

Price Movements

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) increased 0.2 percent before seasonal adjustment in January to a level of 293.1 (1967=100). For the 12-month period ended in January, the CPI-U has increased 3.8 percent.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) was virtually unchanged in January, prior to seasonal adjustment. The January 1983 CPI-W level of 292.1 was 3.5 percent higher than the index in January 1982. The CPI-W is used for indexing Social Security and some other Federal payments. It is also commonly used as an escalator in collective bargaining agreements.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for All Urban Consumers rose 0.2 percent in January, following a decrease of 0.3 percent in December. The housing component, which declined in December, advanced in January. (See page 7 for a description of the improved treatment of homeowners' cost in the housing index.) The overall CPI excluding the shelter component of housing was unchanged in January after increasing 0.3 percent in December. A decline in the transportation index—because of a sharp drop in gasoline prices—was offset by increases in the remaining major categories of consumer spending. Large increases in cigarette prices pushed up the index for other goods and services; medical care prices also rose substantially. Although grocery store food prices remained unchanged in January, the food and beverage index rose 0.1 percent. The entertainment and apparel and upkeep components both advanced moderately in January.

The housing component rose 0.5 percent in January, following a decrease of 0.8 percent in December. Shelter costs rose 0.7 percent and were responsible for the upturn. Within the shelter component, renters' costs increased 0.6 percent and homeowners' costs rose 0.7 percent. The index for maintenance and repairs, which pertains to both renters and homeowners, advanced 1.5 percent. The index for fuels and utilities, which had increased at a 12.6 percent seasonally adjusted annual rate during the preceding 8 months, declined 0.2 percent. Sharp drops in both the price of fuel oil and electricity charges more than offset the substantial increase in the index for natural gas. Prices for telephone services and water and sewerage maintenance also registered large increases.

The transportation component declined 0.6 percent in January, following a decrease of 0.1 percent in December. A 3.3 percent drop in gasoline prices was primarily responsible for the further decline. As of January, gasoline prices were 10.6 percent below their peak level of March 1981. Automobile finance charges—down 2.4 percent—declined for the sixth consecutive month. Partially offsetting these declines were increases in new and used car prices—up 0.1 and 0.9 percent, respectively. An increase in airline fares, following declines in November and December, was largely responsible for the 0.6 percent advance in the index for public transportation.

The index for food and beverages advanced 0.1 percent in January. Prices for grocery store foods were unchanged on average, following declines in each of the preceding 2 months. A sharp decline in fresh fruit and vegetable prices offset a moderate acceleration in the prices of other major grocery store food groups. The index for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs, which declined sharply in December, rose 0.3 percent in January. Pork and poultry prices rose moderately, following 2 months of declines. Beef prices continued to decline but by less than in December. The indexes for dairy products and other food at home both advanced 0.7 percent in January, the largest increase in almost 2 years. Prices for cereal and bakery products also rose more than in recent months. The two remaining components of the food and beverage index-restaurant meals and alcoholic beverages-rose 0.3 and 0.1 percent, respectively.

The 0.8 percent increase in the medical care index in January was the same as in December and compares with the average monthly increase of 0.9 percent during 1982. The index for medical care commodities, which includes prescription and nonprescription drugs and medical supplies, increased 0.7 percent. Charges for physicians' services and hospital rooms rose 1.4 and 0.3 percent, respectively.

The index for apparel and upkeep rose 0.3 percent in January, following declines in each of the preceding 2 months. Smaller than usual seasonal declines were recorded for many clothing items and were responsible for the increase. The index for other goods and services registered its fifth consecutive large monthly increase—rising 1.1 percent in January—as increases in cigarette prices again accounted for most of the advance. The index for entertainment rose 0.5 percent in January.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers was unchanged in January, following a decline of 0.2 percent in December. A 0.6 percent decline in the transportation component offset increases in most other major categories of consumer spending. Substantial increases were recorded in both the other goods and services (1.3 percent) and the medical care (0.9 percent) components. The entertainment index advanced 0.4 percent, while the food and beverage component rose 0.1 percent. The indexes for both apparel and upkeep and housing were unchanged in January.

The CPI-W was unchanged in January; the CPI-U rose 0.2 percent. The primary reason for the difference between the 2 measures was the change in the homeownership component. The new rental equivalence CPI-U measure of homeowner shelter costs rose 0.7 percent. Homeownership in the CPI-W, which uses house prices, mortgage interest rates, property taxes, property insurance, and maintenance and repair costs, declined 0.2 percent in January, primarily due to a decline in mortgage interest rates.

In accordance with plans announced in October 1981, this issue introduces a new treatment of homeownership costs into the CPI for all Urban Consumers (CPI-U). The CPI-U based on the old method for homeownership (CPI-U Old Series) will be available through June 1983 (see tables on pp. 87-110). The CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) will not be affected by this change until 1985. Additional information on the CPI homeownership change is given in the article beginning on page 7.

Consumer Price Changes in 1982

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) rose 3.9 percent in 1982, a sharp deceleration from the increase of 8.9 percent in 1981. It was the smallest yearly increase in a decade and compares with a 9.2-percent average annual rate of inflation from 1972 to 1981. The experimental measure CPI-U, X-1, which used an approximate form of the rental equivalence approach that was incorporated into the official CPI-U in January 1983, also showed a lower rate of price increase—up 5.0 percent in 1982 compared to 8.5 percent in 1981.

Six of the seven major categories in the CPI-U showed at least some reduction in the rate of increase in 1982 compared with 1981 (Table C). Only the "other goods and services" category, which accounted for only 4.4 percent of the index at the end of 1982, exhibited an acceleration. The major sources of the deceleration were the sharp declines in mortgage interest rates and motor fuel prices, two of the more dominant factors leading to the double-digit inflation rates experienced in 1979 and 1980. Together, the decline in mortgage interest costs and motor fuels accounted for over 70 percent of the slowdown of the CPI-U between 1981 and 1982. Mortgage interest rates, which rose nearly 60 percent from 1978 to 1981, declined 12.5 percent in 1982. Fuel oil and gasoline prices benefited from the worldwide oil glut, as crude oil imports reached their lowest level since 1974. In addition, for the second consecutive year, favorable food supplies helped moderate food price increases.

While mortgage interest and fuel costs dominated the marked deceleration of prices in 1982, the overall slowdown in prices was widespread. The all items index excluding energy, homeownership costs, and food, referred to as the underlying rate of inflation, increased 6.0 percent in 1982 compared with 9.4 percent in 1981.

Food and beverages

The food and beverages component rose 3.2 percent in 1982, following increases of 4.3 percent in 1981 and 10.1 percent in 1980. Consumer prices for food at home (grocery store foods) advanced only 2.2 percent during the year compared with 3.0 percent in 1981 and an annual rate of nearly 10 percent from 1972 to 1980. The 1982 increase in grocery store food prices was the smallest since the 0.9-percent decline in 1976. The index for cereals and bakery products continued to decelerate, increasing 3.1 percent in 1982. Prices for cereals and cereal products, in response to the second consecutive year of declining wheat prices, climbed only 1.3 percent. The index for flour and prepared flour mixes rose only 1.2 percent while cereal prices were up 4.9 percent. Rice, pasta, and cornmeal prices declined 4.2 percent, due to large worldwide supplies of rice and wheat during the year.

Meat, poultry, fish, and egg prices, after falling in 1981, rose 3.1 percent in 1982. Beef and veal prices decreased slightly, but the decline was more than offset by a sharp increase in pork prices—up 15.3 percent—

due to decreased supplies. As a result of plentiful supplies, the index for poultry declined for the second consecutive year. Prices for fish and seafood products rose 2.8 percent, slightly less than in 1981. Egg prices fell 12.9 percent following a more modest decline in 1981.

Prices for dairy products were relatively stable for the second consecutive year, as supply continued to outstrip demand. The oversupply of raw and fluid milk at the wholesale level prompted legislation of a tax of 50 cents per hundredweight to be assessed on producers to help finance the milk support price.

The index for fruits and vegetables increased very slightly during the year, following substantial increases in each of the preceding 5 years. The market for fresh fruits and vegetables, sensitive to weather conditions, exhibited wide swings in prices throughout the year. Prices for fresh fruits and vegetables rose at a 20.0-percent annual rate during the first half of the year, compared with an 18.2-percent annual rate of decline during the second half. The poor 1982 crop in Florida and low production levels in the Southwest resulted in price increases in oranges and other fresh fruits which more than offset decreases in apple and banana prices.

Prices for fresh vegetables fell 3.2 percent following a moderate increase in 1981 and a much sharper rise in 1980. The first half of 1982 showed a 14.4-percent annual rate of increase while the second half registered an 18.1-percent decline, due to increased production levels during the latter half of the year.

Retail prices for sugar and sweeteners rose 7.1 percent after declining more than 30 percent in 1981. The reversal was largely attributable to imposition of new government import quotas in the spring which caused raw cane sugar prices at the producer level to climb 29.4 percent. By the end of the year, domestic raw sugar prices were more than triple the world level. Candy and chewing gum prices fell slightly, reflecting the earlier decline of sugar prices in 1981.

The index for nonalcoholic beverages advanced 2.9 percent, somewhat more than in 1981. Prices for roasted coffee decelerated throughout the last three quarters of the year, but failed to offset January and February increases brought about by market speculators. Soft drink prices climbed moderately throughout the year.

The index for food away from home advanced 5.0 percent, the smallest rise since 1972. The decline in per capita disposable income during 1982 lowered demand while at the same time most ingredient prices were rising less rapidly.

Prices for alcoholic beverages rose a modest 4.0 percent, the smallest increase since 1977.

Housing

The housing component of the CPI rose 3.6 percent in 1982, the smallest increase in 10 years. The deceleration

was especially apparent in homeownership costs, which rose 1.4 percent in 1982 following an increase of 10.1 percent in 1981 and even larger increases in each of the preceding 3 years. Mortgage interest costs, which account for about 42 percent of homeownership costs, declined 6.0 percent in 1982, compared to an increase of 20.0 percent in 1981. This index reflects the combined effect of changes in house prices and mortgage interest rates; in 1982, house prices rose 7.5 percent, while mortgage interest rates declined 12.5 percent. The ceiling on FHA/VA insured mortgages dropped from 15.5 to 12.0 percent between August 15 and November 15. Conventional rates followed the same general pattern. Market conditions and economic policies both contributed to the decline as diminishing inflationary expectations led to an easing in monetary policy and a subsequent downward slide of interest rates in the last 4 months of 1982. Prices for home maintenance and repairs, which rose at an average annual rate of about 10.0 percent from 1978 to 1981, rose 4.2 percent in 1982.

Household fuel prices increased 10.5 percent in 1982, down from a 15.2-percent increase the year before. Escalation in natural gas prices—up 25.4 percent—was mainly responsible for the 1982 increase. A common provision of contracts between producers and distributors—which were drawn up in the late 1970's when supplies were well below demand—required distributors to take the higher priced natural gas or pay for it anyway. This led to rising prices even though supplies were up and demand was down. On the other hand, fuel oil prices declined 0.7 percent in 1982, a dramatic change from the 17.0-percent increase in 1981.

Electricity charges rose 6.4 percent, compared to 14.5 percent in 1981. Lower fuel costs for generating electricity and smaller rate increases permitted by State and Federal regulators resulted in the slowdown.

Prices of housefurnishings rose 3.2 percent in 1982 compared to 6.1 percent in 1981, reflecting in part the slack demand that accompanies a depressed housing market. The index for textile housefurnishings posted its smallest increase since 1977. In an attempt to keep mills operating despite lower demand for raw fiber, manufacturers chose to cut prices extensively.

Apparel and upkeep

The index for apparel and upkeep increased 1.6 percent in 1982 compared to a 3.6-percent rise in 1981. This was the smallest increase since 1965. The major causes of the slowdown were the slackening demand associated with the recession and a general stabilization of wages throughout the apparel industry. Most unions agreed to postpone negotiated wage increases in 1982. Although labor costs held steady, profit margins were still squeezed due to significant increases in the nonlabor costs of production. Most of the deceleration occurred within apparel commodities, which rose only 0.9 percent in 1982. In particular, women's and girls' clothing prices were unchanged on average, a situation last experienced in 1964.

Prices for infants' and toddlers' apparel accelerated in 1982, possibly fueled by the surge in sales accompanying an apparent baby boom. The cost of sewing materials and notions increased very moderately as domestic producers continued to struggle to remain competitive with inexpensive imports. The index of jewelry and luggage, which has been dominated by the prices of precious metal jewelry, decreased for the second consecutive year after the rapid rise in gold and silver prices in 1980. Footwear prices—up 0.1 percent in 1982—exhibited their smallest rise in 30 years, largely because of stable leather and hide prices.

Although apparel services increased 6.2 percent in 1982, this still represented a slowdown from the 9.4-percent increase posted in 1981. The service sector is usually slower to react to slackened demand. The impact of the recession has, however, forced drycleaners and laundries to limit their price increases to changes in their costs.

Transportation

The index for transportation rose 1.7 percent in 1982, a major reversal from the 10.7-percent average annual rate for the previous 8 years. The dominant factor in the dramatic deceleration was the index for gasoline, which registered its largest decline-6.6 percent-since it was first published in 1935. The worldwide crude oil glut which began in early 1980, together with a continued slackening in demand, caused prices at the pump to drop in 18 of the 21 months from April 1981 through December 1982. Crude oil supplies began to tighten in the second quarter of 1982 as OPEC struggled to maintain existing price levels by lowering production. This led to significant price increases for gasoline from May through July. However, production of many OPEC countries exceeded the levels set by the cartel, the spot market price was again pushed down, and further gasoline price declines resulted.

The new-car market suffered through its third consecutive year of generally declining sales as domestic new-car sales hit the lowest level since 1961. Even a large drop in auto finance charges failed to generate an increase in sales. Prices for new vehicles rose 1.5 percent in 1982 compared to 6.8 and 7.5 percent in 1981 and 1980 respectively.

Used-car prices rose 10.9 percent in 1982. Although large relative to other items, the increase in used-car prices is a substantial slowdown compared to the 19.3-percent annual rate over the previous 2 years.

Public transportation costs went up 6.5 percent in 1982, a significant improvement over the 23.4-percent

average annual rate for the 3 preceding years. Lower fuel costs, smaller negotiated wage increases, decreased demand, and increased competition all contributed to the deceleration.

Medical care

The index for medical care registered a slightly lower rate of increase in 1982, but still increased more than all other major consumer categories except other goods and services. For the 12 months ended in December 1982, the medical care index rose 11.0 percent, compared with a 12.5-percent rise in 1981. The increase in 1982 reflects a modest slowdown in prices of both medical care services and medical care commodities. In particular, smaller increases in the index for professional services were responsible for most of the moderation in the services rose somewhat more in 1982 (up 15.3 percent) than in 1981 (14.4 percent). The cost of hospital rooms, which continued to increase substantially, rose somewhat less than in the preceding year.

Entertainment

Prices for entertainment increased 5.6 percent in 1982, a moderate slowdown from the 7.2-percent increase in 1981. Nearly 50 percent of the deceleration came from sporting goods and equipment, which rose only 1.2 percent in 1982. Price increases accelerated for several other items, however. Increases for reading materials reached double-digit levels as newspapers and magazines continued to pass through their rising publishing costs. In addition, higher costs for film and print paper led to larger price increases for photographic supplies and services.

Other goods and services

The only major category in the CPI that experienced a greater rate of price change in 1982 than in 1981 was other goods and services. The acceleration can be attributed to one item-cigarettes. Legislation passed in the summer of 1982 doubled the Federal excise tax on cigarettes from 8 to 16 cents per pack effective January 1, 1983. Manufacturers began phasing in the effect of the tax increase gradually, apparently to minimize the adverse impact of a large one-time increase. From September through December, cigarette prices rose almost 15 percent. The index for tobacco products (90 percent cigarettes) rose 20.1 percent in 1982-more than double any previous year's increase. In addition to the Federal tax increase, two other tax factors have pushed up cigarette prices: First, many States apply their excise tax on cigarettes to the retail price, thus compounding any other price increases; and second, ten States raised their tax on cigarettes in 1982.

Digitized for FRASER http://fraser.stlouisfed.org/ Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis The price change for other goods and services excluding tobacco products decelerated from 1981 to 1982, consistent with the overall CPI-U. Most of this slowdown occurred within the personal care category for both commodities and services. Although prices for all of the items within the personal and educational expense categories rose at double-digit levels, the increases were still less than those experienced in 1981. Prices for school books reflected the same publishing cost increases shown in reading materials. Tuition fees rose sharply for the third consecutive year. Personal expense prices, dominated by bank service charges, increased 14.3 percent.

Changing the Homeownership Component of the Consumer Price Index to Rental Equivalence

The Bureau of Labor Statistics introduced an important improvement in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) with release of January 1983 data on February 25, 1983. The Bureau changed the homeownership component of the CPI to a "flow-ofservices" approach. The change, first announced by Commissioner of Labor Statistics Janet L. Norwood in October of 1981,¹ was implemented by means of the rental equivalency technique.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) will continue to use the old homeownership method until January 1985, when it also will be changed to incorporate a rental equivalence measure of homeownership costs. In both cases, BLS will publish indexes using the old method for a 6-month overlap period following the switch to the new method.

In essence, the change converted the homeownership component from a method that included investment as well as consumption elements, to a flow-of-services approach that measures only the cost of shelter services consumed by homeowners. The flow-of-services approach was implemented using the rental equivalence technique, which estimates the change in the cost of renting housing services equivalent to those provided by owner-occupied homes.

This article presents some background on the nature and purpose of the change and the steps involved in the conversion to the rental equivalence measure. The specific changes, discussed in detail below, are summarized in tabular form in table D.

Background

The change in the index followed many years of recommendations and research by BLS staff and by other government, academic, business, and labor economists and statisticians.

The Bureau conducted extensive research on measuring shelter cost for homeowners as part of the program that led to the comprehensive revision of the CPI in 1978. From these efforts came a BLS staff proposal to change the treatment of shelter costs in the CPI to a flow-of-services approach. This proposal was widely reviewed and discussed. However, difficulties in developing a workable flow-of-services measure and the diversity of views held by various advisory groups led to the decision not to change the component's concept at that time.

After the completion of the revision program, BLS continued its research on the measurement of homeownership costs. In 1980, the Bureau introduced five experimental measures (known as the CPI-U-X1 through the CPI-U-X5) to demonstrate the effect different homeownership concepts and techniques could have on the All Items CPI. The measure known as CPI-U-X1, which used a rent substitution technique, is the direct (although approximate) antecedent of the method the Bureau now has adopted. The development of the CPI-U-X1 increased confidence in the workability and credibility of a rental equivalence measure. The extraordinary changes that have occurred in real estate and mortgage markets in recent years, changes which called greater attention to the limitations of the old method, also influenced the timing of the Bureau's decision to change the homeownership component.

The asset approach to homeownership formerly used in the CPI-U was based in part on house prices and mortgage interest rates. In recent years, the Bureau has had serious difficulties in obtaining reliable data for both.

Important changes had occurred in financial markets which were not reflected in the CPI. Funds available for long-term mortgage commitments had declined sharply. New types of mortgage instruments, involving variable rates, shorter financing terms, and other special arrangements, had developed, making the standard, longterm, fixed-rate mortgage used in the CPI increasingly unrepresentative of the mortgage market. In fact, some of the new instruments had characteristics, such as variable rates and principal amounts, which made them impossible to use in computing the CPI, because the CPI assumed long-term mortgages at fixed interest rates. Furthermore, because of high interest rates and difficulties faced by home buyers in securing bank mort-

gages, many owners were offering to sell their home by providing financing at below bank rates. These financing arrangements were not reflected in the CPI.

The house prices used in the CPI-U were obtained from the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) and pertained only to purchases financed with FHA-insured mortgages. This data base represented a very small, specialized, and declining segment of the housing market; the data were becoming less representative of the market and were causing serious estimation problems.

In addition to problems of data adequacy, the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 (Public Law 97-34), which requires use of the CPI-U for escalation of income tax brackets and the personal exemption amount, made it even more important to improve the index. The law requires announcement of the new tax brackets in December 1984, based on CPI-U data for the prior 2 years. This major new use of the index will have a broad effect on total Federal Government revenues. This new use was among the factors which underscored the importance of action to ensure that the CPI reflects the consumption cost experience of consumers in the most accurate way possible.

Conceptual framework for homeownership

The appropriateness of a given homeownership method for use in the CPI is best judged in terms of its underlying conceptual framework. The old method of measuring homeownership costs—the so-called asset approach—is based on procedures that are largely definitional. The flow-of-services approach and the rental equivalence methods were developed directly from the economic theory of consumer price indexes.

In the overall conceptual framework for the Consumer Price Index,² it is assumed that the consumer's welfare is determined by the flow of consumption services received, where the services can be (1) directly provided, (2) obtained coincidentally with the consumption of a nondurable good (in which case, the distinction between a good and a service is unnecessary), or (3) obtained from the use of a durable good owned by the consumer. In each case, satisfaction is derived from the act of consumption. Ownership of a source of consumption service—a durable good—is an "investment," designed to provide consumption services over a future timespan.

Within this framework, the CPI should measure the change over time in the cost of the market basket of ser-

vices consumed in the base period. For the services provided by directly purchased services and nondurable goods, this implies observing market prices and transaction levels in the base period, as well as the subsequent time path of market prices. However, for the services provided by durable goods owned by consumers, the implicit price of the services must be estimated, because market transactions do not take place each time the service is consumed. Consequently, the problem is basically one of estimation. This problem is not serious for many durable goods because aggregate service flows and aggregate purchase flows are closely related, and asset price movements are closely related to service price movements. For example, an automobile normally will depreciate fully over a period of years. New automobile purchases during a period can be viewed as replacing the depreciated stock, thus equaling the value of automobile services for all consumers. In these cases, standard techniques can be used. For housing, however, this pattern does not typically hold, and more complex procedures are required to capture its consumption cost.

The rental equivalence approach as incorporated into the CPI attempts to answer the following question: How much rental income do the owners of housing units forego when they choose to occupy the units themselves instead of renting them out? In what follows, this is called the "implicit rent." It is useful to stress that, although homeowners' rent is implicit, it is not hypothetical. It is a cost all homeowners actually incur. This cost includes both indirect and direct homeowner expense items. Indirect items include the cost of keeping wealth tied up as equity in one's home and the house's physical depreciation. Price appreciation can be an implicit negative cost, that is, a cost offset, when rising real estate prices give homeowners a gain in the value of their homes. Property taxes and insurance are examples of direct homeowners' expenditures which affect the level of homeowners' implicit rent.

Implementation of rental equivalence

Even before the October 1981 decision to adopt the rental equivalence method, work was underway to improve the experimental rental equivalence measure, CPI-U-X1, and to conduct further research on rental equivalence techniques. Funds were obtained to augment the CPI rent survey, adding more renters in heavily owner-occupied areas, and to begin observing a sample of owner-occupied housing units. With the decision to convert homeownership costs in the CPI-U to a rental equivalence measure, these activities were organized into three separate phases of work.

Phase 1 addressed the limitations of the experimental measure CPI-U-X1 and was completed with the publication of the January 1983 CPI. Phase 2 augmented the rent sample so as to improve both the homeowners' rent-

al equivalence and the regular rent components of the CPI. Although not originally announced for completion at this time, phase 2 also was completed with the publication of the January 1983 CPI. Phase 3, which is currently in progress, consists of research activities to identify improved rental equivalence estimating techniques.

Limitations of CPI-U-X1

Because the CPI-U-X1 was computed outside the CPI production system by restructuring indexes at the U.S. major group level, it lacked the precision and detail and, more importantly, the proper local area weighting of the official CPI. Further, the five homeownership items of the old method-home purchase, contracted mortgage interest cost, property taxes, property insurance, and maintenance and repairs-were simply replaced in the CPI-U-X1 by a single, new homeownership item. The weight for this new item was computed using a rather imprecise, shortcut technique from homeowners' estimates of what their homes would rent for, as reported in the 1972-73 Consumer Expenditure Survey. Finally, the price movement used for this new item was the price movement of the U.S. residential rent index.

Phase 1

In phase 1, these limitations of the CPI-U-X1 were addressed. First, the new index was computed from local-area item-strata cost weights. This process provides the precision, complete item and geographic detail, and proper geographic weighting associated with the official CPI. Second, new expenditure weights were calculated by means of the complex statistical estimating procedures used throughout the CPI. As described in detail below, weights were calculated for a new primary homeownership item, titled homeowners' equivalent rent, and recalculated for household insurance, maintenance and repairs, and household appliances. Finally, a new set of statistical weights for the sample of rental units was calculated so that its price movements could represent owner-occupied housing units as well as renter-occupied units.

Expenditure weight calculation

The expenditure weights currently used in the CPI refer to the 1972-73 period and are based upon a survey of consumer spending conducted at that time. Calculation of the base-period expenditure weights for the primary rental equivalence item, and for portions of the maintenance and repairs and the appliance strata, was straightforward since these weights were standard tabulations from expenditures reported in the 1972-73 survey. However, the calculation of secondary strata weights—those for insurance and repairs and appli-

ances—under the rental equivalence approach proved more complex. The relative importance of each index component resulting from this activity is shown in table E.

Owners' equivalent rent. The weights for the primary new stratum, owners' equivalent rent, are based on the owner's estimate of what the house would rent for. In the 1972-73 Consumer Expenditure Survey, each homeowner was asked: "If you were to rent out your home today, how much do you think it would rent for monthly, unfurnished and without utilities?" Studies of the responses to this question showed estimates to be reasonable. The responses, tabulated by geographic area, structure type, age, and other variables, were compared, cell by cell, with the rents on similarly classified renter-occupied residences. The estimated rents for owner units were, consistently, slightly higher than the actual rents for the renter units. This indicates that it is likely that owner-occupied homes are, as is generally thought, somewhat better than those occupied by renters even in the same geographic areas and the same age and structure type categories. Therefore, they command a higher rent.

Maintenance and repairs. The rental-equivalence items for maintenance and repairs contain both renters' and owners' expenditures. The renters' expenditure portion of each item weight was computed by aggregation of actual renter expenditures as reported in the 1972-73 survey. For the owners' portions of the maintenance and repair strata, weights were estimated by imputing expenditures from survey renters to survey homeowners. In each region, renters were sorted into cells by variables such as size of house, type of structure, and age of structure. The average expenditure by renters with the cell characteristics for each of the five maintenance and repair strata was assigned to each homeowner with the cell's characteristics. The resulting weights were consistent and reasonable for all but 1 of the 5 maintenance and repair strata. For one stratum, which included miscellaneous hardware items, the directly estimated owner weights were used because they are not particularly tenure sensitive and many of the items in the stratum are not likely to be provided by a landlord. Capital improvements made by homeowners are out of scope under the flow-of-services concept.

Household insurance. The rental-equivalence expenditure weights for insurance were obtained by reducing owners' total expenditures for property insurance to remove the share of insurance included in owners' equivalent rent. This was accomplished by adjusting the old method weights. Factors to do this were developed from insurance industry data for each of the four regions of the United States. It was assumed that the owners' estimated rents included property insurance on

their dwellings' structure, but did not include "tenant" coverages for contents or liability. The factors that removed the structure coverage were the ratios of premiums for tenant insurance policies to comparable homeowner policies. For example, a homeowner policy was priced for a \$50,000 masonry, single-family home with \$25,000 contents and liability coverages in selected rating areas for selected insurance companies. Then, a tenant's policy, which covered everything except damage to the house itself, was priced for the same coverages, areas, and companies. The ratios of the tenant policy prices to the owner policy prices were computed for a number of specifications. The ratios within each region were averaged to obtain the factors; they were 0.64, for the Northeast, 0.59 for the North Central, 0.60 for the South, and 0.68 for the West. These ratios were applied to the current weights for homeowners' insurance to produce the rental equivalence household insurance weight.

Appliances. For the four appliance strata, a similar, but more complex, reduction-factor scheme was devised using data for rental units in the 1972-73 survey. It was assumed that owners' expenditures for these appliances during the survey year were a reasonable estimate of the value of the flow of services provided by the entire stock of these appliances during the survey year. However, since some housing units were rented with certain appliances-that is, the services of the appliances are included in the rent-owner expenditures for these appliances needed to be scaled down by the proportion assumed to be in the implicit rent. For the four major appliance items (refrigerators/freezers, washers/dryers, dishwashers, and stoves), it was assumed that the proportion of homeowners who included the services of each appliance in their estimate of implicit rent was equal to the proportion of comparably specified rental units in the same geographic area in which the appliance was supplied. For the other appliance items (floorcleaning equipment, sewing machines, office machines, window air-conditioners, and small electric kitchen appliances), the reduction factor was assumed to be 1.0; that is, it was assumed that no expense for these items was covered in homeowners' estimates of what their dwellings would rent for. Factors were computed for the 40 CPI publication areas and, within each area, for three types of dwellings (single-family, multifamily, and mobile homes). These appliance factors-the proportion of rental units in which the appliance was not provided for in the rent-were applied to the owners' appliance expenditure to obtain an estimate of the value of appliance services not included in the implicit rent and, consequently, the value which, when added to renters' appliance expenditures, produced the new appliance expenditure weight.3

Statistical reweighting of the rent sample

Rental units in the existing rent sample were selected with a multistage technique, using 1970 census data. First, using a stratified technique, a set of Censusdefined areas called enumeration districts was chosen within each CPI pricing area. The selection was proportional to the number of renters. Enumeration districts are generally the smallest areas for which stratification variables are available. Among the stratification variables used for selection was the extent of owner occupancy; that is, whether the enumeration districts were mostly (more than 65 percent) owner-occupied residences, mixed (between 20 and 65 percent owner occupied), or mostly renter (under 20 percent owner occupied). BLS subdivided the selected enumeration districts into smaller areas called segments, usually containing between 40 and 125 housing units. One or more segments were selected, on a probability basis, for each enumeration district. All the housing units in the selected segments were screened to determine their tenure status (whether owner or renter) and a simple random sample of the renters in each segment was taken. This rent sample was designed to measure rent change for renters. Each sample unit was weighted according to the number of rent units it represented. Those units in mostly owner-occupied segments represented renters in those areas, and the units in mixed and mostly renter areas represented renters in those areas. Because the enumeration districts, segments, and sample units were selected with probability proportional to the number of renters, each unit in the sample for each CPI publication area had a weight of approximately the same magnitude; that is, the sample was efficiently designed to estimate rent change for renters.

In phase 1 of rental equivalence a new statistical weight for each unit in the rent sample was calculated so that the rent units would represent the owners. The new owner weights were computed by applying to each unit's original renter weight the ratio of owners to renters in its enumeration district. For example, the phase 1 owner weights for all the units located in an enumeration district that was 90-percent owner and 10-percent renter would be the old renter weights increased by a factor of 9 (90 \div 10). In an enumeration district which was 80-percent renter and 20-percent owner, the weight was multiplied by a factor of 0.25 (20 \div 80). Thus, with the recalculated statistical weights, the units in the existing rent sample are assumed to represent the owners in their enumeration districts. Ultimately, they also represent the owners in their CPI areas and the urban United

States. With the original and the recalculated weights, two different measures of rent change can be calculated, rent change for renters using the original weights and rent change for owners using the recalculated weights. However, since the enumeration districts were chosen to represent renters, not owners, and since the recalculated weights are so varied, the rent change estimator for owners derived from the reweighted sample is not as efficient for owners as the rent change estimator is for renters, which uses the original weights.

Phase 2 – rent sample augmentation

As already noted, the original rental unit weights are all roughly the same size in each publication area, which makes the existing rent survey a reasonably efficient estimator for renters. However, the phase 1 owner weights varied greatly from one another, so that the phase 1 measure was not as efficient. The recalculated weights of some units were reduced to zero (those in 100-percent renter areas), while others' weights were increased by as much as 35 times. Consequently, while the phase 1 reweighting did represent owners, it was relatively inefficient; the variance of the estimates was higher than could be obtained for the sample size if the survey were focused on representing owners. The phase 2 augmentation was designed to mitigate this shortcoming, at least in part. The augmentation was concentrated in the heavily owner-occupied enumeration districts. New segments and sample units were selected from them and added to the sample. All statistical weights were then recalculated for a second time. First, the original weights (those representing renters) were recomputed, yielding lower values in the heavily owner-occupied areas where the additional units were concentrated as the fixed weight of each enumeration district was spread

among more units. Second, the weights representing owners were recalculated from the new weights for renters in the same manner as phase 1. Because the weights representing renters became smaller in the areas with high ratios of owners to renters, the new statistical weights representing owners generally became lower, too. So the phase 2 augmentation lowered many of the very high owner weights, reducing the range of their magnitudes and thereby improving the estimate of rent change for owners. More importantly, the augmentation increased the sample size, thereby reducing the expected error of the estimators.

Phase 3

Although it may lead to more immediate technical improvements in measuring homeowners' implicit rent, phase 3 is primarily research into advanced rental equivalence methods to be implemented in the next CPI revision. For phase 3, BLS is developing a sample of homeowners to be resurveyed annually. Various techniques will be tested for estimating implicit rent for the owners.

Future improvements

The 1983 change in the CPI-U breaks new ground in applied economic measurement. Further improvements can undoubtedly be made. In addition to those which may result from the phase 3 research effort, more extensive changes for housing are planned in the next comprehensive index revision. Revision plans include a larger housing survey, based on the 1980 census and designed, from the outset, to support price change estimators for both homeowners and renters. Expenditure weights for housing will be based on a more current period, will use more precise calculation procedures, and will have more consistency among housing items.





Chart 1. CPI-U: All items, food and beverages, 1972-83





Therefore, the Bureau of Labor Statistics strongly urges users to consider adopting the national average CPI for use in escalator clauses.

Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. Effective with the January 1978 index, the Bureau of Labor Statistics began publishing CPI's for two population groups: (1) a new CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total noninstitutional civilian population; and (2) a revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers '(CPI-W) which represents about half the population covered by the CPI-U. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups which historically have been excluded from CPI coverage, such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from about 18,000 tenants, 18,000 housing units for property taxes, and about 24,000 establishments-grocery and department stores, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuels, and a few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by personal visits of the Bureau's trained representatives. Mail questionnaires are used to obtain public utility rates, some fuel prices, and certain other items.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published by size of city, by region of the country, for cross-classifications of regions and population-size classes, and for 28 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period. The index measures price changes from a designated reference date—1967—which equals 100.0. An increase of 122 percent, for example, is shown as 222.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: The price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1967 to \$22.20.

A Note About Calculating Index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-month and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month.

For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year—such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data are also used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

Seasonal factors used to compute the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11 Variant of the Census Method II Seasonal Adjustment Program. Annual updates replace 5 years of seasonal data, e.g., data from 1977 through 1981 were replaced at the end of 1981. The seasonal movement of all items and 35 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 45 selected components. Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluted based upon certain statistical criteria. If any of the 45 selected components changes its seasonal status, seasonal data from 1967 forward for the all-items and for any of the 35 other aggregations that have that series as a component, are replaced.

Explanation of Homeownership Measures

Official CPI-U includes five components. The weights for property taxes, property insurance, and home maintenance and repairs represent expenditures of all homeowners in the base period. The weights for house prices and contracted mortgage interest cost represent only those homeowners who actually purchased a home in the base period. Included are the total price paid for the home and the total amount of interest expected to be paid over half the stated life of the mortgage. Current monthly prices are used for each of these components.

Experimental Measure X-1: The weight for this rental equivalence measure is the estimate of the rental value of all owner-occupied homes in the base period compiled from a specific question asked on the 1972-73 Consumer Expenditure Survey. This covers the entire stock of owned homes. Prices used are the current rents

collected for the residential rent component of the CPI. The CPI rent component is designed to represent changes in residential rents for all types of housing units, not just changes in rents for units that are typically owner occupied. The CPI rent component is, therefore, not appropriate for this measure.

Experimental Measure X-2: The weight for this user cost method includes expenditures for mortgage interest, property taxes, property insurance, maintenance and repairs, the estimated base-period cost of homeowners' equity in their houses, and the offset to shelter costs resulting from the estimated appreciation of house values in the base period. This measure covers the entire stock of owned houses. To derive the weights for mortgage interest costs and equity costs, the total value of the housing stock in the base period was apportioned into its debt and equity components. The debt component equals the amount owed and the equity component is the amount owned, i.e., payments on principal plus appreciation from the time of purchase to the base period. Each component was subsequently multiplied by the average mortgage interest rate in the base period to determine its cost. Prices used are current ones except for the appreciation term which uses a 5-year moving average of the changes in appreciation rates.


Experimental Measure X-3: The weights are the same as in Experimental Measure X-2, except that mortgage interest costs are calculated as the total interest amount *paid out* by homeowners in the base period. As in X-1 and in X-2, this measure covers the entire homeowner population. The prices for all components except mortgage interest costs and appreciation are current monthly prices. As in X-2, appreciation is represented by a 5-year moving average of the changes in house prices. However, X-3 uses past and current mortgage interest costs in a 15-year weighted moving average which reflects the base-period age distribution of mortgage loans.

Experimental Measure X-4: The weights for this outlays approach include expenditures actually made in the base period for property taxes, property insurance, and maintenance and repairs. The weight for the mort-gage interest term is calculated in the same manner as in X-2. However, no appreciation or equity terms are included. Not all homeowners are represented in this measure because those who made no mortgage debt payment in the base period are excluded. The prices used for each of these items are current ones.

Experimental Measure X-5: The weights for this outlays approach include, as in X-4, expenditures actually made in the base period for property taxes, property insurance, and maintenance and repairs. The weight for the mortgage interest cost term is the same as for the X-3. No appreciation or equity elements are used. As in X-4, not all homeowners are represented in this measure because those who made no mortgage debt payment in the base period are excluded. Current prices are used in X-5 except for mortgage interest which uses the 15-year weighted moving average also used in the X-3.

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
