TREASURY DEPARTMENT

The Treasury Department, by this public notice, invites tenders for \$1,600,000,000, or thereabouts, of 91-day Treasury bills, for cash and in exchange for Treasury bills maturing June 14, 1956, in the amount of \$1,600,206,000, to be issued on a discount basis under competitive and noncompetitive bidding as hereinafter provided. The bills of this series will be dated June 14, 1956, and will mature September 13, 1956, when the face amount will be payable without interest. They will be issued in bearer form only, and in denominations of \$1,000, \$5,000, \$10,000, \$100,000, \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 (maturity value).

Tenders will be received at Federal Reserve Banks and Branches up to the closing hour, one-thirty o'clock, p.m., Eastern Daylight Saving time, Monday, June 11, 1956. Tenders will not be received at the Treasury Department, Washington. Each tender must be for an even multiple of \$1,000, and in the case of competitive tenders the price offered must be expressed on the basis of 100, with not more than three decimals, e.g., 99.925. Fractions may not be used. It is urged that tenders be made on the printed forms and forwarded in the special envelopes which will be supplied by Federal Reserve Banks or Branches on application therefor.

Others than banking institutions will not be permitted to submit tenders except for their own account. Tenders will be received without deposit from incorporated banks and trust companies and from responsible and recognized dealers in investment securities. Tenders from others must be accompanied by payment of 2 percent of the face amount of Treasury bills applied for, unless the tenders are accompanied by an express guaranty of payment by an incorporated bank or trust company.

Immediately after the closing hour, tenders will be opened at the Federal Reserve Banks and Branches, following which public announcement will be made by the Treasury Department of the amount and price range of accepted bids. Those submitting tenders will be advised of the acceptance or rejection thereof. The Secretary of the Treasury expressly reserves the right to accept or reject any or all tenders, in whole or in part, and his action in any such respect shall be final. Subject to these reservations, noncompetitive tenders for \$200,000 or less without stated price from any one bidder will be accepted in full at the average price (in three decimals) of accepted competitive bids. Settlement for accepted tenders in accordance with the bids must be made or completed at the Federal Reserve Bank on June 14, 1956, in cash or other immediately available funds or in a like face amount of Treasury bills maturing June 14, 1956. Cash and exchange tenders will receive equal treatment. Cash adjustments will be made for differences between the par value of maturing bills accepted in exchange and the issue price of the new bills. exchange and the issue price of the new bills.

The income derived from Treasury bills, whether interest or gain from the sale or other disposition of the bills, does not have any exemption, as such, and loss from the sale or other disposition of Treasury bills does not have any special treatment, as such, under the Internal Revenue Code of 1954. The bills are subject to estate, inheritance, gift or other excise taxes, whether Federal or State, but are exempt from all taxation now or hereafter imposed on the principal or interest thereof by any State, or any of the possessions of the United States, or by any local taxing authority. For purposes of taxation the amount of discount at which Treasury bills are originally sold by the United States is considered to be interest. Under Sections 454(b) and 1221(5) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 the amount of discount at which bills issued hereunder are sold is not considered to accrue until such bills are sold, redeemed or otherwise disposed of, and such bills are excluded from consideration as capital assets. Accordingly, the owner of Treasury bills (other than life insurance companies) issued to be income to return only the difference between the price paid for such bills, whether on original hereunder need include in his income tax return only the difference between the price paid for such bills, whether on original issue or on subsequent purchase, and the amount actually received either upon sale or redemption at maturity during the taxable year for which the return is made, as ordinary gain or loss.

Treasury Department Circular No. 418, Revised, and this notice, prescribe the terms of the Treasury bills and govern the conditions of their issue. Copies of the circular may be obtained from any Federal Reserve Bank or Branch.

This Bank will receive tenders up to 1:30 p.m., Eastern Daylight Saving time, Monday, June 11, 1956, at the Securities Department of its Head Office and at its Buffalo Branch. Please use the form on the reverse side of this circular to submit a tender, and return it in an envelope marked "Tender for Treasury Bills." Tenders may be submitted by telegraph, subject to written confirmation; they may not be submitted by telephone. Payment for the Treasury bills cannot be made by credit through the Treasury Tax and Loan Account. Settlement must be made in cash or other immediately available funds or in maturing Treasury bills.

DANGEROUS COUNTERFEIT FEDERAL RESERVE NOTES

To all Banks in the Second Federal Reserve District:

Counterfeit Federal Reserve notes of the 1950 A series in the \$20 denomination have appeared in the Second Federal Reserve District. Your tellers and customers should be warned to be on the alert for the appearance of similar counterfeits. While the counterfeits that have appeared purport to be issues of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York (B), it would be prudent to assume that similar counterfeits purporting to be issues of other Federal Reserve Banks may also appear.

The United States Secret Service describes the new counterfeits as follows:

The serial number on the specimens seen to date is B 73030086H.

The over-all appearance of the note is deceptively good. It is printed from intaglio plates on distinctive paper, apparently obtained by bleaching \$1 notes. The portrait of Jackson is somewhat dark and coarse. Department stores and women's specialty shops have been the principal victims to date.

All counterfeit currency received from any source should be marked for identification and forwarded to the nearest office of the United States Secret Service, rather than to Washington, D. C. In this District, the Secret Service has offices in Room 917, Federal Office Building, 90 Church Street, New York 7, New York; in the United States Court House, Buffalo 1, New York; in the Post Office Building, Syracuse, New York; and at 1060 Broad Street, Newark 1, New Jersey.
