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Preface

The Bureau of Labor Statistics conducts annual surveys of wage rates and scheduled hours of work for specified crafts or jobs as provided in labor-management agreements in four industries: Building construction, printing, local transit, and local trucking. The studies present the wage rates in effect as of July 1 of each year, as reported to the Bureau by the appropriate local labor organizations in each of the cities included in the survey.

Information on the union scales and hours prevailing in each city is available in September of each year upon request to the Bureau's regional offices which are listed on the inside back cover. A release summarizing the rates for the building trades on a nationwide basis was issued in January 1963. This analysis provides additional data and indexes of the trend of wages and hours for the period 1907-62.

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Union Wages and Hours: Building Trades, July 1, 1962

Summary

Wage scales of union building-trades workers in cities of 100,000 or more population rose an average of 14 cents an hour, or 3.7 percent, during the year ending July 1, 1962, according to the Bureau's 56th annual survey of union scales in the building trades. Two of every three trades surveyed showed an advance of 12 to 18 cents in their average scale.

Negotiated scale changes in labor-management contract provisions which became effective between July 1, 1961, and July 1, 1962, increased hourly scales for nine-tenths of the workers covered by the survey. Advances typically varied from 10 to 25 cents an hour; such increases affected two-thirds of the building tradesmen.¹ Hourly scales rose 10 to 15 cents for a third of the workers, 15 to 20 cents for a fifth, and 20 to 25 cents for a seventh. Scales advanced at least 30 cents an hour for 1 of every 12 workers as did those of less than 10 cents.

Union scales on July 1, 1962, averaged \$3.95 an hour for all building-trades workers combined, \$4.15 for journeymen, and \$3.15 for helpers and laborers. Negotiated scales varied from \$3.80 to \$4.30 an hour for half of the journeymen and from \$3 to \$3.50 for a similar proportion of the helpers and laborers.

Straight-time weekly hours averaged 39.3 on July 1, 1962, unchanged from the previous 2 years, for all building-trades workers combined. Weekly schedules of 40 hours prevailed for 7 of every 8 building tradesmen.

Health and insurance programs financed wholly or in part by employers were specified in labor-management agreements affecting three-fourths of the workers. Pension plans, similarly financed, were provided in agreements covering slightly more than half of the building craftsmen.

Scope and Method of Study

Union scales are those agreed upon through collective bargaining between trade unions and employers, and defined as (1) the basic (minimum) wage scales (excluding holiday, vacation, or other benefit payments regularly made or credited to the worker each pay period), and (2) the maximum schedules of hours at straight-time rates. Rates in excess of the negotiated minimum, which may be paid for special qualifications or other reasons, are not included.

The information presented in this bulletin was based on union scales in effect on July 1, 1962, and covered approximately 635,000 journeymen and 165,000 helpers and laborers in 53 cities with populations of 100,000 or more. Data were obtained primarily from local union officials by mail questionnaire; in some instances, Bureau economists visited local union officials to obtain the desired information.

The current survey was designed to reflect union wage scales in the building construction industry in all cities of 100,000 or more population. All cities of a half million or more population were included, as were most cities in the 250,000-500,000 group. The cities in the 100,000-250,000 group selected for study were distributed widely throughout the United States. Data for some cities were weighted to compensate for cities not surveyed. To provide appropriate representation in the combination of data, each geographic region was considered separately when city weights were assigned.

Average hourly scales, designed to show current levels, were based on all scales reported in effect on July 1, 1962. Individual scales were weighted by the number of union members at each rate. These averages are not designed for precise year-to-year comparisons because of fluctuations in membership and in job classifications studied. Average cents-per-hour and percent changes from July 1, 1961, to July 1, 1962, however, were based on comparable quotations for the various occupational classifications in both periods, weighted by the membership reported in the current (1962) survey. The index series, designed for trend purposes, was similarly constructed.

¹ For ease of reading in this and subsequent discussions of tabulations, the limits of the class intervals are designated as 15 to 20 cents, 4 to 5 percent, etc., instead of using the more precise terminology, "15 and under 20 cents, 4 and under 5 percent," etc.

Trend of Union Scales, 1907-62

The Bureau's series of annual studies of union wage scales in the building trades began with data for 1907. In the initial survey, information was obtained for 20 trades in 39 cities. The current survey presents data for 33 trades in 53 cities.

During these 56 years, wage scales for union building-trades workers advanced in each of the years except 1922, 1932, and 1933. (See chart.) The Bureau's index of union wage rates on a 1957-59 base shows that the level of rates for all building trades combined rose from 11.2 on May 15, 1907, to 117.5 on July 1, 1962.² (See table 1.) This advance has been at an annual rate of 4.4 percent.

The rate of increase, however, has varied markedly during the 56-year span. Advances were moderate prior to World War I but rose sharply during and immediately after the war. A record gain of 35 percent in 1920 raised the level of union scales to more than double that of 1907. After a 6-percent decline in 1922, wage rates continued their upward movement through 1931, when a level 39 percent above 1920 was reached. A downward movement occasioned by a sharp decline in 1932 and a slight setback in the following year was reversed in 1934 but not fully offset until 1938. In 1941, the level of rates was only 8 percent above 1931. Rates increased moderately (10 percent) in the World War II years of 1941-45. Advances during this interval were moderated by the government's wage stabilization program. Gains exceeded 10 percent in each of the first 3 post-war years. Except for the period of the Korean outbreak (1950-53), the advance ranged from 3½ to 5 percent in each of the subsequent years. The successive increases in the years since 1953, while aggregating a rise of 45 percent, have been at the annual rate of 4.2 percent, slightly below the rate of 4.4 percent for the 56-year span covered by the index series. The percent change in each year is shown in an accompanying chart.

The index for journeymen rose from 11.8 in 1907 to 117.1 in 1962, and for helpers and laborers from 8.3 to 120.1. The annual rate of increase in union scales over the 56-year period was 4.3 percent for journeymen and 5.0 for helpers and laborers.

Scale Increases, 1961-62

Rate changes in the building industry result primarily from labor-management negotiations. Many of the union contracts in effect on July 1, 1961, were negotiated for 2 years—a few were for a longer period. Contracts of more than a year's duration often contain provisions for periodic increases. Although individual contracts provided for increases at various dates, only those scale changes that actually became effective between July 1, 1961, and July 1, 1962, were included in the current study. Some of these scale revisions were provided for in contracts which became effective prior to July 1, 1961. A number of agreements negotiated during the year contained provisions for rate increases after July 1, 1962. Such deferred advances were excluded from the survey. Thus, the scale changes presented herein do not reflect the total wage scale changes negotiated in individual contracts during the 12 months covered by the survey.


Between July 1, 1961, and July 1, 1962, union wage scales for building-trades workers in cities of 100,000 or more population increased an average of 14 cents an hour, 1 cent less than in the previous 12-month period. Journeymen scales moved up 15 cents and those for helpers and laborers, 11 cents. Advances during the year raised the level of union scales for all trades combined 3.7 percent. Reflected in this advance, the smallest since 1955, were gains of 3.8 percent for journeymen and 3.6 percent for helpers and laborers (table 3).

Among individual trades, cents-per-hour advances showed a slightly wider variation for journeymen crafts than for helper and laborer classifications. In the journeymen crafts, the increase ranged from 9 cents an hour for tile layers to 21 cents for electricians. Scales for rodmen and structural-iron workers increased 18 cents an hour, on the average, and those for asbestos workers, 17 cents. Of the remaining 19 journeymen trades, 10 registered advances of at least 14 cents, while only 2 showed a rise of less than 12 cents. For the nine helper and laborer classifications, the increase ranged from 8 cents an hour for composition roofers' helpers to 18 cents for terrazzo workers' helpers. Three other classifications (bricklayers' tenders, tile layers' helpers, and plumbers' laborers) also showed advances of 14 cents or more. Hourly scales for building laborers, numerically the most important group, rose an average of 10 cents (table 3).

In terms of percent, increases for the 24 journeymen trades varied from 2.2 for

tile layers to 5.2 for electricians. Gains of 3 to 3.5 percent were recorded by eight trades, of 3.5 to 4 percent by six trades, and of 4 to 4.5 percent by four others. For helpers and laborers, the rate of advance ranged from 3.1 percent for elevator constructors' helpers to 5.3 percent for terrazzo workers' helpers. The increase was 4.8 percent for bricklayers' tenders and tile layers' helpers, and 3.2 percent for building laborers, composition roofers' helpers, and plasterers' laborers.

Pay scales were adjusted upward during the year ending July 1, 1962, for nine-tenths of the journeymen and three-fourths of the helpers and laborers. For a few workers in two journeymen trades and in one laborer classification, there were downward revisions of scales. Such decreases affected 0.1 percent of organized building-trades workers. Rates rose for at least 4 of every 5 workers in 26 of the 33 trades surveyed. Scale increases varied from 10 to 15 cents an hour for three-tenths of the journeymen, from 15 to 20 cents for slightly more than a fifth, and from 20 to 25 cents for a sixth. Raises of 30 cents or more were applicable to 1 of every 12 journeymen as were those of less than 10 cents. Among helpers and laborers, hourly scales rose 10 to 15 cents for three-eighths and 15 to 20 cents for an eighth. Advances of less than 10 cents affected a tenth of the helpers and laborers while advances of at least 30 cents affected another tenth (table 5). The most frequently reported hourly scale increases were those of 10 and 15 cents; those of 10 cents applied to about a fifth of the journeymen and three-tenths of the helpers and laborers and those of 15 cents to a fifth and an eighth, respectively.

Advances in hourly scales between July 1, 1961, and July 1, 1962, represented gains of 3 to 4 percent for a fourth of the journeymen and a slightly smaller proportion of helpers and laborers, and of 4 to 6 percent for three-eighths and a fourth, respectively. Gains of 6 percent or more were registered by a larger proportion of helpers and laborers than of journeymen—almost a fourth compared with a sixth; conversely, those of less than 3 percent affected an eighth of the journeymen and a sixteenth of the helpers and laborers (table 4).

Hourly Wage Scales

Journeymen, as a group, on July 1, 1962, had wage scales averaging \$4.15 an hour. Among the 24 individual journeymen trades, average hourly scales varied from \$3.77 for glaziers and paperhanglers to \$4.46 for bricklayers. Of the remaining trades, 10 averaged

in excess of \$4.20 an hour, 6 had averages of \$4.10 to \$4.20, and only 3 averaged less than \$4 an hour.

Negotiated scales for the 24 journeymen trades showed a wide variation, ranging from \$2.45 for cement finishers in Charlotte to \$5.46 for some stonemasons in New York City. Rates of \$5.25 or more an hour were also in effect for asbestos workers, boilermakers, bricklayers, machinists, structural-iron workers, and some plasterers in New York City and for rodmen and structural-iron workers in Newark. Hourly scales varied from \$3.80 to \$4.30 for half of the journeymen, from \$4.30 to \$4.50 for a tenth, and were \$4.50 or more for a fifth (table 7). Rates of \$4.30 or more were stipulated in labor-management agreements for more than half of the boilermakers, bricklayers, electricians, machinists, plasterers, and plumbers; at least a third of the asbestos workers, elevator constructors, lathers, marble setters, pipefitters, sheet-metal workers, structural-iron workers, and tile layers; and for at least a tenth of the workers in each of the other trades except painters. Hourly scales of less than \$3.20 were in effect for 1 percent of the journeymen as a group, and in only four trades did the proportion exceed 4 percent.

The average hourly scale for all helpers and laborers combined was \$3.15, and by trade classification, varied from \$2.56 for composition roofers' helpers to \$3.50 for terrazzo workers' helpers. Building laborers, the largest group numerically, had an average scale of \$3.05 an hour (table 7).

Union wage scales for helpers and laborers also varied widely, ranging from \$1.55 an hour for building laborers in Charlotte to \$4.75 for some plasterers' laborers in New York City. Contractual scales of \$3 to \$3.50 prevailed for half of the helpers and laborers, of \$3.50 or more for a sixth, and of \$2.50 to \$3 for a fifth. The effective rate was less than \$2.50 an hour for a tenth of the helpers and laborers; however, only three classifications reported more than 10 percent of the workers at such rates.

City Averages

In the building industry, labor-management negotiations are generally conducted on a locality basis. Among the factors affecting the pay scales for building-trades workers are variations in type and amount of local building activity, the demand for construction workers, the extent of unionization, and the general level of wages in individual localities. These factors are reflected in the relatively

wide variations in negotiated scales for individual crafts within a locality as well as in the difference in rates among cities. For example, hourly scales for cement finishers ranged from \$2.45 in Richmond to \$5.15 in New York City. The range of rates among the 24 journeymen trades in 6 typical cities are shown in the following tabulation:

The difference between the highest and lowest scale for helpers and laborers in each of the above cities was smaller than that for journeymen, ranging from 58 cents in Boston to \$1 in New York City.

The city averages presented in table 8 are designed to show current levels of rates. They do not measure differences in union scales of the various crafts among areas. As previously indicated, scales for individual trades differ from one city to another. The city averages are influenced not only by differences in rates among cities, but also by differences in the proportion of organized workers in the various crafts. For example, a particular craft or classification may not be organized in some areas or may be organized less intensively in some areas than in others. In addition, certain types of work are found in some areas but not in others, or they are found to a greater extent in some areas than in others. These differences are reflected in the weighting of individual rates by the number of union members at the rate. Therefore, even though rates for all individual crafts in two areas are identical, the average for all crafts combined in each of the areas may differ.

Average hourly scales, on a city basis, showed a wide variation among the 53 cities surveyed for both journeymen and helpers and laborers. Hourly scales for journeymen averaged highest (\$4.91) in New York

City and lowest (\$3.28) in Charlotte (table 8). Scales averaged from \$3.75 to \$4 an hour, in 20 other cities; \$4 to \$4.25 in 15 cities; \$3.50 to \$3.75 in 9 cities; and \$4.25 to \$4.50 in 6 cities.

Among helpers and laborers, hourly scales averaged from \$1.56 in Charlotte to \$4.20 in New York City. They averaged \$3.25 or more an hour in nine other cities and less than \$2 in four others. Averages varied from \$2.50 to \$2.75 in 7 cities; \$2.75 to \$3 in 10 cities; \$3 to \$3.25 in 14 cities; and \$2 to \$2.25 in 6 cities (table 8).

Standard Workweek

Changes in the negotiated straight-time workweek between July 1, 1961, and July 1, 1962, affected very few building-trades workers. Such revisions had no effect on the average workweek of 39.3 hours for all building-trades workers combined—39.3 hours for journeymen and 39.5 hours for helpers and laborers (table 11).

On July 1, 1962, the most common straight-time workweek consisted of 40 hours and was in effect for 7 of every 8 building-trades workers. Straight-time workweeks of 35 hours were stipulated in labor-management agreements for a tenth of the building tradesmen. Such schedules were applicable to three-tenths of the bricklayers' tenders, a fourth of the painters, a fifth of the bricklayers and terrazzo workers' helpers, and a sixth of the lathers and mosaic and terrazzo workers. Standard workweeks of 30 hours prevailed for a fifth of the plasterers and an eighth of their helpers.

Health, Insurance, and Pension Plans

Health, insurance, and pension plans provided in labor-management agreements for workers in the building trades have increased steadily in recent years. The widespread development of such plans in the industry has perhaps been less rapid than in industries where problems of seasonal operations and casual employment are not as extensive. Also, most construction-trades unions have operated their own programs providing their members with one or more types of benefits,

such as those covering death, old-age, sickness, or disability. The development of negotiated insurance and pension programs undoubtedly has been affected by these factors. On July 1, 1962, three-fourths of the building-trades workers were covered by contracts providing for health or insurance plans and slightly more than half were covered by pension plan provisions.³

Virtually all of the building-trades workers who were provided health and insurance protection were covered by plans entirely financed by employer contributions. Such programs were specified in labor-management contracts applicable to a majority of the workers in practically all of the trades. Pension plan provisions financed entirely by the employers affected almost all construction tradesmen covered by such plans. Provisions for these plans were typically provided for boilermakers and electricians. Among other trades, in which there were substantial proportions of workers covered, were: Asbestos workers, bricklayers, carpenters, lathers, painters, pipefitters, plasterers, plumbers,

rodmen, sheet-metal workers, structural-iron workers, bricklayers' tenders, and plasterers' laborers.

Union Scales, by City and Trade

Table 12 presents the union scales of wages and hours in effect on July 1, 1961, and July 1, 1962, together with the amount of employer contributions to health, insurance, pension, and vacation plans on July 1, 1962, for the individual trades in each of the 53 cities surveyed.

³ The prevalence of negotiated health, insurance, and pension programs for construction workers was first studied in July 1954. Information on these plans was restricted to those financed entirely or in part by the employer. Plans financed by workers through union dues or assessments were excluded from the study. No attempt was made to secure information on the kind and extent of benefits provided or on the cost of plans providing such benefits. In the current study, however, information was obtained on the amount of employer contributions, in terms of cents per hour or percent of rate. Such information is presented in table 12. Although some employer payments are calculated on the basis of total hours or gross payroll, these variations in the method of computation are not indicated in the tabulation.
