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## Preface

This bulletin combines the Bureau's annual wage calendar article, which appeared in the January 1971 issue of the Monthly Labor Review, and the Bureau's listing of major agreements due to expire during the year. Each contract covers 1,000 workers or more. Virtually all of these contracts are on file in the Bureau's Division of Industrial Relations and are open to public inspection. Information for a few situations was taken from published sources.

Table 9 lists agreements scheduled to expire in 1971 by month of expiration; and table 10 arranges them by industry. Users should refer to appendix A for a list of common abbreviations and to appendix B for codes used in identifying the entries by industry, State, union, and scope of agreement.

Table 11 lists 1971 wage reopenings by month for selected collective bargaining agreements covering 5,000 workers or more. This list is duplicated in part in table 8 where wage reopenings are reported along with termination, cost of living, and deferred wage increases.

Expirations that were reported to the Bureau too late to be included in tables 9 and 10 are listed in table 12.

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# Wage Calendar, 1971

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING will continue to be heavy this year. At least 4.8 million workers are covered by major collective bargaining agreements that either expire this year or contain wage reopening provisions. Contracts covering workers in the steel, can, aluminum, construction, and utility industries will expire during the coming year. Bargaining in the railroad industry, which reached an impasse in late 1970, will pick up as the government-imposed strike ban expires at the end of February.

Agreements covering over 5.2 million workers extend through 1971, without any provision for wage reopening, but nearly all of them provide deferred wage increases agreed upon when the contracts were negotiated. Reflecting the growing size of settlements in recent years, especially in the construction industry, deferred increases effective in 1971 will average<sup>1</sup> 7.8 percent, compared with 5.6 percent in 1970. Including deferred benefit improvements, the average package increase in 1971 will be 8.3 percent.

In 1971, about 2.5 million workers will be affected by normal cost-of-living escalator review, compared with 1.4 million in 1970. The bulk of the increase is accounted for by some 900,000 auto, farm implement, and related workers, whose 1967-70 contracts did not provide for review in the year of expiration. (However, there was provision for "catchup" increases, resulting from the effect of ceilings on escalator increases.) In addition, about 500,000 workers in the trucking industry who did not receive escalator reviews in the final year of their 1967-70 contracts will be covered this year by the first review under their new contracts. Roughly 100,000 other workers are covered by new escalator clauses as a result of 1970 bargaining.

## Current versus deferred increases

The number of workers receiving wage boosts in 1971 as a result of bargaining in earlier years (including workers receiving deferred increases prior to contract expirations in 1971) will not be substantially different from a year ago. The following tabulation compares 1971 with earlier years:

In 1971, 4.7 million workers' contracts will expire; 127,000 workers will be affected by scheduled wage reopening provisions in agreements expiring after 1971. (See tables 1 and 2). Also, 360,000 workers, mostly in the ladies apparel industry, may have a wage reopening, depending on movements in the Consumer Price Index.

When this article was completed in mid-December 1970, BLS had information on 2,459 contracts covering 10.0 million of the 10.9 million workers under all major collective bargaining agreements (those covering 1,000 workers or more<sup>2</sup>). The excluded workers came under agreements that were either scheduled to expire later in the month, were being negotiated, or, if the agreements had already expired and had been renegotiated, their

terms were not available.<sup>3</sup> This article is largely limited to data for these 10.0 million workers.

Of the 10.0 million workers whose contracts have been studied, 171,000 are covered by agreements that extend through 1971 but do not provide for specific deferred increases or unconditional wage reopenings. However, some of these workers may in fact be affected by negotiated wage increases. For example, a total of 20,000 workers in the Southern textile industry come under contracts that although not necessarily containing specific wage reopening provisions, typically are reopened after the nonunion sector of the industry raises wages. Also, as noted above, in some industries, a rise in the CPI may trigger wage

negotiations. On the other hand, 5,500 workers whose contracts expire December 31, 1971, are not scheduled to receive any increases during the year.

## Negotiations for the new year

In 1971, major collective bargaining agreements are due to expire in the steel, railroad, and aluminum industries, as well as in the utility-construction, men's clothing, aerospace, bituminous coal, can, glass container, and auto parts industries. In the early part of the year contract-will expire at several auto parts and farm implement plants, with negotiations scheduled to

complete the latest (1970-71) round of automobile-farm implement bargaining.

Early bargaining will cover 30,000 employees of the major can companies, whose contracts expire in February; in late February or March, about 43,000 workers in the glass container industry will be similarly affected. A Government-imposed strike ban for nearly 400,000 railroad workers expires in late February. This year's bargaining should be heavy in the spring, as contracts expire for 700,000 gas and electric utility workers and Bell telephone system employees. During the period from March to July, contracts for some 480,000 construction workers are scheduled for renegotiation. Aluminum industry agreements expire in May, as well as the association

agreement covering 125,000 men's clothing workers.

On July 31, the agreement covering 400,000 steelworkers employed by the 11 major basic steel producers expires. Other groups scheduled for fall bargaining include bituminous coal miners and aerospace workers at various companies.

This year's bargaining will not be limited to contracts expiring in 1971. More than 100,000 shopcraft rail workers are covered by contracts subject to renegotiation as of December 31, 1970. Presumably, no settlement will be reached until 1971. Similarly, it seems highly unlikely at this time (mid-December 1970) that the 1970 round of auto and farm implement bargaining will be concluded before the end of the year.



## Deferred wage increases

Deferred wage increases in 1971 will average 38.1 cents an hour or 7.8 percent of straight-time earnings, as shown in table 3. The average was 23.6 cents, or 5.6 percent, in 1970.

In both years the averages reflect the relatively

large gains made in the construction industry. About 1.1 million workers in contract construction will average 84.9 cents in 1971 or 13.3 percent.<sup>4</sup> Exclusive of construction, the average deferred increase will be 25.7 cents or 6.4 percent. Also in 1971 about half a million workers in the trucking industry will receive deferred increases, with the

bulk of them getting 65 cents and about 560,000 workers at General Motors and Ford will receive a 3-percent deferred adjustment.

The trucking and construction increases brought the average for nonmanufacturing deferred hikes much higher than that of the manufacturing sector. Manufacturing averages will be 18.1 cents and 4.9 percent, while they will be 58.4 and 10.8 percent in nonmanufacturing. However, in manufacturing a substantially greater proportion of workers receiving deferred increases are also covered by escalator clauses which serve to boost the size of their effective wage increases. The deferred increases in manufacturing include 15-cent hikes at General Electric Co. and Westinghouse in March; 5 percent for employees of the New York Coat and Suit Manufacturers Association in June; 5 percent plus a 7-cent guaranteed cost-of-living increase for the California Processors, Inc. employees in July; and 12.5 cents for employees of shirt, pajama, and cotton garment manufacturers in August.

In nonmanufacturing, most construction increases will occur between March and June, while in trucking, local cartage employees will receive hikes in January and July, Chicago truckers in April and October, and over-the-road drivers in July.

Of the 5.3 million workers receiving deferred increases, 3.3 million, or 62 percent, will receive their increases within the first half of the year. (See table 4.) About 900,000 of these workers will

receive additional hikes in the second half of the year.

The growing popularity of fringe benefits, which now constitute 20–25 percent of total compensation, has led to a study of these benefits in addition to wage hikes. When the cost of deferred benefit improvements is added to the wage hike, the average package increase in 1971 will be 8.3 percent in agreements covering 5,000 workers or more. (See table 5.) This compares to 5.6 percent in 1970. About 40,000 workers in 4 bargaining units are under contracts neither permitting bargaining nor providing deferred adjustments in 1971.

### Cost-of-living escalators

The inflationary spiral, prevalent since the mid-1960's has focused public attention on workers' attempts to keep pace with the cost of living. At the beginning of 1971, 3.0 million workers were covered by cost-of-living escalation provisions,<sup>5</sup> continuing the increase of the past several years:

Not only has the number of workers covered by formal escalator clauses increased, but the number affected by normal reviews in 1971 will increase sharply over 1970, primarily because auto and farm implement workers as well as those in trucking will be eligible for review. In recent years, there has been a tendency to lengthen the interval between escalator reviews and to include minimum guarantees and maximum limits on adjustments. For example, in the 1967 bargaining at the auto, farm implement, and related companies, workers received annual reviews (as opposed to the prior quarterly reviews), and had annual minimums (3 cents) and ceilings (8 cents) established for the first time. In 1971, some 2.2 million of the 3.0 million covered by formal escalation will receive annual reviews, while 213,000 will be reviewed quarterly, 50,000 semiannually, and 1,500 monthly. (About 500,000 will not have a review in 1971.) Further, 210,000 will have minimum guarantees and maximum limits on their reviews, 1.0 million maximums only, and 11,000 minimums only. In this article, only guaranteed minimum escalator adjustments are treated as deferred increases—workers receiving a 10-cent deferred plus a 3-cent cost-of-living minimum are considered to have received a 13-cent deferred increase.

In the late 1970 settlement between the United Auto Workers and General Motors, earlier provisions were re-established. Adjustments were returned to a quarterly basis, effective in March 1972, with an annual adjustment continuing the first year, effective in December 1971. In addition General Motors workers will no longer have minimums or maximums. The effect of maximums in times of severe inflation is best illustrated in the auto pacts reached in 1967: a 16-cent ceiling over the 3-year term deprived workers of an additional 26 cents in adjustments by April 1970. The majority of trucking employees will have an 8-cent maximum, no minimum increase, on an annual basis in 1971, as will employees of General Electric and Westinghouse. Major groups of aerospace workers are still under contracts providing for minimum and maximum reviews.

Swift & Co., and other meatpacking firms, negotiated 1970 agreements that provide for a 1-cent adjustment in September 1971 for each 0.4-point rise in the CPI index above 142.0. (The index stood at 134.0 in April 1970, when Swift

settled.) In September 1972, and August 1973, the same formula would apply for any rise above 5.7 points in the prior 12 months. Twenty-five-cent deferred hikes set for September of 1971 and 1972 reportedly included an amount to offset the rise in the CPI below 5.7 points.

With the exception of 96,000 workers tied to BLS city indexes, all workers are under clauses tied to the national BLS-CPI. Of the 5.3 million workers receiving deferred increases in 1971, 2.0 million are covered by escalator clauses, as shown in table 6. Recent escalator increases in major industries have ranged from 5 to 9 cents (table 7).

### Provisions in selected contracts

Table 8 (pp. 38-44) lists 108 selected bargaining agreements, each affecting 5,000 workers or more, covering some 3.8 million workers in a broad range of industries, excluding construction. These agreements were chosen as representative of deferred increases, contract expirations, wage reopenings, or cost-of-living reviews in 1971. □

### NOTE

The summary of deferred wage increases was completed in mid-December and does not reflect settlements reached later in the month. By the end of December, the Bureau had recorded settlements that provided deferred wage increases in 1971 for approximately 90,000 additional workers. Of these, 45,000 were in transportation industries, 42,000 in metalworking, and 3,000 in food.

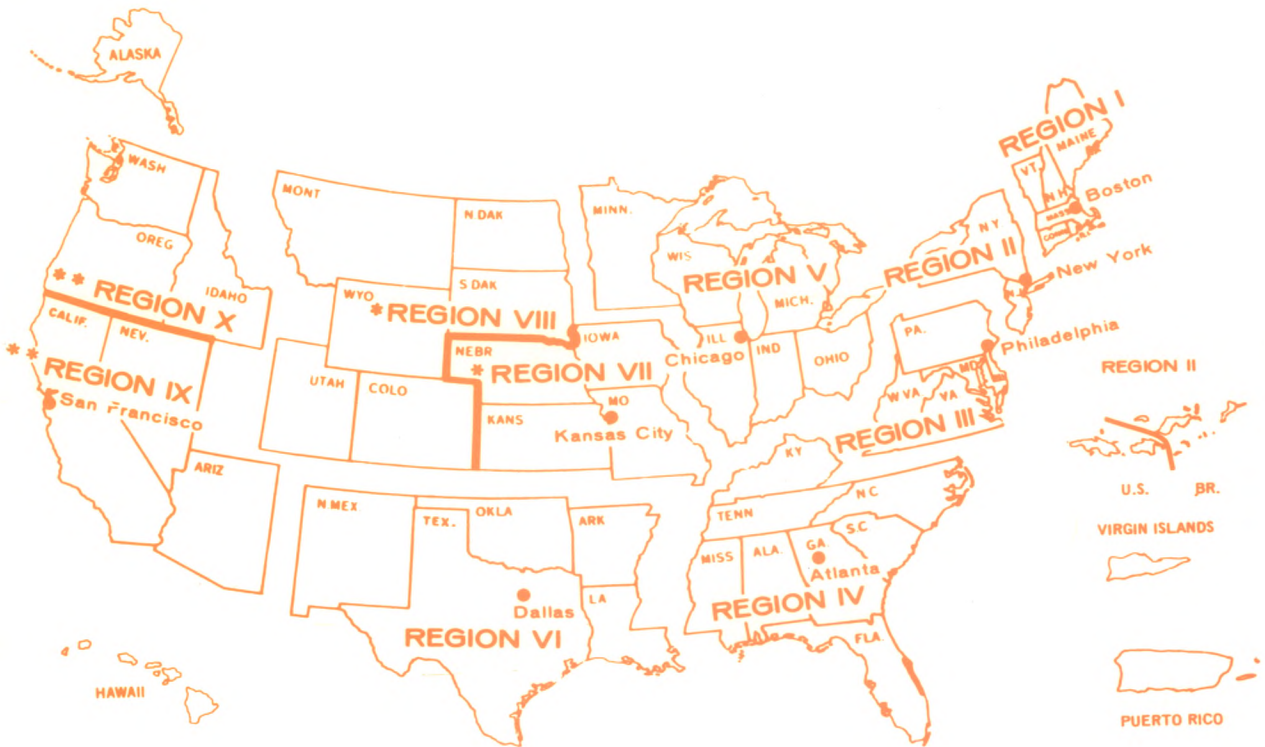
