I would like to know if the acceptance of a check in final settlement of account (growers contract) would prevent me from making a demand on the company in question at a later date. I have reason to believe that I have been defrauded of \$1,000.00.

To insure the proper performace of the growing of certain crops, the San Diego Fruit & Produce Co., of San Diego, with a branch at Goleta, Calif., took our farm equipment on a mortgage. If I did not accept this check now, the mortgage could not be released, thus preventing me from selling the equipment. I did not intend to sell the equipment, but now that the final statement shows such a discrepency I am forced to sell same in order to make evacuation even possible for my family.

I have seen the district attorney at Santa Barbara and he suggests that I write to you for advice. From time to time I have noticed in the newspaper that fraudulent practices on evacuess at this time would not be tolerated. If I have directed this letter to the wrong bureau will you kindly inform me where it whould be sent.

The Office of Agricultural Coordinator is MAD 1942 with the maintenance of a supply of fresh vegetable produce for the Los Angeles metropolitan area and with the problem of replacing production from lands vacated by Japanese farmers, including those producing livestock and poultry. The office acts as a clearing house of information in endeavoring to bring together prospective farmers, land owners, and those holding equities under leases who are desirous of disposing of such equities.

The office does not contemplate undertaking any functions commonly exercised by the Agricultural Commissioner, Livestock Inspector, Agricultural Extension Service, College of Agriculture, etc. It is not in a position to furnish financial assistance to any person undertaking farming operations. It will endeavor to furnish up-to-date information affecting the readjustment of a portion of our vegetable crop production from Japanese into other hands.

Inasmuch as the production of vegetables in an irrigated area such as Southern California is a highly technical business and subject to intricate problems of irrigation, fertilization, pest control, and other cultural practices, it would be ill advised for anyone not familiar with this type of agriculture to consider going into the commercial production of vegetables at this time. It is moreover desirable in addition that persons contemplating this type of farming have capital and equipment of their own or know sources from which they can obtain such capital and equipment.

Farmers already established in areas adjacent to where lands are being vacated naturally have a good opportunity of meeting the situation. Other farmers may have land under irrigation and qualifying experience which will likewise give them an opportunity of planting vegetables on their own farms to compensate for production from land now used for vegetables which in this period of readjustment may go into other types of agriculture.

In order to establish a successful vegetable farming operation in Los Angeles County a farmer must have certain qualifications to his enterprise. He must have a vegetable farm of sufficient area which probably should not be smaller than forty acres except in certain of the less widely grown vegetables. Under intensive conditions smaller areas may be sufficient. The farm must have good soil

thered

and an adequate supply of water at a reasonable cost. The rental dost must be moderate and there must be a moderate investment in improvements and machinery; sufficient equipment to meet the needs but not in excessive quantities.

Obviously at all times an adequate supply of labor at reasonable posts is an important consideration.

In connection with personal qualifications the farmer should have a familiarity with the techniques of the crop production of the particular product he expects to raise. He should have good physical stamina and a liking for his work. He should have the ability to supervise labor and to organize his operations and should be familiar with the timing of the various processes. He must, in order to be successful, be able to secure yields better than the average at an economical unit cost of production. It is likewise essential that a vegetable grower have the ability to market his crops and either have or be able to make desirable marketing connections.

In order to visualize the present vegetable production in Los Angeles County it should be pointed out that there are approximately 50,000 crop acres planted in an average year, this probably representing about 35,000 acres of land as a considerable amount of the land produces two crops a year. The Japanese have been a dominating factor and according to recent figures have produced approximately two-thirds of the production of this county.

The following figures of approximate acreages indicate crops largely grown by Japanese in this county:

While these costs may vary according to condition and season they should be significant and helpful in making a gauge for capital required for vegetable farming operations.

It is perhaps desirable to point out that even when the crop is ready for harvest marketing conditions may be such that prices received will not be adequate to cover costs of production and a reasonable profit to the grower. It may also be probable that in this adjustment period of vegetable production it will be difficult to develop a balanced production of various vegetables produced at a continuing rate. There may possibly be recurring surpluses and shortages.

It is desirable to point out at this time that there are regular services performed by governmental agencies that are for the benefit of farmers. It is anticipated that all of these agencies will do their utmost to be of assistance in this emergency and their combined services should prove of great benefit to farmers willing to undertake the production of necessary vegetable supplies for this great metropolitan area.

(1) California College of Agriculture and the Agricultural Extension Service (Farm Advisor, Los Angeles):

The Farm advisor can furnish free bulletins on growing the various crops; he can instruct in proper irrigation methods; give advice on kinds and amounts of fertilizer; give information on cultural practices; give marketing information, and oe of assistance when called upon in various ways.

(2) U. S. Bureau of Entomology, Vegetable Insect Laboratory 1208 E. Main St., Alhambra ATlantic 2-1056

Can furnish expert information concerning vegetable insect control.

(3) County Agricultural Commissioner's Office:

Has inspectors in the field who are authorities on pest control and can tell the farmer the kinds of dusts and sprays to use in order both to kill the insects and to conform with legal restrictions on the use of certain toxic sprays. The Agricultural Commissioner also has charge of the enforcement of marketing standards on vegetables.

(4) County Livestock Inspector:

Has veterinarians and inspectors who enforce the state laws and local ordinances controlling infectious diseases of livestock. Periodic inspections are made of livestock and upon request, inspections are made for the purpose of diagnosis of livestock ailments.

(5) L. A. Production Credit Association 117 West 9th Street, Los Angeles - Michigan 8039

Is able to assist farmers financially in growing and harvesting their crops when the farmer is able to give adequate security; interest rates are low.

(6) Farm Security Administration (Federal) 903 Fair Oaks, South Pasadena - Sycamore 9-4844

Can give financial aid to farmers who do not have enough security to make them eligible for production credit loans. Some supervision is given with these loans and loans in some cases may run for as long as five years. Ordinarily those securing Farm Security loans have to diversify their crops to a certain extent.

(7) Farm Credit Administration (Federal) - CRestview 6-0759
Emergency Crop & Feed Loan Office, 450 N. Crescent Dr., Bev. Hills

This agency can supply emergency money to farmers generally in amounts of one to four hundred dollars to buy seed, fertilizers, irrigation water, feed for livestock, etc., and taking as security a mortgage on the crop.

Re: Fred M. Kusada vs. Thompson

In a telephonic conversation with Mr. Kalish of the State of California Lebor Commissioner's Office, we learned that tracing letters were being sent to Mr. Thompson in an endeavor to effect collection of this claim. Ordinarily, judgments emanating from that office are paid promptly; however, Mr. Kalish states the defendant was unable to pay all or any part of the claim at the time judgment was rendered but promised to do so at a future date. He hoped, therefore, to obtain collection as the result of a letter being sent today demanding payment.

Frankly, the costs of executing on a judgment cannot be absorbed by the State, according to Mr. Kalish, umless
a portion of such costs, as for example the attachment bond,
is borne by the plaintiff. Fowever, the searching of records

The purpose of this bulletin is to summarize briefly some of the more important controls affecting consumer credit which must be taken into consideration by every bank. Particular attention has been given to the location of field offices administering the various orders and regulations and the type of information and service they are propared to give.

SEPTEMBE SMITTING SEPTEMBE In addition to this bulletin we suggest, first, that you check your files to determine whether you have all of the orders and regulations referred to and second, that you make sure you are on the mailing list to receive announcements, releases, and amendments issued by the agencies and offices listed. It is an inescapable fact that all banks are subject to the restrictions referred to and because of that fact every effort must be made to keep in closest touch with new orders, amendments, and other changes.

Indications are that all enemy aliens, (Germans, Italians, and Japanese) and all citizens of Japanese ancestry, are to be evacuated from areas and zones designated by the Army. This raises grave credit problems for banks with outstanding loans to persons of these classes. Banks should review their loan files at once and give special attention to every such obligation, dealing first, of course, with loans involving Japanese. With respect to loans which are unsecured, co-signed, FHA Title I, etc., prudence dictates that everyeffert be made to obtain immediate liquidation before syscuation. With respect to chattel mortage loans and conditional sale contracts, a distinction must be observed, based on the use of the property under mortgage or contract. If the property consists of passenger automobiles, trucks, domestic appliances or household goods used on or in connection with a farm, any plan of liquidation must be submitted to and approved by the Wartime Civil Control Administration and the Wartime Farm Adjustment Program. Local representatives of these agencies are located at offices of the United States Employment Service (formerly California State Employment service) in cities listed below. If the property subject to mortgage or contract is not used on or in connection with a farm, the plan of liquidation need not be submitted to any governmental agency for approval. It is our understanding that evacuees will not be permitted to take with them any property of the enumerated kinds. Obviously, the important thing is to clean up these cases at once.

The evacuation program is under the direct supervision of Headquarters Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, which has issued the following Public Proclamations to date:

FEDERAL HOUSING ADMINISTRATION TITLE I

Title I of the National Housing Act, which pertains to loans made for the purpose of modernizing and improving real property, is in some respects altered by the provisions of Regulation W as amended (see comments on Regulation W below). Due consideration must therefore be given to both Title I of the National Housing Act and Regulation W when making FHA Title I loans.

All rationing orders issued to date, with the exception of those applying to commercial trucks, are being administered by the Office of Price Administration and include the following:

All sale credit and all loan credit which is payable in two or more scheduled payments or which has a similar purpose or effect is subject to the President's Executive Order of August 9, 1941.

In addition to the Executive Order you should have on file Regulation W issued by the Board of Governors of the Rederal Reserve System on August 21, 1941, and amendments of September 20, 1941, December 1, 1941, and March 23, 1942, and interpretations W-1 to W-131 and subsequent, dealing with specific questions regarding the application of Regulation #.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' CIVIL RELIEF ACT OF 1940

to the fact that I am in charge of the Lands Division
unit of this area, which unit is handling this condemnation proceeding. I will endeavor to answer the
questions contained in the letter of the same date
which you addressed to the Federal Reserve Bank, Evacuee
Property Department.

1. Is the Federal Government paying off loans held by enemy aliens, American-born Japanese, and by native Americans in restricted zones?

In this proceeding, the Federal Government is buying the land or the interest therein of the persons evacuated including all improvements. Out of such sum as will be peid to them as compensation there will be indicated and paid to the lien holders the amount of any loans secured by a lien upon such interests provided that the value of the property taken is in excess of the amount of the loan. If in any instance the amount of the loan should be in excess of the value of the property, the Government will pay to the lender the value of the property, such being the measure of damage to be paid in condemnation action.

2. Is the process the same for Terminal Island as for other barred areas?

Terminal Island and Port Hueneme are the only barred areas in which the Government has instituted condemnation proceedings which are under my supervision.

Our activities in respect to these areas are identical as to the manner in which payment is to be arrived at and made. I have nothing whatsoever to do with actual execuation under the Executive Orders and Military Orders. Questions as to process in respect to such matters should be addressed to Honorable Tom C. Clark, 1602 Postoffice and Court House Building, Los Angeles, Calif. Telephone - Madison 7411.

3. Is there any printed circular or notice available which we could enclose with our bulletin?

4. Should associations in cities where there is no branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco be directed to handle the problem by correspondence, or have offices been set up in the smaller cities?

This question has no relation to the activities of the Department of Justice, Lands Division.

6. Are there any other pertinent data which you would wish us to include in a bulletin to our 173 members?

Any member having a lien upon any of the property taken by the United States will be served with Summons and Complaint in due course, and should then correspond with the writer setting forth the amount and character of its lien and the percel or parcels encumbered thereby. Upon receipt of such correspondence, such member will be immediately contacted and arrangements will be made to safeguard and pay the obligation due it to the extent of and in the manner indicated in answer to Question 1.

So far as is possible we are encouraging evacuoes to make private arrangements in the solution of their property prob-less with which they are confronted in the light of the evacuation program. The arrangements that Mr. Muichi Matsuo suggests appear to be in line with that program. Except for the necessity of licensing Japanese who are classified as blocked "nationals" in order to permit such persons to complete certain types of transactions, there are no restrictions so far as this bank is concerned against dealing with Japanese aliens, and, of course, dealings with Japanese American citisens are not restricted. Or not he is classified as a blocked "national" or operating under the General License extended to Japanesa continuously resident in this country since Jane 17, 1940. In the event that he is a blocked "national" no doubt his bank, or your own bank, would be helpful in solving any problems pertaining to Treasury Department licensing. Copies of your letter and our reply are going forward to our Los Angeles Branch for its information and for that of our Field Representative who is situated in the offices of the U. S. We are sending you a copy of a letter addressed to Representative Jerry Voorhis regarding the matter of the protection of property of citizen and alien Japanese, Germans and Italians now being evacuated along the Pacific Coast.

Since this letter was drawn-up announcement has been made of the Treasury Department's plan of having the San Francisco Federal Reserve Bank act as the agent for possible taking over and liquidation of evacuess' property. We are still of the opinion, however, that the plan outlined in the enclosed letter is a very sound one.

The basic issue seems to be whether any plan is being considered for the possible trusteeship of property, particularly of American citizens, during the evacuation period -- this as an alternate plan to straight liquidation. The possible trusteeship on a non-profit and mutual basis of evacuees' property might help set a pattern for cooperative living and industry that certainly is to be needed in the post-wer period if any real rehabilitation is to take place.

Southern California is home to thousands of the evacuees. The only home they have ever had or care to have. To make no adequate provision now for their possible return after the war is to do them a grave injustice and also a step in the undermining of civil liberties so essential to any living democracy.

Trusteeship of their property we feel is necessary for just such reasons and therefore urge that you support such a plan. Your consideration of the matter will be deeply apprediated.

From various groups you will receive simultaneously with this letter the following suggestions for your immediate action in an effort to help protect the assets of both citizen and alien Japanese, Germans, and Italians now being evacuated:

- (1) The properties now impounded by the U.S. Treasury include two banks, the stock of which is owned entirely by the Japanese government.
- (2) The banks include trust departments capable of protecting these ownership rights under the established trust laws of the State of California and the Federal Reserve Banks.
- (3) These trust departments can be opened without any action by any legislative body or appropriation of government money, for the purpose of administrating personal and real properties for evacuees who elect such trust arrangements; merely Treasury Department action is needed.
- (4) These re-opened trust departments can be operated on a non-profit basis to remove from the government charges of graft that is greatly to be feared by ordinary bureaucratic administration.

We urge that you immediately ask that the Federal Treasury take whatever ateps necessary to re-open these bank trust departments as herein suggested.

Gentlemen: I have just read an account in the newspaper that the Federal Reserve Bank is on guard against attempts on the part of evacuees to avoid payment of reasonable oreditors olaims by taking advantage of the new regulations. I am in a position that I am being taken advantage of and can seem to do nothing about it.

In July 1941 Mr. E. K. Miura, Japanese, knowing that I had a business lot on Camino Real, Hermosa Beach asked me if I would consider building a store Bor him as he would like to start a Chop Suey Parlor and there at that time, was not one store for rent or lease anywhere on the street. He said he would take a five year lease on the store. On the strength of this I obtained a loan and built a two-store building. The rents just made the payments. I explained this to Mr. Miura and told him how necessary it was that I have the rent promptly on the first of each month. He understood and agreed and we drew up a five year lease.

It is customary to receive as a deposit the last month's rent of each year the lease is to run, but because he had had bad luck in his former enterprise and I thought, was short of money, I signed the five year lease with a deposit of only the last month's rent of \$30. This \$30 I immediately put back into the store as extras not called for in the lease, but which would improve his cafe, two large sereen doors, a ventilating fan to take away cooking odors and other incidentals for a cafe but not necessary for any other business.

He has never, since he went in business paid his rent on the date due, but has paid it from 3 to 10 days late each month, which of course breaks the lease, but I had never considered it that way until this month. I went in on the first and second of the month to collect with no success. On the third I told him I must have the money to meet my payment at the bank. He finally gave me \$10 but refuses to pay any more, planning on using up the last month's deposit as rent.

I am in sympathy with the Japanese whom white men are taking advantage of but it is pretty discouraging to be a white men being taken advantage of by a Japanese to whom I feel I have been most fair and who could pay if he wanted to. He knows I will have an empty store on my hands as the street is filled with vacant ones and that I need the balance of the rent for my payment but both he and his son are very smug and insolent. By his attitude one can easily tell on which side of the ocean his sympathies lie.

I will appreciate any information as to any rights I may have or how to proceed with him before he evacuates.

As you too well know, there are innumerable problems for our residents and citizens of Japanese origin to solve as rapidly as possible. In the hope of quickly disposing of one little problem I am writing to ask your authority for relieving one little group of just one anxiety.

The Zen-ne-ji Temple, an independent Euddhist Temple. located at 7278 E. let St., Los Angeles, is the custodian of the ashes of some of its former members, which are kept in the Temple together with a small tablet for each box of ashes. These are of sacred memory to these good people and they are desirous of having them placed where they will rest peacefully until this war is over and they can claim them.

As their only Caucasian member I have been asked where we can have friendly care for these two small boxes, containing the ashes and the tablets. Last evening I went to the Ananda-Ashrama at La Cresenta and discussed with Sister Doys, the American head of that Ashrama, where I am well acquainted with the most loving and universal attitude toward all men, and they would be glad to store the two small boxes there.

However, owing to the many misunderstandings and hatreds rempart in war time, and the possibility that their temporary possession of these harmless boxes might at some time raise a question as to the perfect loyalty of their group to our Country, we want unquestioned suthority, or denial of authority, to let these two boxes rest in the care of the kindly group of Vedantists at the Amanda Ashrama.

Sister Doys is the daughter of Ex-Senstre Jones and my own family has been represented in every wer of this gountry, so you may rest assured that there is no other motive than one of universal helpfulness in this request. Indeed, my very own brother was laid in the Presidio in 1901, brought there from Manila.

Mev. Teigaku Uyeshima, 727 E. 1st St., L. A., is the priest and head of the Zen-ne-ji Temple.

She told me to write to the Jap and if he said I could have it for that it would be alright I did and he let me have the house for \$20.00 if I would agree to stay the rest of the year. I immediatly went to Mrs. Allison (the lady who was renting it) and she was not home so I went shead and moved most of my furniture in and then sh e informed me she had already rented it to enother party for \$25.00. We had to go shead and live in the place because I didn't have another house to go to. She sued me and on the th day of July the trial was held in Judge Lowell Howe's Court in National City, Calif. The Government attorney was present and it was proven that she had no right to have any buisness dealings with this Jap's property. The Jap owed a Lumber bill to the Home Lumber Co here in Chula Vista, for the Material the house is built out of. Now Mrs. Allison has paid the Lumber bill and she says the house is hers and she wants 330 e month for it. I would like some legal information whether she has legaly bought it and if I should Pay the rent to her. My lawyer Mr. O. C. Ludwig Sth St. National City has told me

My dear Judge Desmond:

Cur counsel, Mr. Learence L. Larrabee, has suggested that you might welcome a statement from us concerning our relation to the program for the evacuation of aliens from this area for your assistance in determining the propriety of arranging for early trial of cases to which evacues nationals are party.

This letter is occasioned by Mr. Larrabee's report that some attorneys have exlied him up to inquire what the result may be when such cases, now pending, will probably not come to trial, in the ordinary course, until cometime after the everuse nationals are likely to have been removed beyond the jurisdiction of your court.

The Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco has been designated as the agency to assist in the protection of the property rights of evacues nationals in connection with the enforcement of evacuation orders that are anticipated. The term "evacues national" includes not only nationals of countries with which the United States is at mar, but also American citizens of Japanese descent.

The great majority of these potential evacues have property interests and contract obligations which require adjustment prior to the time they may be compelled to leave this area. The Evacues Property Department of the Pederal Reserve Bank has been established to assist in the completion of these adjustments with a view to the protection of the evacuese against demands of unreasonable and grasping creditors. The objective is not only to encourage observance of humanitarian practices in disposing of the property interests of evacuese, but also to evoid costly dislocation of the scenesic situation on this coast that might result in a wholesale sacrifice of assets.

For the accomplishment of the objectives sought by this department, it would be fortunate if arrangements could be made for the determination of cases involving evaduce nationals prior to the time they are

Hon. Walter Desmond March 28, 1942 likely to have to leave for their new homes. Determination of the effective date of the evacuation order lies in the discretion of General J. L. Dewitt, Commanding Coneral of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, and we have no information as to when that may be. It is possible, however, that such an order may be issued at any time within the next very few weeks. In discussing this problem, Mr. Larrabce has supplied us with some information as to the normal course that pending cases take after they are ready for trial, and indicates the possibility that many cases may not be tried within three or four months after they have been set for trial. He has suggested the possibility that, in order to secure early trial dates for the type of case under discussion. services of judges pro tem might be enlisted. If you feel that early trial dates for such cases can be arranged, we, of course, will appreciate it as an assistance to the general evacuation program, and will be interested in cooperating with you in any way we may. I told him Bank employs were not permitted to have such transactions. He described the car, the condition and number of tires and tubes he was getting, also said he had seen the bill for an overhaul job on the motor. He was very enthusiastic about the deal. I told him that from his description it looked like the car was worth the money he was paying. He came back later and said he had bought the car and wanted the Certificate of Ownership. I told him the Certificate was at 707 S. Spring and that I would call up and see if he could get it. I called Mr. Watkins, who asked me, if as a Social Worker this man was permitted to buy the car from a Japanese. I told him the man said he was, but that I would ask him again. Mr. Wyman was standing beside me at the telephone and he again said he was permitted to buy the car.Mr.Watkins then said for me to write an order for the Certificate of Ownership and have Mr. Wyman deliver it, with a receipt in full from the Japanese owner, to 707 S. 

On March 26th you answered my letter of March 23rd, 1942, regarding the problem of Oxnard Canners, Inc. in connection with the fish net owned by T. Miya. In this you expressed your opinion that it would be necessary for my client to obtain a general Power of Attorney.

I thereupon got in touch with Mr. Merrill H. Scott in charge of the Tuna Canyon Detention Camp at Tujunga, California, and he advised me that the name T. Miya was evidently a short form of a longer name which might be one of several different names. I had hoped that this man, if in detention as claimed, would appear on the records of the Detention Camp, but Mr. Scott could not locate the man.

This letter is written on behalf of Oxnard Canners, Inc. This corporation is now operating at Port Hueneme, recently taken over by the U. S. Navy, and will no doubt be compelled to vacate its premises and give up its lease within the next few days. The corporation has in its charge a fish net belonging to T. Miya, a Japanese national formerly of Terminal Island and now believed to be in custody of the F. B. I. The net weighs approximately three tons, is two hundred fifty feet long and first in the Harbor Transit Building but had to be moved when the Navy took over that building into a temporary location, a garage rented by Oxnard Canners Inc. which they will have to give up when they leave. As the net has been used for fishing it will rapidly deteriorate and rot unless it is placed in further use.

My clients would like to have permission to sell the net in order to avoid further expense of storage and handling; and turn over the proceeds to the Custodian of Alien Property as soon as an agent for such Custodian is appointed in California or they are willing to turn over the net to the Custodian but are of the definite opinion that it would not be worthwhile for the Custodian to attempt to keep such a heavy bulky piece of property.

I have discussed this matter with Mr. W. M. Charlesworth, from your department, and I am sending him a copy of this letter as he may be able to help us carry out any suggestions you have regarding what should be done with the net.

May we have your opinion at your early convenience.

Dear Sirs:

This is in reply to your letter of March 25th, concerning cases in which minor evacues nationals are operating their own properties. and the problem incident to the disposition or care of such properties after evacuation has become effective.

Our counsel advises us that an agency can be created only by one who has the capacity to contract; that as a minor does not have that espacity it follows that a minor cannot give a power of attormey or appoint an agent to perform any acts that he himself does not have the legal aspacity to perform.

Several cases of this character have arisen in the los Angeles area. we have been recommending in such cases that guardianship proceedings be instituted in the Superior Court for the immediate appointment of an appropriate guardian to take possession of the minor's property interests and administer them on his behalf. Such a proceeding does involve expense, usually not less than \$100.00 for court costs, attorneys fees, and premium on the guardien's bond; in some instances the cost might be somewhat higher, depending upon the amount of responsibility devolving upon the attorney in preparing the proseeding for court bearing and conducting that hearing through to a conclusion. Therefore, it becomes desirable to determine in each case, whether the probable cost of the guardianship proceeding is unreasonably out of proportion to the value of the property interests involved. In answering this question it should, of course, be borne in mind, that where the title to property is vested in a minor. no contract of any kind pertaining to the use or disposition of that property can be made unless and until a guardian of the estate of the minor has been appointed by the Superior Court, or until the minor has reached his majority.

Gentlemen:

We are taking the liberty of writing you at this time for any information which you may be able to furnish us in regard to the Japanese evacuation question since reports as to our local situation appear to be very uncertain and also contradictory.

In the Coachella Valley we have a considerable number of Japanese who have been born and raised here, are operating their own farms and have a large acreage in early vegetables. In several instances these farmers have already put into this years spring crops, which will be harvested within the next ninety, anywhere from \$5,000.00 to \$15,000.00. In line with normal practices, prior to the declaration of war, we had advanced some operating funds to some of these farmers and subsequently made some further advances in view of the report that the government wanted all the food-stuffs possible produced, as well as to protect our previous advances.

A representative from the Farm Securities Administration has been in the valley for the past three or four days, contacting the local Japanese and advising them that they should make immediate plans for evacuation within a possible five day period. We have been unable to ascertain his exact standing or secure any definite information from him.

This valley is in the secondary classification. The farmers are producing highly specialized crops of vegetables and are farming up to as many as 120 acres, which at harvest time produce for shipment several truck loads of vegetables per day from each farm. As a result the farm operations are decidedly complicated and the possibility of securing experienced and capable supervision in case of evacuation of the owners is next to impossible. This can easily be realized when consideration is given to the fact that the gross sales from the crops already planted and up, of some of the larger operators, will amount to any place from \$20,000.00 to \$50,000.00 within the next 120 days.





On April 13th last we wrote the Field Representative of the Federal Reserve Bank, H. J. Kircher, regarding the above named person asking what had happened to the alien's crops and assets. On April 17th we received a reply from Kircher advising us that Mr. Fujito was in the Alien Assembly Center at Santa Anita and we should contact him for the information we desire. We know Mr. Fujito; naturally he will not tell us anything about his assets. Not being able to get anywhere with Mr. Fujito on June 10th last we wrote Mr. Kircher again telling him that the Wm. Fujito he mentioned in his letter of April 17th was the party that was our debtor in the sum of \$343.53 and asked him to please advise us as to what became of the debtor's crops. Our claim is for crop advances to the debtor. Not receiving a reply to that letter we again wrote Mr. Kircher on July 21st of this year but so far Mr. Kircher has not seen fit to answer any of our letters. We believe that we are entitled to know just what has happened to the assets of this alien so that the interest of our assignor in those assets might be protected.

Will you please give us that information?

Further reference is made to the request of the Caucasian wife of George Fukawa, to store eight rooms of furniture in Los Angeles, and also to assist in the disposition of automobile repair equipment.

We concur with your conclusion that this is an exceptional case where assistance should be given, even though the controlled evacuation has been completed.

We, therefore, suggest that you offer any reasonable services you can to Mrs. Fukawa.

In making any arrangements for storage with Mrs. Fukawa, our representative can not be too explicit in informing her that this is an exceptional case and can be accomplished only because of the particular circumstances and the fact that the War Relocation Authority has not yet taken over the warehouse in which her goods will be stored. This is necessary in order that any information which she might give out will not indicate that a precedent has been established.

L. A. Vegetable Exchange, Inc. is a California corporation and has been engaged in the business of acting as a commission merchant of agricultural produce. The stockholders and officers of the corporation are all American citizens, but persons of Japanese ancestry.

In view of the recent evacuation orders made with respect to persons of Japanese ancestry, it was necessary to terminate all activities of said L. A. Vegetable Exchange, Inc. and to wind up and liquidate its affairs.

Pursuant thereto, the corporation cancelled its Commission Merchant's License DH-CO595 and Dealer's License D-5529 issued by the Department of Agriculture of the State of California. All liabilities of whatsoever nature have been fully paid and discharged by the corporation. The officers of the corporation have made affidavits to the effect that all of its liabilities have been fully paid and discharged. H. E. Kaesemeyer, Certified Public Accountant, has made an audit of the corporation's books and records, and has certified, and is willing to certify that all of its liabilities have been fully paid and discharged.

In connection with the Commission Merchant's License and the Dealer's License hereinabove referred to, it was necessary that L. A. Vegetable Exchange, Inc. furnish a bond to the State of California, conditioned upon payments to its customers and growers. Bond number B-179856, written by the Globe Indemnity Company, was furnished to the State of California. For years no collateral deposit was required on

Page Two Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco May 13, 1942 the bond; however, on February 20, 1942, Globe Indemnity Company required cash collateral in the sum of five thousand dollars, (\$5,000.00) as security on the bond. L. A. Vegetable Exchange, Inc. has now terminated its affairs, surrendered its licenses and cancelled its bond. Globe Indemnity Company, however, refuses to return the cash collateral on the bond until after four years from the expiration date, i.e., until May 28, 1946. The possibility of the underwriter's suffering liability on the bond is indeed remote, in view of the past record of L. A. Vegetable Exchange, Inc. and in view of the further fact that all of its liabilities have been fully paid and discharged. The position taken by Globe Indemnity Company is oppressive as regards the stockholders of L. A. Vegetable Exchange, Inc. These stockholders have been ordered to evacuate and are badly in need of the funds held by Globe Indemnity Company. We would appreciate any assistance you are able to furnish in this matter. As per our conversation, the name of the party to whom the fixtures were sold is David Wexler, doing business as City Store Fixtures. 404 S. Los Angeles St., Los Angeles.

I might say that I have talked to Mr. Wexler and he advises me that he managed to sell the counters. booths and other merchandise that he considered not worth moving and had left in the store, to a Korean who later rented the store and that he received for these fixtures \$45.00. He states that the fixtures that he removed from the restaurant he still has, as the market for restaurant fixtures is very slow. Mr. Wexler further advises me that as Mr. Goto places such a high valuation on these fixtures he will be very happy to sell them for the amount he paid us which was \$110.60 plus the cost of moving them to his place of business and the storage since they have been there plus a reasonable profit and minus the \$45.00 he received from the new tenant. In other words as I understand it if Mr. Goto (in the belief that these fixtures are so valuable) desires to purchase them back I understand Mr. Wexler will sell them to him for \$160.00 provided that this offer is accepted by Mr. Goto within ten (10) days from date.

As I said when I saw you, everyone connected with this transaction tried in every way to work the deal for the best benefit of Mr. Goto. So far as we are concerned we spent time and offort and a little money in advertising the restaurant for sale, hoping to get enough out of it to pay us and leave something for Mr. Goto. During the more than six (6) weeks that we tried to sell the restaurant we never had one offer. So far as Mr. Caras, the landlord, and Mr. Snyder, his agent, they cooperated with us in the effort to sell the place. They were more than anxious to get a buyer as, as soon as it was sold it meant that they would have a new tenant. The only offer they had during the six



weeks was an offer of \$150.00 which was made by, I understand, the Korean who later on rented the store and is the present tenant. As a matter of fact the only reason that we sold the fixtures to Mr. Wexler was that Mr. Caras was becoming nervous at the length of time the store was vacant and no doubt afraid that he or we would be unsuccessful in selling the fixtures and therefore wanted us to guarantee the rent at \$30.00 per month. We knew the fixtures had little value and felt that if we guaranteed any rent in an effort to sell, we would wind up without

Please refer to your letter of August 11th, relating to the above party. As mentioned, Mr. Wall was to visit this office August 13th. We had the Gotos in the office, although as the attached interview shows, they claim that the party that came here was not Mr. Wall, but one of his associates, although he registered into this Center and gave us to believe he was Mr. Wall personally. It was not until after he left, that we got from the Japanese that this was not so.

The interview with Wall's representative shows on the attached form for that purpose and is given in a fair amount of detail. quite a lot of what he gave us, the Japanese did not agreet. however, it is the collection agency's side of the story. The amount received for all of this equipment is certainly very low and would say from our experience in April and May in helping evacuees sell at 707 South Spring Street office, know that there was a good consumers' demand for good electric refrigerator equipment, for I am sure we had many times the request to buy than we had the listing for sale, and very fair prices were obtained for the evacuees.

Believe this is something that should be checked, if it is possible, particularly in the light of Mr. Schneider's report which is also attached in detail recording at the time of the interview. Therein it is mentioned that he offered in behalf of the principles, considerable more money to Wall and was turned down. This was almost twice as much as was credited to the Japanese.

The Japanese seemed to enjoy good reputation among other business people in the heighborhood according to Mr. Schneider.

This is just a rough statement of facts by Mr. Schneider on the Frank Goto case.

The owner is William Carras, 819% West 3rd St., L. A. Mr. Schneider is the business manager for the Carass brothers in Los Angeles.

Mentioned that time Cotos closed the restaurant, Wall got their key for the restaurant where the fixtures were left on which Wall had Chattel Mortgage to cover his claim of \$235.00. At that time it wasagreed between Mr. Schneider and Mr. Wall that the latter would be responsible for the rent starting April 1, because of the Chattel. About April 10 a demand was made on Wall for the April rent of \$30.00, but this was not forthcoming. The demand was made on Wall for the key which was given back to Mr. Schneider. Rent was not paid, so Mr. Schneider then changed the look of the door. The lock was broken, opened by Mr. Wall, and he took out several items that were listed on the Chattel Mortgage that Goto gave him. They included those that Mr. Schneider ticked off on the attached list of the Chattel. Mr. Schneider also mentioned him taking a ventilating fan in the kitchen that was listed on the Chattel.

Mr. Schneider confirms the Goto statement that the Norge refrigerator was large, about 8 ft. high, remembers that it was in excellent condition, about a year old, and had double doors. He also remembers that the soft drink cooler was also in good condition with brand new coils having been recently installed. Also this soft drink cooler was bought at about the same time. This cooler was bought from the General Electric Company at Los Angeles. Goto does not remember what company he bought the refrigerator



from, but it was from a salesman who came around to the cafe. In any event, this salesman is a Caucasion who could talk Japanese. After the first payment on weekly basis, he paid the rest up in full.

Mr. Schneider thinks this equipment was taken by Mr. Wall out of the cafe and sold to the California Restaurant Equipment Company, Main Street near 4th.

The amount Gotos owed the landlord was total of \$30.00 for rent, \$25.00 plus \$5.00 owing from the previous month. There were no lease, no deposit, just month to month rent. Been there 6 years ending with Mr. Schneider quite satisfied with Mr. Goto. Thinks the equipment that Wall took worth at least \$200. at quick sale.

Mr. Wall tried to sell coder for \$85.00 to the liquor store, and got a bid for \$75.00, but he turned it down. Mr. Schneider priced this at a second hand store and found that the cheapest was \$125.00

Mr. Schneider feels that equipment taken by Mr. Wall was not only worth considerable more than the amount, \$105.700 but feels that it was sold for considerable more than \$105.700 To bear this out, Mr. Schneider, on behalf of his employer offered Mr. Wall \$175.00 for the equipment that he took out before it was taken, and Wall turned this down as being too low.

Regarding the assertion that Mrs. Moore, a friend of Gotos, made, that the landlord took certain fixtures, equipment, etc. and sold this for \$60.00for rent, this information she obtained from Mr. Wall, this is apparently not so, as Mr. Schneider, the landlords' representative, says that he did not take any of the equipment, but do know that Mr. Wall sold the rest of the equipment for \$45.00 to the people who are now running the cafe.

Mr. Schneider says that after 6 years of experience, the approximate time Gotos have occupied the building, he and all the others in the neighborhood would testify to the Gotos' honesty.





Reference is made to your letter of July 30th regarding this evacuee and note what you say. We sent out for this party, but he was ill so his wife came in late yesterday afternoon. We went over thingswith her from the basis of your letter. She understands and speaks American very well, which her husband does not.

Conversation developed as per the attached interview sheet shows several variations to the points which wass brought out in your letter. She said business was very good in January, and they had no thought of sell-ing their cafe and did not meet Mr. Wall at that time. In fact it was sometime in late March or early April this meeting took place, only after he had come to our office at 707 South Spring looking for assistance in clearing up his affairs. It was there that he met Mr. Biggs, who apparently introduced him to Mr. Wall at least so the story goes from this end.

A friend of theirs, Mrs. Florence Moore, of Los Angeles visited them in this Center last Sunday, mentioned that they found out that Mr. Wall sold the fixtures in the cafe for only \$106.00. This included two frigidates. They were nearly new, one costing \$375.00 and the other \$225.00. They are quite dissatisfied with the amount received as they at least hoped to obtain enough to meet their accounts payable.

Also the landlord took certain other fixtures, equipment, etc. and sold this for \$60.00, although never



advised the evacuee to this effect. He claims this was for back rent, but the Gotos here say it was only \$5.00 owed for back rent and \$25.00 for current month. In other words this interview seemed to be of considerable variance from what you were able to develop from Mr. Wall, and the Gotos were wondering if Mr. Wall would come out here some day and go over things with them in our office as they are far from satisfied with the ways this was handled by the others on the outside for it seems as if their property was just taken over and were disposed of without regard to value. At least that is how they feel about it.

They particulary would like to speak to Mr. Wall personally if it could be arranged.

Please refer to your letter of July 24, 1942. We do not find any record of this transaction in ourfile, but discussed the matter with Mr. Wall, Hellman Building, Los Angeles, who operates a Collection Agency, and he gave a complete explanation of Mr. Goto's transaction.

We have been advised that Mr. Goto enticipated changing market conditions, and hoped to obtain a buyer for his cafe last January, which was well ahead of the general liquidation of Japanese interests. At that time Mr. Goto had placed a price of \$750 on his cafe, but dropped the price later to \$500. The only offer he received was \$150., made by a Chinese.

We have been informed that Mr. Coto owes considerable more than the light bill of the Department of Water and Power. However, so far as Mr. Wall is concerned, we learned that his client has a wholesale meat company to whom Mr. Goto was indebted to the extent of \$235. Mr. Goto agreed to execute an intention to mortgage and also signed a chattel mortgage and note which were secured by the fixtures in the cafe. Mr. Wall also explained to us that a part of the fixtures were owned by the landlord, who claims he understands through advice received from an attorney that Mr. Goto owes him some unpaid rental. The fixtures were sold for \$105., and there is a deficiency at the present time on the mortgage note.

We believe that there is no way we can serve either Mr. Goto or the Department of Water and Power.

This office received a letter today from the Collection Department of the Department of Water and Power, Los Angeles, covering a closing light bill for \$19.68, covering 823 West 3rd Street, for the period ending April 23, 1942. This was the location of a cafe operated by the above Japanese party, and he wrote the Department advising that the affairs were being taken care of by us at 707 South Spring Street, and that the bill would be cared for from that source.

Apparently the Department of Water and Power contacted someone at 707 South Spring, whether it was Federal Reserve Bank, is not said, but received information that there were no funds available for account of Frank Goto or any other information relative to him.

We had this party in today, and apparently he operated a cafe at the abovementioned address. His case was handled by Mr. Biggs of our office at 707 South Spring Street, and therefore, there should be some interview reports in our Los Angeles file covering this Japanese.

This party is of the opinion, as near as we are able to determine, that we were looking after his situation, and believe in order to properly develop the case further it might be well to go over the detail covered by the various interviews held on this case. He has not heard from anyone since coming up here and has been wondering what has taken place. He claims his fixtures were worth \$2000.00 and were all clear.



Re: Wage claim of Harry Nishioka, alien Japanese, against I. Matooka, alien Japanese

We are enclosing copy of complaint and assignment of claim for unpaid wages filed by Harry Nishioka against his former employer, I. Matooka, doing business as Lincoln Cafe, San Diego. Both are alien Japanese. Mr. Nishioka states that he has lived in the United States for 35 years; his residence being at Norman, Oklahoma, where his family still resides. He states that he married an American woman, but after war was declared he left his Oklahoma home and came to San Diego to work for Matooka.

We have been unable to contact Matooka to secure his answer to this complaint or to secure payment, if the wages are acknowledged to be due. Inquiries at San Diego and the Santa Anita assembly center lead to information that Matooka has been interned, probably near Santa Fe, New Mexico. As this is outside of the jurisdiction of the California courts, we will appreciate it if you will refer this claim to the proper Federal authorities having custody of Matooka, with the request that a statement be secured from him, and if the \$87.50 is admitted to be due, that arrangements be made with him to forward the money to this office.

You will note that Nishioka has assigned his claim in writing to the California State Labor Commissioner, pursuant to our State law. If Matooka is receiving wages or maintenance money from the United States Government, perhaps he would be willing to divert a portion of it toward payment of this claim, if it is found to be justly due.

We have reference to your letter of March 19th in which you request information concerning the evacuation of Japanese sliens from the Pacific Coast area.

The point raised in your letter as to financing of the removel of the evenues teamed be specifically answered by this office.

It is our understanding, after talking to Judge Morrison on the telephone this morning, that you have in mind a voluntary movement of this
particular family to Colorado, and we believe that under such conditions,
all expenses incident to the removel from this area would be borne by
the Japanese family itself, and would not be taken care of by the
Government. It is our further understanding that in the event of an
involuntary evacuation to established reception centers, costs incident
to food and housing at that point would be at the Government expense.

It has been further implied that a Japanese family in a position to do
so will be expected to take care of themselves in the react themsel erems.

You understand, of course, that this information has been derived from other sources than this department, and we merely mabmix it for your consideration.

We also wish to mention that Judge Morrison called by telephone this morning and informed us that he would further discuss this point with you, and we took the occasion to explain to him the various foreign funds controls in effect at the present time.

I am informed that the question of removing Japanese aliens from the Pacific Coast area has been referred to the Federal Reserve Banks.

I represent Telichi Matsuda of Garden Grove, a native of Japan, as is also his wife. They have eight children, citizens of the United States. A couple of years ago, one of these children was injured in an automobile accident and now has on deposit in the bank something over three thousand dollars. It's in the First National Bank of Garden Grove.

Matsudas came in to me a few days ago to secure a court order that would allow them to use this money for the support of the family if and when they are removed. I presented the matter before Judge Morrison of the Orange County Superior Court, and the Judge is perfectly willing to make such an order if the government does not Vol- sum 2 m/s. move this family, and provided further that the government does not bear all of their expenses and take care of them.

Query: If and when these people are removed, will it be done at the expense of the government, and will the government care for them. or will they be expected to use their own money for their care and support?

The Court has asked that I ascertain what responsibility the government will have towards these people before it makes the order.





Reference is made to your letter dated July 24, 1942 regarding a transaction entered into by the above-named evacues in connection with his property at Lospoc, California, prior to his evacuation from that area.

We do not have any representative in that area at the present time and while it would be possible to refer the matter to our Los Angeles Branch for the purpose of communicating with Mr. Balaam of Lompoc, the transaction would of necessity be handled by correspondence.

Under these circumstances, and particularly in view of the vagueness of the facts presented, we are inclined to believe that the evacuee should endeavor to develop what information he can by direct correspondence with Mr. Balaam rather than through our office.



Bolt Re: Storage space for personal property of aliens Gentlemen: This morning we submitted to you verious proporties that we thought would be suitable for the storage of personal property of aliens soon to be evacuated from this area. A summary of these properties is as follows: 1) 222-34 South Los Angeles street Part 2, 3 and 4-story brick building - spur track - total area 80,000 square feet - available at a rental of 36 per square feet. with the tenant paying for all utilities. There are 20,000 square foot available within 24 hours and the balance of the space can be had within a very short period of time. MW Corner of San Pedro and Pico 4-story brick building containing 50,000 square feet of space available at a rental of 2-1/2d per square foot, including heat, water and power for clevator. This building has a sprinkler system. There are approximately 26,000 square feet of space available within 24 hours, with the balance to be had within approximately a week's time. Biltmore Garage, NE Corner of Fifth St. and Grand Ave. This is a 9-story Class A building containing 270,000 square feet er approximately 30,000 square feet per floor. Ceilinge average 8' to 9' in heighth with the ramp clearance of 7-1/2' to 8'. There is a large freight elevator on the Grand Avenue frontage, size 10' x 18', with a capacity of 6000 lbs. 

Jacobson, Manager of the Brawley Branch of the Security-First National Bank of Los Angeles, and I went over the ledger and deposit records of their account in the name of Hiroshi Kaku and discussed this matter with Hiroshi Kaku and his brother Keige Kaku. These deposits consisted of advances made to the Kaku Brothers by a vegetable wholesale dealer under an agreement for handling their vegetable crop, said crop being grown by the two brothers for themselves under a lease made by them. Since then, the Kaku brothers have sold their crops (in preparation for evacuation) under a marketing agreement and this agreement provides that advances made theretofore (including the \$400 referred to) are to be retired from sale of these crops. Setsudo Kaku, father of the two Kaku brothers referred to, was interned on or about February 15, 1942, and it is claimed the two brothers have been operating on their own for over six years with no interest of Setsudo Kaku thereon. We have been unable to find where any interest of Setsudo Kaku is in evidence for the past two years at least - which is as far back as I went for this purpose. Under the circumstances, Mr. Jacobson and I are satisfied that Setsudo Kaku had no interest in the funds above referred to and that both licenses were issued unnecessarily. Yours very truly. . C. H. SUBJECT: Evacues Property Department We have today received a letter from our El Centro field representative concerning Keige Kaku and Hiroshi Kaku, American born Japanese, who have been operating property in Imperial Valley. The first mentioned Japanese served in the United States Army from August 1941 to February of this year, but was transferred to the reserve and permitted to return to Imperial County. Insofar as our information is concerned, neither of these Japanese would be in the status of a "blocked national". The Brawley Branch of the Security-First National Bank, which is the depository for this enterprise, had blocked the checking account, on the strength of which the Japanese made application under No. SF 16297, dated January 5, 1942. This was not approved by your office. The bank again insisted, however, that the account was blocked and your office subsequently issued License No. SF 19821 on February 7, 1942, for a 15-day period and a similar license, No. SF 21040, dated February 28, 1942, for a three-month period. Reports required under these licenses have never been submitted and your office is endeavoring to obtain the information required. The Kaku brothers have no funds in the bank at the present time and have released control of their acreage. Under the circumstances we are wondering why it would not be feasible for your office to disregard the reports necessary under the two licenses mentioned, inasmuch as there apparently was no basis for blocking the account other than a misunderstanding on the part of the Manager of the Branch at Brawley, who has since admitted to our field representative that he had no conception of what a "blocked account" was suppose to be and assumed that it should be blocked because it was in the name of a Japanese. Insamuch as Imperial Valley will shortly be evacuated, we should like to have your instructions in regard to the reports in order that the matter may be clarified to the Japanese through our field representative at El Centro. Dear Mr. Bold : Keige Kaku is an American born citizen, Japanese parents, 27 years old, in U.S. Army from August 19, 1941, to February, 1942 when he was transferred to the U.S.Armyx reserve and permitted to come home to Imperial County. Hiroshi Kaku is an American born citizen, Japanese parents. 21 years old, living in Imperial County. Have under lease 14 acres (10 of tomatoes and 4 of squash) in name of Keige Kaku. In December, under some misapprehension, Hiroshi Kaku, who was conducting the farm operations under a power-of-attorney from his brother, was notified by the Secubity-First National Bank of Los Angeles, Brawley Branch, that their account in that Bank was a "blocked account". Hiroshi Kaku then made application on form TFE-1 for a license to go on with his operations. He received a letter from Mr. Everson's office dated January 5, 1942, that this application No. SF 16297 was not approved as it was not necessary under General License 68A. The said Bank again insisted that the account was a "blocked account" and a license would have to be secured. On the strength of this application was again made to San Francisco office of the Federal Reserve Bank and License SF 19821 was issued February 7, 1942, on form TFEL-1 under Executive Order 8389 "License to operate a business enterprise", for a 15 day period and a similar license SF 21040 dated February 28, 1942, for a three months' period was issued. They never submitted reports as required by said licenses and have inquiries dated April 29th on form Mis 228 from Mr. Parker of Foreign Funds Control for these reports. When I got on the job here, this was one of the cases that came to my attention very early and I ascertained from the Manager of the Brawley Branch of the Security-1st Nat'l Bank that he had no conception of what a "blocked account" was that the account never was blocked except that he said he "blocked it". Upon further inquiry, he said he understood that he was to "block such accounts" and therefore called it a "blocked account", simply because a "Japanese had something

Mr. Bold Sheet #2 to do with it". Subsequent to that, he informed the Kaku brothers that the account was not a "blocked account". The Kaku brothers have no funds in Bank now - have given control of their 14 acres of crops over to another individual under a marketing agreement and when the season is finally wound up the latter part of June, I doubt if they will have not much in excess of six or seven hundred dollars net. Under the circumstances, cannot licenses 3Mxmanamand SF 19821 and SF 21040 be marked canceled on the records so that the farm operating reports called for need not be made up? There never was any necessity for them having been applied for nor issued that I can find - that the condition referred to in Mr. Everson's letter of January 5, 1942, was actually the case and they were wholly within the provisions of 68A. I understand they will have to be evacuated along with all others from this area by May 21st (although they don't know

this yet) so would appreciate a prompt reply to this.



Your kind assistance of last Monday was most helpful. Please accept my sincere appreciation and gratitude.

I am taking the liberty of writing you for further information as you suggested. The following questions I have been unable to clarify or confirm here in Los Angeles and perhaps you may be in a position to obtain the answers to them. The questions are as follows:

- (1) Can evacuees, especially farmers from Zone "A" move into and settle in Zone "B"
- (2) Can a business such as ours i.e. the fertilizer industry, operate with or without restrictions in Zone "B", e.g. send out salesmen to solicit and advise farmers, deliver material etc.
- (3) Can farming equipment be moved out of Zone "A" into the restricted "B" or unrestricted white zones.

The above questions may be better understood if we give you a picture of what we are attempting to do. We have located a place in Reedley which is about 20 miles inside the unrestricted white zone. There we will set up a sales and general office. Our plant and plant force we will retain here in Los Angeles with an arrangement to continue the warehouse and plant operations under a trusteeship. What is essential to find out is whether or not we will be permitted to operate in the "B" zones as well as in the unrestricted white zones.

We are sympathetically inclined, however, to Mrs. Kiyomura's request and feel that this is possibly the outstanding case where consideration should be given, but hesitate to do so as we would unquestionably be establishing a bad precedent. Furthermore, it is our understanding that shipments other than by parcel post are not permitted to enter the reception centers.
