

Price Movements January 1985

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) increased 0.2 percent before seasonal adjustment in January to a level of 316.1 (1967 = 100). For the 12-month period ended in January, the CPI-U has increased 3.6 percent.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) rose 0.1 percent in January, prior to seasonal adjustment. The January 1985 CPI-W level of 312.6 was 3.3 percent higher than the index in January 1984. The CPI-W is used for indexing Social Security and some other Federal payments. It is also commonly used as an escalator in collective bargaining agreements.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for All Urban Consumers rose 0.2 percent in January. This advance was the same as the average monthly increase during the fourth quarter of 1984 and compares with the 0.3 percent average monthly rate for the period since September 1981, when prices began rising more slowly. With the exception of the other goods and services component, all major groups were unchanged or registered moderate increases in January. A sharp jump in tobacco prices was largely responsible for the advance in the index for other goods and services.

The food and beverage index advanced 0.2 percent in January, following a 0.4 percent increase in December. The smaller increase was largely attributable to the behavior of the food away from home and alcoholic

beverages components, both of which were unchanged in January, after increasing 0.6 and 0.4 percent, respectively, in December. Grocery store food prices rose 0.3 percent in January, slightly less than in December. A turnaround in the index for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs more than offset the sharp increase in prices for fresh fruits and vegetables. Egg prices resumed their decline, dropping 13.6 percent in January, and are 39.5 percent below their peak level a year ago. Beef and veal prices, which had increased substantially in the fourth quarter of 1984, declined in January. Prices for pork, poultry, and fish, however, increased for the second consecutive month. Fresh vegetable prices, which had declined sharply in December, turned around in January. Fresh fruit prices increased substantially more—up 3.2 percent in January—than in the preceding month. Among the other grocery store food groups, prices for cereal and bakery products and dairy products rose 0.5 percent and 0.2 percent, respectively, somewhat less than in December.

The housing component rose 0.1 percent in January, following a 0.2-percent increase in December. The index for fuel and other utilities declined for the second consecutive month, largely due to a 2.9-percent drop in fuel oil prices. Prices for fuel oil are now 15.4 percent below their peak level of April 1981. On the other hand, charges for electricity and natural gas, which had declined in the fourth quarter, rose 0.5 and 0.2 percent, respectively, in January. The index for other utilities and public services advanced 0.5 percent in January after declining in December. A small increase in charges

for telephone services, which had declined in December, and substantial increases in charges for water and sewerage maintenance, refuse collection, and cable television were responsible for the turnaround. The other two major housing groups—shelter and household furnishings and operations—recorded very moderate increases in January. Shelter costs rose 0.2 percent, with renters' costs advancing 0.4 percent; homeowners' costs, 0.2 percent; and maintenance and repair costs 0.4 percent. The index for household furnishings and operations rose 0.1 percent.

The transportation index increased 0.3 percent in January, following a 0.2-percent rise in December. Gasoline prices continued to decline—down 1.4 percent in January—and are now 15.2 percent below their peak level of March 1981. New and used car prices, however, rose 0.3 and 1.8 percent, respectively. Among other automobile expenses, the index for automobile insurance—up 1.5 percent in January—rose substantially for the fourth consecutive month. Automobile finance charges declined 0.8 percent, the same as in December. The index for public transportation rose 0.4 percent in January, as airline fares rose 0.6 percent.

The medical care component rose 0.3 percent in January. After registering substantial increases during the fourth quarter, the index for medical care commodities—prescription drugs, non-prescription drugs, and medical care supplies—moderated, increasing 0.5 percent in January. The cost of medical care services continued its recent pattern, advancing 0.4 percent in January, the same as the average monthly increase in the second half of 1984. The indexes for physicians' services and hospital rooms rose 0.2 and 0.6 percent, respectively.

The index for apparel and upkeep, which declined slightly in the preceding 2 months, was unchanged in January. Slightly larger than usual seasonal price declines for clothing items were offset by a 0.4 percent increase in charges for apparel services.

The index for entertainment rose 0.3 percent in January. A sharp increase in charges for admissions to

movies, theaters, concerts, and sporting events was partially offset by a decline in prices for toys, hobbies, and other entertainment commodities.

The other goods and services component advanced 0.9 percent in January. Nearly two-thirds of the increase was attributable to a 2.2-percent increase in cigarette prices. Prices for school books and supplies also rose substantially.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers rose 0.2 percent in January, the same as in the CPI-U. (Beginning with data for January, the rental equivalence approach to homeownership was introduced into the CPI-W. The methodology and samples of areas, items, outlets, and prices are identical in both the CPI-W and the CPI-U, and the differences in monthly changes result only from different expenditure patterns.)

Changes in Frequency of Publication for Local Area CPI'S to Begin in 1987

The Bureau of Labor Statistics will improve the sample of urban areas in which it gathers prices for monthly preparation of the Consumer Price Index beginning in 1987. At the same time, the Bureau will publish a number of local area CPI's less frequently.

The changes in publication frequency arise from the requirement to allocate the sample to reflect population shifts in the 1980 Census so as to provide the most accurate national CPI possible with the funds available. As a result, some local areas will no longer have samples sufficient to permit more frequent publication.

In addition to the national index for all cities, the Bureau now publishes indexes for 28 urban areas. In 1987, it will continue to publish indexes for all but one of these areas—Northeast Pennsylvania (Scranton-Wilkes-Barre).

Of the remaining 27 published urban areas, 13 will have a reduction in frequency beginning in 1987. The index for Detroit, currently published monthly, will be published only in the even-numbered months. Twelve areas now published bimonthly will be compiled on a semiannual average basis. These areas are: Buffalo-Niagara Falls, NY; Cincinnati-Hamilton, OH-KY-IN; Kansas City, MO-Kansas City, KS; Milwaukee, WI; Minneapolis-St. Paul, MN-WI; Atlanta, GA; Anchorage, AK; Denver-Boulder, CO; Honolulu, HI; Portland-Vancouver, OR-WA; San Diego, CA; and Seattle-Tacoma, WA. These semiannual average indexes, which refer to the arithmetic averages of the 6 month periods from January through June and July through December, will be published with release of the CPI for July and January, respectively, i.e., in the months of August and February. These series will be compiled and published on their present reference bases, 1967 = 100 for all areas other than Anchorage, which is on an October 1967 reference base. Also, the Cleveland-Akron-Lorain, OH, indexes will be published in oddnumbered rather then even-numbered months. Further details are available from BLS.

Homeownership changes



The Bureau of Labor Statistics has introduced a technical modification in the method of calculating price changes from the data for the CPI Housing Survey. The modification relates to the treatment of housing units reported as vacant. The original imputation technique continues to be used for other types of nonresponse. 

Chart 1. CPI-U: All items, food and beverages, 1974-85




* Percent changes over 12—month spans are calculated from unadjusted data. Percent changes over 1—month spans are annual rates calculated from seasonally adjusted data.

Chart 2. CPI-U: Housing, apparel and upkeep, 1974-85





Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. Effective with the January 1978 index, the Bureau of Labor Statistics began publishing CPI's for two population groups: (1) a new CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total noninstitutional civilian population; and (2) a revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which represents about half the population covered by the CPI-U. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups which historically have been excluded from CPI coverage, such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from about 18,000 tenants, 18,000 housing units for property taxes, and about 24,000 establishments—grocery and department stores, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuels, and a few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by personal visits of the Bureau's trained representatives. Mail questionnaires are used to obtain public utility rates, some fuel prices, and certain other items.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published by size of city, by region of the country, for cross-classifications of regions and population-size classes, and for 28 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities, they only measure the

average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date—1967—which equals 100.0. An increase of 122 percent, for example, is shown as 222.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: The price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1967 to \$22.20.

Calculating Index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points, because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-month and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month.

For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year-such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data also are used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

Seasonal factors used in computing the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11-ARIMA Seasonal Adjustment Method. The updated seasonal data at the end of 1977 replaced data from 1967 through 1977. Subsequent annual updates have replaced 5 years of seasonal data, e.g., data from 1980 through 1984 were replaced at the end of 1984. The seasonal movement of all items and 44 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 51 selected components. Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluated based upon certain statistical criteria. If any of the 51 components change their seasonal adjustment status from seasonally adjusted to not-seasonally adjusted, not seasonally adjusted data will be used for the last 5 years, but the seasonally adjusted indexes will be used before that period. If any of the 51 components change their status from not seasonally adjusted to seasonally adjusted, seasonally adjusted data will be used for the last 5 years, but not seasonally adjusted indexes will be used before that period.

Homeownership Changes

Effective with data for January 1985, the Consumer-Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) has been changed to incorporate a rental equivalence measure of homeownership costs. The Bureau of Labor Statistics announced plans to change the treatment of homeownership costs on October 27, 1981. Effective with release of the index for January 1983, the BLS had made the same changes in the way in which homeownership costs were measured in the CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U).

The rental equivalence approach calculates shelter cost of homeownership based on the implicit

rent owners would have to pay to rent the homes they own. The old method calculated homeownership costs as home purchase, mortgage interest costs, property taxes, property insurance, and maintenance and repair. As with the CPI-U, the new homeownership component has been introduced into the CPI-W in such a manner that the indexes using the old and new methods were equal in the so-called link month—December 1984 for the CPI-W. BLS will continue to calculate and make available the CPI-W using the old homeownership approach for the 6-month period from January to June 1985. For more information, see the CPI Detailed Report for January 1983, pp. 7-13.

Treatment of Vacant Units

Effective with the January 1985 CPI, BLS introduced a technical modification in the method of calculating price change from data collected for the CPI Housing Survey. The enhancement relates to the treatment of units reported as vacant. It applies both to "owners' equivalent rent" (rental equivalence) and to "rent residential" in both the CPI-U and CPI-W.


Part of the price change calculation method is a technique that imputes a rent to any rental housing unit in the sample that is classified as "nonresponse," including failures to contract, refusals, and vacant housing units. The imputed rents are based on previously collected information for the nonresponse unit and current information on units that did respond. For example, an imputed rent is computed by increasing or decreasing the previously reported rent by the average percent change in rent in other units. It is important to impute a rent for nonresponse; otherwise, it would be assumed that they experienced no price change.

Under the method in place before January 1985, BLS used the same imputation technique for all types of nonresponse. Research has demonstated that vacant units cannot be accurately imputed with a method developed primarily for other types of nonresponse. Vacant dwellings are almost always in the process of getting new occupants, and rents are more likely to change when there is a new occupant. BLS has developed a new procedure which imputes rents for vacant units from rental units with a recent change in occupant rather than from all rental units.¹

The new price change calculation procedure uses this new process for vacant units and the original imputation technique for other types of nonresponse. In a 38-month simulation, the new method produced indexes for both residential rent and owners' equivalent rent that were slightly higher (by less than 0.1 percent per month) than under the old method, suggesting that the old method missed some price change that occurred when units were temporarily vacant.
