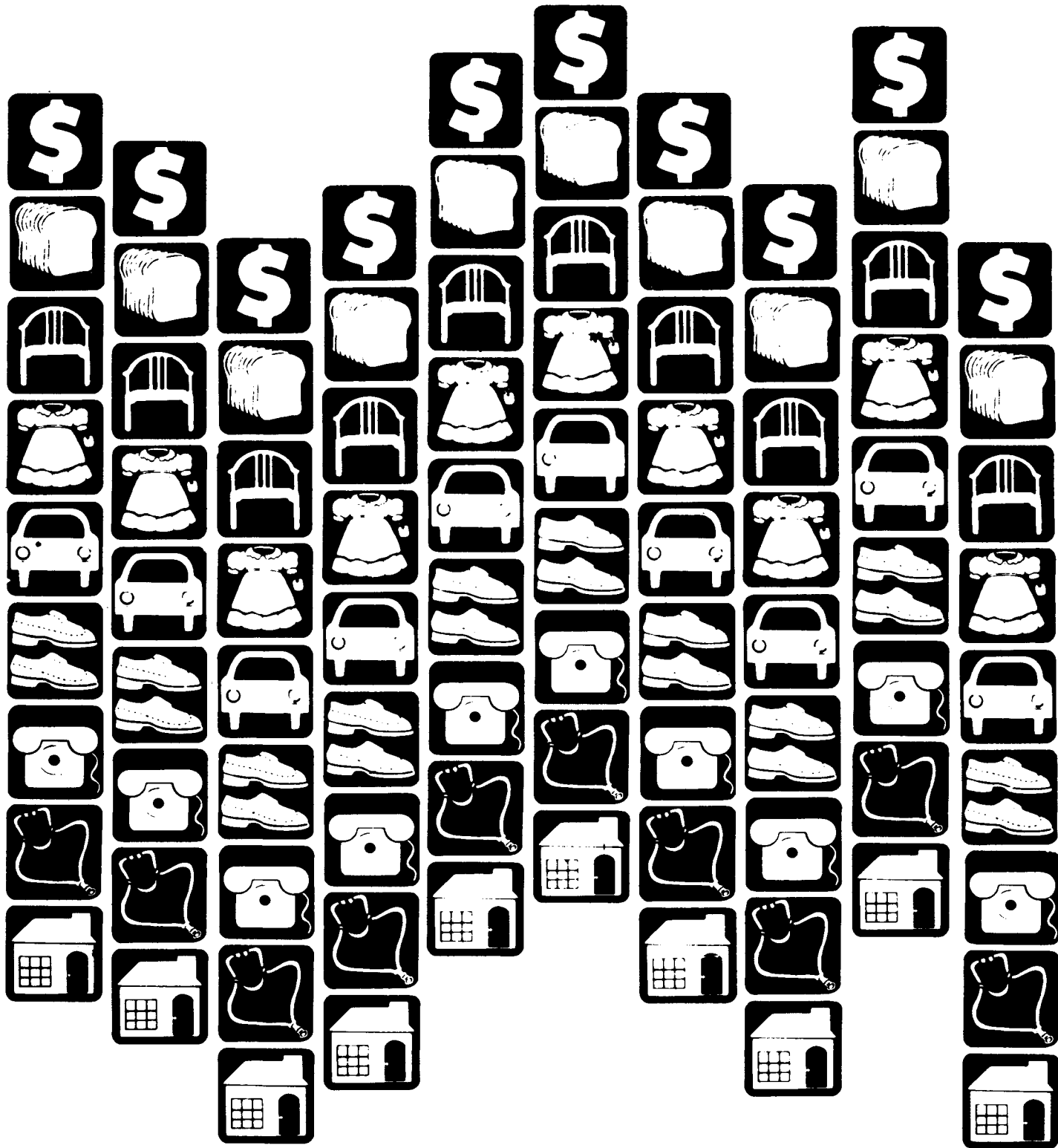

The indexes reflect data for the U.S. city average and selected areas.

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Price Movements

May 1989

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) rose 0.6 percent before seasonal adjustment in May to a level of 123.8 (1982-84=100). For the 12-month period ended in May, the CPI-U increased 5.4 percent.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) also rose 0.6 percent in May prior to seasonal adjustment. The May 1989 CPI-W level of 122.5 was 5.4 percent higher than the index in May 1988.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI-U rose 0.6 percent in May following a 0.7-percent increase in April. Energy costs continued to advance in May—up 1.6 percent—but by substantially less than the 5.1-percent rise in April. Gasoline prices rose 3.9 percent in May after advancing 11.4 percent in April and accounted for about one-quarter of the overall increase in the May CPI-U. The food index, reflecting a sharp increase in fruit and vegetable prices, rose 0.6 percent in May, about the same as the average monthly increase during the first four months of 1989. Shelter costs, which rose 0.1 percent in April, increased 0.5 percent in May. The index for all items excluding food, shelter, and energy increased 0.5 percent in May after registering a 0.2-percent rise in April. Advances in the indexes for apparel, tobacco, and automobile finance charges accounted for over 60 percent of this acceleration.

During the first 5 months of 1989, the CPI-U rose at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 6.7 percent. This compares with a 4.4-percent increase for the 12-month period ended

in December 1988. The sharp upturn in petroleum-based energy prices and the larger increase in food prices have been principally responsible for the recent acceleration in the CPI. Shelter costs have risen the same as in 1988, while the all items less food, shelter, and energy index has advanced at a 5.1-percent rate, a somewhat faster pace than last year's 4.7-percent increase.

The food and beverage index rose 0.6 percent in May. Grocery store food prices, which increased 0.6 percent in April, advanced 0.8 percent in May, with a 3.2-percent increase in the index for fruits and vegetables accounting for two-thirds of the rise. In particular, prices for tomatoes, reflecting weather-induced supply shortages, jumped 29.8 percent. The index for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs advanced 0.6 percent. Poultry prices rose 3.2 percent and beef prices were up 0.5 percent. In contrast, pork prices declined 1.5 percent in May. Among other grocery store food groups, prices for cereal and bakery products continued to rise, advancing 0.8 percent. The index for dairy products, however, turned down in May, declining 0.3 percent. The other two components of the food and beverage index—restaurant meals and alcoholic beverages—increased 0.4 and 0.7 percent, respectively.

Over three-fourths of the 1.0-percent increase in the May transportation component was accounted for by a 3.9-percent rise in the index for motor fuels. Gasoline prices have advanced 21.2 percent in the first 5 months of 1989 to a level 14.5 percent below their March 1981 peak. Automobile prices declined for the second consecutive month; new vehicle prices decreased 0.1 percent and used car prices were unchanged in May. Automobile finance charges, however,

rose 0.7 percent in May after declining 1.2 percent in April. The index for public transportation rose 0.4 percent in May.

The housing index increased 0.4 percent in May following a 0.1-percent rise in April. Shelter costs, which rose 0.1 percent in April, increased 0.5 percent in May. Within shelter, renters' costs were unchanged, homeowners' costs rose 0.7 percent, and maintenance and repair costs increased 0.1 percent. The index for household fuels and other utilities advanced 0.2 percent as a decline in prices for household fuels was more than offset by a 0.6-percent increase in the other utilities and public services component. Within fuels, declines in the indexes for natural gas and fuel oil—down 2.5 and 0.2 percent, respectively—more than offset a 0.8-percent increase in charges for electricity. Within the other utilities and public services component, the index for telephone services rose 0.6 percent, as increases in charges for local calls and intrastate calls more than offset a decline in interstate calls. The index for household furnishings and operations increased 0.3 percent in May.

The index for apparel and upkeep rose 0.8 percent in May following seasonal adjustment. Smaller than usual seasonal price declines for women's and girls' clothing—up 1.5 percent after seasonal adjustment—were largely responsible for the May increase.

The medical care component rose 0.7 percent in May and has advanced 7.3 percent during the past 12 months. The index for medical care commodities—prescription drugs, nonprescription drugs, and medical supplies—increased 1.1 percent. The index for medical care services rose 0.5 percent, with the cost of professional services and hospital related services both up 0.6 percent.

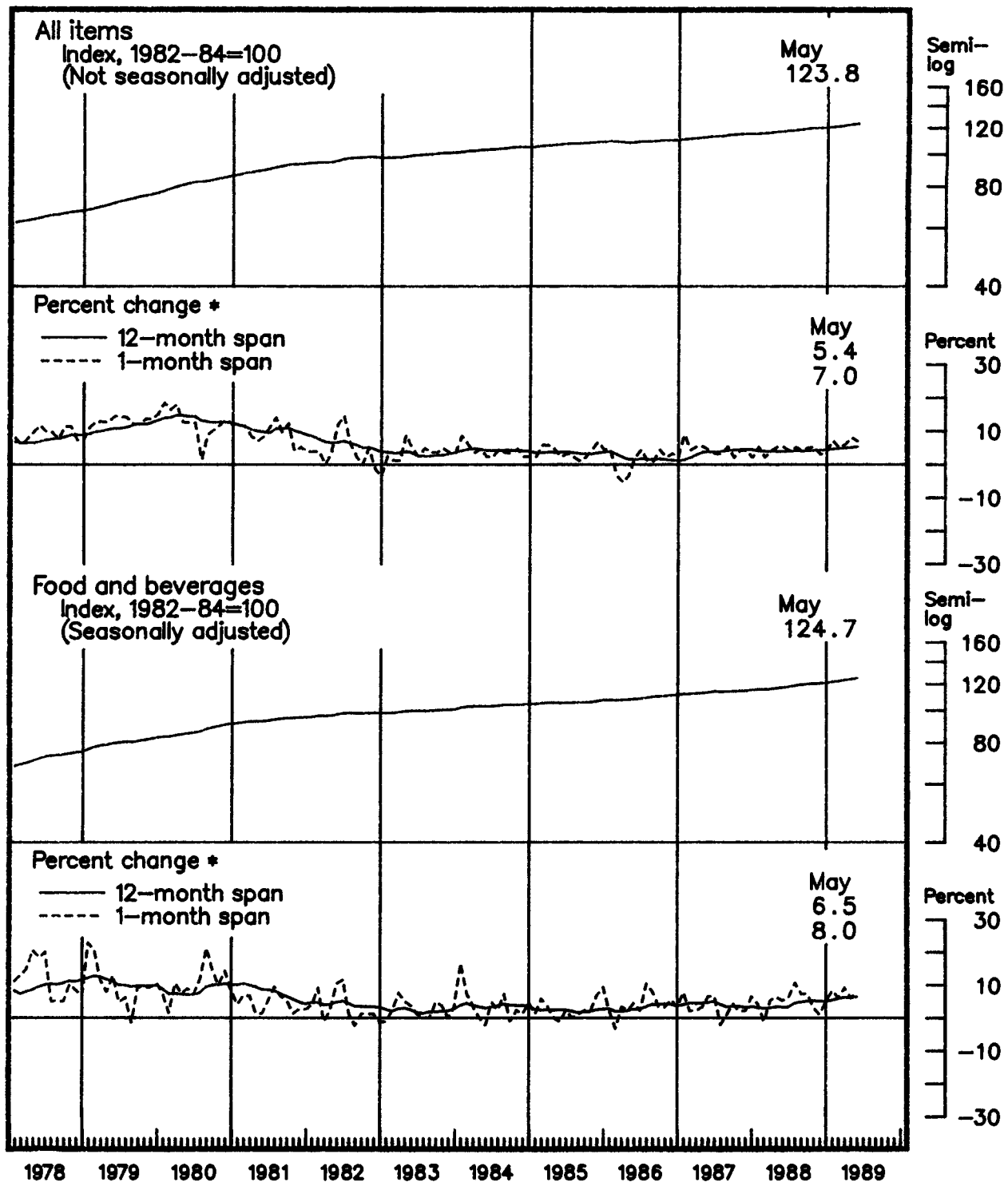
Entertainment costs rose 0.1 percent in May. A 0.3-percent increase in prices for entertainment commodities was partially offset by a decline in charges for entertainment services, in particular admissions to movies, theaters, concerts, operas, and other musical events, and sporting events and fees for participant sports.

The index for other goods and services rose 0.7 percent in May. Increases in the indexes for tobacco products and personal care accounted for about half of the May increase in this component.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)

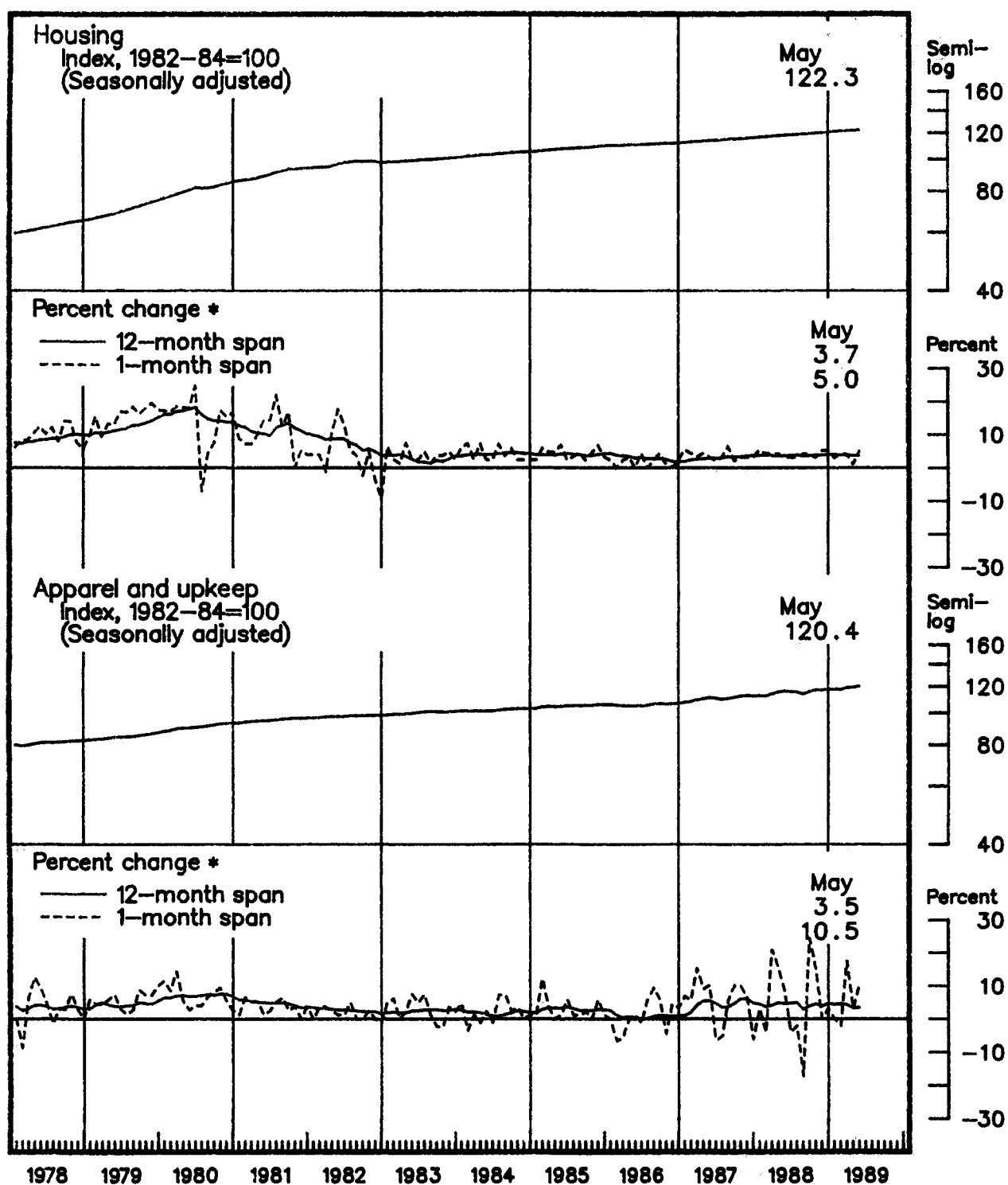
On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers also rose 0.6 percent in May.

Chart 1: CPI-U: All items, food and beverages, 1978-89



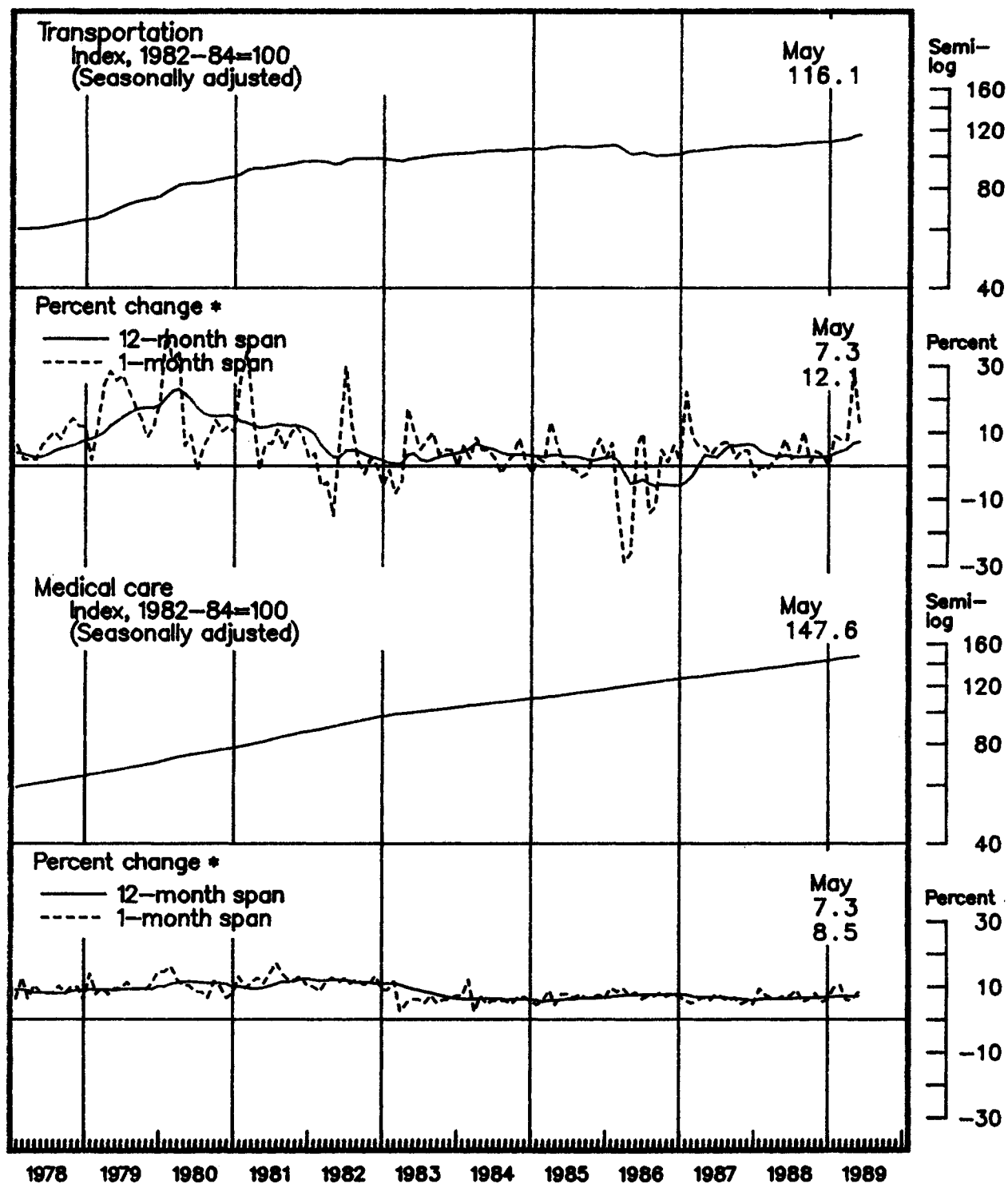
* Percent changes over 12-month spans are calculated from unadjusted data. Percent changes over 1-month spans are annual rates calculated from seasonally adjusted data.

Chart 2: CPI-U: Housing, apparel and upkeep, 1978-89



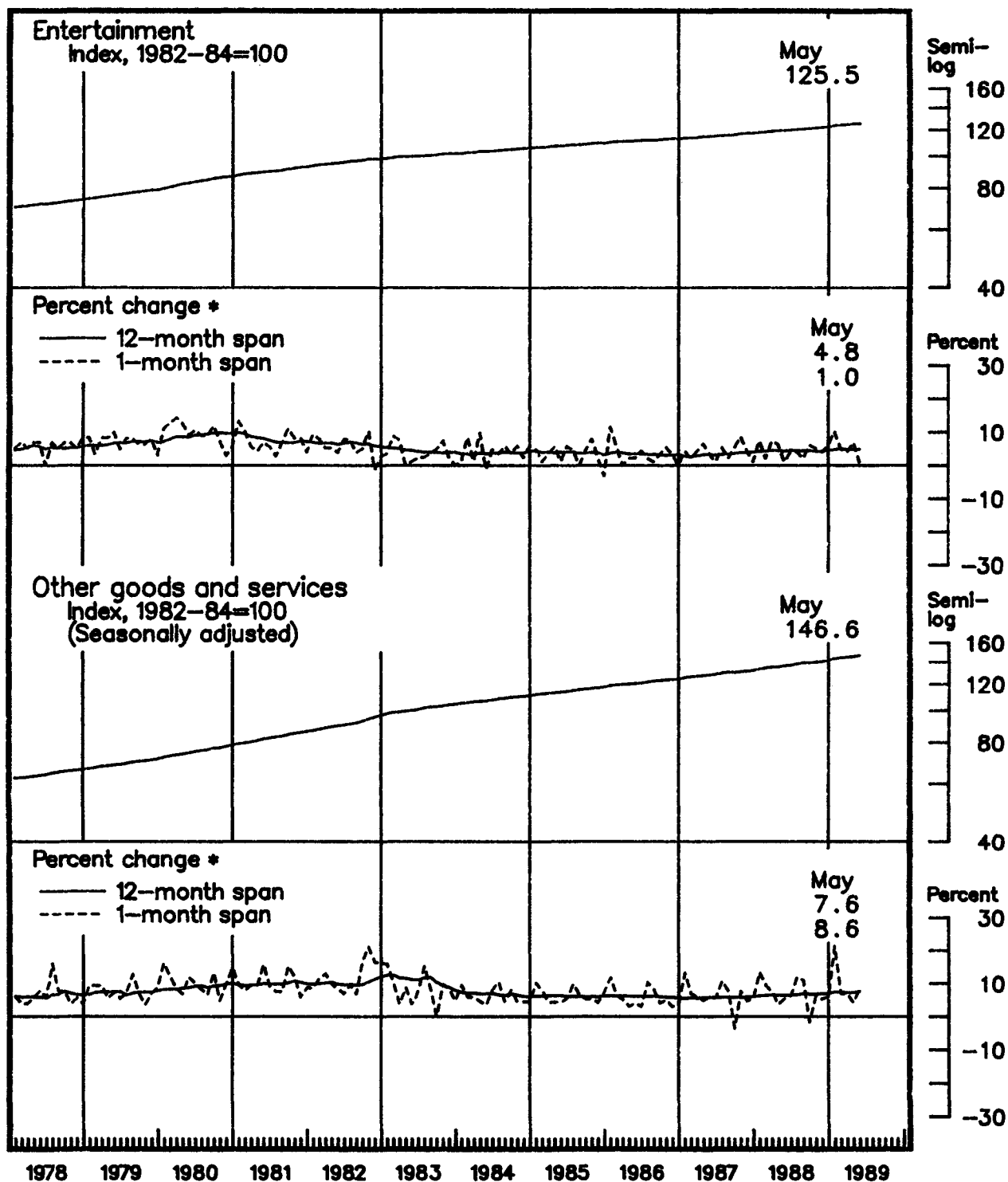

Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPI's for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total population and (2), a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers 32 percent of the total population. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from about 57,000 housing units and approximately 19,000 retail establishments—department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuels, and a few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by personal visits of the Bureau's trained representatives. Some data, such as used car prices, are obtained from secondary sources.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published by size of city, by region of the country, for cross calculations of regions and population-size classes, and for 27 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities, they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The indexes measure price change from a designated reference date, 1982-84, which equals 100.0. An increase of 7 percent, for example, is shown as 107.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: The price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$100 in 1982-84 to \$107.

Calculating Index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points, because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-month and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

Energy Prices

Price are usually available for the U.S. city average, 28 large urban areas, and 16 areas reflecting the four Census regions cross-classified by four population sizes. However, not all energy commodities and services are used in every area of the country. Fuel oil, for example, is not a common heating fuel in some urban areas, particularly in the South and West. Where no average prices are available, the designation NA will also appear if the data sufficiency criteria have not been met in any given month. For example, if there are fewer than five usable fuel oil prices for a published city or region size class, no fuel oil prices for the area will be published.

All prices are collected monthly by BLS representatives in the urban areas priced for the CPI. Prices for natural gas and electricity include fuel and purchased gas adjustments and all applicable taxes. Fuel oil and gasoline prices include applicable Federal, State, and local taxes.

Natural gas and electricity. Natural gas prices are reported in therms, which are a measure of heating value. Electricity prices are given in kilowatt hours (kwh). For both utility services, the consumption ranges specified in table P2 are the upper and lower limits of the bill sizes priced for the Consumer Price Index. The average prices per therm and per kilowatt hour are calculated from bills priced within these ranges. It should be noted that bills priced for the CPI are not only for different consumption amounts, but may also be calculated from different types of residential rate schedules. *The average prices per therm and per kilowatt hour are not, therefore, generally suitable for use in place-to-place price comparisons.*

The average prices for 40 and 100 therms of natural gas for 500 kilowatt hours of electricity (table P1) are calculated from a special price collection program. They are not used in the calculation of the CPI. Since heating and air-conditioning requirements vary by geographic location, climate, and weather conditions, it cannot be inferred that these consumption amounts represent those used by a typical residential consumer. These bills are used merely to track price changes over time for constant amounts of consumption, and to provide continuity with prices of natural gas and electricity formerly published in conjunction with the unrevised Consumer Price Index.

Fuel oil. Only #2 fuel oil (home heating oil) is priced. Prices are collected, in most cases, for quantities greater than one gallon. These prices are converted to a gallon price for this program. Fuel oil prices reflect discounts for quantity and/or quick payment.

Gasoline. Gasoline prices are collected at the pump from a sample of full service, mini-service, and self-serve gas stations.

Approximate British Thermal Unit (BTU) values for some energy items are as follows, according to the source indicated:

1 therm = 100,000 BTU'S (U.S. Department of Energy).

1 kwh = 3,412 BTU'S (Edison Electric Institute)

1 gallon #2 fuel oil = 140,000 BTU'S (U.S. Department of Energy).

Food Prices

In the revised CPI, actual weighted average prices are calculated each month at the national level and for the four Census geographic regions. As a result of changes in price collection methodology and sample sizes, average prices for individual cities cannot in general be produced. It is hoped, however, that regional average prices will help satisfy the need for local area data. It should be noted that the average food prices in this report reflect variations in brand, quality, and size among geographic areas. Users of average food prices should be aware that these differences exist.

Because a number of food commodities are not available in all areas on a year-round basis, prices will not appear in some months for some regions or for the U.S. city average. In other instances, sufficient prices may not be available due to temporary disruptions in supplies. Where no average prices are available, the designation NA will appear. When a price is not available from an individual store in any month, an estimated price will be calculated for the missing item and used in computing the average price. In cases where the proportion of estimated prices used to calculate the average is considered too high, the average price will not be published and NA will appear for that item in the table.

Because of space limitations in the table, the description for each item is abbreviated. More detailed specifications are available from the BLS regional offices or from the Washington office upon request.

Reference Base Change

Beginning with the release of data for January 1988 in February 1988, most Consumer Price Indexes have shifted to a new reference base year. All indexes previously expressed on a base of 1967=100, or any other base through December 1981, have been rebased to 1982-84=100. Only indexes with a base later than December 1981 have maintained their bases. This base change was reviewed by the Office of Federal Statistical Policy and Standards, Office of Management and Budget, and is in keeping with the Government's longstanding policy to update index bases periodically. Selection of the 1982-84 period was made to coincide with the updated expenditure weights, which are based upon data tabulated from the Consumer Expenditure Surveys for 1982, 1983, and 1984. The last rebasing of CPI data occurred in February

1971, when the 1967 base was substituted for the former 1957-59 base.

Historical data for each CPI series on the new base are available from the Bureau of Labor Statistics. For the convenience of users, the BLS will continue to publish all-items indexes for the U.S. city average, and for the individual local areas for which CPI's are published, on their former official reference base (1967=100 in most cases).

Conversion factors and an accompanying fact sheet on rebasing are available from BLS. Dividing by one of these factors will rebase the related index series from its current 1982-84 base to its previous reference base. (*Users should note:* Because of rounding effects, there may be occasional minor differences between the final rebased index and the result obtained using the conversion factor.)

Adjustment of Shelter Indexes for Aging Effects

Beginning with the January 1988 CPI, the Bureau of Labor Statistics adjusted the monthly CPI shelter indexes for the change in quality resulting from the effect of aging on rental housing. In January 1987, the Bureau announced its intention to begin making such adjustments, assuming that further research substantiated the need to do so. The decision to implement the adjustment was based on extensive BLS research, in which alternative adjustment methods were explored and tested. Evaluation of the research indicates that an aging effect exists, and that the chosen method is operationally feasible.¹ The adjustment affects CPI shelter indexes, which would have been raised by 0.2 percent for the year 1987 had an aging adjustment been applied.

The quality of a housing unit decreases as the unit ages. Existing BLS methods are used to correct for relatively easily measured quality changes such as the addition of an extra bedroom, but such methods are inadequate to correct for deterioration in the condition of housing units.² The aging adjustment method was specifically designed to correct for quality changes associated with this deterioration. The BLS

used hedonic regression methods to estimate the aging effect. The estimates were then used to correct the CPI rent and rental equivalence indexes. Hedonic regressions are statistical functions that relate the price of a good to its attributes or characteristics. For example, a hedonic regression relates a housing unit's rent to its size, age, location, etc. By using BLS housing survey data from 1987 and Census data from 1980, hedonic regression methods provided estimates of the relationship between a housing unit's rent and age while other housing unit characteristics were held constant. The estimated relationship was then used to construct the aging adjustment. Estimates will be recomputed annually by using the previous year's BLS housing survey data and the most recently available Census data.

Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month.

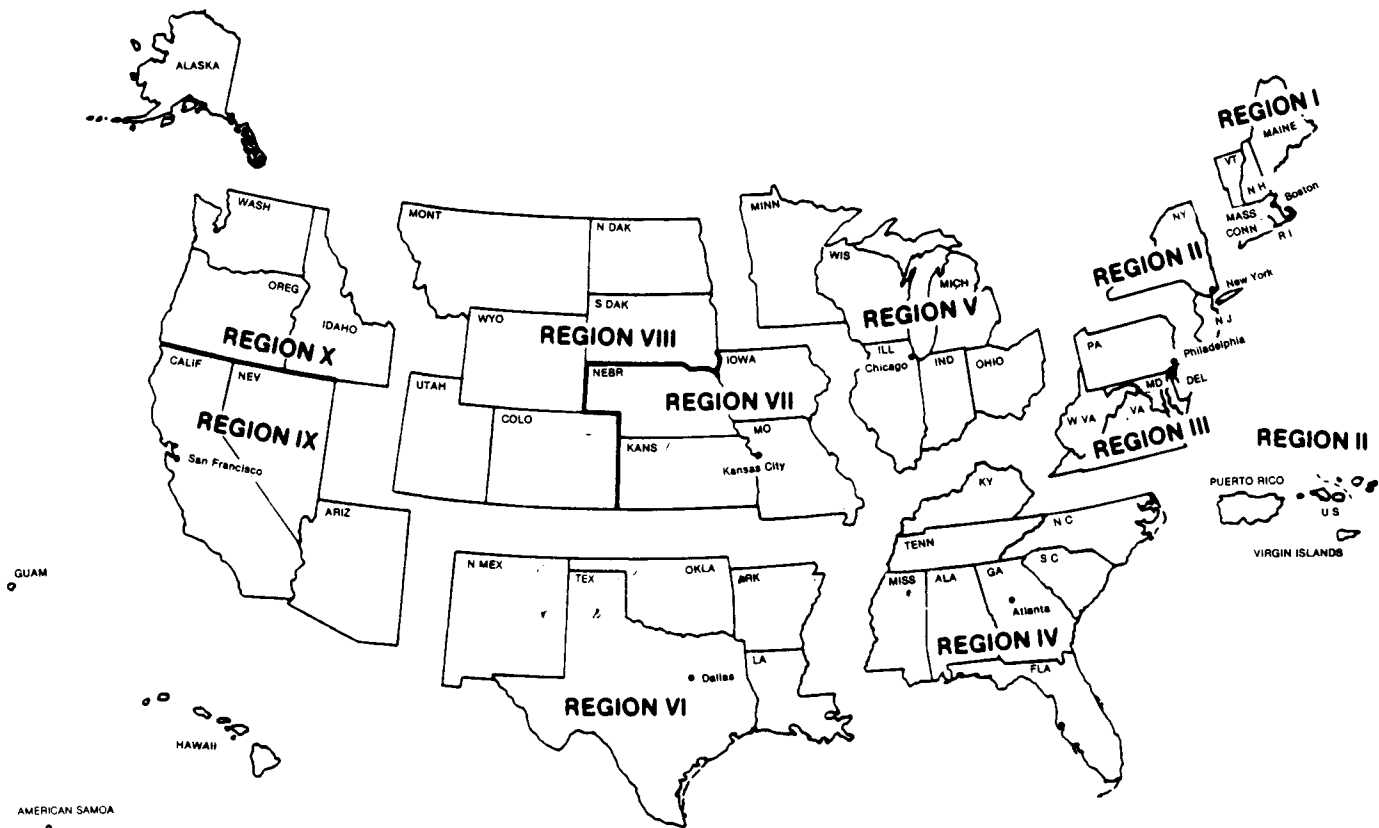
For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year—such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data also are used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

Seasonal factors used in computing the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11 Seasonal Adjustment Method. The updated seasonal data at the end of 1977 replaced data from 1967 through 1977. Subsequent annual updates have replaced 5 years of seasonal data, e.g., data from 1984 through 1988 were replaced at the end of 1988. The seasonal movement of all items and 43 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 50 selected components. Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluated based upon certain statistical criteria. If any of the 50 components change their seasonal adjustment status from seasonally adjusted to not seasonally adjusted, not seasonally adjusted data will be used for the last 5 years, but the seasonally adjusted indexes will be used before that period.
