

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Price Movements

A new Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) and a revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (revised CPI-W) were introduced with release of the January 1978 data on February 27. The new and the revised CPI's are the result of an 8-year effort to update and improve one of the Nation's most important economic statistics. This release presents March data and other information on the new and revised CPI's and on the unrevised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (unrevised CPI-W). March 1978

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers rose 0.7 percent before seasonal adjustment in March to 189.8 percent of its 1967 base. The revised Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers also increased 0.7 percent before seasonal adjustment in March to 189.7 percent of its 1967 base.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) rose 0.8 percent in March. The CPI-U rose 0.6 percent in February and 0.8 percent in January. Food and beverage prices rose sharply in March for the third

consecutive month, up 1.3 percent. The housing index rose 1.0 percent, somewhat more than in January or February. The index for apparel and upkeep also increased 1.0 percent in March, after declining by a similar amount in February. Among other major expenditure categories, increases in March of 0.6 percent for medical care and 0.2 percent for transportation were smaller than in January or February.

Prices of food purchased in grocery stores—the major portion of the food and beverage index—rose 1.5 percent in March, following increases of 1.3 percent in February and 1.4 percent in January. About two-thirds of the March increase stemmed from higher prices for meats, fresh fruits, and eggs. Continuing the rapid rise evident since late 1977, beef prices rose 2.6 percent and pork 2.9 percent in March. Fresh fruit prices rose 4.7 percent; except for a decline in February, these prices have also been advancing sharply since late 1977. Egg prices showed a large increase after seasonal adjustment in March, following a small decline in February. Prices also rose in March for many other food items including poultry, dairy products, cereal and bakery products, sugar and sweets, and fats and oil products. Fresh vegetable prices, however, declined, and the downtrend in coffee prices, which began in July 1977, continued. The index for food away from home rose 1.0 percent, and the index for alcoholic beverages rose 0.7 percent; each increase was about the same as in February and January.

The housing index rose 1.0 percent in March, compared with 0.6 percent in February and 0.8 percent in January.

Homeownership costs, charges for fuels and utilities, and prices for housefurnishings and housekeeping supplies increased more in March than in February or January. House prices rose 0.8 percent in March, over twice the February rise; other homeownership costs such as mortgage interest and home maintenance and repair charges continued to rise rapidly. Prices for fuel oil rose 1.0 percent after seasonal adjustment in March, following smaller increases earlier this year. The index for gas and electricity rose 1.4 percent in March, the second consecutive month of large increases. Prices for housefurnishings rose 0.9 percent and housekeeping supplies 1.4 percent in March, both considerably more than in February or January. The March increase of 0.6 percent in the residential rent index, however, was about the same as in recent months.

In the apparel and upkeep category, prices of apparel commodities rose 1.0 percent in March, after declining 1.2 percent in February. From mid-1977 through January of this year, these prices rose moderately—an average 0.2 percent each month. Prices turned up in March for men's and boys' and infants' and toddlers' clothing after declining in the 2 preceding months. Prices for women's and girls' apparel rose 1.7 percent in March, following a decline of 2.4 percent in February. Charges for apparel services rose 0.7 percent in March, somewhat less than increases earlier this year.

The entertainment index rose 0.8 percent in March, about the same as in February and somewhat more than in January and in late 1977. The March increase stemmed from higher prices for reading materials, sporting goods, and admission charges.

The rise in the medical care index of 0.6 percent in March was somewhat smaller than in each of the 2 preceding months, primarily because of smaller increases in charges

for medical care services. Fees charged for physicians', dentists', and other professional services rose 0.5 percent in March compared with 0.8 percent in February and 0.7 percent in January. Charges for hospital and other medical care services rose 0.6 percent in March, less than half the monthly increases earlier this year.

The transportation index increased 0.2 percent in March, a third as much as the increases in each of the preceding 2 months. The new car index rose a slight 0.1 percent in March, following large increases from late 1977 through February. The used car index was unchanged after seasonal adjustment in March, compared with increases of 2.0 percent and 2.5 percent in February and January, respectively. Gasoline prices moved up 0.3 percent in March, the first increase this year.

Revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (revised CPI-W)—seasonally adjusted changes

The revised CPI for Urban Wage and Clerical Workers rose 0.8 percent in March after seasonal adjustment. This was more than the 0.6 percent increase in February and the same as in January. The food and beverages index rose 1.3 percent, about the same as in February and in January. The increase of 1.0 percent in the housing index was somewhat larger than in each of the 2 preceding months. The index for apparel and upkeep rose 0.6 percent in March, following a decline in February. On the other hand, increases in March of 0.6 percent for medical care, 0.3 percent for entertainment, and 0.1 percent for transportation were smaller than increases earlier this year.

The index for food at home rose 1.5 percent in March, following increases of 1.3 percent in each of the 2 preceding months. Over two-fifths of the March rise resulted from higher prices for meats. Fresh fruit prices rose considerably

more in March than in February and January; and egg prices, which declined in February, showed a large increase in March after seasonal adjustment. Prices for cereal and bakery products and fats and oils also rose in March, but the increases were smaller than in February. Prices declined for fresh vegetables, processed fruits and vegetables, and coffee. The index for food away from home increased 0.9 percent in March, about the same as in recent months. The March increase of 1.0 percent in alcoholic beverage prices was somewhat larger than increases earlier this year.

In the housing category, homeownership costs rose 1.2 percent, more than in February and about the same as in January. The March increases for fuel oil, gas, and electricity were larger than in February or January. Among housefurnishings, prices for textile housefurnishings and appliances including radio and television rose in March after declining in February, and furniture prices showed relatively large increases for the second consecutive month. Prices for housekeeping supplies rose considerably more in March than in recent months. The rent index rose 0.6 percent, about the same as in recent months.

The index for apparel and upkeep increased 0.6 percent in March after a decline of 0.8 percent in February and a small 0.1 percent increase in January. The index for apparel commodities rose for the first time this year.

Among other major expenditure categories, the March rise in the medical care index was slower than earlier this year, primarily because of smaller increases in fees for professional services and in charges for hospital and other medical care services. In the transportation category, the new car index increased much less in March than in recent months; and the used car index, which rose sharply in January and February, showed no change after seasonal adjustment in March. In the entertainment category, prices for sporting goods declined in March.

Changes in the unrevised and revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers

Table C shows the March indexes and unadjusted percent changes from February for selected expenditure groups in the unrevised CPI-W and the revised CPI-W. Detail for the unrevised CPI-W using the new publication format is available on request. Further details for the unrevised CPI-W presented in the form previously published, are shown in tables 25 and 26.

Differences in price changes in the two indexes are due to many differences between them, including expenditure weights, samples of items and cities priced, and price collection methodology. For example, food prices for both the CPI-U and the revised CPI-W are collected throughout the entire month. For the unrevised CPI-W, food prices are collected in the first week of the month.

Price change—first quarter 1978

The CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) rose at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 9.3 percent in the 3 months ended in March 1978, almost twice as fast as in the second half of 1977. Prices in the three major components of the CPI-U—food, commodities other than food, and services—increased at a faster rate in the first quarter than in the last two quarters of 1977.

The sharpest acceleration was in food prices which rose at a 16.4 percent from December to March, because of broadbased increases. (table A). Retail food prices had risen at a 4.2 percent rate in the preceding quarter and only at a 1.9 percent rate in the third quarter of 1977. The sharp advance in retail prices can be traced to earlier increases at the producer level. After declining in the second and third quarters of last year, producer prices for foods and feeds at the crude and intermediate levels both rose at

about a 27 percent rate in the fourth quarter and at a 44 percent rate in the first quarter of this year. The rise in producer prices of finished foods accelerated also from a 7.4 percent rate in the final quarter of 1977 to a 21 percent rate in the first quarter of this year.

Higher prices for livestock and grains accounted for much of the rise in prices at the farm level in the fourth quarter; but in the first quarter, prices rose for most agricultural products. An exception was coffee prices which continued the downtrend begun in the spring of 1977. Extremely cold weather in some parts of the country and heavy rains in others were partly responsible for the higher food prices in the first quarter of this year as in the first quarter of last year. Among other factors which contributed to the rise in food prices this year were strong export demand, government price support programs, and the shrinkage in cattle supplies caused by the rapid rate of liquidation during the past three year.

In the first quarter of this year, the index for commodities other than food rose at a 6.1 percent rate, slightly faster than in each of the three preceding quarters. The acceleration was primarily due to an upturn in the index for used cars. This index had declined during most of 1977, when the used car sample consisted only of full-size cars for which demand was quite weak last year. In January 1978, the sample was expanded to include a number of smaller-size cars (intermediates, compacts, subcompacts, and imports). The much heavier demand for these smaller used cars resulted in the sharp upturn in the used car index. There were also large increases in the first quarter for fuel oil and home purchase prices.

Among other nonfood commodities, the rise in furniture and appliance prices showed a slight acceleration but the increases—at a 4.3 percent rate and 4.5 percent rate, respectively—were relatively moderate. In the first quarter,

the new car index rose at a 5.8 percent rate, about half as much as in the final quarter of 1977. Increases for these durable goods reflected higher prices at the manufacturers' level due in part to rising materials and labor costs. In addition, prices of imported goods have risen as the value of the dollar declined in international money markets. In the first quarter, footwear prices rose at a slower pace than in the preceding quarter and prices for gasoline and apparel turned down. The decline in gasoline prices reflected excess inventories and restricted winter driving. The extremely cold weather and prolonged coal strike in some areas slowed sales and moderated retail prices of many nonfood commodities.

The services index advanced at a 9.1 percent rate in the first quarter of this year, compared with 4.9 percent in the final quarter of 1977. The rise in charges for household services, medical care services, and public transportation accelerated during the first quarter. Among household services, the rise in charges for home financing, property taxes, and insurance accelerated in the first quarter as mortgage interest rates increased on conventional and VA-insured loans; gas and electricity rates rose in the first quarter after declining in the fourth quarter of 1977; and charges for housekeeping and home maintenance and repair services advanced sharply. In the transportation services category, airline, bus, train, and taxicab fares increased more in the first quarter than in the previous quarter; auto insurance rates, however, declined slightly for the second consecutive quarter. In the medical care services category, charges for professional services such as doctors' and dentists' fees increased more in the first quarter than in previous quarter, and charges for hospital services continued to rise at a rapid rate. Price increases for other types of services such as entertainment, apparel, personal, and educational also accelerated in the first quarter.

Technical Notes on the Consumer Price Index Revision

With release of the January CPI data, the Bureau of Labor Statistics introduced (1) a new CPI for all Urban Consumers and (2) a revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers. The unrevised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers will be published until the June 1978 index is released, after which it will be discontinued. The new CPI and the revised CPI will continue into the future.

The CPI for All Urban Consumers includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups which historically have been excluded from CPI coverage such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force. At the national level, this index covers approximately 80 percent of the total noninstitutional civilian population of the United States. The revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (revised CPI-W) represents about one-half of the population covered by the CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U). (Neither index includes persons in the military services or in institutions, or persons living outside urban areas such as farm families.)

BLS will publish the unrevised CPI for 6 months so that those who have difficulty making the transition quickly to the revised CPI or to the new CPI will have some extra time.

Both the new CPI-U and the revised CPI-W form a continuous series with the unrevised CPI-W. For the national index and for the five areas for which indexes are published monthly, this was accomplished through a process called pivoting in which the new and revised indexes were set equal to the unrevised CPI as of December 1977. Each index will move upward or downward from that level in accordance with subsequent changes in prices. Indexes for six areas were pivoted as of November 1977, and others will be pivoted in accordance with the schedule shown in table D.

The standard reference base period for the revised and the new CPI remains 1967=100, the same as for the unrevised index.

Local area indexes. The number of CPI's for local areas was expanded to 28 from 24 in the unrevised series. The four additional indexes cover Miami, Florida; Portland, Oregon; Scranton, Pennsylvania; and Denver, Colorado. With the exception of Miami (base period—Nov. 1977) and Anchorage (base period—Oct. 1967), the base period for the area indexes remains 1967=100.

The U.S. index and those for the five largest cities will continue to be published monthly. Indexes for all other areas will be published bimonthly instead of quarterly as in the unrevised index. (See table D.) The change from quarterly to bimonthly publication schedules for local area in-

dexes in the revised CPI may present problems for some users of the CPI. The Bureau is prepared to provide, upon request, estimates of revised local area indexes for those months covered under the previous quarterly publication schedule but not under the bimonthly schedule. Note that area indexes for the unrevised Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (unrevised CPI-W)—both for monthly and quarterly publication areas—will be terminated with publication of the June 1978 index.

Regional indexes. New regional CPI's cross-classified by population size were introduced with release of the February 1978 indexes. These indexes will enable users in local areas for which an index is not published to get a better approximation of the CPI for their area by using the appropriate population-size class measure for their region. These indexes are based on December 1977=100.

The ability to produce this information results from a major expansion in the number of areas in which price data are collected for the new and the revised CPI—to 85 from 56 urban areas in the unrevised index. The sample for the unrevised index was based on the 1960 Census of Population. The 85-area design is a probability sample of urban areas based on the 1970 Census of Population.

Indexes by regions only and population-size only will also be published bimonthly.

Source of data. Improvements were made in obtaining the updated 1972-73 consumption weights for the new and the revised CPI's through changes in sample design and collection methods. See table E for a comparison of the weighting structures for the new, the revised, and the unrevised indexes.

Substantial improvements were also made in the method of selecting retail stores in which price data are collected for the CPI. The selection of retail stores was based, for the most part, on the results of a household survey—referred to as the Point-of-Purchase Survey—in which families across the country were asked for information on the name, location, and amount spent in retail stores for many different categories of goods and services. Data provided from this household survey have been used to develop a consistent, objective, and scientifically-based sample of retail stores and service establishments for the CPI.

In addition, a major change in the process of item selection for pricing within stores was introduced. For the unrevised CPI, data collectors select items conforming to detailed specifications, which are basically the same for every store across the country. For the new and the revised CPI's, the selection of each detailed item is keyed to the sales experience of the store in which it is priced. Data collectors work from a list of fairly general categories in

selecting the item to be priced over time. The new procedure gives each variety, brand, size, etc., a chance of selection proportional to its importance in total sales for the general category in the particular store. Once selected, the same item is priced over time. As a result, a considerably larger range of goods and services will be priced, giving a much better representation of the varieties that exist in the market place.

Timeliness of data. Food items in the CPI—which were priced in the first week of each month in the unrevised series—will be priced during the entire month for the new and revised series. This change makes pricing for the food

component consistent with pricing for the other components of the CPI.

The collection of prices of other items is being spread more evenly over the month, and prices collected on a quarterly cycle for the unrevised series will be collected on a bimonthly cycle.

Consequently, the new and revised CPI will be more representative of the month as a whole, and price changes will be reflected more quickly.

Presentation of data. A number of changes have been made in titles and definitions. See table F for a list of these changes.



Chart 1. Revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers: All items and major components by expenditure class, 1967-78—Continued




Chart 1. Revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers: All items and major components by expenditure class, 1967-78—Continued




Chart 1. Revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers: All items and major components by expenditure class, 1967-78—Continued




