Dear Benator Owen:

I count it a a privilege to have received from you your learned depositions before the house committee on banking and currency. I am happy also to have "The senatorial career of Robert Latham Owen," a pleasure shared by Mrs. Foreman. Last evening I was showing them to the librarian of the public library at Pryor, Oklahoma, and suggested that they ought to have these works in that library. She will probably make the request of you. I am very grateful to you for giving them to me.

Last week I sent to the University of Oklahoma
Press my manuscript on "A History of Oklahoma". This is
not a school text book; I have intended it for the
use and information of people who wish to read something of our history. I am greatly indebted to you
for much of the information touching conditions in
this country while you were agent at the Union Agency.
I am sure that very few people now living have any
idea of the abuse of tribal privileges to which you
called attention throughout your administration,
and which hastened tribal dissolution and statehood.
