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PERSONAL INCOME AND OUTLAYS - March 1982

Personal income increased \$10.4 billion in March to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$2,524.8 billion, according to the Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis. Personal outlays declined \$4.0 billion to \$2,005.6 billion. In February, personal income increased \$15.4 billion and personal outlays increased \$15.2 billion, based on revised estimates.

Wages and salaries

Wages and salaries increased \$1.1 billion in March, compared with a \$10.8 billion increase in February. Commodity-producing industries' payrolls declined \$2.3 billion, compared with an increase of \$4.4 billion. Distributive industries' payrolls declined \$0.5 billion, compared with an increase of \$2.6 billion.

Service industries' payrolls increased \$2.7 billion, compared with \$3.1 billion. Government wages and salaries increased \$1.1 billion, compared with \$0.7 billion.

Manufacturing payrolls declined \$1.3 billion in March, compared with an increase of \$4.2 billion in February. Declines in employment and average weekly hours more than offset increases in average hourly earnings. The payroll declines were widespread in both durable and nondurable goods industries.

Nonwage income

Transfer payments increased \$5.8 billion in March, compared with \$1.5 billion in February. A cost-of-living increase in military retirement pay and increases in unemployment insurance benefits accounted for most of the March increase. Farm proprietors' income declined \$2.9 billion, the same as in February. Interest income increased \$5.5 billion, compared with \$5.3 billion. All other nonwage income increased \$1.3 billion, compared with \$1.6 billion.

Personal taxes and disposable personal income

Personal tax and nontax payments declined \$2.5 billion in March, compared with an increase of \$5.0 billion in February. Disposable personal income (personal income less personal tax and nontax payments) increased \$13.0 billion, compared with \$10.3 billion.

Personal outlays and personal saving

Personal outlays--personal consumption expenditures, interest paid by consumers to business, and personal transfer payments to foreigners (net)--declined \$4.0 billion in March, compared with an increase of \$15.2 billion in February.

Personal consumption expenditures (PCE) declined \$3.9 billion in March, compared with an increase of \$15.0 billion in February. Purchases of durable goods declined \$4.6 billion, compared with an increase of \$1.4 billion; purchases of new cars declined \$3.7 billion, compared with an increase of \$1.1 billion. Purchases of nondurable goods declined \$4.6 billion, compared with an increase of \$11.6 billion; purchases of gasoline declined because of a sharp reduction in price. Purchases of services increased \$5.4 billion, compared with an increase of \$2.0 billion.

Personal saving (disposable personal income less outlays) was \$121.8 billion in March, compared with \$104.8 billion in February.

Constant-dollar estimates and the PCE implicit price deflator for February

Constant-dollar disposable personal income (disposable personal income adjusted for price changes) increased \$5.5 billion in February, compared with a decline of \$2.6 billion in January.

Constant-dollar personal consumption expenditures (PCE adjusted for price changes) increased \$7.8 billion in February, compared with an increase of \$3.2 billion in January. The implicit price deflator for PCE was unchanged in February, compared with a 0.8 percent increase in January.

March estimates of constant-dollar disposable personal income and PCE, and of the implicit price deflator will be available in next month's release.

Details of personal income and outlays for March and other recent periods are shown in the accompanying tables; additional data appear each month in the <u>Survey of Current Business</u>, a monthly journal of the Bureau of Economic Analysis, available from the Superintendent of Documents.
