Coast were issued by Lt. General J. L. Dewitt. These new orders should serve as an additional warning to the Japanese farmers that the time is very short in which farmers may dispose of their property. The Army has already indicated that it will increase the tempo of the evacuation as fast as possible.

Colonel Karl R. Bendetsen, of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, gave today another emphatic warning to the Japanese farmers.

"Loss of property and great personal disappointment will be the harvest of Japanese and Japanese-American farmers who ignore repeated evacuation warnings from the Army. These farmers throw themselves at the mercy of unscrupulous persons if they believe rumors that evacuation will be delayed, or that they will be allowed to wait until after the harvest season to dispose of their farms. The evacuation program will not stop for anyone."

"Reports have reached my office that certain of the Japanese in farming districts, particularly in the inland areas, have been counting on two or three months elapsing before they are evacuated," the Colonel said. "The Army has indicated several times that the evacuation will be completed on schedule."

Colonel Bendetsen explained that a number of unauthorized individuals in positions not connected with the evacuation program have been telling the evacuees that the Army does not plan to move them for two or three months or until certain crops are harvested.

"The Army does not contemplate sending three months evacuating the Japanese, nor does the Army intend to let the harvesting dates for certain crops determine the date of evacuation. Military necessity will not compromise. It is a stern matter," Colonel Bendetsen declared.

CAR STORAGE

Through the interest of Mr. Fairbairn of WCCI, the Nash & Camp Co. has rented a warehouse in Perkins to store automobiles. The rent is \$2.50 per month and is to be paid when we return. There has been many requesting for storage space, but there is room for about 15 more cars.

Those who are interested, please drop in at the office. There is an agreement that must be signed and we must have the engine number and the serial number too.

Mr. Bronson of the Occidental Life Insurance Co. is offering to insure cars for fire and theft, but cannot promise how long he will be able to keep this offer. If you are interested, please, do not delay.

Mr. Bronson has consented to be available on Saturday, April 25th at the YBA hall. It may be too late to get your car insured if you wait. Please try to see us within the next week concerning this!

The storage plan that was proposed by Ford & Henry Storage and Transfer Co. was dropped because only a few were interested in storing at Sacramento. The reports brought in by the district chairman totaled not more than 50. We had to have about 250 cars signed up to make this plan good.

There may be one or two other possibilities in Florida for Car Storage. We will inform you later when more concrete information can be released.

WARNING FROM WCCA AND SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Mr. Phelps received a complaint from the sheriff's office that many people are in Sacramento without permits. He wanted to clearly state that only boys who are working for the strawberry company have permission to go to Sacramento. Others must see Mr. Phelps and Mr. Stevens about permits before they can go into Sacramento with their vegetables, but strawberries must be sold in Florin, because they are buying them in Florin.

APPRECIATION

The district representatives are commended for their unflinching effort in helping the community in this emergency. They are no longer just "doing nothing." Subject: Florin, California

Dear Sir:

We attended a meeting of the J.A.C.L. in Florin on Saturday afternoon. The District Captains of the League, who were present, numbered fifty-one. They represented approximately 2600 of the permanent residents of the town and between 375 and 400 evacuees from other districts. The purpose of the meeting was to iron out a few minor details such as storage and the delivery of the evacuees' goods to the warehouse. This was easily adjusted to their satisfaction. In the course of the conversation the members of the J.A.C.L. assured us that the majority of their business affairs had already been adjusted or would be prior to the time of the evacuation order.

The question of the disposal of their surplus supply of sacked rice came up again. It is estimated that they will have between fifteen hundred and eighteen hundred one-hundred-pound sacks. This seems to be a serious problem. The J.A.C.L. has agreed to instruct all Japanese in the district, whether they are members or not, to bring in their unopened sacks. They will issue receipts and store this rice temporarily, until such time that they can be sold as one lot or sold to various grocery jobbers in this district. We are enclosing Bulletin No. 4, issued by the Florin Chapter of the J.A.C.L. for your information pertaining to this subject.


There is one other question which came up and which we were unable to answer. This was in regards to

LET US STOP FALSE RUMOR !

The following information was released by the Wartime Civil Control Administration Western Defense Command and Fourth Army.

Col. Earl R. Bendetsen, Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division, issued out today at west coast residents, both Japanese and non-Japanese, who have been spreading rumors about the conditions under which evacuees are living in assembly centers.

"Some individuals, including non-Japanese as well as Japanese, have been spreading rumors which discredit the assembly centers," Colonel Bendetsen said. "These persons are speaking without factual knowledge and often are activated by unhealthy reasons."

He explained that the assembly centers are still in the process of building in many cases, and that certain sections are not as completed nor as efficient as they will be within a few weeks.

"In every case, however, adequate facilities are constructed before the evacuees arrive. The construction is ahead of the evacuation," Colonel Bendetsen stated.

"There are bound to be certain phases of the assembly centers which do not yet satisfy us. Carpenters are working around the clock and the assembly center officials are getting precious little sleep because they are devoting every minutes of their time to accomplishing our objective," he said.

One Japanese reported to Colonel Bendetsen yesterday that he had learned third hand that lavatory facilities in the Santa Anita center are limited and inadequate.

"This is unfounded. The carpenters are constructing facilities as fast as possible, and before evacuees are taken to any assembly center we make absolutely certain that facilities of this type are adequate. Remember that we are building an assembly center capable of housing, feeding and otherwise taking care of 20,000 Japanese. It just can't be done overnight, but it will be done before the evacuees arrive," Colonel Bendetsen said.

The colonel, in response to rumors which have criticized the food in the assembly centers, said that the evacuees, for the time being, are being fed ration B, which is a balanced diet consisting largely of canned foods and rice, prepared as the Japanese cooks directed.

"This ration is healthful and makes for a well rounded diet. After the assembly center is organized and as soon as it is possible to do so we will feed the evacuees the ordinary army diet of fresh meats and vegetables, and also fruits. The army diet, which has improved the health of soldiers all over the country, should prove adequate for any group of people," Colonel Bendetsen stated.

STORAGE

As far as we know now, the Y. B. Hall, Buddhist Language School House, and the Florin Japanese Hall will have a 24 hour guard and it will be a government warehouse for the duration.

The storage committee has asked the district representatives to make a house to house canvas and find out how many will need storage space. Then the committee will divide the space up equally, so that every family will have an equal opportunity to enjoy storage space. Probably just a very minimum amount will be charged, just to save the expenses, which will be involved in storing their belongings.

Mr. Hold of the Federal Reserve Bank has promised to come to our J. A. C. meeting Saturday afternoon to give us advice and latest information concerning Gov't Storage. Much of our storage problem, we hope, will be ironed out.

CRATING

Arrangements have been made by the Federal Government for certain sum to be used for preparation for aid in evacuation. Those who need help in getting lumber must figure how much lumber for crating they would need, and how much lumber for making protective frames on certain types of furnitures. Then go to Miss Thayer at W.C.C.A. and she will complete her interview and you can get your lumber at the lumber co.

Some of our belongings may not need crating. We may cover our ice-box with an old blanket or covering to protect them. Or make a frame to protect them. But many of our things, such as beds or mattresses need not be crated. If the legs or mirrors are breakable, protective frames must be fixed.

Let us use our disgression in the amount of lumber we will use, so that it won't take up too much space nor waste good lumber.

Those who need financial assistance in preparing your family things for evacuation, may contact Miss Thayer and aid will be extended.

VACCINATION AND DIPHTHERIA INNOCULATIONS

More than 2,000 persons have been treated for diptheria and vaccination shots up to date. The generous service that Dr. Ito is extending to the Public is deeply appreciated. If we stop to realize how much work it means for one doctor to handle as many as 641 persons in a day, we might understand the welfare Dr. Ito has for all of us in the face of this great emergency. The little the J.A.C.L. will be able to pay him is certainly far from being enough. There aren't many who are willing to give as much for so little. The J.A.C.L. in behalf of all in our community want Dr. Ito to know we are grateful.

The J.A.C.L. undertook the responsibility thinking there were only a few hundred persons that needed these medical treatments since schools and counties sponsored such a program from time to time. But to our great surprise, many responded to our announcement and we never seemed to have enough serum to cover everyone. The expense involved in these treatments because of the great number has made it necessary to charge a quarter for the second diptheria innoculation.

Last Sunday, April 12th, marked the end of the first treatment for diptheria innoculation. On April 19th, those who were treated on March 29th will finish their second shot. Those who received their first treatment on the 4th will come for their second injection on April 25th. Those who came on the 5th must come on the 26th. Those who had their first shot on April 12th must finish their treatment on May 3rd.

If there should be some who have missed their vaccination for small-pox, they may be treated late in the afternoons of the above designated dates. In spite of the busy season, we advise everyone to make some arrangements to come and complete his treatment. Many who had some reaction from their first shot have thought of getting their second shot at Camp. Typhoid and vaccinations will be administered later at the Center but according to the latest information from Miss Thayer, we will not receive diptheria shots at the Assembly Center unless diptheria cases develop. Those who did not take advantage of the special J.A.C.L. health program must now see his doctor privately and have diptheria innoculation given or take the risk of being exposed in the crowded Camps. We have been advised from W.C.C.A. not to try giving Typhoid shots through the J.A.C.L. now because we will not know when the order will come, and since typhoid treatments will take three injections at ten day intervals. If we started typhoid treatments for everyone after we finish our diptheria and vaccination treatments on May 3rd, we may not be able to complete the treatment should the evacuation order come.

FOR THE HEALTH OF EVERYONE

There are many who are under a doctor's care. Miss Thayer wishes all of you to see your doctor now and have the doctor send a medical report of your condition to the W.C.C.A. office so that the doctors at the Camp will know of your condition. Especially those who are quite ill and to move then now would be dangerous, please have the doctor contact W.C.C.A. immediately with the report of his illness.

We can announce the available help of W.C.C.A. welfare office and try to advise everyone to act immediately about the families who have invalids, bedridden people and tubercular patients. If we do not get much response-- we hope you will realize what this scenly ugly dis-interested attitude may mean to the sick person as well as to all the

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thousands of healthy people that come together in one place. We must make plans to safeguard everyone from contagious diseases. We must give particular protection to the weak. The ill must have medical care and special physician's help. In order to plan for these things, you must come to us. This office has not, I'm sure-- a complete record of all who are ill. For the sake of your friends and every-one, please come to us, before it is too late to make adequate preparations.

Mrs. Higginson, of the county welfare, will come regularly every Wednesday afternoon to the Florin J.A.C.L. office. This coming Wednesday, April 22nd, she wishes to interview every one under her care. Please come to the J.A.C.L. office in the afternoon from about 1:30. It will save her a great deal of time traveling from home to home. If there should be anyone needing aid, let us not hesitate to come.

THOSE WHO WISH TO SELL--PLEASE NOTICE

At times like these under the strain of uncertainty, we are easily frightened into selling our possessions in haste--at whatever price we can get--or sell without thought of what we might do after this war is over, and we must resume normal living again. Already a great number have sold their cars--at prices far below its estimated value. Many have practically thrown their cars on to men who are jumping at this opportunity to "fatten their little nest eggs".

Let us be careful--whom we trust. Unless proper agreement can be reached and papers carefully studied, don't sign or give away important contracts and papers. We have had reports of people turning over their car and even their pink-slip to the man who has offered to sell their car without receiving cash or any agreement papers. Let us make certain, the proper steps that must be taken in selling or leasing or asking people to look after your property so that you will be protected from any trickery and unnecessary losses.

PERMITS

Mr. Phelps of the W.C.C.A. Federal Farm Security Agency has specifically stated that only boys who are working for the three strawberry companies will be protected by the W.C.C.A. office if they are stopped. All others must sell their strawberries through the companies and will not be given a permit to sell at Sacramento.

At the office--we have records of people who wish to serve as tenants on vacating Japanese farms, some who wish to rent--others who wish to buy land, many are finding good solutions to their farm problems in the event of evacuation, through kindly neighbors. Others through this office and Mr. Fairbairn-- we hope to continue to bring interested persons together and thus make satisfactory arrangements for most of our farmers. It is good to know--of so many whose generous neighbors and owners have offered to watch and look after their farm land--their vineyards and houses. At times like these we have found understanding among our friends and their effort to help is in time of need is certainly something to be deeply grateful.

UNITING FAMILIES

If you have members of your family living elsewhere--get in touch with them immediately. Ask them to contact their local W.C.C.A. for a permit to move into Florin now. If they should have difficulty in getting the permit ask them to check up with Miss Thayer of the Sac'to W.C.C.A. If they are refused a permit--let Miss Thayer know--and she will try to arrange with that W.C.C.A. for a permit. We cannot delay in this matter. Should we be ordered out of Florin soon, the confusion and rush will make it impossible to make any arrangements to bring distant friends and families together. So let us tend to this right away.

LET US NOT FORGET OUR PETS

We have been advised to see that our pets will be cared for. Let us leave them knowing we have done the best we can for their welfare. If and no one can be found to look after them till we return, let us do the humane thing by taking them to the city pound. None of us will be able to take care of our pets, difficult as it will be-- we must leave them behind, assist us take care of these things now while we have time to seek a new master or a kindly friend.

J.A.C.L. DEPENDS ON YOU

If you who read English--The J.A.C.L. and the W.C.C.A. must depend on you to pass on accurate information in this bulletin to your already worried and anxious parents and friends. Let us feel that it is our responsibility to explain to our folks in detail every advice and fact which come from the J.A.C.L. There aren't many Japanese papers in circulation and we must try to give out accurate news. Let us pass these news out to everyone. Anyone who you know hasn't received the bulletin, let us know and we will pass them or send them to you.

OUR NEW CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

Miss Joice Kawamoto has accepted the position of corresponding secretary of our J.A.C.L. for the rest of the term, since the resignation of our former secretary who is away at work and unable to carry on the duties of that office.

J.A.C.L. VOLUNTEERS

In order to catch up on all J.A.C.L. records, including the diphtheria inoculations and vaccinations, the family survey, the new J.A.C.L. membership file, and to keep up our weekly bulletin, a staff of voluntary helpers have given gladly their time. The J.A.C.L. office is a buzz--with 3 typewriters and busy workers. Mary Louise Kuroiwa from Oakland, has practically every day to help. Isabel Oshiro, Shizu and Yoiko Dukuhara, George Suye, Joice Kawamoto, Beatrice Tamura, Miss Keshi, Marian Murata, and Clara Celand have been invaluable to our office also John Hirohata, the editor of our Bulletin.

LAST MINUTE FLASH NEWS FROM W.C.C.A.

Latest information from the W.C.C.A. Permit department headed by Mr. Stevens is:

Starting this morning April 17th no one will be given a permit to go shopping unless you can prove that it is absolutely necessary. Snapping for groceries and necessities must be done at your local stores.

Those who wish to have their dentist polish their teeth or give them a check up should wait a few weeks until further notice. Permits for dentists and doctors will be given when doctors can verify the need for a visit. Unless business, bank, lawyer and insurance Co. are absolutely imperative, permits will not be issued.

MUTUAL COOPERATION IN TIME OF NEED

Many evacuees have come into our community in the last few months. We who have been in Florin extend our good will to you and hope that in spite of the threat of uncertainty all around us, we can be your friends.

Florin is facing a problem as we are advancing into a busy strawberry season. Because of the war, the usual number of labor we get from the Philippines has been cancelled. This shortage may mean a great deal of loss to many farmers. To those who have evacuated, we ask you to cooperate with us and in time of need give us your understanding and willingness to help by offering to at least try working in the strawberry patches. We realize that perhaps we are asking a great deal in this for we do know that to those who are not accustomed to farm labor strawberry picking will not be easy. We would like to keep a record of all who have come to Florin at our J.A.C.L. office at any opportunity do drop in to see us. If you can offer your service in this call for labor, we will refer you to the proper companies who will help you find work.

REAL PROPERTY CUSTODIANSHIP

The J. A. C. L. of Berkeley has been making a thorough study of the problem of evacuation, and has accomplished the following:

Contact was made with Mr. Hoyt Sibley, licensed real estate broker and building contractor of Richmond, California, and Mr. J. Jeffrey Cowen, Attorney at Law of Berkeley, California, in an effort to provide ways and means to maintain property during the absence of all members of the J. A. C. L. of Berkeley.

ASH-5885
Conferences have been held with Mr. Sibley, Mr. Cowen, Mr. Kimio Obata, president of the Berkeley J.A.C.L., Mr. Harry Mayeda and Mr. James Nishimura in attendance. At these meetings, the following conclusions have been arrived at and are presented to the members for their consideration.

1. That a corporation, co-operative and mutual in its concept be set up for the benefit of all Japanese who are to be evacuated and who are willing to become a member of said corporation.
2. The corporation will be set up under the temporary trade name of Sibley Estates, Inc.
3. The corporation will be directly managed by Mr. Sibley, Mr. Cowen and a qualified accountant yet to be named, and said corporation will be incorporated under the Laws of the State of California having all the rights and privileges thereto.
4. The corporation will be a non-profit, ~~non-facile~~ organization operated for the sole benefit of the individual members, and the fees of the management of the corporation will be nominal. These fees will be fixed at the first general meeting of all members.
5. The corporation will pledge itself to the proper conduct and proper processing of all properties of all members with the view in mind of preserving all property for the duration or until such time as conditions are suitable for the return of the individual members.
6. Individual members who wish to become members of the corporation will be assured legally of the proper conduct and maintenance of their property for the duration. All funds received from the income of the property for the first year will be left with the corporation as a revolving fund, not only to assure the preservation of all properties but to maintain sufficient funds for the corporation to exist and to meet any emergencies.

It must be clearly understood in this connection that this corporation is designed not only to look after the individual's but to maintain everybody's property. The corporation must be maintained for the mutual benefit of all members, for instance:

If one house goes vacant and remains vacant, the individual owner will know that the proceeds of other rented houses will maintain his property until such time as the property will be income producing. This is not likely to happen, but we must consider it as a possibility. Necessarily, the corporation will fail in its purpose if members lose their homes; therefore, the corporation's revolving fund must be used to protect every member's home and not to look to maintaining those homes that are only income producing.

7. After the first year all income received from properties will be remitted direct to the owners, wherever they may be residing, unless conditions require otherwise; such as, government restriction on mails, etc; in which case the funds will be held to the owner's credit.

8. Individual books will be maintained for each member and an accounting to each member will be made semi-annually.

9. Mr. Sibley, Mr. Cowen and the accountant will be bonded as a further assurance of faith, and they, as the corporation, will accede to the wishes of the members and the individuals involved. As an example, if a member wishes to sell his home, the corporation is empowered to sell the home, and remit to the original owner the proceeds, after necessary deductions are made; such as, paying off the mortgage, if any, pro-ration of taxes, revenue stamps, upkeep, recording and reasonable management fees in closing the escrow.

10. All individual problems may be presented to the corporation; and the corporation pledges itself to process each case as deemed best advisable and to the best interests of the individual involved.

The initial fee for membership will be based upon the number of homes to be handled by the corporation; such fees will be nominal and will be used to defray the expense of setting up the corporation.

Upon evacuation, the members of the corporation must be called upon to leave their homes in first class renting condition, clean and livable. This will help the corporation a great deal in renting the properties immediately.

Prospective tenants for homes will be interviewed by the corporation and must pass the requirements set up by the corporation; i.e. good character, steady positions, ability to maintain the home and pay rent promptly when due. All rents are payable one month in advance. The corporation will provide members with a printed booklet designed to cover an inventory of all personal property to be left in homes. This inventory must be signed by the tenant before moving in, and the tenant must agree to maintain said personal property in its present condition, allowing for reasonable depreciation. This method will forestall any damage to property, both real and personal, and will entail the least amount of trouble, both present and in the future.

The corporation has succeeded in procuring a strong board fire and automobile insurance board company to adequately protect the property against loss.

Any complaints against the corporation must be presented to a recognized committee composed of J.A.C.L. members who are members of the corporation. After hearing both sides, their decision shall be final.

There is no rail connection between Concord and Byron and a limited bus service. There are about 500 evacuees located in the Concord area which is about twenty-five miles from Byron.

Action taken: Called head office and talked with Mr. Tyler and he stated I should take it up with the Federal Security Administrator here and I ascertained that Mr. Koepke was the representative and I submitted the problem to him for further action. The management at the Byron control center is being handled by the manager of the Hayward office and we know little or nothing about the details.

Storage and Insurance on Personal Property

The Delano Gakuen will be ready in a few days as a place of storage. It may or may not be sufficient to take care of the needs of those who turned in the inventory sheet. We will therefore try first to take care of those who supplied us the necessary information. In the event that there is not a sufficient storage facilities in the Gakuen, Mr. Johnson of the WCCA office assures us that he will arrange for other facilities.

Masao Yano has contacted a local representative of insurance firm, and he states that insurance on your personal property is available at a very nominal rate. To facilitate matters in event of loss, it is suggested that a power of attorney be included with your insurance policy.

Please keep in mind that the Delano Gakuen is not a bonded warehouse and that the Delano JACL is not responsible for any loss.

Please do not take this to be an evacuation order. We are doing this to alleviate any congestion that may occur when the evacuation order comes. And also a few families or persons are anxious to have their property stored.

Suggestions for Storage

1. Do not bring in anything that is necessary up to the date of evacuation; such as, bed, mattress, kitchenware, etc. Try not to separate your personal property.
2. Pack your belongings well. Goods will be piled one on top of another in order to conserve space so objects like glassware should be well padded. Do not use oily rags or wet paper for packing materials.
3. Label your boxes of packages with your name and nature of the contents; such as, "glass", "fragile", "precision instruments", etc. so that they will be handled with care.
4. Furnitures such as straight chairs can be tied together to conserve space. Linoleum and rugs should be rolled up.
5. Refrigerators and ranges need not be crated. Some refrigerators have volatile substances which should be removed.
6. Metallic objects; such as, instruments, cash registers, typewriters, etc., should be oiled or greased to prevent from rusting.
7. Objects to be sent to you later should be well packed or crated for shipping and should be brought in for storage later.
8. Be sure to be able to give a valuation on the articles to be stored. Storage and insurance rates will be given upon request or at the time of storage.
9. Transporting of property at this time must be done by each individual. WCCA office assures us that at the time of evacuation transportation will be furnished but not at this time.



HOW FARM SECURITY IS HELPING IN THE DISPOSITION OF JAPANESE LAND

The Army has established the Wartime Civilian Control Administration to assist Japanese nationals, Japanese American citizens, German, and Italian nationals and others subject to evacuation from the prohibited and restricted areas in Pacific Coast military zones.

The Wartime Civilian Control Administration has established "service centers" at the United States Employment Service offices in more than 60 Pacific Coast cities and towns. These "service centers" have been established to assist the Japanese and others subject to evacuation, with all immediate problems arising from the evacuation order. At each "service center" there are three field agents: one from the Farm Security Administration, one from the Federal Security Agency, and one from the Federal Reserve Bank, representing the U. S. Treasury.

The Farm Security field agent is there to assist Japanese to obtain a fair disposition of his agricultural land, interests and farming operations. They will also assist in finding qualified farmers who can take over evacuated land, and help them in making arrangements to operate the land and to obtain credit. The Federal Reserve Bank agent's job is to help the Japanese to dispose of personal and non-agricultural property. The Social Security agent's job is to help the Japanese with problems of moving, finding employment, financial assistance, etc.

This leaflet explains how the Farm Security Field agent can help you, whether you are a Japanese about to move or a farmer wishing to operate vacated land.

WHAT THE FARM SECURITY AGENT CAN DO TO HELP YOU

The Farm Security agent has several jobs. First, he must encourage the voluntary evacuation of Japanese and others subject to evacuation. Second, he must help the Japanese find a farmer to buy or lease his farming interests, and he must oversee arrangements to be sure that they are fair. Third, he must take steps to see that the vacated land is kept in full production of the crops already planted or for which there is a war need. He will help farmers taking over the land to obtain credit, and if they are unable to obtain operating capital, under certain circumstances he will make loans to them.

The Army is desirous that all Japanese contact the Wartime Civilian Control Administration before making any final arrangements to dispose of their property. The Army also wishes all farmers interested in operating vacated land to make their arrangements through the "service centers". The Army wants to encourage the speedy voluntary evacuation of Japanese, but the Army also demands that the Japanese get a "square deal" and that the vacated land be kept in production of war crops.

SOME ANSWERS TO YOUR QUESTIONS

The following questions and answers will help you determine if and how you can be assisted by the Farm Security field agent at the WCCA "service centers" at Pacific Coast U. S. Employment offices.

IF YOU ARE A JAPANESE OR OTHER FARMER PROPOSING TO VOLUNTARILY EVACUATE YOUR LAND YOU WILL BE INTERESTED IN KNOWING THE ANSWERS TO THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS:

Q. 1. How much time do I have in which to dispose of my property before evacuating?

A. 1. This has not been determined, but it is very short. You should report immediately to the WCCA "service center" at your nearest U. S. Employment office. Otherwise you may be forced to abandon your property before being able to properly dispose of it. Those voluntarily evacuating will be in much better shape than those who do not do so.

Q. 2. How can I dispose of my property when I don't know where I am going or what will happen to me?

A. 2. The Army's Civilian Control Administration, through the Federal Security and Federal Reserve Bank and their agents, is working as fast as possible to complete plans for helping you move and relocating you. However, the evacuation must take place very soon, and if you wait to find out just where you are going or how other matters will be handled, it will very likely be too late. You know you must move, so you must start making arrangements to dispose of your farming interests right now. That means today, if possible.

Q. 3. Where are the best areas for me to go to?

A. 3. The government has men in the field locating sites for you. Families and small groups may move now and find new sites without government approval. At present the induction centers and reception centers are not open to those evacuating voluntarily. The War Relocation Authority under Mr. Milton M. Eisenhower will have charge of relocation of those forced to evacuate and who are sent to reception centers, but this agency is not now providing for those voluntarily evacuating. The U. S. Employment Service will help you find employment.

Q. 4. Are any other persons, organizations or government agencies authorized to help me dispose of my farming operations?

A. 4. The Farm Security Agent at the U. S. Employment office is the only government agent authorized to do this job. He may refer you to other government agencies. If you have made or are considering making arrangements with private persons you should seek the advice of the Farm Security Agent.

Q. 5. Do I need any intermediary, lawyer or third person to help me?

A. 5. No. You can deal direct with the Farm Security field agent.

Q. 6. Will the agent help me lease, sub lease or sell land and equipment?

A. 6. Yes. He is authorized to take any steps necessary to keep the land in production.

Q. 7. Will the Farm Security field agent see that I get a fair price for my land, equipment or operations?

A. 7. The Farm Security agent is instructed to see that you get a fair price. He will have a Federal appraiser look at your land to determine its fair value.

Q. 8. Will the Farm Security agent help me get reimbursement for what I have already put into the land?

A. 8. Yes. He will make every effort to see you are reimbursed for your time, effort and money put into growing crops.

Q. 9. Can I take my equipment with me?

A. 9. This has not been entirely decided, but will probably depend to a great extent on the individual case. If you know where you are going and have a place to farm, the chances are you can take your equipment. If you do not, and the equipment is needed to keep the land in production, you may have to arrange to dispose of it to the new operator. The Farm Security agent also can arrange to store your equipment until you are able to use it.

Q. 10. If I want to arrange to work as a laborer in the Internountain sugar beet area or elsewhere, should I make arrangements through the Farm Security agent?

A. 10. Such arrangements should be made through the Federal Security agent at the U. S. Employment office. If you are already negotiating for such work, you should seek the Federal Security agent's help. This is necessary in order to determine what working conditions prevail and whether the prevailing wage for that area is being paid.

Q. 11. Is there any chance I can obtain government assistance at wherever I relocate?

A. 11. Yes, if you are an American citizen, it may be possible to obtain a regular Farm Security rural rehabilitation loan, or loan from some other government agency. Loans cannot be made to aliens.

Q. 12. Do I have any protection against individuals who are trying to buy my land at ridiculously low prices, or to defraud me by making false pretenses?

A. 12. Yes. If you make your arrangements through the "service center" you will be given every possible protection. The Government, the Army and the State of California has promised to take action against any person attempting to cheat you. You should report such attempts, giving the name of the person, the time and place they approached you to the agent at the service center. If you have witnesses to such attempts, their names should also be given to the agent as they come in.

Q. 13. Do I absolutely have to dispose of my property, even if it means getting cheated of taking a heavy loss?

A. 13. You do not necessarily have to dispose of your property. The Farm Security agent can aid you in arranging for the custodianship of your property if it cannot be fairly disposed of.

Q. 14. Can the Farm Security agent assist me in matters arising from the fact that I have bank loan or mortgage payments due?

A. 14. Yes. Take the matter to the agent.

Q. 15. Will the FSH aid in disposing of greenhouses and fishing enterprises?

A. 15. No. These fall under the jurisdiction of the Federal Reserve representative.

Q. 16. What can I do to help my people now?

A. 16. Go to the "service center" at the U. S. Employment office and find out what the agents there can do for you. Then tell your friends and those who will be affected by the evacuation order.

4. Farm equipments--value and the method of disposal.
5. Farm land and real property--value and methods of disposal.

Bargain Hunters Warned; U. S. Will Store Alien Goods

SAN FRANCISCO, March 28.—

The Western Civil Control Administration warned tonight that any person "taking advantage of the perplexed state of mind of Japanese evacuees" to defraud them of property will be prosecuted by the department of justice.

The WCAA said it has received reports Japanese, facing a "freezing order" Sunday night, are hurrying to dispose of their fishing gear, household effects, refrigerators, washing machines and other property.

The WCAA said it had arranged for storing property of evacuees prior to issuance of exclusion order.

"Warehouse space is being acquired and all nonperishable goods properly crated will be stored," said the WCAA. "Information regarding storage and storage regulations can be obtained by Japanese at any of the sixty-four WCAA service offices established along the Pacific Coast."

Lieutenant General John L. DeWitt, commanding general of the western defense command, said no Japanese need sacrifice any personal property of value. He added:

"If he cannot dispose of it at a fair price he will have opportunity to store it prior to the time he is forced to evacuate by exclusion order."



We have heard that the War Department has made arrangements for the storage of Japanese owned property; that is, provide storage spaces. We understand that these places will be designated by the War Dep't. In regards to such places, inasmuch as no such places have been yet designated, we have a suggestion to make.

We have in Lodi two places that might be used as storage places. To be definite these are the Lodi Japanese Hall and the Buddhist Church at 25 N. Stockton St., and 23 N. Stockton St. Because of the fact that no provision have been made as yet, the Japanese people are undecided as to the disposition of their goods. We offer these places to you, if it is advisable to your office. We have conferred with Mr. Weeks of the Fed. Reserve in the Stockton JCCA office regarding such a move.

The insurances on these two buildings have been cancelled recently; but we felt that thru the good graces of your offices such insurance may be taken out again. We also felt that in the event that these places are used as storage the individual persons storing their goods might be able to pay pro rata on the insurance.

In the event that these particulars can be taken care of thru your offices, kindly let us know at your earliest convenience. We feel that a early settlement of these matters will be conducive to the facilitation of the evacuation program.

Reference is made to your letter dated March 18, 1942 referring to the Alien Property Custodianship.

We are endeavoring to meet all problems which arise in connection with the equitable disposition of their properties by evacuees, and it is believed that the Field Offices which have been and are being established, will be able to extend greater assistance as time goes on.

So far as the Alien Property Custodianship operation is concerned, this bank is not acting in that capacity, but is exercising the duties delegated to it to assist evacuees from the recently established "military areas" in arranging for the proper and satisfactory disposition of their property holdings. No office of the Alien Property Custodian has been established on this coast locally as yet, so far as we know.

That portion of your letter referring to the Yokohama Specie Bank will be otherwise answered.

We are forwarding a copy of your communication and our reply to our Los Angeles Branch and to the San Diego Field Office which is being established at 1165 Front Street in that city.

Dear Mr. Armstrong:

I would like to know what provisions can be made to release the accounts of depositors in the Yokohama Specie Bank in Los Angeles who can be classified under general license 68A.

Certainly there must be some method to classify the block accounts from the others, and these people in the latter group be able to draw on their accounts directly or thru some other bank in this locality. Many people are in difficulties because of the prevailing conditions and I believe it is order that your office or the Treasury Department help in this case.

Even if affidavits must be required it would clarify the problem, and you would be doing service in easing the tension financially and otherwise. Evacuation is in order, and I am sure that the government wishes to see these people move on their own, but how can they accomplish this under the present circumstances.

As you may know, the Japanese people would like to move on their own if possible, they do not like to get the help of social agencies on the whole. The money is there, why not let them use it?

I beg for you immediate consideration on this matter and would appreciate a reply.

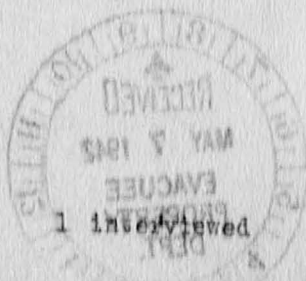

Yesterday Guy B. Curtis of Monterey, one of the City Councilmen, came over here and I took him out to the Reception Center at the Salinas Rodeo Grounds with the permission of the Camp Manager, Mr. E. A. Rose, in order to obtain the signature to a Power of Attorney from the Monterey J.A.C.L. to Curtis so that Curtis could take charge of and manage their real estate holding in the City of Monterey.

We obtained the signature and had the same witnessed by a notary there so that now this property should be properly taken care of. Kaz Oka is the president of the organization and Geo. Nakaji Secretary. I do not have a list of all the directors but they met and passed a resolution directing the president and secretary to give the Power of Attorney to Curtis.





So, today we are preparing to go into temporary exile from the homes in which we were born and raised, or which we have purchased through the small income that we have saved--the very foundation of which has taken years to build.

In our darkest hour, we are grateful to find that we still have friends who have faith in our loyalty, ability and sincerity in serving this great country of ours. Our friends, even though under pressure, have remained true to us when we need them most. They have furnished us with the courage and strength to retain our self-respect and to continue to have faith in the noble ideals upon which this country has been founded. At this time, we wish to salute and thank our friends who have helped us until the last minute. Ever since the declaration of war, we have been grateful to our federal government for the fairness with which our case has been managed. We are glad that we can become the wards of our government for the duration. We have been assured of humane treatment and full protection of our property rights. As patriotic citizens and law-abiding residents, we are willing to place our future into the hands of the federal government. Both the President and General DeWitt, the military commander of this area, have made it clear that everything possible will be done for our welfare.

We are leaving cheerfully and willingly, secure in the belief that our acquiescence to military order is in the best interest of national security. No matter what we may do, wherever we may go, we shall always maintain faith in our government and our self-respect. We shall keep our chins up despite all the traversities being committed upon our good name and rights. We are gladly cooperating because this is one way of showing our loyalty and sincerity. So, today we are preparing to go into temporary exile from the homes in which we were born and raised, or which we have purchased through the small income that we have saved--the very foundation of which has taken years to build.

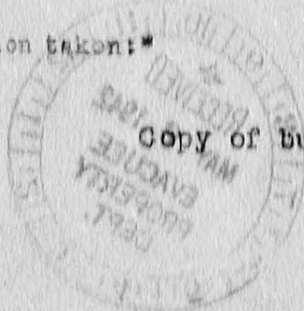

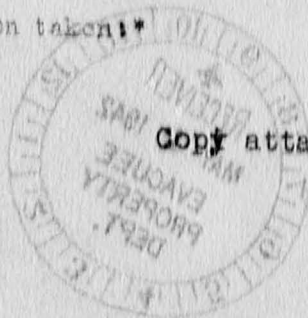

1. Evacuation date has not been officially given out by the government as yet but according to all indications and unofficial reports, eventual evacuation is nearing every day.
 2. Get your business and other affairs in shape so that you can leave for camp on short notice.
 3. If you have cars or trucks to sell, list them with the JACL office so that we may assist you in selling or disposing of them.
 4. STORAGE
According to the latest WCCA report, the local warehouses that we have planned for you for storage of your household goods and furniture is only temporary. After each item and parcel is numbered and marked, they are to be stored in a government warehouse. At present there are three such temporary warehouses available; namely, the Loomis Japanese hall, Penryn Japanese hall, and one of the fruit house sheds in Newcastle which is to be named in the near future. If there are any questions regarding this matter of storage, kindly feel free to call at the JACL office for further information.
 5. TO THOSE THAT HAVE CREMATION ASHES TO DISPOSE OF
The Placer JACL and the Buddhist Church have arranged to build a monument in the Newcastle cemetery to store them. For further details, kindly call at this office.
 6. MEDICAL CASES
Your immediate attention should be given to any bedridden or seriously ill person prior to evacuation. If you have not already done so, kindly report these cases to this office so that we may be able to register them with the WCCA office.
 7. According to present information, the taking of cars to temporary assembly centers will be allowed. (Depending upon which assembly center this area is allotted.)
 8. PROCEDURE AT TIME OF EVACUATION
When definite order of evacuation is given by the Army, a responsible member of each family and each individual living alone affected by that exclusion order will report to a designated Civil Control Station established in this area. At this control station, each family is registered and given a number for identification purposes. This number will be used for storage purposes and all other purposes for the duration of the temporary evacuation. Medical examinations as well as definite information and instructions will be given relative to evacuation.

10. Essential items to take (suggested)
Evacuees must carry with them on departure for the assembly center, the following property:
 - (a) Bedding and linens (no mattresses) for each member of family. Get duffel bags if possible.

 - (c) Extra clothing for each member of the family.
 - (d) Sufficient knives, forks, spoons, plates, bowls and cups for each member of the family.

Dear Sir:

I was in your Portland office this morning to find out about protection as to fire insurance for our dwellings and businesses that we are leaving behind. As you know, all insurance companies cancelled out liability insurance and automobiles and plate glass on all establishments occupied by Japanese immediately after the outbreak of the war. Consequently, the majority of us have been without protection.

As in the case of plate glass, the insurance companies immediately cancelled all risks in the establishments occupied by Japanese after three or four plate glass claims came into their offices. I am afraid, or rather, I am certain that the insurance companies will do likewise if one or two of the buildings of the Japanese should burn by arson or accident, and we would be without any means of protection.

Please let me know immediately what your office can arrange for us to protect these properties, so that we can make proper arrangements in accordance with your answer.

Yesterday, Guy S. Curtis of Monterey, one of the City Councilmen, came over here and I took him out to the Reception Center at the Salinas Rodeo Grounds with the permission of the Camp Manager, Mr. E. A. Rose, in order to obtain the signature to a Power of Attorney from the Monterey J.A. C. L. to Curtis so that Curtis could take charge of and manage their real estate holding in the City of Monterey.

We obtained the signature and had the same witnessed by a notary there so that now this property should be properly taken care of. Kaz Gka is the president of the organization and Geo. Nakaji Secretary. I do not have a list of all the directors but they met and passed a resolution directing the president and secretary to give the Power of Attorney to Curtis.

The real estate and improvements in Monterey are clear of encumbrances, as I understand it, and the only expenses will be for taxes, insurance and upkeep. There should be no difficulty in renting the property for more than that.

It is possible that the Coast Guard may want it and it is also possible that the Boy Scouts may want it.

Dear Sir:

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter dated March 12, 1942, inquiring as to our activity with respect to the property problems of evacuees from the recently designated "military areas", and with respect to the particular problem of a Japanese American citizen cafe owner.

In the conduct of our program of assistance to evacuees we expect to call upon all banks in the military areas to extend assistance in their own localities, not in the capacity of agent of this bank but on their own account in behalf of the persons in their localities affected by the recent Public Proclamation.

In the matter of the disposition by the cafe owner of his property holdings, it would appear that the individual you mentioned is in a position to dispose of his property on his own account, but that while he desires to sell the physical property, at the same time he wishes to retain ownership of the "on sale" licenses which he now owns. As it is possible that the licenses have a direct relationship to the property, we are inclined to question the practicability of a sale of the property without the transfer of his license interests. It would undoubtedly be desirable to contact the State Board of Equalization direct in order to determine whether it would be possible to effect a sale on such a basis. That agency will at the same time be able to advise you as to its policy with respect to licenses to persons of Japanese ancestry.

With respect to the matter of custodianship of the licenses on the part of this bank, while due consideration can be given to the acceptance of agencies from evacuees, by this bank if circumstances so warrant, the practical aspects of the matter you mention would seem to be of first importance.

Offices of this bank have been established in the I. N. Van Nuys Building, 707 South Spring Street, Los Angeles, California, which will be available to assist you in the event that you desire addition-

I had the pleasure of hearing Mr. Herbert D. Armstrong who spoke before us at the recent National Japanese American Citizens League Council meeting held in San Francisco. It was pointed out to us that the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco was to become the property conservator. Is it true that a bank in San Diego will be appointed to act in that capacity?

A Japanese American citizen is the owner of two cafes that have an "on sale hard liquor license and an "on sale beer and wine" license. He wishes to transfer the sale of the licenses because of the value attached to the licenses as an asset, valuing \$4,000.00, the buyers will not consider the transaction without the inclusion of the said licenses as part of the property. These licenses are not only highly valuable but are issued only to recommended concerns. Since he wishes to keep the licenses if possible he asked me if it would be possible for the Federal Reserve Bank to act in the capacity of a custodian for the duration of the war. Also it is rumored that the State Board of Equalization is suspending the licenses of American citizens of Japanese ancestry. Do you have any information to confirm such a report?

Gentlemen:

Reference is made to your Instruction Letter No. 12 of April 4, 1942 referring to Personal Property. Storage in Salinas is going to be expensive and not very easy to obtain.

It appears likely that there will be very little storage required from Monterey Peninsula or Castroville due to previous evacuations so that you probably may find it best to bring what little there is from those 2 areas to a central point here.

Yesterday, T. Kadani, R.1, Bx 11, San Juan, representing the Evacuee Program for San Benito County came in with George Nishita R.1, Bx 9, San Juan farmer and also trustee of the old Japanese school at San Juan which is now used as a hall. This is a stucco building, 30' x 90' with 10' ceiling as reported to me, with a gravel and tar paper roof, situated in San Juan near the convent on First Street which is a paved street. It has large double doors on main street and 1 door on each side.

These boys brought in a clipping from a San Francisco newspaper stating that arrangements had been made with the W.C.C.A. in Sacramento to use a church there for storage by the Government, and they wanted to offer their property at this time with the hope it would be accepted as suitable and used for storage under Government supervision and care for the duration.

It is stated this building is large enough to care for all of San Benito County personal property that the Japanese people may want to store there. The taxes on the building at the present time are about \$50 a year and if this amount could be paid to the trustees, they would be glad to lease the building to

the Government for the duration for evacuee property storage under Government protection.

They ask that an answer be given them as soon as possible so that the people will know whether to prepare their property for Government storage there or allow certain ones to store there privately. These San Juan people report about 80 families in the county and of course, if this proposed location were chosen, it would not be necessary to use any other location in the county such as Hollister.

If you have decided to only have one storage place in this territory, it would appear that Salinas is the logical choice.

Re: Storage of personal and business furniture

The Evacuee Property Department of the Federal Reserve Bank, responsible for the proper disposition of property left in evacuated areas, announced that definite arrangements for the storage of personal furniture and business equipment at government's expense is being arranged.

The definite arrangement will not be known until the evacuation order for the affected area is released by the Army, at which time, the warehouse depot and the arrangements for the pickup by Army trucks will also be known.

All such furniture stored by the Army will be at the owner's risk, it was stressed.

In the second phase of this problem, the War Relocation Authority may make some announcement whereby our essential furniture needed in the resettlement zones may be forwarded to us when called for, for which some mutual arrangements may be necessary.

For these reasons, it was stressed by National JACL Headquarters that no unnecessary sales and disposal be indulged in by our people. Contact your nearest WCCA offices for further developments along this line.

Remember that it costs much more to purchase comparable furniture and equipment than the price which second-hand dealers will pay you.

Remain calm. Keep up your courage and maintain your perspective.

Reports that Japanese and Japanese Americans, facing a "freezing order" tomorrow (Sunday) night, and evacuation under Army control, were rushing to dispose of their fishing gear, household effects, refrigerators, washing machines and other property, today brought two statements from the Wartime Civil Control Administration:

1. Stern warning from Tom C. Clark, chief of the WCCA civilian staff, and special assistant to the Attorney General, that any person taking advantage of the perplexed state of mind of the evacuees to defraud them of property will be prosecuted by the Department of Justice.

2. Statement from the WCCA that arrangements have been made for storing the property of the evacuees prior to issuance of exclusion orders. Warehouse space is being acquired, and all non-perishable goods properly crated will be stored. Information regarding storage and storage regulations can be obtained by Japanese at any of the 64 WCCA service offices established along the Pacific Coast. These offices are staffed with experts prepared to facilitate the closing of all personal and property affairs of Japanese in an equitable manner prior to their exclusion.

ALIENS

Lieutenant General J. L. DeWitt stated the Wartime Civil Control Administration will provide for the storage of evacuees' household furniture and non-perishable stocks of goods.

"Storage space will be available for the storage of household furniture and properly crated stocks of non-perishable goods prior to the time when any Japanese exclusion orders will be issued," General DeWitt said, "Provision will be made for instructing each person desiring to avail himself of storage space as to how to proceed. Information regarding storage space and regulations can be obtained by Japanese at any of the 64 WCCA service offices established along the Pacific Coast, in or near each Japanese Colony."

Commenting in reports of Japanese panic and forced sales, General DeWitt said: "No Japanese need sacrifice any personal property of value. If he cannot dispose of it at a fair price, he will have opportunity to store it prior to the time he is forced to evacuate by Exclusion Order. Persons who attempt to take advantage of Japanese evacuees by trying to obtain property at sacrifice prices are un-Americans, unfair, and are deserving only of the severest censure."

"Evacuation of Japanese from Military Area No. 1 is a military necessity, but I insist that it shall be accomplished with the maximum duty of fairness, consistent with rapid and orderly accomplishment of the objective. I counsel and advise all Japanese to await official orders, to be calm, law-abiding, and to prepare themselves for the coming evacuation by taking advantage of the property protection services offered them."

"Japanese who know of these services owe a duty to advise other Japanese to take early action to prepare for evacuation, and tell them that for such personal property of value as cannot be sold at a fair price, storage will be available."

PUBLIC PROCLAMATION NO. 5
March 30, 1942

TO: The people within the States of Washington, Oregon, California, Montana, Idaho, Nevada, Utah and Arizona, and the Public Generally:

WHEREAS, by Public Proclamation No. 1, dated March 2, 1942, this headquarters, there were designated and established Military Areas Nos. 1 and 2 and Zones thereof, and

WHEREAS, by Public Proclamation No. 2, dated March 16, 1942, this headquarters, there were designated and established Military Areas Nos. 3, 4, 5 and 6 and Zones thereof, and

WHEREAS, the present situation within these Military Areas and Zones requires as a matter of military necessity the establishment of certain regulations, as set forth hereinafter:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, J. L. DeWitt, Lieutenant General, U. S. Army, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the President of the United States and by the Secretary of War and my powers and prerogatives as Commanding General, Western Defense Command, do hereby declare and establish the following regulations covering the conduct to be observed by all alien Japanese, all alien Germans, all alien Italians, and all persons of Japanese ancestry residing or being within the Military Areas above described:

Prior to and during the period of exclusion and evacuation of certain persons or classes of persons from prescribed Military Areas and Zones, persons otherwise subject thereto but who come within one or more of the classes specified in (a), (b), (c), (d), (e) and (f), below, may make written application for exemption from such exclusion and evacuation. Application Form WDC-FM 5 has been prepared for that purpose and copies thereof may be procured from any United States Post Office or United States Employment Service office in the Western Defense Command by persons who deem themselves entitled exemption.

The following classes of persons are hereby authorized to be exempted from exclusion and evacuation upon the furnishing of satisfactory proof as specified in Form WDC-FM 5:

- (a) German and Italian aliens seventy or more years of age.
- (b) In the case of German and Italian aliens, the parent, wife, husband, child of (or other person who resides in the household and whose support is wholly dependent upon) an officer, enlisted man or commissioned nurse on active duty in the Army of the United States (or any component thereof), U. S. Navy, U. S. Marine Corps, or U. S. Coast Guard.
- (c) In the case of German and Italian aliens, the parent, wife, husband, child of (or other person who resides in the household and whose support is wholly dependent upon) an officer, enlisted man or commissioned nurse who on or since December 7, 1941, died in line of duty with the armed services of the United States indicated in the preceding subparagraph.
- (d) German and Italian aliens awaiting naturalization who had filed a petition for naturalization and who had paid the filing fee therefor in a court of competent jurisdiction on or before December 7, 1941.

- (e) Patients in hospital, or confined elsewhere, and too ill or incapacitated to be removed therefrom without danger to life.
- (f) Inmates of orphanages and the totally deaf, dumb or blind.

The applicant for exemption will be required to furnish the kinds of proof specified in Form WDC-FM 5 in support of the application. The certificate of exemption from evacuation will also include exemption from compliance with curfew regulations, subject, however, to such future proclamations or orders in the premises as may from time to time be issued by this headquarters. The person to whom such exemption from evacuation and curfew has been granted shall thereafter be entitled to reside in any portion of any prohibited area, including those areas heretofore declared prohibited by the Attorney General of the United States.

Dear Mr. Armstrong:

This is to confirm our telephone conversation of this afternoon regarding the disposition of furniture of Japanese evacuees.

With the proclamation freezing all travel as of Sunday midnight March 29th, we would say that about 10 percent of San Francisco's 5000 Japanese have and are planning to evacuate "voluntarily" by the deadline and these people have been able to dispose of their furniture in some way or another.

The problem at hand is this: The remaining Japanese population in waiting for definite evacuation order from the government recognizes that under army supervision no furniture and personal belongings other than our bare necessities will be permitted to be brought with us. The problem then is that of the disposition of such furniture and personal property.

From the activities in this community in the last few days, we fear too many of these people, without adequate and immediate assurances from the government to date, are selling most of their furniture at "give-away" prices. It is acknowledged that in the time of relocation and resettlement, such furniture as we now have will be of inestimable value and of essential need. It is our understanding that the War Relocation Authority are now considering some measure to make it possible to transport these essential furniture.

Our chapter is conducting its first meeting of the whole Japanese community Sunday afternoon at our headquarters, and at that time we wish to give adequate assurances that the government has definite intentions of providing some means whereby storage and forwarding will be anticipated so that the selling and throwing away of essential pieces will not continue. It is imperative for our organization to be firm in asking that the people still hold on to such basic articles as stoves, refrigerators, beds, tables, chairs, etc., so that every effort in relocation and resettlement can be facilitated with the least expense to the government.

Mr. Tani wishes to send a letter to about 100 members who are in the cleaning business in re. their problems. These people are retail cleaners - send their cleaning to wholesalers and do their own pressing, etc. equipment averages \$1000 - \$3000 in value.

1. - They would like to sell as a going business. If they obtain a cash buyer they will have no trouble. If the prospective buyer must pay in installments how can they be sure he will continue to pay after they have gone?
2. - If they can't sell where can they store equipment; how can they arrange to sell ^{it} at leisure; and could they arrange to hold it for later shipment? Will the Evacuee Dept. take care of those who have no money?
3. - Is Evacuee Dept. equipped to take over these problems?

Action taken:*

1. Advised securing a firm contract & placing in hands of attorney or bank to watch and inform.
2. Store equip^t in warehouse, or with associates who are remaining. Continued selecting of store in which complete confidence could be placed. This source could then arrange for sale, shipment, etc. - or could solicit a bank or attorney or friend in advance. Those who cannot arrange or finance storage should consult us after exhausting all measures - we may be able to assist, but have made no definite provisions.

SUBJECT: REPORT ON MEETING WITH JAPANESE AMERICAN CITIZENS LEAGUE
THURSDAY EVENING, MARCH 19, 1942.

In response to a request from Mr. Tani, Secretary of the J.A.C.L., for a representative from the Evacuee Property Department to be present at the League's weekly meeting, I was so delegated by our Mr. Armstrong with instructions to advise the League as to our recent activities and to try to answer as many questions as possible. HRA

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P. M. and, after being somewhat eloquently introduced and presented by the chairman, I assumed the "chair" and proceeded in chronological order to tell briefly of our departmental developments and progress (as briefly noted below).

1. A general background dealing with various points of interest and importance.
2. The coordination of the Federal Securities Agency, Farm Securities Administration, and the Evacuee Property Department.
3. The establishment of field agencies.
4. A reading of and a short explanation of special regulation No. 1 relating to transactions in "Special Blocked Property".

Upon completion of the above, an informal discussion was entered into and questions of every sort and nature (and I mean just that) were directed to me. A great many of the questions, to the full extent of my abilities and limitations, I believe, were answered with dispatch and to the satisfaction of the questioners. However, many hypothetical questions and those embracing legal problems, etc., were, I trust and hope, tactfully "evaded". Naturally, many questions of an overlapping nature, however, directly pertaining to the general evacuation program such as the movement of farm implements, Social Security unemployment benefit, etc., were not directly answered but in each case the questioner was advised as to the proper department to apply for such information. (As to questions of removal of farm implements to districts outside of prohibited and restricted areas, it was suggested that no such movement be attempted without full sanction of the Farm Securities Administration Department. I, of course, had reason to believe that the Government most likely would have direct use for such implements but it was a matter entirely outside of our own department so, naturally, gave no direct answer.)

Upon the completion of these so-called "questions and answers", I was thanked and applauded by the assembly. Recess was called and I believe from that moment on "open season" was declared upon me. I am taking time and space to recall and list a few things of importance that came in that sudden and furious barrage which started by the signal of recess. Some of these questions do not pertain directly to our department but are of great importance and of much concern to the Japanese evacuees and therefore are truly worthy of listing.

1. In reference to Special Blocked Property:
 - (a) Will property be allowed to remain open?
 - (b) Can business as usual be conducted when property is known as special blocked property?
 - (c) Similar to No. (b) above, what is the status of said property during the period of time elapsed from time petition is entered until time the license is granted? Can property be considered operative during that time?
2. Eligibility as to unemployment insurance payments. (This was partially answered by referring interested parties to contact proper agency. However, it was claimed by several that such an attempt had already been made and that in each instance the issue had been side-stepped.)
3. The question as to a generally licensed evacuee making a private sale of a tractor or other farm equipment. Should it not be classified the same as making a private sale of an automobile or any other similar type of property? (This could not be directly answered because of the fact that it embraced a problem dealing with agriculture and I did not feel qualified nor authorized to tell them that undoubtedly some special arrangements would have to be made with any and all heavy farm implements.)
4. The question arose as to clarification of the various banks' attitude towards evacuees (in particular those of Japanese ancestry).
 - (a) A special case was mentioned in which the branch manager of the American Trust Company in Berkeley purposely excited a great many of the Japanese by telling them that he had reason to believe they were to be evacuated within the next twenty-four hours, and that they had better come in and settle up their affairs immediately. It was further stated that some of the branch banks of the Bank of America had been entirely uncooperative and such facts would like to be brought to our attention.

After completion of the above impromptu session, I had the privilege of meeting Mr. ~~Kito~~^{Abiko} of the Japanese American News. Mr. ~~Kito~~^{Abiko} stated that a great many of the Japanese people returned from our office feeling that they had not received a great deal in the way of advice or help and that we were merely trying to get rid of them as soon as possible and in so doing referred them to various private and domestic institutions, agencies, etc. To use his own words, Mr. ~~Kito~~^{Abiko} said that the people were of the belief that they were getting "the run-around". I believe I fully explained the matter to Mr. ~~Kito~~^{Abiko} in a satisfactory manner, stating that he undoubtedly referred to the first few days of our inception and at that particular time we were not wholly prepared to meet the situation and that since that time developments have taken place which have been more complete and progressive. I believe after explaining to Mr. Kito that through the coordination of the three departments and with a few people of Japanese ancestry now handling the counter, would be found more to the liking of the evacuees.

~~Abiko~~

Mr. ~~Kito~~ strongly suggested that at all times we feel free to call upon his publication in behalf of their services for anything which might contribute towards the furthering of cooperation in the evacuation movement. He suggested that most of the older Japanese found it difficult to accept advice from those who were their junior and he believed it would be possible in many instances to pass on information to these older people via the press. He further suggested the possibility of publishing (both in Japanese and in English) in his paper a list of questions and answers which might be useful to a great many of his people. This suggestion received my wholehearted approval and I wish to go definitely on record as stating that such a procedure should to all intents and purposes prove beneficial to our department, as well as to the people for whom it is intended.

With proper authorization by the department, I am sure that this matter can be handled with very little difficulty.

As to a general summary, I believe that a great deal was accomplished by the meeting and that the cooperation of the J. A. C. L. is to be highly commended. I am happy to have been able to serve in my humble capacity and trust that my representation was worthy of the department.

MONDAY, MARCH 9, 1942

Meeting was called to order at 2:00 P.M. by President Saburo Kido.

Pledge of allegiance was led by Mr. Ken Matsumoto.

Roll call of 66 chapters disclosed the following absent.

Santa Barbara

Mr. Saburo Kido, National President, said that this was one of the best representations that we have ever had since the organization began to function in 1930.

SPECIAL GUEST SPEAKERS

No members from the floor were permitted to ask questions directly to the speakers, but they were given the opportunity to hand in questions to the committee, who in turn, if of vital importance, presented same to speakers. Mr. Kido said that ever since the outbreak of the war we have been under pressure from one source or another, but was glad that the Federal Government understands our side of the case, and today has given us this opportunity of discussing the evacuation problems with them.

Miko Masaoka, National Secretary and Field Executive, read the following telegram from Rev. K. M. Kimata, field executive of the Buddhist Church of America: "May you have successful conference. 40,000 citizens, Buddhists, pledge full support to JACL." A similar telegram from the General Council of Japanese Christian Church Federations of North America, Northwest, Northern California, and Southern California, and Young Peoples Christian Conference, was also read. He further stated before introducing Col. McGill, Provost Marshall, Western Defense Command, General DeWitt's Staff, that the JACL is the only National organization of American citizens of Japanese ancestry, and expressed to the delegates of the pledge of sincerity and loyalty to this country in the United States.

Colonel W. F. McGill expressed that they have some problems which are mutual, particularly his responsibility of carrying out evacuation problems on certain designated areas from the Pacific Coast. If they can meet on common grounds, there will be less difficulty. He explained that there might be some distortions of General DeWitt's order by the people of outlying districts. However, General DeWitt insisted that the evacuation problem would be handled in the most humane way possible, and the property would also be protected in a similar way. There will be no evacuation order by the military authority until the machinery is set up to care for properties. He also added that we can expect the rights respected of all citizens in that regard, and Federal Government aid will be given if necessary. General DeWitt has issued several press releases to continue farming as well as maintenance in care of your property. They will not be asked to move until they are given opportunity to dispose of their agricultural equipment.

Mr. Thomas C. Clark, Alien Coordinator and Chairman, Civilian Committee on Evacuation, Western Defense Command was introduced but had nothing to say, except that he would attempt to answer any questions.

Mr. Herbert D. Armstrong representing the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco confirmed Colonel McGill's statements. He stated that the Federal Reserve Bank has been delegated the obligation of assisting all evacuees in handling their property problems. The situation is not just in San Francisco but also covers facilities in Seattle, Portland and Los Angeles. However, to what extent the program of accommodating the evacuees in those cities has been worked out is not known at the present time, but he stated he would do the best to help the council in that line.

Mr. Nobu T. Kawai, delegate from Pasadena, Calif., acting as interlocutor requested as many solutions as possible to questions asked to take back to the

respective communities. Questions posed by the council and replies given by the special guests listed above were as follows:

Q. Would it be possible for the Federal Government to buy or lease some areas in certain outlying districts for the evacuees?

(Clark) A. We have 2 projects like that now in Owen's Valley, about 8000 acres tentatively near Colorado River. Near Ellyth. 100,000 acres that we intend to make available for farming during the duration of the war.

Q. Will the evacuees be given special return permits to look after their personal property?

(Clark) A. That is entirely up to the military.

Q. After the evacuees are investigated, will they be allowed to come back and engage in or be employed in any business enterprise?

(Clark) A. That matter has to be worked out by the Federal Reserve Bank, but there will be a problem that they will be trying to work out to the interest of everyone.

Q. What will be the maximum amount of personal and business equipment which the Federal Government will transport for us?

(Clark) A. I do not think I am in a position to answer that. It has not been worked out.

Q. Will the Federal Government declare a moratorium on personal and real property?

(Clark) A. That is a matter for the Federal Reserve Bank to work out. I don't think they are in a position to answer that yet. There is a possibility of a moratorium. Just got here yesterday. It takes time to work this thing out, although we are working day and night. The Government is really interested in this matter. The Federal Reserve Bank will do everything within its power to protect you in your property rights. I think you are very fortunate in having the strong arm of the Government to give service to you free of charge to you in this emergency. I might say just one additional thing. The Federal Reserve Bank, acting as agent of the U. S. Treasury, will endeavor in every way to solve the various problems as they arise. Undoubtedly, the way to proceed and the best way to get results and to accomplish this more expeditiously and to the best interest of all concerned is some voluntary plan of cooperation in which the lines are drawn. I believe it can be satisfactorily worked out. As additional problems arise, we'll solve them too.

Q. Will farmers be reimbursed for their crops?

(Clark) A. I do not know what will be done, but, certainly some steps will have to be taken to protect the crops. That is something that will have to be done as part of the general programming. The idea is to try to put a stop to this forced sale and sacrifice of property, but don't think in a minute the Government will step in and buy your crops, however, you keep your crops in good shape.

Q. Another question on the same line. We have a lot of farmers depending on seeding and fertilization of crops. Several of these farmers are willing to put seeds in provided that they can get some kind of financial aid, and these people would like to know if the Government will help them through loans and through financial aid. If they do not put in the crop because of lack of finance, they will be looked upon as saboteurs.

(Armstrong) A. I know of no Government agency that has been set up especially for that purpose. Ordinarily certain types of credits are available from the Federal Land Bank. What their policy is as to this particular problem. I cannot tell you. Might go on a little further to say that the Dept. of Agriculture will be available for providing such assistance. I don't think it can handle the general problems involved. (That would seem to be one of your problems.)

(Clark) Q. Can businessmen be expected to carry on their respective business in camp?

(clerk) A. We have been trying to work that out. The Social Security Office will issue emergency permits. It may be that we can work out some more flexible and suitable means. If you have any suggestions, let us know.

Q. Will federal aid be in the form of loans or outright relief?

(clerk) A. This new problem will be a matter for the Social Security Office to work out. In the past, only 140 people out of 8000 asked for assistance. I think that is quite a fine record for you. I think that shows your people are a type that want to carry on for themselves.

Q. Are these people evacuating on Government order or by choice?

(clerk) A. Under orders of the military authorities.

Q. If the people use their present assets for evacuation purposes, they will have no funds with which to reestablish themselves. Therefore, will the Government foot the expenses of evacuation?

(McGill) A. I think you are asking for too much, and that is not good for you.

Q. Is there any possibility that a sudden change will occur and that we will be told to evacuate in a few days as in Terminal Island?

(McGill) A. I answered that question in many previous remarks. There will be no sudden evacuation.

Q. In order to carry on their enterprises it is necessary for many people to reside near railroad lines. If they are not permitted to settle near the rail lines, how can they transport their products to the sheds?

(clerk) A. As far as sheds are concerned, if you are just talking about business matters and if it is not next door to landing fields or bombing planes, it is permissible.

Q. This is a personal question. I wonder what was the sequence? Did the Japanese farmers settle near defense industries, or did the defense industries settle near those farmers? I believe that defense industries established themselves many years after these people had been settled?

(clerk) A. I do not know.

Q. Will your office attempt to arrange professional license reciprocity so that practicing surgeons can go right to work in the resettlement areas?

(clerk) A. We certainly hope so. The Government will do everything it can so that doctors can practice.

Q. Licenses of alien doctors in California have been revoked. Will this happen to professional men when we move out of the state?

(clerk) A. I think you ought to bring that up in your committee.

Q. Will there be any public utilities in the resettlement areas?

(clerk) A. We are planning for them.

(clerk) Q. Is the approximate date of the first evacuation available?

(clerk) A. No. We hope to be able to effect a general evacuation in about a sixty day period.

Q. Is there any plan for evacuation according to community, or profession, or is there any other plan worked out by your office?

(clerk) A. I thought you would get some committee to try to get some plans for the evacuation.

These were all the questions to be asked.

Mike Masacka, National Secretary and Field Executive, asked if

(Clark) A. We are going to try and work it up. We are to try to establish a count on your nationals and if that is done, perhaps there may be some way by which they could be transferred. I don't know if the Government would pay for that. The Government is trying to make a complete community for you, your own doctor, own merchants. You would be running the community there under the protection of military authority.

Q. Should farm equipment be sold at fair prices now?

(Clark) A. If they can get a fair price.

Q. It has been said that many of these people may be transferred to agricultural lands and put to work on agricultural farms. Will the Government make some provisions?

(Clark) A. We haven't decided on that yet.

Q. Is there any assurance that Japanese in camps will not be drafted for labor at draftee wages?

(Clark) A. The present intention is not to disrupt the labor wages.

Q. Will Federal aid and protection be given to these voluntary evacuees?

(Clark) A. Of course, we will give you protection and aid as you need. The Government will see to it that evacuees will reach their destinations without harm. If a committee of two or three people can come in and talk with us to plan, of course, we will give you protection to get there safely. This will not be a bad experience.

Q. Those who are required to remain behind and send their families ahead, such as JACL officers, will they be allowed to join their families?

(Clark) A. Yes, certainly. Whoever told you that we are going to separate the families. We do not intend to do that at all. This is a mutual undertaking. It may be necessary to take all of us out of this area. Frankly, I think, you have an opportunity to show the people in this country your loyalty and you can do it, and we are going to do everything in our power to help you do it, and I mean just that! In other words, no one is going to harm you. Whoever harms you will be prosecuted under the laws of the Government.

Q. Are the funds of evacuees available to them in their restricted and resettlement area, or will they be frozen?

(Gunderson) A. I know of no plan at this time regarding the freezing of funds of evacuees as a class. Of course, there are Foreign Funds Control Regulations in operation now. That has been in effect for some time past and with which you are undoubtedly familiar. But to lay down the rule, I know of nothing along those lines. The resident aliens funds might be frozen for some time.

Q. Will some form of legal guardianship be placed for minor orphans?

(Clark) A. I haven't attended any meeting where that has been discussed. I think it would be well if 3 or 4 people can make some constructive suggestions along that line. We haven't thought about it as being necessary. This is a two-way deal.

Q. Can we select or suggest our own Caucasian conservator?

(Gunderson) A. I believe there will be general opportunity for you to select your own representative to handle property for you.

Q. Will automobiles and other property on which there are still payments due be permitted to be taken out of State?

(Gunderson) A. I do not know what arrangements are now being made as to the amount of property that can be taken out of the area. We are more concerned with property remaining here.

Q. Can we get better travel permit facilities?

there was any possibility of meeting tomorrow morning with the evacuation officials to discuss and try to settle problems relative to evacuation so that the delegates may be able to take answers home to their respective states.

RECESS, 3:15 p.m.

The meeting was called to order at 3:30 p.m.

Mr. Mike Masacka requested all those who did not have the proper credentials to leave the room.

Colonel McGill and Mr. Clark will meet with a select committee to discuss specific plans at 10 a.m. Tuesday morning. The committee was requested to be as small as possible. Mr. Kido will organize the committee to work out these problems. He also asked all professional men and all farmers to get together and make their own complete reports and present them to the committee. Mr. James Nishimura of Berkeley requested that the business group be represented on the committee.

Mr. Mike Masacka suggested that the group be divided into three parts--social, agricultural and resettlement problems.

Mr. Masao Satow of Los Angeles suggested that the committee members be appointed according to their individual ability.

Mr. Satow moved that we divide the Council into occupational and professional groups, and as the chairman see fit various problems of each group will be brought up and will be submitted to the committee meeting with the Federal officials. Those serving in this committee should be appointed by the chairman on the basis of ability to represent the (natives) interests.

Mr. Kolly Yamata of Oakland seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Mr. Tokutaro Slocum suggested that a public relations and information committee be formed so that the American public may be better informed of our activities. He also stated that, in view of the fact that we are at war some of the questions asked were impertinent. He suggested that we delete some of the smaller requests and questions and bear in mind that speed and efficiency are paramount and comfort is secondary.

The following six were chosen to serve on the Committee to confer with the Federal officials:

Mr. Fred Tayama of Los Angeles
Mr. Mamoru Wakasugi of Portland
Mr. George Inagaki, Executive Secretary of S.C.D.C.
Mr. Susumu Terasaki of San Francisco and Alameda
Mr. Tom Yogo of Placer

Mr. Inagaki and Mr. Terasaki resigned because of pressure of other responsibilities. Mr. James Sakamoto and Mr. Mike Masacka were chosen to take their places.

It was requested that groups that are primarily interested in resettlement, transportation and various other problems concerned meet with Mr. Satow and Mr. Sakamoto in Room 6 this evening.

The Agricultural group will meet in the auditorium with Mr. Yogo and Mr. Wakasugi in charge. Dr. Yatabe will meet with the professional men in Mr. Henry Tani's office and Mr. Fred Tayama will head the business men's group in the Board room.

The Ways and Means and Budget Committee, headed by Mr. George Inagaki, will meet in room 9 at 7 p.m.

Henry Tani announced that the Council pictures will be ready tomorrow. The price will be fifty cents.

The Resolution Committee, headed by Dr. Yatabe, will meet in Room 6 at 7 p.m.

Mr. Tan Yego asked all farmers to meet in the auditorium again tonight.

Mr. Mike Masaoka reminded the delegates that we must not think of ourselves alone. We must think of the greatest good for the greatest number. With that thought in mind, let us go to work.

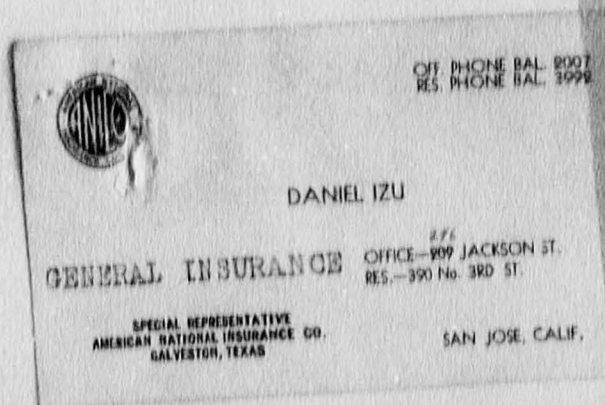

Dear Sir:

Mr. Weeks has forwarded for our attention a copy of your letter dated June 25, 1942, presenting a problem with respect to the possibility of now storing in the warehouses provided by the Government property of evacuees previously stored privately in order that they may be forwarded to relocation areas at Government expense, relieving the owners of such charges.

We have been somewhat surprised to learn that it has been felt that evacuees lacked information on storage of personal property of evacuees prior to evacuation from the Stockton area. We believe that it was pointed out throughout the entire program that at the time military evacuation occurred in each area, storage facilities would be provided at owner's risk and at Government expense for the personal property, exclusive of perishable goods, on the proviso that the goods would be properly prepared for such storage. Furthermore, every effort was made to inform evacuees going through control stations of the availability of such services to them.

It is true that a certain amount of indefiniteness was present during the evacuation of Military Area No. 1 as to the circumstances under which properties would be forwarded to relocation areas and the type of properties which could be so forwarded, but that the War Relocation Authority would arrange for the forwarding of goods of evacuees which could be satisfactorily utilized there, was never in doubt and this information was made clear to the evacuees.

The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco is now in the course of transferring the warehouses established by it to the control of the War Relocation Authority for whose account the goods placed in the warehouses were stored in the first instance. That agency has jurisdiction over the forwarding of the goods to relocation areas.



You will understand that the fact of completion of evacuation operations in Military Area No. 1 makes it infeasible to now open up warehouses previously established for the acceptance into storage of goods which the evacuees from that area stored on a private basis. However, it is suggested that you may desire to submit this problem to the War Relocation Authority within whose jurisdiction it appears to fall.

Dear Mr. Weeks:

I have been requested by several interested parties to inquire about government storage facilities, especially concerning the possibility of negotiating a transfer of certain pieces of personal property from private storage to government storage.

As you already know, the storage problem was a big issue among the evacuees long before the actual exclusion order was posted in the Stockton area. Lacking sufficient information on actual government storage facilities to be provided, the majority made plans to leave their belongings with friends and in private storage.

We firmly believe that a certain amount of fairness was lacking in making proper facilities for storage, because no definite information was forthcoming from the main offices of the Wartime Civil Control Administration until actual exclusion orders were posted. Individuals making preparations to evacuate, relied on government storage only as a last resort because of the uncertainty.

Now, after the first movement in the evacuation program was completed, the War Relocation Authority issued a pamphlet of questions and answers, giving information as to how property should be stored, both from the standpoint of using private storage as well as government storage, so that we could have certain essential pieces of furniture available for use at relocation.

Had this information been available prior to moving, we feel that a certain amount of our property could and would have been stored under government care so that it could be forwarded to relocation. Under the present setup, we feel that the expense involved in moving our stored beds and other property to relocation is beyond our financial means.

from Mr. Wagner of Pacific Storage Company, dated
May 11, 1942. I believe an investigation would
bear out Mr. Wagner's findings in the matter. Ted
Chashi, acting Secretary of the local JACL, reported
along the same lines as Mr. Wagner. According to
Mr. Chashi, a great deal of storage had been placed
privately by Japanese before the present program
was well under way.

Experience is always a good teacher. Were I
to take on this work and do it all over again, of
course, I could bring in much more Government storage,
and I do not offer this letter as an alibi in the
matter if, indeed, any real damage has been done to
the Government Program. If I could have foreseen the
really fine storage facility which is available here,
I know that a great number of those who stored privately
would have stored with us.

Dear Mr. Weeks:

We are writing this letter to you in answer to your question regarding the reasons which we believe are responsible for the small amount of storage which has developed under the Federal Reserve Bank plan.

After discussing this matter with other warehouse men in Stockton, and investigating our own records we find the following reasons probably the most important ones for the small response to government storage:

1. A large number of Japanese made their own private arrangements for storage about April 1, to April 15. This was prior to the conclusion of any arrangements in Stockton for government storage.

2. We talked with a large number of Japanese regarding storage and found a genuine mistrust amongst them for the government storage. This mistrust was caused by the fact that the government would not be responsible for their goods that they thought would be stored in some dilapidated building; that they would not be able to send items as they needed them; and that the government might sooner or later confiscate everything they had in storage.

I would estimate that in the Stockton area approximately one hundred and twenty families made their own private arrangements for storage.

There was also a tremendous amount of goods stored in privately rented buildings, Japanese churches, as well as numerous items which were loaned to private homes for safe keeping.

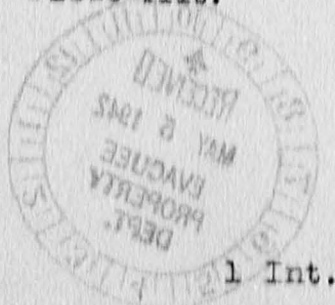

When we made the quotation to the J.A.C.L. our figures were based on household goods of very large volume which naturally carries much more bulk than the baggage you have stored with us.

The rates we set included storage and warehouse handling, but no insurance.

As you can understand, when we bring in three or four rooms of furniture, they are stacked in a cubicle to the ceiling and the rate based thereon. In the case of baggage, such as yours, this is not stacked to the ceiling and we cannot put other goods on top of yours and such baggage is based on the basis of: .75¢ for the 1st piece - .50¢ for the 2nd piece and .25¢ for each additional piece - up to six pieces, and there is no charge for warehouse handling.

Mr. Reid and myself attended a meeting at Winters, California, held by the local members of the J.A.C.L. which twenty-two of their members attended, representing two hundred seventy-five individuals in the community. We found that an unfortunate circumstance existed here inasmuch as thirty of the fifty-five families in the community of Winters live in Solano County. The remaining twenty-five live across the creek in Yolo County.

We went over many of their problems, and they have agreed to transport from the outlying ranches their personal property into the Buddhist Temple for temporary storage.

However, the day brought up the usual headache. It develops that in the small community, these people have over 350 sacks of Japanese rice which they are not able to sell to the local merchants. If this condition exists in this small community, no doubt the same thing prevails elsewhere. Mr. Reid and myself are wondering if it would be possible to make some sort of a deal whereby the Army Procurement Department would take over this rice to be used in feeding the evacuees at the Assembly Centers. This of course is merely a thought.

It was found that the Japanese grocery store, the only one in the Winters District which is fourteen miles from Vacaville and twenty-five miles from Woodland, was operated by a Mr. Horai, a blocked alien who is operating under License No. 23832. This license was just extended to May 17, 1942. Some difficulty was experienced in convincing this man that he must liquidate his stock immediately. From the appearance of the store, he is still carrying a full stock of merchandise.



In fact, we questioned him as to whether or not he was still buying. His failure to liquidate the business was no doubt brought about by the fact of his inability to move freely to the W.C.C.A. Office in Sacramento. You will recall that in a previous letter, we mentioned that the Sheriff of Solano County had refused permission to all Japanese to go beyond the five-mile radius from their homes without a special permit from the Sheriff's office.







The monthly payments may seem small but they mean much to my mother. If they don't keep up the payments what can we do about it.

Action taken: *

This obviously would keep the store open and the rental would probably be sufficient to meet the payments on the deed of Trust. Evacuation does not cancel their obligation as set forth in the Note & Deed of Trust. Otherwise their evacuation does void any of your rights.
