

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The CPI Detailed Report is a monthly report on consumer price movements, including statistical tables and technical notes. The report covers two indexes, the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) and the Consumer Price Index for Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). The indexes reflect data for the U.S. city average and selected areas.

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Price Movements

July 1985

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) increased 0.2 percent before seasonal adjustment in July to a level of 322.8 (1967 = 100). For the 12-month period ended in July, the CPI-U increased 3.6 percent.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) rose 0.1 percent in July, prior to seasonal adjustment. The July 1985 CPI-W level of 319.1 was 3.8 percent higher than the index in July 1984. The CPI-W is used for indexing Social Security and some other Federal payments. It is also commonly used as an escalator in collective bargaining agreements.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for All Urban Consumers rose 0.2 percent in July, the same as in May and June. Shelter costs, which have advanced at a 6-percent seasonally adjusted annual rate so far this year, accounted for nearly three-fourths of the increase in the July CPI. Of the seven major expenditure groups, only the index for other goods and services rose faster in July than in June, reflecting an increase in cigarette prices.

The July advance of 0.3 percent in the housing index was the same as in June. A larger increase in the shelter cost component—up 0.6 percent in July after advancing 0.4 percent in June—was offset by a slowdown in the index for fuel and utilities and a larger decline in the index for household furnishings and operations. Within the

shelter component, renters' costs and homeowners' costs each advanced 0.6 percent, while the cost of maintenance and repairs rose 0.1 percent. The index for fuel and other utilities was unchanged in July, following an increase of 0.6 percent in June. Prices for fuel oil continued to decline—down 1.5 percent in July—and are now 16.6 percent below their peak level of April 1981. Charges for electricity declined 0.6 percent, following seasonal adjustment. The index for natural gas rose 0.7 percent in July and is now 0.5 percent above its level a year ago. The index for telephone services rose 0.8 percent as increases in local charges—up 1.4 percent—and intrastate toll calls—up 1.2 percent—more than offset a 1.7-percent decline in interstate toll calls.

The food and beverage component rose 0.1 percent in July, the same as in June. Grocery store food prices increased 0.1 percent, registering their first increase since February. A turnaround in the index for fruits and vegetables was primarily responsible. Fresh vegetable prices, which declined 8.9 percent in the second quarter, rose 6.5 percent in July and more than offset the continued decline in fresh fruit prices—down 4.3 percent. On the other hand, the index for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs, which had recorded its first monthly increase of this year in June, declined again in July. Decreases in beef and poultry prices offset increases in prices for pork, fish, and eggs. Beef prices have declined in each of the first 7 months of 1985 and are 7.4 percent below their December 1984 level. Among other grocery store

food groups, the indexes for both cereal and bakery products and dairy products were unchanged in July. Indexes for restaurant meals and alcoholic beverages—the other two components of the food and beverage index—were up 0.1 percent and unchanged, respectively.

The transportation component declined for the third consecutive month, following large increases in March and April. Large declines in used car prices and a slowdown in gasoline prices have been responsible for the overall transportation decline in the May-July period. The index for gasoline registered its first decline since February, although before seasonal adjustment posted pump prices rose slightly. The index for gasoline prices is now 11.4 percent below its peak level of March 1981. New car prices continued to register moderate increases, advancing 0.2 percent in July, the same as the average monthly increase so far during this model year. Automobile finance charges—down 0.9 percent—declined for the eighth consecutive month. Prices for tires and motor oil and other lubricants also declined in July. On the other hand, charges for automobile inspections, drivers' license fees, registration fees, and automobile rentals all rose sharply in July. The index for public transportation—up 0.8 percent—registered its largest increase in 12 months, primarily due to a substantial increase in intracity mass transit fares. Increases in intercity bus and train fares also contributed to this advance.

The index for apparel and upkeep declined 0.2 percent in July, following a 0.3 percent increase in June. A 0.4 percent decrease in clothing prices was only partially offset by a 0.6 percent increase in charges for apparel services. End-of-season price reductions for clothing in July were larger than in recent years.

The medical care component rose 0.5 percent in July, slightly less than the 0.6-percent average monthly rate during the first 6 months of the year. The indexes for both medical care commodities—prescription drugs, nonprescription drugs, and medical care supplies—and medical care services also increased 0.5 percent. Within

medical care services, physicians' fees rose 0.6 percent, while charges for hospital rooms declined 0.4 percent, after seasonal adjustment.

The other goods and services component advanced 0.8 percent in July, primarily due to a 1.6 percent increase in prices for tobacco products. The entertainment index rose 0.5 percent, the same as in June, again reflecting a sharp increase in prices for magazines, periodicals, and books.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers rose 0.1 percent in July, compared with an increase of 0.2 percent in the CPI-U. (The rental equivalence approach to homeownership has been used in the CPI-W since January 1985. The methodology and samples of areas, items, outlets, and prices are identical in both the CPI-W and the CPI-U, and differences in monthly changes result only from different expenditure patterns and seasonal adjustment factors.)

Changes in frequency of publication for local area CPI's to begin in 1987

The Bureau of Labor Statistics will improve the sample of urban areas in which it gathers prices for monthly preparation of the Consumer Price Index beginning in 1987. At the same time, the Bureau will publish a number of local area CPI's less frequently.

The changes in publication frequency arise from the requirement to allocate the sample to reflect population shifts in the 1980 census so as to provide the most accurate national CPI possible with the funds available. As a result, some local areas will no longer have samples sufficient to permit more frequent publication.

In addition to the national index for all cities, the Bureau now publishes indexes for 28 urban areas. In 1987, it will continue to publish indexes for all but one of these areas—Northeast Pennsylvania (Scranton—Wilkes-Barre).

Of the remaining 27 published urban areas, 13 will have a reduction in frequency beginning in 1987. The index for Detroit, currently published monthly, will be published only in the even numbered months. Twelve areas now published bimonthly will be compiled on a semiannual average basis. These areas are: Buffalo-Niagara Falls, NY; Cincinnati-Hamilton, OH-KY-IN; Kansas City, MO-Kansas City, KS; Milwaukee, WI; Minneapolis-St. Paul, MN-WI; Atlanta, GA; Anchorage, AK; Denver-Boulder, CO; Honolulu, HI; Portland-Vancouver, OR-WA; San Diego, CA; and Seattle-Tacoma, WA. These semi-annual average indexes, which refer to the arithmetic averages of the 6-month periods from January through June and July through December, will be published with release of the CPI for July and January, respectively, i.e., in the months

of August and February. These series will be compiled and published on their present reference bases, 1967 = 100 for all areas other than Anchorage, which is on an October 1967 reference base. Also, the Cleveland-Akron-Lorain, OH, indexes will be published in odd-numbered rather than even-numbered months.

Homeownership changes

As announced in October 1981, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has changed the treatment of homeownership costs in the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) effective with release of data for January 1985. See the last page of the Technical Notes for additional detail.

Reconciling Two Measures of Consumer Price Change: Second Quarter 1985

This article continues the analysis presented in the April 1985 *CPI Detailed Report* of differences between two major price measures—The Consumer Price Index (CPI-U) published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Implicit Price Deflator for Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) published by the Bureau of Economic Analysis of the Department of Commerce. More information on the technique of reconciliation appears in the September 1981 *Monthly Labor Review*.¹

Cumulative differences

The reconciliation begins with a comparison of cumulative percent changes in the indexes from the 1972 reference base (1972=100) through the second quarter of 1985 (see table C). During this period, the CPI-U advanced 156.3 percent to a level of 256.3 while the PCE rose 126.4 percent to a level of 226.4. The total cumulative difference between the two measures grew only 0.9 percentage point in the second quarter after increasing 0.2 point in the first quarter of 1985 and is now 29.9 percent. Removing the constant residual housing effect (14.1 percent for quarterly data), the remaining cumulative difference of 15.8 percent is attributable to the effects of weighting and "other" differences.²

Weighting differences increased from a first quarter 1985 level of 11.8 percentage points to 12.5 points in the second quarter. This increase of 0.7 point follows a 0.1-percentage point increase between fourth quarter 1984

and first quarter 1985. The "other" effects increased 0.1 percentage point in the first quarter and 0.2 point in the second quarter and now account for a cumulative difference of 3.3 percentage points.


Period-to period differences

Analysis of differences in the annual and quarterly rates of change in the CPI and PCE (see table D) makes use of the chain-weight PCE in place of the current-weight PCE.³ This PCE index increased at an annual rate


of 4.1 percent during the second quarter, 0.1 percent less than the 4.2-percent increase in the CPI-U. During the first quarter of 1985, the chain-weighted PCE had increased 0.4 percent less than the CPI-U. Comparing the chain-weighted PCE with the fixed 1972-weighted index which was 0.2 percentage point lower than the PCE rate using fixed weights. The second-quarter rates for the CPI-U and the fixed-weight PCE, which determine the "other" effects, showed a 0.1-percent differences, the same as in the first quarter.

Chart 1. CPI-U: All items, food and beverages, 1974-85




* Percent changes over 12-month spans are calculated from unadjusted data. Percent changes over 1-month spans are annual rates calculated from seasonally adjusted data.

Chart 2. CPI-U: Housing, apparel and upkeep, 1974-85





NOTE: Local area CPI indexes are by-products of the national CPI program. Because each local index is a small subset of the national index, it has a smaller sample size and is, therefore, subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar. Therefore, the Bureau of Labor Statistics strongly urges users to consider adopting the national average CPI for use in escalator clauses.

Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPI's for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total noninstitutional civilian population; and (2) a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which represents about half the population covered by the CPI-U. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from about 4,000 food stores, 24,000 rental units, and 28,000 establishments—department stores, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuels, and a few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by personal visits of the Bureau's trained representatives. Mail questionnaires are used to obtain public utility rates, some fuel prices, and certain other items.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published by size of city, by region of the country, for cross-classifications of regions and population-size classes, and for 28 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices

among cities, they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date—1967—which equals 100.0. An increase of 203 percent, for example, is shown as 303.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: The price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1967 to \$30.30.

Calculating Index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points, because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-month and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

Homeownership Changes

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) has been changed to incorporate a rental equivalence measure of homeowners' costs in accordance with plans announced by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) on October 27, 1981. For the CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), this change was effective with release of the index for January 1983 and for the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), it was effective with the release of the January 1985 index. The rental equivalence approach calculates shelter costs of homeowners based on the implicit rent owners would have to pay to rent homes that they own. The old method calculated homeownership as home purchase, mortgage interest costs, property taxes, property insurance, and maintenance and repairs. The new homeownership component was introduced into both the CPI-U and the CPI-W in such a manner that in each case the indexes using the old and new methodologies were equal in the so-called "link month"—December 1982 for the CPI-U and December 1984 for the CPI-W. Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month.


For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year—such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data also are used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

Seasonal factors used in computing the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11 Seasonal Adjustment Method. The updated seasonal data at the end of 1977 replaced data from 1967 through 1977. Subsequent annual updates have replaced 5 years of seasonal data, e.g., data from 1980 through 1984 were replaced at the end of 1984. The seasonal movement of all items and 44 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 51 selected components. Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluated based upon certain statistical criteria. If any of the 51 components change their seasonal adjustment status from seasonally adjusted to not seasonally adjusted, not seasonally adjusted data will be used for the last 5 years, but the seasonally adjusted indexes will be used before that period. If any of the 51 components change their status from not seasonally adjusted to seasonally adjusted, seasonally adjusted data will be used for the last 5 years, but not seasonally adjusted indexes will be used before that period.
