

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Preface

This bulletin presents estimates of employment, average hourly and weekly earnings, and weekly hours of work of nonsupervisory employees in miscellaneous retail stores in June 1962. This survey supplements a similar study conducted in June 1961. This bulletin provides data on changes in earnings and hours of work between the survey periods, during which time the 1961 amendments to the Fair Labor Standards Act, that established a \$1 minimum wage for employees in large retail enterprises, became effective. The survey was part of a broad program of studies initiated by the U.S. Department of Labor for continuing appraisal of Federal minimum wage legislation.

The statistics were obtained from a nationwide survey of retail trade (excluding eating and drinking places) conducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for a June 1962 payroll period. Data are provided separately for men and women; four regions of the United States—Northeast, South, North Central, and West; metropolitan and non-metropolitan areas; and for retail enterprises and establishments by their annual volume of sales. Appendix A provides technical information on the scope and method of the survey, as well as definitions of terms. A copy of the questionnaire used in the survey is shown in appendix B.

A bulletin containing comprehensive statistical data for the entire retail trade industry (except eating and drinking places) is available. Separate bulletins providing data for each of the other major retail groups comprising retail trade will also be issued. (See inside back cover.)

The Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions participated in the planning of the survey and provided the necessary funds. This study was conducted in the Bureau's Division of National Wage and Salary Income by Norman J. Samuels, Chief of the Division, under the general direction of L. R. 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Employee Earnings in Miscellaneous Retail Stores, June 1962

Summary

Nonsupervisory employees in the Nation's miscellaneous retail stores had average straight-time earnings of \$1.62 an hour in June 1962. About a fourth of the estimated 873,000 workers included in the Bureau's survey earned less than \$1.05 an hour, nearly two-fifths, less than \$1.25, and fewer than a fourth, \$2 or more. During the survey week, almost three-tenths of the employees worked more than 44 hours, approximately a fourth exactly 40 hours, and close to three-tenths less than 35 hours. Average weekly earnings were \$59.96, and varied from \$13.18 for employees who worked less than 15 hours a week to \$85.96 for those who worked more than 49 hours.

Among the four geographic regions of the Nation, average earnings ranged from \$1.31 an hour in the South to \$1.99 an hour in the West. Men averaged \$1.83, 53 cents an hour more than women. Metropolitan area workers averaged \$1.71, 28 cents an hour more than those in nonmetropolitan areas. Workers in establishments which, for the most part, were subject to the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, had average hourly earnings of \$1.75, 16 cents an hour more than those in nonsubject establishments.

Nonsupervisory workers in drug and proprietary stores, for which data are presented separately, averaged \$1.45 an hour. Of the 353,100 drug store employees, about a fourth earned less than \$1 an hour, a sixth between \$1 and \$1.05, more than half less than \$1.25, and another sixth \$2 or more. During the week surveyed, about two-fifths of the drug store employees worked less than 35 hours, a fifth worked exactly 40 hours, and nearly a fourth worked in excess of 44 hours. The weekly pay level was \$50.33 and varied from an average of \$13.12 for employees who worked less than 15 hours a week to \$80.56 for those who worked 49 or more hours.

Average hourly earnings for nonsupervisory employees of miscellaneous retail stores were 7 cents an hour higher in June 1962 than in June 1961. Changes in the wage distribution on a national basis were relatively minor, not exceeding 5 percentage points at any pay level. In miscellaneous retail stores brought under the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act on September 3, 1961, the proportion of workers paid less than the \$1 Federal minimum wage declined from 10 to 6 percent between surveys. In miscellaneous stores which were not subject to the act, the proportion of workers paid less than \$1 an hour declined from 18 to 15 percent. The \$1 Federal minimum wage had a greater effect on the earnings of workers in subject drug stores, in which the proportion earning less than \$1 an hour was reduced in half, from a fifth to a tenth.

Characteristics

The miscellaneous retail stores group includes establishments which differ greatly in the type of merchandise which they sell. Included in the major group are stores selling drugs, liquors, antique and secondhand merchandise, books and stationery, sporting goods and bicycles, farm and garden supplies, jewelry, and fuel and ice, and other establishments primarily engaged in the retail sale of specialized lines of merchandise.

About 873,000 nonsupervisory employees of miscellaneous retail stores in the United States were included in the survey. Approximately two-fifths of these employees worked in drug and proprietary stores. About a fourth of the miscellaneous store workers were employed in the Northeast, three-tenths each in the South and North Central region, and about a sixth in the West. The regional distribution of employment in drug stores was similar to that in the overall group. About three-fifths of the miscellaneous store workers were men, but women accounted for about three-fifths of the drug store workers. Approximately seven-tenths of the workers in miscellaneous stores and in drug stores were employed in metropolitan areas. About a sixth of the workers in miscellaneous stores and more than a fifth of those in drug stores were employed in establishments which were subject to the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Miscellaneous Retail Stores

Average Hourly Earnings

All Nonsupervisory Employees. Nonsupervisory employees earned an average of \$1.62 an hour in the Nation's miscellaneous retail stores in June 1962 (table 1). An eighth of the approximately 873,000 workers included in the survey earned less than \$1 an hour, another eighth earned between \$1 and \$1.05, nearly two-fifths, less than \$1.25, and fewer than a fourth, \$2 or more.

Pay levels among the four geographic regions of the United States were \$1.31 an hour in the South, \$1.61 in the North Central region, \$1.80 in the Northeast, and \$1.99 in the West. The distribution of individual earnings varied among the regions. In the South, more than a fourth of the workers earned less than \$1 an hour, nearly three-fifths less than \$1.25, and about a tenth \$2 or more. In the West, on the other hand, fewer than a twentieth of the workers earned less than \$1, fewer than a fifth less than \$1.25, and more than two-fifths at least \$2 an hour. In the Northeast, although the proportion of workers who earned less than \$1 an hour was similar to that in the West, a fourth of the workers earned less than \$1.25 and fewer than three-tenths earned \$2 or more. In the North Central region, the distribution of earnings was virtually the same as that noted on a nationwide basis.

Men and Women. Men earned an average of \$1.83 an hour, 53 cents more than women (tables 2 and 3). Nearly a tenth of the men earned less than \$1 an hour, and more than a fourth, less than \$1.25. The proportions of women with such earnings were about twice those of men. A third of the men, but fewer than a tenth of the women earned \$2 or more an hour.

On a regional basis, the wage advantage of men over women was 41 cents an hour in the South, 54 cents in both the Northeast and North Central region, and 60 cents in the West. Men in the South, however, averaged 16 cents an hour less than women in the West. More than two-fifths of the men in the South compared with fewer than three-tenths of the women in the West earned less than \$1.25 an hour.

Men's and women's earnings varied among the regions by approximately the same relative amounts. Based on their pay levels in the South, men earned 23 percent more and women 19 percent more in the North Central region, 32 and 31 percent more, respectively, in the Northeast, and 51 and 53 percent more, respectively, in the West.

Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Areas. In metropolitan areas, average earnings were \$1.71 an hour compared with \$1.43 in nonmetropolitan areas (tables 4 and 5). In metropolitan areas, fewer than a tenth of the workers earned less than \$1 an hour while in nonmetropolitan areas, nearly a fourth had such earnings. The distribution of earnings between \$1 and \$2 an hour in the two areas, on the other hand, was similar. For example, in each area an eighth of the workers earned between \$1 and \$1.05, approximately another eighth earned between \$1.05 and \$1.25, and roughly two-fifths earned between \$1.25 and \$2.

Earnings of metropolitan area workers exceeded those of nonmetropolitan area workers by 12 cents an hour in both the Northeast and South, by 25 cents in the North Central region, and by 38 cents in the West. However, the \$1.36 an hour average for metropolitan area workers in the South was from 9 to 36 cents lower than the average for nonmetropolitan area workers in the other regions. Nearly two-fifths of the southern metropolitan area workers earned less than \$1.05 an hour, while in nonmetropolitan areas of the other regions, the proportions with such earnings ranged from an eighth to about a third.

The relative pay advantages of metropolitan area workers in the North Central region, Northeast, and West over those in the South were 25, 34, and 54 percent, respectively. The pay advantages of nonmetropolitan area workers in the respective regions over those in the South were 17, 37, and 39 percent.

Enterprise and Establishment Sales-Size Classes. Miscellaneous retail stores, for purposes of this survey, were classified by their annual gross volume of sales (exclusive of excise taxes), and by the sales of their parent enterprises (tables 6 and 7). More than a fifth of the workers were employed in enterprises with \$1 million or more in sales and four-fifths of these workers were in establishments with \$250,000 or more in annual sales. On the other hand, more than seven-tenths of the workers in enterprises with less than \$1 million in sales were employed in establishments with less than \$250,000 in annual sales.

Employees in enterprises with \$1 million or more in annual sales earned an average of \$1.72 an hour. A sixth of these employees earned less than \$1.05 an hour, three-tenths less than \$1.25, and nearly three-tenths, \$2 or more. In establishments with \$250,000 or more in annual sales which were part of such enterprises, average hourly earnings were \$1.75 and the distribution of individual earnings was similar to that noted for the enterprise sales-size class. Employees in establishments with less than \$250,000 in sales which were part of such enterprises averaged \$1.58 an hour. Nearly three-tenths of these workers earned less than \$1.05 an hour, two-fifths less than \$1.25, and about a fifth \$2 or more.

Workers in enterprises with less than \$1 million in sales earned an average of \$1.59 an hour. Nearly three-tenths of these workers earned less than \$1.05 an hour, two-fifths less than \$1.25, and about a fifth \$2 or more. Employees in establishments with \$250,000 or more in sales which were part of such

enterprises averaged \$1.69 an hour, 15 cents an hour more than those in establishments with a lower sales volume. In the higher volume establishments, about a sixth of the employees earned less than \$1.05 an hour, fewer than three-tenths less than \$1.25, and more than a fourth \$2 or more. In the lower volume establishments the proportions with such earnings were nearly a third, more than two-fifths, and a fifth, respectively.

The pay advantage of metropolitan over nonmetropolitan area workers in each of the enterprise-establishment sales-size classes, for which such comparisons could be made, was similar in magnitude to the overall area differential previously noted.

Weekly Hours of Work

The length of the workweek varied noticeably among employees of miscellaneous retail stores in June 1962 (table 8). Nearly three-tenths of the employees worked more than 44 hours, about a fourth exactly 40 hours, and close to three-tenths were employed on a part-time basis (less than 35 hours a week).

The longer workweek was most common in the South, where more than a third of the employees worked more than 44 hours. A 40-hour week was most common in the West, where a third of the employees worked such hours. Part-time work prevailed for about a fifth of the workers in the South and for approximately a third in each of the other regions.

More than a third of the men worked over 44 hours a week, more than twice the proportion of women with such hours. On the other hand, nearly threetenths of the women were on a 40-hour schedule and close to a third worked parttime, compared with about a fifth and a fourth, respectively, of the men.

The longer workweek was more common in nonmetropolitan than in metropolitan areas (table 9). Nearly two-fifths of the employees in the former areas worked more than 44 hours compared with fewer than a fourth in the latter. A 40-hour workweek prevailed for a greater proportion of metropolitan than nonmetropolitan area workers, a fourth and a fifth, respectively. Similarly, more than three-tenths of the workers in the former areas compared with fewer than a fourth in the latter were on a part-time schedule.

In enterprises with \$1 million or more in sales, about a fourth of the employees worked longer than 44 hours, another fourth worked on a part-time basis, and about three-tenths worked 40 hours a week (table 10). In enterprises with less than \$1 million in sales, three-tenths of the employees worked longer than 44 hours, another three-tenths worked on a part-time basis, and about a fourth worked 40 hours.

Average Weekly Earnings

Nonsupervisory employees in miscellaneous retail stores earned an average of \$59.96 a week in June 1962. The weekly wage level ranged from an average of \$13.18 for employees who worked less than 15 hours to \$85.96 for those who worked more than 49 hours. Weekly earnings were not always determined by the length of the workweek. For example, employees who worked 40 hours a week averaged \$72.27, \$4.69 more than those who worked over 40 but under 44 hours a week.

The patterns of relative wage differentials on a weekly basis generally paralleled those previously noted on an hourly basis for the regions, men and women, metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas, and for establishments with less than \$250,000 in annual sales which were part of different enterprise sales-size groups. In establishments with \$250,000 or more in annual sales, however, average hourly earnings were higher but average weekly earnings were lower in those establishments which were part of enterprises with \$1 million or more in sales than in those which were part of the lower volume enterprises.

Drug Stores and Proprietary Stores

Average Hourly Earnings

All Nonsupervisory Employees. Nonsupervisory employees in the Nation's drug and proprietary stores earned an average of \$1.45 an hour in June 1962 (table 11). Nearly a fourth of the 353, 100 workers included in the survey earned less than \$1 an hour, a sixth between \$1 and \$1.05, and more than half less than \$1.25. A sixth of the workers earned \$2 or more an hour.

Regional pay levels were \$1.16 in the South, \$1.42 in the North Central region, \$1.67 in the Northeast, and \$1.95 in the West. In the South, more than two-fifths of the employees earned less than \$1 an hour, compared with more than a fifth in the North Central region and about a twentieth in both the Northeast and West. Approximately a sixth of the workers earned between \$1 and \$1.05 an hour in every region but the West, where fewer than a tenth had such earnings. Nearly two-fifths of the western workers earned \$2 or more, compared with fewer than a fourth in the Northeast, an eighth in the North Central, and fewer than a tenth in the South.

Men and Women. Men earned an average of \$1.81 an hour, 61 cents an hour more than women (tables 12 and 13). A sixth of the men earned less than \$1 an hour, more than an eighth between \$1 and \$1.05, and two-fifths less than \$1.25. The proportions of women with these earnings exceeded a fourth, a sixth, and three-fifths, respectively. Three-tenths of the men but fewer than a tenth of the women earned \$2 or more an hour.

Men's earnings exceeded those of women in each of the four regions by amounts ranging from 41 cents an hour in the South to 83 cents an hour in the West. Men in the South, however, averaged 21 cents an hour less than women in the West. Half of the men in the South compared with about a sixth of the women in the West earned less than \$1.05 an hour.

The pay level for men varied relatively more widely among the regions, than that for women. Based on their pay level in the South, men earned 25 percent more in the North Central region, 39 percent more in the Northeast, and 73 percent more in the West. The pay levels for women in the respective regions were 18, 27, and 61 percent higher than in the South.

Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Areas. Workers in metropolitan areas earned an average of \$1.54 an hour, compared with \$1.28 for those in nonmetropolitan areas (tables 14 and 15). A sixth of the former workers were paid less than \$1 an hour, another sixth between \$1 and \$1.05, and nearly half less than \$1.25. The proportions of nonmetropolitan area workers with such earnings

were nearly two-fifths, a sixth, and more than two-thirds, respectively. Although workers in the smaller size communities represented only three-tenths of all the nonsupervisory workers, they accounted for half of the workers paid less than \$1 an hour.

On a regional basis, average hourly earnings for metropolitan area workers ranged from \$1.15 in the South to \$2.02 in the West. Nearly two-fifths of the metropolitan area workers in the South compared with fewer than a twentieth of those in the West earned less than \$1 an hour. Sufficient regional data for non-metropolitan area workers were available only for the South, where such workers averaged \$1.16 an hour.

Enterprise and Establishment Sales-Size Classes. A fourth of the drug and proprietary store employees worked in enterprises with \$1 million or more in annual sales and all but an eighth of these worked in establishments with \$250,000 or more in annual sales. Only about a fourth of the workers in enterprises with less than \$1 million in sales were employed in establishments with \$250,000 or more in sales (tables 16 and 17).

Workers employed in enterprises with \$1 million or more in annual sales averaged \$1.50 an hour. For an eighth of the workers average earnings were less than \$1, another eighth between \$1 and \$1.05, and almost half less than \$1.25 an hour. Fewer than a fifth earned \$2 or more an hour. Workers in establishments with \$250,000 or more in sales which were part of such enterprises averaged \$1.54 an hour, and the distribution of their earnings was similar to that noted for the enterprise group. Insufficient data prevented presentation of information separately for establishments with less than \$250,000 in sales.

Workers in enterprises with less than \$1 million in sales averaged \$1.44 an hour. More than a fourth of the workers earned less than \$1 an hour, a sixth between \$1 and \$1.05, and nearly three-fifths less than \$1.25. A sixth of the workers earned \$2 an hour or more. In establishments with \$250,000 or more in sales which were part of such enterprises, employees averaged \$1.53 an hour. Fewer than a fifth of the workers in these establishments earned less than \$1 an hour, about a sixth between \$1 and \$1.05, and fewer than half less than \$1.25. A sixth of the workers earned \$2 or more an hour. Earnings for employees in establishments with less than \$250,000 in sales averaged \$1.40. The distribution of their individual earnings was similar to that noted for the enterprise class.

Metropolitan area workers averaged 24 cents an hour more than those in nonmetropolitan areas in both establishment sales-size classes which were part of enterprises with less than \$1 million in annual sales. This differential was only 2 cents less than the overall differential between metropolitan and non-metropolitan area workers. A similar comparison in enterprises with \$1 million or more in sales was not possible because of insufficient data.

Weekly Hours of Work

The number of hours worked during the week studied varied widely among employees of drug stores (table 18). Nearly a fourth of the employees worked in excess of 44 hours, a fifth exactly 40 hours, and about two-fifths on a part-time basis (less than 35 hours a week).

Among the regions, a long workweek was most prevalent in the South, where more than a third of the employees worked longer than 44 hours a week. The West had the largest proportion of employees who worked exactly 40 hours, three-tenths, while part-time work was most common in the Northeast, where nearly half the employees were on such a schedule.

Long hours of work as well as part-time work prevailed for a greater proportion of men than women. Nearly three-tenths of the men were employed in excess of 44 hours, and over two-fifths less than 35 hours compared with a fifth and a third, respectively, of the women. A 40-hour week, however, prevailed for a fourth of the women and a sixth of the men.

A workweek in excess of 44 hours prevailed for a third of the employees in nonmetropolitan areas but for only a fifth of those in metropolitan areas (table 19). A 40-hour workweek applied to roughly a fifth of the employees in both areas. Two-fifths of the metropolitan area workers compared with threetenths of those in nonmetropolitan areas were employed on a part-time basis.

In enterprises with \$1 million or more in sales, nearly a fifth of the employees worked more than 44 hours, and about the same proportion of workers were on a 40-hour week as were on a part-time basis, about three-tenths (table 20). In the lower volume enterprises, the proportions of workers on the respective schedules were a fourth, nearly a fifth, and two-fifths.

Average Weekly Earnings

Weekly earnings averaged \$50.33 for nonsupervisory drug store employees in June 1962. The weekly wage level ranged from an average of \$13.12 for employees who worked less than 15 hours a week to \$80.56 for those who worked at least 49 hours (table 18). However, the length of the workweek did not always determine average weekly earnings. For example, employees who worked 40 hours averaged \$64.41, \$7.57 a week more than those who worked more than 40 but less than 44 hours.

The patterns of wage differentials on a weekly basis paralleled those previously noted on an hourly basis for the regions, men and women, and metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas. However, for establishments with \$250,000 or more in annual sales, average hourly earnings were higher in those which were part of enterprises with \$1 million or more in sales than in those which were part of the lower volume enterprises, whereas average weekly earnings were lower. Insufficient data were available to permit a similar comparison for establishments with less than \$250,000 in sales.

Changes in Earnings and Hours of Work, June 1961-June 1962

Miscellaneous Retail Stores Including Drug and Proprietary Stores

Average hourly earnings in miscellaneous retail stores in the United States increased by 7 cents an hour between June of 1961 and 1962. The proportion of workers paid less than \$1 an hour, although reduced by 3 percentage points since 1961, still represented an eighth of the workers in June 1962. The concentration of workers at the \$1 to \$1.05 wage interval remained unchanged between survey years, while the proportion at higher pay levels increased slightly, as shown in the tabulation on the next page.

On a regional basis, increases in hourly pay levels varied from 4 cents an hour in the South to 14 cents in the West. The only significant reduction in the proportion of workers paid less than \$1, from a third to about a fourth, occurred in the South, where the majority of the workers with such earnings were employed. Most of the wage distribution changes in the other regions took place at higher pay levels. For example, the proportion of workers earning \$2 or more an hour increased from about a fourth to nearly three-tenths in the Northeast, and from a third to more than two-fifths in the West.

In drug stores, the nationwide pay level increased by 5 cents an hour. Changes in the wage distribution were of a similar magnitude as for the overall group, except that the proportion of drug store employees earning \$2 or more an hour was unchanged between survey years. Among the regions, decreases in the proportion of workers earning less than \$1 were somewhat greater in drug stores than in all miscellaneous stores, while increases in the proportion of workers earning \$2 or more were, for the most part, slightly smaller.

Average earnings for men and women in miscellaneous retail stores rose by about the same amount, 8 and 7 cents an hour, respectively. Changes in the distribution of men's earnings were similar to those of the overall group. The reduction in the proportion of women earning less than \$1 an hour, from about a fourth to fewer than a fifth, accounted for nearly four-fifths of the total decline of workers with such earnings.

In drug stores, the pay level for men increased by 2 cents an hour compared with 6 cents for women. The larger pay increase for women reflected the decrease in the proportion of women earning less than \$1, from a third to about a fourth.

Pay levels for miscellaneous stores advanced by 7 cents an hour in metropolitan areas and by 8 cents in nonmetropolitan areas. The magnitude of changes in the wage distribution of the two areas was strikingly similar. In drug stores, on the other hand, a 10-cent increase in average hourly earnings of nonmetropolitan area workers was more than twice that of metropolitan area workers. The reduction in the proportion of workers earning less than \$1 an hour, as well as the increase of those earning \$1.25 or more, was more pronounced in the former than in the latter areas.

In miscellaneous retail stores which became subject to the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, average hourly earnings increased by 2 cents an hour. Except for a decrease in the proportion of workers paid less than \$1 an hour, from 10 to 6 percent, little change occurred in the distribution of earnings between June of 1961 and 1962. During the same period, the pay level advanced by 9 cents an hour in stores which employed the vast majority of workers not subject to the \$1 Federal minimum wage. The proportion of nonsubject workers earning less than \$1 an hour declined from 18 to 15 percent and accounted for about two-fifths of the total decline of workers with such earnings. Moreover, the proportion of workers earning \$2 or more an hour increased from 18 to 22 percent and accounted for most of the overall increase of workers with such earnings.

The influence of the \$1 Federal minimum on earnings of subject workers was more apparent in drug stores, where earnings increased by 7 cents an hour. The proportion of workers paid less than \$1 an hour was reduced from a fifth in June 1961 to a tenth in June 1962. The concentration of workers at or just above the \$1 Federal minimum, however, was virtually unchanged, while the proportion earning \$1.25 or more an hour increased from 51 to 57 percent. In non-subject drug stores, where average earnings increased by 5 cents an hour, changes in the proportion of workers earning less than \$1 and in the proportion earning \$1.25 or more were less pronounced.

⁴ Eighty-six percent of the workers earning less than \$1 an hour in June 1962 in the subject miscellaneous group were employed in drug stores and most of these workers were in food service jobs which are exempt from the \$1 Federal minimum wage.

Changes in the length of the workweek were relatively minor for employees of miscellaneous stores. The proportion of employees who worked longer than 44 hours during the selected week in June declined from 29 percent in 1961 to 28 percent in 1962. At the same time, the proportion working on a part-time basis increased from 28 to 29 percent, and there was no change in the proportion who worked exactly 40 hours. In drug stores also, the proportion of employees who worked more than 44 hours decreased slightly, from 25 to 23 percent. At the same time, the proportions who worked exactly 40 hours and on a part-time basis each increased by 1 percentage point, from 20 and 37 percent, respectively.

The weekly pay level for employees of miscellaneous retail stores increased by \$2.15 between June 1961 and June 1962. Average weekly earnings increased by \$2.41 for part-time workers, by \$3.55 for those on a 40-hour schedule, and by \$2.90 for those who worked longer than 44 hours. Weekly earnings for drug store employees on such schedules increased by \$1.32, \$1.86, and 89 cents, respectively. The weekly wage level in drug stores rose by \$1.13 during the year.

Appendix A: Scope and Method of Survey

Scope of Survey

This bulletin relates to those retail establishments which were classified, according to the 1957 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as part of the miscellaneous retail stores group (SIC 59). Stores within this group were further identified as drug and proprietary stores (SIC 591). The major group covers retail stores not elsewhere classified and includes stores such as drug, liquor, antique and secondhand, book and stationery, sporting goods and bicycles, farm and garden supply, jewelry, fuel and ice dealers, florists, cigar, newspaper, cameras and photography supplies, gifts and souvenirs, and optical goods.

Drug and proprietary stores are included on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than on the more strict interpretation of commodities handled. These establishments are primarily engaged in the retail sale of prescription drugs and patent medicines and any combination of such merchandise as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco and novelty merchandise; and they may or may not operate a soda fountain or lunch counter.

The 50 States and the District of Columbia are covered. The data reflect the earnings and hours of work of nonsupervisory employees for a representative payroll period ending nearest June 15, 1962.

Sample Design

The sample was designed to yield national and regional estimates for the major industry group and for the line of business for which separate data are shown. A stratified sample design was used with variable sampling ratios depending on the kind of business and employment size of the sample unit. For example, the sample size for the line of business shown separately was proportionately larger than for those not published and the probability of selection increased with the employment size of the sample unit.

The following tabulation shows the number of units included in the sample of the miscellaneous retail stores group and in the drug and proprietary stores for which separate data are published:

Establishment samples were obtained from three different sources: (1) State unemployment insurance listings furnished employer reporting units with eight or more employees. (2) The large chainstore enterprises provided current lists of retail stores and auxiliary units from which a sample of such units was selected. It was necessary to obtain these lists from the large chainstore enterprises because State unemployment insurance listings frequently provide data on a statewide or county basis for such companies rather than on an individual establishment basis. (3) The Bureau of the Census sample used in conjunction with its Monthly Survey of Retail Sales covering single-unit retail stores with fewer than eight employees. The Census coverage of small units was necessary to supplement the Bureau's universe lists for retail trade, since State unemployment insurance laws in many States do not cover employers with fewer than four employees.

Method of Collection

The majority of the establishments included in the sample were solicited for information by mail. The largest units were visited in person by field economists of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, as were the smallest units by the Bureau of the Census enumerators acting as agents for the BLS. Personal visits were also made to a sample of the nonrespondents to the mail questionnaire.

Estimating Procedure

Data collected for each sampling unit were weighted in accordance with the probability of selecting that unit. For example, where 1 establishment out of 10 was selected from an industry-size group, data for that establishment were considered as representative of the 10 establishments in the group. Thus, each segment of the retail trade industry was given its appropriate weight in the total, regardless of the disproportionate coverage of large and small establishments.

No assumption has been made that the wage structures of the units not responding to the mail questionnaire were similar to those of the units responding. To minimize the bias resulting from nonresponse, data obtained by personal visits from a sample of nonrespondents were weighted to represent all other nonrespondents in similar industry-size groups. To compensate for schedules with unusable data, their weights were assigned to usable schedules of the same industry-size group and from the same or related area.

For drug stores, all estimated totals derived from the weighting process were further adjusted to the employment levels for June 1962, as reported in the Bureau of Labor Statistics monthly employment series. The published estimates for drug stores in this report are, thus, consistent with the nonsupervisory worker employment shown in the monthly series. Employment estimates for all miscellaneous retail stores, which the Bureau does not publish monthly, were prepared especially for purposes of this survey. Current regional estimates, which could not be prepared from the monthly series, were based on regional distributions from the most recent Census of Business, prepared by the Bureau of the Census.

The adjustment of the survey totals to the predesignated totals was confined, for the most part, to that segment of the survey for which the sample units were obtained from State unemployment insurance listings. The lists generally were prepared prior to the time of the survey and consequently do not account for units opened or closed after the date of the lists. In the Census and the large chainstore enterprise samples, the best unbiased estimates of totals were presumed to be the weighted-up sample totals, since there was no apparent problem of unrepresented business births in these groups.

Criteria for Publication of Estimates

The results of this survey differ from those that would have been obtained by a complete canvass of all retail operations, since the survey was conducted on a sample basis. These differences may be substantial in those instances where the sample was small. It has not been possible, therefore, to present data for all cases. No earnings distributions are shown for groupings of fewer than 50 stores.

Definitions of Terms

Nonsupervisory employees include all full-time, part-time, seasonal, and casual employees below the supervisory level, such as salespersons, shipping, receiving, and stock clerks, laborers, warehousemen, caretakers, office clerks, driver-salesmen, deliverymen, installation and repairmen, elevator operators, porters, janitors, food service employees, and working supervisors.

Establishment is generally defined as a single physical location where business is conducted. In the case of two separate business entities transacting business at a single physical location (for example, a leased shoe department in a department store), each was treated as a separate establishment. On the other hand, a drug store which also operated a food counter was treated as a single establishment.

Enterprise. Establishments were considered to be part of a larger enterprise if owned by a company operating other establishments engaged in the same general field of business and under its general direction or control. The terms "enterprise" and "establishment" were used synonymously for single-unit companies.

Annual volume of sales excludes excise taxes at the retail level.

Earnings data relate to straight-time earnings and exclude premium pay for overtime and for work on weekends, holidays, and late shifts. Commission and bonus earnings and special sales bonuses, such as "P.M.'S" and "stims" paid quarterly or oftener, are included.

Individual average hourly earnings for employees not paid by the hour (e.g., salary, commissions) were obtained by dividing individual earnings reported by the number of hours worked during the corresponding period.

Individual weekly earnings were obtained by multiplying the individual average hourly earnings by the number of hours worked during a single week in June 1962.

Group average hourly earnings published in this report were obtained by dividing total individual earnings by total individual weekly hours worked.

Group average weekly earnings were obtained by dividing the sum of the individual weekly earnings by the number of employees represented in the group total.

Regions used in this study include the following States: Northeast—Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont; South—Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia; North Central—Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin; and West—Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming.

Metropolitan areas as used in this report refers to those cities and county areas defined by the Bureau of the Budget as "Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas." Metropolitan areas include those counties containing at least one central city of 50,000 population and those counties around such cities which are metropolitan in character and economically and socially integrated with the county containing the central city. For a more detailed description, see Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas, prepared by the Bureau of the Budget, 1961.

5. EARNINGS AND HOURS OF WORK OF NONSUPERVISORY EMPLOYEES:

This study is designed to provide information on hourly earnings and weekly hours of work for both male and female nonsupervisory employees and working supervisors for a payroll period ending nearest June 15, 1962. The number of employees in each establishment for which earnings and hours data are reported should correspond with the number of nonsupervisory employees shown in item 3(c) on page 1. The information requested should be reported separately for each establishment and the establishment identified. Earnings data for food counter, cafeteria, or restaurant workers in Department, Drug, or Variety Stores should be entered only on the blue supplement provided. Data for all other employees should be reported in Item 5 of this form.

Report earnings and hours separately for each employee unless these data are identical for two or more employees. Do not report aggregate earnings and hours for several workers. For convenience of reporting for employees paid on other than an hourly basis, columns 5 through 8 are provided. Data will not, however, be published separately by various methods of pay. Instructions and examples for reporting the necessary data in each column are listed below. INSTRUCTIONS

(Please read carefully to avoid correspondence)

Column (1)—Indicate whether the employee is male (M) or female (F).
Column (2)—Use a separate line for each employee and enter "1," unless two or more employees of the same sex work the <u>same number</u> of hours during the selected week, and receive <u>identical hourly or salary rates</u> (see example 1). Data are to be reported individually for each employee whose earnings are based entirely or in part on commissions or bonuses (see examples 3, 4, and 5).
Column (3)—Enter the number of hours worked during the week of June 10 to June 16, 1962. Include hours paid for sick leave, holidays, vacations, etc. These hours should relate to a 1-week period regardless of the length of the payroll period.
Column (4)—Enter the base (straight-time) hourly rate. Premium payments for overtime work are excluded from the survey and are not to be reported. This column may also be used to report earnings of employees paid on other than an hourly basis if average straight-time hourly earnings are available.
Column (5)—Enter for each employee the straight-time earnings for the salary period (weekly, biweekly, monthly, or semimonthly) ending nearest June 15, 1962. Include straight-time pay for overtime, but exclude overtime premium. Do not include "draws" against commission as salary. Column (6)—Enter the number of hours worked during the salary period (weekly, biweekly, monthly, or semi-
monthly). Include hours paid for sick leave, holidays, vacations, etc.
Column (7)—Enter for each employee the total commission and/or bonus earnings, including "PM's," "Stims," or any special bonuses based on sales paid quarterly or oftener by the store. These earnings are to be reported for the commission or bonus period ending nearest June 15, 1962. If the commissions earned during that pay period are not representative of normal commission earnings, a longer period may be used. If store employees receive both commission and bonus payments for an identical period of time, report the combined figure (see example 4). If bonus payments cover a period longer than the commission period, add only the prorated amount of the bonus to the commission earnings that correspond to the commission period (see example 5). For employees paid an hourly rate or salary in addition to commissions or bonuses, it is also necessary to complete column 4, or columns 5 and 6 (see examples 4 and 5).
Column (8)—Enter the number of hours worked during the commission or bonus period. (The hours should refer to the total hours worked during the period (weekly, biweekly, monthly, or semimonthly) and not necessarily only to those hours during which commissions or bonuses were earned.)

EXAMPLES ILLUSTRATED ON PAGE 3

- 1. Two women each worked 36% hours during the selected week, and each were paid a straight-time hourly rate of \$1.05. 2. One man worked 40 hours during the selected week, and received a salary of \$125, exclusive of premium pay for overtime.
- for 88 hours worked during the salary period (½ month).

 3. One man worked 32½ hours during the selected week and was paid on a straight commission basis, receiving \$215.70 for 168 hours.
- 4. One woman worked 40 hours during the selected week and was paid an hourly rate of \$1.25; she also received \$35 in com-
- 4. One woman worked 37% hours during the selected week, and was paid a weekly salary of \$7.50 in "PM's" for 173.6 hours worked during the commission period (1 month).

 5. One man worked 37% hours during the selected week, and was paid a weekly salary of \$75; he also earned commissions of \$102 during a 1-month period (162 hours) and \$150 in bonuses during a 3-month period. Only % of the bonus, or \$50 is reported so that the bonus period corresponds to the commission period.
