Preface

This bulletin summarizes information on wages and supplementary practices for the men's and boys' suit and coat manufacturing industry in October 1963.

Separate releases were issued earlier for: Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Los Angeles—Long Beach, New York, N.Y., Philadelphia, Rochester, St. Louis, and Southern New Jersey. Releases were also issued for regular (inside) and cutting shops and for contract shops in three of these areas—Baltimore, New York, N.Y., and Philadelphia. Copies of the area releases are available from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Washington, D.C., 20212, or any of its regional offices.

This study was conducted in the Bureau's Division of Occupational Pay, Toivo P. Kanninen, Chief, under the general direction of L. R. Linsenmayer, Assistant Commissioner for Wages and Industrial Relations. The analysis was prepared by George L. Stelluto, under the immediate supervision of L. Earl Lewis. Field work for the survey was directed by the Assistant Regional Directors for Wages and Industrial Relations.

Other reports available from the Bureau's program of industry wage studies as well as the addresses of the Bureau's six regional offices are listed at the end of this bulletin.

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Industry Wage Survey—

Men's and Boys' Suits and Coats, October 1963

Summary

Straight-time earnings of production workers in the men's and boys' suit and coat manufacturing industry averaged \$2.12 an hour in October 1963.¹ Individual earnings of the 92,116 production workers covered by the survey were widely dispersed with the middle half of the workers earning from \$1.59 to \$2.51 an hour. Variations around the industry average were found by location,² community size, establishment size, type of establishment, and occupation.

Sewing machine operators, numerically most important of the occupations studied separately, averaged \$2.17 an hour in coat fabrication, \$1.94 in trouser fabrication, and \$1.89 in vest fabrication.

The large majority of the workers were in establishments providing paid holidays and vacations as well as several types of health, insurance, and pension benefits.

Industry Characteristics

The Bureau's survey covered establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing men's, youths', and boys' suits, separate tailored coats, overcoats (including topcoats), and uniforms. Establishments primarily manufacturing suits accounted for four-fifths of the production workers covered by the survey. Suit manufacturing establishments employed a majority of the workers in all regions except New England, where the manufacture of suits, separate coats, and overcoats and topcoats were of nearly equal importance.

The Middle Atlantic region accounted for 55 percent of the 92,116 production workers covered by the survey. The Great Lakes region employed 15 percent of the work force and the Border States only slightly less. Of the other regions, only the Southeast accounted for as much as 5 percent of the industry's employment.

The industry was largely concentrated in a relatively few metropolitan areas. Five such areas accounted for slightly more than half of the workers covered by the study: New York and Philadelphia employed 16,801 and 13,579 workers, respectively; Baltimore, Chicago, and Rochester each employed between 5,000 and 6,000. In addition to these areas, the study developed separate information for Boston, Cincinnati, Los Angeles—Long Beach, St. Louis, and for Southern New Jersey and Kentucky. Establishments primarily making suits employed most of the workers in all but 1 of the 9 metropolitan areas studied

Approximately three-fourths of the workers covered by the study were paid on the basis of some form of piecework. Such piecework payments were included as part of the straight-time average hourly earnings covered by the survey. Differences in average hourly earnings reported for such workers among the several areas cannot be used as an accurate measure of differences in piece rates. Average hourly earnings of pieceworkers reflect both the piece rate for the given operation and the productivity of the workers performing the operation.

separately; in Boston, workers were most commonly employed in establishments making overcoats and topcoats. A majority of the workers in Southern New Jersey were in establishments manufacturing uniforms; nine-tenths of those in Kentucky were in plants primarily manufacturing suits.

Three types of shops are included in the industry: (1) Regular or "inside" shops (the most important in terms of employment) which own the materials and perform all or nearly all of the manufacturing processes; (2) cutting shops, which own the material, cut the cloth, and deliver it to contract shops, employed less than 5 percent of the industry's work force and have been grouped with regular shops for purposes of this study; and (3) contract shops which perform the tailoring operations for manufacturers. Contract shops, which employed nearly a fourth of the industry's production workers, were principally located in the Middle Atlantic region, particularly in and near the New York and Philadelphia areas.

More than 150 distinct operations are required to make a suit, and more than 75 to make an overcoat. Although smaller shops combine operations into a single job, the number of occupational classifications is still relatively large. After a suit has been designed and patterns made in various sizes, garment parts are marked, cut, and then prepared for sewing by fitters who sort, match, and trim small parts, and mark locations for pockets, buttons, belt loops, etc. Workers in the sewing departments are usually assigned a specific task in the assembly process, such as sewing on buttons, sewing backs to fronts, or setting in sleeves. Periodically during the process, seams are pressed and the garment is inspected for proper workmanship.

Workers engaged in sewing operations, performed either by hand or machine, constituted a majority of the industry's production workers. Sewing machine operators, accounting for nearly two-fifths of the production workers, greatly outnumbered hand sewers, who are largely employed in the fabrication of higher priced garments.

Women, accounting for two-thirds of the production workers, were largely employed as sewing machine operators and hand finishers. Other jobs predominantly staffed by women included final inspectors, hand buttonhole makers, and thread trimmers. Men, on the other hand, accounted for a majority of the workers in such jobs as cutters and markers, finish pressers, underpressers, packers, and work distributors. The proportions of men in the industry varied from about one-fifth in the Border States, Middle West, and Southeast, to two-fifths in the Middle Atlantic region.

Wage payments for nearly three-fourths of the production were based on individual piecework rates. The proportion of employees paid at these rates was slightly more than half in the Middle West, about seven-tenths in New England and the Middle Atlantic region, three-fourths in the Border States and Great Lakes region, and slightly more than four-fifths in the Southeast. Among the selected areas, the proportions of workers paid under individual piecework systems ranged from approximately three-fifths in the New York area, to nearly seven-eighths in Rochester. Sewing machine operators, hand sewers, and finish pressers were typically paid under incentive wage systems; workers in the selected cutting and marking jobs were, with the exception of some areas, usually paid time rates, as were adjusters, janitors, and work distributors.

Establishments having collective bargaining agreements covering a majority of their production workers accounted for about nine-tenths of the industry's production work force. The proportions of workers in such establishments were two-fifths in the Southeast, about half in the Middle West, nine-tenths in the

Border States, and virtually all in the other regions. Among the selected areas, the proportions of workers in establishments with collective bargaining agreements ranged from one-third in St. Louis to over nine-tenths in all other areas. With few exceptions, collective bargaining agreements were with the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America (AFL-CIO).

Average Hourly Earnings

Compared with the national average of \$2.12, average hourly earnings of production workers ranged from \$1.65 in the Southeast to \$2.25 in the Middle Atlantic region (table 1). Production workers in the Border States and Great Lakes region averaged \$1.95 and \$2.08 an hour, respectively.

The \$2.12 hourly average for all production workers in October 1963 was 20.5 percent above the average of \$1.76 recorded in a similar Bureau study conducted in March 1958.³ Regionally, the increases were 13.9 percent in the Middle West, 18.7 percent in the Southeast, slightly more than 20 percent in the Great Lakes and Middle Atlantic regions, 23.4 percent in the Border States and 26.6 percent in New England.

Women, largely employed as sewing machine operators and hand finishers, averaged \$1.88 an hour in October 1963 compared with \$2.59 for men, who were predominant in the higher paying jobs and were relatively more numerous in the higher paying regions. The average wage advantage for men ranged from 38 cents an hour in the Southeast to 73 cents in the Middle Atlantic region.

Differences in average pay levels for men and women may be the result of several factors, including variation in the distribution of the sexes among establishments and, as suggested above, among jobs with disparate pay levels. Differences noted in averages for men and women in the same job and area may reflect possible minor differences in duties. Job descriptions used in classifying workers in wage surveys are usually more generalized than those used in individual establishments because allowance must be made for possible minor differences among establishments in specific duties performed. As noted earlier, earnings in some jobs are largely determined by production at piece rates. Variations in incentive earnings for individuals or sex groupings may be traceable to differences in work experience, effort, work flow, or other factors which the worker may or may not control.

Nationally, production workers in metropolitan areas averaged \$2.20 an hour—43 cents more than those in smaller communities. The wage advantage for workers in metropolitan areas was 16 cents in the Southeast, 24 cents in the Border States, and 46 cents in the Middle Atlantic. These were the only regions for which data could be compared by community size.

There was no consistent relationship between earnings levels in establishments with 250 workers or more and those in the smaller establishments. In New England, for example, workers in establishments having 250 workers or more averaged 19 cents an hour more than those in the smaller establishments, whereas in the Middle Atlantic region workers in establishments with fewer than

250 employees averaged 16 cents an hour more than workers in the larger establishments. In the latter region, the high-wage New York area accounted for about half of the employment in establishments with fewer than 250 workers but only about a fifth of the employment in the larger establishments.

Among the nine metropolitan areas surveyed separately, averages for production workers ranged from \$1.81 an hour in St. Louis to \$2.43 in Los Angeles—Long Beach and \$2.49 in the New York area (tables 7 through 24). Averages for the remaining areas were grouped between \$2 and \$2.30 an hour.

Workers in contract shops nationally averaged \$2.24 an hour, 16 cents more than those in regular and cutting shops. This nationwide relationship, however, results primarily from the fact that a few comparatively higher wage areas accounted for a much larger proportion of the employment in contract shops than in regular and cutting shops: the New York area, for example, accounted for three-eighths of all the workers in contract shops, but only one-eighth of all those in the other category. In this area, workers in regular and cutting shops averaged 4 cents an hour more than those in contract shops, which typically do not employ the relatively high-paid cutting and marking jobs. In Baltimore, the wage advantage of workers in regular and cutting shops was 8 cents an hour. In Philadelphia, the only other area for which this information was developed, identical averages were recorded for both types of shops.

Individual earnings in the industry were widely dispersed, with the middle half of the workers' earnings falling between \$1.59 and \$2.51 an hour (table 2). Slightly more than 8 percent of the workers earned \$1.25 but less than \$1.30 an hour; nearly 20 percent earned less than \$1.50; 50 percent earned less than \$2; and nearly 75 percent earned less than \$2.50. Contributing to this dispersion were such factors as differences in shop pay levels among and within regions and areas, the relatively high incidence of incentive wage systems, and the wide range of skill requirements in the industry.

Occupational Earnings

Sewing machine operators, numerically the largest of the occupations studied separately, averaged \$2.17 an hour in coat fabrication, \$1.94 in trouser fabrication, and \$1.89 in vest fabrication (table 3). Earnings of sewing machine operators varied somewhat according to the specific sewing operation performed. In each of the regions, for example, operators sewing in coat sleeves averaged more than those joining undercollars and sleeve linings or piecing pockets. About four-fifths of the sewing machine operators were women, but the proportion varied considerably by area—ranging from nearly half in the New York area to virtually all in St. Louis.

Cloth cutters and markers, nearly all men and the highest paid of the occupations studied separately, averaged \$3.11 an hour. Men were also in the majority in the other jobs for which averages of more than \$2.50 an hour were recorded, such as cloth cutters (\$2.88) and machine finish pressers in coat fabrication (\$2.74). Lowest job averages were recorded for janitors (\$1.55) and work distributors (\$1.52); in general, both of these jobs were staffed by men.

Differences in pay levels are illustrated in the following tabulation for selected regions and areas of industry concentration. The averages for all production workers and for six selected jobs are expressed as percentages of their respective nationwide averages.

Regional pay relatives were lowest in the Middle West and Southeast—usually between about 75 and 85 percent of national levels, but less than 60 percent for hand finish pressers. Highest pay relatives, found in New England and the Middle Atlantic regions, ranged from 104 percent of the national average for hand finish pressers to 111 percent for cloth cutters and markers. Among the areas studied separately, lowest pay relatives for the six jobs did not fall below 84 percent of national levels, whereas highest relatives ranged from 11 to 31 percent above nationwide averages. Within areas, wage relationships to national averages also varied widely by occupation. In the New York area, for example, the average for hand finishers was only slightly above the national level, but the average for sewing machine operators in trouser fabrication was 31 percent higher.

Occupational pay relationships also varied considerably by area. To illustrate, average hourly earnings for machine finish pressers (coat fabrication) exceeded the average for janitors by 156 percent in Southern New Jersey and 129 percent in Cincinnati, compared with 86 percent in St. Louis and 59 percent in Rochester; this relationship ranged from 95 to 104 percent in the other areas permitting comparison of averages for the two jobs.

Occupational averages in metropolitan areas were higher than those recorded in smaller communities in nearly all instances where comparisons were possible (table 4). The difference amounted to more than 40 cents an hour for most jobs in the Middle Atlantic region but was usually less than 30 cents in the Border States and Southeast.

In the Middle Atlantic region, which accounted for nearly 85 percent of the workers in contract shops, average hourly earnings in the large majority of the selected jobs for which comparisons could be made were higher in contract shops than in regular and cutting shops (table 5). Average earnings for the

selected occupations in Philadelphia were usually higher in contract shops than in regular and cutting shops; however, in the New York area, averages for slightly more than half of the jobs for which comparisons could be made were higher in regular and cutting shops. Baltimore accounted for all the contract shop employment in the Border States, but only about three-eighths of the workers in regular and cutting shops.

In 2 of the 4 regions for which data are presented by establishment size, occupational averages were higher in establishments with 250 workers or more than those in smaller establishments for most of the jobs permitting comparisons (table 6). The highest job averages were about equally distributed among the large and small establishments in the Border States. In contrast, in the Middle Atlantic region, occupational averages in establishments with fewer than 250 workers were, for the most part, higher than those recorded in the larger establishments. In this region, the high-wage New York area had a greater impact on wage levels in smaller establishments than in establishments with 250 workers or more.

Earnings of individual workers varied greatly within the same job and area. For some jobs, particularly those typically paid under incentive systems, there was considerable earnings dispersion even in the same establishment. In many instances, the difference between the highest and lowest paid worker in the same establishment and job exceeded 50 cents an hour.

Establishment Practices and Supplementary Wage Provisions

Data were obtained on work schedules and selected supplementary benefits including paid holidays and vacations, retirement pensions, life insurance, and hospitalization and surgical benefits for production workers.

Scheduled Weekly Hours. Work schedules of 40 hours a week were in effect in establishments employing nine-tenths of the industry's production workers at the time of the survey (table 25). Although workweeks of less than 40 hours were reported in all regions and nearly all selected areas, they were most prevalent in the New York area where a fifth of the workers had schedules of 36 hours a week.

Paid Holidays. Paid holidays were provided to all or nearly all of the production workers in five regions and to about three-fifths of the workers in the Southeast (table 26). The most common provision in each region, except the Middle West, was 7 days annually. In the latter region, a majority of the workers were provided 6 days a year. Time-rated workers were generally paid for each holiday at one-fifth of their current weekly rate and incentive workers usually received 8 times their straight-time average hourly earnings as computed for determining the first week's vacation pay. (See paragraph immediately following.)

Paid Vacations. Paid vacations after qualifying periods of service were provided by establishments accounting for virtually all production workers (table 27). Nine-tenths of the workers were in establishments in which vacation pay was determined by contractual agreements with the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America. Workers covered by these agreements usually received one-half week's vacation pay after 6 but less than 9 months of service, three-fourths week's pay after 9 months but less than 1 year, and 2 weeks' pay after 1 year or more. For the first of these 2 weeks, time-rated workers receive

their current weekly rate and incentive-paid workers receive 40 times their straight-time average hourly earnings for the 4 consecutive busiest weeks of the vacation year. The second week's vacation pay amounts to $2\frac{1}{2}$ percent of the employee's straight-time earnings during the previous calendar year. Commencing December 1964, employees with 1 year or more of service will receive additional Christmas vacation pay equal to 80 percent of their second week of summer vacation pay.

Health, Insurance, and Pension Plans. Health and insurance benefits were in most instances provided from the Amalgamated Social Insurance Fund to which employers having contracts with ACWA contributed 3.1 percent of gross wages payable for each pay period⁴ (table 28). Employee benefits provided by the fund included \$1,000 life insurance, accident and health insurance, and medical care and hospitalization. Medical care and hospitalization were also provided for the families of the employees.

At the time of the survey, ACWA maintained health centers in four of the areas surveyed separately—Chicago, New York, Philadelphia, and Rochester. In the New York area, employers contributed one-fourth of 1 percent of gross wages and each employee paid \$10 annually to maintain the center; in Philadelphia, employers contributed $1\frac{1}{4}$ percent of gross wages and employees made an initial contribution of \$20 each. Employers in Chicago contributed $1\frac{1}{2}$ percent of gross wages and those in Rochester 1.267 percent to maintain the centers.

Retirement pension plans, providing regular payments on retirement for the remainder of the worker's life (in addition to benefits available under Federal social security), were provided by establishments accounting for slightly more than nine-tenths of the industry's production workers. Establishments having agreements with ACWA contributed 3.4 percent of gross wages to the Amalgamated Retirement Fund which provides retirement benefits of \$50 a month to qualified workers beginning at age 65. Women may retire at age 62 at proportionately reduced benefits.

⁴ In New Jersey, employers contributed 2.35 percent of gross wages payable to the fund and paid 0.75 percent normally required of employees by the State temporary disability law. Employers in Baltimore contributed another 1 percent of gross wages to provide additional medical and other benefits, the specific details and effective date of which have not yet been determined.

Appendix A. Scope and Method of Survey

Scope of Survey

The survey covered establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing men's, youths', and boys' suits, coats, and overcoats (industry 2311 as defined in the 1957 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, prepared by the U.S. Bureau of the Budget). Included in the study were tailored suits, separate coats or jackets, overcoats and topcoats, and uniforms. Separate central offices and other auxiliary units were excluded from the survey.

The establishments studied were selected from those employing five workers or more at the time of reference of the data used in compiling the universe lists.

The number of establishments and workers actually studied by the Bureau, as well as the number estimated to be in the industry during the payroll period studied, are shown in the following table.

Method of Study

Data were obtained by personal visits of Bureau field economists under the direction of the Bureau's Assistant Regional Directors for Wages and Industrial Relations. The survey was conducted on a sample basis. To obtain appropriate accuracy at minimum cost, a greater proportion of large than of small establishments was studied. In combining the data, however, all establishments were given their appropriate weight. All estimates are presented, therefore, as relating to all establishments in the industry, excluding only those below the minimum size at the time of reference of the universe data.

Establishment Definition

An establishment, for purposes of this study, is defined as a single physical location where industrial operations are performed. An establishment is not necessarily identical with a company, which may consist of one or more establishments.

Employment

The estimates of the number of workers within the scope of the study are intended as a general guide to the size and composition of the labor force included in the survey. The advance planning necessary to make a wage survey requires the use of lists of establishments assembled considerably in advance of the payroll period studied.

Production Workers

The term "production workers," as used in this bulletin, includes working foremen and all nonsupervisory workers engaged in nonoffice functions. Administrative, executive, professional, and technical personnel, and force-account construction employees, who were utilized as a separate work force on the firm's own properties, were excluded.

Occupations Selected for Study

Occupational classification was based on a uniform set of job descriptions designed to take account of interestablishment and interarea variations in duties within the same job. (See appendix B for these job descriptions.) The occupations were chosen for their numerical importance, their usefulness in collective bargaining, or their representativeness of the entire job scale in the industry. Working supervisors, apprentices, learners, beginners, trainees, handicapped, part-time, temporary, and probationary workers were not reported in the data for selected occupations, but were included in the data for all production workers.

Wage Data

The wage information relates to average straight-time hourly earnings, excluding premium pay for overtime and for work on weekends, holidays, and late shifts. Incentive payments, such as those resulting from piecework or production bonus systems and cost-of-living bonuses, were included as part of the workers' regular pay; but nonproduction bonus payments, such as Christmas or yearend bonuses, were excluded. The hourly earnings of salaried workers were obtained by dividing straight-time salary by normal rather than actual hours.⁵

Comparison With Other Statistics

The straight-time hourly earnings presented in this bulletin differ in concept from the gross average hourly earnings published in the Bureau's monthly hours and earnings series. Unlike the latter, the averages presented here exclude premium pay for overtime and for work on weekends, holidays, and late shifts and were calculated by summing individual hourly earnings and dividing by the number of individuals. In the monthly series, the sum of the man-hour totals reported by establishments in the industry is divided into the reported payroll totals.

Size of Community

Tabulations by size of community pertain to metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas. The term "metropolitan area," as used in this bulletin, refers to the Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas as defined by the U.S. Bureau of the Budget in 1961.

⁵ Average hourly rates or earnings for each occupation or other group of workers, such as men, women, or production workers, were obtained by weighting each rate (or hourly earnings) by the number of workers receiving the rate.

Except in New England, a Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area is defined as a county or group of contiguous counties which contains at least one city of 50,000 inhabitants or more. Contiguous counties to the one containing such a city are included in a Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area if, according to certain criteria, they are essentially metropolitan in character and are socially and economically integrated with the central city. In New England, where the city and town are administratively more important than the county, they are the units used in defining Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

Establishment Practices and Supplementary Wage Provisions

Supplementary benefits and practices were treated statistically on the basis that if formal provisions for supplementary benefits and practices were applicable to half or more of the production workers in an establishment, the practices or benefits were considered applicable to all such workers. Similarly, if fewer than half of the workers were covered, the practice or benefit was considered nonexistent in the establishment. Because of length-of-service and other eligibility requirements, the proportion of workers receiving the benefits may be smaller than estimated. Because of rounding, sums of individual items may not equal totals.

Weekly Hours. Data refer to the predominant work schedule for full-time production workers employed on the day shift.

Paid Holidays. Paid holiday provisions relate to full-day and half-day holidays provided annually.

Paid Vacations. The summary of vacation plans is limited to formal arrangements, excluding informal plans, whereby time off with pay is granted at the discretion of the employer or the supervisor. Payments not on a time basis were converted; for example, a payment of 2 percent of annual earnings was considered the equivalent of 1 week's pay. The periods of service for which data are presented were selected as representative of the most common practices, but they do not necessarily reflect individual establishment provisions for progression. For example, the changes in proportions indicated at 5 years of service include changes in provisions which may have occurred after 4 years.

Health, Insurance, and Pension Plans. Data are presented for all health, insurance, and pension plans for which all or a part of the cost is borne by the employer, excluding only programs required by law, such as workmen's compensation and social security. Among the plans included are those underwritten by a commercial insurance company, those provided through a union fund, or those paid directly by the employer from his current operating funds or from a fund set aside for this purpose.

Death benefits are included as a form of life insurance. Sickness and accident insurance is limited to that type of insurance under which predetermined cash payments are made directly to the insured on a weekly or monthly basis during illness or accident disability. Information is presented for all such plans to which the employer contributes at least a part of the cost. However, in New York and New Jersey where temporary disability insurance laws require employer contributions,⁶ plans are included only if the employer (1) contributes more than is legally required or (2) provides employees with benefits which exceed the requirements of law.

Tabulations of paid sick leave plans are limited to formal plans which provide full pay or a proportion of the worker's pay during absence from work because of illness; informal arrangements have been omitted. Separate tabulations are provided according to (1) plans which provide full pay and no waiting period and (2) plans providing either partial pay or a waiting period.

Medical insurance refers to plans providing for complete or partial payment of doctors' fees. Such plans may be underwritten by a commercial insurance company or a nonprofit organization, or may be self-insured.

Catastrophe insurance, sometimes referred to as extended medical insurance, includes the plans designed to cover employees in case of sickness or injury involving an expense which goes beyond the normal coverage of hospitalization, medical, and surgical plans.

Tabulations of retirement pensions are limited to plans which provide regular payments on retirement for the remainder of the worker's life.

⁶ The temporary disability insurance laws in California and Rhode Island do not require employer contributions.

Appendix B. Occupational Descriptions

The primary purpose of preparing job descriptions for the Bureau's wage surveys is to assist its field staff in classifying into appropriate occupations workers who are employed under a variety of payroll titles and different work arrangements from establishment to establishment and from area to area. This permits the grouping of occupational wage rates representing comparable job content. Because of this emphasis on interestablishment and inter-area comparability of occupational content, the Bureau's job descriptions may differ significantly from those in use in individual establishments or those prepared for other purposes. In applying these job descriptions, the Bureau's field economists are instructed to exclude working supervisors, apprentices, learners, beginners, trainees, handicapped, part-time, temporary, and probationary workers.

Cutting

CUTTER, CLOTH

Cuts cloth (other than linings) by hand or machine after pattern has been outlined on material by the marker. Workers who mark and cut are to be classified as cutters and markers (see below).

CUTTER, LINING

Cuts out body linings, stays, sleeve linings and/or other parts of the inner lining from single or multiple layers of fabric. May also mark the outline for the cutting operation.

CUTTER AND MARKER, CLOTH

Arranges patterns on material (other than linings) and marks outlines of pattern with chalk, and cuts material by hand or machine. May assemble various parts of garment, matching stripes or plaids where required; may also spread or lay up layers of fabric.

MARKER

Arranges patterns on materials to be cut and marks outline with chalk.

PATTERN CUTTER

Cuts patterns from paper or fiberboard by following markings made by pattern grader.

SPREADER

Spreads (lays up) multiple layers of cloth smoothly and evenly on a cutting table by hand or with the aid of a spreading machine. Cuts each ply to length from the bolt of material.

Coat FabricationBASTER, ARMHOLE, HAND

Bastes lining and padding into shoulders and around armholes of coats by hand.

BASTER, EXCEPT ARMHOLE, HAND

Arranges and hand-sews parts of garments together with long stitches, usually to hold parts together temporarily until they are stitched by others.

BUTTON SEWER, HAND

Sews buttons to garments by hand, using needle and thread. In addition, may match buttons or mark location of buttons.

BUTTONHOLE MAKER, HAND

Sews buttonholes in garments by hand.

COLLAR SETTER, HAND

Bastes topcollar and undercollar to neck of coat and tacks collar corner by hand; tacks gorge seam open.

FINISHER, HAND

Performs one or more of the following hand operations: Sewing or felling lining to lining, or lining to cloth at the armholes, shoulders, sleeve bottoms, body lining, top and undercollar to neck of coat, and felling corners where it is impractical or undesirable for the various machines to be used—such as corners between facing and bottom turnup, openings with thick seams, etc.

FITTER (TRIMMER)

Sorts, matches, and trims garment parts and linings preparatory to the sewing operations. This classification excludes workers who do only such single operations as stamping, marking sizes, marking stitches, etc.

INSPECTOR, FINAL (EXAMINER)

Examines and inspects completed coats prior to pressing or shipping. Work involves: Determining whether the coats conform to shop standards of quality, and marking defects such as dropped stitches, bad seams, etc. In addition may make minor repairs.

Thread trimmers who may only casually inspect garments are not included in this classification. In many shops manufacturing inexpensive garments there will be no inspectors falling within this description; in those shops whatever inspection is carried on is usually performed by thread trimmers.

PAIRER AND TURNER

Pairs or brings together parts of the garment for assembly, or turns various parts, excluding front edges and collars.

PRESSER, FINISH

Performs the final pressing operations on completed coats by means of a hand-pressing iron, or a pressing machine which is heated by gas or steam. Workers who press only a portion of the completed garment are also included in this classification.

Workers are to be classified according to the type of pressing equipment used.

Presser, finish, hand
Presser, finish, machine

SEWING MACHINE OPERATOR

Operates a standard industrial machine or a special-purpose sewing machine to perform the stitching involved in making parts of garments, in joining various garment sections together, or in attaching previously completed garment parts to partially completed garments.

Sewing machine operators working on coat fabrication are to be classified according to the following breakdown:

Baste, edges. Bastes front edges and bottoms, just after the front edge of the coat has been turned, with a temporary removable chainstitch.

Baste, jump-stitch machine (armhole). Bastes armholes with jump-stitch machine inside and outside including sleeve head.

Baste, jump-stitch machine (canvas). Bastes on canvas, shoulder pads and bridle with jump-stitch machine.

Baste, jump-stitch machine (facings). Attaches facings to coat with jump-stitch machine.

Baste, jump-stitch machine (linings and yokes). Bastes lining at side and bottom, bastes vent or vents (if any), and bastes yokes to back with jump-stitch machine.

Book edges. Books or turns in raw seam edges with a serging machine.

Button sewing. Operates a button-sewing machine that automatically sews buttons to garments or garment parts.

Buttonhole making. Operates a buttonhole machine that automatically cuts and stitches buttonholes in garments or garment parts.

Collar preparing (except piecing or padding). Bastes topcollar to undercollar and bastes edge all around with jump-stitch machine.

Collar setting. Bastes topcollar and undercollar to neck of coat by machine; or sews topcollar to gorge and across neck with a plain sewing machine and bastes or sews undercollar to neck with a zigzag machine.

Facing tacking. Tacks facing to front with blind-stitch machine.

Fell body lining, bottom and side. Fells (joins) body lining to cloth forepart at side seams and bottom of coat with a machine designed to join parts by means of a blindstitch which does not show on the front side of the cloth.

Join shoulders, cloth. Joins shoulder of cloth forepart to back.

Join side seams. Joins back to forepart (front) of garment.

Join undercollar, join sleeve lining, or piece pockets. Includes operators who join undercollar cloth and undercollar canvas; or join top-sleeve lining to under-sleeve lining; or sew cloth and lining facings to the pocket lining and may also make the cash pocket.

Lining maker, body. Sews lining to facing and makes inside breast pocket by machine (double needle knife machine or Reese pocket machine).

Pad collar and lapels. Joins (pads or quilts) collar and lapel of forepart to canvas by numerous rows of blindstitching.

Pocket setting and tacking. Sews flap and bosom to front, cuts open, turns, tacks corners, and sews around silesia pocket; sets outside welt, cuts open, tacks corners, and sews around silesia pocket.

SEWING MACHINE OPERATOR—Continued

Sew darts (cloth). Sews the "darts," "gores," or "clams" in the body at the waist of coat front (cloth).

Sew edge tape. Sews narrow tape down front edges of coat and across bottoms after facing is first attached to front by hand or machine basting. Usually performed on sewing machine with cutting attachment.

Sew in sleeve. Sews completed sleeves to the body of the coat.

Sleeve making, cloth. Sews in seam of cloth, makes turnups with wigan, sews elbow seam, and makes sleeve vent by machine.

Tape armholes. Sews a narrow tape and/or bias strip to the armholes of either, or both, front and back parts of coat.

SHAPER, EDGE AND BOTTOM, CLICKER MACHINE

Pairs fronts, places them on block, sets metal die on fronts, and clicks machine.

SHAPER, EDGE AND BOTTOM, HAND

Marks and trims lapels, front edge, and bottom of coat with shears. Lapels are marked by means of a special pattern or "shaper." The lower part of the front edge and bottoms may also be marked with the aid of special patterns.

SHAPER UNDERCOLLAR, CLICKER MACHINE

Places undercollars on block of machine (stacked two or more), places metal die on top of undercollars, and clicks machine.

SHAPER, UNDERCOLLAR, HAND

Marks and trims undercollar by hand with the aid of a special pattern known as an "undercollar shaper."

TAILOR, ALL AROUND

Performs several or all of the hand basting, hand sewing, and sewing machine operations included in the making of a coat.

THREAD TRIMMER AND BASTING PULLER

Trims loose thread ends, and removes basting threads of coats prior to pressing.

Workers who also carefully examine and inspect garments are classified as inspectors, final.

UNDERPRESSER

Uses hand iron, machine iron, or powered press to press various parts of coat such as armholes, darts, long seams, short seams, etc., during the fabricating process.

Trouser FabricationINSPECTOR, FINAL (EXAMINER)

Examines and inspects completed trousers prior to pressing or shipping. Work involves: Determining whether the trousers conform to shop standards of quality, and marking defects such as dropped stitches, bad seams, etc. In addition, may make minor repairs.

Thread trimmers who may only casually inspect garments are not included in this classification. In many shops manufacturing inexpensive garments, there will be no inspectors falling within this description; in those shops whatever inspection is carried on is usually performed by thread trimmers.

PRESSER, FINISH

Performs all the final pressing operations, on completed trousers, both tops and legs, by means of steam pressing machine. Workers who press only a portion of the completed garment are not included in this classification.

SEWER, HAND (FINISHER)

Performs sewing operations by hand including sewing on buttons, making buttonholes, sewing on size tickets, stitching edges, closing openings that have been left by various hand and machine operations, etc.

SEWING MACHINE OPERATOR

Sewing machine operators working on trouser fabrication are to be classified according to the following breakdown:

Attach fly. Attaches either/or both right and left fly to trousers.

Attach waistband. Attaches cloth waistband all around top of trousers.

Attach zipper. Sews zipper to either/or both left and right flies.

Bartacking. Sews bartacks at various parts of garment, such as at ends of pocket openings, at the bottom of fly opening, at top and bottom of belt loops, and/or buttonhole ends for reinforcement on a specially designed sewing machine.

Join inseams. Joins front and back legs at innerseam.

Join outseams. Joins front and back legs at outerseam.

Join seatseams. Joins right and left halves of trousers at the center back or seatseams.

Make pockets. Makes either complete front, side or back pockets, or complete pockets exclusive of sewing facings (piecings) to pocket linings.

Piecing flys. Performs operations for preparing the fly prior to attaching fly to trousers, exclusive of zipper sewing.

Piecing pockets. Sews cloth facings to pocket linings before linings are sewed to the trousers.

Serging. Makes covering (or overlocking, overcasting, or serging) stitch over raw edges of cloth on a special machine to prevent raveling.

Sew on waistband lining. Sews waistband lining to cloth waistband, or to top of trousers when there is no separate cloth waistband, on a plain or special machine.

Stitch pockets. Stitches around edge of pocket lining, after the pockets have been turned, as a reinforcing seam.

THREAD TRIMMER AND BASTING PULLER

Trims loose thread ends and removes basting threads of trousers prior to pressing.

Workers who also carefully examine and inspect garments are classified as inspectors, final.

UNDERPRESSER

Uses hand iron, machine iron, or a powered press to press garment parts such as pockets, seams, etc., during the fabricating process.

Vest FabricationSEWING MACHINE OPERATOR

Operates a standard industrial machine or a special purpose sewing machine to perform the stitching involved in making parts of vests, in joining various vest sections together, or in attaching previously completed vest parts to partially completed vests.

UNDERPRESSER

Uses hand iron, machine iron, or powered press to press back, darts, neck seams, pocket seams, welts, etc. during the fabrication process.

MiscellaneousADJUSTER (REPAIRMAN)

Adjusts and repairs sewing machines used in the establishment. Work involves most of the following: Examines machines faulty in operation to diagnose source of trouble; dismantling or partly dismantling machines, replacing broken or worn out parts or performing other repairs, and reassembling machines; adjusting machines to function efficiently by turning adjustment screws and nuts; regulating length of stroke or needle and horizontal movement feeding mechanism under needle; replacing or repairing transmission belts; preparing specifications for major repairs and initiating orders for replacement parts; using a variety of handtools in fitting and replacing parts. May also do adjustments on pressing machines.

JANITOR

Cleans and keeps in an orderly condition factory working areas and washrooms, or premises of an office, apartment house, or commercial or other establishment. Duties involve a combination of the following: Sweeping, mopping or scrubbing, and polishing floors; removing chips, trash, and other refuse; dusting equipment, furniture, or fixtures; polishing metal fixtures or trimmings; providing supplies and minor maintenance services; cleaning lavatories, showers, and restrooms. Workers who specialize in window washing are excluded.

PACKER

Places finished garments in shipping containers. In addition, may also seal or close container, and/or place shipping or identification marks on container.

STOCK CLERK, GARMENTS

Receives completed garments, stores garments according to size, style, and color; and prepares garments for shipment. May also assemble parts (coats, vests, and trousers) into complete garments and keep records of garments received and prepared for shipment.

This classification does not include stockroom helpers or employees who supervise stock clerks and helpers.

STOCK CLERK, PIECE GOODS

Receives bolts of cloth (piece goods) and checks the receipts against orders; arranges the cloth in bins or on shelves according to style, quality, and color; and issues cloth to cutting department according to requisitions. May also keep inventory records of stock and notify the proper official when cloth is needed; and issue linings and findings such as buttons, thread, and tape.

This classification does not include stockroom helpers or employees who supervise stock clerks and helpers.

WORK DISTRIBUTOR (BUNDLE CARRIER)

Carries or trucks garments in various stages of completion to the worker who is to perform the next operation on the garment. May exercise some discretion in distributing work, but has no supervisory responsibilities.

Office JobsBOOKKEEPING-MACHINE OPERATOR

Operates a bookkeeping machine (Remington Rand, Elliott Fisher, Sundstrand, Burroughs, National Cash Register, with or without a typewriter keyboard) to keep a record of business transactions.

Class A. Keeps a set of records requiring a knowledge of and experience in basic bookkeeping principles and familiarity with the structure of the particular accounting system used. Determines proper records and distribution of debit and credit items to be used in each phase of the work. May prepare consolidated reports, balance sheets, and other records by hand.

Class B. Keeps a record of one or more phases or sections of a set of records usually requiring little knowledge of basic bookkeeping. Phases or sections include accounts payable, payroll, customers' accounts, cost distribution, expense distribution, inventory control, etc. May check or assist in preparation of trial balances and prepare control sheets for the accounting department.

CLERK, PAYROLL

Computes wages of company employees and enters the necessary data on the payroll sheets. Duties involve: Calculating workers' earnings based on time or production records; posting calculated data on payroll sheets, showing information such as worker's name, working days, time, rate, deductions for insurance, and total wages due. May make out paychecks and assist paymaster in making up and distributing pay envelopes. May use a calculating machine.

STENOGRAPHER, GENERAL

Primary duty is to take dictation from one or more persons either in shorthand or by Stenotype or similar machine, involving a normal routine vocabulary; and to transcribe dictation. May also type from written copy. May maintain files, keep simple records, or perform other relatively routine clerical tasks. May operate from a stenographic pool. Does not include transcribing-machine work.

TYPIST

Uses a typewriter to make copies of various material or to make out bills after calculations have been made by another person. May include typing of stencils, mats, or similar materials for use in duplicating processes. May do clerical work involving little special training, such as keeping simple records, filing records and reports, or sorting and distributing incoming mail.

Class A. Performs one or more of the following: Typing material in final form when it involves combining material from several sources or responsibility for correct spelling, syllabification, punctuation, etc., of technical or unusual words or foreign language material; combining material from several sources, or planning layout and typing of complicated statistical tables to maintain uniformity and balance in spacing. May type routine form letters, varying details to suit circumstances.

Class B. Performs one or more of the following: Copy typing from rough or clear drafts; routine typing of forms, insurance policies, etc.; setting up simple standard tabulations, or copying more complex tables already set up and spaced properly.
