A NEW EDITORIAL PLAN FOR THE SURVEY OF CURRENT BUSINESS

With a view to making the Survey of Current Business of greater practical value to the business men of the country and to others interested in the development and trends of American business and industry, the following new editorial plan for the Survey is announced:

An Annual Supplement to the Survey of Current Business, the first issue to be published in March, 1931. The 1931 Annual Supplement, of about 275 pages, will contain monthly data for the past seven years, and cover some 2,000 items on the activities of business and industry.

A Monthly Survey of Current Business of 52 pages, which will contain all data reported by the 25th of the month, and which will be distributed within 8 or 10 days after that date. The Monthly Survey will contain monthly business statistics on some 2,000 items, carefully arranged alphabetically, and running back 13 months; the weekly business statistics for the latest weeks, with yearly comparisons. The data will be supplemented by 25 pages of interpretive text and diagrams conveniently arranged, prepared by members of the Division of Statistical Research of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce. The semiannual issues of past years will be displaced by a regular monthly issue and by the Annual Supplement.

A 4-page Weekly Supplement to the Survey of Current Business, containing weekly and monthly data made available during the preceding week, will be distributed the following Thursday. The Weekly Supplement will follow the current form very closely for the present.



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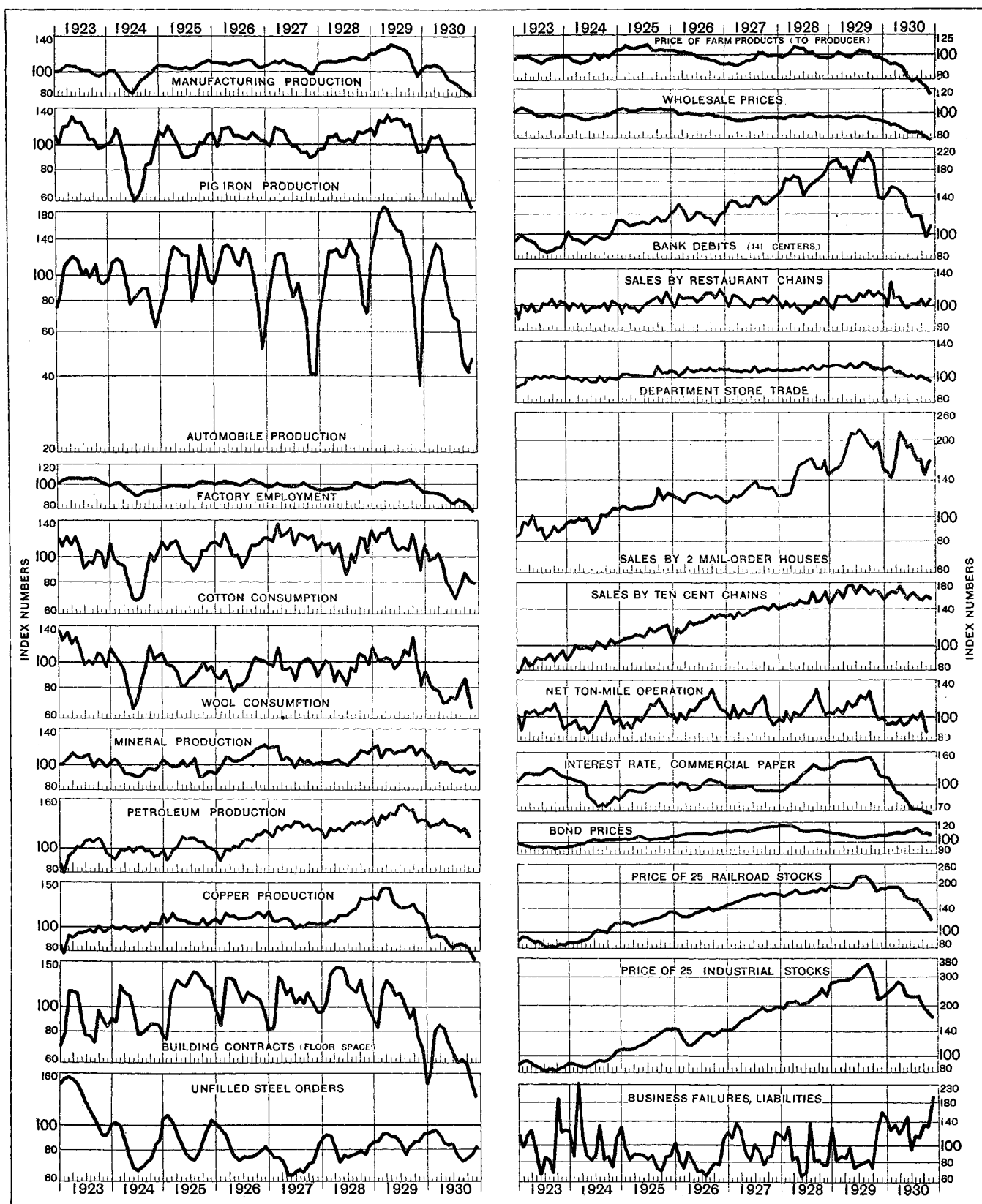

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Loans and discounts of Federal reserve member banks showed a falling off during the first three weeks of the month and were less than those of a year ago. The Federal reserve ratio was higher than at the close of December, 1930, and above January a year ago. Bank debits outside New York for the early weeks of January were on an average above those of December, but were materially under January, 1930. Prices of stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange averaged slightly higher than during the closing weeks of December, but were materially under the corresponding period last year. Bond prices, on the other hand, averaged higher than both previous periods. Loans to brokers and dealers secured by stocks and bonds continued to decline during the early weeks of the month.

MONTHLY BUSINESS INDICATORS

The principal business indicators are shown below, all calculated on a comparable basis, the average for the years 1923 to 1925, inclusive. Thus the table gives a bird's-eye view of the business situation in a concise form, so that trends of the principal indicators may be seen at a glance.

Certain indicators, in which there is a marked seasonal movement, are shown with the average seasonal variations eliminated, as noted below. In this manner a more understanding month-to-month comparison may be made.

GENERAL REVIEW OF THE YEAR 1930

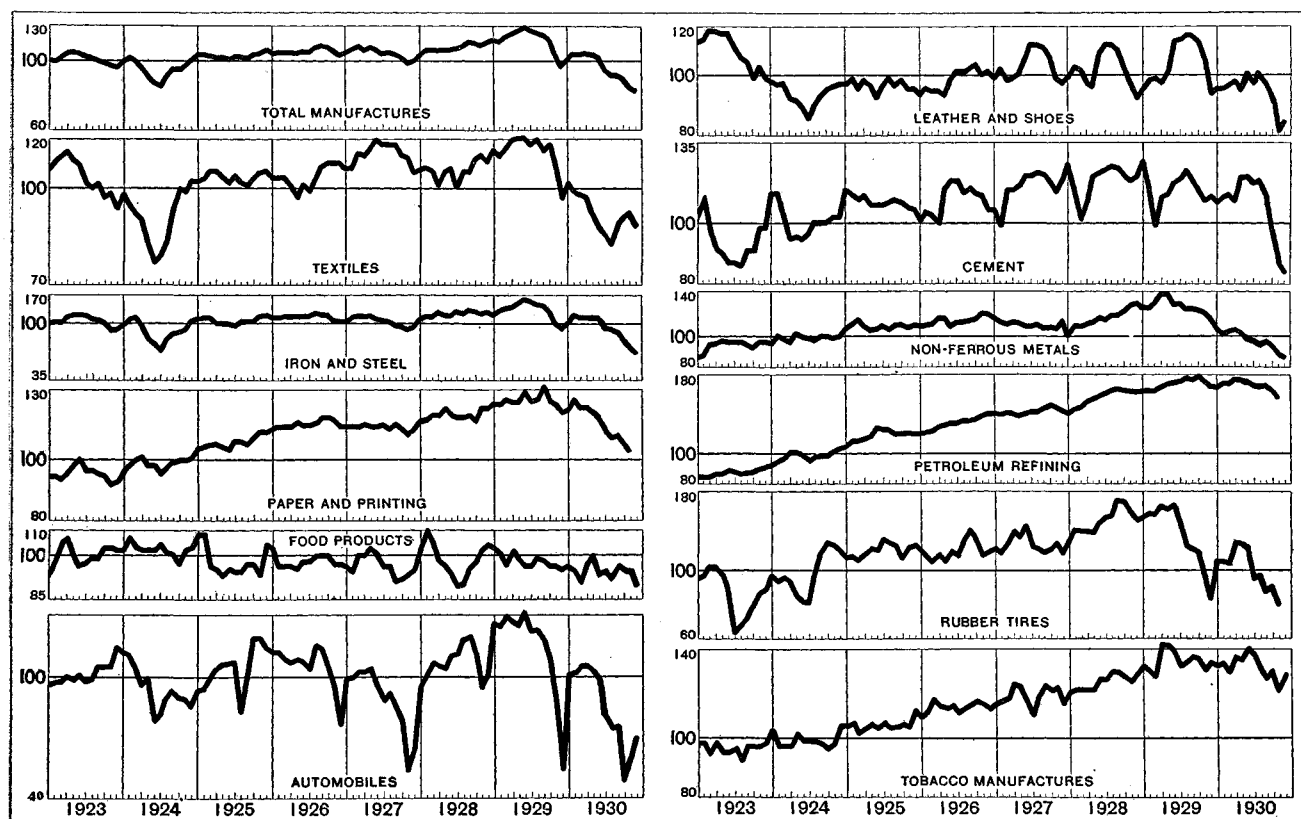
The year 1930 witnessed a continual month-by-month decline in general business and industrial activity, with the exception of April. This decrease in operations was shared by practically all business and industrial groups.

Bank debits outside New York City totaled \$277,577,000,000 for the year, a decrease of 17 per cent from the 1929 total and 9.3 per cent under 1928. January witnessed the largest volume of bank debits and November the smallest volume. The average monthly volume was \$23,131,000,000, against \$27,684,000,000 in 1929 and \$25,516,000,000 in 1928. Because a number of automobile manufacturers brought out their new models in November instead of January, as in former years, the December production exceeded that of December, 1929. The iron and steel industry also witnessed a 1930 volume of operations materially under that of 1929, steel-ingot production for the year totaling 39,653,000 long tons, or 27 per cent below the 1929 production and 20.4 per cent under 1928. The peak of operations was witnessed in March, and the year's low point was recorded in December, after a continuous decline following the March peak, with the exception of August.

business failures during the year totaled 26,355, against 22,909 in 1929 and 23,842 in 1928. The number of failures during each month in 1930 was without exception greater than for the corresponding month in 1929 or 1928.

The rate of manufacturing operations as indicated by the consumption of electrical energy for power purposes increased during January and February, declined steadily until August, when an upward turn was reported which lasted through September. The year closed with the rate of general manufacturing 14.9 per cent under that reported at the close of 1929 and 22.2 per cent under December, 1928. Automobile production for the year totaled 3,354,870 cars of all types, against 5,358,420 in 1929 and 4,358,759 in 1928.

Distribution as pictured by freight-car loadings declined materially during 1930 as compared with previous years. Car loadings for the year totaled 45,887,413, as against 52,827,925 in 1929 and 51,589,887 in 1928. Movements of merchandise, as indicated by lot car loadings during 1930 were 7.6 per cent under 1929 and 7.3 per cent under 1928.

Reflecting the decreased demand for fuel by manufacturing plants, the production of coal during 1930 was materially under that of 1929. Bituminous coal mined during 1930 totaled 461,630,000 short tons, a decrease of 65,153,000 tons from the 1929 production and 39,115,000 tons under 1928.

The year as a whole witnessed an almost continual decline in employment and volume of pay rolls. The

cost of living declined throughout the year, excepting September. The cost of fuel and lighting, while following the general downward trend during the first half of the year, witnessed a continued increase during the last half. The cost of clothing and food had the greatest drops during the year.

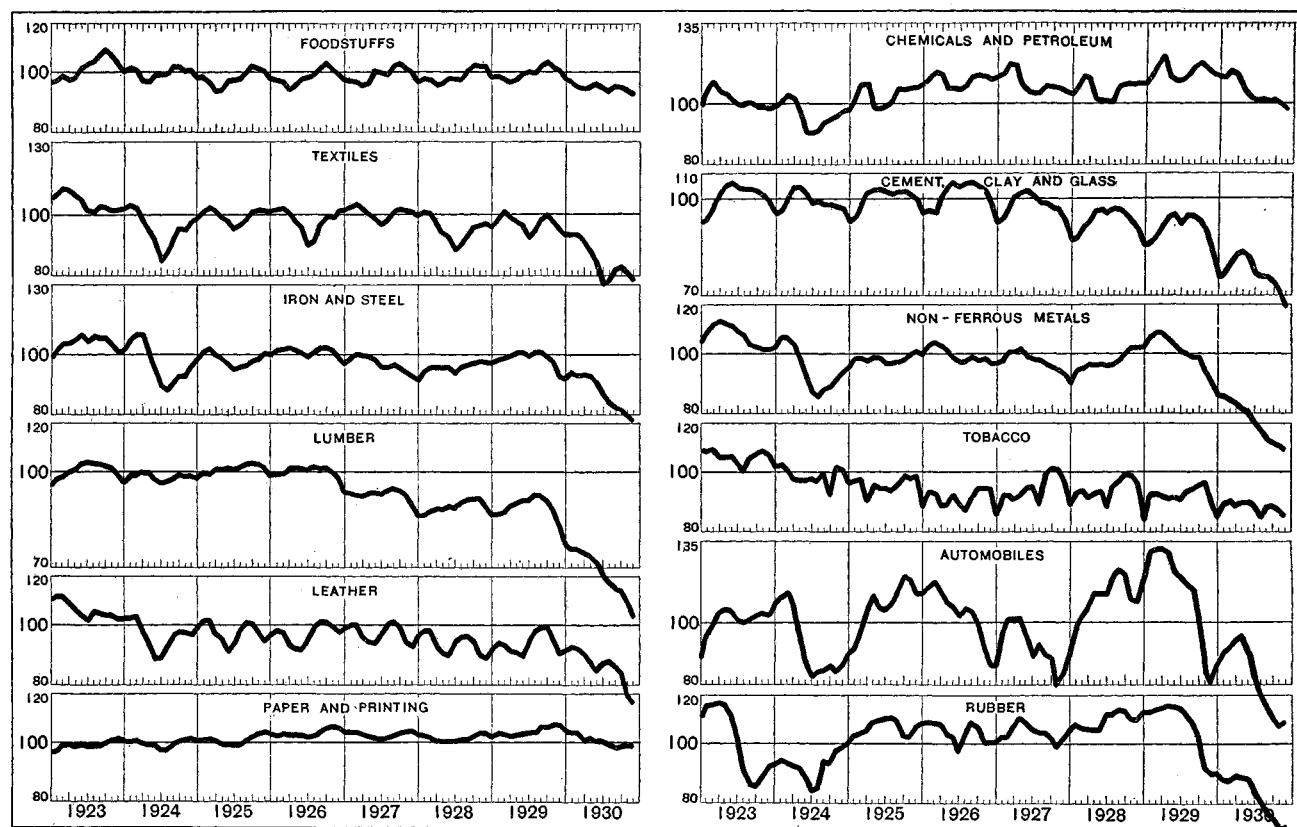
The values of both exports and imports of commodities showed substantial declines during 1930 as compared with 1929. Although the reduction in value of exports was due in part to smaller foreign sales, it

The closing week of 1930 found the average price of representative stocks some 28.4 per cent under the corresponding week in 1929. Bond prices, on the other hand, in general rose during the year, closing the year on a slightly higher level than at the close of 1929 and about on a level with the close of 1928.

With the exception of public works, the square footage and valuation of the various groups of contracts awarded were less for the year than in 1929 or the immediately preceding years. The efforts made

reflected also the marked falling off in general commodity prices.

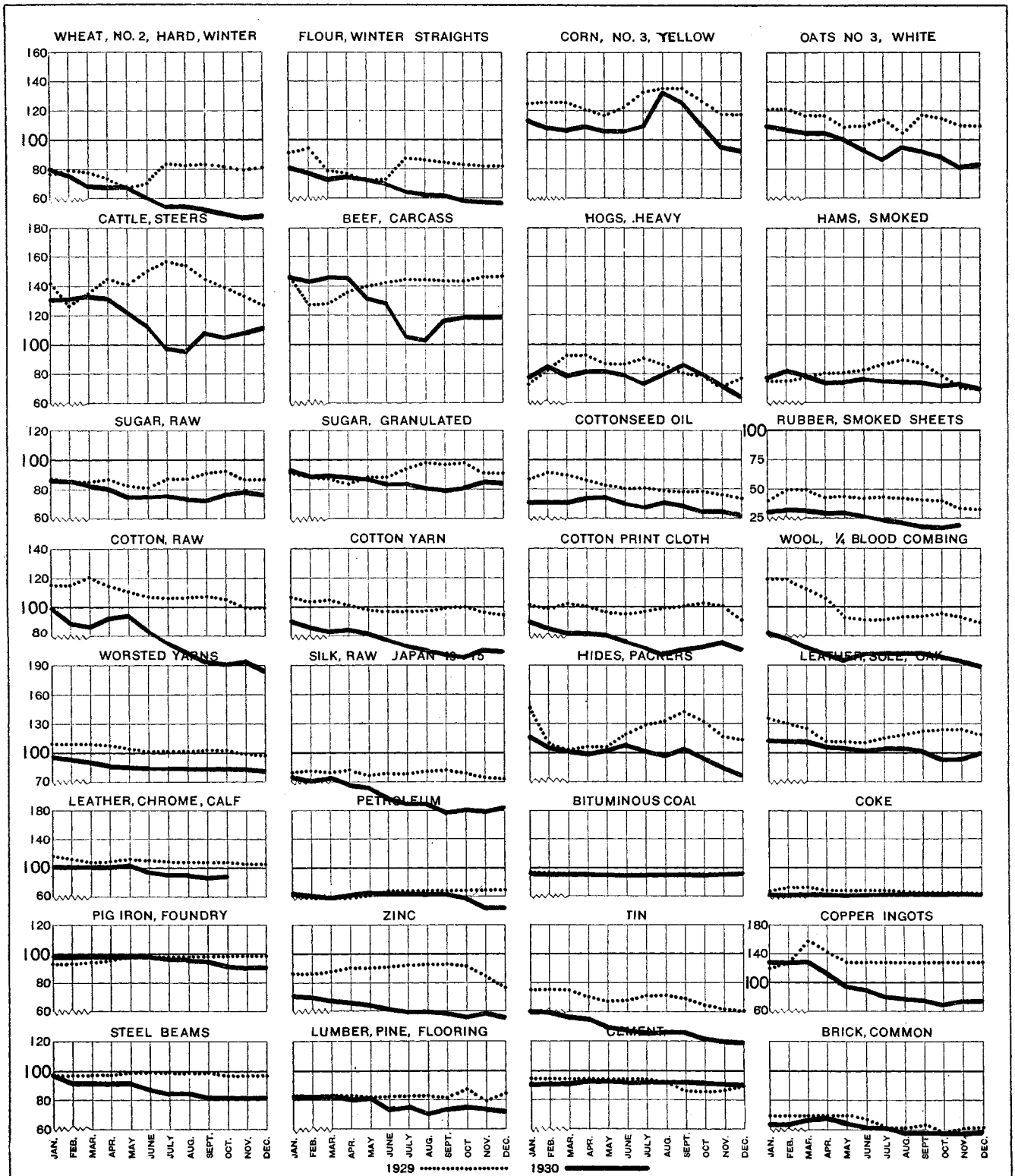
Extremely marked recessions in the prices of crude materials and food stuffs, which constitute the major part of our foreign purchases, account for a considerable part of the decline in the value of imports during the year.

Prices of representative stocks on the New York Exchange rose slowly during the first four months of the year, but, starting at the opening of May, a downward trend developed which continued, with but few exceptions, during the remainder of the year.

during the year to encourage public construction as a means of partially relieving unemployment resulted in a considerable increase in the valuation of public works and public utility contracts awarded during 1930, as compared with 1929. Residential building contracts awarded, which account for about one-half the square footage and 40 to 45 per cent of the total valuation of all types of contracts awarded, were less for the year than in 1929 or other recent years. The volume of industrial buildings showed a decided falling off from 1929, in which year there was unusual activity in this type of construction.

[Relative numbers, 1926 monthly average taken as 100. December, 1930, is latest month plotted. Data from which these charts are drawn are given on the opposite page]



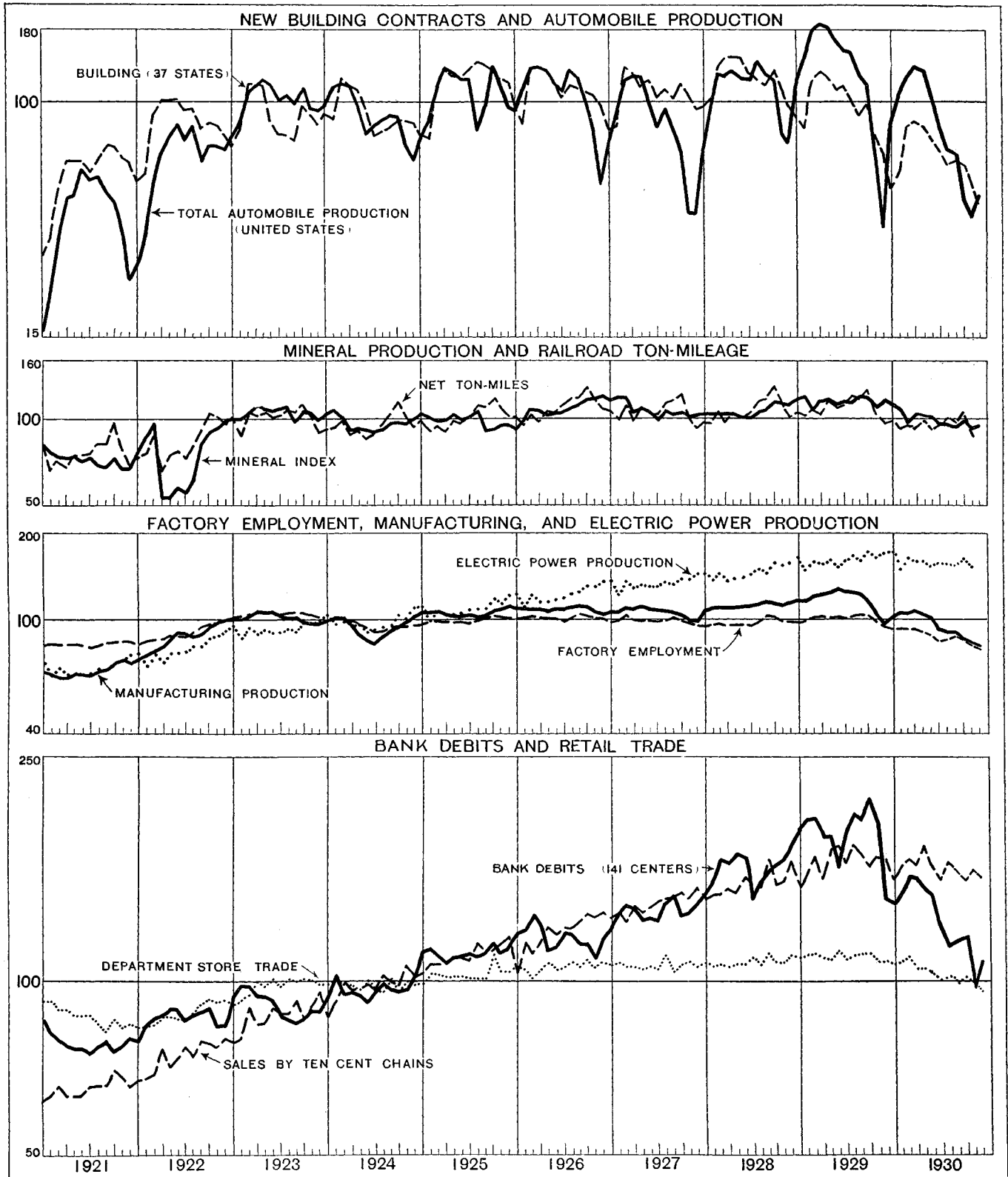

[Relative numbers, monthly average 1923-1925, taken as 100]



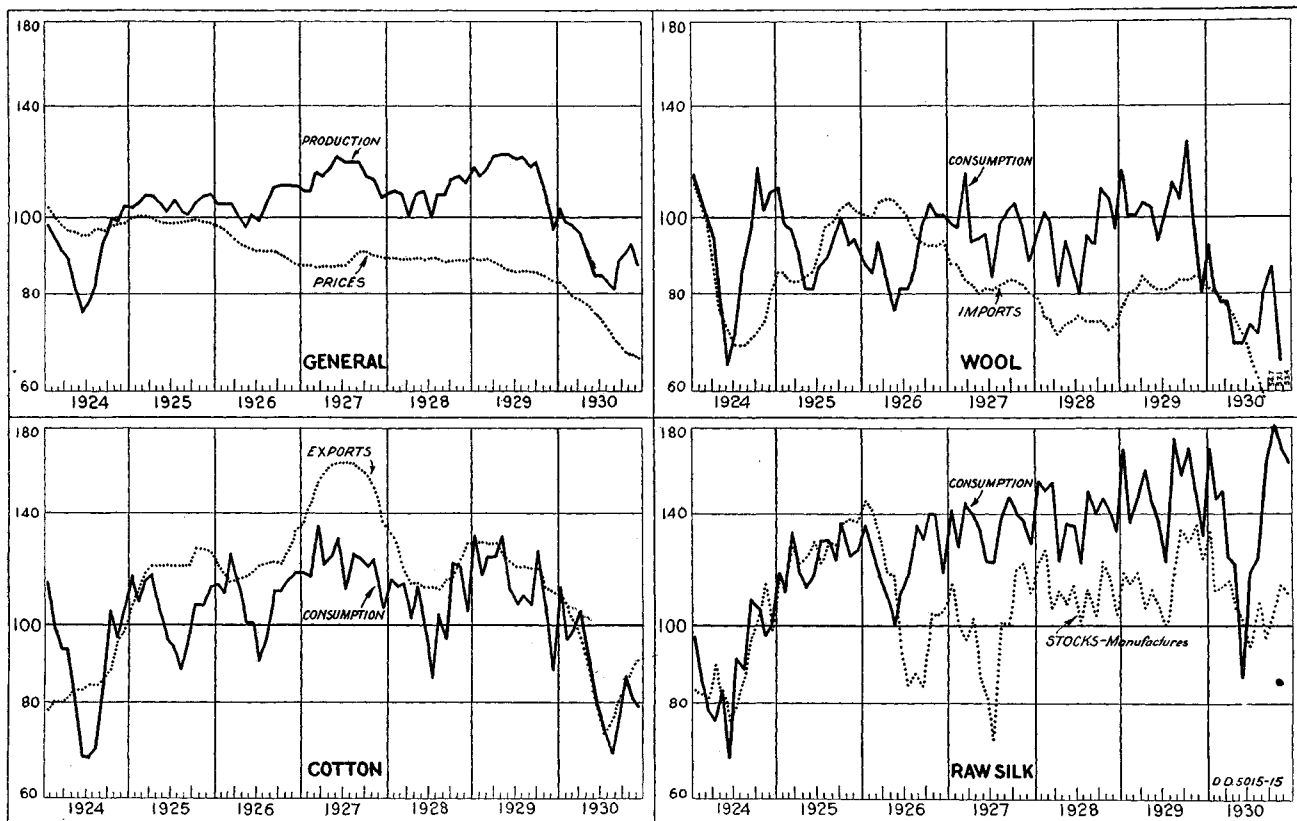
BUSINESS CONDITIONS IN DECEMBER

The volume of general business operations in the country as a whole during December was the smallest so far in the present recession. Bank debits outside of New York City were greater than November, a normal trend during the holiday month, but were under the corresponding month in 1929. The value of new building contracts decreased from the previous period and was materially under that of the year previous. The activity of steel plants declined from November, steel ingots production being 10.1 per cent under November and 30.8 per cent under December, 1929. Wholesale prices of commodities, as measured

were below December, 1929. Interest rates on time money rose during the month, while rates on call money, with the exception of one week, remained on the same level as during November. Both rates, however, were materially lower than during the same period in 1929 and 1928. Bond prices during December continued to decline from those of November, and were about on the same level as during the same period in 1929, but were lower than 1928. Stock prices also continued to decline during December, reaching the low point of the year during the final week of the month. Brokers' loans declined steadily

by Fisher's index, continued to decline during December and were considerably under the corresponding month of the year previous. Prices of farm products receded to the lowest quotation of the year. Prices of all commodities, except farm and food products, dropped only slightly in comparison with November, but were considerably under the 1929 quotation. Iron and steel prices remained fractionally on the same level as during November, but were considerably under 1929 prices.

Loans and discounts of Federal reserve member banks declined slightly from the November level, and

during December and were materially under 1929. The Federal reserve ratio continued to decline throughout the month, but was considerably higher than during December, 1929. The number of commercial failures remained on a comparatively high level both in respect to November and December, 1929.

Total freight-car loadings during December were the lowest of the year and were materially under December of the year previous. Bituminous coal production also declined during December and was also under the 1929 production.

REVIEW OF PRINCIPAL BRANCHES OF COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY

TEXTILES

The receipts of wool at Boston in December amounted to 11,574,000 pounds, as compared with 15,272,000 pounds in December, 1929. Exports of raw cotton in December registered a loss from the exports of November and were less than in December, 1929 and 1928. Consumption of cotton by textile mills showed a decrease from the preceding month, and was less than December, 1929. Stocks of this commodity were higher than both comparative periods.

Deliveries of silk to mills were lower in December than in the previous month, but materially exceeded the corresponding period of 1929. Stocks of silk at warehouses at the end of December, although greater

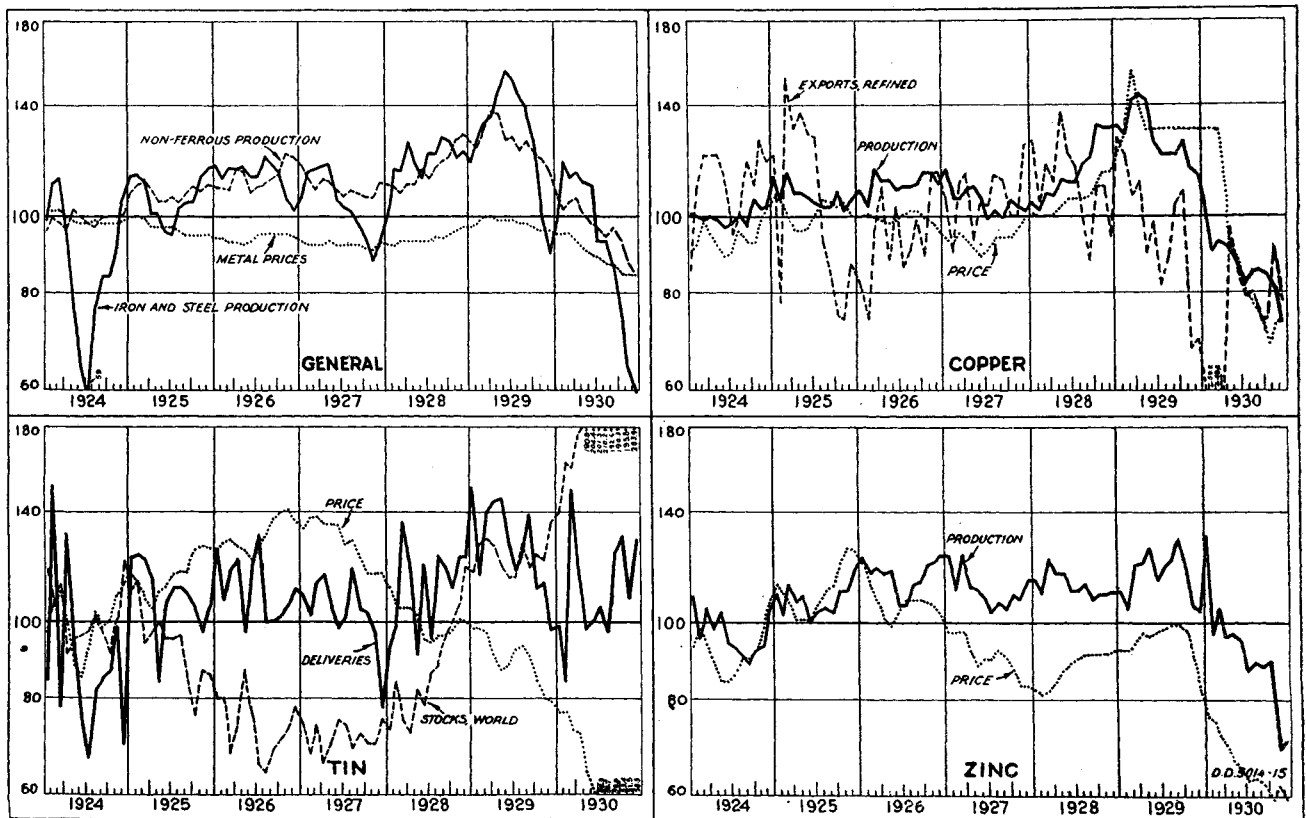
Shipments of iron ore from mines were considerably less than during the previous month. The consumption of iron ore and the production of pig iron also decreased from both prior periods, and the number of furnaces in blast decreased proportionately.

The December output of steel ingots was less than for either the previous month or the corresponding month of 1929. Total production and new orders of steel and malleable castings increased in the month previous, but were under December, 1929.

Unfilled orders of the United States Steel Corporation were greater than for the previous month, but were under the corresponding month of 1929. Pro-

than at the end of the previous month, were smaller than at the close of December, 1929. Silk machinery in the case of broad looms showed less activity than in November. As compared with the activity of a year ago, December, 1929, the activity of broad and narrow looms was decreased. The activity of spindles was less than in November, but was slightly greater than in December, 1929.

Production of pyroxylin-coated textiles was less than in November and lower than December, 1929. Shipments billed during December increased over the preceding month, while unfilled orders decreased. In comparison with the year previous, both items were decreased.

duction of track work increased from November, but was under December, 1929.

The December output of zinc showed a slight increase over the previous month, but was less than during the corresponding month in 1929. The number of zinc retorts in operation was less than in either prior period. The December production of copper at the mines showed a decrease from November and was considerably less than in 1929. Smelter copper output was less than in the preceding month.

Imports of tin were less than during November and under the year previous. Deliveries of tin, indicative of consumption, showed gains from comparative periods. The world visible supply increased from

November and was greater than at the end of December, 1929. Tin prices were uniformly less than in November and less than those during the same period in 1929.

FUELS

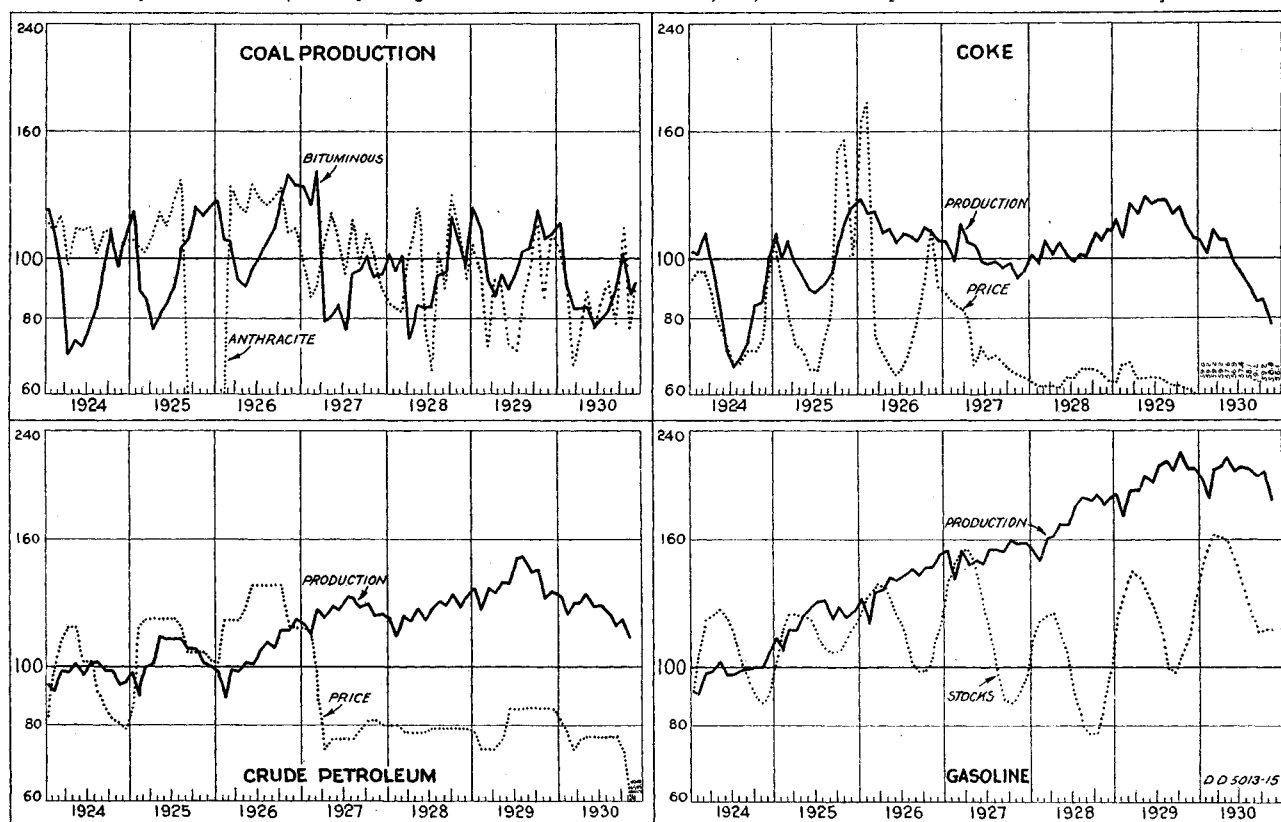
The production of bituminous coal and of anthracite was greater than during the previous month, but less than during December, 1929. Coal prices in general were less than in either prior period. Beehive coke output was slightly less than in November, and was materially under that of the corresponding month in 1929.

HIDES AND LEATHER

December imports of hides and skins from foreign countries were greater than those during the previous month, but less than in December, 1929. As compared with the imports in December, 1929, imports of calf skins and cattle skins were less. The production of boots and shoes during December were less than in December, 1929. Production of gloves and mittens showed an increase over the month of November and was greater than during the corresponding month in 1929. Exports of sole leather to foreign lands registered a decrease from November, but were materially over December, 1929.

AUTOMOBILES AND RUBBER

There were 155,601 passenger cars, trucks, and taxicabs produced in the United States during the month of December. This compares with 135,752 in November and 120,007 in October, 1929. Canadian output totaled 5,622 cars and trucks, as compared with 5,407 for November and 5,495 for December, 1929. The total output during 1930 in the United States was 3,354,870 cars of all types, as compared with 5,358,420 in 1929 and 4,358,759 in 1928.

A greater quantity of rubber was imported during December than during November, but less than in December, 1929. The value of automobile pneumatic casings exports for December totaled \$2,103,304, against \$1,944,467 in November and \$2,377,760 in December, 1929. The total value of exports of casings during 1930 was \$27,768,878, against \$33,479,692 in 1929.

PAPER

The imports of newsprint during December were less than during November, or during December, 1929. Newsprint output by mills in both the United States and Canada was less than during November, and less as compared with December of the year previous. Consumption of newsprint by publishers showed increases from comparative periods. During 1930 more newsprint was used in this country than during either 1929 or 1928. Imports of woodpulp were greater than in November, but materially under December, 1929.

LUMBER

The production of Douglas fir lumber during December was less than during November, and was less than during December, 1929. Production, shipments, and new orders were all less as compared with

the year previous. California redwood returns indicated decreased production, shipments, and new orders as compared with November. As with Douglas fir, all items were less than in 1929. There was less northern pine lumber shipped in December than during the previous month, the production being somewhat greater. The production, shipments, and stocks of maple flooring were all less than in both prior periods.

FOODSTUFFS

The visible supply of wheat in the United States, while less than at the end of November, was greater than at the close of December, 1929. Wheat receipts, shipments, and exports were less than those of the

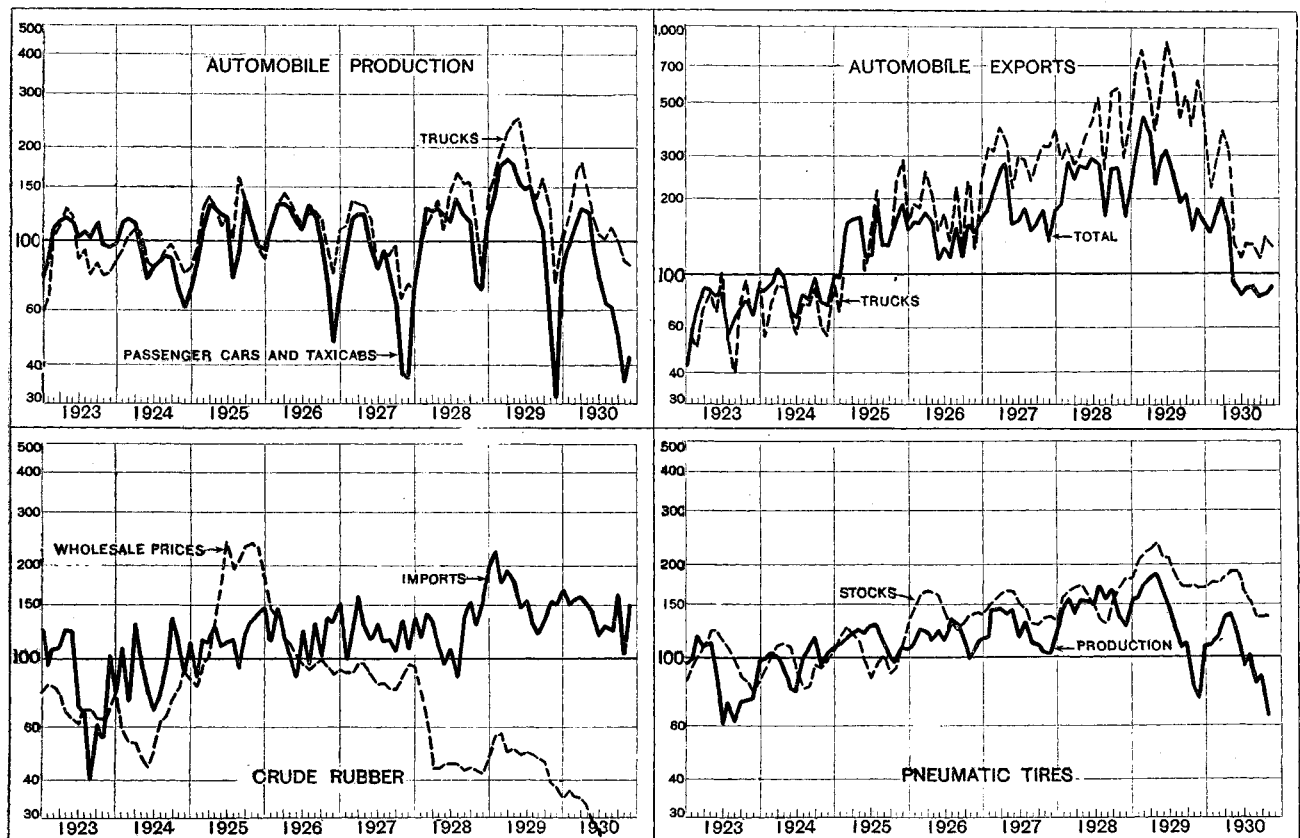
hogs. Cold-storage holdings of beef products at the end of December also showed an increase over November, but were under December, 1929. Wholesale prices of beef products averaged about the same as in November but were less than in December, 1929.

Shipments and slaughter of hogs showed increases from November. As compared with December, 1929, shipments were greater and local slaughter less. The production of pork products decreased from November and was less than the corresponding month in 1929. Holdings in cold storage showed increases from November, but were under the corresponding month in 1929.

Shipments of sheep and lambs during December showed a decrease from the preceding month, but in-

preceding month and those for the corresponding month in the year previous. Flour was exported in less quantities than during November and December, 1929. Exports of flour from Canada were less than either prior period. Receipts and shipments of corn were greater than during the preceding month, but less than in December, 1929. The visible supply of corn increased from November, and was greater than in 1929. Prices of wheat, corn, oats, barley, and rye were decreased from November, and were, without exception, less than the corresponding month in 1929.

Receipts of livestock of all types were greater than in November. As compared with December, 1929, receipts in each case were greater with the exception of

increased over the corresponding month of 1929. Local slaughter increased over November. Production and consumption of mutton and lamb were greater than during both comparative periods. Prices of ewes and lambs decreased as compared with those of the month of November and a year ago.

Receipts at important markets for live poultry were seasonally greater than during the month of November; holdings in storage also showed a similar change. In comparison with December, 1929, both receipts and holdings were lower. Receipts and cold-storage holdings of butter, cheese, and eggs were all less than in the previous month and December, 1929.

TOBACCO

The consumption of large cigars during December indicated a decrease from the preceding period, but small cigarettes increased. In comparison with the corresponding month of 1929, similar trends were witnessed.

Exports of unmanufactured tobacco and cigarettes during December were greater than the previous month but less than in December, 1929.

BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION

Building costs were generally higher in December than in November, but were on a lower level than during the month of December, 1929. New building

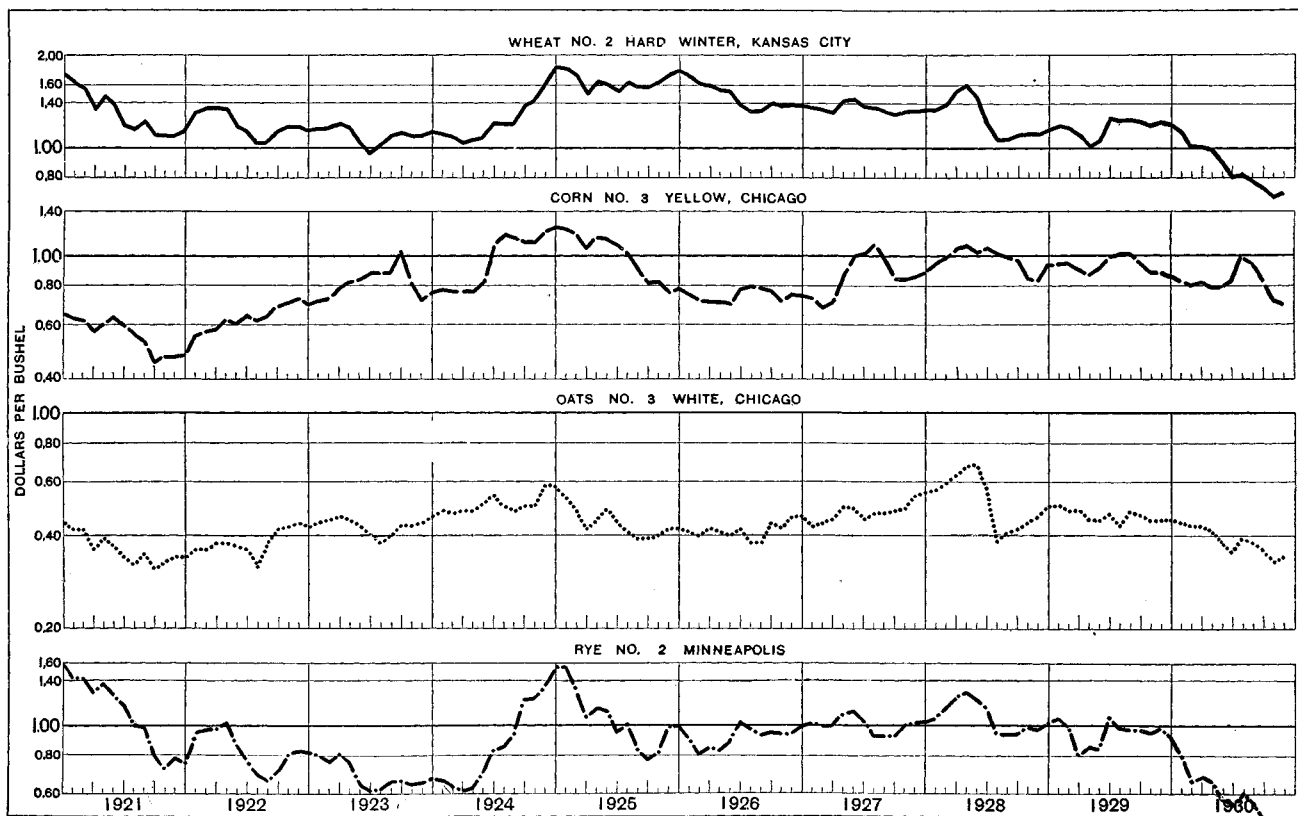
BUILDING MATERIALS

Portland cement output in the United States during December was smaller than during the preceding month and was below production of December, 1929. The 1930 production totaled 160,905,000 barrels; this compares with 170,198,000 barrels for 1929 and 175,968,000 barrels in 1928. Shipments were under prior periods, but December stocks were slightly in excess of December, 1929.

The production of sand-lime brick and face brick were both less than during November. In comparison with December, 1929, the stocks of common brick were smaller, and those of face and sand-lime were also smaller. Shipments of all types of brick showed

in 37 States, as measured by contracts awarded (as compiled by the F. W. Dodge Corporation), showed decreases both in total valuation of contracts and in floor space from the month of November. As compared with December, 1929, both were less. In comparison with November, increased valuation of contracts was noted in contracts awarded for public buildings, religious and memorial buildings, and in public works and utilities, while decreases occurred in commercial buildings, industrial buildings, educational buildings, hospital and institutional buildings, recreational buildings, and residential buildings. In contrast with December, 1929, contracts let for all types of buildings, with the exception of educational buildings, hospitals, public buildings, and public works and utilities, were smaller.

decreases from prior periods. Output of polished plate glass during December amounted to 4,941,000 square feet, as compared with 7,103,000 square feet in November and 8,482,000 square feet in December, 1929. Production of all types of prepared roofing and the output and stocks of roofing felt in December showed decreases from the preceding month and December of the year previous.

TRANSPORTATION

The movement of commodities by rail, as reflected by freight-car loadings, showed a decrease from the previous month and was also less than December, 1929. For the year 45,887,413 freight cars were loaded with all types of commodities. This compares with 52,827,925 cars in 1929 and 51,589,887 in 1928.

Surplus freight cars, both box and hopper, were more plentiful than in the previous month and in December, 1929. Clearances of American and foreign vessels for foreign trade in December were less than during the previous month, but above December of the year previous.

BANKING AND FINANCE

Bank debits, both in and outside New York City, exceeded those of the preceding month, but were smaller than in December, 1929. Bank clearings in Canada also showed a similar comparison. Loans and discounts of Federal reserve member banks showed decreases from both the preceding month and December, 1929. Brokers' loans at the end of the month were less than at the end of both the month of November and December, 1929. Interest rates on call-loan renewals showed an increase from November, while rates on 60 to 90 day commercial paper remained as in November. Both rates were considerably less than the year previous.

More business firms failed during December than during the previous month, and the liabilities of such firms were also greater. The number of business failures were greater and the liabilities were more than during the corresponding month of 1929. Prices of

representative stocks were lower than the preceding month and December, 1929. Bond prices also showed losses from comparative periods.

GOLD AND SILVER

Domestic receipts of gold at the mint were less than during the previous month, but exceeded those of December, 1929. Imports showed a similar tendency, while exports were less than the exports during both periods. The production of silver in the United States was less than for the previous month and was also under December, 1929. Imports of silver were slightly greater and exports were less than during November. Both movements were under the level of December, 1929. Silver stocks decreased from the previous month, but were greater than at the end of December, 1929.

FOREIGN EXCHANGE

Exchanges on the principal countries showed little change from November, there being a slight advance in rates in Belgium and Netherlands. Declines in rates were registered in India, Canada, Argentina, and Brazil. Compared with a year ago, rates of exchange in Japan and Canada increased, while rates in England, Netherlands, Sweden, India, Argentina, and Brazil declined.

INDEXES OF BUSINESS

The index numbers presented in this table are designed to show the trend in production, prices, trade, etc., by commodities or groups. They consist in general of weighted combinations of series of individual relative numbers; often the individual relative numbers are also given. All of the index numbers, except where noted, are based on the average of the years 1923 to 1925, while maxima and minima are given only since 1923, thus eliminating the abnormal period prior to 1923.
