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Preface

This bulletin combines the Bureau's annual wage calendar article, which appeared in the January 1969 issue of the Monthly Labor Review, and the Bureau's listing of major agreements due to expire during the year. Each contract covers 1,000 workers or more. Virtually all of these contracts are on file in the Bureau's Division of Industrial Relations and are open to public inspection. Information for a few situations was taken from published sources.

Table 9 lists agreements scheduled to expire in 1969 by month of expiration; and table 10 arranges them by industry. Where the contract has been negotiated already, the entry has been lined through in both tables. Users should refer to appendix A for a list of common abbreviations and to appendix B for codes used in identifying the entries by industry, State, union, and scope of agreement.

Table 11 lists 1969 wage reopenings by month for selected collective bargaining agreements covering 5,000 workers or more. This list is duplicated in part in table 8 where wage reopenings are reported along with termination, cost-of-living, and deferred wage increases.

Expirations that were reported to the Bureau too late to be included in tables 9 and 10 are listed in table 12.

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Wage Calendar, 1969

WAGE CHANGES going into effect in 1969 for a large proportion of workers covered by major collective bargaining contracts will reflect negotiations that took place in 1967 or 1968 rather than current negotiations. Bargaining activity will be relatively light since a record number of workers—about 2 out of 3—are covered by long-term contracts that specify deferred wage increases in 1969.

Major negotiations scheduled to take place in the coming year are in electrical products, and men's shirts and other cotton garments manufacturing, for railroad shopcraft workers, in construction, and West Coast paper and lumber industries.

Deferred wage increases will be larger in percentage terms than in earlier years but the importance of deferred wage increases will greatly influence the median wage changes actually going into effect in 1969, which are the net result of negotiated increases plus deferred and cost-of-living escalator increases. Because deferred changes in recent years have typically been smaller than the changes that go into effect in the first year of a contract and because they will be relatively important in 1969, the size of the average wage change going into effect during 1969 will probably be somewhat smaller than in 1968.

Deferred and current increases

More workers under major collective bargaining agreements¹ will receive deferred instead of currently bargained wage increases in 1969 than in any previous year. About 6.1 million of the 9.3 million workers under major collective bargaining agreements, for which information is available,² will receive wage increases in 1969 as a result of negotiations concluded in earlier years, as shown above.

Contracts for approximately 2.7 million workers permit bargaining during 1969. This includes about 2.44 million whose contracts expire during the year and 234,000 whose agreements do not expire until 1970 or later but have provisions for reopening (tables 1 and 2). In 1968, the number of workers affected by deferred wage increases exceeded the number who received negotiated increases by less than 200,000.

The record number scheduled to receive deferred wage increases in 1969 is due in part to the high proportion of contracts subject to negotiation in 1967 or 1968 rather than in 1969, and in part to the fact that almost all of the 1967 and 1968 agreements provided for a wage increase in 1969. Very few of the workers, whose contracts will still be in force through 1969, will receive no deferred wage increase during the year.

Who will bargain?

The bargaining that is scheduled to take place in 1969 will be about equally divided between manufacturing and nonmanufacturing industries. Manufacturing contracts covering about 1.2 million workers will expire, and contracts for about 200,000 are subject to reopening. The most important contracts to be renegotiated are in electrical products, apparel (men's shirts and other cotton garments), petroleum refining, lumber, and shipbuilding.³ Contracts in the West Coast paper industry and some agreements in leather and

³ Contracts for workers in petroleum refining, railroad shopcraft workers, and mechanics of 8 major airlines expire on the last day of 1968 but have been considered as part of the 1969 bargaining and settlement picture.

aerospace will also be on the bargaining table in 1969.

In nonmanufacturing, approximately 1.2 million workers have contracts that expire and agreements for another 38,000 can be reopened in 1969. Included are agreements for over 425,000 workers in the construction industry and for about 135,000 railroad shopcraft workers. Some contracts in the maritime, gas and electric utilities, anthracite coal mining, and retail grocery industries can be reopened or renegotiated. Negotiations for mechanics of eight major airlines were underway in late 1968. Telephone agreements, originally scheduled to expire in 1969, were renegotiated under clauses for wage reopenings in 1968 and extended to 1971 without reopening provisions.

The median deferred increase will be the highest on record in this decade—4.1 percent (table 3), compared with 3.8 percent in 1968. In both years, the most common increase will be 3.5 to 4 percent, or 14 to 15 cents—the amount that most automobile workers and many workers in farm and construction equipment and the aerospace industry will receive in 1969.⁴

Of the workers who will receive deferred wage increases, approximately one-third are also covered by provisions for cost-of-living escalation. Be-

⁴ As indicated subsequently, minimum cost-of-living adjustments guaranteed under escalator clauses have been considered a part of the deferred increase. Contracts in automobile and related industries specify that regardless of the level of the CPI, the cost-of-living allowance will be at least 3 cents higher in 1968 than in 1967 and at least 6 cents higher in 1969 than in 1967. Therefore, in each year 3 cents has been considered as part of the deferred increase.

cause a maximum limit has been established on the size of the cost-of-living escalator adjustments for most of these workers, such clauses typically can add no more than 5 cents during 1969 to the deferred wage adjustments.

Multiyear contracts

Multiyear contracts may provide deferred benefits, as well as wage changes. Taking such benefit changes into account, the median deferred package increase in key contracts will be 4.7 percent in 1969 (table 4).⁵ This compares with 4.5 percent in 1968.

Workers covered by most key collective bargaining agreements will receive deferred wage in-

creases in 1969. Contracts in automobiles ⁶ and automotive parts, farm and construction equipment, steel, aluminum, trucking, and aerospace extend beyond 1969, and have provisions for deferred wage increases during this year. The increase in the automobile and related industries will

amount to about 3.6 percent. ⁷ Most railroad employees will also receive deferred rather than negotiated increases.

Other industries in which deferred increases will be given to at least some workers in 1969 include food, apparel (including men's and boys' coats and suits), rubber, stone, clay, and glass

products, metal working, warehousing, wholesale and retail trade, transportation, public utilities, services, tobacco, textile, lumber and furniture, paper, printing and publishing, chemicals, leather, finance, insurance, real estate, and mining industries.

At least 850,000 workers in the construction industry will receive deferred wage increases in 1969, about the same number as in 1968, but well below the approximately 935,000 who had such increases in 1967. As usual, most of the increases in construction will be effective in the first half of the year but some workers will also receive deferred changes in the second half of 1969 (table 5). Of the approximately 260,000 workers scheduled to receive increases in the second half, about 160,000 will also receive increases in the first 6 months.

Deferred increases in construction typically will be greater than those in other industries. The relatively large increases reflect both the size of construction settlements and the fact that, in contrast to other industries, deferred wage and benefit changes in construction are typically larger than first-year wage increases.

Most common increases in construction wage scales will be 5 but less than 6 percent. Ninety-seven percent of all construction workers will receive wage increases of at least 15 cents an hour, and 93 percent of the workers' increases will be 4 percent or more. In other industries, increases of these amounts will affect 35 and 48 percent, respectively. More than half of the construction workers will receive deferred increases of at least 35 cents or 7 percent, compared with less than 1 and 2.5

percent, respectively, of the workers in other industries.

Cost-of-living escalators

The accelerated rate of increase in consumer prices in recent years has rekindled interest in cost-of-living escalator clauses and such clauses were added to a small number of major collective bargaining agreements during 1968.⁸ Despite these recent increases in the number of contracts containing escalator provisions, at the beginning of 1969 only about 2.55 million workers⁹—less than 1 out of 4 under major contracts—were covered by such provisions. This compared to about 2.46 million a year earlier and 2.2 million at the beginning of 1967 as indicated in the following tabulation.¹⁰

The contracts negotiated during 1968 continued the trend toward establishing a maximum limit on the amount of escalator adjustments. By the end of the year escalator clauses for about 1.9 million workers, compared with about 1.5 million a year earlier and 360,000 2 years earlier, included such limits. In early 1966, such limits affected only about 50,000 workers.

Most automobile, farm and construction equipment, and aerospace contracts, and many in the automotive parts industries specify a maximum increase of 8 cents for each of two annual re-

views.¹¹ The national trucking agreement negotiated in 1967 set a maximum increase of 4 cents in each of two annual reviews. Contracts with General Electric Co. and Westinghouse Corp., which expire in 1969, specified annual limits of 1¾ percent in 1967 and 1968. Because of the accelerated increase in consumer prices in 1968, the limits on

Motors Corp., Ford Motor Co., and Chrysler Corp., to be effective October 27, 1969, was combined with a scheduled deferred wage increase of 3 percent in November, and not indicated separately.

escalator adjustments were a factor in the size of such increases in many contracts (table 6).

A very recent trend has been to accompany establishment of upper limits on escalators with minimum escalator guarantees. Most automobile, farm and construction equipment, aerospace, and automotive parts agreements specify a guaranteed minimum cost-of-living increase of 3 cents in each of the two annual adjustments. The General Electric and Westinghouse agreements of 1966 provided a minimum of one-half of 1 percent for each of two adjustments. These guaranteed minimums

were considered as deferred wage increases rather than escalator increases.

The trend of recent years toward longer intervals between cost-of-living escalator reviews also continued. The most notable development took place in 1967, when annual reviews were substituted for quarterly reviews in most agreements in the automobile and related industries. In 1969, at least 2 million (78 percent of the workers with escalation) will have annual reviews, about 425,000 will be under quarterly reviews, nearly 100,000 will have semiannual, and the balance will be under monthly or various other types of escalator clauses.

Nearly all escalator clauses specify the national BLS-CPI as the index on which possible cost-of-living adjustments will be based. Only 90,000 workers have clauses tied to individual city indexes.

Except for electrical products and airline mechanics, most contracts in which escalator clauses are concentrated are not scheduled for bargaining in 1969. These clauses are widespread in the automobile, automotive parts, farm and construction equipment, aerospace, trucking, and meatpacking industries, where nearly all major agreements provide for deferred wage increases during the year.

Although most workers under major agreements with escalator clauses will receive deferred rather than negotiated wage increases in 1969, only a relatively small percent (33) of workers receiving deferred increases will be eligible for cost-of-living adjustments (table 7). Escalator clauses are rare in food production (except meatpacking), construction, the manufacture of apparel, lumber and furniture, paper, rubber, leather, printing and publishing, warehousing, wholesale and retail trade, gas and electric utilities, services, finance, insurance, and real estate, and mining.

Significant provisions

Table 8 lists 102 selected major bargaining agreements, each covering 5,000 workers or more, applying in total to 3.3 million workers. Space limitations preclude the listing of all major contracts covering 5,000 workers or more under which some action in 1969 is scheduled.¹² The selection was designed to cover a broad range of industries and key bargaining situations; contracts in the construction industry are not listed. Many of the selected bargaining agreements expire or may be

Other agreements provide for wage reviews based upon changes in living costs or specify deferred wage increases payable during 1969.

The Labor Management Relations Act of 1947 requires that a party to an agreement desiring to terminate or modify it shall serve written notice upon the other party 60 days prior to the expiration date.

NOTE

The summary of deferred wage increases was prepared early in December and does not reflect settlements reached later in the month. By mid-December, the Bureau had recorded settlements that provided deferred wage increases in 1969 for approximately 135,000 additional workers. Of these, about 82,000 were in metalworking; 20,000 in public utilities; 12,000 in retail trade; 8,000 in stone, clay, and glass; 6,000 each in paper and transportation; and 1,000 in chemicals.
