INTERPRETATION OF BANKING ACT OF 1933

Reference is made to your letter of September 6, 1934,
inclosing a copy of a letter dated August 31, 1934, addressed to
Mr, Assistant Federal Reserve Agent at the Federal Re-
serve Bank of, in which you ask for the opinion of the
Board with regard to the question whether Mr, who
holds the position of Manager of the Branch Office at,
, of, should be regarded as a "manager" of
that company within the meaning of section 32 of the Banking Act
of 1933.
Your letter, and the letter from point out
that Mr authority is limited and that the home office
prescribes definite rules which he must follow in all transactions
The letter from amplifies this statement, and adds
that he has no authority over the character of the business trans-
acted. In the circumstances, you suggest that section 32 is not
applicable to Mr since the word "manager" should be
interpreted to include persons who not only carry on some part of
the management of the organization but who are also vested with
a share of the final control or authority in the organization, or
assist in formulating its policies.

The Board has given careful consideration to the view which you express in this matter but, as the word "manager" is frequently used to describe a person in charge of a local branch office of an organization and in view of the wide use of the term as applied to managers of branch offices of securities dealers at the time when the Banking Act of 1933 was under consideration by Congress, the Board is of the opinion that the words "officer, director, or manager" in section 32 are properly to be regarded as including a manager of such a branch office. This view is indicated in the definition of the word "manager" in the Board's Regulation R and has been followed in connection with several applications under section 32 which have been acted upon by the Board.
