

CPI Detailed Report

For September 1978 Consumer Price Indexes: U.S. City Average and Selected Areas

CPI for All Urban Consumers CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers

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The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers rose 0.8 percent before seasonal adjustment in September to 199.3 percent of its 1967 base. The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers increased 0.7 percent before seasonal adjustment in September to 199.1 percent of its 1967 base.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)----seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) also rose 0.8 percent in September. This compares with increases of 0.6 percent in August, 0.5 percent in July, and an average monthly increase of 0.8 percent in the first half of this year. For the 3 months ended in September, the CPI-U rose at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 7.8 percent, compared with 11.4 percent in the quarter ended in June and 9.3 percent in the first quarter.

In September, the food and beverages index rose 0.5 percent. This index rose 0.2 percent in August and was unchanged in July, following substantial monthly increases during the first half of this year. The housing index rose 0.9 percent in September, compared with monthly increases of about 0.8 percent in the 2 preceding months. The index for other goods and services rose 1.4 percent in September, reflecting sharp advances in personal and educational expenses, particularly tuition and other school fees. The September increases were about the same as in August in the expenditure categories for transportation, apparel and upkeep, and entertainment and less than in August for medical care.

The index for food at home increased 0.4 percent in September after seasonal adjustment, following no change in August and a decline in July. In September, fresh fruit prices rose 5.4 percent after seasonal adjustment, considerably more than in recent months, and fresh vegetable prices rose 2.8 percent, the first increase in 4 months. Prices for dairy products rose more in September than in August. Beef prices increased 0.4 percent in September, following 2 months of declines. Pork and poultry prices continued to decline in September, but by much less than in August. Among other foods, egg prices fell in September, following a large increase in August. The indexes for cereal and bakery products, sugar and sweets, and processed fruits and vegetables all were unchanged in September after moving up steadily in the preceding 8 months. The index for fats and oils declined in September for the first time this year. The index for food away from home rose 0.7 percent in September, somewhat less than in recent months. The index for alcoholic beverages increased 0.7 percent in September, about twice as much as in each of the preceding 3 months.

In the housing category, the residential rent index rose 0.8 percent and the homeownership index 1.3 percent in September—the largest increase this year for both. In the latter component, the index for home purchase advanced 1.6 percent in September, and home mortgaging costs continued to rise rapidly reflecting increases in house prices

and interest rates. The September increase in the index for mortgage interest rates, however, was smaller than in July or August. Among utilities, fuel oil prices increased 0.9 percent in September, more than in recent months; the 0.8 percent increase for natural gas was smaller than in August; and electricity charges declined for the third month. In the household furnishings and operations component, prices for furniture and bedding rose 1.9 percent in September, considerably more than in recent months; but prices for appliances, including TV and sound equipment, declined. Charges for housekeeping services rose 0.6 percent in September, less than in recent months.

In the other goods and services category, the index for personal and educational expenses rose 2.6 percent in September because of increases in tuition and other school fees and higher prices for school books and supplies. The personal care index rose 1.0 percent in September, the sharpest rise this year as a result of higher prices for toilet goods and appliances and beauty and barber shop services.

About half the September rise of 0.6 percent in the transportation index resulted from higher prices for gasoline. The gasoline index rose 1.4 percent in September compared with increases of 1.0 percent in August and 0.8 percent in July. The September increases of 0.9 percent for auto repairs and maintenance and 0.8 percent for auto insurance were larger than in August. The new car index rose 0.6 percent in September. The used car index, however, was unchanged in September after moving up in the preceding 5 months. Tire prices declined for the first time this year. The public transportation index declined 0.5 percent in September and 0.1 percent in August.

The apparel and upkeep index increased 0.6 percent in September, about the same as in August. Clothing prices rose moderately in September----0.4 percent for men's and boys' and infants' and toddlers' clothing and 0.5 percent for women's and girls' clothing. The increase of 1.0 percent for footwear, however, was much larger than in August. The increase of 0.7 percent in charges for apparel services in September was the same as in August.

In the entertainment category, prices in the commodities component increased 0.2 percent and services 0.8 percent in September—both about the same as in August.

The slower rise in the medical care index in September than in August--0.6 percent compared with 0.9 percent--was primarily due to smaller increases in charges for hospital and other medical care services and dentists' services.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)--seasonally adjusted changes

The CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers rose 0.7 percent in September after seasonal adjustment. This was more than in July and August and less than the average monthly increase of 0.8 percent in the first 6 months of this year. In September, the food and beverages index increased 0.4 percent, after an increase of 0.3 percent in August and no change in July. The housing index rose 0.9 percent, compared with increases of about 0.8 percent in July and August. The index for other goods and services rose 1.0 percent in September, considerably more than in August but less than in July. The September increases of 0.6 percent for apparel and upkeep was slightly larger than in August. The transportation index increased 0.6 percent and the entertainment index 0.4 percent in September, about the same as in July and August. The increase of 0.7 percent for medical care in September was less than in August.

The index for food at home rose 0.3 percent in September, following no change in August and a decline in July. In September, prices for fresh fruits and vegetables rose sharply and prices for dairy products and fish and seafood continued to rise. These increases were partially offset by declines for eggs, poultry, beef, pork, cereal and bakery products, fats and oils, and coffee. The indexes

for food away from home rose 0.6 percent and for alcoholic beverages 0.9 percent in September.

Among major components in the housing category, the residential rent index increased 0.7 percent in September, somewhat more than in recent months. The homeownership index advanced 1.4 percent in September, the largest increase this year. The increases in September of 0.4 percent for household furnishings and operation and 0.2 percent for fuels and other utilities were about the same as in August.

In the other goods and services category, the index for personal and educational expenses rose 2.6 percent because of sharp advances in tuition and other school fees and school books and supplies. The personal care index rose 0.6 percent as charges for personal care services rose 0.8 percent while commodities such as toilet goods and personal care appliances increased 0.3 percent. The index for tobacco products increased 0.4 percent compared with 0.1 percent in August and 3.1 percent in July.

In the apparel and upkeep category, prices of apparel commodities increased 0.5 percent in September, about the same as in August; but the increase of 0.7 percent in


charges for apparel services was larger than in July or August.

Over half the rise in the transportation index in September resulted from higher prices for gasoline. The gasoline index rose 1.5 percent in September, compared with 1.1 percent in August and 0.7 percent in July. Charges for auto repairs and maintenance and auto insurance continued to rise. The new car index rose 0.5 percent in September, about the same as in August. The used car index, however, showed no change in September, and the index for public transportation declined.

The September rise of 0.7 percent in the medical care index was some what smaller than the increase in charges for hospital and other medical care services—-0.5 percent in September, compared with about 1.4 percent in August and in July. In addition, the 0.3 percent increase in medical care commodities in September was smaller than in recent months.


The entertainment index increased 0.4 percent in September as a result of a 0.2 percent rise in the commodities component and a 0.6 percent increase in the services component.

Chart 1. CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers: All items and major components by expenditure class, 1968-78





Chart 1. CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers: All items and major components by expenditure class, 1968-78—Continued




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Chart 1. CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers: All items and major components by expenditure class, 1968-78—Continued

Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. Effective with the January 1978 index, the Bureau of Labor Statistics began publishing CPI's for two population groups: (1) a new CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total noninstitutional civilian population; and (2) a revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which represents about half the population covered by the CPI-U. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups which historically have been excluded from CPI coverage, such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, shortterm workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from over 18,000 tenants, 18,000 housing units for property taxes, and about 24,000 establishments—grocery and department stores, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuels, and a few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by personal visits of the Bureau's trained representatives. Mail questionnaires are used to obtain public utility rates, some fuel prices, and certain other items.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published for 28 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date—1967—which equals 100.0. An increase of 22 percent, for example, is shown as 122.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: The price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1967 to \$12.20.

A Note About Calculating Index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-month and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

A Note on Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month.


For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year—such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data are also used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

Seasonal factors used in computing the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11 Variant of the Census Method II Seasonal Adjustment Program. The updated seasonal data at the end of 1977 replaced data from 1967 through 1977. Subsequent annual updates will replace 5 years of seasonal data, e.g., data from 1974 through 1978 will be replaced at the end of 1978. The seasonal movement of all items and 35 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 45 selected components.

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
