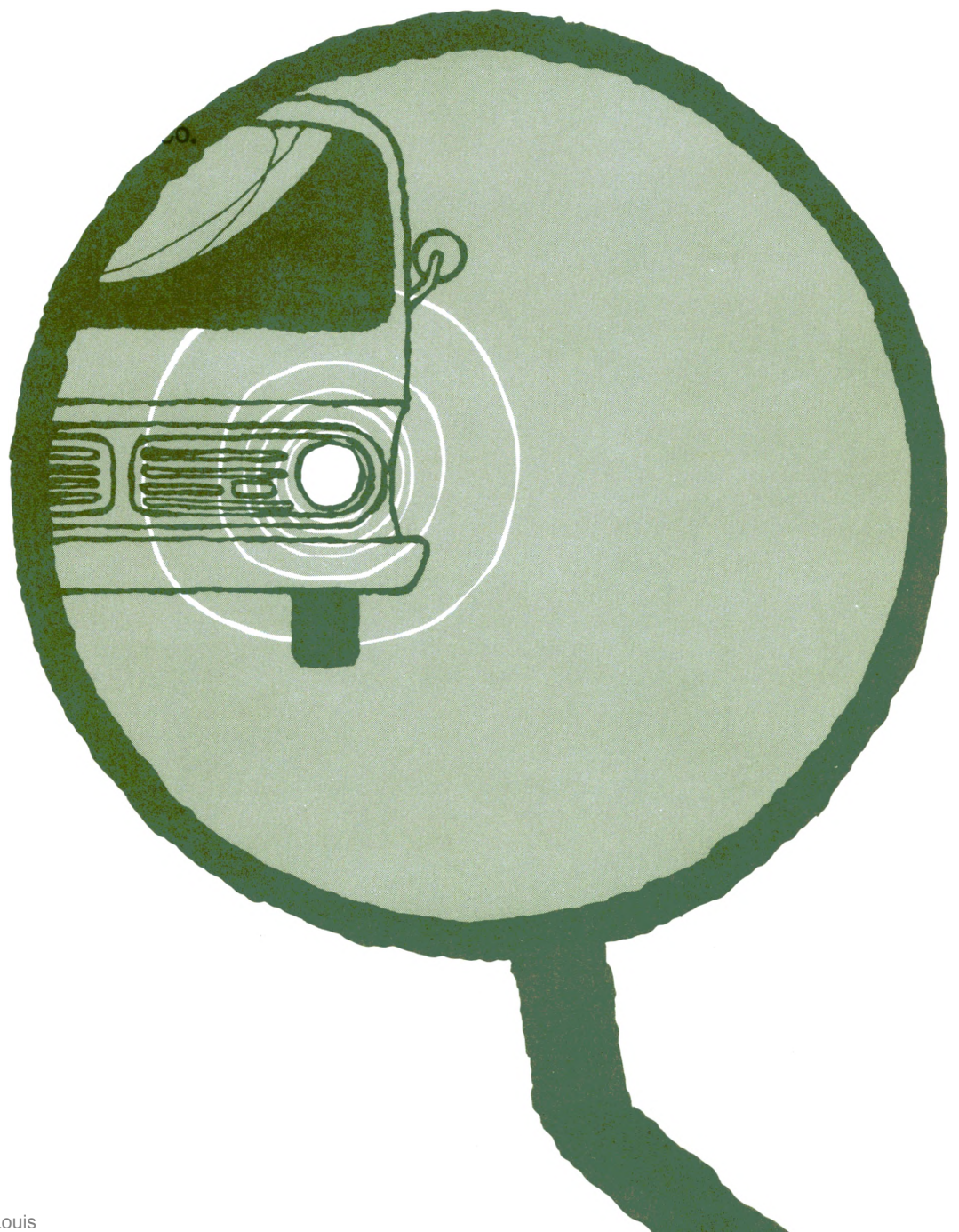

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Preface

The Bureau of Labor Statistics conducts annual surveys of wage rates and scheduled hours of work for specified crafts or jobs as provided in labor-management agreements in the construction, printing, local transit, and local trucking industries. A biennial survey of grocery stores also is included in this program. Wage rates and hours presented are those in effect July 1, as reported to the Bureau by the appropriate local labor organizations in each city included in the survey.

Preliminary listings of union wage rates and hours for local truckdrivers and helpers in each city were issued earlier. Copies of these are available from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Washington, D.C. 20212, or any of its regional offices listed on the inside back cover of this bulletin.

This study was conducted in the Bureau's Office of Wages and Industrial Relations. Philip M. Doyle of the Division of Occupational Wage Structures prepared this bulletin, which provides a comprehensive account of the current study. In addition, it includes trend indexes of wage rates and hours for 1936-73. Field work for the survey was directed by the Associate Assistant Regional Directors for Operations.

The U.S. Census Bureau has introduced new job titles in its Occupational Classification System to eliminate those that denote sex stereotypes. For purposes of this bulletin, however, such titles have been retained where they refer specifically to contractual definitions. Where titles are used in the generic sense, and not to describe a contract term, they have been changed to eliminate the sex stereotype.

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Local Truckdrivers and Helpers, July 1, 1973

Survey findings

Union wage rates for local truckdrivers and helpers in cities of 100,000 inhabitants or more averaged \$5.85 an hour on July 1, 1973—up 7.9 percent from a year earlier. The increase, which was below the 9.9-percent gain a year before was the smallest 1-year rise since 1968-69. It raised the Bureau's wage rate index for union local truckdrivers and helpers to 163.4 (1967=100). (See table 1.)

Truckdrivers, 90 percent of the workers studied, averaged \$5.90 an hour on July 1, 1973, an increase of 7.9 percent since the previous year. (See table 2.) Rates for drivers' helpers increased at a slightly faster pace, rising 8.4 percent, to an average \$5.30 an hour.

Wage rate increases affected almost 90 percent of the workers studied during the year ended July 1, 1973, compared with about 95 percent a year before. Also, the size of the increases reported during 1972-73 tended to be considerably smaller. For example, slightly less than 30 percent of the workers received gains of 10 percent or more between July 1972 and July 1973, whereas nearly 55 percent received similar increases a year earlier. Rates for about 1 percent of the drivers studied decreased over the year, largely as a result of rollbacks ordered by the Cost of Living Council's Wage Stabilization Committee.

Over the past 10 years, union wage rates for local truckdrivers and helpers have advanced at an average of 6.8 percent a year. The rate in recent years, however, has been much more rapid, as increases between 1968 and 1973 averaged 9.2 percent a year compared with an annual average of 4.4 percent for the 1963-68 period. (See text table 1 for comparisons.)

Truckdrivers' helpers, most commonly found engaged in moving and storage services and delivery of general freight, groceries, furniture, and beer, averaged \$5.30 an hour on July 1, 1973, compared with \$5.90 an hour for truckdrivers. Much of this 60-cent-per-hour differential, however, reflects the distribution of drivers and helpers among individual cities and trucking operations with widely varying wage scales, rather than disparities in contract rates paid for the two classifications within the same city and type of operation. example, when union rates for workers engaged in hauling general freight were examined on a city-by-city basis, the wage advantage of drivers over their helpers was 10 cents an hour or less in a majority of the cities where comparisons were possible. At the extremes, the largest differential reported for general freight haulers was 50 cents in Grand Rapids while in three cities, Kansas City, St. Paul, and Spokane, rates for general freight truckdrivers and those for helpers were identical. Similar pay relationships in other selected types of trucking operations are illustrated in text table 2.

Regionally, average wage rates for truckdrivers ranged from \$5.44 in the Mountain States to \$6.08 in New England and the Great Lakes. (See table 7.) The inter-regional spread for drivers' helpers rates, on the other hand, was substantially greater, ranging from \$3.19 in the Southeast to \$5.89 in New England.

In contrast to the pattern found in most of the Bureau's occupational wage surveys, average rates in cities of the largest size class studied were about equal to those in smaller cities. (See text table 3.) Comparisons of larger- and smaller-sized cities in the trucking industry also show some unusual patterns. Union wage rates in

New York, the largest city surveyed, averaged \$5.64 an hour—only 9 percent more than the \$5.16 recorded in Scranton, Pa., the smallest city studied. Furthermore, the average rate for drivers' helpers was 18 percent higher in Scranton than in New York. Such relationships are heavily influenced by differences in types of delivery covered by union contracts in a city. In New York, for example, truckdrivers' helpers were widely distributed among 27 different types of delivery, compared with only six types (beer, department stores, heavy, highway and railroad construction, furniture, general freight, and soft drinks) in Scranton. In the latter, as in a number of other small cities studied, a majority of helpers were engaged in relatively high wage hauling, particularly general freight delivery.

About 97 percent of the drivers and helpers studied were under union contracts providing premium rates after 40 hours of work a week. (See table 6.) Schedules of less than 40 hours, usually 37½ hours, most frequently applied to workers engaged in newspaper and beer delivery. Longer schedules, typically 45 or 48 hours a week, were reported most often for grocery and bakery delivery employees.

Contract provisions for health, welfare, and pension plans financed wholly or in part by the employer applied to nearly all of the workers covered by the study. When available, information on the amount of employer contributions to these plans is presented in table 10. About four-fifths of the workers surveyed, were also under plans providing vacation benefits.

Scope and method of study

Union wage rates and hours reported in this bulletin were agreed on through collective bargaining between trade unions and employers, and are defined as (1) the basic, or minimum wage rates (excluding holiday, vacation, and other benefit payments made regularly or credited to the worker each pay period) and (2) the maximum schedules of hours at straight-time rates. Wage rates in excess of the negotiated minimum, which may be paid for special qualifications or other reasons, are excluded.

The information presented is based on union wage rates in effect on July 1, 1973, for approximately 300,000 local truckdrivers and 33,000 helpers in 70 cities. The study excludes local city drivers paid on a mileage or commission basis as well as over-the-road drivers operating either between cities or between various parts of the United States. Data are obtained primarily from local union officials by mail questionnaire. In some instances, however, Bureau economists visit local union officials to obtain the desired information.

The current survey is designed to reflect the union wage rates of local truckdrivers and helpers in all cities of 100,000 inhabitants or more, excluding Honolulu, as determined by the 1970 Census of Population. Included are all cities of 500,000 inhabitants or more and most cities of 250,000 to 500,000 inhabitants. Data

for cities studied are weighted to compensate for cities not surveyed. In order to provide appropriate regional representation, each region was considered separately when city weights were assigned.

Average wage rates, designed to show current levels, were based on wage rates in effect in each city on July 1, 1973, weighted by the number of union members at each rate in the area. These averages are not designed for precise year-to-year comparisons because of fluctuations in membership and in the classifications studied. Average cents-per-hour and percent changes from July 1, 1972, to July 1, 1973, however, are based on comparable quotations for the various job classifications in both periods, weighted by the memberships reported for the current 1973 survey. The index series designed for trend purposes, is constructed similarly.

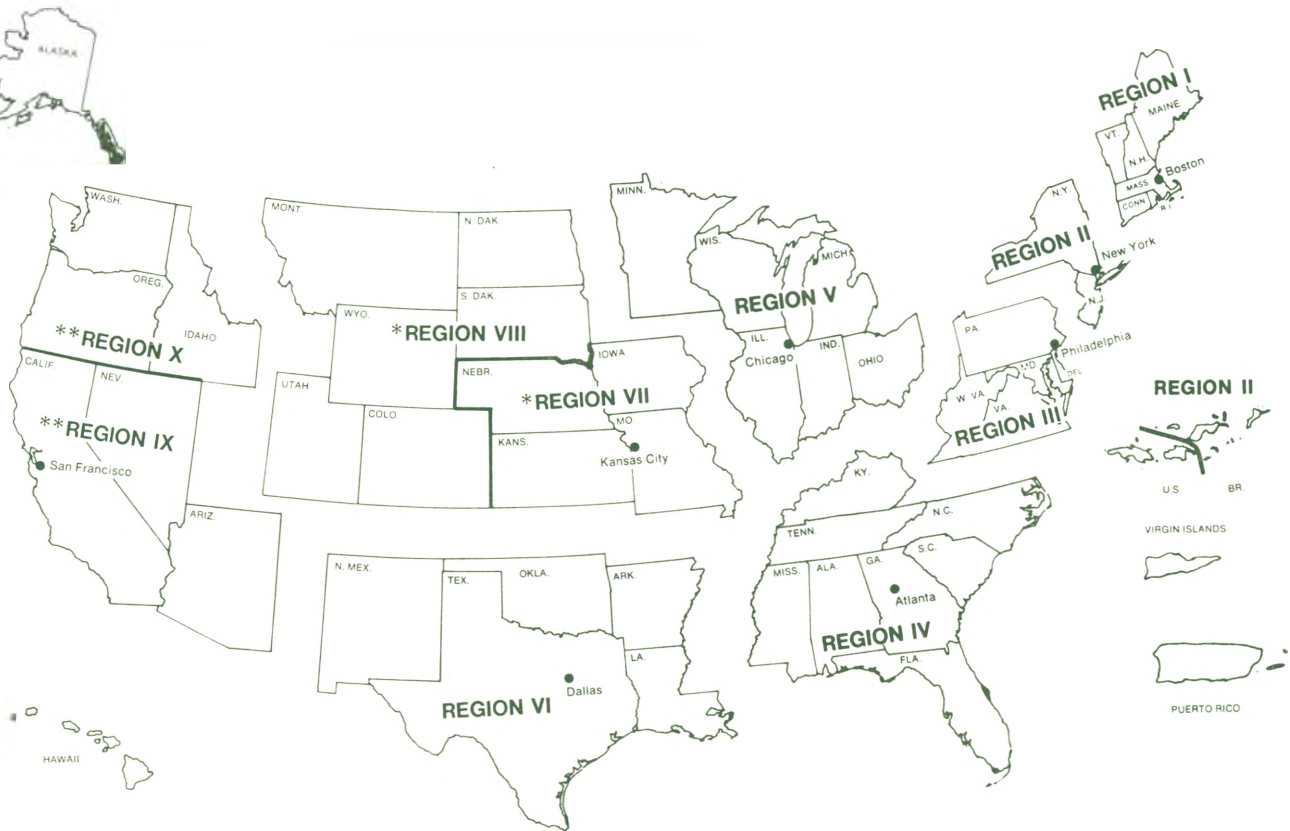
